Perryton's 15th Birthday Celebration, August 22 Start Cattle Buying In Ochiltree County Friday, August 10

ST CATTLE COUNTY AGENT STOVALL NOW

Appraisers and Veterinarian Will Pass on all Drought Relief Cattle

\$100 To \$200.00 Per Head

Opportunity to Cull Herds of Scrubs, Boarders and Worn Out Stock

Considerable delay caused by the lack of proper Government funds. Ochiltree county will swing the cattle buying program Friday morning, if the promised blanks are not further delayed.

George W. Barnes, assistant director of the State Drought Relief Campaign, has appointed the appraiser, and Dr. Phillips, the district veterinarian, has promised to be an inspector on the job. It is hoped that the program will proceed rapidly until all cattle are purchased.

T. Stovall, the county agent, said that it was a chance of a lifetime for the cattle raisers and men to thoroughly cull their herds. With the price ranging from \$100 to \$200.00, the calves, boarders, and old stock can be moved out to a good advantage. He said nothing but the young, profitable cows in our dairies should be left on our ranges.

The procedure of the sign up will be as follows: Go to the county agent's office on the first floor of the courthouse every morning, and sign all papers necessary for the sale of the cattle. This sign up does not, in any way, obligate the owner to sell his cattle, but it is necessary because an inspection and appraisal must be made. When the inspector makes his visit, it will be necessary to have all animals offered for sale in a corral or pen where they will be inspected and appraised.

The price offered by the appraiser is not satisfactory to the owner, it can be refused in part, or whole, but another appraisal cannot be made for thirty days. There are only a single animal or small herd to be appraised. The owners of such animals will be required to concentrate these at a central point for inspection and appraisal.

SERVICES FOR FULLER TODAY

R. A. FULLER, COMMISSIONER FROM SOUTHWEST PRECINCT, PASSES ON AFTER SHORT ILLNESS

Died at his home in the southwest part of the county, Commissioner R. A. Fuller, aged 72 years. This was the word that was flashed over Ochiltree county, Tuesday night, carrying the word that another name is stricken from the ever lessening roll of our old pioneers, and a solitary woman in the sunset of life and a lonely home, are left to attest how sadly they will miss him. It must be so; these tender human ties cannot be severed with a pang. Yet in such a death there is no cause for grief. His life work was well done. Not

for him our tears! Rather let us crown his grave with garlands; few of us will live as long or as well, and fewer yet will the Angel of Death greet with such a loving touch.

R. A. Fuller was born July 10, 1862 in Tennessee, and when he passed away late in the afternoon of August 7, he had just lacked a few days of being a month past 72 years of age. When he was about 13 years of age, he came with his parents to Texas, settling in Johnson county. When a young man, he lived for several years in Tascosa, then one of the wildest of the frontier cowtowns. After leaving Tascosa, he lived at Vernon for several years, before going back to Johnson county. He resided in Ward county for 7 years before coming to Ochiltree county in 1910, when he settled on the place where he lived until his death.

Almost a half century ago, on December 30, 1886, he was married to Miss Mary Pearson, who survives him. Children are Ira Fuller, Big Springs, Texas; Gordon Fuller, South Dakota; Lawrence Fuller, El Paso; Mrs. D. M. (Lena) Hooper, Fort Davis, Texas; Mrs. J. (Ethel) Keim, Waka; Guy Fuller, at home; and Bob Fuller, Pampa. An infant son and a daughter, Alta, who died in 1915 and is buried at Ochiltree, have been the only deaths in this large family. Other surviving relatives are a half-sister, Mrs. Gussie Park, Gleason, Tenn.; and 13 grandchildren and 2 great grandchildren.

