Planes Have Held Power For Calles

AIR BOMBS HAVE MADE WAY FOR INFANTRY

(Mr. Lloyd has just returned from the field headquarters of General Calles.)

MEXICO CITY, Mar. 28 (P)—A handful of airmen and a dozen more or less modern airplanes have dominated the Mexican revolutionary campaign in northern Mexico.

They have been the eyes and the long punitive arms of the federal army as horse, foot troops and guns plodded wearily over the deserts and mountains where dynamited bridges and destroyed railway tracks had been defended by unseen rebel hands, might have held up the federal advance for days.

Soaring high over the prairies of Durango and the deserts of Coahuila, the little group of aviators so effectively scouted and bombed out the insurgents that ground units of the advancing federal army, save for a skirmish here there, have had little more to do than repair wreckage destroyed by retreating rebels.

The air campaign has been beginning at Vera Cruz they "bombed" insurgents with hand bills and newspapers, reclaim-

JENSEN NEARS SOLO RECORD

FLIER SEEMS HEADED FOR SUCCESS IN ENDURANCE TRY

ROOSEVELT FIELD, March 28.—Though the air was rough, Martin Jensen was in the third and last leg of his race to set a new solo endurance flight record and still going strong.

Jensen went up at 5:01:34 a. m. yesterday to beat the late Royal V. Thomas' record of 35 hours and 33 minutes, which would keep him in the air until 6:35 this evening. Through a miscalculation early this morning he decided that he was going to lose his fight, but a later check showed he still had a good chance to win. Between six and seven o'clock, when he was circling Long Island no more than 80 feet from the ground in a sudden rain, he dropped a note saying he had only 60 gallons of gasoline left, enough for about five hours. He explained the automobile gasoline he was using would not permit idling his engine and that at that speed the consumption was 12 gallons an hour.

Emil Burgin, chief pilot for the oil company that is sponsoring the flight, went aloft in a plane on the fuselage of which was the painted advice to Jensen: "Drop it, speed, note saying he found he still had 70 gallons.

\$5500 Residential Permit Issued Here

TELLS OF DAY ON WHICH HE SHOT PASTOR

DEFENSE CONCLUDES ITS TESTIMONY IN TRIAL TODAY

TYLER TEX., Mar. 28.—Loys Wilson young garage man of Troup, charged with shooting to death Rev. Fount Wallace, Baptist minister of Troup last April, took the stand today in his own defense.

Harold, one of Mr. and Mrs. Wilson's nine-year-old sons preceded his father in the witness chair.

The well dressed little boy said he saw Rev. Wallace "pat mother on the back, tell her she was a beautiful woman, and ask her to pray for him." That was while the Wallaces were visiting at the Wilson home after Mrs. Wallace and her daughter had stepped out of the room, the little boy said.

Harold also testified that his father "kissed all of us" when they returned to him after a brief separation, and that "papa wanted me to go to Sunday school." The boy was not cross examined.

Wilson took the stand as soon as Harold, one of his twin sons, ended his testimony.

Wife Looked Queer
"My wife didn't look right to me at my garage the day of the tragedy," he said. "She came there to see me from her house. When she left, I followed her in the shop wrecking car and saw her wave in an unusual manner to the preacher who was walking along the street. The wave looked like a signal of trouble."

Heavy Movement Of Troops To Border

JUAZUE, Chihuahua, March 28 (P)—Heavy movement of insurgent troops from the border to the war zone of Southern Chihuahua today pressed a conflict.

A strict censorship over all telegraph lines south of Juarez, controlled by the rebel forces, shrouded developments in the main revolutionary camp and no advices were received in rebel headquarters to confirm the belief of the advancing federal command that the insurgents have evacuated Jimenez.

American Legion Bureau Is Defunct

SAN ANTONIO, March 28 (P)—Maurice Maverick, manager of the Kelly-Maverick Lumber company has been named receiver for the Tenth National American Legion Bureau, which was in charge of the Legion convention here last October.

Maverick's company, with two other plaintiffs petitioned for a receiver in thirty-seventh district court, alleging an indebtedness of approximately \$41,000.

MARRS TO BE IN PARIS

YOUNG SCHOOL TEACHER KIDNAPED, BEATEN, THEN DESERTED WITHIN WOOD

WILKESBARRE, Pa., Mar. 28.—Suffering from shock and bruises, Miss Margaret Dodson, 20, remained in a hospital today, while search continued for two men and a woman who kidnaped her and abandoned her in a wooded section. She is a teacher at the rural school in Muhlenberg.

She was seized at the school yesterday and, while her frightened pupils looked on, was thrown into an automobile. Some of the children ran to their homes and told their parents, who notified state police. Searchers found her in the woods several hours later and after being taken to the hospital she frequently lapsed into unconsciousness. She gave no detailed account of her experience, but said she did not know the men and women who took her away.

Police started search for the writer of three threatening letters, one of which was found in Miss Dodson's desk Monday after the school had been broken into the night before. The letter was signed "Frank J." and read: "This has gone far, enough. Watch your step." Two other letters were pinned to the school house door recently.

Belief was expressed by the police that the kidnapping was actuated by revenge because the teacher had reported a parent for not sending a pupil to school.

CALLES ARMY PRESSING ON

REBELS EVACUATING ANOTHER CITY IN CHIHUAHUA

(By Associated Press)
Apparent evacuation of the town of Jimenez in Southeastern Chihuahua was reported by federal airmen today.

The insurgents were proceeding northward in the direction of the rebel stronghold of Chihuahua and the federal forces were looking for a battle at Bachimba Pass, strong strategic point south of that city.

The rebels, on the other hand, indicated a clash was expected in the vicinity of Jimenez, no confirmation being given of the reported evacuation of that town.

General Escobar, rebel commander-in-chief, has repeatedly asserted that he would lead an advance on Mexico City itself.

Otherwise a strict censorship veiled the plans of the insurgents. Federal relief forces were expected to reach Mazatlan on the West Coast today, relieving the garrison which successfully held off a rebel attack early this week.

The governing of the northern district of Lower California today denied that loyal Mexican troops had been transported across Arizona territory to reach Naco where a federal garrison is held out.

The federals at Naco, strongly entrenched, were still awaiting a long

OKLAHOMA EXTENDING THE SCOPE OF ITS INVESTIGATION

(By Associated Press)
BATON ROUGE, La., March 28.—The impeachment resolution against Gov. Huey P. Long went over today until Monday night at 8 o'clock when the House of Representatives will begin examination of witnesses to determine if it will impeach the governor on any of the nineteen allegations concerning a plot to murder and numerous alleged official irregularities.

A committee of twelve was appointed to formulate rules after an administration leader had failed in an effort to invoke a house rule to stop the investigation. He argued the proceedings were out of order but neither the speaker nor the membership took official notice of his pleadings.

