Love of animals inspires new head of Humane Society

A love of animals is what made Lisa Davis decide to quit her nursing job and become manager of the Big Spring Humane Society.

She had been a nurse at Best Home Care for two years before taking the new position.

Davis has been on the job for one week and is in the process of making the shelter more appealing to customers. The Eagle Scouts are scheduled to paint this weekend and a group of federal prisoners will soon remove the old carpet and replace it with ceramic tile.

"This is my favorite place to be. There is a group of real dedicated volunteers and there is a lot that needs to be done considering the number of animals we have," said Davis.

"We needed to establish a routine, get things cleaned up and organized. It has been a busy

week. I am hoping once things are cleaned up, people will be more apt to come out and volunteer or adopt an animal."

Because the shelter is run strictly on donations, Davis said she really needs some volunteers and donations from the community.

She thanks the Dora Roberts Foundation and Dorothy Garrett for their support of the shelter. Any donations made are considered tax deductible.

"We could really use a new truck. If anyone has a good, used one they want to donate and have as a tax write-off, we could use it. Also if anyone has an old vacuum cleaner, we could use that too," Davis added.

She also needs some volunteers to help out with daily routines of feeding and watering the animals and other chores.

The shelter may eventually expand its hours to be open Saturdays. It is open Monday through Friday 4-6 p.m. and on Sundays 3-5 p.m.

Stanton taxes to stay about the same

STANTON - A slight rise in property valuation allowed a corresponding drop in Stanton's effective tax rate for 1995-96.

At a budget workshop during the Aug. 14 regular meeting of the Stanton City Council, members learned that, contrary to the trend in Martin County and other local taxing entities in West Texas, the City of Stanton will probably not need to raise taxes to fund next year's budget.

The final form of the budget will be presented for approval at the next regular meeting of the city council.

The council considered a request from cheerleaders at Stanton High School that West Second Street between Highway 137 and Kunz Street be renamed. A number of streets in Stanton are being renamed and re-signed as part of the city's efforts to comply with the requirements of the 911 system.

West Second, which leads directly into the high school, will be renamed Buffalo Trail. The council also approved requests for placement of streetlights at the intersections of Oak and St. John streets and of Elizabeth and Convent streets.

The city's 1995 sealcoat project has been completed. About 15 blocks of city streets and about a mile of the airport were resealed. The airport coating was done with a grant from the Federal Aviation Administration.

Application cards available to carry concealed handguns

Local residents can pick up an application card to carry a concealed handgun at any Department of Public Safety office.

The cards are free and may be obtained by individuals or business owners who want to distribute them to their customers. The local DPS office is in the basement of the Howard County Courthouse.

Application packets will be mailed to those applying beginning Sept. 1. Courses by certified instructors can also start Sept. 1.

To be eligible for a permit,

you must be at least 21, have never been convicted of a felony or Class A or B misdemeanor or have been charged with a Class A or B misdemeanor or felony. Applicants can't be chemically dependent or of unsound mind, delinquent in child support payments, in default on a student loan or be restricted under a court protective order.

Training requirements include:

- Ten to 15 hours of proficiency training with classroom instruction administered by a qualified handgun instructor.

- Instruction on laws related to weapons and the use of deadly force, handgun use, proficiency

and safety, dispute resolution and proper storage practices.

- A continuing education course for a license holder who wishes to renew a license.

- An exam that includes a written section and physical demonstration of proficiency in the use of one or more handguns.

The four-year license costs \$140. Elderly and indigent people receive a 50 percent discount.

Lotto leads to lawsuit for Rains

Howard County's most recent lottery winner, Carol Rains, is being sued for \$17.15 million.

In a lawsuit filed last Thursday in the county's 118th District Court, R.C. Mills claims Rains breached an oral contract to split her \$12.87 million winnings with him. Rains was one of four people to share a \$51.5 million jackpot on May 31.

Mills is suing for \$6,435,210 — half of her winnings. He is also asking \$3 million for mental anguish, at least \$3 million in punitive damages, and \$4,717,605 in attorney's fees. The suit requests a trust be imposed on Rains' prize winnings during the course of legal action.

Mills, a retiree from Big Spring's Fina Oil and Chemical, said in the suit as part of his daily routine since his retiring, he has coffee at Herman's Restaurant, where he met Rains, a waitress there for many years prior to winning.

The suit alleges after their initial meeting at Herman's Restaurant the two began playing the lottery together, with Mills purchasing the tickets most of the time. The winnings were split 50-50.

