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Boat exemption requires amendment

A constitutional amendment will be required before commercial fishing boats can be exempted from ad valorem taxation in Texas — and a measure is now pending in Austin that would put such an amendment before Texas voters next November.

Commercial fishermen along the Texas coast began pressing earlier this year for legislation that would exempt their vessels and equipment from ad valorem taxation on the basis that they are "sea farmers" and therefore entitled to the same type of exemption presently given to farmers on land.

In place of the ad valorem tax, the fishermen are asking for a tax on their productivity.

In February, Sen. John Sharp — whose 18th district includes Aransas County — introduced a simple bill that would exempt commercial fishing boats from ad valorem taxation on a local option basis. Sen. James E. (Buster) Brown — whose senatorial district included Aransas County until the last redistricting — introduced a bill that would provide for the exemption through constitutional amendment, again based on local option.

At the same time, Texas Attorney

General Jim Mattox was asked to rule on whether the exemption could be granted by simple bill or if a constitutional amendment would be required.

Mattox's opinion, delivered recently, is that a constitutional amendment will be required to grant the exemption. Sharp is now throwing his support behind Brown's

bill which would call for a proposition amending the Texas Constitution to go before the state's voters in November, Ken King, Sen. Sharp's legislative assistant, said if voters approved the amendment, it would become effective Jan. 1, 1984.

King stressed that the proposed legislation calls for the commercial fishing

boat tax exemption on a local option basis. "Taxing entities don't have to exempt the boats from taxation under this proposal," he said.

However, he added, in some cases, the taxing entity is probably spending more to tax the boats than it is getting back in tax revenues.

Local shrimpers last month asked for — and received — approval from Rockport's city council of a resolution supporting the legislation to exempt commercial fishing boats from ad valorem taxes. Support of the resolution was also gained in other coastal cities including Freeport, Port Isabel and Aransas Pass.

Shrimpers also gained support of the resolution from the Aransas County commissioners by a vote of two for, one against and one abstention.

J.C. Harlan, Rockport shrimper who appeared before the county commissioners and the city council, said fishermen are not

asking for a tax exemption but are asking to be taxed on their production rather than on their boats and equipment.

"In all legislation, we (commercial fishermen) are classified as sea farmers," Harlan said. "We are asking to be taxed on our production as farmers are."

Another bill introduced by Sen. Sharp, changing the Texas Parks & Wildlife Department code to conform to the agreement for management of Matagorda Island, cleared the Senate earlier this week and is going before the Texas House, King said.

King said this bill, SB 249, "clarifies legislation" so that the code will conform to legislative intent to have hunting used as a tool for wildlife management on the Island.

A third bill introduced recently by Sharp cleared the Senate Committee on Natural Resources this past Wednesday and will now go before the full Senate for

Courthouse contractor selected

Aransas County Judge John D. Wendell said Tuesday that the county commissioners have selected Moorehouse Construction Co. of Corpus Christi to do the work on the new addition to the courthouse.

Moorehouse was the lowest bidder of eight construction companies who submitted bids for the work which were opened during a special meeting of the commissioners court March 14. Moorehouse submitted a base bid of \$265,000 less \$2,000 for the installation of one-inch fiberglass to line air ducts instead of sheet metal and less \$300 for fluorescent lighting over jurors' chairs in lieu of indirect lighting. They expect to finish the work within 195 days of the starting date.

Wendell said that a contract is currently being drawn up and expects it to be signed later this week.

The courthouse addition will add 4,500 square feet and will include a new courtroom which will house the county, commissioners and district courts, as well as increase office and storage space.

Voters asked to support proposed city charter

Cards seeking support of Rockport's proposed city charter — set for special election on April 2 — went out this week to Rockport residents who voted in the August, 1982, charter commission election.

Paid for the the Citizens for Home Rule Committee, the cards are signed by Rockport Mayor Burt Mills and all four city aldermen and ask the voters to cast their ballots in favor of the city charter for "better control" of their city government.

Next week's charter election will be the climax of work that began in May, 1982, with the appointment by the city council of a steering committee whose task was to determine if Rockport had sufficient population to become a home rule city.

The steering committee reported in June that Rockport's population was in excess of

6,000 — 1,000 more than the minimum needed under state law in order for a city to adopt its own charter.

A charter commission was elected in August to draft the proposed document and in January, commission members presented the document to the city council with a request that an election be called for April 2.

The proposed city charter, if adopted, would establish a city council-city manager form of government for Rockport with a five-member council consisting of a mayor and four aldermen as at present. No major changes in the composition or structure of the council are proposed and all legislative authority would be vested in the city

Twister is reported as storm sweeps area

Some flooding and at least one twister were reported this past week in Aransas County as a storm swept through the Coastal Bend area late Wednesday morning.

Officially, according to Rockport city employee Rex Littleton who keeps track of temperature and rainfall records, the city received 2.17 inches of rain. Littleton added he had received reports of more rain from some areas.

At least one area residence, that of the R.C. Balderrees south of Rockport, was apparently hit by a twister that touched down about 11:15 a.m.

Jerry Balderree said she was at the sink in her kitchen making nachos "when I heard a roaring like crazy, then I saw leaves and things blowing across the yard."

She said the twister tore down part of a hurricane fence, tossed a barrel about 12 feet into the air, into a tree, "and took the stall right off our horse and dropped it on a fence." The mare who was in the stall at the time "is okay — just scared to death," Jerry added.

A boat in the yard was "swung around" by the wind and a gate was blown some 150-200 yards, she estimates. "It broke several limbs off trees and a piece of tin is

Council. LaBerge said that the proposed Fulton zoning ordinance would create hardships for residents and that it would provide for the deletion of mobile home/recreational vehicle parks within five years. Not only would the Winter Texans go elsewhere, but zoning would create civil suits against the Town of Fulton which they would not be able to pay for without raising taxes.

Both LaBerge and Hunt are Fulton trailer park owners and LaBerge, like Hunt, believes that the town needs reasonable control over growth, but that zoning is not the means by which to achieve it.

According to section 4-4 of the proposed zoning ordinance which regulates non-conforming uses (mobile home and trailer parks have been defined as non-conforming uses for zoning purposes), the purpose of this section is to make the Ordinance more workable, legal and not to impose unnecessary hardships on individuals who have established certain uses before the enactment of the Zoning Ordinance. It is the long-range objective, however, that such uses will ultimately be eliminated by attrition or other means.

Under the proposed ordinance, property owners who suffer less than 95 percent damage to their property from storms and other disasters may rebuild without question. However, if more than 95 percent damage is incurred all restorations must conform with zoning regulations.

"The reason they (the zoning committee) want to keep us under special permit is because it's easier to say no to a request for a variance," LaBerge said in a telephone interview Thursday morning.

wrapped around a tree."

Jerry and her husband — who was home at the time — estimated damage was relatively minor: "We've got to replace part of the hurricane fence, replace maybe one gate — and the stall," Jerry said.

She figures the entire incident "probably didn't last over two or three minutes, but it seemed like it lasted a long time. Everything was going everywhere . . ."

Area streets and roads were reported flooded briefly during the storm which came through around 11 a.m. The county was under a severe thunderstorm watch from 11 a.m. until 11:30 a.m. and during that period, portions of FM 881 were reported under water.

Winds of up to 60 miles per hour were unofficially reported in Rockport Harbor.

High winds described as a tornado hit Taft Wednesday morning shortly before 11 a.m. and both Taft and Sinton were reported flooded. One southbound lane of U.S. 181 in Taft was blocked by high water for about 30 minutes, officials reported.

Rainfall of up to three inches was reported in some area cities.

Forecasters call for fair skies Saturday and Sunday, partly cloudy conditions Monday, with highs in the 60s to low 70s Saturday and Sunday, 70s to low 80s Monday. Lows are predicted in the 30s to high 40s Saturday and Sunday, high 40s to 50s Monday.

FBI had free hand

Subversive groups in the United States known to condone violence may not be able to operate as freely as they have been now that the FBI has been given more leeway in probing activities of such organizations.

