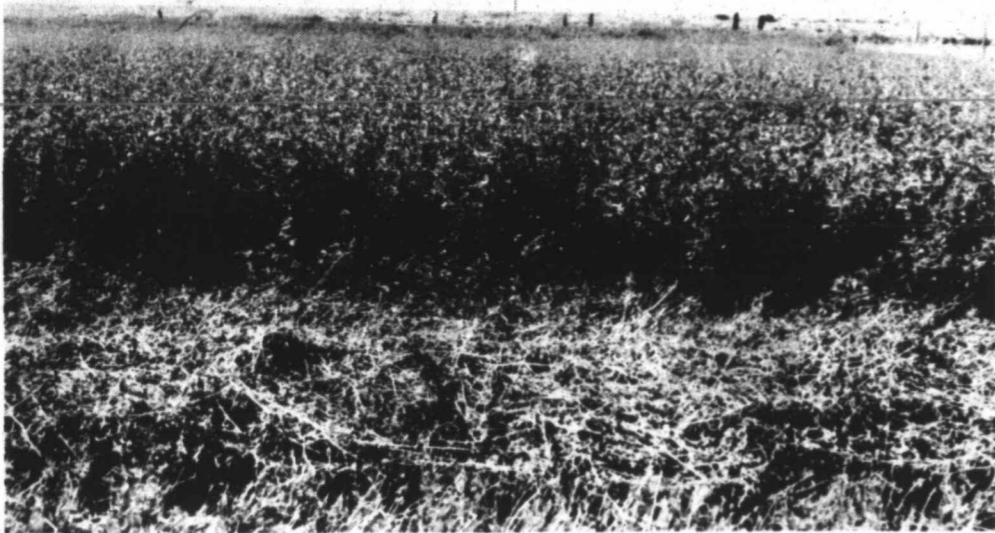
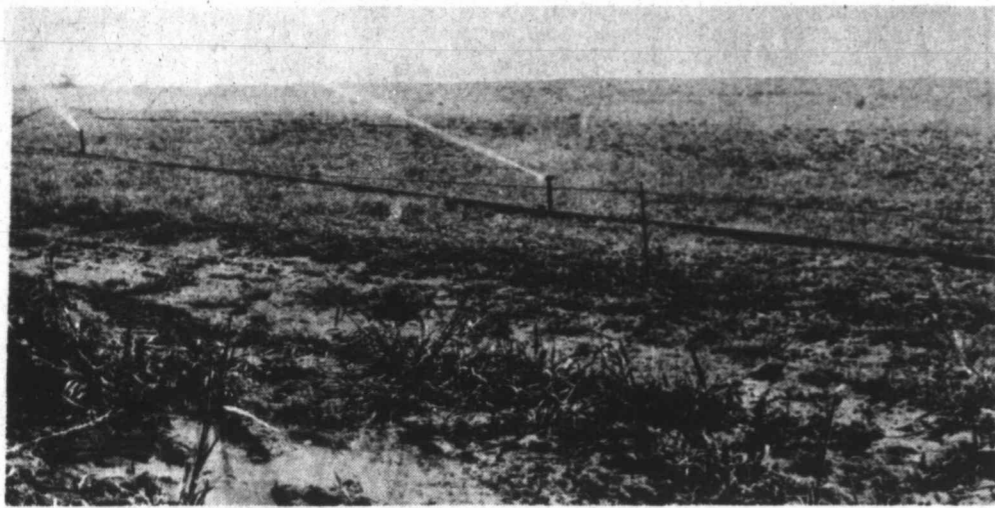

Hay Maker

Relief Sought For County Farmers

The county's Emergency Board met Monday, discussing drought conditions and sending a report to County Judge Bill Carter about drought effects on Mitchell County farms and ranches.

Judge Carter said that he forwarded the Board's report to Texas governor Dolph Briscoe. Members of the Emergency Board include chairman Don Stewart, executive director of the ASCS; Bob Benson, county extension agent; Guy McIlhenny, acting head of the SCS and David Marion, county supervisor of FHA.

The committee reported that of 56,000 acres intended for planting in cotton, 86 farms were prevented from planting 4,600 acres and 25 farms failed, a total of 2,000 acres failed.

The report further states that the 50,000 acres of standing cotton have a potential yield of only 18,000 bales, which is 20,000 bales below normal and 36,000 bales below last year's production.

Grain sorghum shows a similar picture. Of 22,000 acres intended for planting in grain sorghum, 206 farms were prevented from planting, a total of 10,300 acres. Two farms failed, a total of 50 acres.