R. A. Fuller, or Bob Fuller, as he is known to all, has ever been a leader in his community and county. The Black school, much of whose success is due to the work and interest of the deceased, is located on land given outright by Mr. Fuller. He has always taken an intelligent interest in all public affairs and given freely of his time for the upbuilding of his community. In 1924, he was first elected as a member of the commissioners court of the county, but was compelled to resign on account of ill health after only seven months of service. In 1926, he was again elected to this position and has served continuously since. Just a few weeks ago, he was again elected for another two year term. He was president of the Spearman Equity Exchange for about eight years. He was also a member of

FREE PROGRAM IS FEATURE OF CELEBRATION

Chamber of Commerce Offers Free Entertainment To Visitors On Birthday

City Is Founded In 1919

Large Crowd Expected Here For Observation of City's Fifteenth Birthday

Arrangements are practically completed for Perryton's annual birthday celebration to be held on Wednesday, August 22, in commemoration of the fifteenth year of the founding of the city.

With the exception of two celebration dances to be held Tuesday and Wednesday nights, the entire celebration program is free and the general public is extended a cordial invitation by the local Chamber of Commerce, sponsors of the annual affair, to participate.

Starting with the races and contests for the boys and girls in the morning and lasting until the big fireworks display in the evening, the entire day will be crowded with entertainment events provided for the visitors and they're all free.

At 1:30 o'clock in the afternoon, calf roping contests and saddle pony races will be staged, open only to amateur performers. At 3:00 o'clock, under the direction of Harold Kindried, Enid, Okla., an aerial circus will be staged for the entertainment of the crowd. At 3:30 o'clock, a ball game will be played between Borger Phillips 66 team and Perryton which promises to be a real attraction.

At 7:00 o'clock in the evening, a boxing exhibition will be held featuring two ten round main events, with Everett "Wildcat" Bales, Wynoka, Okla., matched against Earl Madden, Spearman, and Dick Hedgpeth, Waka, pitted against Joe Vernon, Pampa.

A new feature on the program this year will be the fireworks display which will be held after dark in the evening. The display will be one of the most brilliant ones ever held on the North Plains, with aerial bombardments and beautiful set pieces.

Two bands will be on hand during the day, the Guyon Concert Band and the Perryton Band, and will afford musical interludes between events. The loud speaker equipment of the Chamber of Commerce will be available for the affair.

No expense has been spared by the Chamber of Commerce in arranging the varied program having in mind only the entertainment of the guests and everything will be complete, even to a generous supply of free ice water.

The next issue of the Herald will carry detailed information regarding the celebration program and will be the official birthday issue, carrying advertising messages from practically every business firm in the city in addition to a historical and pictorial account of the growth and development of this city.

International Sunday School Lesson

Lesson VII—August 12, 1934

A Good Preacher and A Bad King (Amos 5:1-24)

I. A Good Preacher

Did you ever see a sycamore tree with fruit on it? Well, our story of the present lesson is concerned with a farmer who farmed such trees for their fruit, long ago. His name was Amos. He lived in a little town, Tekoa, about six miles south of Bethlehem. Part of the time he took care of a flock of sheep and at other times he looked to the care of his sycamore orchard.

Amos came into close contact with the common people of his day. When he sold the wool from his sheep, the markets were filled with a cross-section of village and country life. Here he saw many people who were poor and were oppressed by the rich. Vice and bribery were common among officials. The law was a hollow shadow to vain pretenders. Commons people had been led away from the true worship of God by the use of idols. As Amos followed his sheep over the hills and thought of the oppression of the poor, and the low religious level to which they had been led, he resolved to turn the sheep herding over to other hands and go to the cities, preaching to his people, and seeking turn them from their evil ways. Back of this distress was the ugly fact that God had been forgotten.

The prophet also had a message for the rich. He told them to cease oppressing the poor. Their greed and wastefulness must be forsaken if they would please God and bless man. The officers must obey the law, ceasing to accept bribe, and refusing to court favoritism.

