

Turkey-Day Trot In Texas Looms Bigger Than Ever

Texas is learning to talk turkey with an industry which may well gross several million dollars a year besides making an ordinary meal as good as Thanksgiving, that is, with the development of the broad breasted bronze turkey.

Once growing wild in the state and rounded up only at holiday time to sell for 50 or 75 cents, the turkey has literally come into its own in the day of inflationary prices—scientific breeding and care has produced a bird to sell for \$6 on the market, \$10 for a good egg for breeding.

Natives of the state have been overlooking the value of the Texas-grown bird for market, pedigree, and delicacy, but eastern buyers have not. Once the native bird was marked inferior to northern quality, and more than one raiser will admit he was required to leave the fan feathers on the wing of the dressed turkey to prove the dealer was not getting a buzzard.

Now, however, northerners, with an early growing season, are cleaning the state for good breeders. The broad breasted bronze hen is said to average 50 pounds a year, whereas the other varieties average only 50 eggs, not all of which may hatch.

In fact, science has done much to improve the breed—it has moved the legs closer to the front, smoothed out the V in the chest and taken away some of their overly-developed front to give

them balance and poise. The ROP (Record of Production) Turkey Breeders association is credited with much of the progress of the Texas turkey in becoming as civilized as those eastern birds. It is this organization which points out that the birds,

Soviets Outline Proposed Setup

MOSCOW, Nov. 1 (AP)—The Soviet news agency Tass said today in a dispatch from Washington that the Soviet Union favors a control council for Japan made up of Russian, American, Chinese and British representatives, with an American as permanent chairman.

(In Washington President Truman said yesterday he had received a satisfactory reply from Generalissimo Stalin to his recent letter on the current diplomatic difficulties. The president said that on the basis of the reply he expected Russia to join the Far Eastern advisory commission soon.)

The Tass dispatch said that in the interest of clarity it should be pointed out that the Soviet Union is not taking part "at present" in the Far Eastern advisory commission.

"The Soviet government feels that the question of the advisory commission should be solved in connection with the formation of a control organ for Japan which would consist of representatives of the four powers under the chairmanship of the United States representative."

The Soviet Union has not stated at any time it would not participate in the commission. Acceptance of an American as chairman of the proposed control council was believed in informed diplomatic circles here to remove the last obstacle toward a meeting of minds among the four powers on the subject of Japan.

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Brazilian Civil Liberties Upheld

RIO DE JANEIRO, Nov. 1 (AP)—Brazilians were told today the civil liberties of all citizens would be guaranteed without political or religious discrimination as the government which supplanted the 15-year regime of Getulio Vargas paved the way for national elections on Dec. 2.

The cabinet of President Jose Linhares, emerging from its first meeting, announced adoption of a resolution that its first duty would be to prepare the nation for the election of a president.

The new justice minister, Sam-

palo Doria, commenting on rumors that communists were being rounded up, asserted that under the present government "no person can be arrested for being a communist or an atheist."

At the same time the new police chief, Riberio Da Costa, issued a message to the public which said: "As a jurist I will guarantee the liberty of all citizens without distinction as to their political, religious or moral attitudes, fixing as a limit that point where their freedom impairs that of others. There will be no political prisoners."

The Nation Today—
Only One Important Change Made
In Truman's Wage-Price Policy

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1 (AP) — President Truman's latest talk on wages and prices is—except for one very important change—hardly more than a restatement of the wage-price policy he laid down last August.

It was then—generally—and still is just this:

No wage increases, if they mean price increases, without government permission. And the government is going to allow very few price increases.

Business should go ahead and raise wages. If it can show at the end of the six months that it has been unable—because of the wage boost—to make a fair profit, the government will consider allowing it to increase prices.

Business will certainly look at this proposal very closely before taking the president at his word. There are points to consider. Here are some of them:

OPA's power under the law to control prices ends next June 30, eight full months from now. OPA Boss Chester Bowles said price controls will have to be authorized beyond that time in order to prevent inflated prices.

Maybe congress will extend them when June 30 comes. But maybe congress will just let OPA die.

When they ask for a price increase, if congress refuses to re-new price control, all OPA price controls will die automatically on June 30.

