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Bottom Again Hit By Stock Market

Couple Million Shares Of Distress Stock Dumped Overboard At Opening Of Trading Thursday

NEW YORK, Nov. 7.—The stock market struck a new bottom today when a couple of million shares of distress stock was thrown overboard at the opening, and then staged one of the most spectacular rallies in recent market history.

Early declines of \$5 to \$15 a share in many of the leaders were wiped out, and converted into gains which ran from \$1 to nearly \$18 a share. Recoveries in the general list were not so pronounced as nearly 500 stocks, or about half of those traded in, closed with net declines, the large majority of which ranged from a few cents to \$2 a share.

Blows of 5,000 to 75,000 shares were dumped "at the market" as soon as the opening gong had sounded, with the result that nearly 2,500,000 shares changed hands in the first half hour. The ticker fell steadily behind, and was exactly two hours late in printing the final quotation.

Total sales for the abbreviated three hour session on the New York stock exchange were 7,184,000 shares or at the rate of nearly 12,000,000 shares for a full five hour day, which compares with 5,914,760 shares in yesterday's short session.

Ship Is Reported Afire In Pacific Ocean Over Radio

Steamers Rush To Rescue; Broadcasting Stations Requested To Shut Down For S. O. S. Signals

SAN PEDRO, Cal., Nov. 7.—A radio report received by marine sources here tonight said the mine sweeper Ortolan radioed the naval base at San Diego that it was going to the rescue of an unidentified ship afire off the coast near Encinitas.

The Ortolan gave the position of the vessel toward which it was steaming as six miles off of Encinitas.

Encinitas is approximately 15 miles north of San Diego harbor.

A few minutes before the Ortolan radioed its position, broadcasting stations were requested to shut down for reception of S. O. S. signals. Radio receiving stations had been unable to develop the identity of the ship, or whether it was a freighter or passenger.

Later advice from San Diego identified the vessel as the India Arrow, General Petroleum tanker, en route from New York to San Pedro.

The Point Loma naval radio station at San Diego said it had no definite information regarding the ship or its condition.

SUFFERS STROKE

Thompson's Fate Rests With Jury In Slaving Trial

Testimony And Arguments Completed On Wednesday In 2nd Trial Lasting All Week At Eastland

Youth Tells Story

Defendant Is Charged With Slaying Of Lucian And Leon Shook; Eye Witness Is Principal Witness

EASTLAND, Nov. 7.—The fate of Clyde Thompson, charged with slaying Lucian and Leon Shook, brother near Leray, Texas, rests in the hands of a jury tonight.

Testimony and arguments in the trial, which started here Monday, were completed this afternoon.

Tried Second Time

Thompson is on trial the second time in connection with the deaths of the brothers. In his first trial he was given the death penalty by the verdict of the trial court jury was reversed and a new trial granted on an appeal.

The state's principal witness, 13-year-old Woodrow Davis, an eye witness to the shooting, testified his brother and Thompson were hunting the afternoon of the slaying and that they stopped at Shook's cabin and induced the brothers to join them. He testified that Thompson shot the boys to death as they walked ahead of him, and then beat out their brains with the butt of his pistol.

His brother, Thomas, was convicted of murder in connection with the slayings and now has an appeal pending. Woodrow has been granted immunity.

Fall Leaves For Home In El Paso

Former Interior Secretary Appeals To Higher Courts On His Conviction For Accepting Bribe

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7.—(AP)—Albert B. Fall, former secretary of the Interior, left Washington at 4:30 p. m. today for El Paso, Texas, where he will remain while his conviction for accepting a bribe in the leading of the Elk Hills naval oil reserve is being taken on appeal to higher federal courts.

He was accompanied by Mrs. Fall and their two daughters, Mrs. C. C. Chase and Mrs. Joseph Elliott, and H. O. Quinn, his secretary.

In El Paso he will remain at the home of Mrs. Chase.

He was sentenced to a year in jail and fined \$100,000 on the bribery conviction.

BODY RECOVERED

Drowning Victim Found To End Five-Day Search

CORPUS CHRISTI, Nov. 7.—(AP)—After a five-day search, the body of J. C. Brit, 30, of San Antonio, who was drowned Saturday night in Aransas Bay off Fulton, was brought to the surface late this afternoon.

Brit and Clifford West, 27, also from San Antonio, were drowned when their boat capsized a mile off shore. Lieut. James R. Flannery, Brooks Field aviator, swam ashore to bring aid, but the men were gone from the overturned boat when he returned.

Twenty sticks of dynamite were used this afternoon to bring the body to the surface.

Efforts To Brand Liquor Buyers Criminals Flayed

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7.—The effort to brand liquor purchasers criminals was denounced to a national radio audience tonight by Senator Harry Hawes as "a frank confession that prohibition under the present law has measurably failed."

The Missouri democrat's vitriolic address was in answer to one in defense of the proposed amendment last week by Senator Sheppard, democrat, Texas, its sponsor, who wrote the prohibition amendment. Both speeches were in the Evening Star Radio Forum over the Columbia system.

Attack Voluted Act

A vet. Hawes attacked the Voluted act and said because of its actual failure "we are now asked to brand many millions of our people in a new criminal class, and to add to the power and immunity of the bootleggers by closing the mouths of his customers under the threat of five years' servitude in the penitentiary and a \$10,000 fine for the purchase of beverage which contains more than one half of one per cent alcohol."