II. A Bad King

Jeroboam II had as priest a man named Amasiah. When this priest learned of the scorching rebukes of Amos and the warnings that Israel would fall into the hands of their enemies for their sinful deeds, he resolved to work a wicked plot against the man of God. The tongue of the plotter got busy and told the king that Amos was a traitor. But this did not frighten Amos. He turned the fire of his prophecies upon the hypocritical Amasiah. He said the priest would be taken captive in a foreign land. He and his children would be killed with a sword.

III. A Wonderful Book

After Amos had uttered his message, he went home and wrote a book.

It is called after its author. In this book you will find many warnings to a disobedient people. You will also discover one of the most remarkable prophecies in the entire Bible. The rich were so anxious to oppress the poor that they wanted to use the Sabbath day (a day given to the Jews for rest and spiritual refreshment, Exodus 20). They asked when the new moon and the Sabbath would cease to be observed, gain and greed could go merrily on. (Amos 8: 5) God's answer to them was that the sun would go down at noon and the earth would be dark in a clear day (8: 9). The Sabbath as well as the rest of the Jewish law was nailed to the cross (Cor. 3; Col. 2: 14). While Jesus hung upon this cross, the sun virtually went down at noon, and until three in the afternoon darkness spread like a pall over the land (Matt. 27: 45). Though the voice of Amos had been stilled through the lapse of the years, his words rang true to the voice of heaven, and the things that he foretold have come to pass exactly as he said they would.

