4-H Fat Stock Show Opened Here Today

Final Judging Of Farm Homes Made Here

Crowds Gather To View Prize 4-H Baby Beef Show Being Held At County Fair Grounds

Winners Will Be Announced When Banquet Is Held

Prizes totaling one thousand dollars

Judging of farms entered in the Dawson County Farm and Home Improvement Campaign for the period beginning Jan. 1, 1939 and extending through December 31, of the same year, has been completed. March 6, date of the annual chamber of commerce banquet, has been selected for awarding the \$1,000 in cash to the four farm families showing by their records best results during the year. First award will be \$500, second \$250, third \$150 and fourth \$100.

The following improvements, through comparison of general conditions in Dawson County now and those existing one year ago, have been observed by the judges as direct results of the improvement campaign: more new home; more remodeled houses; more farm houses and farm buildings painted; more farmsteads landscaped; more lawns sodded; foundation plantings added; improved water systems; hot, cold and running water; more completely equipped bathrooms. Further the judges add in a general statement that many farmers have added new furnishings, such as refrigerators, stoves, living room furniture, bedroom furniture, rugs.

First Baseball Meeting Held Wednesday As Plans Laid For Opening New Season

At a meeting of the officers and directors of the Lamesa Baseball Association Wednesday night, plans were laid for the opening of the baseball season in Lamesa.

It was decided at this meeting to enlarge the present grandstand, building a fifty foot extension on the west wing, as well as to paint the stand and the park fence.

This new addition will not only provide a much larger seating arrangement, but will serve as a shade to the box seats, which heretofore have been exposed to the sun.

The season is scheduled to open in Lamesa on Thursday, April 26, with Lamesa playing host to the Lubbock Hubbers. Lamesa opens the season in Lubbock on the Tuesday previous for a two day stand, according to tentative schedules adopted at a meeting of league officials last Sunday in Lubbock.

The same eight clubs which constituted the West Texas-New Mexico League last year, will again be represented this year.

Spring training for the Lobos is expected to get under way about April 1, with Manager Jodie Tate reporting that about ten men have already been signed, with several more good prospects on the list.

A committee will start selling box seats for the new season next week it was announced.

A drive will get under way very shortly for the opening day attendance trophy, which Lamesa won last year, and which they are going after again this year. It is planned to have a very unique souvenir ticket for opening day, which within itself should be worth the price asked.

Enthusiasm in Lamesa has been steadily mounting and officials look forward to an even more successful season than last year.

Wintry Winds And Snow Bring Death To Two Men Near Lamesa Last Friday

Last Friday saw one of the most disagreeable days in the history of this section, when heavy snow, driven by a high north wind, brought death and suffering to many in this vicinity.

The snow, which started falling the early hours of Friday, was described by many as being the wettest ever seen in this section. Drifts of several feet were not uncommon over Lamesa and Dawson County, as well as over the entire South Plains.

Death from freezing of Bill Walker, 39, and J. L. Martin, 22, farmers of the Harmony community southeast of O'Donnell, was discovered Sunday morning with the finding of the bodies 16 miles south east of O'Donnell. These were the only known casualties of the blizzard.

Joint funeral services were conducted Tuesday afternoon at two o'clock in the Harmony school house for the victims. Higginbotham-Funeral Home of this city directed the funeral.

Mr. Walker is survived by his wife and nine children, including three sets of twins. His wife and parents, Mr. and Mrs. George Martin of the Harmony community, survive Mr. Martin.

Bodies of the two men were found by Finis Glethorn and Jack Smith of Harmony community, terminating a search that started late Saturday.

With John Hemmingway and Hubert Walker, brother of Bill Walker, the men had been forced to abandon their car in which they had traveled from Lamesa. They decided to proceed afoot in twos.

Hemmingway and Hubert Walker found safety in an abandoned farmhouse. The victims were within a half mile of a ranchhouse. Bodies were found 150 yards apart.

School Census Will Be Started Here March 1st

Supplies for the taking of the school census has been received in the county and the enumerators should be ready to start work by March 1, according to Jno. Olsen, director of the school census.

In the districts which have a separate depository the supplies have already come to the local school board, but for the rest of the county, the supplies may now be obtained at the office of the County Superintendent.

Trustees should appoint the census enumerator immediately so that they can begin work, soon after March 1. Enumerators should be cautioned to be sure to check the age of the child with the parent so that many of the errors of the past could be avoided. They should also be cautioned about overlooking colored children, and crippled or defective children. Colored children account for the same per capita money as do whites and they are frequently overlooked. Crippled children are often found by a competent enumerator which have been overlooked for years. Many times the State Home for Crippled Children can restore the boys and girls to a normal life.

