Dentler Given 3 Years; Centralization of Pen Jury Returns Four Bills System is Before Senate

Judge E. J. Miller held the first night session of this term of 35th district court here Wednesday night to complete the case of the State of Texas vs. H. J. Dentler, charged with possession of beer for sale. Testimony was concluded late Wednesday afternoon and immediately after supper the court's charge was given the jury and arguments in the case heard. The jury was out about twenty minutes and returned a verdict of guilty, assessing the penalty of three years in the penitentiary.

Dentler was charged with the sale of beer on or about the 17th day of August, 1929. Six state witnesses were presented in establishing the evidence in the case. The first witness called was Billie Baker, a girl who was present at the Dentler home on the night of the alleged sale. She testified she drove to the Dentler home in company with Kirk Murphy and Forest DeMent after they had been to a dance on the same evening. They arrived at the Dentler home, she stated, around 11 p. m., and Dentler came out to their car. Murphy asked if he could get some beer and was told that he could, witness declared. Here the young woman told of getting the beer and drinking it, which she alleged was intoxicating. She stated that the price of the beer was twenty-five cents a bottle.

Murphy and DeMent followed on the stand and told about the same story as related by Miss Baker. They stated that they remained at Dentler's place for several hours and until the officers arrived and arrested them.

C. B. Armstrong, city night-watchman, the first officer called to the stand, described the condition of the place when they arrived. He stated that the officers were called to Dentler's by some neighbors to quiet a "row." As they approached the house, Armstrong said, they saw a man run from the house and through the brush near the house. Upon entering the premises the three above named witnesses were found in the house, intoxicated, it was alleged. Bottles were strewn about the house and yard and upon examination were found to contain small quantities of beer, the officer testified. A laugh was provoked in the courtroom when District Attorney Walter U. Early asked Mr. Armstrong if he would know beer when he smelled it. Chief of Police Lee Moreland and Sheriff R. E. McWilliams testified to about the same facts as did Mr. Armstrong. Here the state rested its case and defense also rested without placing a single witness on the stand.

The grand jury which reconvened early Wednesday morning, reported late in the afternoon, returning four felony indictments. C. P. Filler, Bryan Filler and Dalton Tuttle were indicted for stealing chickens, and Oscar Coble was indicted for theft of cottonseed and blacksmithing tools. Sheriff McWilliams stated that Coble had made a confession and asked to be given a chance to plead guilty as soon as possible. Cottonseed and tools stolen were recovered by the sheriff and returned to the owners.

The sheriff also stated that Myrtle Vowell, arrested recently at Abilene and charged with forgery, had asked for an early opportunity to appear before the court and enter a plea of guilty.

The grand jury spent some time Wednesday investigating a reckless driving charge in which Mr. and Mrs. Henry Winchester of this city were recently run over by a hit-and-run motorist. A number of witnesses were heard but no light could be thrown on the incident. On the night of the occurrence officers made considerable investigation trying to discover a car that fit the description of that which struck the couple, but had no success. Finding no evidence which would warrant an indictment the grand

Income Tax Deputy Here On March 5th

R. G. Erwin cashier of the First National Bank, is in receipt of a letter from Geo. C. Hopkins, of Dallas, collector of internal revenue, stating that Deputy O. A. Cain will be in Ballinger on March 5th for the purpose of assisting individuals make out their income tax returns. This is a free service given by the department and any person who desires help in making out their income return blanks can see Mr. Cain at McCarver & Lynn's office during his stay in Ballinger. Mr. Erwin stated that desk space had been arranged for the deputy at this office where he would be glad to meet anyone who is required to file federal income tax return.

March 15th is the final date for the filing of the returns and time will be limited after the deputy arrives here. The law requires that the return must be in the mail by that date or certain penalties are imposed on any who is delinquent.

Blanks are mailed out from the Dallas office in this territory. However, those subject to income tax who have no blank will be able to secure same from Mr. Cain at his office.

USE DIRIGIBLE TO TEST AIR CURRENTS FOR GERMS

AKRON, O., Feb. 27.—List the dirigible as a new ally of preventive medicine.

