Bulldogs face tough opponent Friday night

Dell City will bring a perfect 10-0 record into the area play off game against Loraine Friday night and the Bulldogs will counter with an 8-3 mark including an unblemished slate in district action. The game will be played at Grandfalls-Royalty High School with a 7:30 p.m. kick off.

The Cougars' record includes wins over Balmorhea, Buena Vista (Imperial), Sierra Blanca and they defeated Fort Hancock twice this season. The first time was by a score of 60-28 and in their final game of the season, they defeated them by a score of 37-30.

The enrollment at Dell City totals 207 as compared to Loraine's total of 210.

Dell City is primarily a farming and ranching community of 550 population located on Highway 62-180, 90 miles east of El Paso and 89 miles west of Carlsbad, N. M.

At the present time, they are

carrying 21 players on their varsity roster.

The Bulldogs advanced to this round by defeating Klondike last Thursday, 52-42.

Loraine scored 32 first quarter points and held on for the victory.

City mulls bond vote

An improved water distribution system, waste water treatment plant and improved streets appear to be in the future of Colorado City residents as the city council and city administration is eyeing improvements in these areas.

And the council appears ready to proceed as soon as possible on some of the improvements as they are expected to consider some work in their December meeting with funds they have ear-marked in the past for such projects.

The council is expected to approve the seeking of bids to replace a water line on Chestnut Street and to tie in other water lines in the northeast part of town.

Both projects are expected to improve the distribution of water and eliminate some "red water" which some home owners currently experience.

The city has funds on hand for

these two projects which could range from \$200,00 to \$250,000.

Buzz Rich and Glen Hemphill met with the council and expressed their feelings that the city could save large amounts of money by not doing what some engineering firms have suggested in recent proposals.

An engineering firm suggested at the last council meeting that improvements at the lake pump station and the water treatment plan could run almost \$2 million.

The city is facing much more costly projects however and methods of financing these projects were presented by the city's long-time financial advisor, Joe W. Smith of First Southwest of Abilene.

He suggested several options open to the city in financing the

Mildred Free, Foundation Chairman, stated that she had made some bookmarks to be sold, the proceeds going to the foundation.

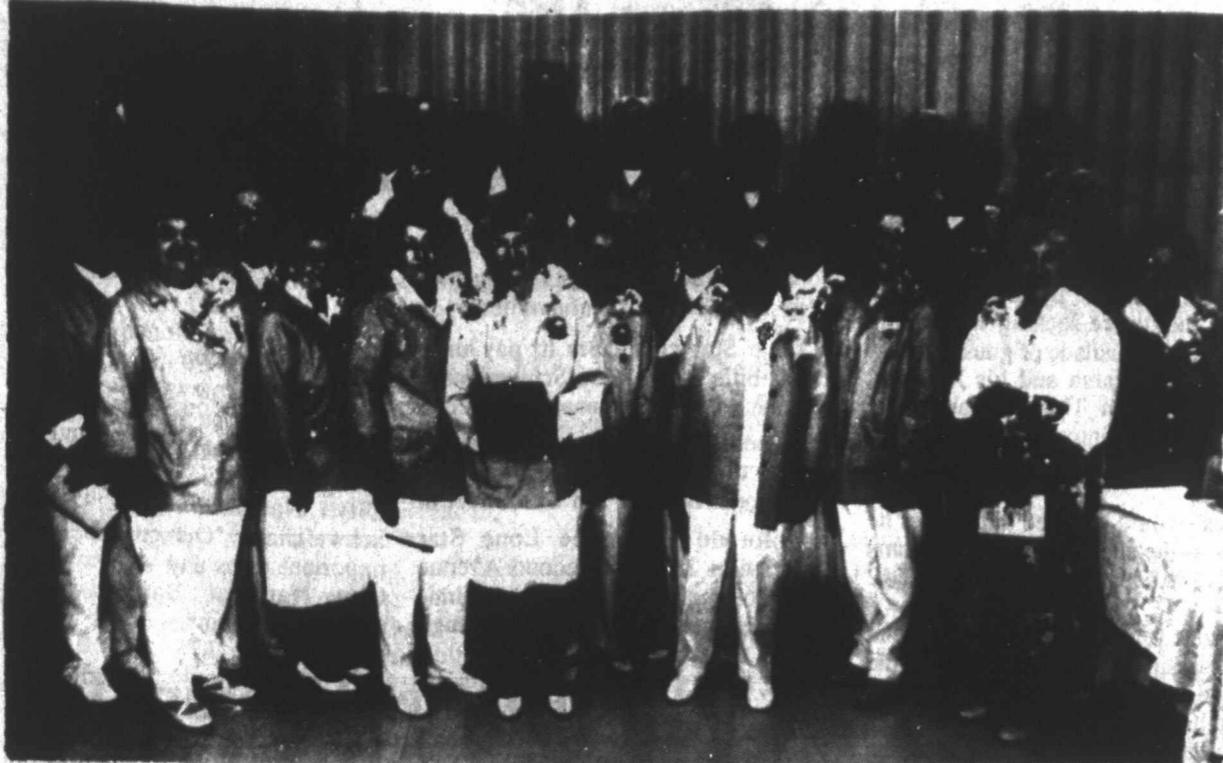
Sharon Truelove, chairman of the Finance Committee, gave details on a garage sale that the club will have on December 4 and enlisted some workers for the project.

