EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE NAMED FOR C. C. MEMORIAL ASS'N.
At the Thursday evening meeting of the Knox Curtis Post No. 42, of the American Legion, an

Executive Committee was appointed by Post Commander Bill Nesbitt to handle the Coryell County Memorial for Veterans of World War II.
Jap Laird was named Chairman, Roger Miller, treasurer, and Wade Sadler, Lou Hatter, Carl McClelland, Jack Roach, A. W. Ellis and Oscar Fowler, as members of the committee.
It was voted to request the Gatesville Lions Club to sponsor the memorial drive to solicit funds to buy a lot, erect a building as a memorial to veterans of both World War I and II.

"CHAMPEENSHIP" OF THE "HOODS" TO BE DECLARED HERE FRIDAY NIGHT
Gatesville Friday night will be the scene of a clash between the two Hood elevens, undefeated and untied 4th Army Maroons at North Camp and also undefeated and untied South Camp.
Both teams appear pretty evenly matched although the 4th army team appears a little ahead on the basis of percentages. The North Camp team is in a first place tie with the AAF Skymasters for first place in the Texas service league. The 4th Army gridders boast victories over Allen Academy, (12-0), John Tarleton College (12-0), and the Ellington Field players (6-0). South Camp has only played one game, winning from the Tarleton ploughboys 20-0.
Picking a winner of this game is like comparing two dark nights, although the 4th army has a more rounded and balanced squad. Both teams played Tarleton, N. Camp playing them in the mud and winning by two touchdowns, although fumbles cost them two more TDs. The North Camp eleven made 16 first downs to JTC 0. On a dry field South Camp thumped the Ploughboys 20-0, mainly thru the efforts of Busby, 165 pound half-back. First downs were slightly in favor of victors.
The Maroons have a constant scoring threat with such backs as Szekely, Meyer, Brush, and Papson and Greenlee at full. The passing combination of Szekely and White, former Ohio State flanker. NAZI WAR CRIMINALS CHARGED IN BERLIN

BERLIN, Oct. 18 (AP)—Massive book-size indictments charging German war criminals collectively and individually with crimes against humanity was filed today at the first public session of the International War Crimes Tribunal.

Twenty-four top-ranking Nazis included Hermann Goering, Rudolf Hess, Joachim von Ribbentrop, were given 30 days to prepare their cases.

CIO ELECTRICIANS STRIKE IN DETROIT

DETROIT, Oct. 18 (AP)—CIO organized electrical power workers began a strike in Michigan today but by mid-morning the service was continuing in affected areas to two million inhabitants and industrial centers.

The superintendent of the power plant near Saginaw said he expected to continue operations "as best we can" with men still on duty. A wage dispute is involved.

TRUMAN ASKS BRITAIN TO OPEN PALESTINE

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18 (AP)—President Truman said today the United States has asked Britain to open Palestine to 100,000 Jewish refugees but Prime Minister Attlee did not want to admit that many. The President said the whole matter was still under consideration.

HIROHITO'S PALACE NEARLY DESTROYED

TOYKO, Oct. 18 (AP)—Emperor Hirohito's palace, with the exception of one wing, was burned to the ground during the war, Brig. Gen. Elliot Thorp said today. He explained the fire started from sparks from blazing buildings in Tokyo.

SCHOOL BUS INSPECTION MONDAY, 22, 10 A. M. HERE

School buses of Coryell county will be inspected by Sgt. A. L. Chilcote of the Texas State Highway Patrol Monday, Oct. 22, at 10 o'clock.

Busses will report on S. 7th street just one block off the square and will be inspected in order of arrival.

These requirements must be met before they will be approved: Identification, signs, entrance facilities, service and emergency doors, driver's vision, rear view mirror and windshield wiper, brakes, foot and emergency, lights, signals, head, clearance, stop, and tail lights, chassis, steering, tires, general safety, fire extinguisher, first aid kit, muffler and exhaust pipe.

There are 40 busses carrying over 1900 students and they earn \$35,000 during the school year. The state pays transportation at \$2.75 per month on elementary students and \$3 on high school students.

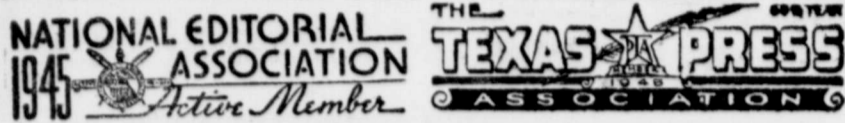

GETS SILVER STAR

Camp Chaffee, Ark.—S. Sgt. C. F. Weiss of the 44th Inf. Div. has been awarded the Silver Star for gallantry in action February 15, 1945, near Buchenbusch Woods, France.

In making the ward, to the man who's outfit was 205 days in combat, it was said:

"When an enemy mortar became severely harrassing by its accurate fire, Sgt. Weiss was called upon to lead a combat patrol to destroy it. He and his men crawled approximately 75 yards thru a gap in the enemy lines. Well inside the enemy defenses, the patrol cautiously resumed its advance and found the mortar 250 yards behind the German front. Sgt. Weiss then crawled to within hand grenade range of the enemy weapon and lobbed two white phosphorous grenades into the hostile position, completely neutralizing it and wounding its two crew members. On returning the combat patrol encountered and destroyed an enemy outpost. Sgt. Weiss' gallant action is worthy of praise."

