Rockefeller, Nixon Meet

WASHINGTON (AP)—Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller of New York said after meeting with Vice President Richard M. Nixon today there is no struggle for power in the Republican party.

Rockefeller said he and the vice president have agreed they must cooperate to make the party a "positive, progressive force in America."

The governor, however, did not back down from statements he has made in the last few days which question the role of Nixon in the party.

Rockefeller again agreed that Nixon is the titular head of the party. But he said that National Chairman Thurston B. Morton is the actual head of the GOP because the national committee is the vehicle through which the party operates.

Rockefeller passed up an opportunity to give Morton full endorsement for re-election as chairman. He praised Morton, long-known as a Nixon supporter, as an outstanding leader.

But, when asked if he thought another man should be national chairman, Rockefeller merely said it was not his position to name the chairman—the national committee does that.

The meeting between Nixon and Rockefeller was their first since early in the campaign.

Rockefeller had been a rival for the Republican nomination before the GOP convention, and the two possibly could battle for the nomination in 1964.

They met in Nixon's Capitol office for an hour and a half. After the session, Rockefeller answered questions by waiting newsmen.

He said both he and Nixon recognized the magnitude of the international and national problems faced by the country and agreed that the party must take a positive rather than a negative position.

He added that in working to keep the party united he and Nixon will keep in touch through the national chairman and other channels of party communication.

Rockefeller parried several questions about his plans and proposals for the national scene in the next few years. He repeated that he will seek re-election as governor in 1962.

Rockefeller's reiteration that he considers Nixon the party's leader in name only, admitted a disagreement with President Eisenhower who had indirectly taken issue with Rockefeller's earlier statement.

Eisenhower said at a White House dinner Wednesday night that Nixon should be regarded as head of the party the next four years.

Asked for comment on Eisenhower's view after visiting the President at the White House Thursday, Rockefeller told newsmen:

"I wouldn't want to debate with the President on that subject."

Thursday night Eisenhower renewed his statement this time with Rockefeller in the audience.

At another White House dinner, with the New York governor and Mrs. Rockefeller among the guests, Eisenhower repeated the toast in which he had dubbed Nixon as party chief.

Asked today if he had drunk a toast with Eisenhower to Nixon as head of the party, Rockefeller said the GOP standard bearer, Rockefeller laughed and replied: "I certainly did, wouldn't you?"

Signals From Red Space Ship Stop

LONDON (AP)—British scientists reported that signals from the latest Soviet space ship stopped today.

Prof. Bernard Lovell, director of the radio telescope at Jodrell Bank, said this could mean one of three things—the satellite has landed under command, it has burned up in the atmosphere, or it has suffered electronic failure.

Earlier today its signals were heard by two research stations in southern England. Listeners described them as fairly weak because at that time the satellite was at its extreme distance from the earth.

Rocket Fragments Touch Off Big Hostility Wave In Cuba

By ROBERT BERRELLEZ, HAVANA, Cuba (AP)—Bitter anti-American hostility in the government-controlled press and radio suggested today that a heated protest is being planned on a shower of U. S. space rocket fragments that landed on Cuban soil. The case may reach the United Nations.

Prime Minister Fidel Castro's government has already charged the United States with aggression before the world organization. Debate on this is due during the current U. N. General Assembly session, and may be raised then.

Pieces of the rocket—some reportedly as heavy as 40 pounds—were taken to Oriente Province military headquarters at Palma Soriano for close examination by government officials.

Authorities at nearby Higuain reported the rocket pieces plumed onto a hillside near the city about 3 p. m. Wednesday. This was about 10 minutes after a rocket test was fired from Cape Canaveral, Fla., in an attempt to put two satellites in orbit. The rocket was blown up in flight by remote control after a malfunction developed.

An Air Force spokesman in Washington said the serial numbers reported in the Cuban press make it likely that the fragments came from the defective rocket.

Lumumba Captured By Troops

WASHINGTON (AP)—President-elect John F. Kennedy today announced his selection of David E. Bell, professor of economics at Harvard, as his budget director.

Kennedy made the announcement from the doorway of his Georgetown home to shivering newsmen standing on the sidewalk in near freezing weather.

Bell, 41, secretary of Harvard Littauer Center for Public Administration, stood by the president-elect's side as Kennedy made the announcement.