TEXAS ANGLER

Several weeks ago I wrote an article on fall fishing. This is my favorite time of year to go after anything from bass to flounder. Cooler water makes fish more active and consequently they are easier to catch. But once the water has cooled below the 60° mark, fishing activity will slow down.

I've just returned from Lake Amistad, which is located on the Rio Grande River just out of Del Rio. This clear water deep reservoir is a tremendous fishery for black bass, striped bass and catfish.

The surface water temperature

was 68° in the main lake. The weather was cloudy and winds were 15-20 mph. It was perfect to catch fish.

I was going after black bass and hoped they were going to bite one of my favorite lures, the spinner bait. This is the season when spinner baits fished just under the surface can be very effective on aggressive fish. The term for this is 'buzzing' or 'waking' a spinner bait.

Working windy main lake points making long casts due to the clear water and retrieving the lure just under the surface was exactly what the fish wanted. Virtually every spot I worked had fish.

When bass strike a buzzing spinner bait they hit with such a force that you won't believe it. I feel that they react more out of

anger than hunger. In clear water, fish get a good look at lures but if you run it fast they hit because they don't know what it is.

In two days of fishing I boated over 60 bass. Most of them were non-keepers. However, each day I had two limits of good 2 1/2 pound bass. On this big lake, that's not bad.

Fishing spinner baits this way is work. You need to have a high speed reel and long rod. Line size isn't that critical because it is almost totally out of the water. You must retrieve the lure very fast to keep the spinner bait just under the surface.

Try this method at clear water reservoirs this time of year. It'll only take a couple of vicious strikes to make you a believer.

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CHIEF LONE WOLF

In its earliest days Colorado City had no law enforcement of its own. Thus, the Texas Rangers were sent here to provide law and order. Among those first lawmen to be stationed in Mitchell County was James H. Williams.

As the railroad moved westward, other towns began to appear, among them Big Springs, as it was first called. Those settlements along the route of the Texas and Pacific Railroad were mostly tent towns but in short order permanent buildings were constructed.

Early on the morning of September 14, 1881, Ranger Williams was sent to Big Springs from Colorado City. His mission was apparently to search for a fugitive. Witnesses told how Williams would enter darkened tents, light a match and then move on. He had repeated this ritual several times when he came to the tent of Seville C. Buchanan.

By now the Ranger from Company "B," whose captain was J.D. McMurry, had met two other men and they followed him as he made his rounds. The two were Jack McGee and S.M. Brown. All three men were tired and later testimony would indicate they were ready to bed down for the night.

Upon entering Mrs. Buchanan's tent, they asked for a place to spend the night. Although she had several beds in her tent, they were all occupied so she told the trio she didn't have room for them. Before the men could leave the tent a conversation developed and Williams, Brown and McGee decided to sit down on a bed in which Mrs. Buchanan's daughter, Olive, was sleeping.

Olive later recalled the men were sitting at the foot of her bed with McGee in the middle. Suddenly, he jerked out his pistol and fired two shots. The women, as well as Brown and Williams, hurriedly exited the tent at the south end. McGee also ran outside, leaving in the opposite direction. Outside the tent, he squeezed off two or three more shots.

"I'm struck," Ranger Williams told Mrs. Buchanan. "The third shot hit me!"

