AID GIVEN PANHANDLE PAVED HIGHWAYS ONE DEAD, FOUR MISSING IN BLAST NEAR BORGER

TWO OF SEVEN INJURED WILL DIE, BELIEVED

TORN BODIES OF LOST OIL WORKERS ARE IN WELL, SAID

(By Associated Press)
BORGER, May 26.—One man is known dead, four missing and two are in a Borger hospital, and seven of them with burns which doctors say will prove fatal as a result of an explosion and fire at a McMillan oil company well near Sanford, 15 miles from here at 8:30 a. m. today. The ambulances from Borger, aided by Borger police and citizens, are bringing the injured men here as fast as they can be located. No names of injured or dead are yet available.

Where the wooden rig of the well stood is now only a gaping hole, which reserves expect to find remains of the four missing.

The origin of the explosion is undetermined. The dead man was identified as Frank Daniel. It was believed E. S. Billwagon, Lester Nelson, Elmer Richards and G. C. Patney were mortally injured.

Big Builder Dies Following Burns

BORGER, Texas, May 26 (AP)—Allen Bishop, rig builder, was burned at his home here at 10:30 p. m. Wednesday, dying at 2:30 p. m. at a local hospital. He had been burning gasoline when he ignited the gas igniting the gasoline on his back. He jumped in bed and his blanket smothered out the flames, but the skin was burned from two sides of his body and he died later.

Educational Bill Held Up In House

AUSTIN, May 26 (AP)—Responding to a plea of Representative W. H. Poage, leader of the "economy bloc," the house today deferred consideration of its largest appropriation measure, the educational bill, until 2 p. m. Poage said members had not had time to study the bill which was printed only last night. It carries more than \$18,000,000, but has been trimmed by the appropriations committee to more than \$14,000,000. The bill already passed. The educational measure is expected to provoke the hottest fights of the special session. The house then took up Representative Roscoe Rung's measure to appropriate \$100,000 emergency aid for Rock Springs.

FORD TO MAKE NEW TYPE CAR

(By The Associated Press)
DETROIT, May 26.—The Ford Motor company will shortly place in the light car field a new machine to replace its present T automobile. It was announced last night. The announcement, verifying long rumored plans of the company, was made in a statement signed by Henry Ford and issued through a national advertising agency handling the Ford advertising account. Details of the new machine were not disclosed in the statement which said a complete description along with the price would be made public within a few weeks. The date for the start of production also was withheld.

To Make Replacements Parts for Model T car will continue to be produced in view of the fact that there are about 18,000,000 of these machines still in use which will require replacements and service, the statement said.

In regard to specifications for the new machine, Mr. Ford was quoted as saying: "At present, I can only say that the new model has speed, style, flexibility and control in traffic. There is nothing quite like it in quality and price. The new car will cost more to manufacture but it will be more economical to operate." The machine, according to the statement, was designed personally by Mr. Ford.

Blake Is Narcotic Addict, Is Claimed

TULSA, Texas, May 26 (AP)—Defense attorneys in the insanity hearing of Robert Blake, charged with the murder of Fred Conner, Tulsa, automobile dealer in 1925, were busy here this morning presenting witnesses who testified the youth was a narcotic addict. Among the witnesses was Jim Blake, his brother, who testified the youth began taking narcotics before he was out of high school in 1921. The defense attorneys, expect to close their case on the insanity hearing this afternoon.

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ENGLISH OPEN SOVIET TRADE BREAK DEBATE

(By The Associated Press)
LONDON, May 26.—Speaking for the laborites, J. R. Clynes told the House of Commons today that soviet Russia "must not be condemned without trial." Mr. Clynes faced a packed floor and galleries when he rose, amid labor cheers, to place his motion before the house. The government, he said, had reversed its former position that British trade and industry should be severed from Russia. He understood the government position now to be that Russia "We accept that position," he declared, "but we demand that in this matter she must not be condemned without trial. We refuse to admit either the guilt or the innocence of Russia."

Documents Include People In U. S.

LONDON, May 26 (AP)—Sixteen documents, including a list of addresses of many persons in the United States, Canada and Central and South American countries, found in the raid on the soviet house, were issued by the British government today as a white paper to illustrate the "hostile activities of the soviet government and the third international against Great Britain."

Chamberlain Says No Inquiry Is Invited

LONDON, May 26 (AP)—Sir Austen Chamberlain, British foreign minister, told the House of Commons today that the government was not prepared to accept a motion by J. R. Clynes, laborite, that an inquiry should be held into the government's charges of soviet propaganda in Great Britain which have resulted in a decision to sever diplomatic relations. Sir Austen declared that the laborite motion was a vote of censure and that the government invited a clear explanation of confidence and approval. If it did not obtain it, the government would know what steps it would be its duty to take. He declared that there was not a word of truth in the suggestion that at Rome and Geneva he had endeavored to form an anti-soviet union. The British government, he said, had no idea of embarking on any such anti-soviet campaign.