Charles Barton of the Los Angeles board of health used the semi-rigid dirigible "Volunteer," of the Goodyear fleet to go aloft for samples of air. He found the ship valuable because it could be held almost stationary.

Barton took cultures at 4,500 feet, 3,500, 2,500 and 1,000 feet over Los Angeles and at 2,500 feet above a rural region.

Over the city he found no bacillus that he could identify as disease producing. Over the country he found some that probably are disease producing along with subtilis, or hay bacillus.

Directors Close Rising Star Bank

RISING STAR, Feb. 27.—The First National Bank of this city failed to open for business today. A notice on the door said the directors had found it advisable to close the institution and had asked the state banking department to take charge of it. No further information was obtained as to the cause of the closing.

C. C. Falls is president of the institution, which is capitalized for \$25,000. Deposits at the time of the last statement were \$162,000.

Johnson Well is Down 1000 Feet

It was reported Wednesday afternoon by the contractors, Gibson & Johnson that a depth of 1,000 feet had been reached in the D. O. Johnson No. 1, located about two miles north of Ballinger. The drillers are making excellent progress on this well and only daylight drilling has been done so far. Night shifts have been contemplated but due to the light plant not working properly only day runs have been made.

Twelve and a half inch casing will be set in this well to its present depth at an early date.

Oil operators are manifesting considerable interest in the Johnson test as it is in a territory where repeated showings of oil have been encountered. The location is about one mile east of the old Serrati No. 1, which came in for about 25 barrels a day. It is also but a short distance south of McMillan No. 1, discovery well in this county.

Texas Now Stands 35th in Illiteracy

AUSTIN, Feb. 27.—Texas stands thirty-fifth among the states in literacy and prospects are that it will drop still further unless intensive work is done before the 1930 federal census, says an appeal issued by Governor Dan Moody and educational leaders urging Texans to take part in a campaign to eradicate illiteracy.

Declaring the situation disgraceful, the appeal suggests that local illiteracy committees be organized immediately with a view of reducing as far as possible the number of illiterates before census takers start to work. A concerted eleventh-hour effort to seek out illiterates and teach them to read and write in the coming week would prove of inestimable value and would create public interest in permanent programs, the appeal stated.

As there is no state fund for this work, it is suggested that teachers and friends of education volunteer their services. Opening of city and county night schools also is recommended.

In addition to Governor Moody, the appeal was signed by S. M. N. Marrs, state superintendent of public instruction; Nat M. Washburn, president of the state board of education; Ernest C. Cox, state commander of the American Legion; H. D. Fillers, president of the State Teachers Association and Mrs. Noyes D. Sith, president of the Texas Congress of Mothers and Parent-Teacher Associations. The appeal asserts that the legislature has repeatedly refused to create a division of literacy in the department of education with the result that little had been done in the past ten years to reduce illiteracy where other states had carried out organized programs.

AUSTIN, Feb. 27.—The Senate today began consideration of the so-called administration bill to centralize the state penitentiary system near Austin after refusing to reconsider its motion yesterday in refusing to pass an opposition bill to engrossment.

Senator Tom Pollard, of Tyler, raised a point of order that the administration bill is dead insofar as this session of the legislature is concerned because the Senate failed to substitute it for the bill proposing rehabilitation of existing properties. The Pollard contention was overruled.

The House took up the bill offered by Representative Harry N. Graves, of Georgetown, to rehabilitate existing properties. As an amendment to effect a compromise Representative Phil Sanders, of Nacogdoches, offered a bill to provide for a unit on the Wynne state prison farm, and an industrial plant in Central Texas, calling for an appropriation of \$1,000,000, to August 31 of next year.

On Speaker W. S. Barron's desk was a sine die adjournment resolution proposing that the special session of the legislature adjourn Saturday.

Old Postoffice Being Repaired

Workmen commenced Wednesday to tearing out the fixtures in the old postoffice quarters and will store them in the third story of the Farmers & Merchants State Bank building.