Inside the tent, James Simmons had been sleeping when he heard the three men ask about lodging for the night. Now wide awake, he heard the wounded Ranger call out to S.M. Brown, "arrest that man and take him to town." Then, moments later, Simmons heard Brown order McGee to "drop it," as he took the gunslinger into custody.

By now the Ranger was being helped back into the tent and was placed on a bed. Williams muttered for "someone to call his Pa and to telegraph J.C. McMurry" at the Ranger camp near Colorado City. Then the young man said, "Send for a doctor. Take my shoes off." Finally he struggled to say, "It was an accidental shot."

Jack McGee would have been the first to agree with that statement. When Brown had placed him under arrest and taken his pistol, McGee said, "If I shot Jim Williams, I am sorry for it. I want to see if I shot him and know if I did, it was accidental."

Less than twenty minutes after being shot, Ranger James Williams died. There hadn't even been time for a doctor to be brought to the tent. Williams is believed to have been in his early twenties.

His career with the Rangers had been short but memorable. Earlier that year he had been part of a detachment headed by Captain Bryan Marsh which was sent to San Angelo to quell rebellious troops at Ft. Concho.

Black soldiers had stormed a hotel in Angelo after one of their comrades had been shot by a white man. The irate troops shot up the hotel because they had heard the man they were seeking was hiding there. Fortunately, no one was wounded in the fusillade of gunshots.

The uprising ended with the arrival of Marsh and his Rangers, including James Williams, who was among them. The commandant of Ft. Concho was told, "If another soldier comes into San Angelo, he'll go back to the fort feet first." Now, only months later, Williams lay dying in a tent in Big Springs.

A man identified only as "J. Briggs" would later tell authorities he had gone to the tent when he heard about the shooting. After Williams died Briggs said he took the Ranger's billfold, which contained \$42 cash, and put it in a safe.

Several bystanders who had also gone to the tent would relate that they had heard Williams defend his assassin by saying he thought the shooting had been an accident. The two women occupants of the tent, Mrs. Buchanan and her daughter, heard him say the same thing, as did a man identified as Mike Houston, who had accompanied Briggs to the site of the shooting. "Me and Mr. Briggs went down to the tent," Houston said. "We asked him what Jack shot him for. He only replied, 'It was accidental.'"

After being arrested, McGee was taken to a place called the Cattle Exchange, where he was detained. But the suspect wasn't planning on staying there long. Pleas of accidental shooting weren't popular with West Texas juries.

Meanwhile, S.M. Brown had gone back to the Buchanans' tent where he was examining it for bullet holes. That's when McGee bolted from the Cattle Exchange and ran to the railroad tracks.

The fugitive jumped on a steam engine with Brown now in pursuit. Yelling at the engineer to stop, Brown climbed aboard the engine but was struck by McGee, who had armed himself with a club. Brown retaliated by pulling out his pistol and started flailing away at McGee. During the fight, Brown kept thinking someone would be along to help him, but such was not to be.

The suspect was eventually subdued by Brown and taken back into custody. Later, he was indicted by a 32nd District grand jury in Mitchell County, of which Howard County was then a part. In giving his statement after the melee, Brown said McGee had "taken a few drinks (earlier in the evening), but was not drunk." The case was transferred to Sweetwater, in Nolan County, on a change of venue.

Unfortunately, old court records are not available to tell us the final chapter in Jack McGee's murder trial. There are many unanswered questions about the death of the first Mitchell County lawman to be killed. Who was he looking for in Big Springs? Why was he making the rounds with McGee and Brown? Why did the three men linger in Mrs. Buchanan's tent when she told them she didn't have an extra bed? The answers to these and other questions about that night in 1881 are left to our imaginations.

Safety check is suggested for propane appliances

With cold weather moving across the state, Texas Railroad Commission Chairman James E. (Jim) Nugent and Commissioners Mary Scott Nabers and Barry Williamson suggest that homeowners and other consumers who fuel furnaces and appliances with propane contact their local dealer for a safety check of their propane tank and regulator.

The commissioners warn that if the regulator vent ices over or is clogged by insect nests or debris, high pressure gas can be released directly to appliances.

Regulators on most home tanks are located under protective metal domes on the top of the tanks, shielding them from weather. On some tanks, however, the circular regulator is installed outside the dome cover. Consumers should check to make sure the regulator vent is pointing down toward the ground, away from the elements and is free from debris.