The first job for Bell, who served as an administrative assistant in the administration of President Harry S. Truman, will be to serve as liaison officer for the incoming Kennedy administration in discussions with Eisenhower's budget director, Maurice E. Stans.

After that he will have to start tailoring Eisenhower budget recommendations to the Kennedy pattern.

The post to which Kennedy appointed Bell is a key one in any administration.

The selection of Bell is the third top-level assignment made by Kennedy outside of his immediate White House staff.

He tabbed Gov. G. Mennen Williams of Michigan Thursday for assistant secretary of state for African affairs, and later named Connecticut's Gov. Abraham Ribicoff to be secretary of health, education and welfare.

Kennedy said Bell will start work next week, at the Budget Bureau "if this is agreeable to the President," (Eisenhower) but in any event will start his tasks at the beginning of the week.

The president-elect said Mike Feldman, a member of his Senate office staff, will serve as an assistant to Bell until the start of the Kennedy administration, then shift over to become a member of the White House staff.

Kennedy and Bell had never met until they conferred at length at the president-elect's home Wednesday evening. Bell had been highly recommended by Truman administration officials.

Bell, 6 feet 4, is a native of California and was graduated from Pomona College there. Later he received his master's degree in economics at Harvard and then won a one-year fellowship at the Littauer Public Administration School.

He joined the Budget Bureau in 1942 as an analyst in the war organization school, but left shortly to enlist in the Marine Corps.

In 1945 he returned to the Budget Bureau and quickly became top economist in the fiscal division. He came to the attention of Truman's special counsel, Charles Murphy, who had him transferred to the White House for work on presidential messages and other legislative and executive assignments.

Eventually he was appointed an administrative assistant to Truman.

Kennedy, hatless in the chill, stood before his front door to make the announcement today with Bell at his side.

In reply to questions, he said he was not intent on the fiscal division at the Budget Bureau from now to Jan. 20, the president-elect said Clark Clifford, his liaison man will discuss this at once with the Eisenhower administration.

Kennedy said the nation and the administration are fortunate to have a man of Bell's experience.

"I am delighted he has been able to arrange his affairs so he can come with us," Kennedy said.

Bell's salary will be \$22,500 a year.

After announcing the Williams appointment Thursday, Kennedy met with Robert A. Lovett, a Republican who was secretary of defense and under secretary of state in the Truman administration.

Belgium Ired By Seizure

BRUSSELS, Belgium (AP)—The Belgian government today instructed its ambassador in Cairo to lodge a strong protest with the United Arab Republic over President Gamal Abdel Nasser's seizure of Belgian firms.

Public Health Minister Paul Meyers announced the move after a Cabinet meeting. He added that the Belgian envoy in Cairo is being recalled for consultations.

A government statement said Belgium will seek international redress unless adequate compensation is paid for the properties. Political sources said this probably means the International Court at the Hague.

The government said the reason the U. A. R. gave for the seizures "defies law and common sense."

The Cairo press viewed the move as retaliation against the expansion of the U. A. R. envoy from the Congo. It blamed Belgian advisers in the Congo for the ouster.

The government said two firms were nationalized by the U. A. R., the Belgian International Bank in Egypt, and the Cairo Electric Railways & Helipolis Oasis Co.

Informed sources placed the value of all the properties at \$10 million.

Economic spokesmen pointed out that the U. A. R. already had part control over Belgian companies in Egypt.

Two Missionaries Slain In Congo

ELISABETHVILLE, the Congo (AP)—Two evangelical missionaries, a British and the other New Zealand—were hacked to death by Baluba tribesmen in north Katanga last week, it was learned officially in Elisabethville today.

The men are Elton George Behrent Knays, 50, of New Plymouth, New Zealand, and Edmund Hodgson, 62, of Blackpool, England.

Boycott Losing Grip

NEW ORLEANS (AP)—Ten white students returned to classes at integrated William Frantz school today, sharply undermining the boycott backed by mothers of the area.

A small foreign car with two girls drove up in the sunny, but near-freezing weather, catching reduced picket lines by surprise, apparently.

No one jeered until the two little girls mounted the school steps. Then the same make car sped up with five children, and the Rev. Lloyd Foreman arrived by car with his daughter, Pamela Lynn, and two boys.