"This amendment would impede law enforcement and promote lawlessness," averred the Missourian. "It would give additional security to the bootlegger, provide a new field for the blackmailer and create an enlarged 'gangland'."

He maintained that advocates of the Sheppard amendment should ask that it be made a constitutional amendment through a referendum and predicted "strange results" in event such a step were taken. He said bootleggers would favor the amendment "as they did in the recent Nova Scotia election."

Death Cheated By Convicted Slaver By New Reprieve

Stay Is Granted Howard By Governor Moody After Condemned Man's Mother Says Testimony False

AUSTIN, Nov. 7.—P. W. Howard, convicted in El Paso county for the murder of N. V. Nixon, chauffeur, in 1926, and sentenced to death, was given a reprieve by Governor Moody today. His execution was set for early Saturday. Howard previously had received several stays of execution.

The governor said he had not decided how long he would make the reprieve, depending on the date of the next term of district court in Abilene, where an indictment against W. S. Ham, an alleged accomplice in the crime, is pending.

Mother Requests

He acted today upon receipt of a telegram from Mrs. Willie Jack, former wife of Howard, who had testified against him in trial of the case. She repudiated her testimony and admitted she had sworn falsely. Governor Moody said:

"I am not satisfied to let Howard be executed until Ham, his alleged accomplice and on whose testimony, corroborated only by Howard's wife at that time, he was convicted, is tried." Governor Moody stated. "The record shows that Ham was not promised immunity, but it seems he has been getting plenty of it. He was tried only once, and the jury could not agree that time."

Lester Trial Set For December 2nd In District Court

Alleged Wife Slaying Given Continuance When Motion Of Defense Is Granted By Judge Mullican

Clay Lester, alleged slayer of his wife, Mrs. Virgie Lester, is scheduled to be tried in this city December 2, following the granting yesterday of a motion for continuance by Judge Clark M. Mullican in 99th district court.

The motion for continuance was presented Wednesday after motions for change of venue and to quash special venire had been overruled by the court. Judge Mullican's decision in the application followed the State counsel's consideration of a 7,000-word motion filed by W. F. Schenck and C. C. Triplett, defense attorneys. The application was studied about 14 hours by District Attorney Durwood Bradley, and special prosecutors, George M. Dupree and C. C. Crenshaw.

Witnesses Absent

The defense counsel outlined that 20 material witnesses in the case were absent and that the accused man could not receive a proper trial at this time.

Hamilton Resting After Acquittal

Bandit Officer Killed In Battle

SHAWNEE, Okla., Nov. 7.—Owen Edwards, alleged to have been a confederate of Fred Davis in the robbery of a bank at Craig, Okla., several months ago, and James A. Kiersey, 20, a Seminole, Okla., policeman were shot to death in a gun battle two and one-half miles north of Marjo, Okla., tonight.

Claude Tyler, an operative of the state bureau of criminal investigation and identification killed Edwards after Edwards had shot and killed Kiersey, who was stationed with Tyler at the back door of a house through which Edwards ran on learning that the house was surrounded.

Hanged Self

Davis hanged himself in his cell in a jail at Chandler last week after telling fellow prisoners he feared he would be sentenced to death in the electric chair. He was charged with robbery with firearms in connection with the looting of the Craig bank.

Lubbock Butcher Cuts His Hand Accidentally

Jack Martin, 28, employee of a local meat market, was painfully injured shortly after noon Thursday when a knife, with which he was butchering, slipped and ran through his left hand.

Martin was rushed to the West Texas hospital for emergency treatment. An examination revealed a severe wound at the thumb and attendant are doubtful that it can ever be used again.

The accident occurred when an animal kicked Martin while he was skinning, causing the knife to enter his hand.

Claim Democrats Ought To Follow Virginia's Lead

John Boyle, Texas Leader Of Party Ranks, States Next Political Battle Must Be On Party Lines

Stress Discipline

Removal Of Religion From Issues Of Campaign One Of Points Offered For Democratic Hopes

AUSTIN, Nov. 7.—Texas democrats should follow the lead of Virginia and fight the next state political battle along strictly party lines in an effort to retrieve the commonwealth for the party of its fathers, John Boyle of San Antonio believes.

Boyle, leader of the forces in Texas that remained loyal and voted for the democratic presidential nominee, former Governor Alfred E. Smith of New York, declared here today that so far there is not an announced candidate for the democratic nomination for governor that the local democrats can pin their hopes to with any confidence of success.

"We must entirely and completely remove the religious issue from the coming campaign and make it one of party survival strictly," Boyle said.

"To do this we must get behind an outstanding Texan who stood by the democratic party in its trying days last fall and to whose candidacy cannot be attached in the slightest degree any religious interest."

He believes in strict party discipline and is advocating the barring from the next primaries those who bolted the democratic nominees and voted for Herbert Hoover for president. Neither as voters nor candidates, should they be permitted to have a voice in the affairs of the party they turned against after having participated in its primaries.

BURGLARS SOUGHT

Six Point Business Firms Looted Of \$200

GREENVILLE, Nov. 7.—(AP)—Officers today sought burglars who last night ransacked six business places at Polk, near here, and escaped with about \$200 in cash and a considerable amount of merchandise.

The greatest amount of loot was taken from the postoffice, where the safe was hauled away. It was found opened near Embury. More than \$100 it had contained was missing.

Other places entered were the E. B. Rabb general merchandise store, the C. V. Ray hardware store, the D. S. Peoples drug store, the B. B. Davis grocery store and the McMillan and Young general merchandise store.