While the House was deliberating the impeachment resolution, the Senate unanimously adopted a resolution requesting Governor Long to furnish the legislature with names of the legislators charged verbally by him and in a pamphlet distributed by the highway department with accepting bribes from the Standard Oil company to oppose the governor's proposed occupational tax on oil.

The Senate resolution also requested the names of the Standard Oil company financial agents, who were charged with paying the bribes. The resolution, adopted by both House and Senate, read:

Grounded Steamer Makes It To Port

CHERBOURG, France, March 28 (P)—The Cunard liner Transylvania, with American tourists aboard, came into Cherbourg at 11 a. m., listing sharply at her port bow and well down after running aground near Urville-Hague.

The 100 or so passengers debarked immediately none the worse for their experience except for the shock of the sudden grounding which threw some of them out of their berths.

The vessel will probably be beached before it can enter a drydock. The accident took place in the midst of a dense fog at 4:10 a. m., while the Transylvania was proceeding at very low speed.

THREE BOYS FACE SLAYING CHARGES

SHERMAN, Texas, March 28 (P)—Three youths, Jimmie Dixon, Robert Mason and Clifford Harris, the last only 16, faced murder charges today in the death of W. L. Echols, Van Alstyne night watchman, who died here Saturday of wounds received when he interrupted an attempt to rob a Van Alstyne bank.

Dixon and Mason were arrested Monday near Coleman. Harris was taken near Dallas Tuesday night. Both Dixon and Harris were said to have made statements admitting participation in the Van Alstyne incident.

Dixon and Mason already faced charges of robbery with firearms in connection with an attempted filling station robbery Saturday at Coleman, in which Elgie Lettall was perhaps fatally wounded.

Bradley Released On Bond Of \$1500

Luther Bradley, arrested about two weeks ago in a liquor raid near Posey when a large quantity of whiskey, mash, and liquor making apparatus was confiscated, today was released under a bond of \$1,500 on a charge of manufacture of intoxicating liquors.

Another man thought to have been backing the alleged liquor making plant has been arrested and is now under bond, Sheriff Wade Hardy said today.

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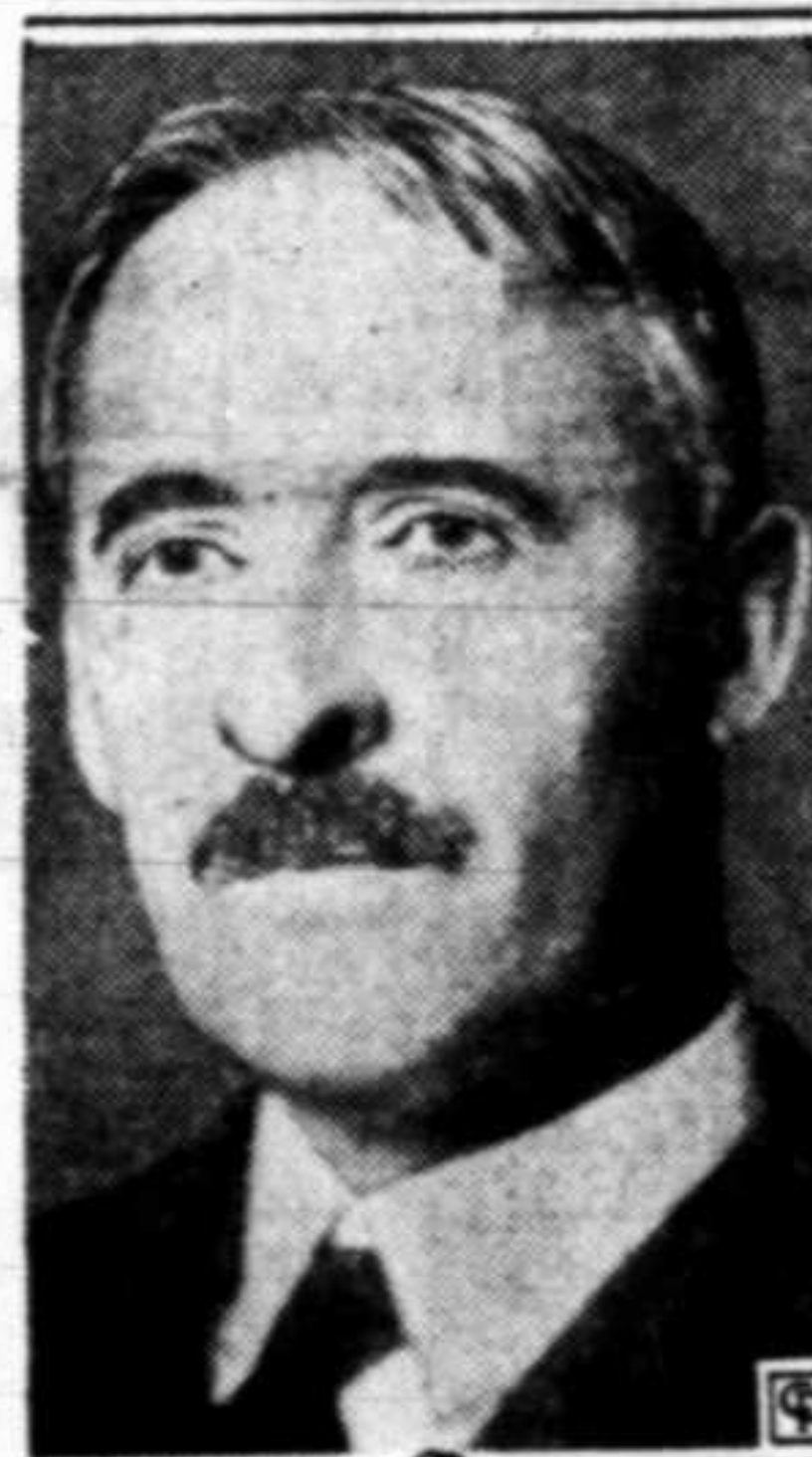

WASHINGTON, Mar. 28.—Frank B. Kellogg came to the end of more than four years of service as secretary of state today, ready to relinquish his post at the close of the day's work to Henry L. Stimson, former governor-general of the Philippines.

When Mr. Stimson takes up his official duties tomorrow, it will be his second experience of the kind. He was secretary of war in the cabinet, and recalling his association, he was particularly pleased to be able to have the oath of his office in the Hoover cabinet administered by his former leader as chief justice of the United States.

TAKES KIDDIES ON KNEE AND SETS OFF DYNAMITE CHARGE PLACED UNDERNEATH CHAIR

SALEM, Mar. 28.—Taking his two small daughters, Charline, 4, and Gladys, 6, on his knees in the kitchen of their home at Grassy Pond, Charles Stetter, 38, touched off nine sticks of dynamite he had placed beneath the chair in which he sat. All three were instantly killed.

The house was wrecked and the bodies mangled. Neighbors attributed Stetter's act to despondency over financial and family matters.

Just before the tragedy Stetter and his wife had quarreled, and she had gone to the home of his brother, 200 yards away.