The one Negro first-grade girl brought total attendance at William Frantz to at least 11.

Only three Negro girls attended the city's other integrated school, McDonough No. 19, at the normal opening hour.

Temperatures that dipped during the night into the low 30s cut the number of picketing mothers to about a dozen. One of these mothers told a reporter:

"You don't know how we are suffering. Our feet are freezing."

The reporter said: "You can go home."

"You think we don't have to stay?" the woman asked. "We're working, too; we can't leave."

Only three Negro girls didn't pack the volume of Thursday at William Frantz, and at McDonough only about 10 women hooded as seven U. S. deputy marshals escorted three Negro girls into school.

Mobutu Says Trial Is True

By MICHAEL GOLDSMITH, Leopoldville, the Congo (AP)—Col. Joseph Mobutu announced today that his soldiers arrested Patrice Lumumba and had threatened to shoot the ex-premier. Mobutu said he sent strict orders that Lumumba was not to be harmed.

Relaxed and smiling, the Congo army leader received reporters at his home to tell about the capture. Mobutu said a plane is en route to bring Lumumba back here from Port Francqui, where he was arrested.

Six companions also were taken into custody just four days after Lumumba fled his guarded residence in this capital, presumably to head for Stanleyville and an effort to seize power.

Mobutu said soldiers holding Lumumba threatened to shoot him "as a traitor" if he was not collected from them by 2 p. m.

"I told them a commander does not accept that sort of ultimatum from his subordinates," Mobutu declared. "They have been warned that any man who harms Lumumba will have to answer for his acts."

"Lumumba will be brought back to Leopoldville to face trial," he said.

Mobutu said a plane has been sent from Leopoldville to Luluabourg to collect Lumumba and the four persons arrested with him. There is no airfield at Port Francqui large enough for this plane to land, so a smaller plane probably will deliver Lumumba and the other prisoners to Luluabourg tonight or Saturday.

Among those arrested with Lumumba was Antet Kashamura, Communist-leaning information minister in Lumumba's deposed government.

Mobutu said Lumumba would be tried for inciting the army to rebellion and other "common law crimes."

He said he had received information that the population of Port Francqui booted and seceded Lumumba as he was escorted through the town and called him "Judas and traitor."

The arrest, he said, was made by a company of 120 military police stationed at Port Francqui. Lumumba reached the Kasai River port by automobile after a desperate four-day flight across the wild bush country east of the capital. Port Francqui is 400 miles in a straight line from Leopoldville, but the distance of his tortuous jungle tracks is much greater.

Mobutu claimed the area is completely under the control of his men. He expressed confidence his orders would be obeyed to the letter and that Lumumba would arrive in the capital within a day or two.

He said he would call off the nationwide hue and cry for Lumumba's followers, issued after Lumumba's flight Sunday.

"Now that I have Lumumba and Kashamura, that is all I need," he said. "The others are no longer any danger."

Warm-Up For State Seen

Temperatures dipped below freezing in several sections of the state early this morning but the warm-up here continued over most of Texas today.

Seven Perish When Blaze Levels House

LA PLATA, Md. (AP)—"Throw out the children, then jump yourself," called the trapped wife of a tenant farmer to her 21-year-old daughter.
The daughter—Rose Ella Powell—three nine brothers and sisters from the second story of the frame house better searing flames swept through the entire structure. Seven members of the family, including Mr. and Mrs. Robert Dana Powell and five children died in the fire.
The entire frame building had become "one big torch" by the time firemen arrived, and two fire companies stood by helplessly. Flames were so intense that the seventh body was not recovered until three hours after the alarm sounded this morning.
The burning house, which was in a tobacco-raising area of southern Maryland's Charles County, was spotted by several neighbors who called the alarm. Authorities believe the blaze may have started with an overheated wood-burning stove on the first floor.
Rose Ella and the nine surviving children she rescued received first aid for sprains and bruises. The Negro girl told firemen she had been awakened by her mother's call to leave the children. Mrs. Powell and all the other victims but one were sleeping on the first floor.
Killed in the fire were Powell, 43, and his wife Viola, 45; their four children, James Henry, 12; Barbara Regina, 10; John Allen, 8; and Joseph, 3; and an 11-year-old cousin of the Powell's Phillip G. Yates.