Attorney General William French Smith has handed the FBI greater authority in dealing with these groups, which will make it easier for agents to infiltrate and monitor groups that advocate violence to accomplish social and political change.

For years such organizations have operated without much direct interference by government agencies. Some groups have built up tremendous, and often dangerous, potential for civil disruption while claiming immunity under the constitution from federal intervention.

New guidelines have been formulated by Attorney General Smith for use by the FBI in domestic terrorism investigations, replacing certain restraints instituted by Attorney General Edward Levi in 1976.

Levi said he issued the regulations to stop abuses uncovered by congressional committees. These probes found that during the 1960s and early 1970s the FBI infiltrated anti-Vietnam War groups, civil rights organizations and the women's liberation movement, and tried to disrupt their activities and discredit their leaders.

Smith said the new guidelines, which become effective March 21, resulted from eight months of study and consultation with Congress. He said they should clarify standards regulating these investigations and reaffirm the importance of gathering criminal intelligence about violence-prone groups, while keeping adequate safeguards for lawful and peaceful political dissent.

Some groups, operating within constitutional boundaries in exercising political dissent, have been exploited by subversive elements using these groups as fronts.

It has been difficult for the FBI to ferret out subversives without violating rights of citizens to protest what they perceive to be injustices.

The new operating procedure should remedy this to a large extent.

For the first time, the Justice Department has authorized full investigations into public advocacy of crimes or violence where there is apparent intent to carry out such threats.

Also, the FBI will now be allowed to investigate members of front or support groups knowingly helping criminal objectives of a violence-prone group already under investigation.

This will allow the FBI to investigate people who establish safe houses for fugitives without opening a new investigation.

The new guidelines bring rules for domestic security investigations more in line with general FBI criminal probes and clarify rules for field agents who had been reluctant to open such inquiries under the Levi rules.

Regardless of objections by advocates of civil liberties, these new guidelines should be allowed to stand. They give the FBI a much-needed weapon in its ceaseless battle against the criminal element in our society.

White right

Faced with a request to designate as an emergency an \$81 million proposal for prison construction, Gov. Mark White's rejoinder was that the state cannot afford to build "Cadillac prisons."

Asked to define a Cadillac prison, the governor said, "\$81 million prisons are rather high when you divide that by what — 4,000 people?"

He said the Texas Department of Corrections, which is seeking the \$81 million appropriation, had dormitories built for \$2.7 million for 1,400 prisoners previously housed in army tents because of prison overcrowding.

By that formula, White pointed out, TDC should be able to handle 4,000 prisoners for the \$5.4 million prison system directors are seeking.

No public project is as simple as it sometimes appears at the outset. Regardless of the amount the legislation eventually approves for prison construction, building costs will be higher than anticipated by the time ground is broken.

We agree with Gov. White the state does not need Cadillac prisons. Prisons are places of punishment and were never intended to be country clubs.

The federal government has set a bad example for states in prison construction, especially minimum security units, where a home atmosphere, rather than a prison atmosphere, prevails.

The practice of building too-comfortable prisons has influenced many federal court decisions, with some judges playing the role of warden and telling state prison officials how to run their institutions.

It is Gov. White's belief that "every prison does not have to have red bricks and steel bars . . . we have seen that they (prisons) can effectively contain prisoners in less-costly facilities, and certainly that's what I'm going to be looking for if they develop those kinds of facilities."

Other arguments aside, the governor has pledged Texas will build an adequate number of prison cells to handle offenders convicted of violent crimes or crimes involving use of firearms.

W. James Estelle, TDC director, has asked the legislature to restore the \$1.5 billion two-year prison budget he requested and which was reduced to \$800 million by the Legislative Budget Board.

Included in the budget request made by the State Board of Corrections was the \$81 million funding request. The \$81 million would complete a 1,000-bed maximum security prison and start work on a 2,000-bed maximum security unit. The request was made at the suggestion of the Legislative Budget Board.

The appropriation would be in addition to the \$800 million general appropriation for 1984-85. Estelle said the two prison projects were cut by the Legislative Budget Board from TDC's \$1.5 billion appropriations request for the next biennium. The budget board suggested the construction be done with surplus funds in the current biennium.

Last sail on Karakal

KARAKAL IS BOUND for the beautiful reef at Moraine Cay, but doesn't make it. Off Loggerhead Bar, south of Whale Cay where one leaves the Sea of Abaco and meets the Atlantic, there is a "rage" of wind and sea from the west meeting the ocean rolling in from the east. We turn back and anchor for the night at Great Guana.

Another day and Karakal makes it around Whale Cay, the worst passage in the skipper's memory. There are eight-foot seas as we round the north end of the cay. They tower above us and roll down under our stern. We are suddenly a surf board. Then we are sheltered by No Name Cay and approach the harbor at New Plymouth and anchor in protected White Sound at Green Turtle Cay. We agree even if we were to make Moraine we might be weathered in for a week or more and there is no good holding ground there nor at any place on the way. We settle for a stroll ashore.

During the night there is a torrential rain at Green Turtle, but the next day we walk across the cay to the Atlantic side. Our path is carved out of solid limestone. A four-wheel drive vehicle can make it. A number of attractive houses lend testimony. Otherwise it would take as many men and as many years as it took to build the pyramids of Egypt to do the building.

We look out upon the ocean. The huge waves meet the reefs a mile and more offshore and roar and pound their way to the beach before they break.

Another day. We arrive late at the Conch Inn. After dinner entertainment is what the men and women from the sailing yachts make it. On this night the skipper's old friend Barbara from "Our Song" is at the piano and sings songs from the '30s, '40s and '50s. She was a professional entertainer before becoming first mate on a sailing ship. Animated, sparkling blue eyes, a woman who loves life.

Austin at Wharf

Several couples dance on the hankercloth-size floor. Someone appears with a trumpet, another with a banjo lashed to a broomstick. Barbara is happy, the house is happy. A party of tourists, the ladies in dresses and men in jackets, watch with a measure of amazement, but sheer delight.

OUTSIDE THE WIND is increasing. Darkness will come early. I wonder that the coconuts remain in the palms. At the Crawl the shutters are closed. Perhaps I should go there and see if the fireplace is alight? Will the planes fly tomorrow? It takes only a few hours to get home to Texas. Oh Lord, please don't let the customs make me open my stuffed duffle bags. I haven't an ounce of contraband! So 'elp me.

OUT ISLAND VI-gnettes: It is raining and the wild wind blows. I am a bit sad, nostalgic. This is my last day aboard Karakal. Tomorrow I shall be flying home, but Karakal has been home too for nearly half of the past year.

A front, the worst storm of the season, according to our vague weather reports, is moving in from Florida. Will my flight be postponed? Even secure at the dock Karakal rolls, but gently. How will it feel to sleep in a bed that is motionless, solidly secure as these islands that rise from the ocean depths?

I finish the last of my morning coffee, climb the ladder and poke my head on deck. At the same time another head appears from the hatch of the boat across the dock from us. A shaking head. Rather crudely he says: "Blowing bloody

stink." And I reply, "In paradise." We both laugh and get the hell below, shelter in our respective cabins.

People on the dock, draped in oil skins, heads down, move hastily. Except for a couple of pretty young girls, bare legs, foul weather jackets. They stroll, eating ice cream cones. Certainly there are shorts under their jackets?

We lunch ashore, at the Conch Crawl, a sailors haven. Foul weather gear, oil skins — tired of those words — are draped over chairs or piled on the floor. We order cracked conch and salad. Dolf, his real name is Dolphin — wonderful, glorious name — joins us.

Yesterday was my last sail in Karakal. We left the loveliest of all these beautiful islands, Man-O-War. But how can I say that? There are an estimated two thousand plus cays. I have seen no more than a dozen or so. Still, Man-O-War will forever be in my heart and mind. We pass through the channel, cut through a reef, and I try to engrave every rock, tree, house and the tiny entrance light on my mind. We round Garden Cay and the skipper, understanding chap, leaves me at the helm. It is overcast, the storm pending, the wind east by north and we are under the main alone, making six knots. It is a short run to Marsh Harbour. The skipper drops and furls the sail and off the dock he takes over his ship. A landing with the wind blowing off the dock can be tricky.

