THANKSGIVING CELEBRATED QUIETLY HERE

People of Cisco celebrated Thanksgiving quietly yesterday. For the most part they ate their turkey and cranberries and remained at home, preferring their own homes and rest to braving the wet and chilly weather outside.

A cold, driving rain which later changed to a slow drizzle cut the attendance at the Union Thanksgiving dinner at 7 o'clock yesterday morning at the First Baptist church. The scheduled football game between the Cisco Lobos and the Abilene Eagles was postponed on account of the rain also.

With business houses closed for the holiday and most of the people staying indoors rather than driving on slippery roads, there was little traffic on city streets or state highways.

Police headquarters this morning reported a very quiet day, without a great number of celebrators of the disturbing sort, taking their day too seriously.

TRAGEDY DOGS FOOTSTEPS OF SIAMESE KING

LONDON, Nov. 30 — Tragic coincidence has dogged the footsteps of the king and queen of Siam. Every day they have made recently has been spoiled by death or assassination.

The story is told by M. Smaksman, a young confidential secretary of the king.

The king and queen had planned to visit King Albert of Belgium, said Smaksman. "He was killed."

"But we were to go to Holland on the next day. As soon as the king and queen were informed of the death of King Albert, they decided to go to Holland. Arrangements were made. Once more we had to be abandoned. The king's consort was dead."

"All this happened during the same year. We believe there is something unlucky for royal personages in this present time."

Smaksman then talked about the king's offer to abdicate in favor of his son, Prince Bhumibol, because of the government's alleged efforts to take away his power of life and death.

"It was the wish of the people of Siam that the king should not have the power of life and death. I know he would grant it," said Smaksman. "It is not their wish. It is the wish of unscrupulous statesmen."

Coldest Weather Settles Down Over Texas

SUB-FREEZING FORECAST FOR NORTH TEXAS

Coldest weather of the winter settled on the state today as the storm that brought rain and sleet to most of the state Thanksgiving today pulled northeastward over the middle-west.

Freezing temperatures were recorded by points in all of north Texas and extending southward as far as Del Rio.

In Amarillo and the Panhandle the mercury dropped to 24. At Abilene the minimum temperature was 32° and at El Paso the 28° mark was reached.

The southwestern part of the state barely escaped freezing. Del Rio reported a low of 34. Warmest place in the state was Brownsville where 50 was recorded. There was a light frost at San Antonio.

Fair skies for today and tonight was predicted by the weather bureau in the official forecast.

Tonight, the weather bureau warned frost and near freezing temperatures will extend nearly to the coast, while the north half of the state generally will experience sub-freezing temperatures.

The eastern half of Oklahoma, southern Kansas, most of Missouri, and part Illinois, were reported under a light blanket of snow today. Temperatures were reported around 30.

STORMS TAKE HUGE TOLL IN SOUTH STATES

NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 30 — Freakish winds which attained cyclonic proportions in some places twisted across Mississippi and Louisiana last night, blew down frame houses, smashed windows, disrupted communication lines, and left a known casualty list of at least 22 persons.

Widespread damage was caused near New Orleans, Miss., where 18 persons were injured by falling debris. Five were negroes.

Twisting across the state into Louisiana, the wind blew down communications, disrupted traffic, and destroyed homes near West. Baton Rouge, where six negroes were injured. None of those reported injured were in critical condition.

THREE DEAD IN PHILIPPINE TYPHOON
MANILA, Nov. 30 — Three deaths and a huge property loss were reported today in a typhoon which ripped through a section of the Philippine Islands. An estimated 15,000 homes were destroyed. At least seven provinces felt the force of the typhoon.

Connecticut Kidnapers Trapped and Beaten



Sprawled on the floor, thoroughly beaten, these three kidnapers learned how Connecticut treats would-be abductors. Police, tipped off by the kidnapping of Robert Westheim, 12, was planned, were hidden in the home of his father, Gustave Westheim, wealthy steamship broker, of Darien, when the thugs entered. In the battle that ensued, Joseph Gord left, was slugged with a gun but shown broken near his head; and John Collins, right, and Edgar LaRose, center, were overpowered when they tried to shoot their way out. Three other suspects were captured later.