On several occasions Mills and Rains won \$20 or more playing the lottery's scratch-off games and won a \$500 scratch-off prize before Rains won big

on May 31.

The suit alleges around May 29, Mills purchased two Quick-Pick tickets at the East Fourth Street Fast Stop in Big Spring and delivered one of the tickets to Rains.

After the winning numbers were announced, the two discussed the winning ticket and going to Austin. Mills RAINS claims Rains told him, "You don't have to go, you don't have a damn thing to worry about."

The initial check received by Rains for her winning share of the jackpot was \$643,521.

After making the trip to Austin, Rains allegedly transferred \$50,000 to Mills' account at State National Bank. At that time, he asked if that was all she was going to transfer since he was entitled to half.

The suit also alleges Rains began to avoid Mills and refused to discuss joint ownership of the winnings, that her statement about not needing to go to Austin was misleading and that her actions were fraudulent, intentional or committed with disregard and/or indifference for the rights of Mills.

At first, she told police her brother shot himself between the eyes with their father's .357-caliber pistol, said Broward Sheriff's Office spokesman Ott Cefkin.

The girl later admitted shooting her brother, Cefkin said. She had lied because she was scared her father would beat her, he said.

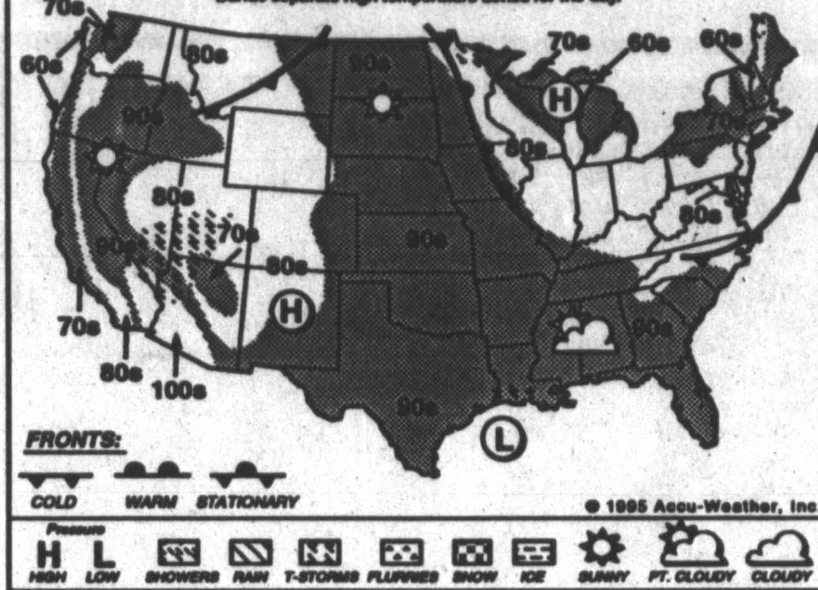

Two Lotto tickets split jackpot

AUSTIN (AP) — Two tickets bought in Harlingen and Weatherford correctly matched all six numbers drawn Saturday night for the twice-weekly Lotto Texas game, state lottery officials said. The jackpot was worth \$60 million.

The numbers drawn from a field of 50 were: 2, 7, 9, 15, 29, and 41.

There were 524 tickets sold with five of the six numbers, with each ticket worth \$1,394. There were 29,119 tickets with four of six numbers, with each winning \$90. And there were 539,505 tickets sold with three of six numbers, with each worth an automatic \$3.

Man electrocuted by lightning

DALLAS (AP) — A man was electrocuted by lightning, winds gusting to near hurricane force and thousands were left without electrical power after strong thunderstorms roared through the Dallas-Fort Worth area.

Rolando Gonzalez, 25, of Irving, was standing under a tree in Center Avenue Park in the Dallas suburb Sunday when lightning struck a tree and passed through him, according to Charles Gaylor, a field agent for the Dallas County medical examiner's office.

Several people suffered minor injuries from broken glass when high winds, gusting to 70 mph damaged several businesses, including a theater in an Arlington shopping center.

Texas plane found near Arizona

SANOSTEE, N.M. (AP) — The wreckage of a plane missing four months has been found in mountains on the Navajo reservation with the skeletal remains of four people aboard.

The wreckage was found Saturday afternoon by a Navajo shepherd in the Chuska Mountains near the Arizona state line, state police and Civil Air Patrol officials said Sunday.

The single-engine Cessna 172 had taken off April 24 from Page, Ariz., after a weekend outing on Lake Powell for three executives of Dallas-based Univesco Inc., a property management company.

The New Mexico Office of the Medical Investigator was to determine positive identification, officers said.