A dinner at Cynthia's Kitchen. Cynthia does things to grouper that gives it a taste of heaven. She does it especially well for the skipper, after a couple of big hugs. Her food is half the price and twice as good as many other places.

"Excellent Bahamian dishes at reasonable prices," reads Kline's Guide to the Bahamas. Cynthia has raised four sons and sent them all through college.

After the fall of OPEC, the rise of TAXROC

In Washington, they learn well.
Having seen what OPEC could do in extorting money from nations around the world, the politicians and bureaucrats are now busy creating its domestic replacement, an organization that might be called TAXROC (Taxes Raised on Consumers). Just as OPEC engorged the treasuries of Middle East sheikdoms by taking money from our pockets, TAXROC will expand the income of government, by taking money from our pockets.
If this seems harsh, consider what's happening: — We have more money to spend. After 10 years of pain and suffering from the original OPEC price increase and all the events and adjustments that followed, it now appears that the power of OPEC has been broken. Energy prices are falling, consumer prices are stabilizing, and real purchasing power is rising.
Small wonder that everyone is more optimistic. According to the Conference Board, a New York organization that tracks such things, con-

sumer confidence rose for the second straight month in February. Other indicators are equally positive: Home sales are up, housing starts are up sharply, and all the economic forecasting firms are advising their clients that a \$5-a-barrel decline in oil prices will mean more rapid growth in 1983 because consumers will have billions more to spend.
— But the government wants it. In the face of such good news, do we hear cheers from the Orgy on the Potomac?
No. We hear proposals to impose new taxes on oil — say \$5 a barrel.
Testifying before the House Budget Committee last week, Federal Reserve Chairman Paul Volcker said, "A deep decline in oil prices would suggest early re-examination of the case for energy taxes." Specifically, Volcker, the administration and members of Congress are talking about a \$5-a-barrel tax on crude oil.
The bottom line for you and me, if this happens, is that one gang of extortionists, OPEC, will be supplanted by another gang of extortionists, TAXROC, a

collection of taxing authorities that also includes state governments. All these taxes, whether on barrels of crude oil or on gallons of gasoline, come straight out of our pockets.
Now let's see what this means.
The Burns family, which owns an aging station wagon, buys about 1,000 gallons of gasoline a year. For the Burns boys, 12 and 14, declining gasoline prices "bought" one of the two \$250 BMX bicycles acquired in recent months. In future months, it could mean even more money available for the endless Wish List.
If you drive a car, similar figures and similar purchases may apply to you. The average car, for instance, uses about 800 gallons of gasoline a year. With gasoline prices down about 25 cents a gallon over the past year, this means a typical car owner has about \$200 to spend that previously went into the gas tank. Add some further savings for lower electric bills as the fuel adjustment cost is changed and declining energy prices add up to a nice boost in spending power and a real stimulus to the economy.
Still lower prices for energy will bring further benefits. Data Resources estimates a value of \$12.4 billion in consumer spending power from the expected oil price decline.
How much is \$12.4 billion?
It's enough to:
To do for the world more than the world does for you—that is success.

— Buy 1,250,000 new cars.
— Increase the annual sales of the 50 largest retailing companies in America by about 5 percent.
— Triple the \$3.5 billion sales of the home furnishings industry.
— Triple the \$3.4 billion annual sales of the toys and school supplies business.
— Double the annual sales of either the entire apparel or textile industry. Spread over the entire economy, it is powerful stimulus for growth and employment in the pursuit

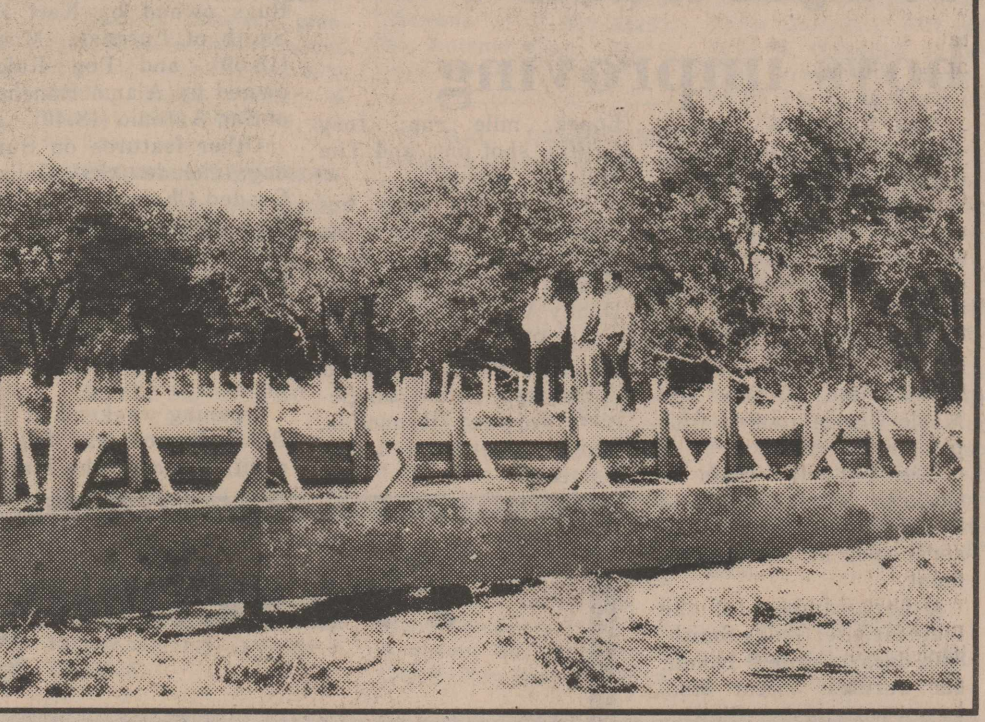
of what 230 million Americans want for their own lives.
Unfortunately, that is not what we're going to get.
A \$5-a-barrel tax on crude oil translates to a 12.5 cent-a-gallon federal tax on the price of gasoline, and a \$100 tax bill for the average car owner.
Can you do anything about it?
Yes, maybe. Let your congressman know, right now, that he can reduce the deficit by spending less, not by taxing you more.

Peninsula Park West construction begins

Construction of the first four houses in Peninsula Park West, Rockport's newest subdivision, began this past week.
Four more will be started this coming week, according to project developers, D.L. Morrison Sr. and Jr. and Cecil Phelps. Current plans call for a total of 20 speculation homes to be constructed and sold in the subdivision, with another 10 lots to be sold for those who want their homes custom-built.

will include central air and heat, dishwashers, garbage disposals, ranges and ovens and vent-a-hoods.
The developers of the project have been building in this area since 1977. Construction of the houses is by C&D Construction.
Greenfield added financing will be available to qualified buyers with a variable rate mortgage starting at 5 3/4 percent interest.
The Morrisons pointed out the subdivision, located at the intersection of Enterprise and Live Oak, is close to both an elementary school and the high school-junior high school complex and is near Enterprise Clinic and the new post office site.



Social Security annual earning reports due in April

People in the Rockport-Fulton area who receive Social Security checks and who earned more than the annual limit in 1982 should remember that they must file an annual report of their 1982 earnings by April 15 if they have not yet done so. David Tutl, Social Security district manager in Corpus Christi, said recently.
The 1982 annual earnings limits were \$6,000 for people who were 65 or older and \$4,400 for people who were under 65 all of 1982. People who were 72 or older all of 1982 do not have to file an annual report of earnings.
The report is used to ensure that people received the correct amount of benefits last year. Any necessary adjustment will

be based on the information in the report.
People who notified Social Security that they expected to earn more than the annual limit in 1982 should have received a report form in the mail by now. Those who have not received a form can obtain one at the Corpus Christi Social Security office.
On the report, a person will also estimate 1983 earnings. If estimated earnings exceed the 1983 annual limits, benefits will be withheld accordingly. The 1983 annual limits are \$6,600 for people 65 or over and \$4,920 for people under 65 all of 1983.
Generally, \$1 in benefits is withheld for each \$2 of earnings above the annual

limit.
In addition, the age at which the earnings test no longer applies drops to 70 in 1983. This means that earnings a person has in and after the month he or she reaches 70 will not affect benefits. Only earnings before the birthday month affect benefits.
More information about how earnings affect the receipt of benefits can be obtained at the Corpus Christi Social Security office, located at 619 S. Staples. The telephone number is 888-3492. The people there will be glad to answer any questions.