BABES IN WOOD DEATH BLAMED ON FAMILY BAN

ROSEVILLE, Calif., Nov. 30 — Family protests to a love affair settled Elma Noakes, 32, and his 18-year-old niece, Winifred Pierce on a long flight which apparently ended in the strange "babes in the woods" tragedy in Pennsylvania, it was learned today.

In the background of the tragedy was a story of poverty which had exhausted the resources of the couple and which in the opinion of Roseville residents, formed the most likely motive for the death of the elopers and of Noakes's three children.

For none had the slightest doubt that the bodies of two adults found near Dunsmuir were those of Noakes and his niece, and those of three children found 100 miles away were those of the Noakes children. Norma, 12; Deville, 10; and Cordelia, 8.

They left here secretly Nov. 11. None knew where they had gone. In Pennsylvania and California authorities identified the Pierce girl through a club-footed left leg and Noakes through other means and linked them with the bodies of the three little girls.

Former Texan Now Illinois Lawmaker
AUSTIN, Nov. 30 — Dr. Thomas V. Smith, graduate of the University of Texas and former professor of philosophy at the University of Chicago, was recently elected on the democratic ticket to the state legislature of Illinois. Mr. Smith received his bachelor of arts degree from the University in 1915 and his master of arts degree in 1916. He has combined his career in the field of philosophy with a second in the realm of literature, serving as editor of the International Journal of Ethics. He has written several books which have been published by the University of Chicago Press, including "The Democratic Way of Life," "The American Philosophy of Equalization," "Beyond Conscience," "Creative Skepticism," and "Philosophers Speak for Themselves."

HUNT WAS COSTLY
BUZZARDS BAY, Mass., Nov. 30 — Henry P. Curry and Benjamin H. Crowell, unsuccessful hunters, were forced to pay, as well as a fine in court, for the lost hat and glasses of the game warden who chased them.

CHICAGO CONVENTION HOST
CHICAGO, Nov. 30 — During the last 30 years Chicago has been host to 17,119 conventions, with an aggregate attendance of 18,238,293 delegates, according to the Chicago Association of Commerce.

Alamo Honored By Jap's Poem In Chinese

SAN ANTONIO, Nov. 30 — A granite shaft erected here 20 years ago by the Japan Geographical society commemorating a remarkable similarity between a famous Japanese battle and the historic Alamo, is the object of universal comment by tourists who visit this city.

The marker is erected on the site of the famous battle where nearly a century ago, Santa Anna's troops fought the loyal defenders to finally capture the Alamo.

The shaft is itself a piece of the huge granite stones which once formed the great Nogashino castle which was located on the plains half way between the modern cities of Nagoya and Shizuoka, the tea center of Japan. What the Alamo is to Texas, the great castle is to Japan.

The inscription on the monument is, strangely enough, in Chinese. It is a long poem written by Prof. Shigetaka Shiga of Tokyo, Japan, commemorating the stand of the famed "One hundred and fifty" against the 5,000 of Santa Anna's army.

GEN. CARDENAS IS PRESIDENT OF MEXICANS
MEXICO, Nov. 30 — Gen. Lazaro Cardenas today took over the task of guiding Mexico through its six year program of reconstruction.

Cardenas took the oath as constitutional president before a crowd of 70,000 who packed the national stadium for the inaugural.

Pheasants and workers from all parts of the country joined in a joyful celebration of his assumption of office.

SHAKEUP SEEN IN RELIEF FOR JOBLESS MEN

WARM SPRINGS, Ga., Nov. 30 — President Roosevelt today began a series of conferences with administration officials, from which may emerge drastic changes in federal unemployment relief distribution.