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Five Men Escape After Successful Hold Up Of Bank

Sounding Of Burglar Alarm Fails To Draw Attention Of Citizens; Heavy Loss Covered By Insurance

One Man On Guard

Four Robbers Enter During Noon Hour; Officials Are Ordered To Lie Down As Cash Is Scooped Up

JEFFERSON, Wis., Nov. 7.—Five men held up the Farmers and Merchants bank of Jefferson today and escaped with close to \$105,000 in cash and securities. The loss was covered by insurance.

After slugging the cashier and firing two shots into the floor, the men sped out of town. Sounding the burglar alarm failed to attract the attention of citizens. It had been ringing almost daily because of mechanical faults.

Check Up Incomplete

"Although a check up of the loot obtained will not be complete until tomorrow, bank officials believe \$105,000 is correct. Of this \$8,400 is in cash, \$28,000 in negotiable Liberty bonds and the remainder in non-negotiable securities. The bank had more than \$240,000 insurance.

All main roads in Wisconsin were under guard as county authorities watched for the robbers. They were reported seen at Hebron, a small town south of here, heading toward Illinois. Their black sedan bore, according to witnesses, an Iowa of Ohio license.

Four In Bank

Only four persons were in the bank, during the noon hour as the robbers drove up. One man remained.

Griffin Declared Sane By Jurymen

Alleged El Paso Slayer Of Father-In-Law Mentally Competent Verdict Says; State Ready For Trial

WATAHACHIE, Nov. 7.—(AP)—Cleve Griffin of El Paso, charged with murdering Grant S. "Red" Griffin, his father-in-law, last May, was held mentally competent to make a rational defense by a jury here today.

Griffin was to have gone on trial Monday but was granted a sanity hearing upon a motion presented by his wife, acquaintances and alienists testified.

Three Ballots Taken

The jury's deliberations lasted thirty minutes. Three ballots were required.

After the verdict was read the state announced readiness for the murder trial, but Judge Tom Ball adjourned court until tomorrow in order that the defense might work out its plans.

Ralph Fleagle, Awaiting Hanging For Bank Robbery And Murder Of Four, Jests At Death; Philosophy Related

Bandit Talks About His Crimes In Denver Jail

DENVER, Colo., Nov. 7. — "No. I never was sick a day in my life—until, recently, I found myself threatened with throat trouble." The speaker is a ruddy-faced, gray-haired man of 50, who looks for all the world like a cultured bank president or a kindly physician. He smiles at his own grim jest, fingers his neck and chuckles again.

Was "Brains" of Bank Robbery. His name is Ralph Fleagle. A wealthy ranch owner, he was the "brains" of the famous Lamar, Colo. bank robbery, who killed four men and got away with \$238,000—and he made this little remark as he sat in a cell in jail, waiting for the state of Colorado to hang him by the neck until he is dead. Two of his accomplices are also under sentence to hang while a fourth, Jake Fleagle, a brother—being sought throughout the world with a large reward offered for his capture.

A man who can make a grim jest like that is unusual. Fleagle is all of that. He received a newspaper reporter graciously, quite in the manner of a good-natured executive willing to spare a few moments to give out a "news story" interview.

No trace of the cold-blooded robber about him. But his interview came strangely from his lips—for he told about the theory and practice of bank robbery from the standpoint of an expert.

"One should never drink or take any food before robbing a bank," he remarked. "If a man needs that to nerve him he'd better quit the business, for he lacks the essential nerve."

"Don't Shoot! It Cuts Down Profits." "Never shoot if it's possible to avoid it, either, was one of my mottoes." A shooting affray always cuts down the profits—you're better off to overlook some of the cash in the excitement.

"The unexpected shooting in the Lamar job cost us money."

After all, robbing a bank is a financial proposition. You're there to get everything in sight. We overlooked a lot of cash at Lamar because of the gunfire."

Evenly, the dignified bandit leader explained that he deeply regretted the murders at Lamar.

"Of course," we expected no shooting," he said. "And there shouldn't have been any, but for the attempt to protect the money by A. N. Parrish, bank president."

"That money was insured. His bank didn't stand to lose a cent. He shouldn't have moved a finger. It was most unfortunate, and started a chain of events that claimed all those lives and now is about to claim some more."

Fleagle shook his head.

"But how about the War's Murders?" My sympathy certainly goes out to the widows and orphans of the slain bank officials," he said. "I don't attempt to belittle their grief and loss one iota. But it's a queer commentary on human life—when you consider the little fun that was made over the widows and orphans who were made so by the wholesale murders of the last war."

"But that's different. That legalized murder. The killings in the Lamar job, I insist, were accidental and due to circumstances. Had the elder Parrish resisted from shooting, nothing untoward would have happened."

Two of the killings did not take



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Once, in San Francisco, he was approached and asked to engage in the bootlegging business.

"I refused," he said. "I have no use for bootlegging. I told them I wouldn't consider it—that if I engaged in the business I'd have to drink bootleg liquor, and I'd sooner take poison."

Fleagle reads the Bible, it developed, but he isn't reading it any more now than he did before he was arrested.

"It's No Time to Become Religious" "This is no time to become suddenly religious," he said.

"I shouldn't have agreed to that Lamar job. I was fairly well-fixed and had enough for myself and wife. I'm now convinced that a career of robbery is inadvisable."