Sgt. Weiss, soon to receive his discharge from the 44th via the pint system is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Chris Weiss of Gatesville.

Here's some more of our fan mail which we always appreciate. This is from Pvt. Ralph L. Mayberry, who has a San Francisco APO, and he says:

"This is just another soldier's viewpoint on demobilization. I think that what I have to say about the demobilization plan has been discussed and moaned about by most of us guys who came in the army at the first call for the 18 year old group. Most of the time when the army hands out ratings they look upon us as a bunch of kids, O. K., so maybe we are, but, the Japs and the Germans didn't take that into consideration when they took a guy's last breath. Did they? Also when the point system came out was any consideration given to the fellows of that 18 year old group. Hell no! We were considered men then. Other incidents have arisen when we should have been put on equal basis with the older persons for our benefit and the answer to that has been "No". These incidents are too numerous to mention. Yes, I know all of us hav had it rougher, but some of their questions and problems have been answered. Some weren't for the simple reason that it might embarrass or cause someone to be put on the spot.

"For example, I have been in the army 30 months and I've served overseas since July '44. This is one of the mistakes I think, of the demobilization plan for there are men who have more points toward a discharge than I have. These men have not served overseas or in the states as long as I have, but some of them are getting out and some are getting out soon, while I will still be here for months after they are civilians. I'm not saying that the men with children shouldn't have additional points, but why so many. It's not fair to the single man. All we want is to get a break somewhere so that we can get home a lot sooner. The officials who have all this in their hands had better see to it that a lot of these bottlenecks in the demobilization plan should be taken out, or they won't be officials long when the soldier gets his vote. There will be young blood taking over a lot of important positions in our government. These men will be put into office by us who were refused our vote because of our age, yes, too young to get to vote but not too young to die.

This story is one of the many that are being uttered by thousands like me, and it all boils down to this. Something is going to bust soon. This is not entirely my opinion but the opinion of thousands of guys in the same boat. We came in as kids, we come out as thinking citizens ready to take our share of the responsibility of our communities as efficiently as we have in the army. A long time isn't it not to have enough points for an immediate return to home. From the rate the discharges are going now I expect several more months over here.

I haven't lost faith in the people back home yet and I don't want that to ever happen. You have all done a swell job so far, but don't let us down at this stage of the game. Your support is necessary if we are to get home soon.

Evans saying he had been liberated from a Jap prison camp, Sept 15, and expected to be home by Oct. 15. In a cablegram from Manila he stated he was in excellent physical condition.

Pvt. Evans who volunteered for overseas duty in March '41, served at Ft. Mills in the Philippines and was captured on Corregidor in May '42. He was held prisoner in Cabanatuan prison camp near Manila until October '44, when he was moved to Fukuoka prison camp on Honshu Island in Japan.

John O. Orvig, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Orvig, Sr., has been in service since August 22, '44, and took 15 weeks raining at Camp Hood. From here he went to a POE and on to combat zones in Germany. He landed here Feb. 2, '45, and was attached to the 9th

army. He was awarded during his combat time, the combat Infantry Badge, Good Conduct, Presidential Unit Citation, and a campaign ribbon with 3 stars.

The 9th captured 219,253 prisoners, shot down 242 enemy planes, built 262 bridges (23,727 feet) and crossed four major rivers, the Roer, Rhine, Weser, and Elbe. Casualties were heavy, but Orvig missed injury. He stayed in the battle zone until May 7, and then went to rest camp.

His wife the former Miss Doris Jackson of Teague received a congratulatory letter from his commanding officer, his Captain, and a U. S. Congressman. When he started in Germany he was Pfc and rose to the rank of staff sergeant. He will be home in December.