The chief executive met first with James Moffett, federal housing administrator. Coming here for conferences over the week-end were Harold Ickes, secretary of the Interior; Harry Hopkins, federal emergency relief administrator. Sec'y of the Treasury Henry Morgenthau, Jr., and Frank Walker, former director of the national emergency council.

Hopkins wants to substitute a work relief program of large proportions to get away from the dole system of aiding the unemployed. The size of his contemplated program has been reported as approximately \$8,000,000,000. It also was reported that his plan contemplated large extensions of subsistence farming projects and a major stimulus of home construction through federal housing financing.

University to Hear Famed Irish Poet
AUSTIN, Nov. 30 — James Stephens, Irish poet, playwright, and novelist, will lecture at the University of Texas Friday, December 7. Mr. Stephens was born in Dublin county, Ireland, in February, 1882. During his early life he was very poor, wandering all over Ireland and doing odd jobs. He later learned typewriting and shorthand and obtained a job as a solicitor's clerk in Dublin. In his leisure time he wrote verse and fiction, contributing to the Sinn Fein and the Irish Review. His first book, "Insurrections," was published in 1909. It soon attracted attention, and returns from it enabled him to devote more of his time to literature. Since then, he has published twelve works, his latest being a volume of poems in 1931. Mr. Stephens is listed in Who's Who for 1934.

MAY NOT VOTE
CITAWA, Ont., Nov. 30 — Removal of civil servants from the voters' list in order to free them from political influence was suggested here by C. H. Cahan, secretary of State.

ACQUAINTANCE SAID TO HAVE SHOT STUDENT

TULSA, Nov. 30 — John Gorrell, 23, dental college student found dead of bullet wounds in his stalled automobile was slain by someone who knew him well and who shot to kill, police said today after investigating the tragedy.

Fellow students of Gorrell in the Western Dental college, Kansas City were reported to have said Gorrell apparently had cause to fear violent death. He was slain with his own pistol, which had been wiped carefully to remove fingerprints.

Two bullet holes were in the right side of the youth's head when his sedan was found on a lonely driveway. His father, Dr. J. F. Gorrell, surgeon, identified.

MODERN FIBERS HIT HEMP HARD SAYS SOCIETY
WASHINGTON, Nov. 30 — Hard hit by more modern fibers, hemp gradually is losing favor with rope-makers, the National Geographic Society reported.

Once, rope and hemp were synonymous, the society said, but today very little rope is made of hemp. Abaca, a Philippine fiber, has all but replaced hemp in the rope industry.

Abaca, however, mistakenly is spoken of in the cordage trade as "Manila hemp."

Hemp From China
Hemp first was grown in China 2,700 years B. C. Shen Nung, Emperor of China, taught his subjects to grow "ma" (hemp, used for making hempen cloth).

In the 8th century India recognized the hemp plant principally as a source of drugs. Neither Hebrews nor Egyptians were familiar with it. During medieval times, however, it was found in Northern Africa. Migrant civilizations introduced hemp into Europe about 1500 B. C., but the society pointed out, no commercial importance was attached to the European plants until the French imported Chinese hemp centuries later.

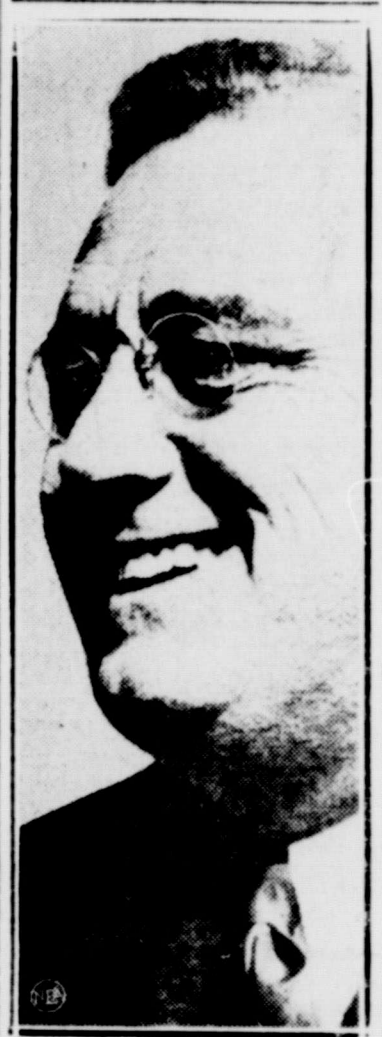
Italian Hemp
Today, the highest-priced hemp in either American or European markets is grown in Italy.

