Another Messiah Comes Forth In a Canadian Province

Alberta province in the Dominion of Canada has welcomed another messiah, who is going to teach the people how to live, in a governmental sense, under the Social Credit Party auspices. They have been promised a \$25 monthly dividend regardless—this while the head of the municipal government in the two principal cities of Alberta are predicting that disaster awaits the people of the province and that the municipal governments of Alberta will be unable to pay interest on the securities they have floated. Messiah Aberhart is very confident. He is going to put his scheme of government, legislatively speaking, into operation.

Is this soviet rule in a Canadian province, or is it a plunge into the future on a gambling chance of the Messiah and his advisors?

It extends "congratulations to the Texas Company and to the Gulf Refining company in acknowledgement of the community's appreciation of the obligation to these two great concerns expending a total of \$8,000,000 in plant units and modern processes to meet the great demand for the two finest lubricating oils made today—Gulfpride by the Gulf and Havoline by Texaco."

AMARILLO.—One of Texas' biggest expositions this year, the Tri-State Fair, will be open here Sept. 14 for eight days, Wilbur C. Hawk, fair association president, announced today.
The Tri-State Fair takes first rank among Texas fairs of its kind because of the suspension of the Dallas State Fair this year due to preparations of the Centennial celebration in 1936.
An innovation in agricultural exhibits is planned for this year's fair. Hawk announced. Instead of having counties compete for prizes each county entering a worthy exhibit will receive \$50 in cash.
This, it was explained, will induce more counties to enter and will give the different regions a better chance of displaying products characteristic of their territory. So called "standard exhibits" consisting of "one pump-kin," will not be given prominent display, it was said.

Mourning Dove Hunting Laws Are Held Constitutional

WASHINGTON.—Objections to federal mourning-dove hunting regulations on constitutional grounds have been over-ruled.
Judge H. Church in federal court at Lexington, Ky., has declared that the act of congress giving the secretary of agriculture power to set hunting seasons on migratory game birds and the regulations adopted thereunder are "valid and constitutional." The section of the act involved in the



ruling prohibits the hunting of migratory game birds except during such seasons and by such means and methods as the secretary shall permit by regulations.
The ruling, says the biological survey, which administers the federal bird laws, was made in an opinion handed down on Aug. 31, dismissing an action instituted by local sportsmen who objected to extending the close season on mourning doves to Sept. 21. The complainants, says the bureau, sought to enjoin the United States marshal and United States district attorney from enforcing the regulations. The regulations, they argued, resulted from an unconstitutional delegation of legislative power and violated the due-process-of-law provision of the Fifth Amendment.
Commenting on the contention that the regulation was based on an unconstitutional delegation of power, Judge Ford pointed out that the recent N.R.A. cases on which the complainants relied "clearly recognize that, while con-
