Munday Cagers Start Seasons with Victories

Moguls and Mogulettes expecting stiff competition from Seymour this Friday

Munday's Mogul and Mogulette basketball teams started both of their respective seasons with a pair of victories each. Both teams handed losses to Stamford and Chillicothe, and put up respectable numbers doing it.

The Mogulettes defeated Stamford by the score of 52 to 44 and hammered Chillicothe 82 to 21 in an impressive offensive and defensive performance.

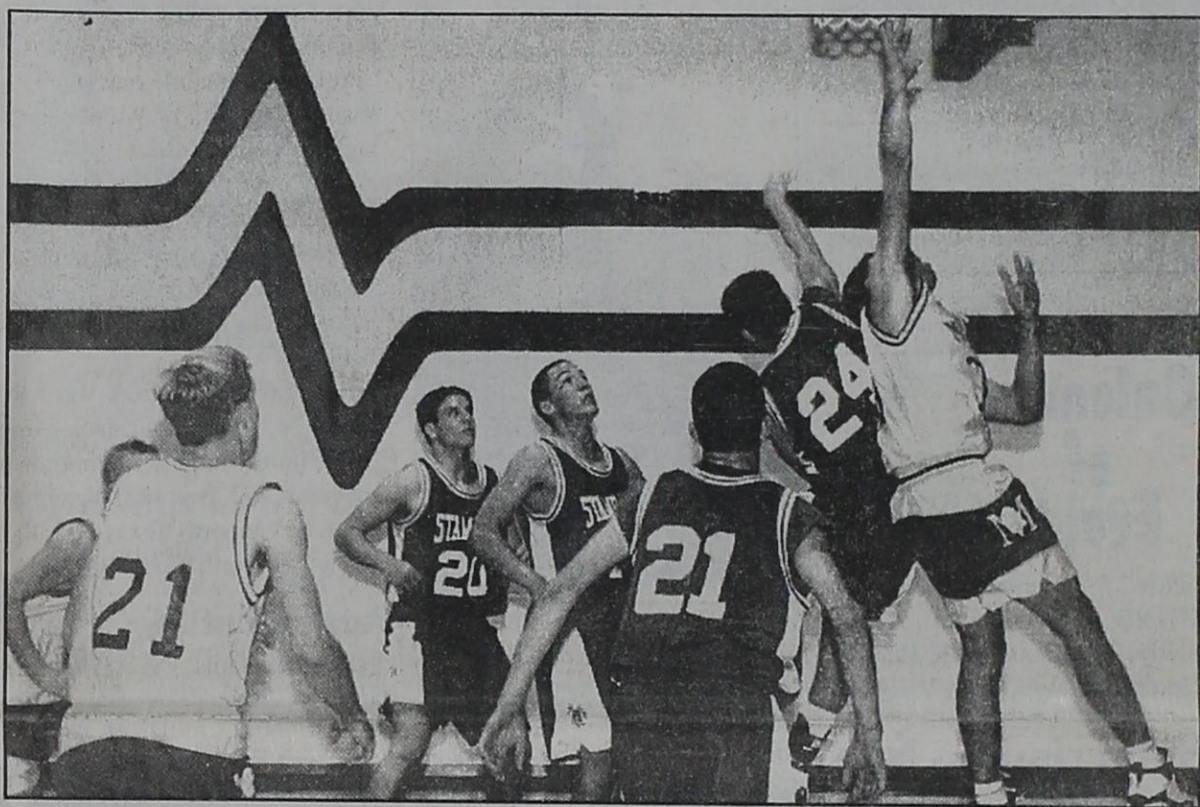
Laci Myers led the Mogulettes offensively hitting 59% of her shots from the floor including 1 three pointer, and added to her game high total of 29 points by

hitting 8 out of 16 free throws. Nicole Urbanczyk had 11 points on the night, Erica Gray hit for 4 points and Keramie Brown, Amanda Myers, Joann Thomas, and Miranda Zeissell all had 2 points each against the Stamford girls.