New England and Virginia cultivated hemp in early Colonial days. In 1802, the blue grass region of Kentucky supported two extensive rope-walks (factories for making rope). During the 19th century, Kentucky led the United States in the production of hemp.

Since 1930, however, very little hemp has been grown anywhere in the United States.

More Chickens, Eggs Shipped From Texas
AUSTIN, Nov. 30 — Poultry and egg shipments from Texas are normally light during October, and although this year is no exception, interstate shipments totaling 44 cars were considerably larger than the 29 cars shipped during October last year, according to the University of Texas bureau of business research.

Poultry shipments amounted to 21 cars, against twelve last year, and eggs shipments were 23 and seventeen cars respectively for the two periods.

Eight cars of eggs were shipped into Texas from other states during October. Two from Kansas, three from Missouri, two from Iowa, and one from Nebraska, against eleven cars last year when eight cars came from Kansas, two from Missouri, and one from Nebraska.

NO MOTIVE IS ASSIGNED FOR HER SUICIDE

DENTON, Nov. 30 — The words "suicide from burns" today summed up an official investigation of the strange death of Helen Gardner of Wichita Falls, brilliant 18-year old student at North Texas State Teachers College.

The suicide verdict was returned at an inquest today. Motivation of the act was not disclosed to the public, although the girl, a writer and a student of poetry, left six sealed and addressed letters and a note.

Apparently suffering from melancholia, the girl yesterday spread towels and newspapers soaked in rubbing alcohol over her body and set them on fire. She died 12 hours later in a Denton hospital.

Friends of Miss Gardner destroyed the note and five of the letters. One addressed to her mother, Mrs. W. H. Gardner, was delivered when Mrs. Gardner came here yesterday. The mother did not disclose its contents before leaving for Wichita Falls last night.

FUNERAL FOR W. A. FREE TO BE HELD HERE
Funeral services for W. A. Free, 68, were to be held at Green's funeral home at 4:30 this afternoon, with Rev. E. S. James and Rev. C. S. Moad officiating. Burial was to be in Oakwood cemetery.

Mr. Free died at 8 p. m., Thursday at his home on South D avenue after an illness of six months. He had lived in Cisco for 16 years and had been in this territory for 35 years. He was postmaster at Harpersville near Brenkenridge for six years before coming to Cisco.

Born in Alabama, Nov. 7, 1866, he came to Texas with his parents when he was seven years old. He was a member of the First Baptist church.

Survivors are the widow and the following seven children: Mrs. Eula Jackson, Corn, Okla.; Mrs. Edna Firksey, Seminole, Okla.; Mrs. Ella Holt, Atlanta; E. D. Free, Lubbock; Earl Free, Corn, Okla.; Martin Free, Cisco; and E. P. Free, Dallas.

Increase Seen In Building Permits
AUSTIN, Nov. 30 — A sharp rise occurred in building permits in Texas during October, according to reports from 38 chamber of commerce secretaries throughout the state to the University of Texas bureau of business research. Compared with September, permits of \$2,050,254 represented an increase of 69 per cent, and with October last year an increase of 99 per cent.

Cities showing increases over the two months compared were: Amarillo, Austin, Beaumont, Brownsville, Brownwood, Corsicana, Dallas, Del Rio, Fort Worth, Houston, Jacksonville, Laredo, Longview, Lubbock, Palestine, Paris, Plainview, Port Arthur, San Antonio, Snyder, Sweetwater, Tyler, and Waco.

Although in a number of instances the increase was small as was also the total amount involved, it appears all sections of the state have participated in the forward movement, the bureau's report said.