"But nobody ever learns from the experiences of others. Hence I refrain from handing out platitudinous advice to the youth of the land. When I was a boy I used to hide behind the barn and read the 'Life of Jesse James.' Maybe that had something to do with my career—and maybe it didn't."

Fleagle revealed that when he was arrested, after a nation-wide hunt by Sheriff L. E. Alderman of Lamar, he was on his way to New York, where he had planned to invest his share of the proceeds of the robbery on the stock market. He reads the newspapers daily in his cell and prefers the editorials and

NEW YORK, Nov. 7.—They said,

An Assorted Crew.

of a new day in Russia.

Bolotov, a tiller of the soil with
generations of down-trodden peasant
ancestors behind him.

The scientist was scholarly, bespectacled Boris Stenligov, astronomer
and inventor, who went along
as navigator to test out some new
flying instruments of his own de-
signing.

width to the Atlantic ocean," ex-
plained Shchegolev, through an in-

"We attempted to set no speed
or endurance records. Two months
were taken to the flight so we
might map out and study carefully
the regions we traversed with view
to definitely linking Russia and
America by air in the future. It
was a flight of exploration as much
as anything else. Our actual flying
time for the 13,300 miles was only
140 hours.

Hazards Were Numerous.

"We were handicapped by poor
landing facilities, of course, and
were compelled to face many dan-
gers that would not be duplicated
if the route over which we flew
were to be built into a modern,
scientific airway with facilities for
accurately covering and reporting
the weather.

"Our flight covered great stretches
of territory never before traversed
by plane, such as the vast, unin-
habited marshy forests of Siberia.
Because of having no knowledge
of weather conditions ahead, we
were forced to proceed blindly into
the stormy North Pacific ocean,
which is particularly dangerous in
the fall.

The "Land of the Soviets" flew
for miles through the dense black
smoke of fires raging in Siberian
forests. From China to Biagovest-
chenka, near the Manchurian bor-
der, there was the triple menace of
sandstorms, violent winds—and
Chinese bullets. Storms, heavy
banks of fog, snow, hail and rain
imperiled them between Kamchatka
and Attu, westernmost of the Aleu-
tian Islands.

Saved By Navy Cutter.
Forced down and nearly wrecked
on the rocks at Dutch Harbor,
Unalaska, after a terrific battle
with a southeast gale, they were
rescued by the crew of the United
States navy cutter Chelan. The
plane was tied to a buoy while re-
pairs were made. On the final
stage of their flight to Seattle, they
several times were out of communica-
tion with the world and reported
lost.

But they "came through," just as
they had come through before. For

this wasn't the first time that these
men of such diversified training had
set out together on the broad sky-
way of adventure.

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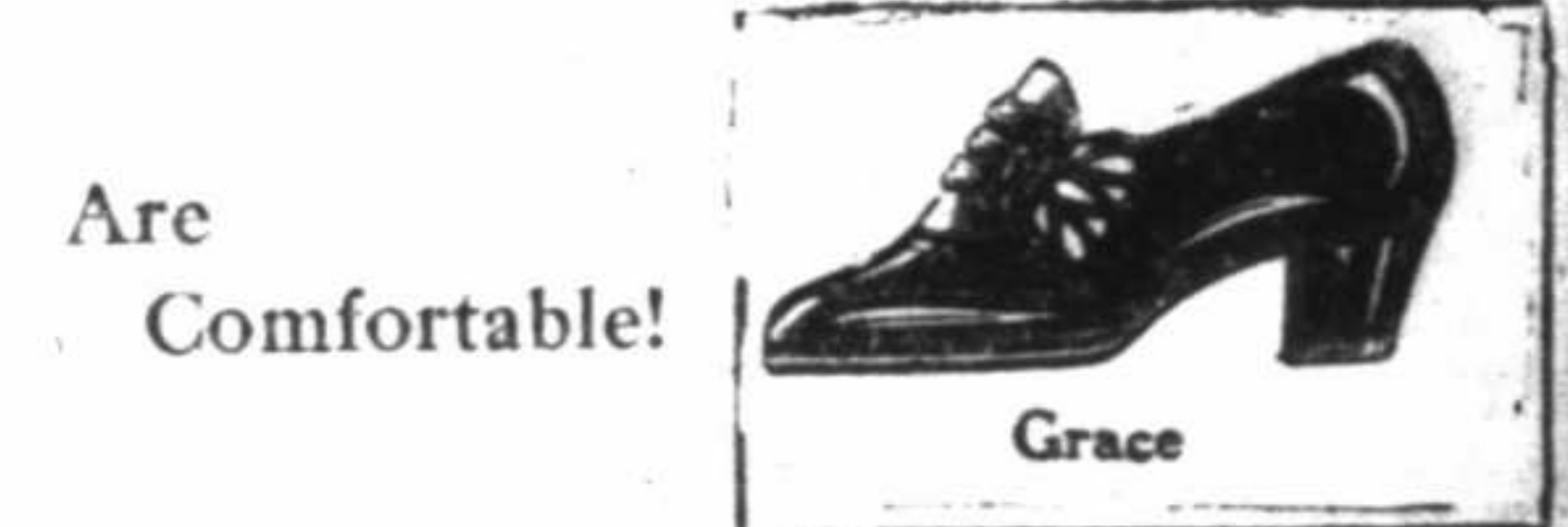

Here in the Lubbock county jail he spent two days and nights awaiting transfer to Hale county and in that time his thoughts turned to the events that had gone before and the justice that had been meted him. These thoughts he set down in verse.