EXECUTE ONE OF CHINA WAR LORDS TODAY

LONDON, March 28.—A Reuter dispatch from Nanking today said Li Chai-Sum, governor of Canton, had been executed at 11 a. m., despite the fact his safety had been guaranteed by President Chiang Kai-Shek and three leading members of the government.

NATIONALIST CHIEF COMMITS SUICIDE

SHANGHAI, March 28 (P)—It was reported here today that Wu Tze Hui, venerable Nationalist statesman, committed suicide at Nanking following the reported execution of Li Chai-Sum, governor of Canton, at 11 a. m. Wu, one of three guarantors of Li's safety, felt the execution meant a disgrace he was unwilling to face.

ATTACKER OF CHILD SOUGHT

LI was arrested March 13 shortly after he arrived at Nanking to attend the Kuomintang congress, concluding its sessions today.

Charges against him involved sedition in connection with the activities of the Wuhan and Kwangsi military clique opposition to the Nanking government.

Chiang Kai-Shek, president of China, is said to have sought his execution as a traitor, the move being vigorously opposed however by other prominent figures in the national government.

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Oklahoma Families Are Caught By Flood

ALTUS, Okla., March 28 (P)—Families living in the Bitter Creek and Turkey Creek lowlands, west of Altus, were rescued from their homes in boats today after the streams had been sent far out of their banks by torrential rains.

Many families fled from their homes last night before the flood waters reached them, but the rise of the water was so swift several families were trapped. County and city peace officers formed a rescuing force to take them from their homes in boats.

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Spanish Aviators Seek To End Flight

BAHIA, Brazil, March 28 (P)—The Spanish aviators, Captains Ignacio Jimenez and Francisco Iglesias, took off at 8:30 a. m. (6:30 E. S. T.) for Rio Janeiro to complete the flight from Seville, Spain, interrupted when they were forced down here Tuesday morning.

The entire police force was called out immediately. It was thought the attacker, described by the child as a "black man," was the same who had committed numerous robberies here the last two weeks.

A man has been arrested and is being held for questioning in connection with the attack.

Shots were exchanged with prowlers by police a short time after the attack.

St. Louis Bank Is Robbed, \$17,000 Lott

ST. LOUIS, March 28 (P)—Three men held up the Citizens State Bank of Maplewood, St. Louis suburb, today and escaped with \$17,000. They kidnaped a teller, who was released unharmed a short time later.

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OIL PROGRAM PLANNED OUT

PRORATION BY BASIS
OF LAST YEAR IS
EFFECTIVE SOON

(By Associated Press)
NEW YORK, March 28.—Curtailment of crude oil production for the current year to the 1928 output of 3,974,187 barrels in the western hemisphere has been agreed upon among leaders of the petroleum industry.

The agreement, expected to be 50 per cent effective April 1 and in full effect by July 1, is the first step in a program adopted by the directors of the American Petroleum Institute for the conservation and stabilization of oil production.

The curtailment will mean a reduction of about 200,000 barrels per day which has been the excess of this year's production over the last daily average of 2,453,051 barrels brought to the surface last year.

Fields in the United States, Mexico and South America are affected by the conservation program, the details of which will be in the hands of five regional committees.

Sir Henri Detering, managing director of the Royal Dutch-Shell companies of Europe, which has interests in this country and in Mexico, Venezuela and Colombia, attended the meeting yesterday. After an one time threatening to up-set the entire plan by refusing to agree to it he finally emerged from the session pledging "100 per cent cooperation."

E. B. Reiser, president of the institute, said after the meeting that no advance in the retail price of oil products was expected at this time as an outcome of the restriction program.

Eventual extension of the plan to cover European and Asiatic production was seen as a possibility in the presence of Sir Henri, who in addition to his position at the head of the Dutch-Shell interests is regarded as the spokesman for the larger oil world producers.

**Ask Resignation
Of Water Chieftain**

SAN ANGELO, March 28.—(By Associated Press) Charles N. Norris, chairman of the state board of water engineers, has displayed partiality toward a power company, Senator Walter C. Woodward of Coleman last night asked the resignation of the official.

Senator Woodward was the principal speaker at the annual conference of West Texas public officials. More than 50 business men from surrounding towns attended the meeting.

It was charged by Senator Woodward that Norris declined to grant requests of an individual for water to be used in an irrigation project, but had extended time for a certain power company on its application for filing privileges.

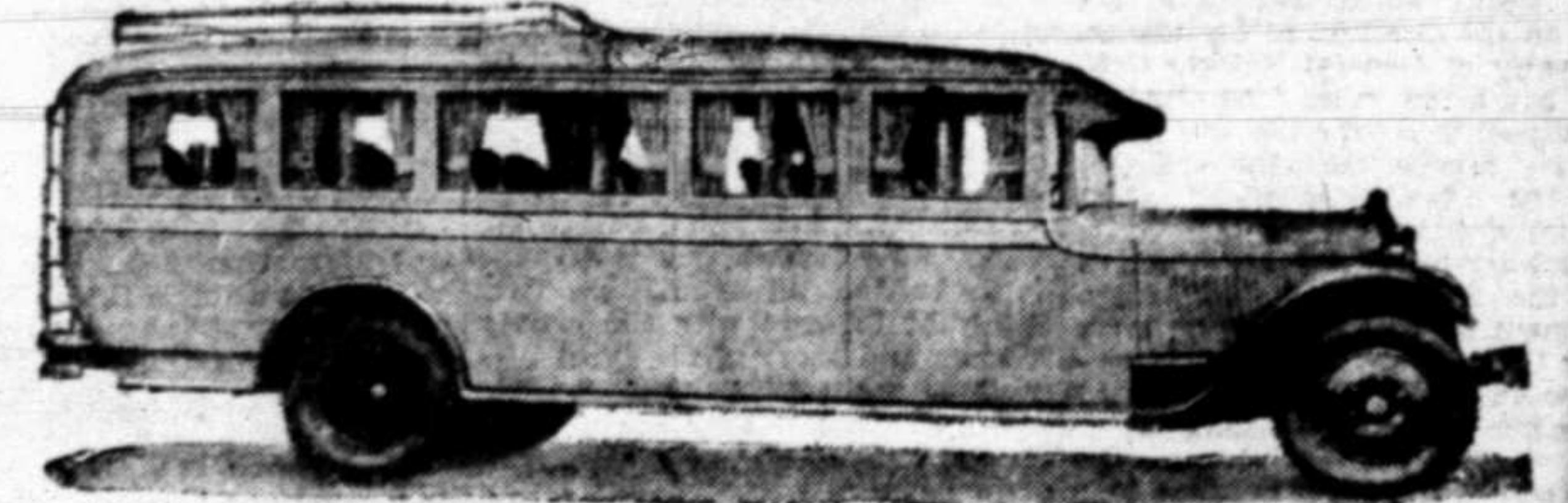

SCHISM IN SOLID SOUTH EXPLAINED BY EDITOR AT STATESMANSHIP MEET

(Special To The Journal)
WINTER PARK, Fla., Mar. 28.—Whether "the solid South" is definitely broken depends on the attitude of the Hoover administration toward "patronage outrages" in the South and "the alacrity with which the democratic party recognizes the fact that national election results last year spelled an emphatic endorsement of prohibition." George Fort Milton, editor of the Chattanooga, Tennessee, News told the Institute of Statesmanship today.

