Twenty-Three Children Are Burned In Explosion Extended Drouth Threatens Crops Over Wide Area

Vast Section Of U.S. Under Heat Scourge

East, Middle West, Parts of South Suffer Blows from Lingering Drouth; Relief Not in Sight from Wave

Crops Are Wilted

Dire Predictions Arise as Result of Continued Rainless Period as 100-Degree Temperature Holds Sway

A VAST section of the United States bowed under the punishing scourge of "Old Man Heat" yesterday.

The middle west, from Nebraska to Ohio, caught the burden of the punishing blow, but the east and parts of the south suffered in sympathy.

Emporia, Kans., held the day's heat ribbon with 114 degrees and century-mark temperatures were general throughout the central part of the country except around the Great Lakes, where cooling breezes spelled comfort.

Crops Wilted

Crops wilted in Missouri, Kansas and Oklahoma and in Texas below normal cotton production was predicted because of extended drouth.

The east fared only slightly better. The mercury soared to 98 in Boston and 93 in Philadelphia. New York reported 96, a figure more common for the day in the seaboard states.

Little lasting relief is in sight from the scorching wave. Local thunderstorms are forecast to bring short reprieves to some sections.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 4. (AP)—A new heat wave seared the drouth-stricken regions east of the Mississippi today as dire predictions arose regarding the results expected if the rainless season continued.

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 4. (AP)—Attempting to fly around the world in 200 hours of actual flying time, Ted Lundgren, 38 year-old Hollywood aviator, late today presumably was

AMARILLO, Aug. 4. (AP)—Ted Lundgren, Los Angeles pilot and seeker of a round-the-world flight record, set his plane down at English field here at 9 p. m. tonight. He planned to leave in the morning for New York City. The flyer said strong head winds delayed him.

winging his way toward New York. Accompanied by W. L. Seiler, a co-pilot, and V. H. Emerson, a passenger, Lundgren took off from Los Angeles at 8:31 a. m. (PCT) a tentative halt for refueling at Kansas City was in prospect, but a non-stop flight to New York would not be unexpected, weather and other flying conditions may play a part in the aviator's decision.

No word had been received from Lundgren since the take off. Those who watched the 425 horsepower plane lift its load of 300 gallons of fuel into the air said the ship would reach Kansas City by sundown without difficulty.

Four Rescued From Caverns In Mountains

Dallas Youth and Three from Nogales Found After Twenty-six Hours in Deep Recesses of N. M. Cave

NOGALES, Ariz., Aug. 4.—Safe after being lost 26 hours in deep recesses of a cave in the Santa Rita mountains, 40 miles north of here, a Dallas, Texas, youth and three others from Nogales were rescued late today.

The youths were Daniel Coughanour, 20, Clay Coughanour, 17, and Paul MacGregor, 18, all of Nogales, and Marion E. Hughes, 17, of Dallas.

Without Food. They had been without food or water since Sunday, when they entered the cave on an exploration trip.

Daniel Coughanour and young Hughes were attending a citizens military training camp here. Hundreds of civilians and a company of troops joined in the search when the boys failed to return last night.

When found, they were wandering around in the darkness of the cave, their torches having been extinguished by a current of air soon after they entered the cave. Physicians who examined them reported the boys none the worse for their experience. Their automobile had been found at the entrance of the cave and the rescuing party followed their tracks inside to where the boys were found.

Stolen Diamond Rings Recovered

Theft of two diamond rings valued at \$250 from a residence here was reported to police Monday night by a young woman and shortly afterward they took the jeweled bands from another young woman.

Although the rings, one valued at \$250 and the other at \$100, were believed to have been taken from a house in the 1200 block of Seventeenth street Saturday night, the loss was not discovered until late Monday. Chief of Police John McDonald said.

Identity of neither the owner nor the person on whom the rings were found was revealed by the chief of police, who said the owner had refused to prosecute.