"As I am sitting alone in my cell When I get out I surely can't tell. Wondering if the jailer is going to come clean And bring me my corn bread, bacon and beans."

Yes, I know he is coming by being so long. And he don't ever think he is doing me wrong. But just today I assure you he will find out. He is holding the man that ought to be out.

The day is still coming the whole world will know. That I'm paying a debt I surely don't owe. And if the jurors hadn't all have been bad. Today I'd be happy instead of so sad.

But the high courts of justice are sound minded men. And I know a new hearing they will recommend. So here I sit till the high courts say No— And the heart-beated jailer opens the door.

And says now young man we surely do hate. That we have delayed you so long in this place. And if you had had twelve good honest men. You wouldn't have gotten two years in the pen.

Now this is my story from head to my toes. And the way it has grieved me no body knows. Eleven long years I have done for my crime. And I don't feel like doing some other man's time.

And if they sustain two years on my hands. They're only convicting an innocent man. Then still I can look the whole world in the face. For they're sending me down in another man's place."

PARIS, Nov. 7.—Reports from Berlin that evacuation of the Rhineland has been suspended by order of Andre Maginot, minister of war in the new Tardieu cabinet, were officially denied today.

Movements of troops necessitated by the evacuation, it was explained, might give reason for the supposition that the evacuation orders had been changed, but such orders have been changed only to meet exigencies of the service without in the least modifying the evacuation.

M. Maginot, questioned concerning the Berlin report, said: "The troop movements are caused simply by reason of hygiene and the regrouping of units."

Regarding evacuation of the third zone of the Rhineland, he declared: "You can deny categorically the information in question for the simple reason that evacuation has not commenced and that it cannot be commenced until the Young plan has been accepted and parliament deliberated upon it."

OUR JURY SYSTEM

THINKING people have just about come to the conclusion that the American jury system has become more of a hindrance than a help to the administration of justice. It sounds very well to say that in this country of ours every accused man is entitled to trial by a jury of his peers. It is a beautiful theory to say that a man's fate rests with his fellows. But does it work to the best interests of society? The Morning Avalanche is not at all sure that it does.

Juries are too easily befuddled by the booming oratory of a clever lawyer and by the sonorous charges of a dignified celebrity perched upon the bench. Too many men who would make good jurors admittedly dodge jury service and the methods of selecting a jury, where opposing counsel break their necks to get persons whom they know are incapable of fair deliberation, are a mockery. Just what should be done is hard to say for the problem of improving our channels of justice is a grave one.

It appears to rank outsiders, however, that the old English custom of the decision of guilt or innocence resting with a judge might be a way out of the wilderness. Election of three judges, say, for each criminal court, might solve the problem. At least, it is worth thinking about.

Put three men on every bench, a chief justice, if you please, and two associates. Let them hear every case, decide upon the conflicting points of law and then return a verdict. True, they would have to be lawyers themselves, but this newspaper has reached the opinion that it takes men schooled in law to keep from being flim-flammed by opposing attorneys in every case. Certainly there are enough fair men left to install this system and courts could stay in session continuously without being held up while sheriffs and underlings scoured the countryside for jurymen, as is the present situation.

The thought behind this editorial may be a trifle of freedom as many Americans theoretically view it. It may even jeopardize the rights of a citizen in a court of law. But it couldn't be much worse than what we have now—and the chances are a might be a whole lot more efficient.

After all, most juries mete out mercy instead of justice. It is up to the American public to decide whether it wants mercy or justice in its courts—and then act accordingly.

HAVE A HEART

There are not so many shopping days before Christmas, as there were when first you were asked to do your Christmas buying early, and there is no hope that the number is going to increase; nor will the quality of the goods now on the shelves increase. So why linger and delay?

Pearlman there are those who believe that "Do Your Christmas Shopping Early" is a slogan devised by merchants who thought they would sell more goods if people bought early and then took thought, and discovered that there was more buying they ought to do. But while that doubtless occurred, to the merchants it was not by any means the controlling motive that inspired the shop-early propaganda which greets us annually.

The fact is, the request for early Christmas shopping came, first, chiefly from the postoffice, the express companies, the railroads and the sales and delivery people, all of whom found themselves swamped by a tidal wave that hit them suddenly and left them devastated. Some way had to be found for controlling this tide for distributing its volume. So an attempt was made to educate the public into buying early and shipping early.

The fear of the merchant is not so much that his sales will not reach the hoped-for peak as that his future will be jeopardized. There is nothing that so disrupts a carefully-built organization as the overstrain of the two or three days—and nights-of hurried and hurried labor before Christmas. Clerks break down, some of them leave; others are not fit again for some time, and meanwhile system goes to the dogs and the sales-machine has to be rebuilt. Customers too, offended by some frazzled employee, get sore and may never trade there again. So the merchant, desiring to serve his public well, asks the public to help him to do so by distributing Christmas buying over as long a period as possible.

So it behooves the public, since it wants good service, to remember that the chief element in that service is the human element and that the human machine breaks under undue strain just like any piece of machinery. And because there is a time for special charity to all humans, it is only reasonable that shoppers and shippers be considerate of the store clerk, the postal employee and the servants of the express companies and railroads. They want to enjoy Christmas too. Why make the Yuletide hateful to them? Have a heart. Do your Christmas shopping early.

A GOOD PRECEDENT

The tariff law is not yet in the form it will be upon passage, but it is certain that the next tariff act will place upon diamonds the free list.