State police said those aboard had been identified from the outset as Teresa Gray, 38, of Plano, Texas; David Kalnes, 37, and David Warren, 42, both of Carrollton, Texas; and pilot Mark Ballow, 45.

"It was just a getaway, just a company retreat. All the executives had rented a houseboat," said Allen Gray, husband of Teresa Gray. She had been Univesco's assistant vice president for residential property management, he said.

The Grays have a 20-month-old son, Michael Allen Gray, he said.

Family and friends had just finished holding a memorial service for his wife a week ago, he said.

Tickets dismissed by the thousands after fines paid

GALVESTON (AP) — Thousands of traffic tickets were dismissed in a troubled municipal court even after fines were paid, apparently allowing someone to pocket the money, according to a published report.

Sources close to the widening investigation say up to \$1 million was stolen over the past decade from Galveston municipal court, according to a report in Sunday's Galveston County Daily News.

The newspaper said it analyzed more than 7,200 computer records of tickets dismissed last year and found a system where tickets given to influential residents were routinely dismissed.

The analysis also found that police officer Jimmy De Los Santos, who doubled as a warrant officer for the court, had 73 tickets dismissed. The officer

said court records were wrong.

"There ain't no way I got that many (tickets)," he said.

In some cases, people apparently paid fines that were not recorded, leaving some innocent people with warrants for their arrest, the newspaper said.

In one case, Cynthia Phillips of Santa Fe, Texas, said she paid the court \$1,000 last May, while official records show that \$675 worth of tickets were dismissed.

Robert Richardson, the city's finance director, said sloppy court management made the scheme possible.

The Galveston County district attorney has been investigating a former court clerk, but no charges have been filed. An independent review of the court found financial mismanagement, including \$4.7 million in uncollected fines in 1994.

Bill would void profits of SW Bell in Texas

DALLAS (AP) — Portions of the new Texas telecommunications law would be voided by legislation recently approved by the U.S. House, according to the bill's sponsor and some Texas congressmen.

The legislation would wipe out Texas rules that prohibit long-distance companies AT&T, MCI and Sprint from competing against Southwestern Bell for local customers, except under certain circumstances.

"We'd preempt some of what Texas has done," said U.S. Rep. Jack Fields, a Republican from Humble, who co-authored legislation approved this month by congress.

Both the Texas telecommunications law and the federal proposals will attempt to allow cable operators, long-distance

companies and local-phone providers to compete against each other.

Bell officials say preemption is unlikely. And the big long-distance companies who stand to gain from the process if the Texas rules are voided, say even if they succeed, it could still take years.

The House bill must be reconciled with a version the Senate passed in June. And President Clinton has promised to veto the bill because of certain cable, telephone and media-ownership provisions.

Supporters say the new Texas law is fair and will bring new investment to the state. Opponents say it will hurt consumers by making it impossible for Bell's challengers to offer local service in all parts of Texas.

KUWAIT BOUND

Soldiers prepare to leave for Gulf

FORT HOOD (AP) — Several hundred more soldiers from Fort Hood waited early today to board planes that would take them to Kuwait for a military exercise that was moved up two months because of reports Iraq was about to go to battle.

A DC-10 and two 747's were scheduled to leave sometime today. In all, approximately 1,400 troops from Fort Hood's 1st Cavalry Division are expected to take part in the coming days in the training exercises with Kuwaiti soldiers.

Although originally scheduled to take place in October, the exercises, dubbed Operation Intrinsic Action, were moved up because of increased activity in Iraq, said Staff Sgt. Christian Mulvey, a spokesman for the Fort Hood information office.

The four- to six-week operation comes on the heels of defections by two top Iraqi officials to Jordan, Iraq's western neighbor.

Lt. Gen. Hussein Kamel al-Majid, who was head of the country's clandestine weapons program and is Saddam Hussein's son-in-law, said he attended meetings of the Cabinet and the Revolutionary Command Council in which invasions of Kuwait and Saudi Arabia were discussed.

Eighty soldiers in battle-dress uniform climbed aboard a C-141 cargo plane Sunday bound for Kuwait.

A second cargo plane — a C-5B carrying 70 soldiers who would complete the advance team — was scheduled to have departed later in the day, but

was canceled.

"There has been a slight delay in the movement of elements of the 1st Cavalry Division deploying to Kuwait for exercise Intrinsic Action. Part of the coordination required en route still needs to be completed to insure a smooth arrival," Mulvey said Sunday.