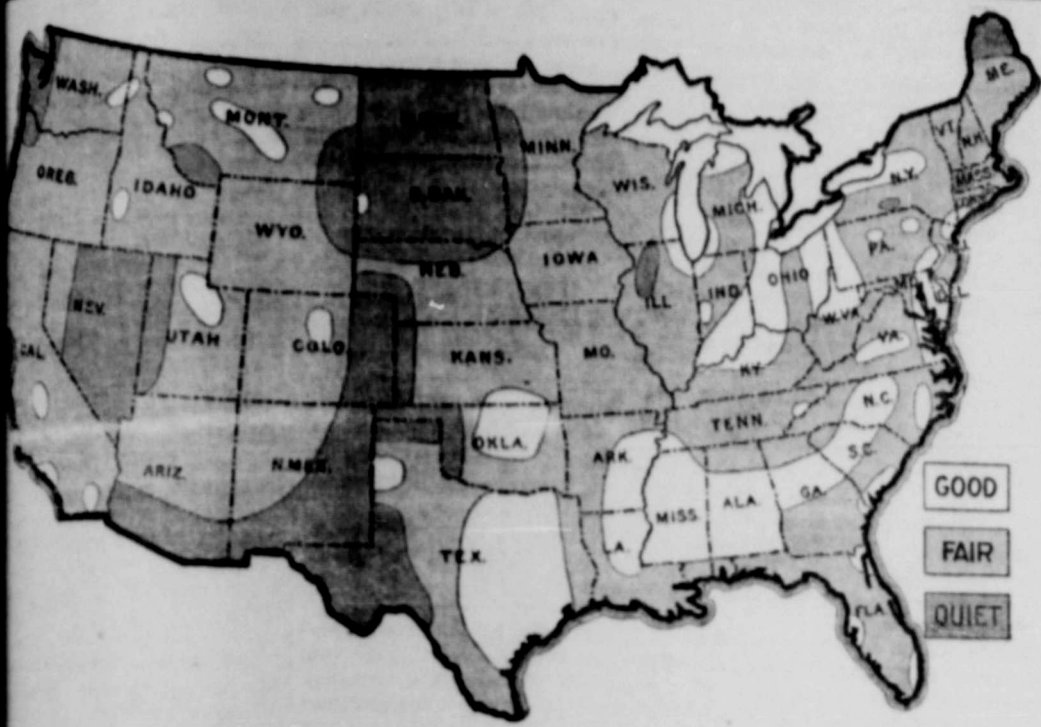

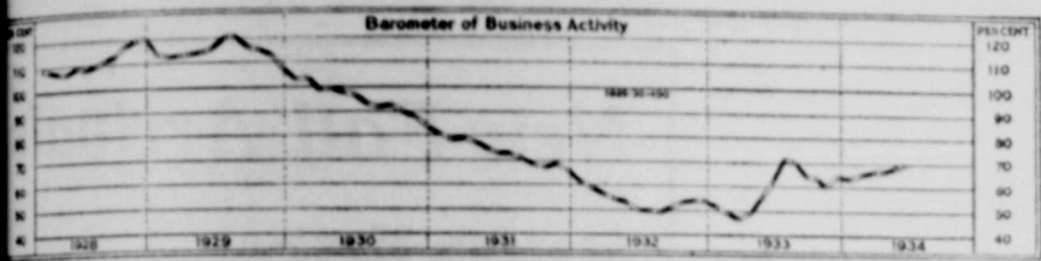

SIMPLICITY IS KEYNOTE OF OUTDOOR MEALS

STILLWATER, Okla.—"The keynote of any out-of-doors meal should be simplicity: something that is appetizing, attractive, easy to prepare and easy to serve."

With that declaration, Dr. Daisy I. Pudy, head of the household A. & M. College, proceeds to suggest some foods for the outdoor meal on hot days.

Planning Saves Trouble
"If you will plan your menu, and then visualize to yourself how you are going to prepare, pack and serve it," Miss Pudy advises, "you can save yourself much worry and flurry, as well as unnecessary work."

Most of the preparation may be done in the morning, when it is nice and cool. Then before time to start on the picnic the final preparations may be made without any fuss or flurry. In that way the hostess will not be tired and worried, and may enjoy both her guests and the meal.

Cold Meat Good
To help in planning the menu, Miss Pudy suggests for the main course or portion of the meal sliced meat loaf, cold roast meat, sliced, or any of the interesting sandwich meats found at grocers, or else a salad such as a meat, fish, chicken, cottage cheese or egg salad. Salad would be particularly good served in tomato cup or on whole tomato cut in sections, almost through so it will flare open on the lettuce leaf when served. The tomatoes may be wrapped separately in oiled paper for packing, and the salad may be put in wide mouthed fruit jars.

"If you use sliced meats you would want some type of vegetable salad with it," Miss Pudy continues. "The jellied vegetable salads are very good. For taking such salads on a picnic, I find either a glass or an enamel bowl is convenient. Wash your lettuce, divide it into cups, wrap in oil paper, and it is ready to pack. Celery, radishes, carrot sticks, as well as young onions, are nice crisp additions to the picnic meal and may also be wrapped in oil paper."

Many Spreads Available
"Pain bread and butter sandwiches are hard to beat; or you might try using 1 cup ground raw carrots, 2 tablespoonfuls peanut butter and 2 tablespoonfuls salad dressing for a sandwich filling. It really is good. There are a large number of interesting cheese spreads now on the market; and

there is almost an endless variety of sweet sandwiches.

"For desserts to use in the summer, it only takes a few minutes to make, freeze and pack almost any kind of ice cream or sherbet; and there is nothing much more refreshing or pleasing on a hot afternoon or evening. Fruit also is easy to prepare, pack and serve; and seldom do we find a person who doesn't enjoy it."

"The kind of beverage we carry with us depends upon the likes of our group. Of course there will be milk for the children; and the adults may have hot or iced coffee, iced tea, or an iced fruit drink if they do not care for milk."

MEAT PLAN SHORTENS WAY TO MAN'S HEART

STILLWATER, Okla. An addition to the old adage "the way to a man's heart is through his stomach" could be that the nearest route is by way of well planned and attractive meals, suggests Miss Florence Lytle, head of the home economics education department at the Oklahoma A. & M. College.

Miss Lytle points out that the women who have been married many years can observe certain aids as well as the young bride.

Essential Foods
"If, in planning your meals," she says "you see to it that each day they include the following foods, you may feel satisfied that you are providing healthful meals:

"One pint of milk for each adult and one quart for each child, as a beverage or in foods; at least one serving of fruit, raw if possible; two servings of non-starchy vegetables or green vegetables, one of which should be raw; one serving of meat, fish, cheese or eggs. Bread, starchy vegetables, cereals, desserts, butter, and cream complete the menu."