Morton In Thick Of Vote Fight

CHICAGO (AP)—The Republican national chairman headed into the thick of the Illinois post-election ballot battle today.
The chairman, Thurston B. Morton, who is directing his party's investigation of alleged fraud charges, arranged a news conference at the headquarters of the Midwest Volunteers for Nixon-Lodge.
At City Hall, a check is being made of paper ballots cast in 906 precincts in Chicago and Cook County.
In the first 30 precincts re-examined President-elect John F. Kennedy had a net gain of 60 votes and Richard M. Nixon had a net gain of 43.
But Republican watchers said Nixon had a net gain of 163 votes in the 22 precincts examined. The GOP watchers disregarded ballots that were spoiled or improperly marked. The other counties didn't.
Kennedy on the basis of reports from the state's 102 counties won the state's 27 electoral votes by a margin of 8,849 votes. But Gov. William G. Stratton has said the state's Democratic electors may not be certified by the Illinois Electoral Board if it receives substantial evidence of fraud in the election. Stratton is chairman of the Republican-controlled board.
The board is expected to meet in Springfield next week.
The check Thursday showed a net gain of 119 for State's Atty. Benjamin S. Adamowski, Republican who lost to Democrat Daniel Ward by 26,600 votes. Ward had a net loss of 35.

Early Session Not Planned

AUSTIN (AP)—Gov. Price Daniel has turned down a proposal to call a special session of the legislature to elect a speaker of the House of Representatives.
Rep. James Cotten of Weatherford suggested the session last week.

He said it would save the state time and money by giving the speaker an opportunity to organize house committees by the time the regular session began Jan. 10.
Daniel said Thursday the law expressly forbids convening the legislature until the second Tuesday in January.
"I think it would merely add to the cost and confusion to attempt an earlier organization and election of a speaker under the law which now governs such matters," Daniel wrote Cotten.
He added that a special session of the current 56th Legislature could not elect a speaker for the 57th Legislature.

Vivien Leigh Gets Divorce

LONDON (AP)—Actress Vivien Leigh was granted a divorce today from Sir Laurence Olivier on grounds of Olivier's adultery with actress Joan Plowright.
Miss Plowright's husband, actor Roger Leonard Gage, was given a divorce in the same court on the same grounds.
Neither Sir Laurence nor Miss Plowright defended the suits against them. Neither was present in court.
Olivier was ordered to pay the costs of both his wife's and Gage's suits.
Gage said his wife—now appearing in New York in "A Taste of Honey"—and Sir Laurence committed adultery in London last June.
Miss Leigh, 47, won her divorce on grounds of the same adultery.
Sir Laurence, 53, and Miss Leigh married in 1949.
Gage and Miss Plowright, 28, married in 1953.

Claims Williams Rated A Top Post

FORT WORTH (AP)—Sen. Paul H. Douglas (D-Ill.) said Thursday night that Gov. G. Mennen Williams of Michigan should have been given a Cabinet post instead of the one he received in the Kennedy administration.
Douglas expressed the view during a panel discussion before about 1,000 persons at Texas Christian University here.
Douglas said the job as assistant secretary of state for African affairs does not measure up to Williams' talents.
In announcing Williams' appointment, Kennedy said he considers the post "second to none in the administration" because Africa has developed into a major battleground in the cold war.
While criticizing the Williams appointment, Senator Douglas praised another that Kennedy made public, the choice of Connecticut Gov. Abraham Ribicoff as secretary of health, education and welfare.
Asked who he thought would make a good secretary of state for the new Democratic administration, the senator laughed.
"We just—dare with talent. Unlike the Republicans, who have just one or two we have a whole truck full."
He mentioned a few—Chester Bowles, Aimee Stevenson, Averell Harriman, Dean Acheson and others. He refused, however, to rank them in order of preference.
Other feelings expressed by Douglas:
1. Vic President-elect Lyndon B. Johnson helped the Democrats cause "very noticeably" in the South.
2. A recount of Illinois votes would increase, rather than diminish Kennedy's margin of victory in that state.
3. The electoral college should be abolished and presidents elected by popular vote, but this probably could never be done because of resistance of smaller states.
4. There are now in the nation the "usual signs" of a recession.
5. The senator stopped short of saying that there actually is a recession now.
6. The Defense Department wastes "tremendous amounts" of money through "negotiated contracts." He cited a case in which the Navy paid \$21.10 each for light sockets you can buy wholesale for 11 cents each.
7. Earlier, talking with reporters, the senator said the rough and tumble grilling a president faces in White House press conferences may be dangerous in today's world.
8. The reason, the senator said, is that the president may accidentally say something about foreign policy that ought not to be said. He suggested it might be better to have reporters submit questions in writing to the president.

Britons Say U. S. Aided Ford Deal

LONDON (AP)—The U.S. Treasury was the target of British criticism today stemming from reports it intervened in the bid by the Ford Motor Co. of Detroit to buy complete control of its British subsidiary.
This move forces Ford to choose between breaking its accord to British shareholders and appearing unpatriotic in America and unhelpful to President Eisenhower, commented the Daily Mail.
On Nov. 4, Ford announced it would offer \$20.50 a share for the outstanding 40.6 per cent of the stock of British Ford which it did not already hold. This would amount to about \$200 million if accepted by all British stockholders.
On the strength of the Detroit bid, approved by the British government, the value of British Ford shares soared.
Reports spread that Secretary of the Treasury Robert B. Anderson had appealed to Henry Ford II to consider American's gold and dollar drain before going through with the deal and the shares fell sharply Thursday.
After the stock market closed, the British Treasury made it clear it would insist the deal be financed by dollars and said payment in shares or in sterling would not be acceptable.
Henry Ford II said in Detroit that he discussed the British purchase with Anderson in mid-November.

Candied Orange Peel For Holidays

KNOW ANY devotees of candied orange peel? Then make this interesting confection to serve with other sweet snacks during the holidays—or any time.

Like to give economical gifts from your kitchen? The candied peel is a perfect offering because its making takes more time than money. Only ingredients needed: oranges and a syrup made of sugar, corn syrup and water. For a glamorous flavor—addition, the ends of the candied peel are dipped in melted chocolate.

FLORENTINE ORANGE PEEL
4 to 6 medium sized oranges
2 teaspoon salt
2 cup sugar
1/4 cup light corn syrup
1 cup water
1/2 cup semi-sweet chocolate pieces

Choose thick-skinned oranges of a good color and free from blemishes. Wash oranges; make lengthwise cuts; on peel down to pulp membrane so there are 4 to 6 sections; with fingers pull off peel. Cover peel with cold water; add salt; bring to a boil; boil 10 minutes; drain. Repeat boiling and draining 2 more times, each time covering with fresh cold water and omitting salt. If white membrane is extra thick, with bowl of spoon gently remove some of it; peel should be about 1/4 inch thick. Cut peel into strips with scissors. Mix 2 cups sugar, corn syrup and water in a 3 - quart saucepan. Cook over moderate heat, stirring constantly, until sugar is dissolved. Add orange peel; bring to a boil. Reduce heat and boil gently 45 minutes. Drain in coarse strainer or colander, reserving syrup. Roll peel, a few pieces at a time, in extra sugar; arrange in a single layer on trays; let dry about 24 hours. Melt chocolate in top of double boiler over hot water. Dip place on waxed paper until chocolate hardens. Wrap tightly in transparent plastic wrapping; store in covered container. Makes about 10 ounces.

To use reserved syrup: After draining peel, bring syrup to a full rolling boil; cool; refrigerate covered. Use as a sauce for a dessert, waffles or pancakes.

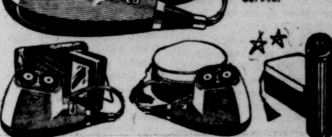

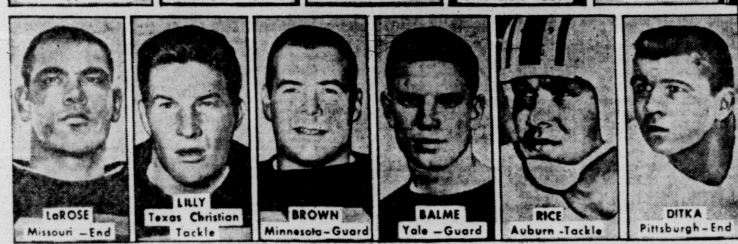

NEW YORK (AP)—A mammoth line and a backfield built around Navy's Joe Bellino, the Heisman Award winner, highlight the 1960 All-America announced today by The Associated Press.