This prospect is not due to a sudden conversion of congress to the free-trade theory. It was due to a coincident demand by diamond merchants. And the reason the merchants want the law repealed is that they know by experience that it is unenforceable. Diamonds are continually smuggled despite the law, which means that the duty on diamonds has fostered smuggling instead of protecting the diamond cutting and selling business in the United States. The industry has decided that foreign competition is better than smuggler competition.

PERIOD OF SLIGHTLY LESS PROSPERITY
MIGHT EVEN BE BLESSING IN DISGUISE.
—SAYS STEWART, VIEWING MARKET CRASH

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7.—Wall Street has been experiencing quite a series of shakeups in recent months, but here in Washington hardly any attention was paid to them.

Once or twice there was a bit of congressional grumbling about the federal reserve board. However, it was political; not from folk who knew anything as to real business conditions. The latter was not sufficiently interested even to advise the public not to worry.

But the shock that hit the market toward the end of October was too strong to be pooh-poohed.

That brought out a flock of "statements."

The nation's leaders, from President Hoover on down, evidently sensed considerable popular nervousness, which they deemed it desirable to allay as promptly as possible.

It was not a panic; only a momentary speculative flurry—business is fundamentally sound—building has fallen off slightly, but that's simply seasonal—business is fundamentally sound—Wall Street and the rest of the country have nothing in common anyway—the temporary slump in grain prices has no genuine significance—prosperity's tide is still rising—business is fundamentally sound.

Thus the statements.

Without claiming to know much about commerce and finance, never in 35 years' experience as a newspaper man, have I seen a violent outbreak of reassuring statements from the country's business leaders, that something darn serious was not the matter.

When a seeming setback actually is of no particular importance, the high moguls keep quiet, perhaps fearing to start trouble by suggesting it.

When the outlook appears to them to be decidedly billious—and they figure I suppose that there is everything to gain and nothing to lose—they invariably cut loose with a barrage of reassurance.

My suspicion always has been—from listening to a good many of them—that big business men and the government's financial experts are not as much wiser than common people as they pretend to be, but simply say what they hope—and would like to have—the public believe.

I know for a fact that they do not understand our last few years' period of so-called prosperity because a few of them have been candid enough to tell me so.

It has been an unprecedented period. Consequently they have nothing in the past to compare it with and draw conclusions from.

They have thought that maybe it was a new thing in the world's history—the product of machinery of our improved industrialism of up-to-date discoveries of the federal reserve system and what not—and bound to last forever.

And yet they have not been certain it was not a huge boom, which could not be depended on.

They have mostly gone on the assumption (because they preferred to that) it was the genuine article. Earlier stock market slumps were not as drastic enough to jar them out of this complacency. October's last one did—it sent them pell mell to their stenographers dictating reassuring statements.

They may prove to have been mistaken. Maybe everything is all right and the latest stock market earthquake was not a warning of a let-up in prosperity any more than the earlier ones were.

All the same, the nation's leaders were alarmed this time—or they would not have been so reassuring.

A short session of slightly tighter times than we have seen in the last seven or eight years might be a blessing in disguise, at that.

For quite awhile heretofore big business could have carried off the United States treasury without a protest, nobody would have dared to say anything, lest he cast a blight on prosperity. Such coodles of prosperity that public crookedness is permitted to flourish, uninterfered with, is almost too much of a good thing.

For instance, in spite of all the howling about our oil scandals, the country's first conviction in connection with them was Albert B. Fall's, the other day—and that followed the great market crash.

Of course the Fall conviction so soon after the Wall Street earthquake was only a coincidence.

Still, with a trifle less prosperity on our minds for a brief space, perhaps we would have leisure to run down a few other grafters who ought to have been attended to long ago.

CHILD'S DIET IS IMPORTANT FOR PREVENTING DECAY OF TEETH

Some months ago investigators in the University of Iowa reported that they had been able to stop the development of decay in the teeth of diabetic children who had been receiving carefully controlled diets to control their diabetes. Repeated examinations on many other diabetic children confirmed the original observations.

In order to find out what the factors were in the diet that were of importance in preventing decay, the studies were extended to children who did not have diabetes but who did have decaying teeth. It was found that the prescribing of a suitable diet aided in preventing the decay in every instance.

When these children went home and began to eat whatever they pleased without relationship to the substances that had been given to them in the hospital, the teeth began to decay again. The Iowa authorities then decided to find out whether they could prevent decay of teeth in children who were being fed at home, provided these children were given all the selected foods.

The diet required included one quart of milk, one egg, a teaspoonful of cod liver oil, an ounce of butter, one orange, two or more servings of fresh vegetables and such other foods as the child liked best. Candy was allowed after meals but not at other times.

When five children were put on the diet and kept to it for a period of 10 weeks, persistent decay of the teeth stopped; practically all of the children gained weight during the period, three of them at the rate of one-half pound each week.

As a result of their survey of children's diets, the Iowa authorities are convinced that even when the Iowa authorities are convinced that even when the children's menus are carefully planned, the foods that the child eats may be considerably different from the diet prescribed. When the food is placed before the child, it eats the things that it likes and avoids the others. Mothers must keep careful watch of the child at the time of eating to make sure that the important food substances are actually taken.

MONTANA JOINS UNION
On Nov. 8, 1889, Montana was admitted into the Union by proclamation of the president after a state constitution had been framed and stated officers elected. Joseph K. Toole, a Democrat, was the first governor of Montana.