Of 4,700 acres planted to wheat, 84 farms failed, 2,100 acres. Wheat was harvested from only two farms in the county due to the drought.

The forage picture shows 30,000 acres intended for planting, with 10,000 acres either failed or prevented. Forage sorghum normally planted for grazing and hay was not planted due to lack of moisture.

"This situation caused overgrazing on rangeland and will cause lack of feed and hay for winter feeding of livestock," the report states.

The estimated 11,700 acres of grain sorghum planted is in severe moisture stress with a present potential of less than 1,000 lbs. yield per acre.

Report on rangeland conditions states that 200,000 acres are overgrazed due to lack of rainfall and lack of usual supplemental or seasonal forage.

Carryover sorghum silage is being fed at this time due to lack of grazing, with the result

that the silage will not be available this winter. "Cattle are being sold due to

deterioration of rangeland and reduced carrying capacity," the report points out.

Eleven Apply For City Judge

A two-hour session of the City Council Monday evening began and ended with discussion of applications for city jobs that are now vacant.

Animal warden applicant Gary Upshaw, 24, of 904 E. 6th, appeared before the council to ask

why action had not been taken on his application. He said that he turned a form in to Police Chief Jessie Browning the second week in June.

Councilman J. Lee Jones Jr. said that the council was not aware of any applications for

the animal warden's job. City Manager J. A. Sadler Jr. phoned the city police department and left word for Chief Browning to appear before the council.

During the course of the council meeting, Chief Browning did appear before the council with three applications for the job, one having been turned in to him that same day.

The three were Upshaw's, dated June 22, one made by Melvin Brown, 58, of 935 E. 8th, dated June 28 and the July 22 application of Charles Herridge, 18, of Rt. 1 Lorraine.

The job pays \$1.90 per hour for five 8-hour days per week and hiring is done by City Manager Sadler.

Animal warden applications were discussed during an executive session of the council, as well as the acquisition of property, both reasons valid. See COUNCIL Page 7

Iranian Student Drowns In Lake

Two Iranian pilot trainees at Webb Air Force Base in Big Spring, who were to have gone home to Iran Tuesday, died Sunday in separate accidents.

Baba Ali Saffari, 23, who had been training at Webb AFB for two years, drowned about 3:30 p.m. Sunday in the swimming area of the Lake Colorado City State Park.

Another Iranian trainee, Azizollah Nickman, 22, died in a one-car accident near Fredericksburg Sunday.

Saffari was graduated from flight training with Class 75-01 last Thursday and he and three companions from Iran were wa-

ting in Lake Colorado City Sunday afternoon.

According to several reports, Saffari could not swim and when he stepped off a sand bar into water about 7 to 8 feet deep, he was unable to get back to shallow water.

By the time his companions could make known Saffari's plight, he had gone under. Several persons in that area said that

they attempted to help but could not locate Saffari.

The body was recovered about an hour later by volunteer firemen from Colorado City and state park officials.

One of Saffari's companions had to be treated for shock at Root Memorial Hospital and was transferred to the Webb AFB Hospital.

The drowning was the first at the lake in more than a year.

Earnest Resigns Stone Const. Co. Wins Jail Bid

Mitchell County commissioners accepted two resignations when they met Monday for the purpose of opening bids on construction of the new addition to the county jail.

Joe Earnest, county attorney, submitted his resignation, effective Aug. 1.

Preparations Continue For Crusade

The county-wide Crusade for Christ starts Sunday evening at 8 in Wolf Stadium.

Cottage prayer services have been held in the sponsoring churches during the week. First Baptist Church music director Laylan Bratcher has been helping to conduct choir practice for the combined choir presentation during the week-long revival services.

Services will be conducted nightly in the football stadium. Texas evangelist Fred Lowery will be evangelist in charge of preaching services. Steve Taylor is music director for the Crusade.

A special feature for this year's Crusade will be a guest appearance Friday, the last night of the Crusade, by country and western singer Wanda Jackson.

The county-wide services are being sponsored by Mitchell County Ministerial Alliance, the Rev. Davis Edens, pastor of First United Methodist Church in Colorado City serving as Crusade co-ordinator.

A special seating area at ground level will be made for those persons who wish to attend the revival services but cannot climb the stadium steps.

Transportation arrangements for people who want to attend the services are being arranged through pastors of the various participating churches.