"It is impossible to predict the length of the delay, but it doesn't appear it will be long. I know that we have three flights scheduled out of here tomorrow," Mulvey said.

There was no way to independently confirm al-Majid's claims. As a newly converted Iraqi opposition figure, it would be in his interest to play up any hints that Iraq was planning such moves.

Oilers, Astrodome at odds again

HOUSTON (AP) — The Houston Oilers might soon be lining up in court against their landlord and county officials who say the club shouldn't have called off an exhibition game.

With concurrence from NFL officials, the Oilers canceled Saturday night's preseason meeting with the San Diego Chargers because of problems with the Astrodome's artificial surface.

The apparently unprecedented decision added another twist in the growing animosity between the Oilers and Astrodome USA, the parent company of the Houston Astros baseball team and manager of the Harris County-owned stadium.

The Oilers, who lease the dome for about \$3 million a year, have long expressed dissatisfaction with the facility and are exploring a move to Nashville.

After the bizarre cancellation Saturday, there was widespread speculation that the Oilers were setting up a breach-of-contract claim against the Astrodome and a loophole out of a contract set to expire in 1997.

Oilers general counsel Steve Underwood denied the Nashville situation entered into

the decision, which he said was made by NFL officials.

"That's really kind of silly," he said. "The idea that we would attempt to cancel a game and inconvenience all of our fans, the people who bought tickets, the opponent team and ourselves is ludicrous."

Cowboys face
Broncos tonight

DENVER (AP) — If Dallas Cowboys coach Barry Switzer has his way, his team will be in peak form tonight when it meets the Denver Broncos.

It's a time for fine-tuning before backing off heading into the regular season.

"We need to make sure our starting group is coming together in the game against Denver," Switzer said. "They won't play much in our last preseason game (against Houston), so this will be a good test for us."

Cowboys quarterback Troy Aikman said his team must use tonight's game to eliminate penalties and mental mistakes that have dogged the Cowboys during the preseason.

"I think the concentration has wavered at times, and I think that should be a little bit of concern for all of us," Aikman said. "It's extremely important for us in this Denver ballgame to go out and look sharp."

It may not be the Ryder Cup, but Janzen satisfied with win

CASTLE ROCK, Colo. (AP) — Lee Janzen ran off four straight birdies, then sank a 6-foot putt to save par at No. 18 and beat Ernie Els by a point Sunday in the International.

Janzen, 30, becoming the first player to post three PGA Tour victories this season but passed over for the Ryder Cup team, vaulted into first place on the money list with \$1,277,827.

Janzen scored 9 points Sunday under a modified Stableford scoring system that awards players 8 points for double eagle, 5 for eagle, 2 for birdie, zero for par, minus-1 for bogey and minus-3 for double bogey or worse.

Els, 25, had three straight birdies of his own, and both players birdied the par-5 17th for 34-point totals.

Els, playing one group ahead, drove into the rough on the par-4 18th and left his approach short of the green. He putted 7 feet past and missed the putt for a bogey, dropping to 33.

Janzen's 5-iron approach to 18 left him a 40-foot putt which he ran 6 feet past, but he made the come-backer.

Els, the first-round leader who started the final round a point behind Janzen, also had a 9-point finale at Castle Pines Golf Club.

Second-round leader Mark Wiebe and third-round leader Jay Haas tied for third with 28 points. Rookie David Duval, who led for much of Sunday's play, finished at 27. Tom Watson, bidding for his first tour victory since 1987, and

Jose Maria Olazabal were at 26.

Greg Norman, winner of this event in 1989 and the tour's previous money leader, was in a group at 24. Norman, who began the day last among the 24 finalists with 15 points, jumped 5 points with an eagle at the par-5 eighth hole but couldn't maintain his momentum.

On Sunday, Claudia Trevino's faith was rewarded when he won his second straight Northville Long Island Classic for a record 25th Senior PGA Tour victory.