State Deficit Is Up to 9 Millions
AUSTIN, Nov. 30 — The deficit in state general revenue funds mounted today to \$9,374,213 in the face of money receipts that enabled state Treasurer Charly Loebhart to call in \$581,000 outstanding warrants for payment. This call includes warrants issued June 18 this year. No new call was issued for retirement of Confederate pension warrants.

Pulling Together

Beaumont and Port Arthur, growing progressive cities in the same county, recently illustrated the old adage, about the effectiveness of pulling together. They had been in conflict for years over efforts to bridge the Beaumont ship channel so as to afford Port Arthur a place in direct high-ways but the fight had gone beyond the bridge to the general theory of mutual resistance.

Business leaders, looking in on the impasse of a bridge bill at Austin, said "this is hurting both cities; let's get together."

They got together in an agreement beneficial to both sides, and tremendous resources of civic leadership and of energy were at once harnessed to constructive purposes, and diverted from restrictive and deleterious effect.

Brazos District Fortunate

The Brazos district, which will sponsor a \$30,000,000 to \$50,000,000 program of flood control and power development under an act of the recent legislature, is extremely fortunate in timing its plan for government financing to start its work. Since the Brazos bill became a law, President Roosevelt has officially restated a national policy embracing just such undertakings and developments. President Roosevelt's carefully-worded speech made clear that the Brazos undertaking is strictly within the definition of what he advocates.

This is a new assurance of a friendly hearing when the government is asked to use some of its money earmarked for similar developments on this big Texas project.

Officers of the district are able to prove the state's faith in its future by the law, applying taxes of the counties to securing the government loan.

The president's speech on his TVA trip makes the outlook of the Brazos undertaking exceedingly bright.

About Our Highways

Thomas H. McDonald, chief of the United States bureau of public roads, the man who has the most, of anyone in the nation, to do with building the network of permanent designated highways, paid Texas a substantial compliment while in Texas recently, by crediting the highway commission, in the past eight years, with having carried through the most extensive schedule of road construction of any state in the nation.

Mr. McDonald was not stingy in his praise of the Texas officials who have achieved this result. His word is the highest authority in the matter.

Moonshiners Complain

Harrisburg, Va., sees the strange spectacle of "moonshiners" telling their stories freely to a federal grand jury to indict oppressive "higher ups." These crafty mountain folk, famous for the skill and force with which they eluded revenue officers while engaged in "stillin' cawn," tell the city bootleg ring executives who drew them in as a supply source and virtually made them slaves. A situation, always unique but not exactly new in criminal courts, comes to pass—Those who have outraged the law indignantly call down the law on those who have outraged them.

British-American Naval Accord

London sees British and American delegates abandon hope of reaching an accord with Japan on naval ratios during the current conversations. Britain and America are firmly agreed that there must be no deviation from the present ratio of 5-5-3, while Japan insists on equality in principle and in tonnage, although willing to meet the others on a tonnage limitation. The three-power conversations may be adjourned and resumed after Tokyo denounces the Washington treaty. An undoubted result of the talks is a closer understanding between Washington and London—Observers believe the two will reach an informal accord that will prevent any naval building race between them.

Alliance Talk Troubles Europe

Europe is made more grimly thoughtful by the statement that Russia is pledged to back France if the latter should have war with Germany. Neither the French Government nor the Soviet Government will admit a complete understanding, but the admission by Archimand in the Chamber of Deputies to speed passage of the huge 5,589,000,000 francs defense appropriation merely confirmed Europe's suspicion that an agreement existed. Germany says report of a Franco-Russian military alliance can have only a "poisonous effect on the international atmosphere." Poland is aroused and Paris approves the terms of an extremely conciliatory note to Warsaw, on the proposed Eastern Locarno treaty. Britain is glad official confirmation of any military pact is lacking, but sees a probably regrettable outcome—If Germany believes the story, it will have to make a counter alliance.

