Assistance Checks Mailed to Old Aged

Old Age Assistance totalling \$3,697,017.75 is being paid in September to 170,509 aged persons in an average grant of \$21.58. In August the average grant was \$21.59 with rolls of 170,850. Payments are \$1.25 below the authorized grant.

Aid to the Blind is being paid to 4,623 persons in an average grant of \$24.10, totalling \$111,461.11 with \$24.09 as the average grant.

Aid to Dependent Children is being paid to 10,697 families with 23,262 children. The average grant is \$20.88.

Fire Prevention Week 8th to 14th

This is fire prevention week, by proclamation of President Franklin D. Roosevelt. One out of every three persons who lost their lives as a result of fires in the United States last year was a farm person, the Department of Agriculture reports. Fire is more hazardous on the farm than in the city because few farms can call on a trained fire department for assistance, most farms are not equipped with a ready water supply for fire-fighting, farm buildings usually are not as fire resistant as city buildings and farmers usually carry less fire insurance than city people do. Farm fire prevention suggestions have a readily available ladder that will reach to the top of the highest building, see that there is a water supply for fire fighting in the farm yard, and establish firebreaks around haystacks, farm buildings and maturing farm crops of high fire hazard.

Three Companies May Start Work On New Automobiles

The first step in reconverting the automobile industry from war to peace production was taken recently when the war production board authorized Chrysler corporation, Ford Motor company and Fisher body division of General Motors corporation to start work on experimental models of new passenger automobiles.

Strict limitations were imposed, however, to prevent any interference with necessary war work.

These provided that no more than \$25,000 may be expended by each company in a month for labor and materials; that workers involved be limited to planning engineers and technicians; that no more than 1 per cent of the company's employees be assigned to the work.

Children Buy 33,100 Jeeps With Savings

America's 30 million school children, investing only 50 cents a week in war savings stamps during the school year, have "paid for" 33,100 of the 200,000 Jeeps that have rolled off the Willys-Overland assembly lines the War Finance Division of the Treasury Department informed officials of the auto concern here today.

Summing up the results of a campaign in which the children were allowed to designate their purchase, the Treasury reported that the versatile scout cars were favored over all other types of military equipment. Each Jeep, completely fitted for combat, cost the pupils \$1.165. Many of the vehicles were outfitted with special metal plaques designing the school which purchased it with war stamps.

"Staghound" Spearheads Allied Thrusts



Fleet and vicious, a 14-ton armored car, called the Staghound, spearheaded Allied thrusts against the enemy in Italy and France. Sponsored primarily by the British government, the vehicle has been a closely guarded military secret for more than three years. It was designed and built in quantity in plants of the Chevrolet Motor Division of General Motors Corp., sole producer in the United States. It combines the features of a tank and a reconnaissance car, according to M. E. Coyle, Chevrolet general manager and a G. M. vice-president.

NO LAST FRONTIER

What's to be looked for when war is over—how about jobs, wages, and standards of living—comes at times to the mind of almost everyone, busy as he or she may be at present wartime work.

Among the best prescriptions these days for those with the malady of postwar pessimism are given each Sunday by C. F. Kettering, General Motors' director of research. Mr. Kettering, talked briefly in connection with the General Motors Symphony program, has been doing a splendid job at healing the war-weary mind, his medicaments wrapped in a general label—"There is Always a Frontier."

No one arises more quickly than Mr. Kettering to any challenge of that statement. He has drawn on inventive and industrial history in his Sunday talks—pointing out that change is constant, that not all of the worthwhile things are done, nor the surface more than scratched, that only an open mind and a willing hand are needed.

Whether inventive procedure has its success the first time or in 20 years is incidental, Mr. Kettering believes. He has told the story of the pneumatic tire, first made as an improvement to a child's play vehicle, with no idea on the part of the inventor of its ultimate many uses. He feels there should be no impatience about developments from ideas and is certain they will continue to emerge and that they will reach full application in proper time.

Keeping the nation's skill at mass production at its best will serve us equally as well in future peacetime as it has in the past and as it is at present in the building of war necessities, Mr. Kettering asserts. "Let us be sure we understand our system of mass production, and so learn to appreciate its great military and economic value that we won't lose it unintentionally," were his closing words in a recent talk.