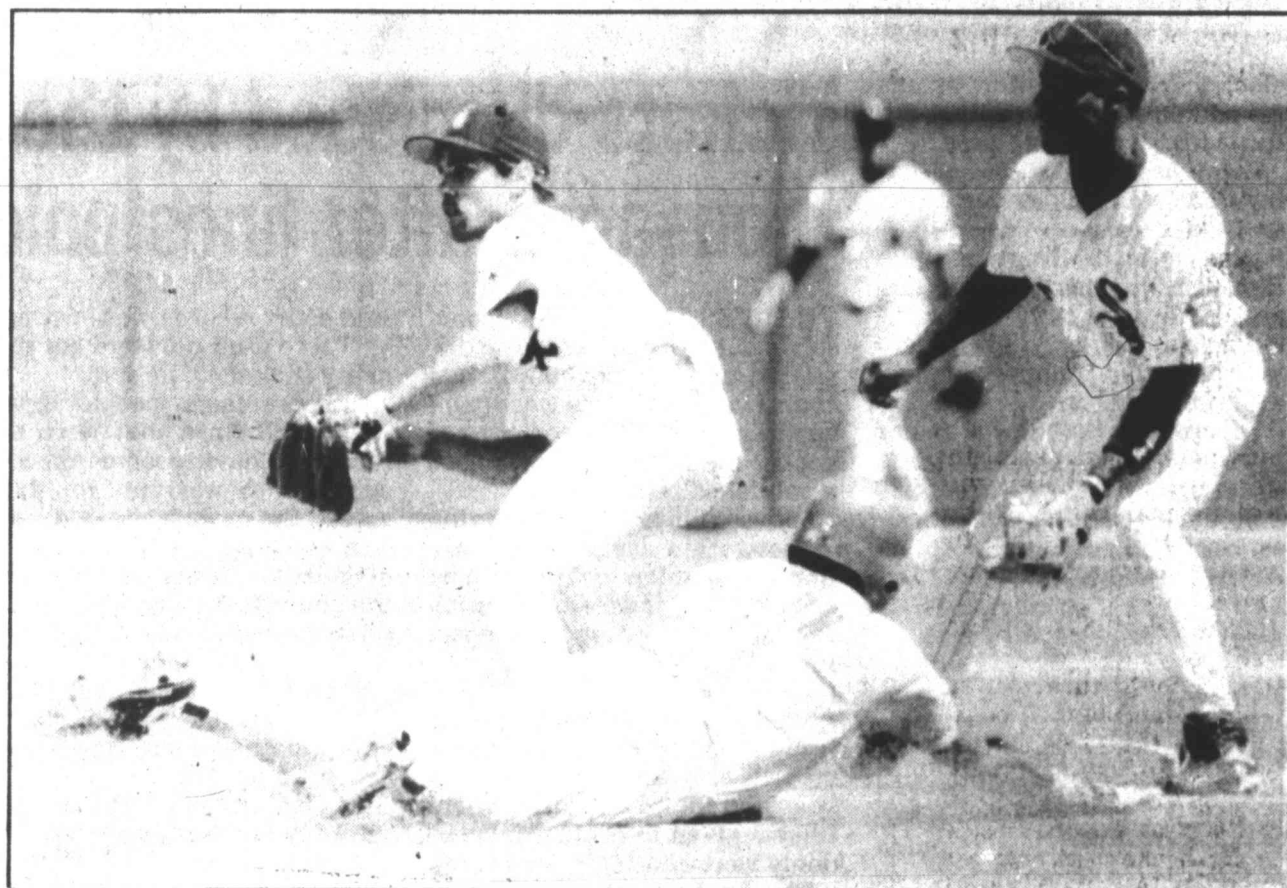
"When I told her I wanted to quit, she kept insisting that things would turn around," Trevino said. "Claudia talked some sense into me. I'm not ready to quit."

Gas gamble gives Labonte checkered flag at Goodwrench 400

BROOKLYN, Mich. (AP) — It seems a shame Bobby Labonte and Jeff Gordon can't race at Michigan International Speedway more often. They staged two memorable duels there this year.

Labonte won both races. And each time, Gordon was driving what appeared to be a superior car. It just goes to show the value of good strategy, to say nothing of a little good luck.

It is but one of the many appeals of the NASCAR Winston Cup series. Brains count as much as brawn, even

on a so-called horsepower track like MIS.

In Sunday's running of the GM Goodwrench 400, Labonte's crew decided to call him in for a tank of gasoline and four new tires with 55 laps remaining. They gambled that would be enough fuel to complete the 200-lap race.

They were correct, but just barely. Bill Elliott, who topped off his tank just one lap earlier, ran out of fuel on the backstretch on the final lap.

Gordon's crew played this cat-and-mouse game by leaving

their man out on the track. He was leading the pack. He had the fastest car. Nobody could touch him. The crew would wait a while longer to bring him in.

But they waited too long. When he finally took a 5.4-second pit stop, there were only 15 laps remaining. It just wasn't enough for Gordon to regain the lead.

"No matter what happened, we were going to have to stop,"

Gordon said. "We could have come in when Bobby came in. It paid off for him. Things went his way this year at Michigan. He and I battled, and he beat us."

"He chanced it and none of the rest of us would. You've got to take your hat off to him."