B-H developments are on schedule

Nautical Towers and the Condominiums of Rockport Country Club, projects being developed in Aransas County by Baker-Haldeman Development Company, are proceeding on schedule, according to Jerry Haldeman, managing partner of the company.
Three of the five buildings in the first phase of the country club condominiums are well under way with the first building scheduled for completion within the next six weeks to two months, Haldeman said.
Work is under way on the remaining two units. All five buildings, Haldeman

said, should be completed by July. He added that contracts for the sale of the condominiums have been let and "presales are about what we expected."
Presales are "going great" on Baker-Haldeman's other project, the residential-retail, condominium Nautical Towers development on Fulton Beach Road.
"Everything is still on schedule," he added. Initial sales in this project are being made through a series of parties with the next one scheduled for next Thursday, March 31, in Victoria.

IRS offers return checklist

The Internal Revenue Service offers the following time-tested approach to avoiding errors on your federal income tax return.
First:
— Do you have all your necessary records and forms easily accessible?
— Do you have plenty of time? (Rushing leads to errors.)

— Have you received a Wage and Tax Statement (W-2 form) from each employer you worked for during the past year?
— Do you anticipate any questions or problems? Are you puzzled about any particular law changes? If so, check your instructions. Also, check with IRS — they may have a free publication that will answer your questions.
Next, before you mail your return, double-check the following:
— Are all W-2 forms attached?
— Are all supporting schedules attached to your Form 1040?

— Is the arithmetic correct?
— If you rounded off numbers, did you round consistently?
— Did you use the correct tax table, and did you follow the line across to the correct figure?
— Is the return signed and dated (by both spouses if a joint return)?
— Did you use the peel-off label and, if so, is the information correct?
— Is there a stamp on the pre-addressed, coded envelope?
— Did you make a copy of the return for your own records?

Contentment surrounds Biddy Wright

The fireside bench, Biddy Wright says, was made from a booth off a fishing boat. She did that herself. The table made from a ship's wheel was actually done by her son-in-law — she'd started it, but he took it over and finished it for her.

The upholstered chair in the living room is her most recent project — done since she started taking an upholstery class at Del Mar this year. "I always wanted to do it," she says when asked why she's taking the class. "Retired people have to count their pennies and upholstery is expensive. I wanted to learn how to take something completely apart and redo it."

A resident for the last 35 years of Aransas Pass, with family living there, in Rockport and Corpus Christi, Biddy was the daughter of an Army cavalryman, the wife of Navy Admiral (Ret.) W.L. (Bull) Wright — and figures she's "one of the few people that had my funeral in advance . . ."

Born in Baltimore, Md., she was named Nancy, "but I've never been called that. I've gone by my nickname, Biddy, for almost 83 years." She thinks she gave herself that nickname. "I was named for my father's mother, but I called myself 'Chickabid.' Thank goodness I dropped the 'chick,' because Biddy sounds a little more dignified!"

Her early years she recalls were spent following her father around. He was stationed for a while in Texas, on the Border, then in 1913 — the year Biddy herself was 13 years old — he was transferred to Alaska. A month later, Biddy and her mother followed.

"We went to San Francisco to catch a ship for

Nome," she recalled during a recent interview at her home, and they enjoyed the city so much, Biddy's mother arranged for passage on a later steamship than the one on which they were originally booked.

"The ship we were supposed to be on ran aground on one of the Aleutian Islands," Biddy

said. Many of the passengers were missing, and among those listed as "presumed dead" — because their names had never been removed from the passenger list — were Biddy and her mother.

"My father was notified and he notified my mother's family, and they held a memorial service for us at the church in Maryland," Biddy recalls, laughing.

Ironically, though, her mother did die in Alaska . . . She and her father returned to the states "and we were in World War I. My father went overseas and I went to live with my mother's sister." She remained with her aunt following her father's death during the War — and during an Easter party, met the young Naval man who was to become her husband.

"He'd been brought to the party as a blind date for me," Biddy said. Smiling, she recalled, "He wrote himself a letter telling him he had to return to his base, in case the date didn't work out, and I had left a message with a friend . . . but it worked out fine." The two were eventually to be married as soon as Wright completed a cruise. "It was supposed to be three months," Biddy said, "but they were having a revolution in Nicaragua, so he didn't get back for a year. So we didn't get married until 1926 . . ."

During the Second World War, Wright was assigned to the submarines — S-boats. "He was captain of the last two he was on," Biddy said. Among her prize possession is her husband's battle flag from the War. The design includes eight torpedoes — one for each Japanese submarine his ship sank. Another memento is a photograph of herself back in 1943 when she christened a submarine . . .

She and her family were among those last weekend to see the U.S.S. City of Corpus Christi. "We went over to the dock about 2 o'clock — they had speakers and whatnot — and we took a tour. My husband went up to New London when this boat was launched, but he couldn't

see very much. He never did see a nuclear submarine . . .

She and her husband had originally planned, she said, that he would remain in the Navy until he was 65, then they would retire to the Yosemite area in California. But after the war, while he was stationed in the Philippines helping with cleanup operations, he contracted malaria. "He started home, got as far as Honolulu and had attack," Biddy said. "You can't cure malaria, you can just keep it under control, so they retired him physically. That was in 1946."

Admiral Wright had grown up in Corpus Christi ("His family came from Sweetwater in 1902," Biddy said), and he decided he wanted to return to this area.

"He talked me into coming here," Biddy said. "I wanted to go back to Maryland, but he kept saying how nice it was, it never got cold in Corpus Christi — whenever a norther would come through," she laughed, "I would kid him."

He didn't want to live in Corpus Christi, she recalled — "not in the city" — so he wrote his mother and she found this place (in Aransas Pass). "We liked it, bought it, moved in." That, she added, was 35 years ago — "the longest I'd ever been in one place in my life!" Her husband died last October: "I still haven't got the nerve to put his clothes away."

Most of her family — two daughters, six grandchildren and six great-grandchildren — live in the immediate area. "There's one in Lake Jackson," she said, but the other are close enough to come over for breakfast on Sunday mornings. For constant companionship, Biddy has a Blitzen, a 4-year-old part-

English sheepdog and several cages of birds — a parrot, a recently-acquired lovebird, canaries, finches.

"I had two mynah birds," she added. One lived to be 19 and the other was "pretty close" to 20. "And I had a mockingbird that fell out of his nest — he was pretty young, naked as a jaybird. He was 14 when he died."

In the back yard of her residence — smaller, now, than when the house was first purchased ("I made it smaller; I built fences in toward the house," she said) — she has plants, bird feeders. "My grandsons help me with the yard, and I have a riding mower," she added.

She started doing carpentry after she and her husband moved into the house in 1946. "He didn't have the patience for small work, detail work," she said. Over the years, besides the fireside bench and the table, she's converted an old sideboard into a hutch and made two four-poster beds. "I cheated," she pointed out on one of the beds: "I sanded down and painted old porch posts" to make the posters. But on another one, she said, "I didn't cheat here. I used four-by-fours."

She found a third four-poster bed in a junk shop in Corpus Christi. "I only cost me \$10, but it took me six months to get down through the paint and varnish to the wood." She took an "old dining room chair that was uncomfortable and ugly, added wings, padded it and put a slipcover on it" to make a comfortable chair for a bedroom.

"I like doing it," she says of her furniture-restoration. "I just like to get a piece of junk, if it's got pretty lines — a piece of

furniture — and fool with it.

