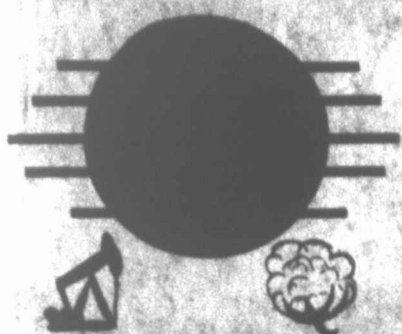

Convicts warn of drug/alcohol consequence

Will is red-headed and from the West Texas town of Post. His boyish good looks belie his age of 23.

Charles is 22 and from Houston. His clean-cut appearance makes him look like the boy next door.

Both are inmates of the Texas

Department of Corrections, each serving time for delivery of a controlled substance.

Will and Charles were in Colorado City Wednesday telling their stories to students at Colorado High School and Colorado Middle School as part of the Community Education Program of the TDC.

"It hasn't been too long ago since we were sitting where you

are," Will told the attentive middle school students during an assembly Wednesday afternoon.

"We had the same opportunities as you have, but we were hard headed and didn't listen," said Will.

Will told how he grew up on a farm outside Post in a middle income family. In junior high, he was the drum major in band

and participated in University Interscholastic League events.

But, he didn't want to be called a "sissy" so he started running around with the wrong crowd and started skipping school, Will said. He started drinking in the eighth grade and soon after was introduced to marijuana by two "friends." He said he continued to drink and do drugs all through junior high and high

school. It was during high school that he joined a rock band and started to experiment with hard drugs.

Will said cocaine was his first hard drug to experiment with and even though he was "scared to death," he "stuck the needle in my arm just to be cool, to be tough."

Farabee to speak at luncheon here

Senator Ray Farabee will be guest speaker at the first Small Business Week Luncheon, sponsored by the Colorado City Area Chamber of Commerce.

"The chamber plans to make this an annual event in conjunction with the Small Business Week designated each year by the Small Business Administration," said Bob Rely, president of the Colorado City Area Chamber of Commerce. "It is our way of honoring and recognizing the contributions of our local small business men and women to our local economy as well as the donation of their time, money, products and services to the civic and charitable projects in our community."

Raymond and Virginia Fuller of Fuller Foods, Inc. are the recipients of the first Colorado City Area Chamber of Commerce Small Business Person of the Year award to be presented to a local small business each year

at the Small Business Week Luncheon. Winners of the award are chosen by a committee of the Chamber of Commerce based on the criteria outlined each year by the United States Small Business Administration. Each year's local winner will be nominated by the Colorado City Chamber for the United States Small Business Person of the Year award, as were the Fullers this year.

As the chamber's 1986 nominee the Fullers were named winners of the Lubbock District Small Business Person of the Year award. The competition included 71 counties. On hand to present this award will be SBA District Director Walter Fronstin.

"Small business owners are the leading job creators and job trainers in the country," said Walt Fronstin. "We are indebted

Beautification group eyed

A steering committee was formed Thursday to organize an on-going clean-up and beautification committee for Colorado City.

The action came following a program presented by the beautification committee of the Colorado City Area Chamber of Commerce. The new committee will be a branch of the chamber, explained Robert Alford, chairman of the beautification committee.

Named to the committee were Alford, Jim Baum, Ben Lancaster, Becky Manning, Sheila Plagens, Kit Lovell, Bobbie Steakley, Penny Solomon, ex-officio member, and Lee Woods, temporary chairman.

Alford said the purpose of Thursday's meeting was to "talk about and throw around ideas for a clean-up and beautification program for Colorado City."

"We would like to arrive at what the community wants and who's interested in serving," said Alford.

Bob Rely, chamber president,

explained that the chamber has three main goals this year - increasing membership, tourism and a clean-up campaign.

"We are aware we have a real problem of clean up," said Rely. "We're thrilled that Robert (Alford) has taken a leadership role."

Tom Ward, president of the Beautify Breckenridge Association, spoke to the group about what Breckenridge has done to clean up the town.

Ward, who is retired from Texas Electric, said that prior to 1983, Breckenridge had a once-a-year clean-up campaign, much like Colorado City.

"We didn't notice the weeds growing up, the junked cars and the dilapidated buildings," said Ward, "but the visitors did."

He explained that visitors and potential industries "see all the pitfalls of the community that we overlook."

"We decided we needed more than a clean-up drive," he said.