So then the makers won't have to ask government permission at all to raise prices. They can raise to suit themselves. But will they

want to? Competition between the makers by that time—when production and sales are in full swing—may be pretty keen. The individual maker may be reluctant to raise prices then. It would give an advantage to his competitor if the latter didn't raise prices.

But here's a side presented by one of the smartest government economists:

If price controls remain after June 30, then the president's plan is insurance to industry against a profit loss from raising wages, because it can expect to be allowed to increase prices.

Actually, this plan of the president might be a very quiet way of getting over the hump of the whole labor-industry wage problem in the next few months which are critical months for reconversion.

If industry widely accepted the president's plan, much of the current labor unrest over wage demands would be ironed out, at least for six months.

No Longer Fugitive

Robert Burns In Georgia To Seek Pardon For Crime

ATLANTA, Nov. 1 (AP)—Scholarly, bespectacled Robert Elliott Burns, the man who wrote "I Am a Fugitive from a Georgia Chain-Gang," is no longer a fugitive.

He came back to Georgia today to accept one of two fates—a commutation of sentence and restoration of his civil rights or another stretch—his third—in custody of the law. He presented himself at Governor Ellis Arnall's office.

Previous Georgia governors have refused to ask clemency for the fugitive who "made good," but today he is to be represented by Gov. Arnall as counsel.

Arnall—whose prison reform program has wiped out the chain-gang system depicted in Burns' book—said he would ask the state board of pardons and paroles to

free Burns. Burns has served only a fraction of his six to ten year sentence. He first escaped after serving less than two months. Seven years later he turned up as a \$20,000 a year magazine editor in Chicago.

Many prominent persons and organizations backed his cause and he returned voluntarily to Georgia. The prison commission refused him a pardon or parole.

Back on the chain-gang, he escaped the next year—just walked off. He found refuge in New Jersey, where three successive governors have refused to grant extradition.

He's now head of a tax investigating company, and takes a prominent part in civic affairs. He's married and is the father of three children.

Burns' book, "I Am a Fugitive from a Georgia Chain-Gang," created wide controversy in Georgia. A libel suit was instituted as the result of the movie by the prison commission director.

Early in his administration, Arnall had an interview with the

fugitive in New York. He came back and asked the state board of pardons and paroles to pardon him.

The board said it couldn't act, because Burns was still a fugitive. It said, too, it couldn't grant a pardon—because Burns admits his crime.

The return to Georgia, however, makes it possible for the board to wipe out the remainder of the sentence. Commutation of sentence to present service and restoration of civil rights is equivalent to a pardon.

Public Ownership Of Communications Planned In Britain

LONDON, Nov. 1 (AP)—Chancellor of the Exchequer Hugh Dalton said in Commons today the Labor government had decided to press for public ownership of Telecommunications Services now operated by Cable and Wireless, Ltd.

Dalton said legislation for that purpose would be introduced "in due course."

The announcement came as the first official notice that the government was planning to extend its nationalization program beyond that announced in its campaign platform.

The platform called for public ownership of the Bank of England, inland transportation, public utilities and heavy industry.

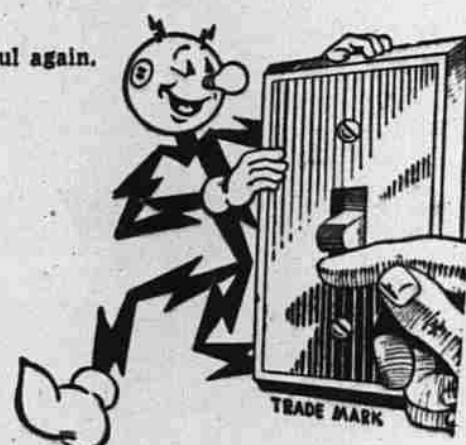

Jap Repatriates To Return Home

NEWELL, Calif., Oct. 30 (AP)—
Return to Japan of voluntary
and involuntary Japanese repatri-
ates will begin at an early date,
possibly by November 15, officials
of the Immigration Service
announced today.