She also does needlecraft and crochet. "This bedspread," she says of one project, "took me 17 years to make, because I got so tired of cross-stitching. I'd put it away. Right now," she commented later, "I'm in the throes of making one of those crocheted canopies" for a bed. And of course, she has her once-weekly two-and-one-half-hour upholstery sessions.

And even after 85 years in one place, she isn't tired of the settled life. For more than half her life, she was moving from one place to another. "It's nice," she says, "after roving around all that time to have a place you can call your own."

Surrounded by her photographs and memories, with Blitzen and her birds for company, her family always nearby, her carpentry and upholstery work . . . Biddy Wright seems content.

Plants, both indoor and outdoor, thrive best in natural sunlight. We move inside each winter a lot of plants that would not live outside in the winter months. We must duplicate the outside environment as closely as possible. The main environment factor that we must consider is the sunlight. There are two ways to remedy this problem — one way is by the addition of grow lights and the second way is by placing the plants on window sills where they would receive the sunlight from outdoors. But if you are like the average gardener (indoor, outdoor or both) you do not have enough window sills for all the plants you have to care for inside during the winter months. Then you will end up with dirty window sills that are wet as well as the drapes, blinds and the carpets.

Recently I found a walnut-grained window tray that is adjustable for use with blinds or drapes that will also keep the window sill clean as well as the carpet. This adjustable window sill tray will adjust to almost any size window

and provide your plants with the necessary sunlight to keep your plants healthy while they are inside. This is a life saver for not only your plants but for your drapes, blinds and carpets.

The same company that makes these window sill trays also make a mini-greenhouse that can sit very nicely on a table in your home and is very beautiful with plants growing and blooming inside. This mini-greenhouse can be used for rooting cuttings or for the germinating of seed. The humidity can be very easily controlled with this mini-greenhouse. This mini-greenhouse has a walnut-grained base to protect the furniture and it can sit on your dining room table with beautiful petunias or pansies blooming in it. And it will light up the whole room. There are many uses for this mini-greenhouse.

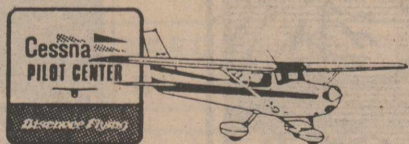

Balanced diet

important for pets

Dear Dr. Lutz, I have a half-grown Persian cat that has a very finicky appetite. Liver is the only food I can get her to eat. Should I be worried?

Signed, Scarlet Dear Scarlet, Liver, without any other food, is not a balanced diet. Feeding an unbalanced diet can result in poor body condition. Incorrect levels of vitamin D, calcium and phosphorus can cause skeletal problems such as rickets. Low levels of other vitamins and minerals can

cause such problems as anemia, poor growth, poor skin and hair coats and loss of appetite.

Most commercially available cat foods contain adequate amounts of all the essential food requirements. Signed, Dr. Hap Lutz

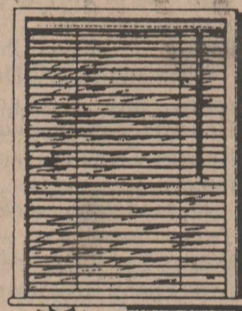

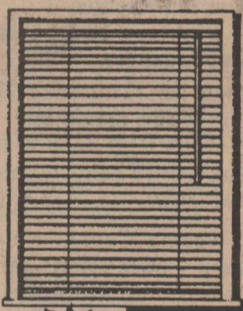

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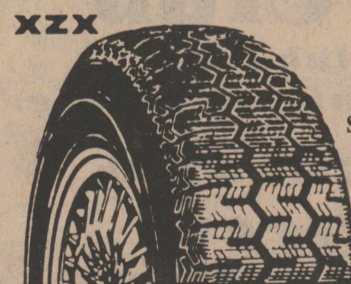

This week's collection is like our weather — mixed up!

TOMATO-CUCUMBER-ONION SALAD
2 tablespoons vegetable oil
1 tablespoon vinegar
1 tablespoon sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
1 teaspoon minced parsley

1 medium cucumber, peeled and thinly sliced
2 medium tomatoes, sliced
1 large onion, sliced and separated into rings
Combine the first six ingredients in a jar and shake well. Pour marinade over the vegetables and refrigerate 2 hours before serving.

FRIED PINEAPPLE
1/4 cup flour
1 teaspoon sugar
1 egg, beaten
2 tablespoons milk
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 1/2-ounce can pineapple slices, drained
1/2 cup soft bread crumbs

vegetable oil
Combine flour and sugar. Combine egg, milk and salt; mix well.
Dredge pineapple slices in flour mixture, dip in milk mixture and coat with bread crumbs. Fry in small amount of hot oil until golden brown, turning once. Drain on paper towels.
Good with ham or pork chops.

COTTAGE CHEESE ROLLS
2 packages dry yeast
1/2 cup warm water
2 cups cream-style cottage cheese
1/4 cup sugar
1 1/2 teaspoons salt

1/2 teaspoon soda
2 eggs
5 cups flour
Dissolve yeast in warm water. Combine cottage cheese, sugar, salt, soda, eggs, yeast mixture and 1 cup flour in a large mixing bowl. Mix well.
Gradually add remaining flour and mix well. Place dough in a well-greased bowl, turning to grease top. Cover and let rise in a warm place free of drafts 45 minutes, or until dough has doubled in bulk.

Turn dough out onto a lightly floured surface. Divide in half and divide each half into 12 equal portions. Roll into balls.

Place in two well-greased 9-inch baking pans. Cover and let rise 45 minutes. Bake at 350° F. about 20 minutes.

SANGRIA
1 gallon burgundy wine
1 quart orange juice
1 quart lemon-lime carbonated beverage
2 cups cherry or peach brandy
1/2 cup lime or lemon juice
lemon slices
orange slices
Combine first five ingredients in a large punch bowl; stir gently. Garnish with citrus slices. Serve over ice.

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Rev. Fake's life 'wrapped up' in church

The Rev. Charles F. Fake probably holds the current record for length of tenure among Aransas County's ministers — he's been pastor of Rockport's First Baptist Church for nearly two decades.

He came here in 1964 after having been recommended to the congregation by former pastor W.D. Broadway. "I almost didn't," he confesses now. "I really wasn't interested (in coming to Rockport), because I thought at the

time that living on the coast was bad for my health." But he did come — and discovered that coastal living did, after all, agree with him.

A native of Houston, Rev. Fake lived there until he went to Waco to attend Baylor University. He already knew what he planned to do with his life: "I started preaching when I was in high school — I think I was about 16."

While attending Baylor, he became associate pastor

of First Baptist Church of Groesbeck, then he became pastor of Oletha Baptist Church near there. "I was ordained when I was 20," he added.

He next became pastor of a mission in Lampasas "which became a church while I was there."

By then, Fake was out of college and he and his wife,

Wanda, moved to Fort Worth so he could attend Southwest Seminary. To put himself through the seminary, he took a job with General Motors in Arlington, but after a year and a half, a plant cutback and a change in hours meant he couldn't work for GM and attend seminary classes. He went to work for a grainery.

His next pastorate, while he was still in the seminary, was at Brian Baptist in Azle where Mrs. Fake was teaching school. In 1959, when he completed his seminary work, he went on to First Baptist Church at Kosse, then in 1961, to Vickery Baptist in Dallas where he stayed until the call came from Rockport.

He's seen a lot of growth, a lot of change, in the past 19 years — "This whole community has changed so much," he says. Certainly First Baptist has experienced growth — so much that the church has purchased land on Enterprise Street with an eye toward building a new and larger church.

Mrs. Fake serves as part-time choir director for the church. Married 30 years, the couple have five children and one grandson.

Rev. Fake spends a lot of his time either at First Baptist or working for the church. "It's a full-time job. There's something here all the time — counselling, marriages, funerals... "My life," he said, "is pretty well wrapped up in this church."

