THE changed condition of things in this country has come about thru copious rains falling over most of Martin county. Where a short few weeks ago the farmers were faces so long their chins touched the ground and would have hardly risked a thin dime on a bet they would pull through crops of any kind, they are now smiling and speaking in terms of a flattering prospects for very good crops. They are planting every spare acre to some sort of a forage crop as well as planting small plots of ground to fall gardens. As a rule it is the fall garden in this area that can be depended upon for providing considerable food for the family to be conserved through canning.

Then too, the changed condition has brought about an air of confidence to the people to the extent the local merchants have been enjoying an increase in business. Prospects for good crops has loosened the purse strings, allowing shiekles to trek into cash registers in payment for needy articles.

That gloomy look on the ranchmen's faces has faded out. Rains have filled the range tanks with water and sent moisture to the roots reviving life and a hasty growth of grass and weeds, supplying food for stock that was getting dangerously near the starving point.

SEPTEMBER will be Safety Month in 39 states and the District of Columbia. By executive proclamation, an effort will be made to arouse public interest in one of the most pressing problems of the day—the conservation of human life.

Special emphasis will be placed on motor driving, and, judging by statistics, there was never greater need for it. Unless there is a marked improvement in the highway accident record during the very worst months of the year—September, October and November—the number of automobile deaths and injuries of 1934 may break all records. According to late reports, the number of fatalities for June was 14 per cent greater than in 1933, and the average increase for the first six months of the year is now about 20 per cent.

If this trend continues, deaths for the year will number nearly 35,000, or more than for the worst year on record, 1931, which had 33,000.

The task facing us this year is much greater, and the duty of citizens, drivers and pedestrians more pressing than ever before. The state executives will call upon the authorities to do all in their power to check accidents. But these authorities need help and cooperation. It will therefore be the duty and obligation of individuals to exercise greater care.

Each year the proclamations have had a salutary effect on the driving record. In 1933, it was estimated that the month of September saw a reduction of 200 fatalities from the corresponding period of the previous year. If the work this year accomplishes a similar result, it will be eminently worth while.

ASIDE from the fact that thereby so useful an institution as the newspaper would be forced into the discard, it would be a great advantage if writers for the press could flash their thoughts into men's minds so soon as the day is over.

That is more than twice the number of soldiers engaged on both sides in the Revolutionary War or in the Spanish-American War. Such cities as Baltimore, Boston and Pittsburgh would be almost depopulated if their inhabitants had to leave home and carry on the strike. Fourteen states of the Union cannot boast of eight hundred thousand within their borders. Not much can be said at this time as to the probable results of the walk-out but it is here and is noted almost as widely as the falling of the autumn leaves.

BULL SOLD TO FEDERAL AGENTS GOES ON SPREE AFTER BEING PENNED UP

A high bred Hereford bull, sold by Lay Powell to government agents the other day, went on a rampage after finding himself denied freedom of the open range. In a short time after being placed in pens at the Texas and Pacific cattle loading yards east of town, the animal charged and killed two cows before cowboys could lasso the infuriated beast and bring his war inspired ambition under control.

"That bull actually threw those cows eight feet into the air and would catch them on his horns as they came down," Powell said the next day in giving version of the attack. "He has been mean all his life and seemed to have become enraged when placed in the pens."

The bull would offer fight when one approached the pen in which he was confined. He would attack paper or any other object thrown into the enclosure. He made deep dents in timbers of the enclosure with his horns when charging the fence in an attempt to obtain his freedom.

It would have been suicide for a person to have entered the pen with the bull, Powell stated. "would kill anything, man or beast, and would not require much time in which to complete the job."—Colorado Record

MEAT CANNING DURING HOT WEATHER

Beef and pork should be canned between November 1 and March 1, when the weather is cool. Summer meat canning is an emergency measure and not an approved practice.

Storage

The carcasses should be washed with cold water and wiped dry with a cloth before being taken to the cold storage plant. The minimum period of cold storage for an animal of 500 pounds live weight is 18 hours when the temperature is 34 to 38 degrees Fahrenheit. The carcasses should be allowed to remain in storage two or three days for ripening. If the temperature of the storage plant is below freezing the meat should remain more than 12 hours. Remove one quarter at a time. Cut and can it. If space permits at the storage plant, it is better to cut the meat there.

Meat that is warmer than 65 degrees should not be canned. The inside of the round or thickest piece of the meat is the place for taking the temperature.