In the June race at MIS, Gordon set a track record with a qualifying lap of 186.611 mph. But he finished second to Labonte in the race.

This time, the best Gordon could do was third. Labonte, who earned the pole for this race, was followed across the finish Sunday by his older brother, Terry.

It was the second time this year the Labonte brothers have finished 1-2. Terry also followed Bobby across the finish line in May at Concord, N.C.

"We had two guys figuring mileage, one on the computer, one by hand, and they both came up with 55 laps as the magic number," Labonte said. "I asked if they were sure, and

we went for it."

CIA reviews hiring of informants

NEW YORK (AP) — The CIA is doing some soul-searching about hiring foreign agents with dubious backgrounds, but would probably still hire the retired terrorist who helped collar the notorious Carlos the Jackal, the New York Times reported today.

The terrorist-turned-informant had American blood on his hands in the 1960s; he had participated in two bombings that wounded Americans in western Europe, the Times said. After he broke with his past in 1967, the CIA considered his information valuable enough to put him on the payroll and he eventually led to the arrest last year of the Jackal, the self-proclaimed mastermind of attacks that killed 83 people, the Times

reported. The CIA declined to comment on the case, and the Times did not identify the talkative former terrorist.

Some U.S. government officials, who spoke on condition of anonymity, questioned whether a man linked to attacks on Americans should have been hired.

Other government officials outside the CIA who are familiar with the case told the Times that the federal agency probably would hire the retired terrorist again today, despite new rules on recruiting foreign agents.

The officials said the CIA should have told the Justice Department about the informant's terrorist past when he was hired.

Justice Department spokesman Carl Stern told the newspaper that if "making deals with terrorists can prevent people from being killed, then there are occasions where it is appropriate, perhaps even necessary, to deal with them."

In May, the new Director of Central Intelligence, John Deutch, ordered the agency to revamp its informant list, focusing on human rights violations by foreign agents, as well as crimes of violence, terrorism, narcotics and other major felonies.

Deutch also ordered the agency's general counsel to draw up the new guidelines governing recruitment, due to be completed next month.

Officials want to move aged inmate

SIOUX FALLS, S.D. (AP) — Howard Christensen is considered the nation's longest-serving inmate, a slightly demented, cantankerous killer jailed in 1937 when he was 17.

After 58 years, prison officials have had enough. They want to put him in a nursing home but are not sure whether they can find any takers.

Christensen, 75, has spent most of the past six decades in the South Dakota State Penitentiary and in hospital psychiatric wards.

He is now in a cell in the prison's wing for mentally disturbed inmates, where his care costs taxpayers tens of thousands of dollars a year.

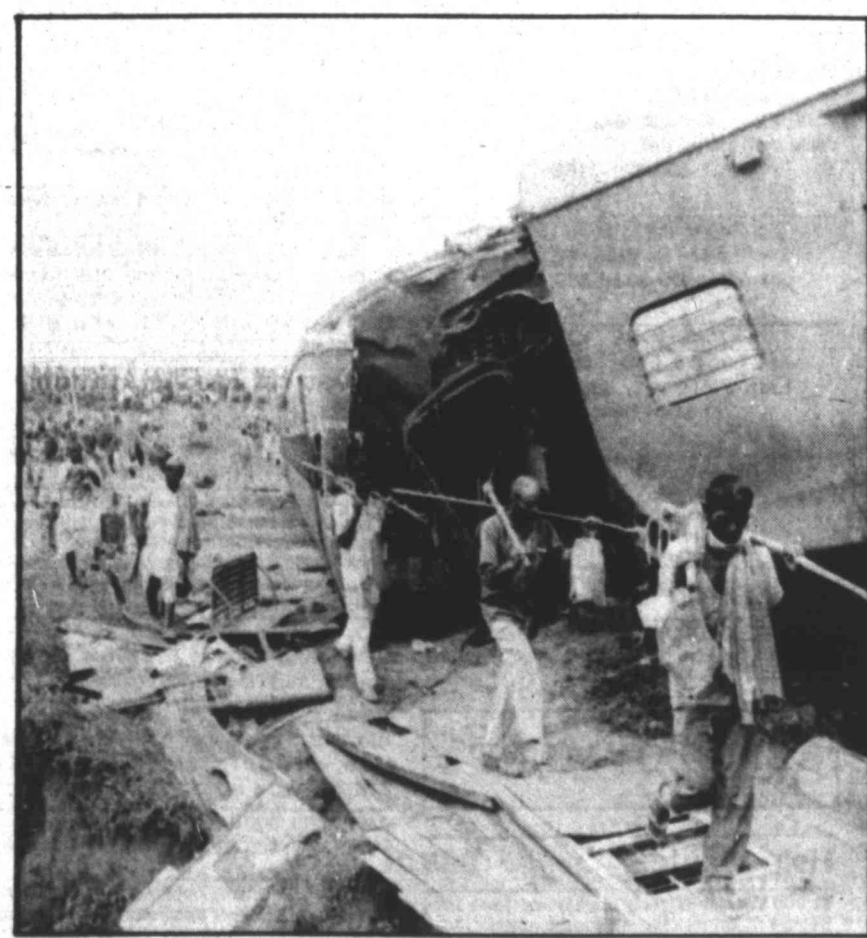
Medicare could pay the bills if he lived outside prison, but Christensen has a long history of being obnoxious to his visitors and fellow inmates, said Rich Wieser, the penitentiary's spokesman.