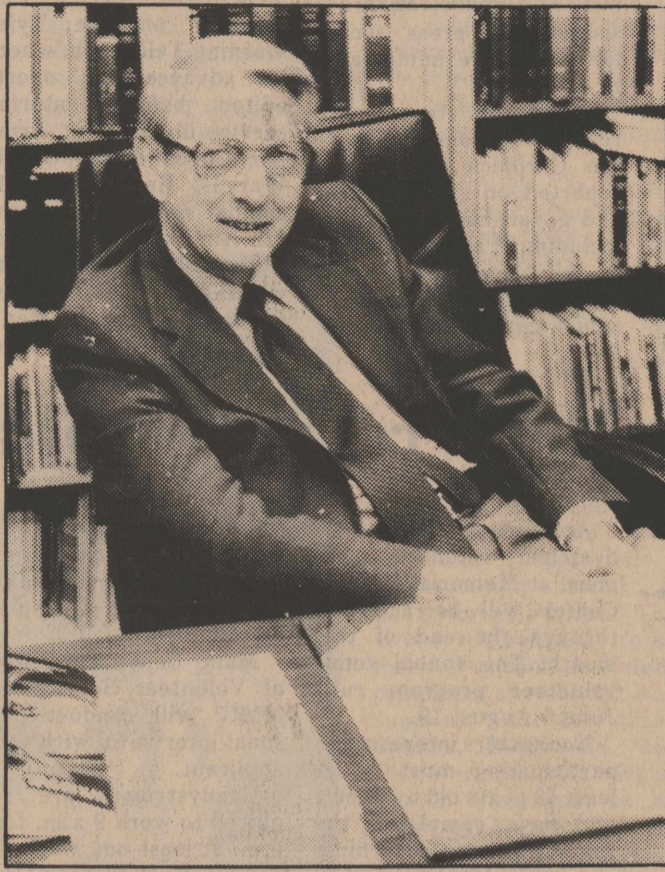

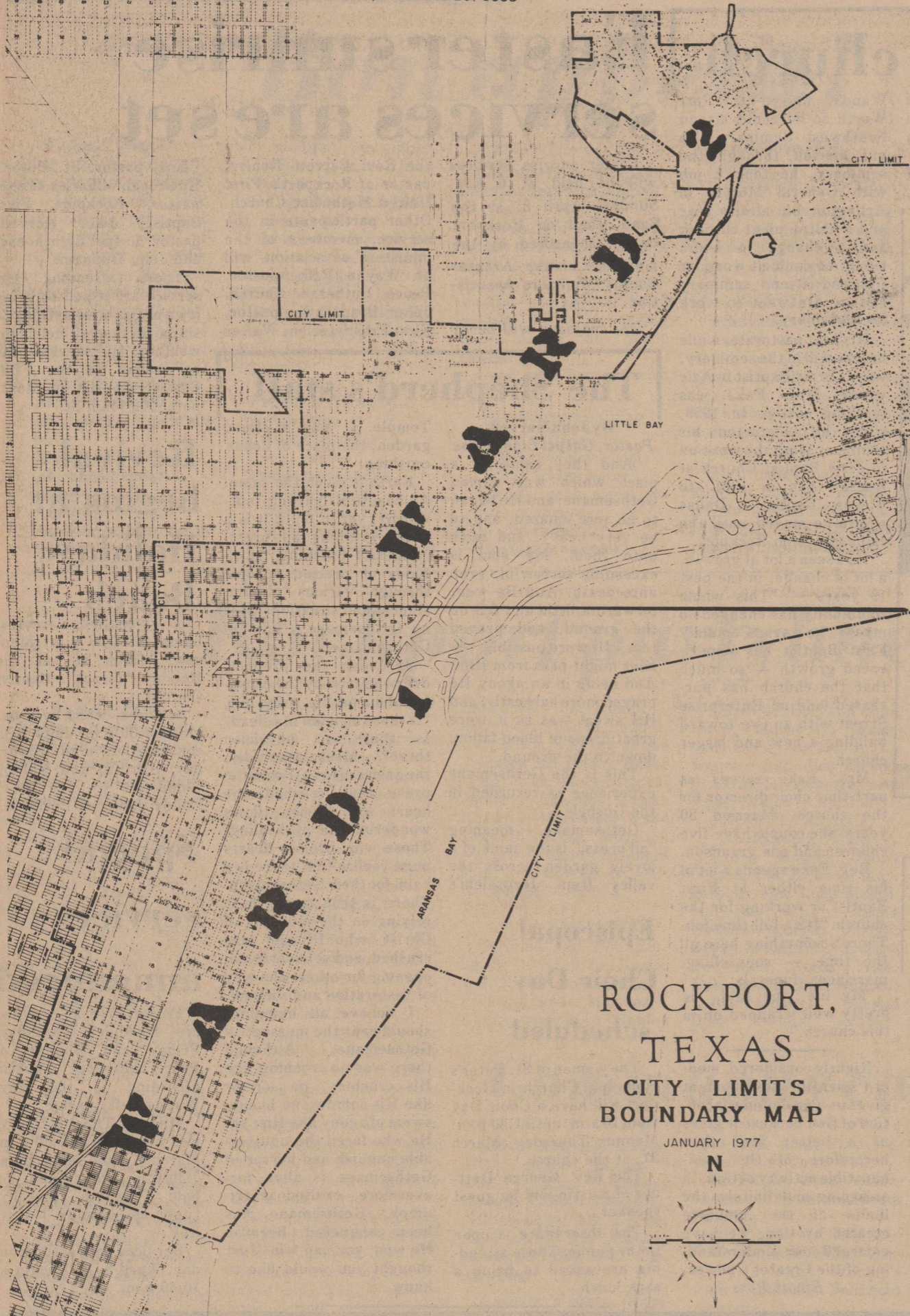

WASHINGTON — Congressman Bill Patman announced employment of Bo Byers, a longtime Texas news reporter and columnist, as administrative assistant and press secretary, effective immediately.

Byers, 62, took early retirement from the Houston Chronicle, where he reported on state politics and government 26 years, including 21 as bureau chief of the Chronicle's Austin bureau before promotion to senior capital correspondent.

Byers began his professional reporting career in January 1941 after graduation from the University of Texas journalism department. He was a cub reporter on the Tyler Morning-Telegraph, where he advanced to sports editor before entering service in the U.S. Army Air Corps during World War II. University System. Regmund says farm and urban people depend on each other for products and services that are essential to modern business and living.

"One group can't live without the other. Together they make the best food and fiber team in the world," the agent explains.

He believes that a basic ingredient for the economic, political and social success of a country is a highly productive agricultural base, which gives a nation the capacity to feed its own people and to export for economic gain as well as humanitarian purposes.

"Food in this country is still an incredible bargain, with Americans spending about 17 percent of after-

tax income for food and beverages."

Agriculture is this nation's leading employer, exporter and the No. 1 industry in the U.S., Regmund points out.

"Today, one U.S. worker now produces enough food for about 55 people at home and another 25 overseas. At the turn of the century, one American farm worker could feed only seven people," Regmund emphasizes.

In Texas one out of every 35 persons is a farmer or rancher, yet about 25 percent of the state's retail trade business is directly associated with agricultural production and selling of food and fiber products.

"Agriculture makes a large contribution to the wealth and well-being of our state. Because quality food is available at affordable prices, a larger part of our income is available to buy other things," the agent says.

consideration. This bill gives a county commissioners court authority to prohibit or regulate the keeping of wild animals at a residence or within 1,000 feet of a residence or public school.

The proposed bill would not apply inside the limits of an incorporated city, town or village.

Aransas County Judge John Wendell

said he is in support of this proposed bill, saying the keeping of non-domestic type animals has "always been a problem."

At various times, the Judge said, people have kept lions, tigers, even a cheetah in the county, "and that causes problems unless they're way out in the country, which they never are."

A local boy was injured earlier this year when a jaguar he was petting through a cage grabbed his hand and refused to let go. The Judge said in past years, there have been other incidents involving such animals.

Sharp has asked that this bill be considered on an emergency basis.