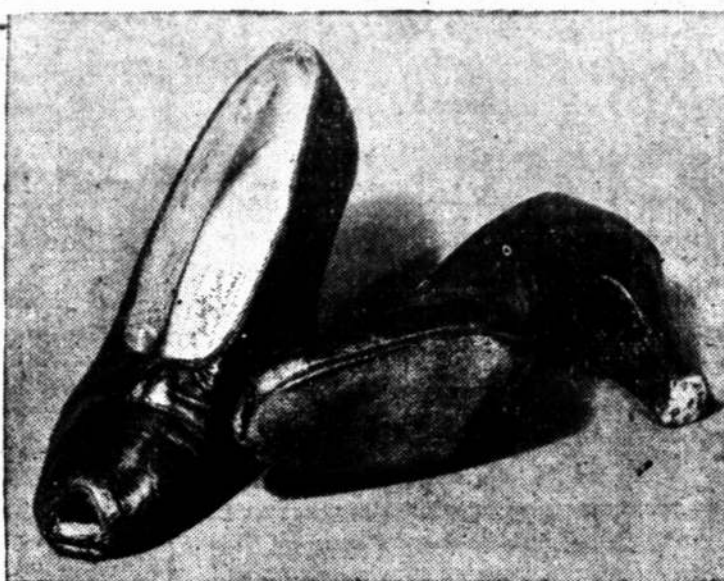

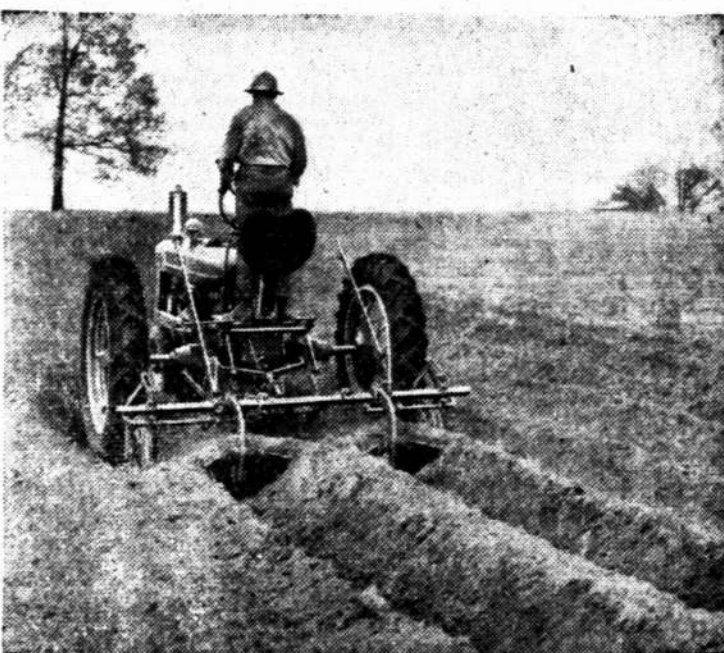

Warn Landlords To Obey Rules

It has come to the attention of the Dawson County A. C. A. Committee that some landlords and operators are charging bonus rent and making other charges for purposes of securing for themselves a share of the agricultural conservation payments to which tenants and sharecroppers are rightfully entitled, said Mr. W. T. Meeks, chairman. The devices employed are varied. In some cases the charges take the form of a cash payment for the same acreage in which a share rent is charged. In other cases they take the form of a payment for each acre not planted to cotton, including idle land. Other arrangements call for a cash rental for all non-depleting crops on the farm, while others call for an additional payment for all land on the farm which is not operated on a regular crop-share basis. A

rental is sometimes charged for the house in which the tenant must live, or for the use of the pasture land; and in some instances the tenants are required to pay the taxes on the farm for the current year.

The secretary of Agriculture has made a determination that such bonus rents or charges when "practiced under conditions where they have not heretofore been regular rental procedure, clearly constitute an attempt to deprive tenants and sharecroppers of payments to which they are otherwise entitled, under the agricultural conservation program within the meaning of the applicable provisions of the 1938, 1939, and 1940 Agricultural Conservation Program bulletins, and that payments be withheld, where made, recovered from any landlord or operator employing such devices." Such determination was made pursuant to Section XI, subsection C, of the 1938 Agricultural Conservation Program Bulletin, and Section 10, subsection (c) of the 1940 Agricultural Conservation Program Bulletin.

If any such bonus-renting was started in 1938 or 1939 or is begun in 1940 under conditions where it has not been regular rental procedure, or if bonus-renting was an established practice prior to 1938 but the amount of the bonus rent was increased in 1938 or 1939 or is increased in 1940 and such action is not justified by definitely increased benefits to the tenant or sharecropper (excluding those benefits attributable to cooperation in the Agricultural Conservation Program), it clearly constitutes an attempt to secure for the owner or

operator a share of the agricultural conservation payment to which the tenant or sharecropper is entitled. This sort of practice on the part of some landlords and operators is seriously damaging the farm program in this area, continued Mr. Meeks. If any such practices are reported to this committee and they are found to be in effect, immediate steps will be taken to apply the regulations in any case reported.