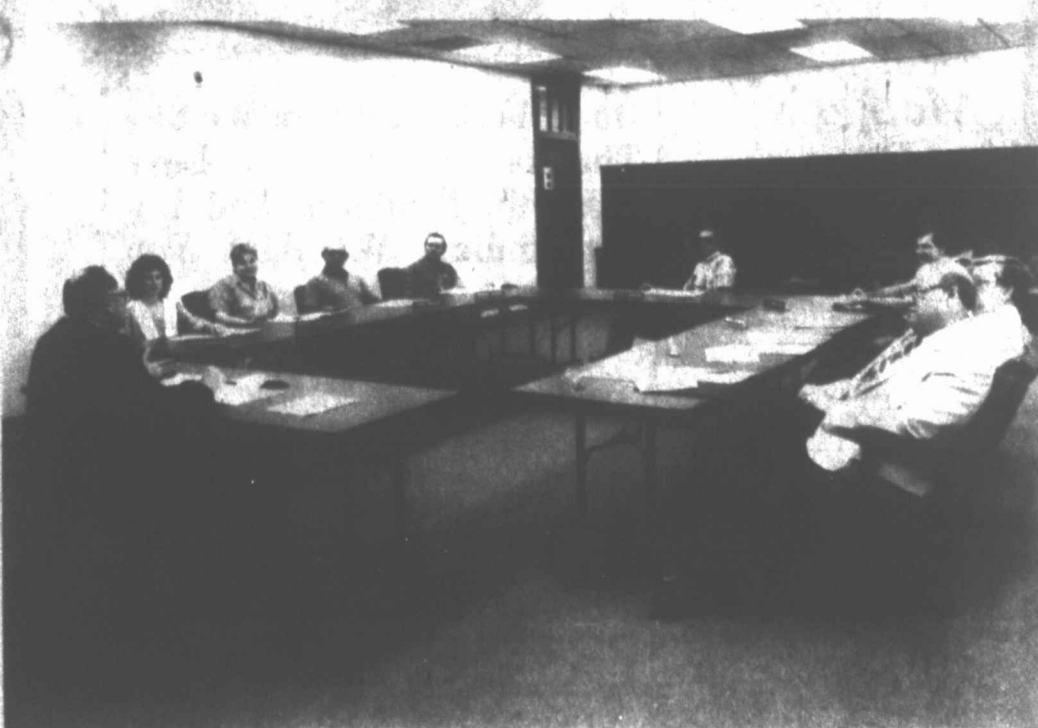
Assistance is available to farmers, ranchers

Mitchell County has been declared as a contiguous county for USDA assistance to the farmers and ranchers following the April 19 tornado which hit Sweetwater.

Robert A. Langford, state coordinator for the Division of Emergency Management of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said that in addition to Nolan County being declared a

major disaster area, seven contiguous counties are also named including Coke, Fisher, Jones, Mitchell, Runnels, Scurry and Taylor.

Emergency loan applications to the Farmers Home Administration will be received through December 23, 1986, for physical and production losses. Applications pending on that date may be completed and approved.

Following high school, he was offered a scholarship to a trade school, but he turned it down for easy money in the oil fields surrounding Post.

He said his drinking problem worsened because he would go drinking after work with his co-workers. When he was 18 years old, he sold some speed to a stranger passing through town. "The 'stranger' turned out to be an undercover narcotics agent and a year later, Will was arrested.

Will said he was lucky because he received a probated sentence and he decided to give up drugs.

He got married but didn't give up drinking. His drinking led to drugs again and the combination lost him his wife and his job.

"The drugs changed me physically and emotionally," he said. "I should have realized I had a drug problem, but I didn't."

He said he gave up drugs again after a wreck, but he kept on drinking. "All I wanted was to catch the buzz," he explained.

After the wreck, he lived in his pickup for three years.

He recalls his last day in "free society" was when he attacked a police officer after being stopped in his pickup.

He was sent to prison for 10 years.

"It's nobody's fault but my own," he said. "Nobody put me in prison but myself."

"I encourage you to be smart and stay away from drugs," he told his youthful audience. "Be smart, be able to say no."

Charles said he is serving 16 years in prison after being sent to prison along with his father, both of whom were convicted of selling drugs to an undercover agent.

"Drugs and alcohol played a significant role in me being in

prison," said Charles, adding that "poor decision making" also led to his eventual imprisonment.

Charles explained that he was the youngest child in his family and that he was never corrected.

"I went through life thinking I could get away with it all," he said. "I didn't."

He described his father as a good provider, but said that when he was in junior high, his parents separated and that his father changed after that.

Charles said that when he was in junior high, he let his hair grow long and he was picked up for both truancy and shoplifting.

By the time he was in the eighth grade, he had tried a variety of drugs.

"I let other people influence me," he said. "I wanted to be part of the crowd."

When he was in the ninth grade, he talked his mother into letting his girlfriend move in with them. He dropped out of school and went to look for work. He couldn't find work.

At 15, he had a pregnant girlfriend and no job. It was then that his father brought him a sack filled with two pounds of marijuana.

"This is it, this is easy," he recalls thinking when given the marijuana.

He quickly sold the marijuana, and then started selling other drugs with his father's friends introducing him to the world of pushing drugs.

In 1961, he and his father were arrested following a raid on their home in which two pounds of heroin was found. The charges were later dropped.

After his girlfriend left him, he stopped using drugs and found a job. He met a new girl and stayed with her for three and a half years before he lost

his job and "the bills started piling up again."

He and his father started dealing in drugs again.

But that came to an end when they were arrested.

"My life shattered before my eyes," he recalls of the time he was arrested.