Fred Kiechle, vice-president of the bank, stated that a large portion of the first floor of the building will be remodeled and more room taken into the banking quarters. The stairway leading to the upper floors will be raised in order to allow a passageway underneath the steps from the banking rooms to the room formerly occupied by the postoffice. The space formerly used by the postoffice will be cut and a directors' room built by the bank at the rear of the present one. The space that has been used as a directors' room will be utilized by the bank for its office staff.

The rear section of the bank building on the ground floor will be converted for use by a mercantile establishment. Mr. Kiechle said he had no announcement to make at present as to who would be the tenant. Several applications have been made for the space but no action has been taken nor contract made with any party.

The additional room acquired by the bank will relieve a crowded condition and aid in the dispatching of the institution's business.

JEFFERSON DRUG STORE ESTABLISHED IN 1864

He says the other store is founded by W. J. Sedberry in 1864. It has never been closed except at night and on Sunday. W. J. Sedberry died in 1923, aged 84, and his son, H. H. Sedberry, has operated the store since.

A general breakdown followed the combined inroads of several ailments which early this month forced Taft to resign as chief justice of the United States supreme court.

Election Probe is Held at Houston

HOUSTON, Feb. 27.—The federal grand jury inquiring into alleged irregularities in the Hidalgo county 1928 general election heard its last witness today and planned to resume deliberations later in the day.

R. L. Bass, employee of the San Antonio Stationery Company, was the last witness. Bass' firm furnished the county with election return envelopes including those presumably used at the Weslaco box, whose returns were not counted. Republicans and independents claimed because the A. Y. Baker Democratic administration feared defeat in the election.

The Baker faction's contention was that the box was discarded because the returns were not sealed as required by law.

Farm Board Head Defends Prices

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27.—Referring to complaints by grain dealers on the farm board's policies on grain buying, Chairman Alexander Legge, of the federal farm board, said today that the recently formed wheat stabilization corporation "is still in the ring, and does not hesitate to face the fireworks."

Legge said the chief purpose of operations in wheat directed by the board was to get the farmers the best possible price.

Highway Patrol To Aid Motorists

AUSTIN, Feb. 27.—The new highway patrol, soon to take to the road on shining new motorcycles, will not be the hard-boiled sort. While their principal business will be enforcement of the highway laws, they have been trained to give another kind of service as well. L. G. Phares of the State Highway Department said:

When they encounter a woman motorist with a flat tire, they will assist in its repair. When they come across a poor fellow stranded because he neglected to fill his gasoline tank before he started out they will carry a message for him to the nearest filling station.

The men will be well up on geography in their respective beats and chock-full of all kinds of information as to road conditions, so that when a traveler wants to ask a few questions they can be answered accurately, fully and courteously.

These new officers of the law may prove to be real "knights of the road."

ROAD CONSTRUCTION WILL SOON START AT ODESSA

ODESSA, Feb. 27.—The Potash Highway for which Ector county recently voted a \$200,000 road bond issue, will be under construction soon. This highway which already is paved from McCamey to Upton county through Crane to Odessa is now being paved from Odessa north to Andrews, connecting up with highway No. 53 at Brownfield.

Would Place Liquor in "Good Citizens' Hands"

Road Contractors Closing Gap Today

The L. E. Whitman Construction Company was pushing ahead as fast as possible on highway No. 30 Thursday and expected to close the gap in the concrete between Rowena and Ballinger by night. Good progress has been made since Monday morning and the one mile of remaining unfinished road between the two towns had narrowed down Thursday at noon to a very short distance. State Highway Engineer G. M. Garrett stated at noon Thursday that if no interference happened the work would be completed before night.

With rain predicted for all of Texas Friday the road is being completed at an ideal time. Rain would help the newly laid concrete and would not particularly handicap the contractors in moving their plant to a point near Miles and getting ready to start work on the other end of the road.

The stretch between Ballinger and Rowena will remain covered for about twenty days before it will be opened for public travel. Mr. Garrett was of the opinion Thursday that the road would be open by March 16th.

This first stretch will complete more than half the road from Ballinger to the Runnels-Tom Green county line and where it will connect with the concrete leading to San Angelo. As soon as the machinery and material plant can be moved work will begin at a point one and one-half miles west of Rowena and will be rushed as fast as possible from that point west. Bridge work and grading has been completed and no delay will be experienced on that account.