Even if a nursing home is found, officials would have to determine that he is not a threat to society and Gov. Bill Janklow would have to reduce his life sentence to time served, Wieser said.

A prison geriatric ward would be another alternative, but South Dakota lawmakers have been reluctant to create such a facility.

Still, the case shows that South Dakota, like other states, is ill-equipped to deal with aging prison populations, said Haley, a former prison guard who has interviewed Christensen for a book.

Christensen and another 17-year-old hitchhiker, Norman Westberg, shot and bludgeoned 28-year-old schoolteacher Ada Carvey in a robbery.

India train crash kills 300

FIROZABAD, India (AP) — Rescuers with cranes and blow torches sliced through the tangled remains of two passenger trains today while police searched for the signalman blamed for one of India's worst train wrecks.

At least 300 passengers died and 500 others were injured Sunday when the Puroshottam Express rammed the Kalindi Express outside Firozabad railway station in northern India.

The Kalindi Express had stopped on the tracks after hitting a cow and damaging its brakes.

A signalman gave the crowded Puroshottam a green light to continue down the same line, officials for India's state-owned railway said.

Police were looking for the signalman today. He vanished after the disaster at 2:45 a.m.

just 15 minutes after he came on duty.

"It is definitely human negligence of the railway staff," said M.N. Chopra, a divisional manager of the railway.

Rescuers searched for more victims today, using blow torches to cut through the train wreckage. Corpses were laid in rows in a muddy field nearby.

"The entire area was reverberating with cries and shrieks," said Manas Patnaik, 29, who was traveling from the eastern state of Orissa to New Delhi on the Puroshottam Express.

Between the two trains there were about 2,200 passengers, most of whom were sleeping when the collision occurred.

Both trains were bound for New Delhi, 165 miles north of Firozabad.

Readers rush to fill rude guests' breach of etiquette

DEAR ABBY: Your answer to the Arizona lady who inquired how she should have handled the situation of uninvited relatives who elected to take their leftovers home with them was dismaying to this reader.

Why? Because your answer ignored the fundamental breach of etiquette, and focused on a technicality related to ordered-in food.

The breach of etiquette had three components: First, the visitors arrived unexpectedly; second, the visitors ignored another obvious courtesy they should have shown their hostess -- NOT to stay so long that it becomes necessary to invite them for dinner; and third, since the dinner was ordered in, surely the courteous action would have been to pay part of the bill. In my mind, your response implies that the actions on the part of the guests were acceptable.

Your response would have been more appropriate had you taken the opportunity to educate your readers about the proper behavior of guests.

It seems to me that the rules for that situation are quite clear.

If you drop in unannounced, make it a short visit, and don't place your host or hostess in the position of having to provide lunch or dinner for an unexpected guest. If the situation favors staying longer, offer to share the cost of the added expense your visit imposes. If the host or hostess declines, that's one thing, but at least the

DEAR KATHERINE WALKER: Your letter makes some good points about drop-in visitors. However, "Perplexed in Arizona" apparently was more concerned that her guests wanted to take home the leftovers from their individual orders, which was the issue I addressed.