Coach Jeff Guice explained that he thought the girls played well for the first game of the season, but got off to a tentative start in the first half.

"In the second half we came out a little more aggressive, and got some lay-ups off of their press and that started the ball rolling our way," said Guice. "We got into our delay with about 2 minutes left, and they started fouling us, and our girls stepped up and made the shots when they had to."

The Mogulettes out hustled, out scored, and just flat out played the Chillicothe Eagles as the 82 to 21 score would indicate. Once again, Laci Myers led the offense with 25 points and 19 total rebounds, but Amanda Myers sparked the team with her 3 for 4 three point shooting and her team high 67% shooting average from the floor. Amanda added one free throw to give her a total of 20 points. Also in double figures for the Mogulettes was Keramie Brown with 11 points and Nicole Urbanczyk with 10. Erica Gray had 8 points, Miranda Zeissell had 4, and Megan Myers and Joann Thomas both had 2 points for the Mogulettes to

round out the shooting for the night.

Defensively coach Guice's Mogulettes had two girls in double figures rebounding the ball, Laci Myers with 19 and Joann Thomas with 13. All together the girls had 28 offensive rebounds giving them good looks at second shots and took the ball off the boards and out of Chillicothe's hands a total of 60 times during the game totally stifling the Eagles and keeping them

from establishing any kind of offensive rhythm.

This weekend, the Mogulettes travel to Seymour and expect to run into a solid Seymour Pantherette team. "Seymour has all of their girls back from last year, and we expect them to use a full court man to man against us and also try to hit some threes," explains coach Guice, "We'll have to be ready for them and take the opportunities they give us to win this game."

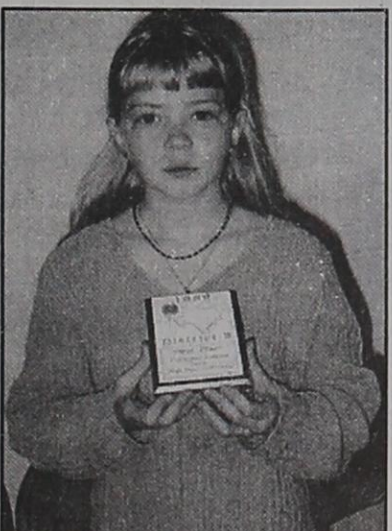
Ralph Klinkerman's Moguls showed why they're ranked at 8th in the state in one poll and 14th in another by starting their season with a 78 to 24 drubbing of the class 2A Stamford Bulldogs. The

Moguls had five shooters with double figures in the contest, B. J. Brown led with 18 points followed by Robert Dockins with 17, Alan Albus with 15, Brian Urbanczyk with 14, and Eric Beaty with 11. Lane Murphy had three points on the night a lone three pointer in the second period. The Moguls led 47 to 8 at the half smothering the Bulldogs and owning the boards all night. This activity teaches youth reasoning skills, leadership, consumer education, communication and comparison skills.

Eight Knox County 4-H members also participated in the District Foods & Nutrition Quiz Bowl. The two teams comprised of four members each were tested on their knowledge of foods and nutrition facts during the quiz competition which was set up on a single round elimination. This was the first year for 4-H to sponsor this activity.

Quiz Bowl teams were made up of Justin and Jordan Lowe - Munday, Raleigh Wilson Munday, Kiel Rowan - Knox City, Ashley Crownover - Munday, Jessica Her-

ring - Munday, Brittany Coop - Knox City and Ashton Smith - Munday. Also attending the contests with these 4-H'ers were Bobby Sosolik, Judy Lowe, Vicki Wilson, Robby Crownover, Lorrie Coop and County Extension Agent - Jane Rowan.

Participants in the two contests came from the twenty-five counties that make up the Rolling Plains Extension District.

Tony Tomlinson and Justin King both had 8 points, followed by

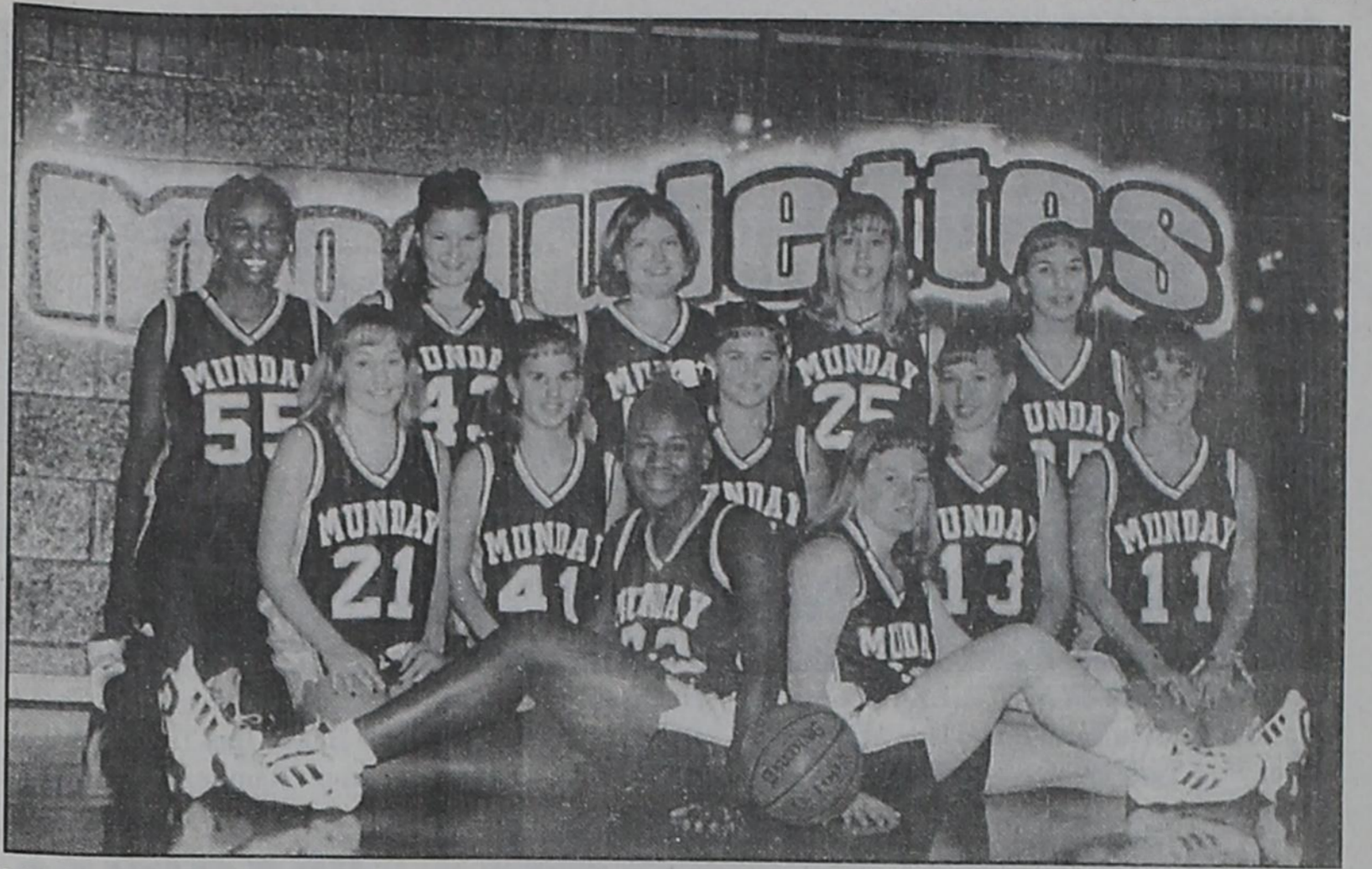
Nathan Neal with 6, and Erik Sosolik with 2.

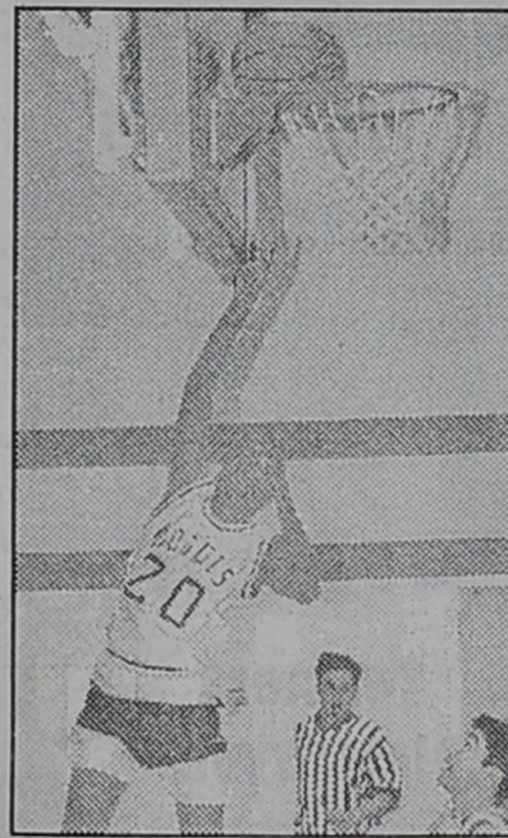

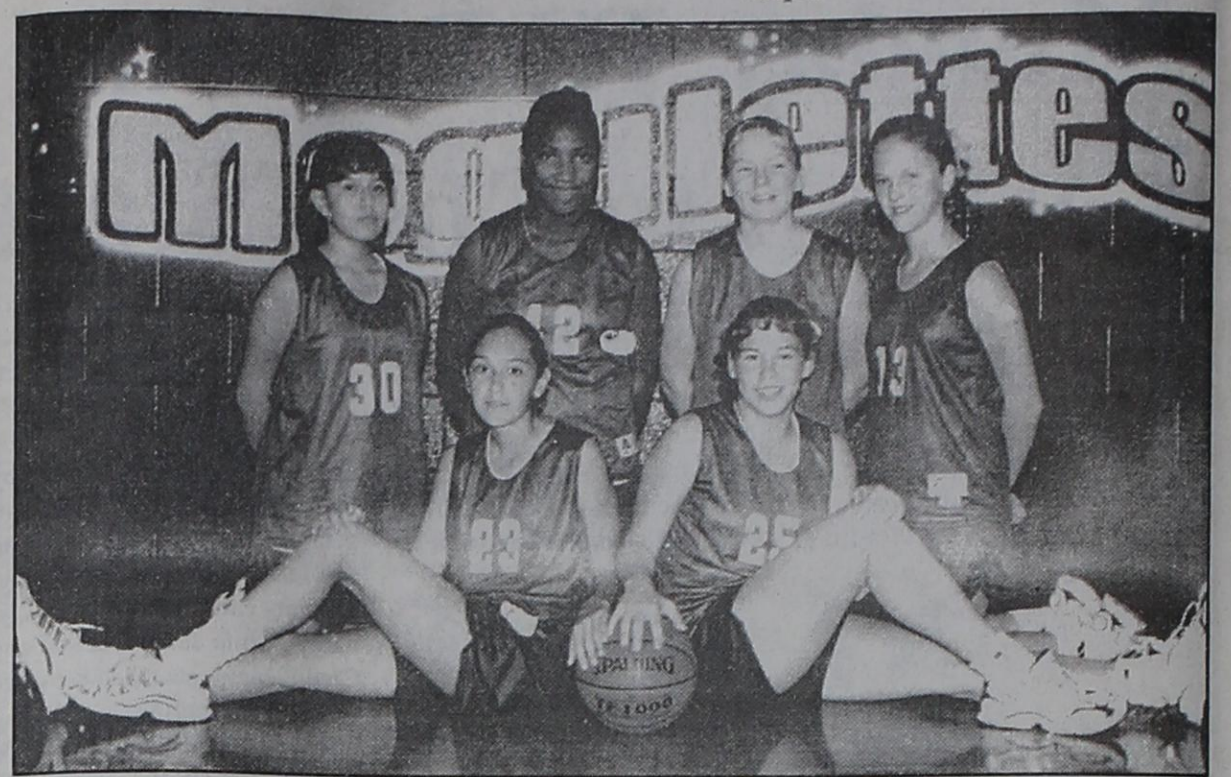

Equal pay for equal work? Really?

I like to read, and one of my favorite recreational reads is Marilyn vos Savant's column in the newspaper's Sunday Parade magazine. It's called, "Ask Marilyn" and features her answers to reader's provocative questions.

The columns vos Savant writes are witty, insightful and entertaining. I enjoy them though they seldom contain anything about small business.

This may come as a shock to Hillary Clinton fans, but vos Savant is listed in the "Guinness Book of World Records" Hall of Fame as the female with the "Highest IQ." There really is a world's smartest woman. Maybe, Hillary grew up in the wrong village. Sorry, I digress.

Recently, a reader wrote to "Ask Marilyn" with a question about why women are paid less than men for equal work. Here is an excerpt from vos Savant's reply: "Consider this: If their work is equal, why aren't employers slashing their payroll costs by hiring women instead of men? In a free market, businesses are highly competitive, and if they are paying men more than they pay women - by any percentage - there must be a reason."

Think about this

I found the above statement very thought provoking. I favor equal pay for equal work. It's fair, honest and it's common sense.

However, it doesn't always work that way. Gender gaps still exist. The latest figures I recall hearing is that women are averaging between 75 and 80 percent of what men are earning in the same jobs.

There are several possible explanations. One reason may be a woman's willingness to accept less. Some may feel that a job with only average pay is better than no job at all.

Another reason may be that some women have less experience than their associates. For example, women who stay home to raise children, may find that their male counterparts kept current with technology, industry developments and relationships.

A third explanation may be that management is still

a male dominated arena. Some managers may just feel more comfortable with other men in leadership roles. I think this is particularly true with managers who are less confident and competent. They may feel intimidated by bright, able and aggressive women.

Another possibility may be the law of supply and demand. As more and more women poured into the workforce in the 70's, 80's and 90's, the increasing supply may have contributed to lower wages.

What is equal work?

While most of us support equal pay for equal work, the tough question is, "What is equal work?" Consider these examples. First, two fourth-grade schoolteachers. Equal work justifying equal pay? In reality one teacher loves the students, spends untold hours preparing special projects and challenges the students daily. The other is just marking time until retirement.

Another example. Two truck drivers, same number of years of service and miles driven. Equal work justifying equal pay? One driver has a spotless safety record, spends hours maintaining the employer's truck and has driving habits that save the owner nearly 10 percent in fuel cost each year. The other has had two accidents in the past two years and drives the dickens out of the truck. Are both worth the same money?

One more scenario. Two retail clerks with the same experience and education. One is customer service focused, the other is looking for a real job. Are both worth the same pay?

Equal pay for equal work is a good concept that is very difficult to administer fairly. Not all employees are created equal, and not all equal work is equal. Therefore, I think our free-market system has done pretty well. Yes, there is still room for improvement, and we all should work for that.