In the first national election in 1892, Montana was Republican. In 1896 and 1900, and thereafter almost invariably Republican.

The state suffered for many years from industrial troubles which centered about Butte and other cities, where labor was at a standstill for a considerable time.

Montana had a population of approximately 600,000. It was crossed by Lewis and Clark in 1804. It ranks third in size among the states in the union. Its area being 146,997 square miles, of which 796 miles are under water.

Glacier National Park in northwestern Montana has an area of 915,000 acres, 80 glaciers, ranging from five square miles down to a few acres, and over 350 lakes.

Farm Board Takes Step In Selling and Buying of Grain

Important Move For Crops Made Through National Grain Corporations At Northwestern Terminals

(By Associated Press)

MINNEAPOLIS, Nov. 7. — The Federal Farm Board, through the Farmers National Grain corporation, has taken an important step toward buying and selling of grain crops at northwest terminals.

At a meeting yesterday attended by S. J. Cottingham of Stanhope, la., president of the corporation, and representatives of farmers elevator associations, wheat pools and state and local farmers unions in Minnesota, the Dakotas and Montana, agreement was reached to co-operate with the corporation.

To Establish Agencies. — As a result, the corporation will establish grain marketing agencies within a few weeks at Minneapolis and Duluth, and five co-operative selling offices will be merged and added as a nucleus for the two new agencies.

It was decided to appoint a committee of representatives from each organization to meet with the Farmers National Grain corporation prior to any action by the latter toward the final marketing plans.

The committee will include four representatives of state farmers elevator associations — one each from Minnesota, North Dakota, South Dakota and Montana; three wheat pool representatives — one each from Minnesota, South Dakota and North Dakota and Montana; one from the Farmers union, and one from the Co-operative Farmers Northwest Grain corporation.

The agreement was announced after a day of executive sessions in which much argument was reported.

BOOM GETS IMPETUS

Second Well Spudded In At Van Zandt Field

TYLER, Nov. 7. (AP)—Van Zandt county's oil boom received new impetus today with news that a second well had been spudded in late yesterday.

Cotton Erratic; Market Takes Drop

Fluctuations Are Wide In Nervous Session Of Mart

Prices Sag In Sympathy Of Wall Street Decline To Make New Low Levels For Entire Cotton Season

NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 7. (AP)—Cotton was nervous and erratic today and price fluctuations were fairly wide. After a moderate early advance the market sagged in sympathy with the weakness in stocks and values made new low levels for the season. The market rallied again, however, but the improvement met renewed liquidation and final prices showed little net change for the day.

January contracts declined from 17.25 to 17.10, net rallied 17.42 only to ease off and close at 17.10, unchanged for the day. The general market closed steady but on point up to 2 points down.

Although Liverpool cables were early, initial transactions here showed advances of 4 to 5 points. The market continued to advance after the start on the unfavorable weather in the belt. December sold up to 18.11 or 5 to 7 points net up. The early decline in the stock market induced sympathetic selling in cotton and as a result prices here traded to new lows for the season with December selling below the 17 cent line to 16.98. January traded to 17.10 and March 17.29, or 12 to 13 points down from the highs.

The subsequent recovery in stocks steadied prices and the apparent over sold condition of the market induced some additional support. The demand proved sufficient to carry all active positions up 32 points from the lows with December at 17.30 and March 17.60.

Cotton Rallies From Early Declines

NEW YORK, Nov. 7. (AP)—Rallies from an early decline in cotton today were attributed to trading by and pre-bureau covering, but met some Southern selling and realizing and were not fully maintained. After selling up from 17.31 to 17.47, January contracts rallied to 17.24 and closed at 17.28 with the general market closing steady, net 3 points higher to 3 points lower.

The opening was barely steady at an advance of 9 points to a decline in the afternoon and the active movement showed net losses of 2 to 4 points under trading and some further liquidation prompted by the opening declines in the stock market. This carried prices into a new low ground for the movement and margin and seemed to bring in considerable trade buying or covering. The latter became more active when the stock market rallied and prices worked up sharply during the middle of the day with December advancing from 17.08 to 17.34 while March sold up from 17.31 to 17.57.

CHICAGO, Nov. 7. (AP)—Big speculative buying that overwhelmed all obstacles swept wheat upward today, with momentum increasing rapidly at the last. Much of the demand was of a highly concentrated character and appeared to be under leadership of a noted eastern trader who is reported to have operated of late on a large scale, changing quickly from one side of the market to the other.

Today's rallies in stock exchange values counted upward toward promising wheat price advances, and so likewise did Argentine frost reports as well as substantial new trans-Atlantic call for North American wheat.

Closing Strong

Chicago wheat trading at virtually the day's top figure, 2 3/4 to 3 1/4c higher than yesterday's finish. Closed 1 1/2 to 1 5/8c up, oats 1 1/2 to 1 3/4c advance, and provisions varying from 1/2c to 1c up on an equal basis.

Unfavorable weather, likely to hold back the movement of the corn crop, tended to give independent strength to corn prices. Oats were responsive to corn market action.

March and May deliveries of oats, however, sold early at a new low price record for the season.

Provisions averaged lower, sympathizing with downturns in the value of hogs.