While American industry is making its fine war record, at the same time it is looking ahead and is not afraid of what it believes will come with peace. Its engineers, research men, executives generally agree with Mr. Kettering that there will be new industries and new jobs after the war is over, as long as the American inventive mind is alert and keen.

CREDIT HERE

From behind bars of American women's prisons, there is action in national war service. Not to be overlooked is the operation of machines in war production, war gardens on prison grounds, giving of blood, serving as nurses aides and buying of war bonds. Women in institutions, over twelve thousand imprisoned for felonies and misdemeanors and girl delinquents, have answered the call. Cooperation and its constructive effect, has been a morale builder as well as a boon for their country's cause. Some are members of civilian defense ambulance drill teams, others are making shirts for the navy and other clothing on lend-lease contracts, some working in medical centers, others knitting rolling bandages, canning, buying bonds meanwhile and giving to the USO. An important job here in Burk Burnett as well as in prisons, accomplishing much on both sides of the bars.

Time Almost Up For Mailing Overseas Xmas Packages

The designated period for the mailing of Christmas parcels to the men in the armed forces overseas ends October 15, it was emphasized today in an announcement from Lieut. Fred P. Hamill, District Postal Officer for the Navy.

To lighten the last minute rush and heavy load of all Postal

Offices, Navy postal authorities urge all residents in this area to hurry their packages so as to mail well before the final deadline.

Packages must not exceed five pounds in weight and not be larger than 15 inches in length or 36 inches in girth combined. They must be wrapped securely with heavy paper and reinforced with twine. The box should be heavy corrugated cardboard or solid fiber or similarly strong material in order to undergo

rough handling on long. Fragile articles should be rounded on all six surfaces sufficient protective material. Type or print with ink the complete address. Show return address and place of both addresses inside the cel.

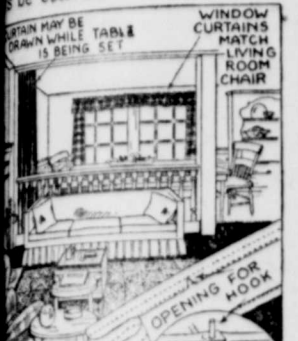

Lesson for October 15

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JESUS' UNDERSTANDING OF MAN

LESSON TEXT—Matthew 12:9-21.
GOLDEN TEXT—And needed not that any should testify of man; for he knew what was in man.—John 2:25.

What is a man worth? That depends on your point of view. In a museum stands a collection of small jars containing minerals, water, etc., which make up the body of a man, and which are valued at less than a dollar. But there is more to man than his body.

And that "more"—intellectual and spiritual—is what determines his real value. Jesus understood (yes, and now we understand) man, and places a high valuation on him. That is worth knowing in a world where the price of humanity is often figured on the basis of his usefulness in warfare or the factory.

Jesus really understands man. He knows his.

I. Need (v. 9).
The first thing Jesus saw in the synagogue was not the leaders, or the beautifully appareled rich, or the learned scribes. He saw a man with a withered hand, one who needed His help. The enemies of Christ complimented Him by expecting Him to see the crippled one—and they "watched him" (Mark 3:2), for it was the Sabbath.

Do we see the real need of humanity? Does it speak to us and prompt us to helpful action? If not, are we like our Lord and Master?

II. Value (vv. 10-12).
They who would not hesitate to save a sheep in distress on the Sabbath did not want the man to receive help. Thus they put property above the person of man, and showed their low valuation of man.

The dignity of man's personality, the fact that he is made in the likeness and image of God, the great potentialities which exist in every man—all these should urge upon the Christian church the need of a new and higher estimate of the worth of a man—or a boy or a girl. Let us look at them with God's eyes, and seek to win them for Him.

III. Faith (v. 13).
No doubt this man had tried countless times to straighten out that withered arm. It was the very thing he most wanted to do, but it was quite impossible. Is Jesus then charging him with the impossible, asking him to do what cannot be done?