UNDER THE DOME AT AUSTIN

AUSTIN, Nov. 30.—Gov. - Elect James V. Alfred isn't saying so, but he does not seem surprised if there is a

paragraph in his first message to the legislature saying: "There seems to be no necessity for continuing a session of the state legislature through the entire 120 days. I think the people appreciate a much shorter session."

The new governor may also point out that the original purpose of a session of 120 days—divided into periods—has been ignored.

Louisiana sessions of less than a week's duration are being commented upon at Austin in contrast with special sessions of the Texas legislature. It seems impossible to end a special session in Texas in less than 30 days.

The question of legislative pay, likely will get no recommendation from the governor. Some members, however, agree with Rep. Elect J. J. Glop of Yukon that the legislature should return to \$5 a day.

Gov. Paul McNutt of Indiana, who will be a guest speaker this week may be addressed as Vice President McNutt soon. He is being mentioned as a likely running mate for President Roosevelt if Vice President John Garner does not choose to run again. Indiana has furnished numerous vice presidents.

John T. Smith of Austin, editor of the Texas Tax Journal, popped right out with an endorsement of the El Paso Herald-Post's proposal that Texas adopt a new constitution in its centennial year. A second thought prompted by a question, put Smith in doubt about its wisdom. The question, asked here frequently, is:

Would a constitutional convention made up of elected delegates be likely to frame a basic law more acceptable to the people than the laws the legislature turns out, and about which they complain?

Delving into past Constitutional conventions reveals some surprising things. It shows that such conventions considered many of the things that have been advocated recently as though they were novel. One constitutional convention increased the governor's salary. Later it was put back to \$4,000 a year and efforts to increase it by amendment have failed. In fact, one convention had before it virtually the same plan for a centralized government with governor-appointed officials, which was advocated by Governors Dan Moody and Jess Sterling. A four year term for officials was also advocated.

Division of Texas was before one of the constitutional conventions for lengthy consideration. Three states were proposed. One would be between the Trinity and the Colorado river, and the other west of the Colorado.

Need of a college thesis led to an investigation by S. S. McKay, who has assembled a record of constitutional conventions and other trends. Later the thesis was found so valuable it was published.

Secession, naturally, was the motive power of the convention of 1861. Those of 1866 and 1869 grew out of defeat of the Confederate arms. The 1895 convention had its stiffest argument over how far it should go in nullifying secession. Abolition of slavery and repudiation of war debts were other leading topics.

The last constitutional convention was in 1875. It was in session 92 days when it was discovered that the \$200,000 appropriated for it had been expended. The 1875 convention was remarkable in having as one of its delegates a delegate to the 1845 convention—H. N. Darnell of Tarrant county. There is no living survivor of the 1875 convention who might sit in a new one.

Six members of the 44th Texas legislature will be law students as well as law makers. They are attending the law school of the University of Texas. Reps. John W. Fain of Weatherford and J. K. Wells of Corsicana, return to the next session. New law student-legislators are George A. Davidson Jr. of Eastland; George M. Newton of Cameron; Ed S. Keefe of Frankston and Eugene Worley of Shamrock.

Texas Topics

By RAYMOND BROOKS

AUSTIN, Nov. 30.—Texas has in store the revolutionary possibility of clipping 30 to 50 days from its four-month regular session in 1936 and

from \$130,000 to \$250,000 off its cost. There has been no official promise or claim that the session will be speeded up or that the legislature has run out of new laws to pass; but the intimation has been heard in state capital corridors that a contract administrative program may be submitted, which can either be enacted or killed within a few days; and that the general appropriations bill, "disapproved" by the incoming governor, by his budget recommendations as to what he would accept or what veto, will be ready for what is termed legislative deliberation early in the session.

Suggestion that the lawmakers might give back part of the four-month to the taxpayers has come from some of those who believed a revision of taxpayer sentiment might send to the voters the question of returning to the former 60-day session and perhaps even the former \$5 per diem of members.