Both Lowery and Taylor have had wide experience with conducting evangelistic meetings. Lowery conducting over 250 Crusades and Taylor having helped 850 revivals, 650 evangelistic concerts and 164 Bible and evangelism conferences.

Both men are southerners. Lowery is a native of South Carolina now living in Fort Worth and Taylor is a native Californian of Armenian extraction who now lives in South Carolina.

Judge Bill Carter said that Earnest's family had requested him to resign for health reasons.

Jerry Evermon, county probation officer, also resigned. Evermon has been the county's probation officer and Boys' Club director for the past year. He will be completing requirements for a Master of Arts degree in social work at the Baptist sponsored college.

Purpose of the called session was to open bids. Three bids were submitted; one from Haney and Sivley of Abilene for \$66,649, one from Stone Construction of Colorado City for \$64,458.83 and one for \$42,760 from Big Country Construction of Abilene.

Carter said that since the low bid was so much lower than the other two, commissioners through company representatives had overlooked some of the requirements. After discussing the matter with Pritchett, a partner in the company, Big Country withdrew their bid saying

that they had not taken into account a number of needed items.

Low bidder on the jail construction was Stone Construction and commissioners agreed to let the contract locally to the low bidder.

Contributions Continue For Water Tanker

Fire Chief Kent Gentry reports that \$1,700 has been contributed to the Volunteer Fire Department toward purchase of an additional water tanker.

Asked if this was a good response, Gentry replied, "Excellent."

The department began taking donations from farmers and ranchers and any interested county resident in order to buy another tank truck for use in fighting rural and grass fires, as the present tanker carries 1,300 gallons of water and is also able to draft its own water supply in rural areas.

Cost of buying and equipping another tanker is estimated at \$4,000.

Carter said that a special session of the court would be held sometime before Aug. 1 in order to consider filling the vacancies created by the two resignations.

Arson Cases Investigated

"Arson was definitely the cause of the fire," said Fire Chief Kent Gentry, discussing the Tuesday night fire which caused about \$300 damage to the concession stand at the Junior Teenage League Baseball field.

Both field and concession stand belong to the Colorado City school district.

Gentry explained that the fire, reported at 10:39 p.m., began on the outside of the stand. Kerosene fumes were detected when volunteer firemen arrived, he said.

The fire was reported out at 11:10 p.m. Colorado City police are investigating the fire.

The concession stand at Little League Park was also burned by arsonists who have not yet been caught.

Lorraine Hires Coach

Lorraine superintendent of schools L. R. Dunn announces the hiring of a head coach and athletic director, subject to school board approval at the next regular meeting.

Hired was Coolidge Hunt, who is now in the process of moving to Lorraine from Durango, Colorado.

Hunt has six years of teaching and coaching experience, Dunn said. He taught for two years at Friendship school at Wolforth and for four years at Midland before moving to Durango where he has not been teaching for the past two years.

Dunn said that Hunt wants to get back into the coaching field and will be moving to Lorraine with his wife, Connie, and two sons.

Hunt played high school football at Lubbock High School and then attended Texas Tech University and also played football. He has a B.S. degree from Texas Tech in Physical Education and History.

Briscoe Proclaims Texas Safety Week

Farm and Ranch Safety Week in Texas has been proclaimed by Governor Dolph Briscoe for the week of July 25-31.

"Texas farmers and ranchers, their families and em-

ployees need to dedicate themselves to the task of safely producing the commodities needed by an entire nation," Briscoe said in his proclamation.

The Texas Safety Association, Texas Farm Bureau, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Future Farmers and Future Homemakers of America and Young Farmers of Texas are joining together for a statewide farm and ranch accident prevention campaign.

The week also concurs with National Farm Safety Week under the co-sponsorship of the National Safety Council and the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

State Health Department figures show that there were 214 fatal accidents on Texas farms during 1973. That number is up 16.9 per cent over 1972.

The highest ranking fatal farm accidents in 1973 were those involving firearms (42 deaths), drownings (41 deaths), tractors (26 deaths), fires and burns (24 deaths) and falls (20 deaths).

This year's national campaign is focusing on the fall with the theme, "ABC's of Avoiding Falls--Alertness, Balance, Care."

Joe Smetana, TSA vice president for farm and ranch safety, offered some basic suggestions for preventing falls:

--Watch your step. Survey your path to spot slipping, tripping hazards.

--Wear shoes and boots with slip-resistant soles and heels. Clean them before climbing, mounting farm equipment, or walking on hard, smooth surfaces.