No, for He saw in this man the desire to be whole and faith in God's ability to make him whole. Dr. G. Campbell Morgan puts it well: "We turn from a contemplation of a withered hand and look at the face of Jesus. The moment we do this, we know that the command is possible because He commands it, however impossible it may appear. To look into that face must inevitably have meant to be certain that He was not there to reveal disability, save as He was also there to put an end to it."

IV. Enmity (vv. 14, 15a).
Jesus saw the good in man. He also saw the evil. He was not unaware of the hatred and the dark devices of His enemies. Until the day when He was to permit them to take Him captive in the garden, He withdrew from them, leaving them to their evil designs and their wicked unbelief.

Sometimes when we see how the wicked seem to flourish in our day, how they appear to go on without let or hindrance, we are prone to forget that there is One who "sits in the shadows," and who knows and notes not only their ungodly deeds, but also their sinful thoughts.

He knows, and that is enough for us. Let us not be seeking vengeance, nor fretting ourselves because of evil doers. God knows, and He will care for it all.

V. Weakness (vv. 15b-21).
Men hesitate to admit their weakness to one another, always trying to keep up the appearance of strength and success. Well, there is no need of that kind of subterfuge with God. "He knoweth our frame; he remembereth that we are dust" (Ps. 103:14).

Jesus sympathized with those who were physically ill and He healed them (v. 15). What comfort there is in knowing that He is present at the sick bed of every believer, and that He is able to heal as it may be His will and purpose. Only He can do it.

But there is something even more precious here. Man is weak not only physically but spiritually. His spiritual light may at times be nearly out, just a smoldering wick instead of a brightly shining lamp. We might be tempted to say that it is so weak, so disagreeable, so smoky—let's put it entirely out. But not Jesus. He will, if permitted, fan it into flame again.

Then, too, man is like a broken reed. The picture is that of a stick cut to use for support as one walks. And then it breaks—what shall we do? Break it into smaller pieces and throw it away? Yes, that is what we will do if we have not the spirit of Jesus.

With Ernie Pyle at the Front:

British Flier Hero Wins Hard Fight Against Death

Rescued by Americans, He Finally
Ends in Army Hospital in England

By Ernie Pyle

(EDITOR'S NOTE: While on his way back to the United States for a much needed rest, Ernie Pyle interrupted his vacation to bring readers this special story from London, England.)

LONDON.—The story about the RAF pilot who was trapped in his wrecked plane for eight days had a happy ending. He is alive, and doing nicely. And even though he has a long hospital ordeal ahead, he is happy and grateful and the sun shines for him again.

When I returned to London from France on my way to America I began tracing the pilot's whereabouts. It took almost a week to find him. Finally I located his hospital, and I traveled halfway across England to see him. My friend, Bill Strand of the Chicago Tribune, made the long trip with me just for company.

An RAF station wagon, driven by a WAAF, met us at the station and took us to a hospital out in the country. The lieutenant had been informed we were coming. We were ushered into a small, sunny ward, and the lieutenant began smiling as we walked through the door. He held out his left hand, for the right one was still tender from bullet wounds.

When we got him out of his plane that day almost a month ago we knew that in a very few days he would either be dead or over the hump toward recovery, because his burned back was gangrenous, and gangrene works fast.

Well, he was first taken to a clearing station of the American 30th division. He was very drowsy from morphine. When he began to come to, all he could hear was a lot of chatter in German, with voices answering to Hans, Herman, etc.

The drowsy lieutenant figured that he must be in German hands after all. But it turned out that he was hearing wounded German prisoners talking to each other.

The lieutenant's back responded to treatment. The gangrene was cut away, and it was seen that he would pull through. He was moved next day to another field hospital, and then three days later he was evacuated to England by air.

You may remember that when we got him out of his wrecked plane he asked the date and said his wedding anniversary was only three days away and he hoped to make it back to England for that. He was nearer right than we had thought. He arrived in England one day after the anniversary.

After that he was in an American general hospital for 16 days. As his wife says, he was treated like "my lord." He was their prize patient. And then he was removed to the RAF hospital where he is now and will be for a long time to come. His wife and baby come to see him twice a week.

His present condition is this: His back is still painful but is healing excellently. Unfortunately he has to lie on it, because of his shattered leg being in a rack.