With Bellino in the backfield are Jake Gibbs, Mississippi; Pervis Atkins, New Mexico State; and Bob Ferguson, Ohio State.

The line is composed of Dan LaRose, Missouri, 221 pounds, and Mike Ditka, Pitt., 218, ends; Ken Rice, Auburn, 250, and Bob Lilly, Texas Christian, 248, tackles; Tom Brown, Minnesota, 224, and Ben Balme, Yale, 215, guards; and Roy McKasson, Washington, 205, center.

The team was selected on the graded recommendations of eight regional boards of sports writers and newsmen who also voted on the top ten throughout the season. All games through Nov. 26 were taken into account.

Bellino was a standout in a season in which, generally, attention centered on the line rather than the backfield. He scored 110 points for Navy's Orange Bowl-bound team, including 18 touchdowns, and gained 834 yards rushing, 280 yards catching 17 passes, and threw five passes for 115 yards. The 5-8, 181-pound halfback wound up his academy career in a blaze.

of glory by intercepting a pass on the goal line in the closing moments of the Army-Navy game, saving Navy's 17-12 lead.

Atkins, 25, a wingback, carried the ball 65 times for 611 yards in New Mexico State's unbeaten season. He caught 24 passes for 468 yards. He stands 6-1 and weighs 190 and was drafted before his senior year by the Los Angeles Rams.

Ferguson, the only junior on the team, is a 217-pounder who was moved from halfback to fullback and crashed through for Ohio State with 13 touchdowns and 853 yards rushing.

Gibbs, who weighs 185, completed 66 of 109 passes for 970 yards and 12 touchdowns, and wound up the regular season by connecting on 13 of 15 passes against Mississippi State. He also was rated the most dangerous runner on an unbeaten but once

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Junior Editors Quiz on YEAST



QUESTION: Where do you get yeast?

ANSWER: Yeast is used in a variety of ways, but the way we know best is in bread. Yeast makes bread dough rise so that the bread is light. Yeast is really a very tiny plant, belonging to the group known as "fungi." Microscopists are of this same group in 1857, the French scientist, Cagniard de La Tour, discovered that yeasts increase by budding. He also found that these plants can act on sugar to change it to alcohol—a very important chemical change which is part of the process of fermentation. While the yeast plants grow they produce substances known as enzymes. In the making of bread, the enzymes attack the starch in the flour and change it to sugar. The sugar is then changed to alcohol and carbon dioxide gas and the gas bubbles up through the mixture, making the mass light and porous. During the baking, the alcohol evaporates and the yeast plants are destroyed. The tiny yeast plants are found floating in the air almost everywhere.

FOR YOU TO DO: It is very simple to see how yeast makes dough rise. Get some dough when mother is doing some baking, or make some yourself. Add the yeast, and then in about two hours you'll see that the dough has almost doubled in size.

Juvenile Problems Face Legislature

AUSTIN (AP)—Juvenile delinquency and other youth problems are among problems the legislature will be asked to remedy. Texas Youth Council Director James Turman says: "I see no decrease in juvenile crime in this state. I see nothing but an increase."

Turman says the crime rate for Texas under 17 increased 104 per cent between 1952 and 1959. The state population rose only 32 per cent.

The lawmakers will be asked for more than \$13.5 million for the next two-year state financing period.

Another problem will be special laws setting up a juvenile parole system to keep young offenders from plunging headlong into a life of crime, and to prevent juvenile delinquency before it occurs.

The council had adopted a \$13,495,636 budget for the two years beginning Sept. 1, 1961, up about \$3.5 million from the current biennium. Included in the budget are \$2,635,750 for new buildings and a home for neglected Negro children.

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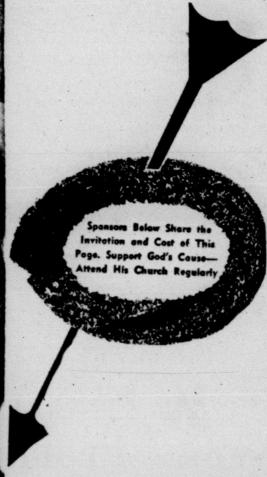
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