Injunction Writ Of Error Refused In Overton Case

School Land Oil, Gas Rights Sold

Leasing Board of University of Texas Receives \$191,864 On 2,100 Acres in Three Counties

AUSTIN, Nov. 7. (AP)—The land leasing board of the University of Texas today sold the oil and gas rights on approximately 2,100 acres for \$191,864. The land leased was in Ector, Crane and Huddspeth counties.

The board rejected all bids on eight other tracts, and no bids were received on ten pieces of land advertised for lease.

Bids Too Low

The eight bids were rejected because the board did not think them sufficiently high. J. H. Walker, land commissioner and member of the board, said the board would hold the land for more money inasmuch as larger bids were received on nearby property. Sale or leases was as follows:

Ector county: S. 1-2 of N. E. quarter, section 1, B-135, Costen company, Fort Worth, \$36,800; S. 1-2 of N. W. quarter, section 1, B-135, Costen company, \$40,000; S. 1-2 of N. E. quarter section 2, B-135, Costen company, \$56,800.

Crane and Ector counties: N. W. quarter of section 12, B-125, Prairie Oil and Gas company, Eastland, \$16,104.

Crane county: S. E. quarter of section 12, B-135, Prairie company, \$9,840; S. E. quarter of section 13, B-135, Snowden and McWherry, Fort Worth \$12,000.

Huddspeth county: Section 14, B-1A, L. E. Lockhart, Los Angeles, \$180.

The figures were in addition to one-eighth royalty and fifty cents an acre on the Huddspeth county land and one-sixth royalty and \$1 an acre on the other tracts.

This was the second sale of mineral rights by the board created by the 41st legislature. At the previous sale 19 tracts were sold for \$168,425.

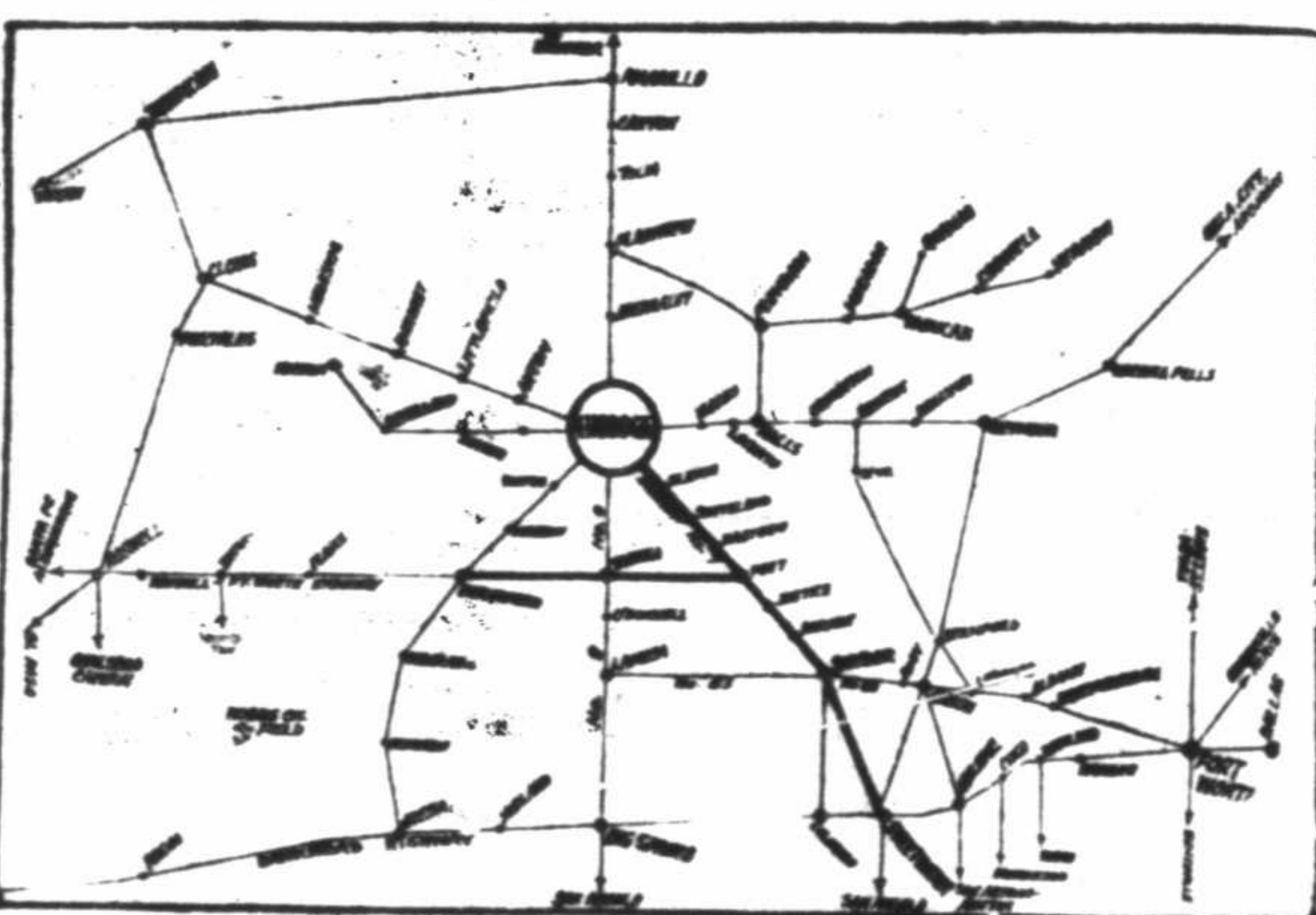