Government Makes Its Promise Good

LONDON, May 26 (AP)—The British government today made good its promise to publish some of the documents alleged to have been uncovered in the recent sensational raid on a soviet house in London, headquarters of the soviet trade and finance men, who fled from the Russian commercial organization. It issued a white paper containing these documents to illustrate as

AMARILLO, Texas, May 26 (AP)—J. Frank Norfleet, of Hale Center, nemesis of a gang of "confidence men" who fleeced him out of a small fortune and who were traced and prosecuted by the rancher who put another man in jail. Working under the sheriff's department here, he arrested a man giving the name of J. C. Nelson in Comanche county, Penn., on a grand jury indictment charging swindling, in connection with the giving of a \$155 check to a restaurant here. The man was arrested last week, and now is in the Potter county jail awaiting trial.

NEWTON, Mass., May 26 (AP)—Dr. Francis E. Clark, 75, founder and president of the World Christian Endeavor Society, died at his home here today. Dr. Clark had been ill for three weeks. Yesterday he sank into a coma from which he did not recover. His family was with him for the last few days of his illness.

AVIATOR DOES OUTSIDE LOOP

Goal Of Airmen Reached At Last By Lieut. Doolittle At McCook Field

(By Associated Press)
DAYTON, Ohio, May 26.—Lieutenant James A. Doolittle, McCook field, today held the record of having performed an "outside loop," the goal of aviators since it was first tried in 1912 with the result that two men lost their lives. Flying over Dayton yesterday at an altitude of 8,000 feet, Lieutenant Doolittle turned the nose of his plane downward and described a huge circle, 2,000 feet in diameter, and returned to level out at his original height. The floor was on the "outside of the circle" throughout, and was held in his seat only by straps. At the lowest point of the circle he was directly under the plane, flying at a speed of 280 miles an hour. As he climbed back the speed of the ship was retarded to the approximate 150 miles an hour he was making when he went into the loop. When Lieutenant Doolittle landed his eyes were bloodshot and he gave evidence otherwise of the severe strain of the feat. Today, however, he declared he had suffered no ill effects.

GAS FOR CITY BY SEPTEMBER PRAIRIE SAYS

(By The Associated Press)
PARIS, May 26.—Captain Charles A. Lindbergh was paraded before the eyes of the populace of Paris today to such cheers as no man has heard in this city since Woodrow Wilson made his triumphal entry into the French capital in 1919. It was the first opportunity the citizens of Paris generally have had to see the heroic American aviator since his arrival on the Le Tourist flying ship Saturday night, for all his intervening hours have been devoted to receiving honors from persons in high places. Tens of thousands of Frenchmen had their first sight of the young American this afternoon as he was escorted from his country's embassy to the hotel Deville. Under the trees of magnificent boulevards, the common people of France stood in great masses, waving flags and shouting "bravo!" as the slender and unspooled youth from America was driven past them in a state procession.

Foch And Joffre Are Hosts To Lindbergh

PARIS, May 26 (AP)—Captain Lindbergh was the honored guest today of two famous marshals of France—Foch and Joffre. He also found time in his busy day's program to make a trip to the hotel Des Invalides to greet a delegation of Belgian war wounded visiting in Paris. "Your effort was a great one," Marshal Foch told the flyer, "because it shows what a young man can do when he is well prepared for his attempt and has the courage to see it through."

Stephen Davis Will Quit Post June 1st

WASHINGTON, May 26 (AP)—Stephen B. Davis, acting secretary of commerce in the absence of Secretary Hoover, has resigned effective June 1 and President Coolidge has accepted the resignation. Mr. Davis is understood to have decided to enter a New York enterprise, but had delayed his departure because of Mr. Hoover's absence in the Mississippi flood regions. The retiring official has acted as first assistant to Mr. Hoover for several years, and originally named as solicitor of the department he was soon promoted to the post of assistant secretary. His home is in Las Vegas, New Mexico.

Damaged Ship Is To Make Port, Is Claim

PHILADELPHIA, May 26 (AP)—A wireless report given out by the Philadelphia Maritime exchange states that the steamer Malolo, disabled at sea as the result of a collision, is not taking any water as the watertight bulkheads are holding. A destroyer, coast guard vessel, tank steamer, fighter and trawler are standing by. All personnel not required for navigation will be transferred if it is expected. A wrecking tug is expected to arrive alongside today.

Young Girl Drowned During Texas Picnic

BROWNSVILLE, Texas, May 26 (AP)—Miss Julia Stoddard, age 20, residing near Harlingen, was drowned in the Arroyo Colorado three miles east of that city late Wednesday afternoon. A party of young people on a picnic went bathing and Miss Stoddard got beyond her depth. The body was recovered.

FIREMAN WITH ARM IN SLING IS HERO

DALLAS, May 26 (AP)—Wanda Wiley, firm actress, was saved from probable death in a fire here Thursday by a fireman with a broken arm. Fireman B. C. Hilton, Jr., who lives across the street from Miss Wiley's house, rushed across the street and kicked in the front door of the burning house. Hilton received a broken arm in the explosion which killed seven persons here recently, and the member is still in a sling. Despite his injury, Hilton found Miss Wiley asleep in a glassed-in sleeping porch, with the fire crackling about her. He wrapped her in a blanket, and while he was carrying her out, Lee Brown, a neighbor, came to his aid. The fire started from a water heater.

HARD SURFACE ROADS ARE TO SKIRT PLAINS

In a gigantic road building program for the Panhandle which will exceed any single project attempted here-to-fore by the Highway commission, two and a half million dollars was granted in state and federal aid on pavement for highway number 28 through Wilbarger, Ford, Cottle and Motley counties, where paving bonds have been voted, and similar road aid has been promised by the highway commission, for Floyd, Hale, Lamb and Bailey counties as soon as bonds have been passed, reported Major Pettus Hemphill, division engineer today. Major Hemphill has just returned from Austin, where he was in conference with the State Highway Department, now in session. Other officials in Austin in the interests of the road building program included Judge George L. Mayfield, of Plainview; Judge J. F. Jordan, of Motley county; Judge Atchison of Ford county and Johnny Nixons of Wilbarger county.

Fifteen Tech Students To Attend C. M. T. Camps; Others Urged To Go

RESERVE OFFICERS AND LEGIONNAIRES AID ENROLLMENTS

Many Lubbock youths plan to take a vacation at the expense of the government at San Antonio this summer with instruction in military drill, athletics and civic duty through the Fifteen Tech boys have signed up for the citizens' military training encampment at San Antonio which will be given from June 12 to July 14 and a large number of others are planning to attend.

The movement is being sponsored by the local Officers Reserve Corps and is endorsed by the I. O. O. F. and Kiwanis clubs. The C. M. T. headquarters will be maintained in the offices of W. A. Snyder, Sr., Friday and Saturday, the last days left to sign up, and reserve officers and legionnaires will be in charge. H. D. Woods, Dr. George Young, Professor T. H. Post of Tech, Col. Clark M. Mullin and others will be on duty and will explain all requirements for the encampment.

To enter the C. M. T. applicants must take a thorough physical examination, after which they are vaccinated against typhoid and spinal-pox, to guarantee against epidemics.

The object of the encampment is to bring the better class of young men of the country together with the object of developing health and to learn citizenship, military training, athletics and other phases of American life.

Basic courses open are the Red, the White, and the Blue. The Red course is for those with no previous military training. The White course follows the Red and the Blue is the finishing course, following the White.

Graduates of the Blue course are eligible for membership in the Officers' reserve.

Reports of all kinds will be encouraged in the encampment, and equipment instructors furnished.

FLOOD MENACE IS INCREASING

Some Inhabitants To Stick By Homes In Spite Of Onrushing Waters

(By Associated Press) NEW ORLEANS, May 26.—Although continued warnings have been issued by relief organization heads and levee engineers residents of Pointe Coupee parish still cling to their homes today. Other residents of the danger area had either left or were preparing to move as the waters began to encroach on their lands, but relief authorities feared that a great number already had been cut off as a result of their delay.

Waters from the crevasse at McCrea, estimated as being 2,000 feet wide last night, were believed to have spread over 250 square miles today.

People Are Prepared In the south central section of the state, residents along Bayou Vermillion became alarmed over the rapid rise of the stream and were preparing for any emergency.

Broussard, already cut off by highway from Lafayette, became alarmed when heavy waters threatened to isolate the town. Relief authorities, however, said that there was no immediate danger for the town and that ample preparations had been made to evacuate the residents in case of necessity.

All automobile traffic on the Old Spanish Trail from Gibaux to New Iberia had been discontinued last night, the New Orleans Association of Commerce reported. This cut off the last highway outlet through southern Louisiana into Texas.

A New Curb On Britain's Navy? Not If First Lord Bridgeman Has His Way

LONDON, May 26.—Across President Coolidge's project of an American-Anglo-Japanese pact to limit or reduce naval armaments there lies the shadow of W. C. Bridgeman.