Speed in handling after the meat is removed from storage is of great importance, as it deteriorates rapidly. Meat is pre-cooked for the following reasons:

1. Helps to set color
2. Shrinks product
3. Drives the air out of the meat itself.
4. Helps exhaust.

Exhausted

Cans are exhausted by removing all air before sealing. This may be done by placing the open cans in the pressure cooker until the content is hot through and steam evolves. Reasons for exhausting are:

1. Removes the air from the can to produce a vacuum.
2. Prevents undue strain on the can during processing.
3. Prevents overfilling of cans.
4. Removes undesirable odors.
5. Kills some bacteria, (those that grow in air).

Again a thermometer. The content of the center of the can should register a temperature of not less than 170 degrees and preferably 180 degrees F. Cans are ready for sealing immediately and processing.

Cooling

If cans cannot be cooled to 105 degree immediately ice should be used to hasten cooling. To test for coolness open a can at intervals and take the temperature in the center of the can. One hundred five degrees F. is the maximum and not the minimum temperature. Lower is desirable. To finish cooling, stack the cans so that the air can circulate around them.

Storage

Cans should be labeled for identification, second for protection, and third for appearance.

The storage place should be cool and dry. Cans should be stacked so that the air can circulate for cooling.

Spoilage

Thermophilic bacteria develops at 120 degrees F. to 130 degrees F. and causes meat spoilage. The development of these bacteria may be after two or three months or cans may keep all winter and spoil in the summer. Bacteria botulinus is another cause of meat spoilage but is rare. Hang a thermometer in the storage room and observe temperatures.

Preparation Condemned Meat

The following questions have been asked of the use of meat from condemned cattle in relief areas. The answers apply to those animals fit for human consumption but unfit for shipping:

Q. Can the farmer can condemned animals in his home?

A. Yes.

Q. Can a farmer sell any of these cans?

A. No.

Q. Can a farmer give them to his tenants?

A. Yes.

Q. Can a farmer carry meat of condemned animals to storage plant and take some from cold storage as needed for his and tenants families?

A. Yes.

Q. Can condemned animals be canned in communities canning?

A. The Texas Relief Commission says, "No!"

Q. Can a farmer give fresh meat from condemned animals to his tenants?

A. No.

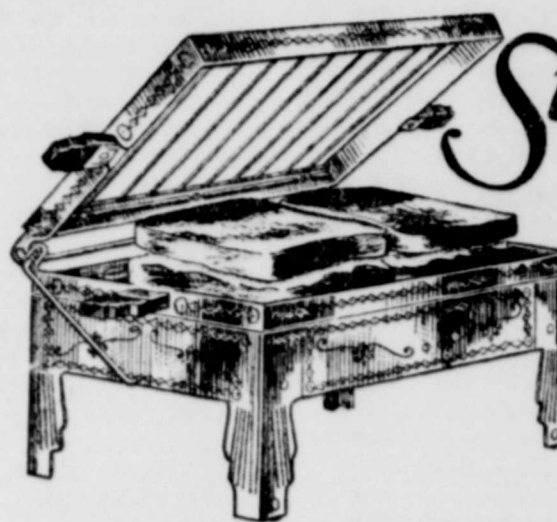

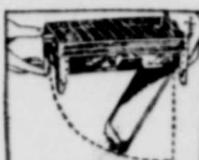

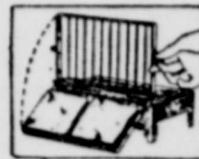

PROTECT NATION'S CHILDREN

Education has been called the nation's biggest business. More than 25,000,000 pupils attend American schools, ranging in size from little one-room shacks in distant countryside, to the magnificent structures in our major cities.

As the National Board of Fire Underwriters points out, the nation owes these children a great responsibility—that of providing them with maximum protection from fire. The tragic records of the past show how badly we have failed in discharging that duty. The history of every state contains black pages which recount school fires resulting in deaths of helpless children. In some disasters as many as 200 children have perished—needlessly.

Past surveys have demonstrated that the average school is literally a fire-trap—and some of the newest and most expensive schools are as dangerous in this respect as those built twenty

years ago. Improper doors, faulty construction, inadequate exits, carelessness in the storing of inflammable supplies—here are menaces to life that exist in thousands of school buildings, unknown to the parents who send their children to them.

The National Board is considering a survey of schools throughout the United States, as a preparation for a general report on school properties, construction and equipment. If that survey is made, it will produce valuable news data—data which should be immediately acted upon in the interest of protecting invaluable lives.