Durene McCain, who is running against Horace Naquin for place 7 on the school board, outlined several changes she would like to see in board policy. These changes include competency-based teaching which encourages student success; abolition of "social promotion" of students regardless of the level of their educational achievement; encouragement of "innovative and creative teaching"; open lines of communication between the board and school personnel in order to better identify problems; expansion and intensification of drug education; encouragement of firm discipline policies, including closing the high school campus with the exception of hardship cases.

McCain also suggested eliminating personnel discrimination and providing better job security for teachers through the introduction of three-year contracts; establishing a summer school program; and eventually building more permanent structures.

When asked about the possibility of all these changes raising taxes, McCain replied that "All reap the benefits of educating children," not just those who have youngsters in school.

Horace Naquin, McCain's opponent, spoke next. Naquin said he agreed with many of McCain's ideas and that he would

work towards quality education for the best possible return on tax investments. He also said he would try to institute a program to encourage teachers to continue their own education and attend workshops.

In addition, he suggested the district do some long-range planning and encourage a policy of teaching pride and self-discipline to students so that learning can be an enjoyable and memorable experience. He also advocated suspension for drug possession and approval of periodic dog-aided drug searches in the schools. However, he said that a program of in-school suspension could possibly be developed to aid first-time offenders but not hard-core users.

ACTA President Willis Pfeifer thanked the candidates for their speeches and reminded those who will be out of town for Easter during the April 2 elections to vote absentee.

Pfeifer said that several nominations to the association's executive committee had been declined by the nominees.

Frank Riordan presented a letter to the membership urging members to write letters to the Army Corps of Engineers opposing a permit request by H.E. Butt Inc. for posts emplaced on a shell bar off Live Oak Point. Riordan said that the Corps is tired of people building first and

requesting permits after the work has been completed and that H.E. Butt Inc. should not be allowed to keep fishermen and boaters out of the area.

Harold Pinchin reported on a bill before the Texas state legislature concerning the process of initiative and referendum. Pinchin said that the proposed bill would allow 10 percent of the voting population in the last gubernatorial election to submit a petition to the legislature asking to pass a bill. The bill may be passed if the legislature has no quarrels with it and it is constitutional. If it is passed by the legislature, it goes back to the voters and 10 percent of the voting population of 51 percent of Texas counties must endorse it in order that it may become law.

The process of referendum, Pinchin said, involves voting to repeal a bill which has already been passed. Voters may also ask for a constitutional amendment through referendum.

"This is one of the most important pieces of legislation brought forth in this state in the last 20 years," Pinchin said. He urged members to write to their congressmen in support of the bill.

Pfeifer told members that Aransas County Appraisal District Office Chief Appraiser Jack Groseclose would address members at the April 26 meeting.

Annexation request set for hearing

A request for annexation of a tract of land at the Glass-Perceval Avenue intersection is scheduled for public hearing at 7 p.m. Monday, March 28, at Rockport's City Hall.

The hearing will precede a joint public hearing of the council and the city planning and zoning commission at 7:15 p.m. and the regular council session set to begin at 7:30 p.m.

The annexation hearing is on a request by Rockport Alderman Murray McMillan and is the first of two hearings scheduled on the 1.0399-acre tract of land. A second hearing, to be held on the annexation site, has been called for 7 p.m. April 12.

During Monday's regular council session, city officials — who earlier this month voted to hold regular council sessions on the second and fourth Tuesday rather than Mondays each month — will be asked to consider holding their second April meeting on Monday, April 25.

Under the meeting change which the council voted for itself, the second April meeting would fall on April 26, but in February, the council set April 25 as the date for selling \$600,000 in certificates of obligation to help fund the cost of expanding the city's sanitary sewer plant.

If the council does not reschedule the regular meeting date for April 25, its members will have to call a special meeting on that date to consider the certificate sale and will be required to have two meetings that week.

'Stay Alive' emphasizes health habits

Americans are being encouraged to adopt healthier lifestyles and thereby enjoy better health and reduce health care costs.

A massive, multi-media campaign, called "Stay Alive," was recently launched by Richard S. Schweiker, then secretary, Department of Health and Human Services (HHS). "Stay Alive!" is part of the broad-based health promotion effort which includes prevention information and activities in a variety of

HHS programs, including Medicare and Head Start, plus state, local and private sector involvement.

Research tells us that by observing a few simple health habits... by not smoking, by using alcohol only in moderation, by eating three regular meals, by maintaining proper weight and getting enough sleep and regular exercise... a 45-year-old man can expect to live about 11 years longer than the man who does not follow these habits. A 45-year-old woman can expect to live about seven years longer than one who does not make these choices.

There's a growing realization among Americans that we as individuals really can influence how long and healthy our lives are. HHS wants to mobilize the public and private sectors to help make preventive health care... the foundation of health policy in

coming years.

The U.S. Public Health Service recently released its report, "Health, United States, 1982," which showed continued decreases in death rates for such diseases as cancer, heart disease and stroke. It showed that Americans continue to enjoy improved health... including higher life expectancy at birth, continued gains in immunization and advances in prenatal care with lower infant mortality rates, as well as advances in fighting cancer and heart disease.

A significant part of the credit for better health goes to increased health promotion and disease prevention efforts.

The facts do indeed show that American medical science is continuing its extraordinary progress in treating people after they get sick. But the other important message is that the next era in health care must take us a step beyond

traditional medical care... to stop illness before it strikes, through disease prevention and health promotion. We see America in 1983 as being on the verge of that next health era.

By emphasizing wellness as much as we have traditionally emphasized treating sickness, we'll not only offer Americans longer, healthier lives but also ease rising health care costs, which reached \$287 billion in 1981. The health promotion initiative marks the first time the Department of Health and Human Services has placed so much emphasis on a coordinated wellness campaign.

One important part of the effort is to correct common myths about wellness, such as the mistaken idea that it is too late to improve one's health after a certain age.

Among the numerous key elements of the plan are: a strong effort to reduce the 10,000 yearly highway deaths of teenagers and young adults, the result of alcohol abuse; coordination and encouragement of new health promotion activities by voluntary and professional groups at the state and local levels; improvement of nutrition, dental health, and medical screening for children in Head Start programs; and a series of "Eat Well, Be Well" television programs.

adults interviewed by phone said they held a very favorable or somewhat favorable opinion of waiting time from their last visit to a doctor's office.

After waiting time, other dislikes cited were payment (12 percent called it unfavorable), amount of time the doctor spent with the patient (10 percent unfavorable), and the way the doctor explained things (8 percent unfavorable).

Before being asked specifically about each of these areas, respondents were asked what they disliked most about their doctor. Forty-five percent could think of nothing.

In order of importance, factors patients considered in choosing a physician were the way the doctor talks to the patient about medical problems; how up-to-date the doctor is on medical techniques and research; the doctor's reputation; and how warm, caring and kind the doctor is. A physician's office staff and fees were considered somewhat important. How long the doctor had practiced and whether he or she had modern office equipment were considered less important.

Fifty-eight percent of those surveyed said they found their physician through recommendations by friends and relatives.

Concerning doctors' fees, 60 percent of the patients said the charge for their last visit was about right. Thirty-five percent said the fee was too high.

Patients also were asked to respond to this state-

ment: "Most doctors are more concerned about making money than with the well-being of their patients." Thirty-four percent disagreed strongly, 22 percent disagreed, 22 percent agreed strongly, 17 percent agreed and 5 percent were unsure.

And what does the public think about doctors who advertise? Seventy percent are less likely to go to a doctor who advertises, 6 percent are more likely to do so, 17 percent said it made no difference and 7 percent were unsure. More than a third of Texas patients did not think that advertising would lower a doctor's credibility and professional standing.

Patients also were asked whether they preferred a male or female doctor. Seventy-five percent said it made no difference, 22 percent preferred males, 2 percent preferred females and 1 percent was unsure.

Concerning patient involvement in medical decisions the doctor makes, 54 percent of the respondents said their involvement was about right, 43 percent want to more involved, 2 percent less involved and 1 percent had no answer.

The Texas Medical Association, a 21,500-member organization of physicians and medical students, is using the results of the survey for planning programs to better serve patients.