Mr. Milton addressed the gathering on "The Future of the Democratic Party in the United States." He expressed the hope that "in each of the Southern states there will grow sound social and economic foundations, a strong opposition party."

"Nothing could contribute more vitally to the health and strength of the democratic party," he said, "than the knowledge that when the democrats nominate a weak, corrupt or inept candidate for office, the man will have the fight of his life to win the plum he seeks."

Concerning the outcome of last year's presidential election, Mr. Milton declared that "by no means do we attribute to the operation of religious prejudices in the South the most substantial share of the determination of the result." "The democratic candidate in 1928, although a man of appealing personality, was nurtured by a political organization, the very name of which has been for decades a hissing byword in the South, and was committed to political views which were anathema to probably a majority of the people of the South."

"The dry anti-Tammany democrats of the South who left the party rather than vote for a wet presidential candidate who was a sachem of Tammany Hall, can hardly be expected to return to the ranks of democracy on a further campaign by the party against prohibition or to put the tiger in the White House."

"The 1928 campaign led to the national referendum on prohibition which Mr. Haskob had forecast. The American people emphatically disapproved the attempt to overturn prohibition as a national policy. In view of this nationwide verdict of the voters, north, south, east and west, prohibition must be regarded as having received the definite approval of the people, and the democratic party must not be committed to a candidate and a campaign for prohibition's overthrow."

He also said he was mobilizing Durango agrarians to combat the "Cristeros."

"Cristeros" is a name applied in some parts of Mexico to those so-called religious insurgents who use the battle cry, "Viva Cristo Rey" or "Lon Live Christ, King."

LIGHT CAVALRY ENTERS JIMENEZ

MEXICO CITY, March 28.—(AP)—The army of General Calles continued its relentless plodding northward today, and, as light cavalry prepared to occupy Jimenez, former headquarters of Rebel General Escobar, completed the occupation of southeastern Chihuahua.

General Calles reported to President Portes Gil that aeroplanes flying over Jimenez did not see a single rebel soldier there. The planes continued northward and bombed two troop trains which had left the town in the direction of Chihuahua.

Cavalry of General Eulogio Ortiz were but a few miles from Jimenez and expect to occupy the city today. Military experts here thought possibly the rebels' evacuation was to Bachimba Pass, a few miles south of Chihuahua, where they would face the federal army and fight. The main body of the federal army under General Almazan was just south of Escalon and expected to occupy that city immediately.

SPURNS CHARGE TO FIGHT IN OPEN

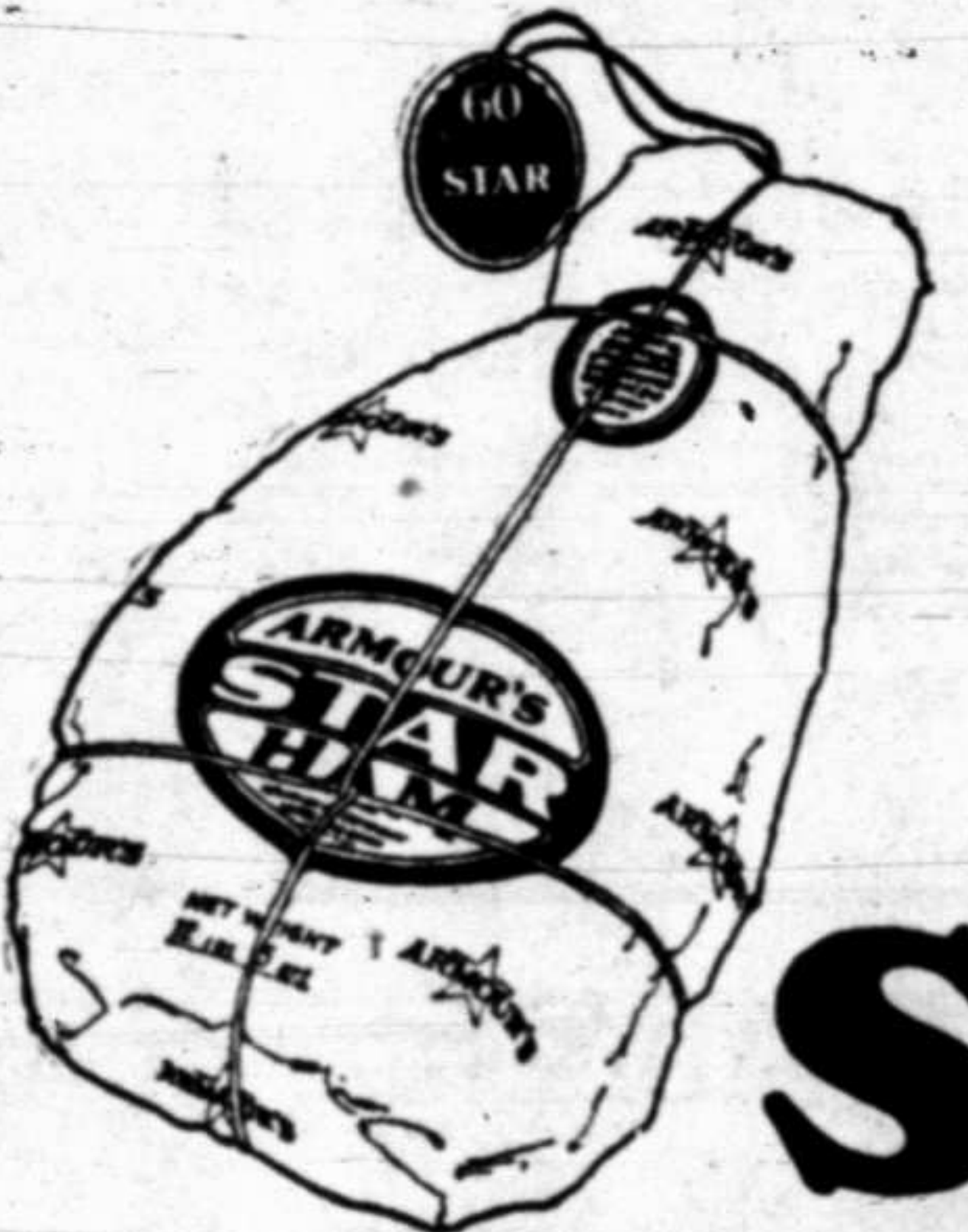
NACO, Sonora, Mexico, March 28.—General Lucas Gonzalez, commander of the federal garrison here, today announced he had spurned a charge from General Fausto Topete, rebel commander, camped with his troops ten miles away, to "come out of our trenches and fight it out in the open."