--Keep walking surfaces free of ice, snow, manure, loose grain, etc.

--Never permit children to ride on farm equipment. Establish a "no riders" rule--no one should be on farm equipment other than those necessary for work operation or for instructional purposes.

--Use hand holds or rails when climbing off and on machinery. Use handrails on stairs.

--Inspect ladders before each use. Repair or replace if unstable or faulty. Set ladders on firm footing. Set straight ladder base out one foot for each four feet up. Don't overreach. Stay off tall ladders on gusty days.

--Keep buildings maintained. Fix broken flooring, steps, etc.

--Have a storage place for everything; put things away when finished. Good housekeeping is a falls prevention "must."

--Don't block your view when carrying large items.

--Look for hidden hazards when walking in weeds, tall grass, etc.

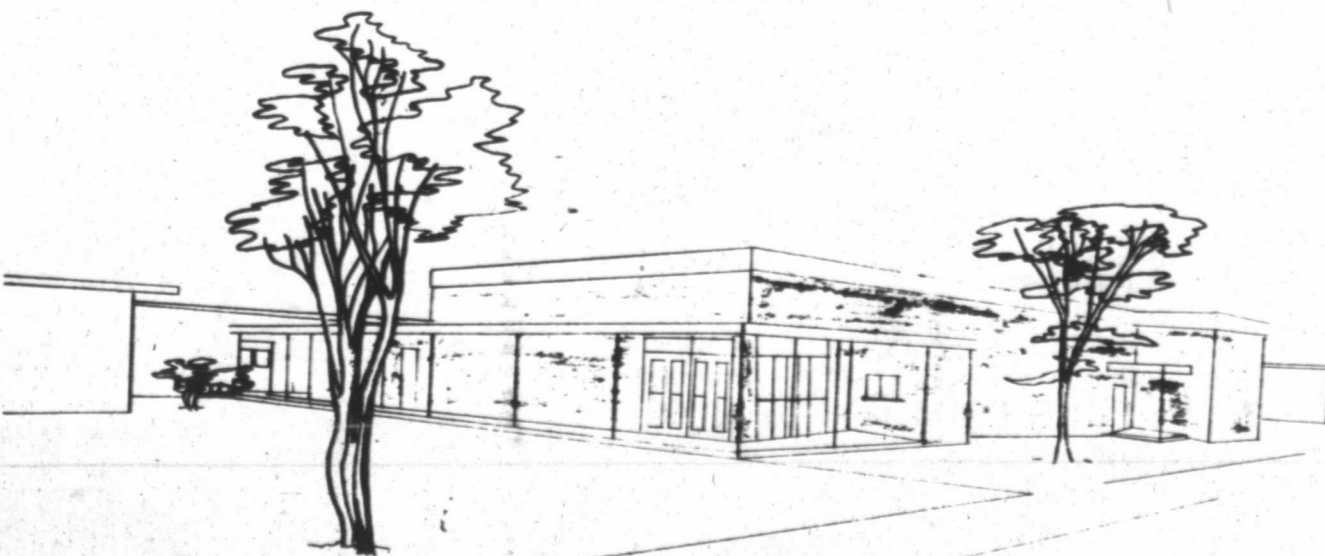

Architect's Drawing Of New Auditorium

The proposed auditorium for Westbrook School, which was approved by the school district's voters in Saturday's bond election, is shown in the architect's concept above. The brick addition to the present building will add 6,638 square feet to the south side of the campus, between the two wings indicated and connect-

ed by the covered walkway. Entrance to the building will be in the same area but through added office and work space of 1,300 square feet (behind and east of the new auditorium). An open patio space between the auditorium addition and present building will allow present windows on the front of the school to function.

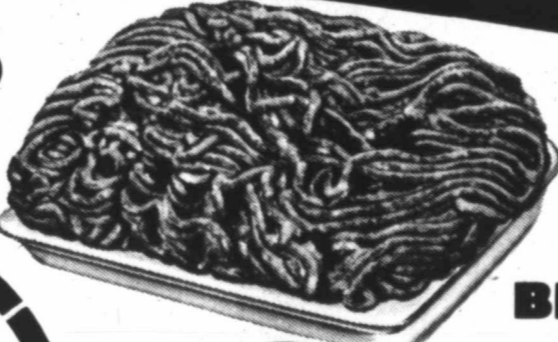

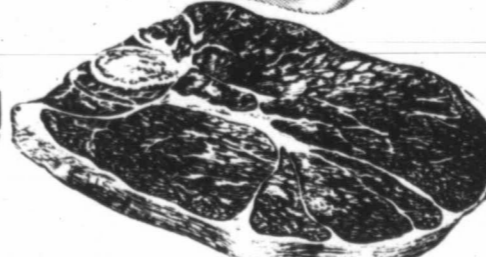

TSA Gives Gun Safety Warning

Pointing out that firearms accidents, last year's major fatal farm accident, took 42 lives on Texas farms and ranches in 1973, the Texas Safety Association suggests some basic gun safety rules for the farmer or rancher.