Electro-Magnet Aids Immunity to Disease

(By Associated Press)
DETROIT, Feb. 27.—An electrical treatment which gives to plants and animals protection from disease is described to the American Association for the Advancement of Science by Dr. R. A. Muttikowski, professor of biology at Detroit university.

Living things are exposed to magnetism created by electric currents. The important point in the Detroit experiments, Dr. Muttikowski reports, is interruption of this magnetic influence during part of each second, so living cells get a rest.

Other scientists have shown that uninterrupted exposure of simple forms of life to similar electrical seems to make them live more rapidly, yet their death comes more quickly.

To avoid death, Dr. Muttikowski gives this rest period. With paramnesia, single-cell animals, those that lived in the magnetic field for a time were able to survive experience that killed ordinary paramnesia. Under the treatment, pea and bean seeds also developed powers of resistance to molds that totally destroy untreated seed.

POLICE HOLD PORCUPINE FOR DISTURBING PEACE

LUBBOCK, Feb. 27.—Because he frightened residents in the south part of town and otherwise disturbed the peace and dignity of the city an unknown, grizzly vagabond is being held prisoner in the city jail. The prisoner is somebody's porcupine but no one knows whose.

City Policeman H. B. Brown, and L. A. Burdant, city hall janitor, arrested the vagrant and Mr. Burdant has sent out a distress signal. "I don't know what to feed it," he said, "and for that reason I wish the owner would call at once."

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27.—Repeal of the eighteenth amendment and establishment of state control commissions composed of Anti-Saloon League members, ministers and "our best citizens," was suggested today at the House judiciary committee's prohibition hearing by Pierre S. du Pont, Delaware capitalist, as a means of putting control of liquor "in good hands" rather than in the hands of criminals.

Du Pont expressed doubt that the dry statute had added to the nation's prosperity, and said the only solution to the liquor problem lay in the best people of the country directing attention to it.

Independent Oil Men at Austin

AUSTIN, Feb. 27.—A special train brought several hundred independent oil men and royalty owners from West and North Texas here today to petition Governor Moody for legislation to protect their interests.

Tom Cranfill, president of the Texas Independent Petroleum Association, organized in Fort Worth Saturday, complained that the big fellows in the oil game were about to smother the little fellows.

Independent oil men are asking the following legislation in their appeal to Governor Moody:

"A bill to oblige pipe line companies to take the oil ratably from all producers and not to discriminate against any particular producer or royalty owner."

"A bill defining the meaning of 'common carrier,' so a pipe line company cannot evade its responsibility to carry oil for all producers at a reasonable charge, the same as a railroad."

"A bill to provide that matters pertaining to pipe line questions be handled in the county in which the complaint is made instead of at Austin, which makes litigation very expensive."

"A bill providing for adequate storage and pipe line facilities and obliging the pipe line companies to furnish certificates showing the oil that has been run into their pipe lines by the producer, similar to the laws that have existed in other states for years."

"A bill providing that matters between the producer and the pipe line companies and oil purchasers be passed on by the state railroad commission so full justice can be done the producer as well as the pipe line company."

Crop "Adjustment" Likely to Become Chief Farm Issue

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27.—A question as big as farm relief seems to have been given American agriculture in the federal farm board's crop adjustment campaign.

Set up by the agricultural marketing act, which congress passed for the express purpose of solving the problems of surplus production, the farm board has passed the responsibility on to the individual farmer by asking him to raise crops only in the amounts for which it sees a demand. A start has been made in cotton and wheat.

Under the direction of the new \$30,000,000 American Cotton Cooperative Association, a committee of its directors has been authorized to weld all state, federal and local informational agencies into a national effort to slash 6,000,000 acres from the annual cotton acreage.

It has been running approximately 16,000,000 acres. Economists believe it should be kept under 10,000,000 acres. The farm board advised farmers not to plant this year on land that had been producing less than one-third of a bale to the acre. In some regions it has required as much as four or five acres to make a bale.