And it is a portentous shadow. It means the pitting of the First Lord of the British Admiralty against the American president.

Bridgeman is a big navy man. Limitation of England's offensive and defensive navy is not to his taste. He takes the view that it is just as vital to Britain to keep open the seas for the safe transport of Britain's commerce and food supplies as it is for the United States to keep her own railways open for the same purpose.

"Sea Sense" He coined an epigram—"Sea sense for Britain is common sense."

All over Britain, people are crying for lower taxes. But Bridgeman went to Parliament and asked for 50,000,000 pounds sterling for the navy this year, only half a million dollars less than last year.

He said Parliament's obligation was to maintain a fleet equal in naval strength to that of any other power—AND provide reasonable security for safeguarding trade and communications. The bite in his speech was in this threat of resignation.

"If this House were to say that we no longer need be guided by such a formula, I for one should not be able to take the responsibility of occupying the post that I do."

Bridgeman, who is 52, is a Shropshire squire, a product of Eton and Cambridge, who started out like many young Englishmen by holding secretarial posts in various governmental departments. He became Minister of Mines, then Home Secretary, and has been in charge of the navy department for about three years.

Unassailed No Chancellor of the Exchequer ever has succeeded in making him cut his estimates.

He has been known to come to Parliament in twenty-dollar suits, although he is a rich man.

It is sometimes thought his bond of comradeship with Premier Baldwin is that both are pipe addicts. A wealthy Liberal Parliamentarian once twitted him about this. It gave rise to the only piece of Bridgeman humor on record.

"Though Liberal plutocrats indulge their taste For rich Havanas, reckless of the waste, True Tories to their country's good give heed And social reform must yield to social need."

The contest will be held in Tech college through the co-operation of college instructors and also Don L. Jones, head of the experiment farm here.

It will be strictly a practice affair in preparation for the short course judging contests to be held the last of July at A. & M. College.

In addition to the work of the two days meet, an elaborate program of entertainment is being planned, including swimming events, athletic events, and a banquet.

About sixty boys will be present for the occasion, it is expected.

New Rail Merger To Be Suggested Soon

WASHINGTON, May 26 (AP)—A revised plan for merger of Southwestern railroads was presented to the Interstate Commerce commission within ten days, L. F. Loree, head of the railroad group involved, announced today. The new plan which involves the Kansas City Southern, Missouri, Kansas and Texas and Cotton Belt railroads, will have a new financial setup but otherwise will be virtually the same as originally presented to the commission.

Mr. Loree said, the commission disapproved the original proposal. Mr. Loree called at the White House today but declined to state the nature of his conversation with President Coolidge. Later he went into conference with the Interstate Commerce commission with a view to shaping into shape his new merger proposal.

TEXAS PRISON FUSS LOOMING

Federal Authorities Begin Investigation Of Charge Of Discrimination

(By The Associated Press)

AUSTIN, May 26.—Federal authorities are investigating reports that federal prisoners are being discriminated against and are not being allowed earned overtime, Mrs. W. A. King of San Antonio, chairman of the prison supervisory board, said today.

The charges first were brought to her attention, Mrs. King said, and she then notified the United States attorney general's department which placed the matter in the hands of the secret service.

"It likely will mean," Mrs. King said, "that all federal prisoners, (about 55) in the Texas penitentiary system will be removed soon."

No Cruelty Charges The woman chairman pointed out that no charges of cruelty against United States prisoners have been brought.

A Texas ranger will be sent to Huntsville, probably today, to conduct an investigation to be ordered by Governor Moody in connection with charges to state prisoners alleged by Leland H. Smith, prisoner recently released through habeas corpus proceedings.

The governor was understood to be preparing a letter to the prison commission asking a complete report of circumstances involving Smith, who sued in Walker county district court for release on plea that his accumulated overtime entitled him to freedom.

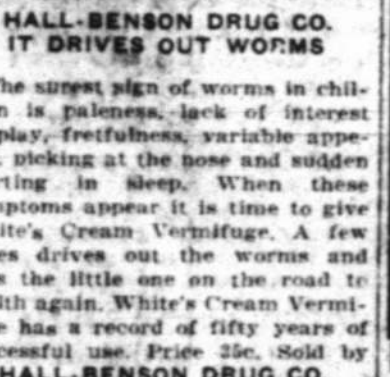
Release, ordered for May 9 and not scheduled until May 14, a sworn statement presented in the governor's office.

Smith, convicted of theft in Bexar county in 1925, charged mistreatment of the prisoners by farm managers and guards.