All firearms should be securely stored after a check to make sure they are unloaded. Any person allowed to use a firearm should be familiarized with its safe use and should be responsible enough to follow the rules. A gun should not be used by a person who is fatigued or intoxicated.

Hunters should check in and out and should be required to specify where they will hunt. They should wear identifiable clothing. The farmer-rancher should be careful not to overstock his place with too many hunters.

TSA Gives Warnings

The Texas Safety Association, noting that drownings accounted for 41 fatal farm accidents in Texas last year, urges that farm ponds be equipped with lifesaving equipment and that children never be allowed to play in them alone. Fencing should be in place and in good repair around tanks, cisterns and wells.

TSA is one of the sponsors of Farm and Ranch Safety Week, proclaimed by Governor Dolph Briscoe for July 25-31.

1934 Colorado City Newspapers Found In Building Rubble

He who says that history doesn't repeat itself should view the 1934 newspapers which were found at Fisher Park on Lake Champion when the old bait house was being torn down. Bits and pieces of the "Colorado Weekly Record" were found in the walls. They had been used as insulation between the wood beams and sheetrock siding.

Excerpts from these papers stated that in April of that year, the United States was facing a wheat shortage as we are now.

Also among the various readable news items was the advertisement for a local grocery store which was running a "Green-Tag" Sale. The store was located just north of the Palace Theatre. Making the announcement about the sale was Tom M. Marsh manager for the store.

Some of the prices listed in the advertisement were: peanut butter, 25¢ per quart; 13¢ for a 14 oz. bottle of catsup and an unknown meat, 12¢ per pound.

An official notice was found which gave the results of the first vote taken after Prohibition ended as to whether Mitchell County would sell alcoholic beverages, especially the 3.2% beer. It stated:

"A Canvass of said election shows that 3.2% beer in Mitchell County, Texas was defeated by a majority of 78 votes and it is therefore, the order of the Hon. Commissioners Court that the sale of 3.2% beer in Mitchell County, Texas is and shall be unlawful until a majority of the qualified voters of Mitchell County, Texas shall in a legally held election, vote for the sale of 3.2% beer."

"Passed and approved by the Hon. Commissioners Court of Mitchell County, Texas, on this 26th day of April A. D. 1934. A. F. King, County Judge, Mitchell County, Texas."

Since this election, Mitchell County has been "dry."

In the section of the paper for church news was the announcement that J. D. Harvey, preacher for the Church of Christ would preach his Sunday morning sermon from Titus 3:1 and his evening message would be from Isaiah 1:16-20 and that Alex B. Hanson was the Minister in Charge of the Episcopal Church.

The building was originally built by the city as a house for the cemetery caretaker and was sited in the southwest corner of the Colorado City Cemetery. Some say that the house had been there since before 1931.

"Be it remembered that on April 21st, 1934, a special election was legally held in which the sale of 3.2% beer in Mitchell County, Texas was defeated, according to the returns of said election, the returns of which were duly canvassed by the Hon. Commissioners Court of Mitchell County, Texas, on April 26th 1934.

The papers were found in a partition which had been built after the house was completed to act as a brace for the center of the ceiling.

It was moved from the cemetery site by the City to Lake Champion to be used as a general store and bait stand in 1961.

According to J. A. Sadler

Jr., City Manager, the house was being torn down in order to build a new haydite tile building with about 1,000 sq. feet of space.

TSA Gives Gun Safety Warning

Pointing out that firearms accidents, last year's major fatal farm accident, took 42 lives on Texas farms and ranches in 1973, the Texas Safety Association suggests some basic gun safety rules for the farmer or rancher.

All firearms should be securely stored after a check to make sure they are unloaded. Any person allowed to use a firearm should be familiarized with its safe use and should be responsible enough to follow the rules. A gun should not be used by a person who is fatigued or intoxicated.

Hunters should check in and out and should be required to specify where they will hunt. They should wear identifiable clothing. The farmer-rancher should be careful not to overstock his place with too many hunters.