Ivan Williams, officer in charge
and speaking for the Commission-
er of Immigration and Natural-
ization Service, said a detail of
men from the Department of
Justice yesterday began a survey
of the Japanese detained at the
war relocation authority Tulelake
center here.

This survey, Williams said, will
include persons whose applica-
tions for renunciation of their
United States citizenship have
been approved by the Attorney
General, together with members
of their families, whether citizens
or aliens, who may desire to
accompany them, alien residents
who are segregated paroles under
alien enemy proceedings, and
alien residents who are under
orders of deportation under the
immigration laws.

Sheriff Finds It Isn't A Prank TARRANT OFFICER HUGS HOTEL FLOOR HALLOWE'EN AT ROBBERS' COMMAND

FORT WORTH, Nov. 1 (AP)—Sheriff H. W. Rhodes of Tarrant county walked in on what he thought was a Halloween prank here last night but which proved to be a real robbery.

He himself was beaten and robbed after he had walked up to two armed men in the process of robbing the cashier of the Court hotel and demanded:

"What's going on?"

The holdup men fled with between \$1,500 and \$2,000 in cash.

Rhodes described one of the men as about 35 years old, about 5 feet 11 inches tall, slender build and wearing a dark brown hat, a dark coat and light pants, and the other as about 5 feet 7 inches tall, about 40 and wearing blue overalls.

"My wife and I had been at the county jail until 11 p. m., and were enroute home when we found the street blocked at 6th street," the sheriff related. "I parked the car and told my wife I was going to take a look at the Halloween crowd on Main."

"As I was walking toward Main, I went into the lobby of the Court hotel and a man standing by the clerk's cage came up with two pistols. I asked them what was going on—I thought it was a joke. One of the men cursed me and told me

to raise my hands and lie face down on the floor beside the room clerk. As I was going down, one of the men kicked me under the heart.

"One of the robbers told me he was going to kill me and would have if he had discovered I was an officer."

Dr. Gage Williams, who resides at the hotel, also stumbled onto the robbery and was told to lie down beside the sheriff. The holdup men took Dr. Williams' wrist watch and billfold and the sheriff's Masonic ring and billfold containing about \$12 in cash.

The men then asked the clerk, W. G. Bateman, where the safe was and took the money. As they started to leave, one of the robbers told the sheriff he had decided to kill him and hit him behind the left ear with a blackjack.

"I was afraid they would discover my gun and badge so I crowded as close to Bateman as I could," he said. "They were calm as they backed out of the lobby into the street and told us if we got up before five minutes, they would kill us. We waited a reasonable length of time until the negro porter, who also was lying on the floor, told us they were gone."

A description of the pair was immediately broadcast by local and state police.

TORONTO, Nov. 1 (AP)—Hallowe'en celebrations in Toronto's east end turned into rioting last night and a youthful mob which officers estimated at 7,000 stormed a police station in a vain attempt to free 13 persons arrested for an earlier disturbance.

Mounted and foot police and hose-wielding firemen repulsed the rush. Five firemen and two police officers were injured. Two youths required hospital attention for head cuts.

Radioactive Mystery Scientists Puzzle Over Cardboard's Unusual Behavior

BOSTON, Nov. 1 (AP)—Scientists in many parts of the country are trying to learn why cardboard made from straw cut in Illinois 23 days after the atomic bomb test at Los Alamos, N. M., is strongly radioactive, according to Dr. Robley D. Evans, Massachusetts Institute of Technology physicist.

Tests of the strawboard delivered to the Eastman Kodak Company at Rochester, N. Y., Dr. Evans said in an interview, showed that it was so intensely radioactive that it would have ruined and film packed in it.

The mystery, Dr. Evans explained, is: Whence did the radio-active elements come?

Dr. Evans, who is director of the M.I.T. Radioactive Laboratories, said that he and other physicists had not reached a final solution but were considering two possibilities.

One is that the explosion of the atomic bomb at Los Alamos may have been responsible. Scientists are trying to determine whether active ingredients of the bomb, which were not "smashed," were carried to great altitudes, caught in prevailing winds and borne eastward to be deposited by rain on the fields of southern Illinois.

The second possibility, Dr. Evans explained, is that the cardboard was contaminated with radioactive elements from some other source such as water of the Wabash river.