As a rule the use of foods in season is more economical than that of other food, because they are so rich in nutritive value and so pleasing in flavor.

Rules for Menu
There are also certain rules to be remembered in making menus, points out Miss Lytle. For instance, one kind of food should not be repeated in the same meal, as tomato soup and tomato salad, creamed cabbage and cold slaw, or green beans and baked beans.

A good balance between soft and solid foods is necessary. A meal of soup, creamed meat, scalloped vegetables and soft custard is much too watery. Likewise a meal of baked meat, boiled potatoes, and steamed pudding is too dry. With a creamed meat, baked potatoes and buttered vegetables are served.

Color Important
Miss Lytle emphasizes the necessity of perfection of balance and color. "Often the choice of a yellow jelly instead of a red one makes the meal more pleasing to look at, and does not alter the flavor combination," she explains. "For example, consider this menu, in which the color scheme is yellow and green except for the red plum jelly."
"Chicken salad, buttered green beans with grated carrots, hot rolls, french fried potatoes, plum jelly, iced tea and peach whip."

"The substitution of an orange marmalade in place of the plum jelly would give the correct color harmony."

Low flowers on the table often give the necessary color decoration. This does not necessarily mean flowers from the green house, but flowers from home gardens.

LARGE MEMBERSHIP GAIN IN AUXILIARY ENROLLMENT

During the first seven months of 1934 the American Legion Auxiliary enrolled more members than during the entire year of 1933, a membership statement received by the local Auxiliary Unit from national headquarters shows. The organization's national membership on August 1st was approximately 15,000 larger than on December 31st last year. An increase of from 35,000 to 40,000 members for the year was indicated, which would give the Auxiliary an enrollment in excess of 400,000.

The gain in Auxiliary enrollment has been general throughout the

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country. Five Departments, Maryland, Ohio, Rhode Island, Alabama and Nevada, have the largest membership in their history. LEGION EXCEED '33 MEMBERSHIP

MEMBERSHIP IS LARGEST IN YEARS; ALMOST RECORD SINCE ORGANIZATION FORMED

Indianapolis, Ind., Aug. 8.—The national organization of the American Legion entered the month of August with a total membership of 806,000. Edward A. Hayes, national commander, said today upon completion of tabulating cards and dues at national headquarters here as of Aug. 1. This 88,282 more than for the same date last year.

He said the books on 1934 membership will not close until Sept. 22, and considerably larger gains will be recorded due to departments making last spurts for their own conventions, and also because the voting strength of delegations at the national convention in Miami is determined as of Sept. 22.

Records at national headquarters show that the 806,000 figure is larger than since 1932, and with the exception of four years, is the largest in the history of the organization.

"This record is the veterans' answer to the challenge of the organized opposition in taking \$30,000,000 compensation away from the service-connected disabled men, and was restored by congress," the national commander commented.

In the tabulation of membership by departments, it is shown that 41 have already exceeded their 1933 membership, and ten have attained their full quotas for 1934. The latter ten are given as Colorado, Maryland, Michigan, Nevada, Oklahoma, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Utah, Puerto Rico and Italy. Each also exceeded its last year's membership.

The others, which have exceeded last year's membership, but have not yet attained their full 1934 quotas are Alabama, Arizona, Arkansas, Delaware, District of Columbia, Florida, Idaho, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maine, Minnesota, Missouri, Montana, Nebraska, North Carolina, North Dakota, Ohio, Oregon, South Dakota, Texas, Virginia, Washington, Wisconsin, Wyoming, Mexico, Alaska and the Philippine Islands. The department of Nevada has the largest membership in its history.

The "Big Three" contest each year is of interest to the entire Legion. Mr. Hayes said, and its first phase has just been decided. New York, Illinois and Pennsylvania are the departments. New York, with a membership of 70,267, has won the first phase as of Aug.

