Antelopes Again Paste Owls 26-7 in Second Tilt

Last Friday's game between the traditional sports rivals, the Abernathy Antelopes and the Hale Center Owls, played on the Hale Center gridiron, was a carbon copy of the game seven days previous at Abernathy. Lightning struck twice, reported the valiant Owls, who were powerless to stop the surging Antelopes. Score for the second game was exactly the same as in the first game—26-7.

Fans viewing both games say the Owls were outweighed from 10 to 20 pounds per man. Indicative of the Antelopes' advantage was the number of first downs each team made last Friday. The Owls made two and the Antelopes, ten.

Abernathy's eleven began scoring in the first few minutes of play, when McMasters plunged through the heart of the Owl line six yards to mark up six points, and he converted for a seventh point in the opening quarter. In the second quarter Lewis Lutrick snagged a pass from McMaster to score a touchdown and H. D. Rhodes plunged over for another point. Score at the half, 14-0 for the Antelopes.

Early in the last half Hale Center capitalized on blocking an Antelope punt on Abernathy's one-yard line, and Caraway plowed over for six points, and later kicked for the extra point.

McMaster brought the fans to their feet with a 65-yard run down the field, but the Antelopes lost the ball when the Owls put up a stubborn defense. Later, V. Parsons intercepted an Owl pass and ran 25 yards to score for the Antelopes. Their kick for point went haywire. In the final fourth, Lester Brown intercepted another Owl pass to score six points more after a 20-yard run. A pass attempt for point-after-touchdown didn't click. Final score, 26-7 for the Antelopes.

AN EIGHTH AIR FORCE FIGHTER STATION, ENGLAND — TSgt. Robert N. Foreman, son of Mrs. James R. Foreman of Clinton, Mich., is the Sergeant Major of a fighter squadron on this Eighth Air Force Fighter Station which was commanded by Brig.-Gen. Jesse Auton, Wing Commander, for the part played in the destruction of 43 enemy aircraft and the damaging of 23 others on a German-held airfield recently.

Gen. Auton pointed out that it required the cooperation of each member of every organization on this field to prepare the way for and to support its Commanding Officer, Col. Hubert Zenke, and his fighter pilots on their straining run over the enemy airfield.

The mission began as a bomber-escort assignment, but after the bombers had dropped their loads on the enemy field, Col. Zenke and his pilots raked the area again and again until almost every plane in view had been either damaged or destroyed.

TSgt. Foreman's wife, Mrs. Ruth A. Foreman, lives in Abernathy. Before his induction in the army in February, 1941, TSgt. Foreman was employed by the Grand Rapids Stamping division of General Motors Corp., as engineering clerk.

The couple left immediately for a honeymoon, after which they will make their home in Merced, Calif., where the groom is stationed.

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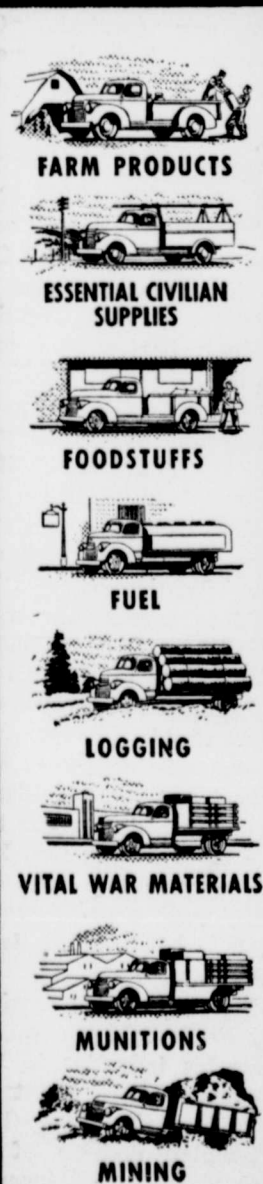

Keep spare lamp bulbs on hand in your home to replace burnouts as soon as they occur. Most electric dealers now have bulbs in all common home sizes. You need no points, coupons or certificates to buy them — never did, in fact. So don't be without light these dark fall days and longer evenings.

It costs you little to have light in your home where you need it. You can be sure you are getting all you pay for if you keep your home lighting equipment in shape this way:
