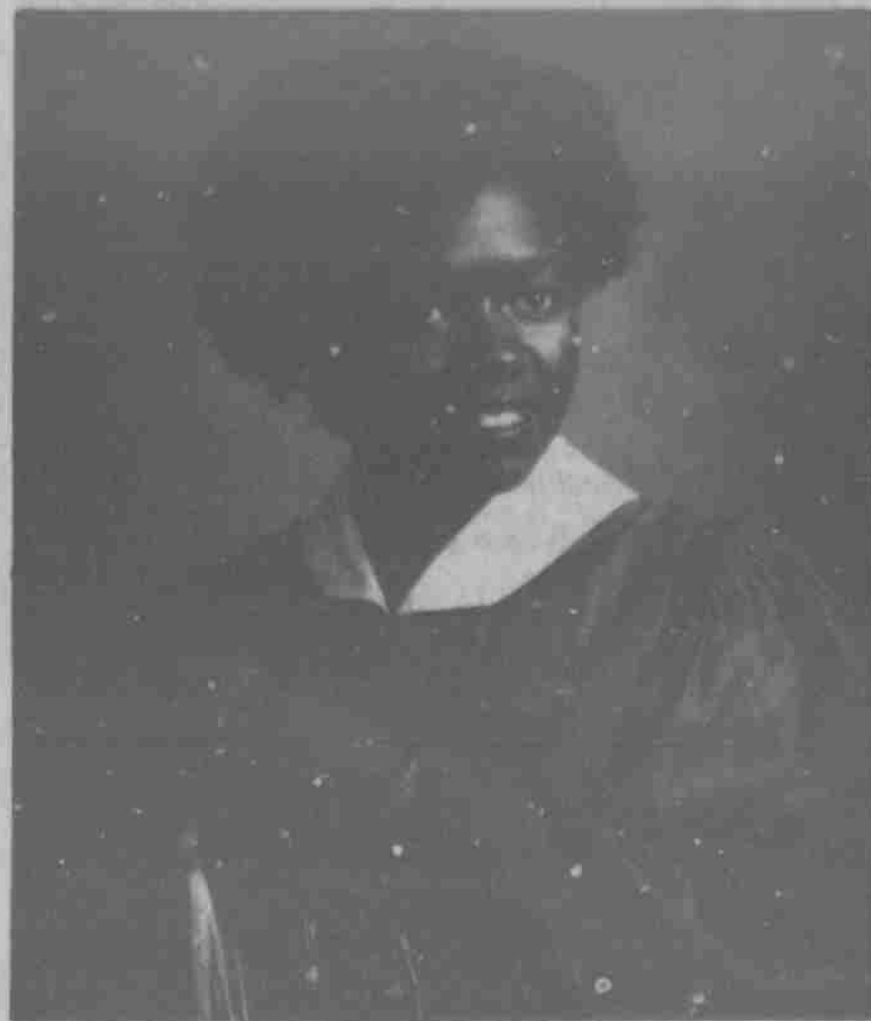


Congratulations!

Emmett Conrad Named Speaker

This is a big week in Lubbock, Texas the seventh annual Juneteenth Celebration will begin tonight, Thursday, June 18, 1987 with a reception at Mae Simmons Community beginning at 7 p. m. Special honorees will be Jerry Gray, All-Pro defensive back for the Los Angeles Rams; and Dennis Gentry, running back for the Chicago Bears. Both are products of Lubbock, Texas and graduated from Estacado High School and Dunbar High School.

Activities for the weekend will begin Friday, June 19, 1987 with a parade, beginning at 10 a. m. The gala affair in Mae Simmons Park will begin at Noon with Mayor B. C. "Peck" McMinn reading the proclamation to the Juneteenth Committee and residents of Lubbock. Other introductions will be made after Mayor McMinn's presentation.

After the opening ceremonies, the booths will open and the games will begin. This will continue throughout the evening and on Saturday, June 20th, with religious services at 2:30 p. m. at Mae Simmons Park Sunday, June 21st. Rev. J. H. Ford, pastor of St. Luke Baptist Church, will bring the message.

The highlight of the celebration will be the annual Juneteenth Scholarship Banquet which is set for

Saturday night, June 20th, beginning at 7 p. m. in the Lubbock Memorial Civic Center.

Speaker for the annual banquet will be Emmett J. Conrad. He is a surgeon at St. Paul Medical Center in Dallas, Texas where he has also served as chief of staff. He is chairman of the Board of Trustees of Huston-Tillotson College in Austin, Texas, and is a member of the Southern Methodist University Board of Trustees.

Conrad was formerly on the boards of trustees of the Public Broadcasting System and the Center for the Books at the Library of Congress. He is a former member of the Dallas School Board, former chairman of the State Advisory Committee for Career Education and served on the State Select Committee on Public Education.

Conrad and his wife, the former Eleanor Nelson of Champaign, Ill., have a daughter, Cecilia Ann, who is assistant professor of economics at Barnard College-Columbia University in New York City.

Conrad serves as secretary to the State Board of Education and is also a member of its Committee for Long-Range Planning and Committee for Personnel.

We Must Do Our Part!

Since others have spoken for us; since we reached these shores; it is not only time for us to speak for ourselves; it is also time for us to speak for others. For us as a people to make it to full participation in the American structure, we must cast our buckets where we are and use what we got. Get smart; not mad. Work together collectively for the good of all of us. Not divided, splintered, split up and going everyone on his or her own way. The cliché: "together we stand; divided we fall." So let's start here this day, this people, this time to work to help ourselves.

So now, let's look at our role. **Black Community Priorities - Casting Down Our Buckets Where We Are.** One of the major objectives of every group of responsible people is to take their rightful place, by reaching out, in mutual interdependency roles with other peoples. However, a necessary precedence in acceptance of the responsibility and/or privilege of interdependence is independences nonetheless,

we are faced with the costly and devastating fact that 33 years after the historic 1954 U. S. Supreme Court decision on school desegregation now nearly 50% of our nation's Black youth are "functional illiterates." These Black youth, as such, and along with many others, are forced to be in a dependency role on society as a whole.

There must be a re-assessment of our immediate goals and priorities. Something must be done immediately to change our past and present policies of paternalism, largesses and irresponsibility - encouragement that dependency, into positive policies that call for an encourage, excellence in education, equitable opportunities for achievement and community pride that builds self-reliance and independence. Therefore, our communities and nation's urgent priorities during the 1980's call for a shift away from certain kinds of "intergration" or reaching out and immediate emphasis on the things necessary within our communities to save our presently denied youth and millions of others in our communities, where there appears for many no other way out than a life of idleness of crime ... all spelling out non-productive and negative dependency.

Accordingly, to eliminate these burdensome needs from within Black America. We have chosen as our over-all theme for the 1980's, "**Casting Down Our Buckets Where We Are.**" This new emphasis, or priority, will have to involve getting all of our **Black Community Organizations and Institutions** together to encourage our youth and others to take pride in preparing themselves early to be our community's economic builders. This means new forms of massive training to take over our Black Community's needs for Black brick layers, Black carpenters, Black electricians, Black street sweepers, as well as Black policeman, Black teachers, i. e.

Ellis Elementary School is in the Black Community. It is a special magnet school in the Black Community with mostly white students. Nearly Zero Black teachers. This is a negative image. Even the school is mostly white. There should be more Black teachers in the Black Community to portray a positive Black image. These white youngsters see the same thing in the Black Community as they see in their community. There needs to be some Black images. Even for white youngsters, especially in the Black Community.

We need Black firemen, Black doctors, Black lawyers, Black merchants, etc. It also calls for new forms for partnerships. Whereby we simultaneously can encourage the Black Community to selectively support those white-owned **businesses and institutions** which have policies that tend to build our long-denied communities in an **equitable manner.**

This new priority of rebuilding our communities from within, calls for new roles for all in the Black Community. It means that the Black Press and others will have to examine every possible way we can "pull up our communities by whatever bootstraps"

we have, as we seek the long-overdue and deserved support required of the white community. However, the leadership to make our communities the responsible and self-sustaining market place must come from within our communities.

It's nearly 10 p. m., where are your kids. Could save a lot of kids from a life of crime!!

Another Point Of View

In our June 11, 1987 issue, we reported some phone calls on an alleged incident at Bill's No. 2, located near Brooks Super Market.

After about three telephone conversations with Manager Mehdi Tenni, we went to the place and personally talked with him in order to get his side of the story. After our visit, we found out we had a parent problem.

On the day of the incident, Tenni reported 5 or 6 teenage youth playing the video machines from about 11 a. m. until 4:05 p. m. FREE, by using coat hangers and other foreign objects to trip the machines. This happens frequently.

Tenni reports he was in the back of his establishment when the young man began kicking the machine. The youth was told to stop by an employee. The young man's reply, according to Tenni, was: "I'm going to kick it because I lost my

money." He continued to kick the machine, and Tenni told him: "I'll throw you out." In an attempt to remove the youth, he kicked Tenni's foot and resisted being removed from the establishment. This is what was apparently seen by witnesses.

According to Tenni, the young man then wanted to use the telephone to call his uncle. Tenni said the uncle did come by and cussed him out and threatened him. But, get this, later the uncle came back and apologized and said his nephew had caused the problems.

Police have been called several other times for the unruly youngsters who apparently are junior high school students who attend Alderson Junior High School.

Our recommendation was to get the names and call parents. His reply to this recommendation was: "I have tried many times, but the kids give me the wrong names and telephone numbers or say they have no telephones. Some parents even argue and tell us to remove the machines."

Tenni reported most of the troublemakers run around in groups and use profanity.

The video machines are all heavily barred, with large locks,

because the kids supposedly take the money from them. Tenni said, with emotion, "The largest mistake I made was to throw the kid out. Most of the kids are good mannerable kids. The smaller ones and larger ones are no problems. The problems come from the junior high school age kids. Just recently, one kid unplugged the microphone. When asked why he did it, he said 'I'm grown.'"

As stated last week, we will not stand for merchants misusing our young people as has happened with some establishments in the community in the past. **On the other hand, parents need to train and raise their children and teach them to respect other people's property/business and have better control of them, and know where they are and what they are doing.** Our friend at Brooks Super Market (Gilbert) suggested we talk to Mr. Mehdi Tenni, and we're glad we did. You were right, Gilbert, he is a very nice person, and we had a bad reading on him and should hear his side of the story. We did that, and respect the people at Brooks Super Market, because they are friends of the community, and has been for many years. We respect their opinion.

When one read I Samuel 18, the immediate attention getter is the jealousy of King Saul toward David. David troubles began when he and the Israelite army returned from war against the Philistines. As was customary, the women expressed their delight in victory by greeting their conquering general with a triumphal procession. As they followed along, they danced, played instrumental music and engaged in responsive singing. These Hebrew women were merely paying the customary honors to David as deliverer of their country from the enemy by chanting, "Saul hath slain his thousands, and David his ten thousands." However, they committed a great indication by praising David at the expense of Saul, the King. Jealousy reared its ugly head.

From the moment that Saul heard the words sung by the women, he was very angry. A bitter suspicion haunted his dark mind and he eyed David with hate in his eyes and heart. In his blind, jealous rage, he attempted over and over again to take the life of his once-loved friend. But God was always standing by to protect David because "David behaved himself wisely in all his ways" (18:14), in spite of his treatment at the hands of Saul.

When those around you would seek to destroy your influence, your position, etc., because of a jealous heart, behave wisely and take it to God in prayer.

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"THE ORDINANCE OF BAPTISM"

We believe that Christian baptism is (a) the immersion in water of a believer; (b) in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost, with the authority of the local church; (c) to show forth in a solemn and beautiful emblem our faith in the crucified, buried and risen Saviour, with its effect in our death to sin and resurrection to a new life; (d) that it is prerequisite to the privileges of a church relation and to the Lord's supper; (e) in which the members of the church, by the sacred use of bread and the fruit of the vine are to commemorate together the dying love of Christ; (f) preceded always by solemn self-examination.

*** (a) Acts 8:36-39. "And the eunuch said, See here is water; what doth hinder me to be baptized? And Philip said, If thou believest with all thine heart, thou mayest. . . And they went down both into the water, both Philip and the eunuch; and he baptized him. And when they were come up out of the water, the Spirit of the Lord caught away Philip."

Matt. 3:6. "And were baptized of him in Jordan, confessing their sins."

John 3:23. "And John also was baptizing in Enon near to Salim, because there was much water there: and they came, and were baptized."