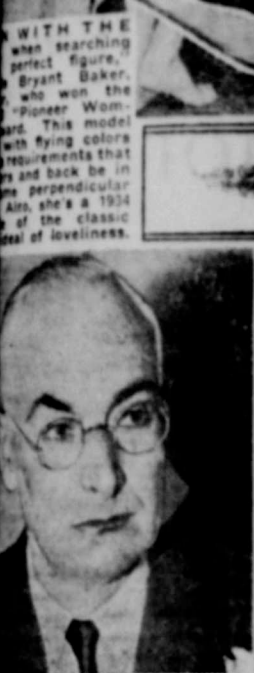

CROP LOANS IN DROUTH AREAS

FARMERS CAN NOW MAKE APPLICATIONS FOR EMERGENCY CROP LOANS IN THIS AREA

Farmers seeking emergency crop loans for general purposes may now place their application for such loans with county loan committees which functioned during the spring of 1934 in all of the drouth stricken counties of Texas, New Mexico and Arizona. Charles W. Sherrill, Regional Manager of the Emergency Crop and Feed Loan Office of the Farm Credit Administration at Dallas announced today. Crop loans were discontinued May 31 but the period for receiving applications has been reopened in response to demands from drouth stricken sections of the Southwest region. Mr. Sherrill said.

The loan area covers primary and secondary drouth counties in the three states. The same regulations which governed spring crop loans will apply. Crop loans are limited to \$250.00 to one individual for general purposes and \$400.00 for

human infection results. "The loss caused by rats would more than pay the State taxes for one year, as it is estimated over \$12,000,000 is thus lost. Dry, hot weather favors the increase of the fleas which cause typhus, and as crops in the field are gathered the rats around buildings will increase. "Although this disease is not commonly fatal, it cannot be considered lightly. The intense headache, the high fever, and the great mental depression are its most unpleasant features. Like in sea sickness, the patients' greatest fear is that he is not going to die. The illness generally lasts about two weeks. "The control of typhus is very difficult and it depends upon the extermination of rats and this is no easy matter. Trapping and poisoning help, but the best results are obtained by starving the rats. This is done by having all buildings where food is stored rat-proof. The State Department of Health and the U. S. Department of Agriculture will be glad to assist communities in their program for the extermination of this pest."

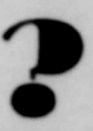

FEDERAL CROP LOANS RAISED

MAXIMUM TO INDIVIDUALS IN EMERGENCY AREA RAISED FROM \$400 TO \$750 BY FARM CREDIT

Amarillo, Texas, August 8.—An increase of \$350 in the maximum amount allowable to farmers under the federal emergency crop and feed loan act will be authorized soon by the Farm Credit Administration in Washington, Congressman Marvin Jones announced yesterday.

The congressman has been advised by Norman Monaghan, assistant director of the crop and feed loan division of the administration, that the maximum loans to farmers will be raised from \$400 to \$750.

"We are pleased to inform you that we are now preparing regulations whereby the maximum amount which may be loaned to an individual on the act of congress, approved February 23, 1934, will be \$750, instead of \$400, as heretofore," Monaghan wrote.

"We expect to be able to authorize the increase within the next several days, and hope thereby to take care of the additional needs for the different kinds of loans that may be made under this act, such as winter wheat, etc."

The increase has been urged by Congressman Jones, who was author and sponsor of the crop and feed loan act, under a provision of the law granting the governor of the Farm Credit Administration authority to increase the maximum amount in case of emergency. The provision reads:

"In any area certified by the President of the United States to

the governor as a distressed emergency area, the governor may make loans without regard to the foregoing limitation under such regulations and for such time as he may prescribe therefor."

Declaring that they could not pay for both harvest and the planting of a new crop out of their \$400 loan, numerous Panhandle farmers have asked that the amount be increased. Congressman Jones said.—Amarillo News.