FRANCE ALSO IN SHIP FUSS

DEATH OF SEAMAN ON I'M ALONE TO GET KICK BY FRENCH

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, March 28.—France, as well as Great Britain and Canada, is now interested in the sinking of the Canadian schooner "Im Alone" by an American patrol boat in the Gulf of Mexico.

This complication has been added to the case by a report from the French consul at New Orleans that the seaman drowned when the alleged rum runner went down was a French citizen. He had been described previously as a naturalized British subject.

The French embassy immediately cabled this information to the foreign office at Paris, and is expected to await instructions before taking up the matter formally with the state department.

Unlike the British and Canadian diplomatic representatives, who are concerned with the broad principles involved in the sinking of the vessel and interpretations of the 1924 rum smuggling treaty, the French embassy's interest has to do chiefly with the death of one of its nation's citizens.

The French consul, however, may have to be called upon by the state department and the Canadian legation to contribute such information as he may have about the distance of the "Im Alone" from the Louisiana coast when first summoned to heave to for boarding and examination by the coast guard patrol boat Wolcott.

Passengers Taken From Ship, Aground

CHERBOURG, March 28 (P).—Passengers were taken from the Cunard liner Transylvania this morning in lighters after it ran aground on a sandy beach as it neared the harbor. It had previously struck back off Ormonville-La-Rogue but had pulled itself off with its own power.

The vessel was believed to be badly damaged and its fuel oil was leaking badly. It was not believed it would be able to continue to Glasgow but would have to go into dry dock here. It was returning from a Mediterranean cruise and had aboard 100 passengers, many of whom were Americans.

Five Coaches On Fast Train Are Wrecked

NORTH CHARLESTON, N. H., March 28 (P).—Twenty of the 40 passengers aboard "The Owl" express, bound from Montreal to New York over the Connecticut River division of the Boston and Maine railroad were shaken up today when five of the eight cars of the train left the rails. Two of the cars, a sleeper and a coach, plunged down an embankment.

Railroad officials said the cause was undetermined.

DIRIGIBLE IS BACK TO BASE

ZEPPELIN COMPLETES 5000 MILE TRIP OVER EUROPE

(By Associated Press)
FRIEDRICHSHAFEN, Germany, March 28.—The dirigible Graf Zeppelin returned to her base here today, completing a voyage of 3 1/2 days and 5000 miles over the Eastern Mediterranean to the Holy Land and return.

It was the second long cruise of the giant dirigible, and in mileage exceeded that of either the trip to America, or the return last year.

En route it passed over Lyons and Marseilles, France, Corsica, Rome, Messina, Corfu, Crete, Cyprus, Haifa, Jerusalem, Crete, Athens, then back along the Adriatic Sea by way

of Hungary to Vienna, Ulm, and Friedrichshafen.

The objection of the British government prevented the ship's passing over Egypt, but its master, Dr. Hugo Eckner, in messages back to Germany he mentioned "unfavorable winds" which kept him from visiting that country.

Coolidge Writes On Preparedness

PHILADELPHIA, March 28 (P).—Calvin Coolidge, writing in the April number of the Ladies' Home Journal on "promoting peace through preparation for defense," says the forces required for adequate national defense should "be large enough so that others would see that there would be a great deal of peril involved in attacking us."

"They should not be so large," the former president says, "that our country would feel that we would undergo no peril in attacking others."

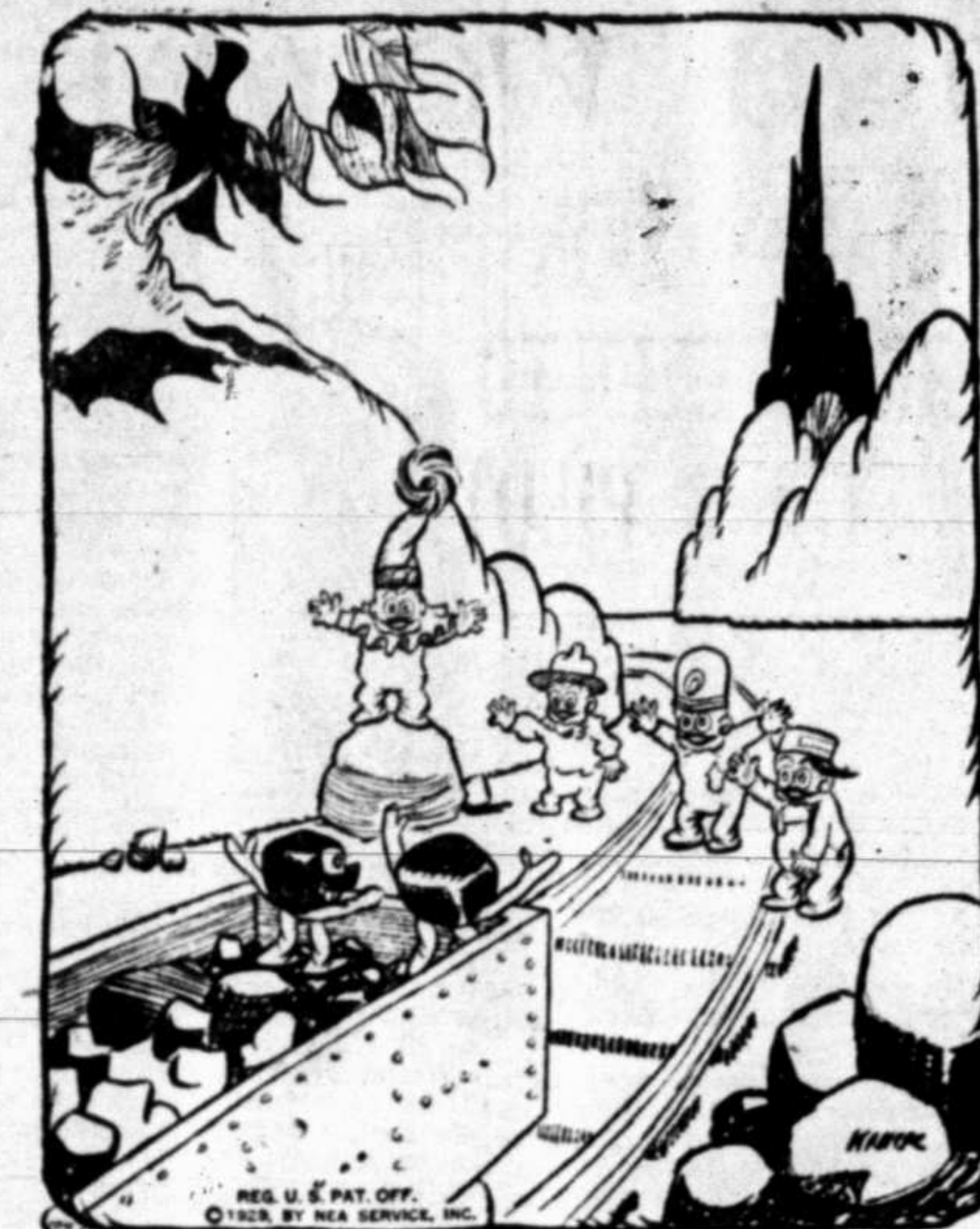

20-MILE ICE JAM BLOCKS MISSOURI

ARMY USED THOUSAND POUNDS OF DYNAMITE IN EFFORT TO SPEED THE FLOW OF WATER

BISMARCK, N. D., March 28.—Army engineers in charge of efforts to break the ice gorge in the Missouri river south of here today estimated 50,000,000 tons of ice is obstructing the flow of water. The jam was estimated to be 20 miles in length.