Texas has had more 30-day special sessions since it adopted the four month regular session six years ago, then it did back in the 60-day regular-session times. There really is no limit on the duration of the regular session, except that after 120 days, the pay of members is restricted by the constitution to \$5 a day. But that \$5 is the former constitutional limit for regular and special sessions. When

the period of the regular session was doubled the pay of the 182 members also was doubled so that session expenses were almost quadrupled at once.

It is well-known there will be no "kingfish" or dictator tactics in the incoming executive administration; but the incoming governor will have a restricted set of definite legislative recommendations, and will lay them before the lawmakers early in the session. His program, which bears the approval of the democratic party of Texas, expressed by its convention and its platform, will in itself tend to free the legislative of restrictive influences which have dragged out the consideration of measures in endless outside lobbying and inside filibustering.

A new set of representatives, fresh from the people, with 60 odd first-termers in the house and with nine new senators, is expected to bring up a viewpoint of the voter's will, and to express such trend as there has been in the voter-taxpayer's attitude toward government, government expenses, economic and long sessions.

If the theory that the public has tired of too much legislative expense the short session may result.

Behind the Scenes in Washington

WASHINGTON.—The long arm of the White House is reaching around behind the scenes and into the Speakership light.

It will be denied, of course, that the president is taking any part. But a squad of fellows as close to him as the hair behind his ears is out to make it clear to Democratic House members that the administration prefers Sam Rayburn of Texas to Joe Byrnes of Tennessee.

Rayburn's campaign has made such headway in the last few weeks that efforts are being made to side-track him with offers of the majority floor leadership under Byrnes.

His strongest friends, including some of the administration higher-ups, have hastened to point out—lest he be tempted—that the Speaker runs the House, dominates appointments to important committees, and can prevent a floor leader from being effective.

Their ticket is Rayburn for Speaker and McCormack of Massachusetts for floor leader in a South-North combination.

The argument for Rayburn is that he is stronger and more liberal than the elderly Byrnes. His able handling of the securities and stock market acts at a time when the Rainey-Byrnes House leadership was creaking under the weight of many New Dealers.

Byrnes, meanwhile, has a strong tactical advantage in his seniority, the favors he was able to distribute when he was floor leader, and his prestige among new congressmen as chairman of the Democratic congressional campaign committee.

BRIG-GEN. PELHAM D. GLASSFORD, remembered for his defiant sympathy with the bonus army when he was police chief here in 1932, retains his friendly

interest in homeless, unemployed men.

Before the government was doing anything for the transient unemployed, Glassford lobbied for appropriations for transient camps and now that these camps are operating he is frequently found in old clothes on inspection expeditions to find out how the camps are operating.

Recently, officials here have been receiving confidential reports from Glassford, who lives on a ranch in Arizona, against exploitation of transients in the camps by means of cheap labor.

He presents first-hand evidence that men are taken in trucks from camps in the Southwest to work vegetable fields or canneries for cents a day.

THE anticipated second revolt of the "young liberals" in the AAA is likely to be hastened by the return of Undersecretary Rex T. Well from Europe. Some of his friends, at least, think Turrell will refuse to stand for some of the "rough stuff" that has gone on in the organization under the leadership of Administrator Charles Davis.

Almost every day at AAA there is something new for the liberals and conservatives to fight about. C. and a legal division of the consumer and legal divisions of the AAA are working to bring about standard grades and examination of books and records.

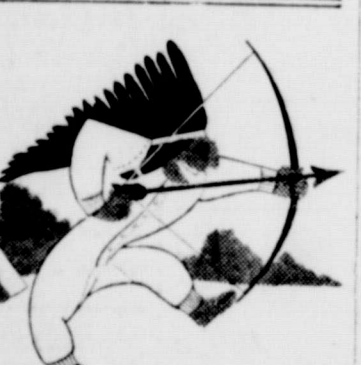
No injuries

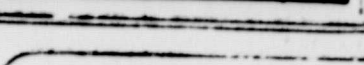
RANGER TAKES BRECK BATTLE TO WIN TITLE