His right hand, on which a bullet had cut the fingers to the bone, is out of the bandage now but is still very tender.

His right leg, which was not wounded at all, is giving him trouble. Because of lying for eight days in one position, with the leg bent and pressure on certain nerves, he has lost control over his foot. He can move the leg all right, but the foot just flops around. The doctors think it will eventually be all right.

His left leg is the worst problem. As you may recall, his left foot was pinned under the rudder bar all that time, and the calf of his leg had a shell hole in it. We couldn't tell just how bad the wound was when we got him out.

Well, the wound was apparently caused by a 20-millimeter shell which exploded inside his leg. It completely destroyed about an inch of both bones in the leg. There was simply a cap there, with no bone whatever.

He has already had three operations on this leg, and he will have many more. They will have to graft in new bone and then give it months to grow and strengthen. The doctors say it will be 10 months to a year before he can walk, but that

Germans Counterattack to Slow
Allies' Smash Into Rhineland;
OWI Warns of Hard Pacific War

EUROPE:

'Greatest Battles'

In what the Germans said was "the greatest battle of material in the world's history . . ." with 2,500,000 men facing each other on a 460-mile front, Allied forces moved slowly on the Siegfried line against stubborn enemy resistance.

All along the curving battle-line the Germans launched extensive counterattacks, throwing in large numbers of tanks to stem the Allied drive on their important industrial belt along the Rhine.

Bearing the brunt of the enemy's aggressiveness were Lieut. Gen. Miles Dempsey's British Second Army driving northward in Holland and Lieut. Gen. George S. Patton's American Third Army lunging for the coal-laden Saar basin beyond Metz and Nancy.

In Holland, strong German counterattacks were aimed at thwarting General Dempsey's Tommies from pressing past the northern anchor of the Siegfried line at Kieve, and of throwing an arm to the great water basin of the Zuider Zee to the northwest to cut off an estimated 200,000 Nazis still engaged in the lower extremity of the country.

In addition to employing masses of tanks against General Patton's men before the Saar, the enemy also made good use of the hilly and wooded terrain in the sector to reduce the valiant doughboys' advances to yards.

As the fighting raged to the north and south, Lieut. Gen. Courtney Hodges' First American Army launched a heavy attack between those two sectors east of Aachen, fighting its way through thick woods to draw up within 27 miles of the great industrial center of Cologne.

Having smashed through the upper reaches of the Germans' vaunted "Gothic line" in northern Italy, Allied troops fought toward the leveling plains of the great Po valley, cradling the majority of the country's population, and its most highly developed resources. Despite desperate German attempts to stem their drive, the Allies pushed on, with Lieut. Gen. Mark Clark's American Fifth Army threatening to close an escape route for stubborn enemy troops ringed between it and the British Eighth army to the east.

While the Germans could fall back on swampy, wooded lake country in East Prussia to slow the Russian drive, they had no such advantage in Hungary, where the Reds pressed for the broad open plains to the southeast of Budapest.

Having landed on the western coast of Yugoslavia, strong Allied forces worked inland to cut off the retreat of an estimated 200,000 Germans moving northward from the lower Balkans.

LOANS DOWN

Index of economic conditions, loans on life insurance policies outstanding in midyear approximated \$2,100,000,000, lowest in 15 years. During the critical depression period of 1932, loans reached \$3,800,000,000, almost double present figures.

Offsetting a decline in civilian mortality, increased deaths among policy holders in military service resulted in an 18 per cent rise in insurance benefits paid out so far this year.

CARS

Thinking in terms of a utilization in space and weight, Ford Motor company officials are working on plans for large scale production of the lowest priced automobile since Ford's model A.

Declaring that the vehicle would not be a miniature doodlebug type Henry Ford II declared: "Such a car would be in addition to our regular line. What it will sell for, what it will look like, are matters of conjecture at the moment. The logical result . . . would be a better automobile for the American family."

PACIFIC:

Airpower

Long is the reach of America's famed B-29 Superfortresses, which have flown to the wars to hamstring the flow of enemy supplies to his widespread Asiatic front by striking at principal Japanese industrial centers.