TSA Gives Warnings

The Texas Safety Association, noting that drownings accounted for 41 fatal farm accidents in Texas last year, urges that farm ponds be equipped with lifesaving equipment and that children never be allowed to play in them alone. Fencing should be in place and in good repair around tanks, cisterns and wells. TSA is one of the sponsors of Farm and Ranch Safety Week, proclaimed by Governor Dolph Briscoe for July 25-31.

No action was taken on animal warden applications. The property acquired was a gift from the Earnest-Porter estate of the buildings between Colorado City Savings and Loan and the alley, which formerly was a Salfway store, built in 1926. The property was an outright gift to the city from Joe Earnest, Charles Earnest Porter and Craig Porter. Council members accepted the property and instructed Sadler to send a letter expressing the council's appreciation to the donors. The final item of business was discussing the vacant city judge office. Sadler gave each council member a copy of each application received for the office. Council members are to study the written applications and take action on an appointment during their next regular meeting, August 12. Eleven applications have been made for the vacant judge's office. They are A. G. Ballard, Fritz William Mogford, Melba Gay-Mikle, Leonard Henderson, Ben L. Costin, Mary Ann Fincher, R. B. Baker, Henry C. Doss, Bedford Dulin, Pat Moore and Mary Lee Moore. The office was left vacant with the recent death of City Judge W. A. Brimberry. The pay is \$250 per month. The council also discussed a number of items at length. Sewer extension was one item of discussion. Sadler read a legal notice which must be published in the local newspaper before accepting bids on 2,480 feet of extension to the new high school. Deadline for submitting bids is 3:30 p.m. Aug. 12, bids to be opened during that night's council meeting. They also discussed a request made by Mrs. George Callender, Texas Highway Department and Mrs. L. W. Terry, all on the east side of Highway 208 and north of the G-Kell Building, asking for an extension of sanitary sewer facilities to the northern limits of the city. Such an extension would include their properties and match the extension of sewer facilities to Key Bros. John Deere Center on the west side of Highway 208. The council took no action on this request but Sadler said that he would negotiate with the winner of the bid for the approved extension to the high school. Council members experienced a shock when Sadler presented figures for paving the parking lot at the city's new Civic Center. Estimates of \$7,500 for paving 8,500 square feet were too much for the council and they postponed making a decision on paving the lot. Councilwoman Mrs. Jody Neff reported that floor covering originally planned for the Civic Center was unavailable and none of the substitutes proposed by the contractor were acceptable to council members when they called a special meeting recently. The council agreed to wait until after the first of the year when an order can be filled for floor covering similar to the one originally chosen. This would mean opening the Civic Center in October for the October Occasion on concrete floors in the main building, she pointed out. The council officially appointed R. L. Mikle as city Fire Marshall and Dr. John Chinn as city Health Officer. Both were made official in order to meet with state requirements. Dr. Chinn's appointment is for two years at \$50 per month. Mikle's pay is \$547 per month. In discussing the city's water supply, which Councilman Jones said was their first priority, Sadler and Councilman Larry Hamner told the council about breaks in a main water line at the west river bridge. Changes in weather conditions cause the steel pipe to break. Cost of replacing the line with buried cast iron pipe will be very expensive, Sadler pointed out, as pipe is almost unavailable. He also said 60 clamps now hold the pipe together. Each set of clamps costs \$30 so the investment mounts with each break in the line. Councilman Jones wanted the city to ask both courthouse and school personnel to watch their use of water in watering lawns. He said that he has seen water running down the street from the courthouse lawn and into the Colorado River. He further said that all seven sprinklers at the school are turned on at once, lowering water pressure all over town. The council continued a discussion begun several meetings ago of purchase of new automobiles for the city police department. Discussion centered around whether or not to purchase heavy duty cars, called "police packages," or just regular assembly line cars. Another item talked about was whether to get 1974 or 1975 model cars. No decision was reached, but they agreed to take alternate bids for the cars. Chief Browning said that the city has had to pay \$1,000 in upkeep since the council last discussed the purchase. He also said that one of the cars is less than two years old and already has 70,000 miles on the speedometer. Councilman Hank Bryant asked the council to consider doing something to regulate cotton and lint in the city during ginning season. Councilman Jones also said he would like to see something done about the lint as it made a number of people very ill during ginning season last year. The meeting adjourned after council members received copies of the audit report from city auditor Joe Morren along with the city judge applications, both to be studied before the next meeting.</p>