While gauge readings here indicated the high water mark of the flood season had been passed, down stream the level was higher than at any other time since the gorge formed.

Major G. R. Young, in charge of operations, who estimated the weight of the ice, arranged to make another survey flight over the ice field with a view to determining the most effective methods of continuing dynamiting.

Wednesday 1,000 pounds of dynamite was exploded and army officials declared operations must be continued. Although the great weight of water pressing down on the gorge is slowing breaking it up, they said, unless the work is speeded, the flow of water may be blocked for days.

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Commerce yesterday formulated plans to secure a representative delegation from this city and county. It is planned to take the Lubbock high school band and as many farmers and business men as can be obtained. F. A. Norman, chairman of the dairy committee, urged the attendance of everyone who can go, pointing out that this county, one of the best dairy counties in the state, deserves a large representation.

Mr. Norman together with Dr. I. E. Baur, and Dick Smith compose a committee to make arrangements for the trip. Those planning to go are requested to get in touch with members of the committee.

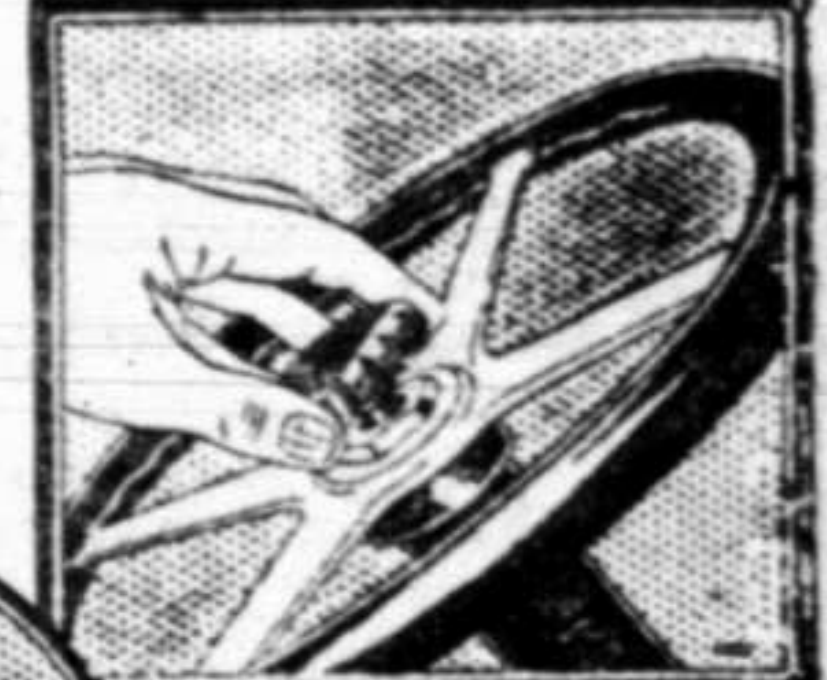

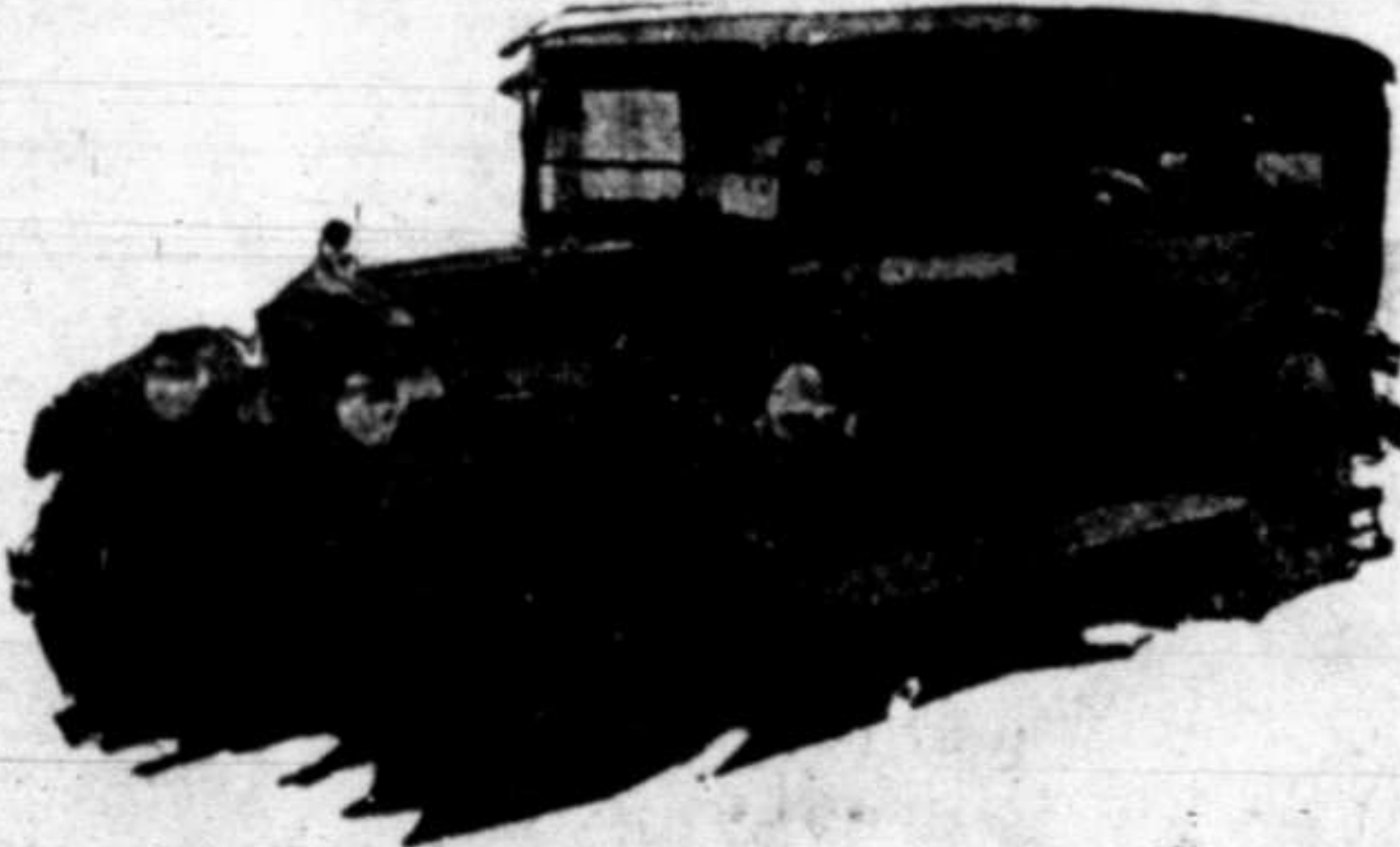

The Traveler

You often hear that the constant
increase in foreign travel will help
make people "better acquainted,"
with other nations and will advance
the cause of permanent world peace.
But Prof. Bernard Fay, writing in
the spring number of the Yale Re-
view, disagrees with this viewpoint.
Casual tourists, he says, can never
bring about international under-
standing.

"They take around the world an
uncomprehending nationalist spirit,
and they bring back, carefully pack-
ed and ready for use, distrust or
contempt," he writes. "In so far
as it creates easy contacts between
people not yet prepared to know or
trust one another, the new trans-
portation system is a very danger-
ous device for misunderstanding of
a foreign country in a person who
has been there is liable to be more
suspicious and invidious than in
the stay-at-home."

If a tourist, visiting a new land,
would strive to make himself tem-
porarily a part of that land, adopt-
ing its customs and ways, all might
be well. But none of us does it
that way. Consequently, we fail to
understand the things that are
strange.

Speed

Two or three days after Major
Segrave set a new auto speed re-
cord by traveling 231 miles an hour
on the sands at Daytona Beach, Lee
Bible demonstrated the risks of that
sort of "sport" by killing himself
and a photographer when the car
in which he tried to break Segrave's
record went out of control.

It is hard not to believe that this
sort of thing ought to be discon-
tinued forever. Pleasure and com-
mercial cars already can go as fast
as anyone in his senses wishes.
Surely the automotive engineers do
not need these speed tests in their
researches. They serve no good
purpose, as far as the layman can
see, and they inevitably cause fre-
quent tragedies.

The powers in the automobile
world would do well to call a halt.

An Old Issue

If you think that the question of
what to do with the vast water
power resources at Muscle Shoals is
a problem confined to post-war
years, you're sadly mistaken. It was
one of the earliest problems raised
in our national life.

Records of the American Philoso-
phical Society, in Philadelphia,
show that the question arose as far
back as 1802. In that year, the so-
ciety's minutes show the following
entry:

"Donations: a plan for Mus-
selle Shoals, Tennessee, Mr. Vaughn
appointed to obtain from Sam Brown,
of Lexington, some further account
of it for publication."

Unfortunately, the record ends
there, so there is no way of telling
whether the early philosophers fa-
vored government operation or out-
right sale to the Henry Ford of that
period.