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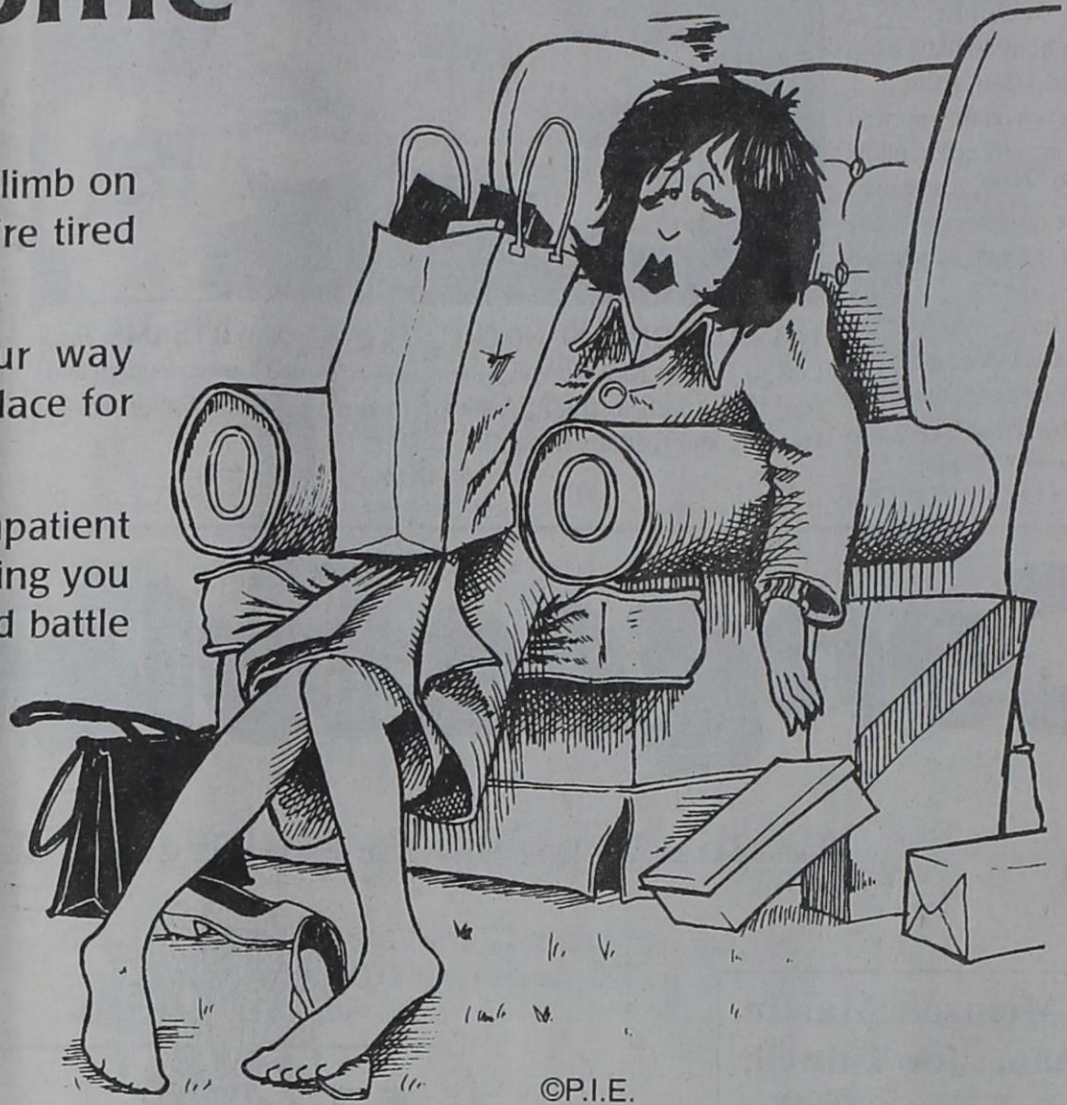
When you shop in the big city, you risk life and limb on the highway. . . have to fight heavy traffic, so you're tired before you even get started.