For the first time, Corpus Christi State University is offering persons who plan to enroll for classes during Summer Session I an opportunity to participate in an early advising and pre-registration program.

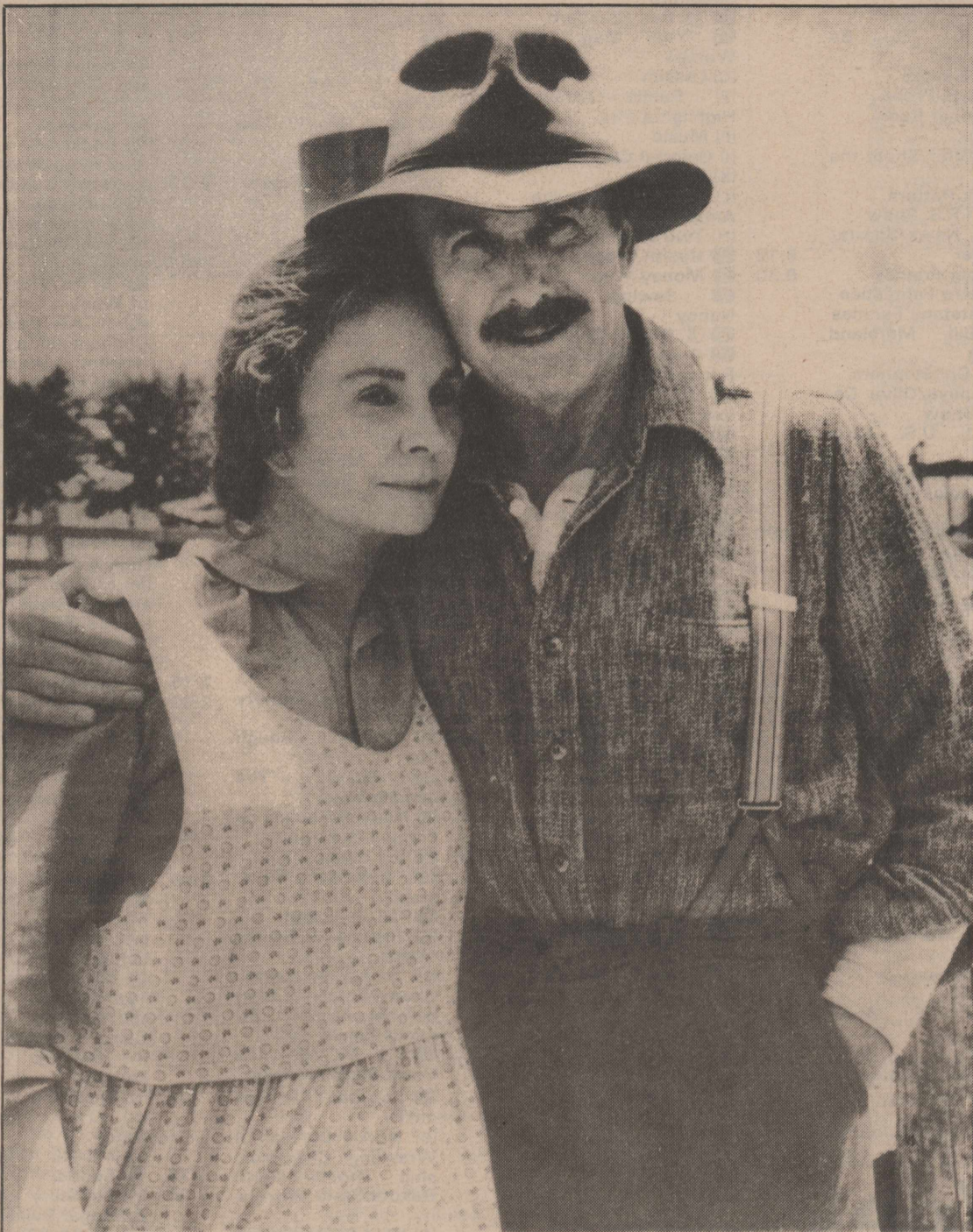
Early advising program will run Monday through Thursday, April 11-14.

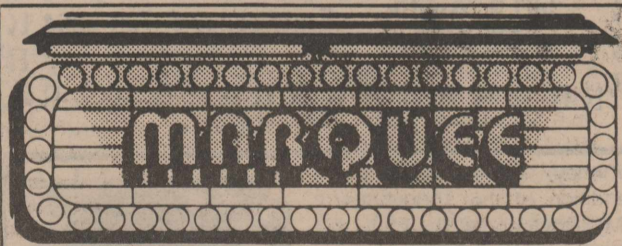

With the success of so many films from Australia, it was only a matter of time before American producers would take advantage of all that talent from Down Under. "Tender Mercies" is a good example of the notion that film has always been a collaborative, as well as universal, art form.

Combine a pair of producers who have formerly worked in the documentary field with an Australian director, make sure you have at least one certified Hollywood star and, *voila*, financing becomes available — and a feature film is born.

The producers are award-winning filmmakers Philip and Mary-Ann Hobel, who have more than 200 documentary films to their credit. They came

across the script for "Tender Mercies" written by Horton Foote, who won the Academy Award for his screenplay of "To Kill a Mockingbird." Playing Boo Radley in that film was Robert Duvall, and when friend Foote showed him the script, he agreed to be the star.

Duvall plays a former country-and-western singer who's now a penniless alcoholic. He meets a young Texas widow whose husband was killed in Vietnam after less than a year of marriage. Duvall gets a new start in life, but it's hindered by his ex-wife who is now a successful singer, singing songs that he'd written.

The script may not sound like much, but "Tender Mercies" has a quiet moving

simplicity that makes its message universally recognizable. Fate has dealt Duvall a few blows, but can he control his fate or is fate controlling him?

Australian director Beresford knows how to let the power of a screenplay come through in his visual techniques — as his "Breaker Morant" amply illustrated. Although he's never been to Texas before, Beres-

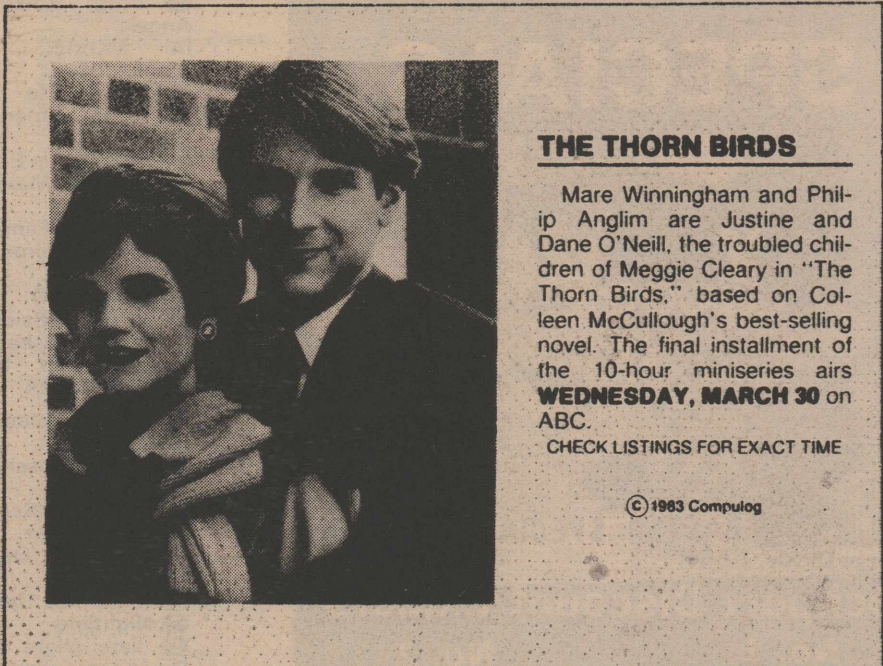
ford manages to capture the sleepy atmosphere of a lonely Texas town and its inhabitants.

This is a film with a fine, understated script, terrific performances by Duvall (he even sings well) and by newcomers Tess Harper and Allan Hubbard. "Tender Mercies" is tender, moving and definitely worth your attention.