election The Plainsman offered

position to balance his ideas for it.

The writer readily admits that it

taxes. Whether it is unpatriotic
or not to feel that way, the
majority of us would rather pay
almost anything else in the
place of taxes. Somehow or
another the word "tax" rubs

WASHINGTON, March 28.—One
of the most impressive lists of
names ever signed to any thing
is attached to a petition ask-
ing President Hoover to call an
international conference on con-
servation of natural resources.

The proposed conference would
provide for an inventory of such
resources through-
out the world and
would function
with a view to
conserving the
material property not only of the
United States, but of the rest of
the world.

Such an idea seems to be in
Hoover's own alley, for he is the
most highly placed economic ex-
pert, engineer and conservationist
in the world. Whatever his
reaction to a proposal of such
magnitude, he will not be likely
to ignore it.

More than 175 conservationists,
college presidents, editors, educa-
tors, economists, business men, la-
borers, bishops, governors, authors
and other widely known persons
signed the letter to Hoover. A few

This army of petitioners advises

tions addressed, only five small ones
declined to participate.

"The people of every country,"
Roosevelt said at the time, "are

not only because these are inter-
changeable through processes of
trade, but because a knowledge of

Among the most interesting col-

naturally to Brillat-Savarin) and to
the whole literature of gastronomy,
Mr. Rothenberg adds injury to in-
sult by claiming that Hungarian
food is the last perfected work in
cooking. Last word, indeed! Shades
of Vatel, Dr. Leopold, Saintsbury
and Morton Shand! Ghosts of a
thousand noble cooks of la belle
France! I shed tears—I cannot
speak such sacrilege."

"But that being Mr. Rothenberg's
opinion, he may state it; he has a
right to it, however savage it may
be."

"Nevertheless, only a barbarian
can stomach Hungarian food—
which cuisine is based on the prin-
ciple of what we term 'hash'—be
it porkchop, goulash (not, as Mr.
Rothenberg writes, 'goulasch') or
kugel, all are equally horrible, mes-
sery and disgusting mixtures, sweep-
ings of the kitchen. The only dis-
tinct I ever partook of in Hun-
garian territory was Viennese ap-
proach, but that is quite anoth-
er thing, and after all, a dish de-
liberately stolen from the Germans."

"I cannot, however, allow Mr.
Rothenberg's statement to stand
that the eater would not mind dull
food if he could wash it down with
a draft of tokay. Only a person of
the lowest tastes would think of
washing down food with any kind
of wine unless it were French, in
ordinaire diluted with water, which
is not classed as wine. And no civil-
ized person who loves art and of
eating would wash down food with
today. Tokay, indeed! Does Mr.
Rothenberg know what tokay is?
It is a sweet, heavy wine, almost
liqueur. Fancy drinking such stuff
with fish, meat—in fact, with any
part of the meal!"

FOODS THAT BRING DISCOM-

TO OTHERS

Oranges and Kidney Trouble
"Do you consider oranges harmful
to one who has kidney trouble? My
mother thinks that even one orange
a day makes her worse. They are
rich in all diet
lists, and we love
them."

NEW YORK, March 28.—While oranges
and other citrus
fruits are acid to
the taste, this
acid is an or-
ganic acid which
is completely ox-
idized in the
body, leaving al-
kaline salts with
which it is com-
bined, so the
final reaction of
these fruits is
alkaline. (The
acid of the tomato is the same.)
They should not in any way irritate
the kidneys.

However, it occasionally happens
that for perhaps some unknown rea-
son, a food or medication that is
perfectly assimilated by most with
no ill effects, will have some un-
desirable reaction on a very few.
These have what is known as an
idiosyncrasy to these foods or medi-
cations. It may be possible that your
mother has an idiosyncrasy to or-
anges, but this is very unusual.

We have an article on Kidney In-
flammations if you are interested.

Mrs. C.—There is nothing I can
recommend to reduce overlarge
breasts except a general reduction.
The reason for this is that the
breasts in late life not infrequently
are the seat of cancer if there has
been some injury to them, and mas-
sage, heavy enough to produce a
tendering in the tissue, might possibly
injure them. Then, if it happened
that there were already cancer be-
ginnings, massage would stimulate
them and cause a scattering of the
cancer cells. For this reason, any
one who has a lump in the breast

seems fixed in his purpose of

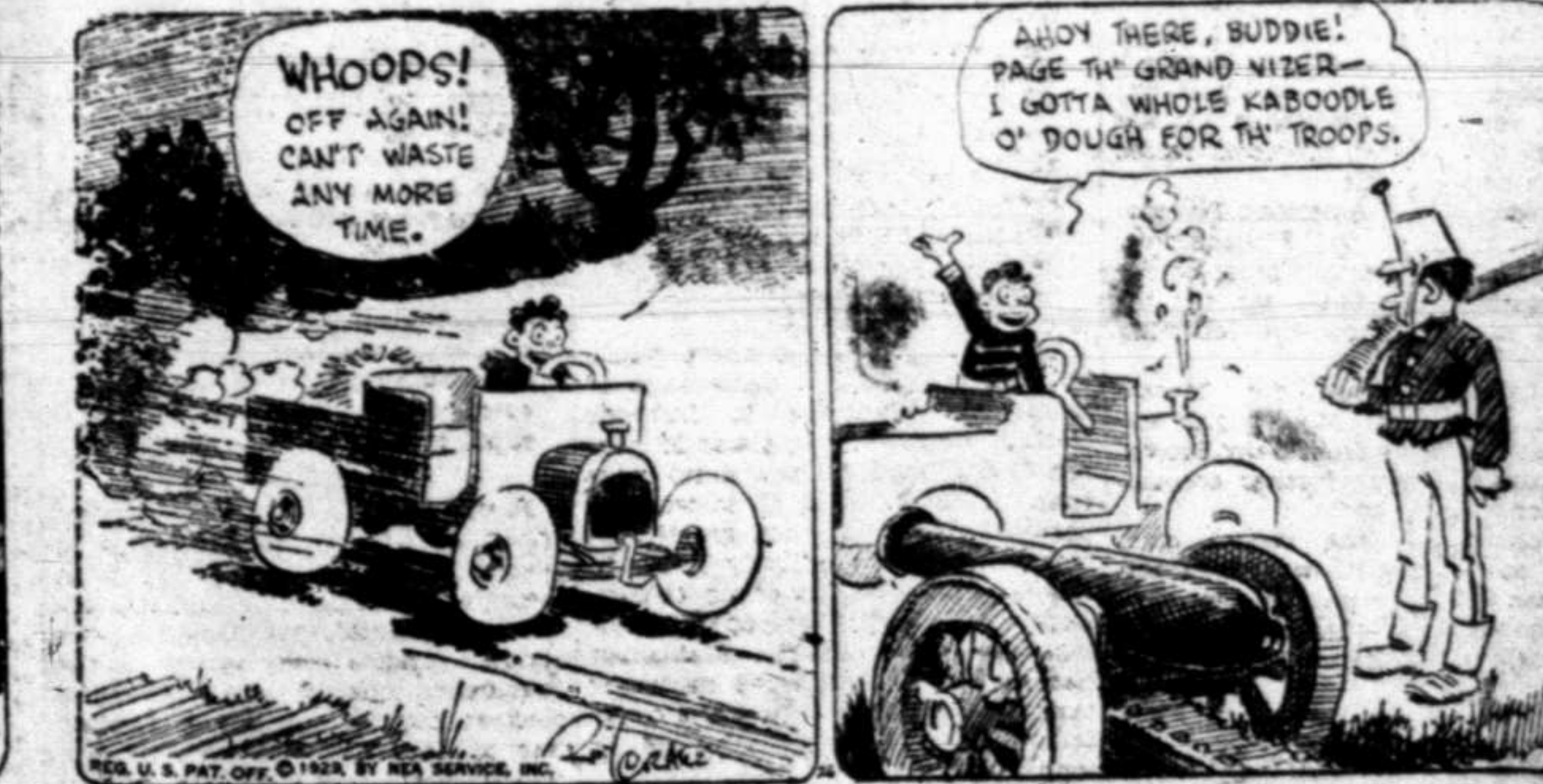

RADIO OPENS THREE POINTS HIGHER EARLY TODAY

NEW YORK, March 28.—Stock prices rallied briskly at the opening of today's market. Radio opened 3 points higher, and initial gains of 1 to 2-1/2 points were recorded by Continental Can, Atlas Powder, Studebaker, Greene Cananea Copper, Missouri Pacific and Westinghouse Electric. Standard Oil of New Jersey opened with a block of 14,000 shares at 58 1/8, up 1 1/8, and Rio Grande oil opened with a block of 10,000 shares at 42, up 1 3/4.

Announcement that the leading oil executives had agreed upon a policy of oil conservation brought a flood of buying into those issues. Several blocks of 5,000 to 12,000 shares changed hands, with early gains of a point or more recorded by at least a dozen issues including Maryland, Mexican Seaboard, Pan-American B. Pure Oil and Richfield. Anaconda, Chile and Andes Copper made up the dividends which came off these stocks today.

Delayed short covering by traders who sold stocks in the midst of Tuesday's reaction stimulated the advance in a number of pool specialties. Radio ran up five points, National Cash Register 4 1/2, Nevada Copper 3 1/2, and Safeway Stores and International Nickel 3 each. American Can, General Motors and Paramount Famous Lasky were among the many issues to sell a point or so higher.

International Telephone soared nearly 15 points to a new high record at 275. American Express dropped five points.

Foreign exchanges opened easier, with cables down 1-3/4 of a cent to \$4.55 11-3/4.

ADVANCES OF 4 TO 6 POINTS MADE AT NEW ORLEANS

CHARGE GRAFT IN ARMS SALE

SAY DOUGLAS POLICE SOLD MACHINE GUNS TO INSURGENTS

(By Associated Press)

DOUGLAS, Ariz., March 28.—Charges that two city-owned machine guns and 37,000 rounds of ammunition had been sold to Mexican rebels for \$2,000 and the city received only \$500 of the money, precipitated an investigation of the whole city administration by the United States Department of Justice today.

Chief of Police Leslie Gatliff and Police Captain Walter Morris were arrested and arraigned yesterday on charges of conspiring to smuggle arms across the border. Each was released under \$5,000 bail.

Federal officials made ten arrests after a preliminary investigation of the transaction. Adrian Enriquez, Raul H. Leon and Gonzales Sosa and five others, whose names were withheld, were taken into custody and had not been released this morning. United States officials said they expected to make ten more arrests.

Charges that the guns and ammunition had been sold to the rebels in violation of an embargo for \$2,000 and that the city treasury received only \$500 of the amount was made in an affidavit by A. J. Duarte.