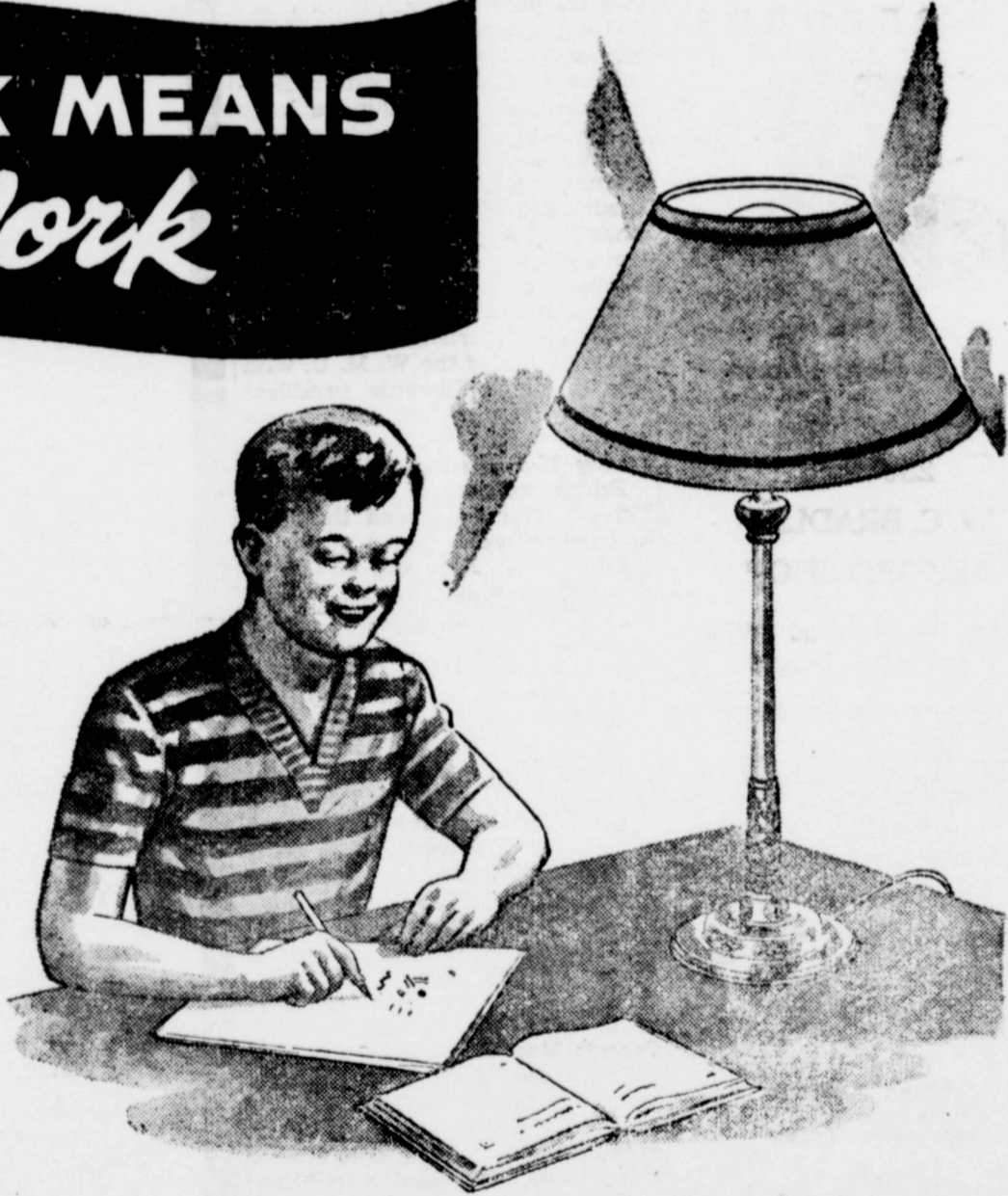

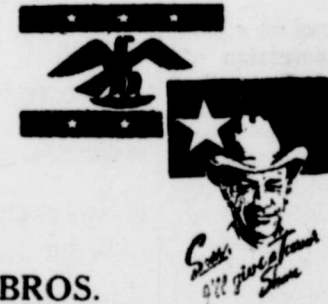

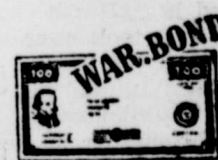

Here's an interesting letter from a boy who signs "Dennie", and he's "Dennie" Dixon.

"We arrived here Sept. 15, it was night and I had to go to work at 3 a. m.

I am just 5 miles from Tokyo. So far as I have seen, this place is not torn up like Manila was. Haven't been around much but I sure want to go see the spot where the atomic

bomb hit. The girls here have a little lighter complexion and are prettier than at Manila.

I sure did hate to leave my other company. I was beginning to like it. Didn't anyone come with me that I knew, but I have learned a good many of the guys already and like them fine.

I never saw so much machinery in my life as the Japs have and most of it was made in Ohio. I don't think much of this pen. I was leaning over the rail coming over and mine fell out of my pocket into the ocean. I didn't think enough of it to dive for it.

We really had a ride for our money coming up her. We hit a typhoon and the sea was awfully rough, but I still didn't get sea sick. Our boat was so crowded we couldn't get around much and looked like all legs. We had tents up between vehicles on the top deck and when the storm came, we had to take them down. We had to sleep anywhere we could find a place and went from 36 to 48 hours without sleep or taking off our shoes, and we liked to have starved to death.

Things are getting better all the time now. Our shops are in one of Ford's plants and we stay there too. Boy it is really fixed up nice and I sure am glad to have a floor under me for awhile.

Ever since I've been overseas I have had to sleep in rice patches or any old place in the mud and water, and the mosquitos are the biggest I ever saw.

I got the liberation of the Philippines Ribbon and one combat star, but just have 19 points, and won't get out on points soon.

I haven't been paid for 3 months and want to get paid this month, but the company furnishes cigarettes and we are going to give each other haircuts. When I get my pay I'll have to have a tow sack to carry it in, as it akes so much of his stuff o make an American dollar.