They each were sentenced to 16 years.

"Drugs in general ruined my life and they can ruin yours as well," said Charles. "Think twice before getting involved with drugs and alcohol."

After a group of Euleas officials came to Breckenridge to explain their program, a permanent clean-up and beautification organization was formed as a branch of the chamber of commerce.

A membership drive was conducted and small projects were undertaken.

"Small projects can be taken on and show positive results," he said, explaining that the downtown area was improved with plantings and new trash receptacles.

He said a clean-up drive is still conducted annually in conjunction with the state and national clean-up week, but the committee doesn't stop there.

The committee encourages the city to enforce ordinances concerning junked cars and dilapidated buildings.

Recognition is also given to businesses for beautification efforts as well as to homeowners for beautiful yards.

He said the most important thing in forming such an organization is to set long-range goals.

He said the city has cooperated in their efforts and that a voluntary 50-cent contribution can be made monthly by water users on their water bills. He said money from the fund is used to landscape entrances into town and to provide matching funds for organizations wishing to beautify public places.

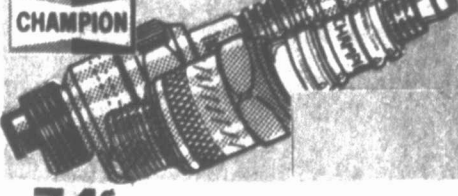

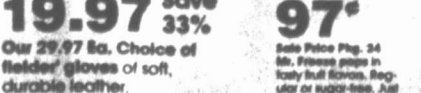

A MOTHER'S VISION

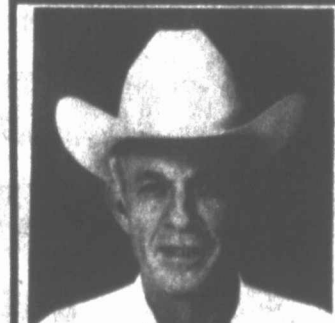

Showing ability to pump 63 barrels of oil per day on open choke, the No. 194 Mary Foster has been completed in the East Howard Istan Field, Mitchell County. Mobil Producing is the operator.

The operation is in a lease about nine miles southwest of Westbrook.

Mobil bottomed the well at 3,400 feet and perforated the Clear Fork Formation for production at 2,834 to 3,380 feet into the wellbore. In addition to 25-gravity oil, the well made 236 barrels of waste water daily.

A pair of 2,000-ft. developmental wells are scheduled for spudding in Mitchell County's Sharon Ridge Field about two miles northeast of Cuthbert.

The wells will be known as the No. 8 and No. 9 Coleman Ranch. Mrs. W. M. Keck Jr. is the operator. Locations are in a 60-acre lease in the H&TC Survey A-1325.

Jade Oil and Gas has plugged and abandoned an ill-fated Mitchell County developmental well about seven miles southwest of

Westbrook. Located in the East Howard Istan Field, the well had been designated as the No. 1 Roy L. Farmer.

It bottomed with no commercial prospects at a depth of 2,800 feet.

Four pumping oilers have been brought on line in the East Howard Istan Field by Crews Oil Inc.

The wells are designated as the Nos. 1 through 4 Bell "G," with drillsites about four miles south of Istan. The ventures showed ability to pump a combined 50 barrels of 30-gravity oil daily.

Production intervals - all in the San Andres Formation - will range from 1,840 to 1,890 feet into the hole.

Waste water production ranged from 36 to 41 barrels per day.

The Sharon Ridge Field, Mitchell County, gained two new producers when the No. 7 and No. 12 Doris Cole were finished about eight miles northwest and north of Colorado City, respec-

tively.

The No. 7 well was taken to total depth of 1,890 feet and will produce from perforations in the Clear Fork Formation, 1,863 to 1,740 feet into the wellbore.

The No. 12 probed to total depth of 1,890 feet and will produce from the Clear Fork at 1,827 to 1,786 feet into the hole.

The wells showed potential to pump nine and eight barrels of oil daily, respectively.

John Otis Cole is the operator.

Testing for potential is scheduled at four developmental ventures in Mitchell County's Sharon Ridge Field. William H. Zahone Jr. is the operator.

The wells are designated as the Nos. 2-B, 4-B, 3-B and 1-B Minatra. The wells have been bottomed at depths from 1,850 to 1,875 feet except for the No. 1 well which was taken to total

depth of 3,406 feet. Locations are from three to four miles south-east of Cuthbert.

Chevron has bottomed its No. 94 W. L. Foster "T" at a depth of 3,045 feet and has plugged back to 2,983 at a lease in the East Howard Istan Field 10 miles southwest of Westbrook. Drilling had gotten underway on March 11. The well has been fractured and acidized and will

be tested on pump.

Potential testing has been ordered at the No. 4 Coleman Ranch in the Sharon Ridge Field three miles northeast of Cuthbert. With Mrs. W. M. Keck Jr. as the operator, the well was spudded on March 31 and taken to total depth of 1,895 feet. Six intervals have been perforated in the San Andres Formation for possible production.