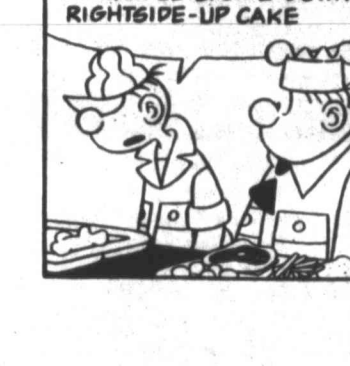

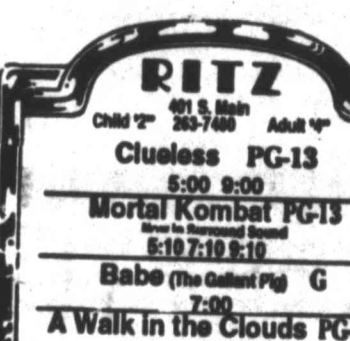

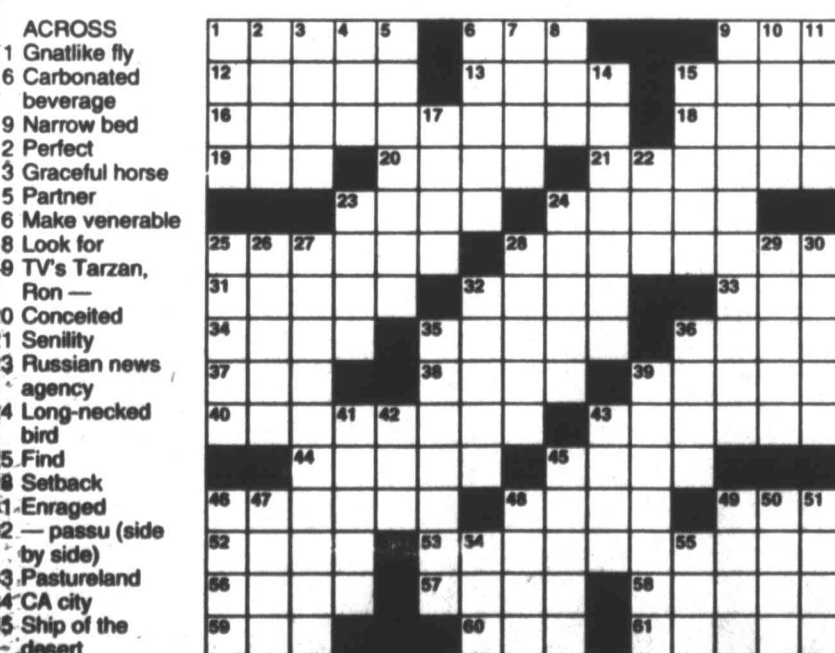

THIS DATE IN HISTORY

Today is Monday, Aug. 21, the 233rd day of 1995. There are 132 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History: Fifty years ago, on Aug. 21, 1945, President Truman ended the Lend-Lease program that had shipped some \$50 billion in aid to America's allies during World War II.

On this date: In 1680, Pueblo Indians took possession of Santa Fe, N.M., after driving out the Spanish.

In 1831, former slave Nat Turner led a violent insurrection in Virginia. (He was later executed.)

In 1858, the famous debates between senatorial contenders Abraham Lincoln and Stephen Douglas began.

In 1878, a group of lawyers, judges and law professors founded the American Bar Association at the Saratoga, N.Y., town hall.

In 1940, exiled Communist revolutionary Leon Trotsky died in Mexico City from wounds inflicted by an assassin.

In 1944, the United States, Britain, the Soviet Union and China opened talks at Dumbarton Oaks, Wash., that helped pave the way for establishment of the United Nations.

In 1959, Hawaiian statehood took effect as President Eisenhower signed an executive order proclaiming Hawaii the 50th state of the union.

In 1963, martial law was declared in South Vietnam as police and army troops began a crackdown on Buddhist anti-government protesters.

In 1983, Philippine opposition leader Benigno S. Aquino Jr.,

ending a self-imposed exile in the United States, was shot dead moments after stepping off a plane at Manila International Airport.

In 1991, the hard-line coup against Soviet President Mikhail S. Gorbachev collapsed in the face of a popular uprising led by Russian Federation President Boris N. Yeltsin.

Ten years ago: The United States accused the Soviet Union of using "spy dust" to track the movements of U.S. Embassy personnel in Moscow, a charge rejected by the Kremlin as "absurd."

Five years ago: Iraqi President Saddam Hussein delivered a speech in which he defended

the detaining of foreigners in his country, and promised "a major catastrophe" should fighting break out in the Persian Gulf.

One year ago: The House, by a vote of 235 to 195, passed a \$30 billion crime bill that banned certain assault-style firearms. Mexico held its presidential election, which was won by Ernesto Zedillo.

Today's Birthdays: Britain's Princess Margaret is 65. Basketball Hall of Famer Wilt Chamberlain is 59. Singer Kenny Rogers is 57. Actor Clarence Williams III is 56. Singer Jackie DeShannon is 51. TV host Harry Smith is 44.