Attempts to reduce wheat acreage have been less spectacular, less organized and far less definite. Present winter wheat acreage is believed to have been increased about 2 per cent above normal and Chairman Legge has indicated that a statement on spring wheat might be issued soon urging a sufficient reduction to offset at least the winter wheat increase.

The board says the country is producing about 20 per cent more wheat than used in domestic trade, which makes it necessary for the 30 per cent to be sold on the basis of the world's price. It predicts that if farmers will cut wheat acreage 20 per cent they can sell production of reduced acreage for more money than they get from larger acreage and production.

HUNTSVILLE, TEXAS IS ONE HUNDRED YEARS OLD

HUNTSVILLE, Feb. 27.—Huntsville, home of the state penitentiary and the Sam Houston State Teachers College is now in the one hundredth year of its existence.

In 1831 Pleasant Gray, with his wife, left their home in Huntsville, Ala., and pushed westward. While traversing what is now Texas, then belonging to Mexico, he became favorably impressed with the transients of the Bedonkosh and neighboring tribes. He immediately decided to remain among the Indians and trade with them.

Gray's next step was to find a suitable location for his post. Just 75 miles north of Houston, in what is now Walker county, Gray established his trading post, calling it Huntsville for his native town. The former trading post now boasts of a population of more than 6,000.

Huntsville is widely known as the former home of Gen. Sam Houston, hero of Texas Independence. General Houston's old home and grounds are maintained by the state as a shrine.

AMSTERDAM, Feb. 27.—Juliana, 20-year-old heiress to the throne of Holland, is to make a royal voyage to the Dutch East Indies soon after her next birthday, April 30.

She has completed her education at the University at Leyden and has left Katwyk, little seashore resort near Leyden where she lived with three other students.

Her impending engagement to Prince Wilhelm of Erblich-Schoenberg, has been reported by the usually well-informed Telegraaf. The prince, 25 years old, comes from an old German family, as did Princess Juliana's father. He has been visiting the royal family at The Hague.

Juliana, only child of Queen Wilhelmina, has had a very simple life. She is serious minded and like her parents, has little time for frivolities. For the vanities of dress she has a sublime disregard.

Juliana is the first member of the House of Orange to indulge in tennis.

Dutch law requires the heir to the throne shall have her own palace and court, and Juliana maintained her own household since she was 18. On that occasion one of her birthday presents was a fully equipped palace.

Princess Juliana became a student at Leyden when 18 and has just passed her final law examination.

Her career at Leyden has been that of an ordinary student under the assumed name of "Freule van Buren." But she put into it an extraordinary degree of ability and energy. Read—studying law, philosophy and theology, with lectures on such diverse subjects as Chinese history and Russian literature, she was a keen member of the club for women students and not only wrote a prize poem but produced her own play, "Blue Beard."

New Game Laws To Aid Wild Life

AUSTIN, Feb. 27.—That conservation of wild animal life in Texas is rapidly coming to the fore is seen in the passage by both houses and the approval by Gov. Dan Moody of two bills introduced at the last session of the legislature. One of the bills limited the number of wild ducks that might be killed and the other regulated the killing of wild turkeys in the third, fifth and fourteenth senatorial districts.

The first measure limited the number of wild ducks that might be killed to 15 per day whereas the old law permitted the killing of 25 per day. It also set a limit of 30 on the number of wild ducks a person might have in his possession at one time and likewise limited the possession of wild geese to eight.

No change was made in the number of geese that could be taken in one day, the limit remaining at four.

The changes in the state law were made in order that there would be no conflict with the federal regulations and that there might be further conservation. Before the enactment of the law a hunter could have 50 ducks in his possession at one time.

Hunters of wild turkey in the

third, fifth and fourteenth senatorial districts were limited to three in one season and their activities were confined to March and April. While the recently approved legislation is applicable only to these three districts, it was seen as the first step in enacting a general law to regulate the hunting of the fast disappearing "turk."

Another bill approved by the governor affected the trawling for shrimp for use as bait. A previous measure prevented the trawling for this species for any purpose and the bill was sponsored with the view of permitting the use of small seines for bait catching purposes only. The size of the seines was limited to 20 feet and persons using a larger net were subjected to a fine of \$100 if found guilty.