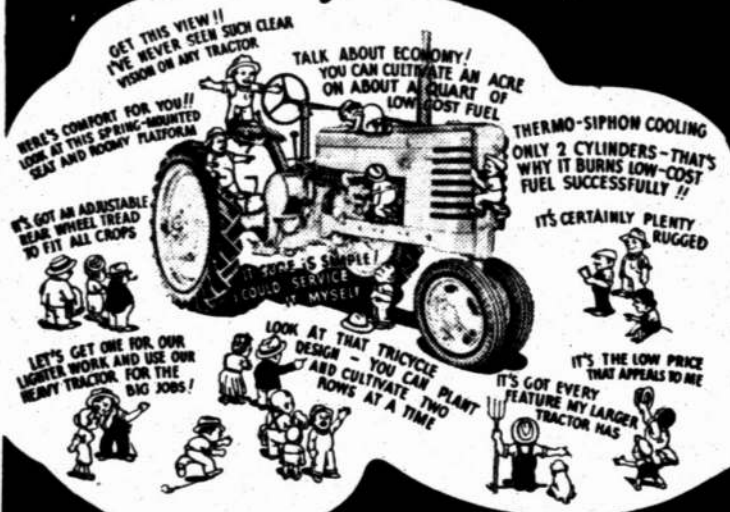

Thanks Santa Fe For Rescue Work

State and county officials offered high praise today for assistance offered by the Santa Fe Railway in the rescue of hundreds of persons snowbound on the highways during the recent blizzard which paralyzed South Plains traffic. State Senator George H. Nelson, who took one of those taking an active part in the rescue work, declared that if it had not been for such prompt assistance that doubtless many would have suffered serious harm from exposure.

More than 300 men, women and children were rescued. Officials and train crews were aided in rescue work by State Highway Patrolmen and radio stations.

Several extra trains were run out of Lubbock in response to appeals from Senator Nelson, Mayor T. J. Shelton of Plainview, and others. Working in face of severe hardships the trainmen fought the elements until all were safe.

Addressing the Down Town Bible Class at Lubbock, Sunday, following the storm, Senator Nelson said: "Anything I might say would be inadequate in expressing my gratitude to Santa Fe Railway officials for the prompt action and aid they provided. Had it not been for this promptness, it is hard to describe the seriousness which may have resulted. I feel that the people of the Plains join me in thankfulness for the wholehearted cooperation in which the Railway officials responded to our appeal for help."

"Action by the Railway was one of the most commendable acts I know. As mayor of Plainview, and speaking for the people of this area, I wish to say that such humanitarian cooperation is highly appreciated by all."

J. A. Gillies, general manager of the Santa Fe Western Lines, under whose orders the rescue work was speeded, asserted that officials felt it a public and humanitarian duty to respond to the general distress.

Borden County To Stage Club Boys Stock Show

According to County Agent Frank W. Medley, the 4-H Club boys of Borden County will have their show Saturday, March 23.

The Land Use Planning Committee of Borden County worked in harmony with the clubbers in sponsoring a movement to raise funds to build a show barn and rodeo arena. The Commissioner's Court made a generous contribution which encouraged the boys to reach their goal. Most of the clubbers made a diligent effort toward raising funds. Along with the interest in the barn, the clubbers were interested in a contest to see which one could raise the most money. The prize for the winner is a free trip (all expenses paid) to the Farmer's Short Course at A. and M. College on July 8 to 13, 1940. One boy received \$121, all of which was donations.

Contributions were made by the people of Borden, Dawson, Howard and Scurry Counties.

When sufficient funds were raised to construct the barn, the county agent submitted building plans to members of the Land Use Committee for their approval. The plan of the barn approved was for a building 30 by 100 feet. The building is now completed. Many people who did not contribute money toward this project came to the building site and contributed labor in the construction of the building.

Along with the construction of the barn and with funds raised in like manner, a rodeo arena is being constructed. The arena will be 180 by 284 feet and will be enclosed in a seven foot fence. This arena will be used on show days for free calf and goat roping contests in which only citizens of Borden County will be contestants.

At times other than 4-H Club show days the boys will lease this arena to any individual or group of individuals for the purpose of holding rodeos. The boys think that enough revenue will be earned by this procedure to care for the ex-

penses of the future club shows. The show this year will consist of club steers, lambs, and hogs. Some breeder stock, saddle horses and colts will also be shown.

The stock of this show will be judged by George W. Barnes, Beef Cattle Specialist of the Extension Service.

On the date of the show a free barbecue and trimmings will be served to all who attend. At the time of livestock judging, the schools of Borden County will give entertainment for those people who are not interested in the judging of the livestock.