With recent improvements permitting the carrying of heavier bomb loads, no less than 100 of the B-29s, the equivalent of from Atlanta, Ga., to the Arctic circle in attacking manufacturing plants in Anshan, Manchuria, second largest steel-making center in the Japanese empire.

While the B-29s were on the wing, other U. S. army and navy planes struck at Jap positions along the whole Pacific front in attempts to soften the enemy against further advances.

Jap Resistance

With Japan possessing many strategic materials in the home islands and Korea enabling her to increase war production; with the country capable of putting 8,000,000 men in the field, and with American supply lines stretched, U. S. victory in the Pacific may require from 1½ to 2 years after Germany's defeat, the Office of War Information said.

To America's advantage in pressing for victory, OWI said, was its own tremendous war output, capable of turning out 8,000 planes a month to Japan's 1,500; the threat to cut the enemy's supply lines from the Indies area and blockade the homeland, and the overrunning of his outer defenses which has brought U. S. forces close to the inner ramparts.

Far from slaking the Japs' fervor, Germany's fight might strengthen the enemy's determination to resist, OWI said.

PRICE CONTROL:
Must Stay—Byrnes

Until total victory is achieved in the Pacific, price and wage controls must be maintained to prevent an under supply of goods and overly stuffed pocketbooks to set off a dangerous inflationary cycle, War Mobilization Director James F. Byrnes declared.

Stating that figures of the bureau of labor statistics showed only an increase of 25 per cent since January, 1941, Byrnes said that farm income rose 81 per cent and the average weekly pay of workers 51 per cent during the same period.

"The stabilization program has hurt neither the farmer nor the worker," Byrnes asserted. "The white collar workers and the people with small fixed incomes have fared less well during the war, but the only way to help them is to continue to hold the line against inflation."

Seek Higher Wages

Even while Byrnes spoke, organized labor pressed for revision of the government's stabilization program, urging that the formula for limiting wage increases to 15 per cent over January, 1941, levels be junked.

In appearing before the War Labor board, CIO Chieftain Philip Murray argued that public members of a WLB panel had found living costs increased almost 30 per cent since January, 1941, rather than 25 per cent as claimed by the bureau of labor statistics.

Declaring that both labor and management were entitled to a quick settlement of the wage question so as to be able to solve immediate and reconversion problems.

AFL leaders joined the CIO in the assault upon present wage stabilization.

Early Start



To beaming parents Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Walls of Los Angeles, Calif., tiny six-week-old Evelyn is a constant delight.

Picture proves parents' boast little Evelyn can stand up. In addition, she can raise herself while lying on her tummy and take three steps while holding her mother's hand.

With such scarce radio tubes as the 12SA7 and 12A8 commanding as much as \$10 in black markets, army release of 1,000,000 surplus tubes for civilian use will tend to only slightly ease the tight supply situation.

To be returned to manufacturers for testing and packing before distribution to customers on an "equitable basis," the 1,000,000 tubes will not even approximate the production of 1,754,000 in July, which met only a fraction of the demand.

Because of the services' extensive use of radio equipment for communications between units on the fighting fronts, trade circles saw little hope for increased civilian supplies until Germany's defeat permitted a cutback in military orders.

FOOD STOCKS:
Orderly Disposal

With the War Food administration already feeding the government's excess stocks of food to civilian markets without disrupting the markets, U. S. officials will make every effort to maintain orderly disposal of surpluses with the war's end, WFA distribution director Lee Marshall said.

"We must maintain specified war reserves no matter how favorable the war may be going," he said, "but I, for one, don't think it necessary to build a separate stockpile of the same foods for postwar relief feeding."

In disposing of surpluses, Marshall said, salable goods would first be offered to companies which furnished the government with the products. Others in the same business would be given second choice.

WOMEN WORKERS

Tasting well the fruits of boom-time employment, with many adjusting themselves to industry since 1941, seven out of ten women workers intend to stay at work after hostilities cease, a survey by the Northwestern National Life Insurance company revealed.

Nearly two-thirds of the married women and four-fifths of the single women declared their intention to remain in industry, the survey showed. Only 19 per cent planned to return to housework.

Sir William Beveridge, the British plan man, has cooked up a new one to be announced after the Armistice.