If consumers are concerned about whether their regulators are properly installed and functioning correctly, they should contact the local dealer that fills and services their tanks.

Some Texas consumers buy propane in portable tanks for use in barbecues or as a supplemental heat source. Colder weather may prompt such users to bring the portable cylinders indoors. But the Railroad Commissioners say all propane cylinders and containers must stay outside for safety, as required by the Commission's liquefied petroleum gas safety rules.

Propane is commonly used as a residential and commercial fuel throughout Texas.

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Child support program sets collection records

Texas Attorney General Dan Morales on Monday announced that the Texas Child Support Program set new records in collections, paternity establishments and the number of child support lawsuits filed in state fiscal year 1993. The increases are a direct result of the strong emphasis on performance and service to the children of Texas.

The child support program collected \$370 million, surpassing the \$300 million mark for the second consecutive year. Child support collections each month averaged about \$30 million, nearly \$12 million more than was collected for the entire year of 1983, the year the program moved to the Office of the Attorney General.

"As a direct result of our efforts, more Texas children are receiving the child support so vital to their families' survival," Morales said. "Our goal is to each year increase the number of children being supported by both parents. They have a responsibility to provide their children with basic needs such as clothing, food and health care. When parents do not support their children, the burden falls on the taxpayer through various social services such as welfare and public health care."

On a national level, Texas' child support efforts rank high among the states. Based on the most recent statistics, 1992, Texas ranked 10th for total distributed collections. Texas also ranked 5th in the number of paternities established in 1992, up from 9th in 1991 and 38th in 1988. The Texas child support program established paternities for 30,429 children in 1993, a 25 percent increase over last year.

"Establishing paternity is one of our biggest challenges. A non-custodial parent is not always willing to come forward and share in the financial support of the children. We expect continuing increases in paternity establishment as a result of a new voluntary in-hospital paternity program being set up in key hospitals across the state. The program assists in gathering the information we need to ensure that both parents assume responsibility for their children."

Additionally, Texas continues as one of the nation's leaders in the amount of child support collected from income tax refunds. In 1993, Texas collected \$35 million from

income tax refunds from delinquent parents. Texas, for two consecutive years, has ranked sixth in the nation in the amount of child support collected from tax returns, according to the latest federal figures.

Texas moved up one notch to capture 9th place in the amount of child support collected in wage withholding in federal fiscal year 1991, the most recent year figures available. Texas collected \$110 million, a 41 percent increase over the amount collected in 1990.

The child support program currently has 758,364 cases. The latest federal figures show that in 1992, Texas had the seventh largest average annual caseload and the 10th largest paying caseload.

In 1993, child support obligations were established in 37,180 cases, 30 percent more than established in 1992. The program also filed 175,893 legal actions to establish or enforce support orders of which final orders were completed in 147,778 of these cases, an increase of 16 percent over 1992.

"We anticipate more success in establishing new obligations and enforcing existing ones as a result of a cooperative effort with employers across the state who participate in our voluntary New Hire Reporting Program," Morales said. "These employers will provide vital information that will help us locate parents who have neglected their responsibility to support their children. It will also help parents who do support their children to remain current in their child support payments when they change jobs."

An automated telephone voice information response system was expanded during state fiscal year 1993 to handle routine calls more effectively. The phone bank handled 497,227 calls, up 19 percent over the number handled in 1992. In addition, the automated system handled 792,479 inquiries. The expanded automated system now handles 21,000 calls per day or 21 percent more calls than was handled for the entire month of September 1992, when the fiscal year began.

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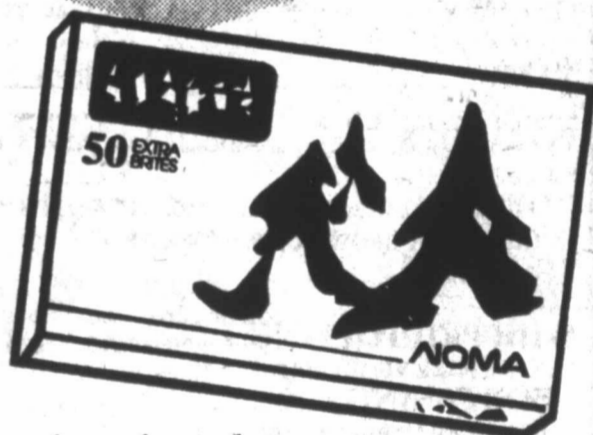