GAS STATION ENTERED

No Loot Taken Sunday Night Hasty Inventory Shows

Although a Texas-Pacific filling station at 2315 Avenue H was entered Sunday night and ransacked a hasty inventory did not reveal that anything had been taken; it was reported to city and county officers by J. L. Knoll, manager of the station.

Whether or not any gasoline was taken could not be determined. Locks on the pumps had not been broken. The door of the station was pried open.

Gangster Believed To Have Talked Too Freely of Act

(By Associated Press)

CHICAGO, Aug. 4. (AP)—A black glove for the left hand, symbol of the killer of Jack Zuta, furnished a new link today between the murder of the Tribune reporter and the killing of Jack Zuta. In the little Wisconsin cottage where the authorities believe Zuta's foe hid while waiting the chance to kill him, they found another black glove today.

Zuta Reputed Plotter. Zuta was reputed to be the plotter of Lingle's death and the officers saw in the glove a reminder that the killings were avenging Lingle, beside whose body a similar left handed glove was found after his assassination June 8.

Perhaps Zuta was slain by his own gang, however, in the belief he had talked too freely of the Lingle case while in custody of Chicago detectives a month ago.

Sam Hunt Sought. Sam Hunt, who carries his guns in a golf bag, was hunted today as the leader of the five executioners who marched across the dance floor of a Delafield, Wis., hotel Friday night and shot Zuta to death. The slim, hard-visaged gangster with the narrow eyes and thin lips answers the description given by witnesses of the slaying and his identity for the Moran gang is well known.

Weeks ago a policeman saw sharpshooters move down a man believed to be Lee Mongoven, friend of Moran and Zuta; drag him, apparently wounded, into their car and start away. The officer snatched at Sam Hunt's arm, pulled him from the car and took him to headquarters—later to be released. In the golf bag Hunt carried was a gun.

A golf bag found not far from the scene of Zuta's end, containing a handful of shotgun shells was being examined to determine whether it might be Hunt's.

Three Confabs Held by Co-Op Groups Monday

Marketing Plan Explained to 350 Lubbock Cotton Farmers in Meetings at County Line, Becton, Slaton

Plan Other Meets

Sessions Mark Beginning of Intensive Membership Campaign for Association in District; Many Sign Up

NEARLY 350 cotton growers attended three community meetings held in Lubbock county Monday afternoon to explain provisions and benefits of the Federal Farm board's plan of cooperative cotton marketing and to solicit members in the Texas Cotton Cooperative association.

Held at County Line, Becton and Slaton, the meetings marked the beginning of an intensive campaign to gain members for the Cotton Cooperative organization in Lubbock county. Community meetings are to be held in virtually all of the county's 24 school districts and each will be followed by a thorough canvass.

Six Sign Agreement. About 50 persons attended the meeting at County Line, Chamber of Commerce Capt. L. Wesley Read reported. About six signed marketing agreements, several others already had affiliated and most of the others indicated they expected to become members of the Cooperative association, Read said.

Of about 40 present at the Becton gathering, about eight signed and two others already had done so. C. C. Chapin, J. C. Anderson said.

Interest Shown. The largest assembly Monday afternoon was at Slaton, where about 250 persons gathered to hear an explanation of the proposed cooperative cotton marketing system. It was reported by R. J. Murray, district chairman, L. A. Wilson and J. W.

Reds Continue Orgy of Death On Tri-Cities

Communists Hordes March on Chinese Areas; 11 Foreign Warships Stationed to Protect Foreigners

(By Associated Press)

SHANGHAI, Aug. 4.—Communist hordes, eager for more spoils after sacking Changsha in an orgy of robbery and murder, advanced today toward the tri-cities, Hankow, Wuchang and Hanhang, where 11 foreign warships, including two American, were concentrated to protect foreigners.

The foreign quarters of Hankow were barricaded and guarded to prevent reds reoccupying the scene at Changsha when foreign property, valued at millions of dollars, was burned in anti-foreign demonstrations.

Protection Sought. Thousands of panicky Chinese poured into Hankow's foreign concessions seeking protection, although additional nationalist government troops patrolled the city.

While Chinese soldiers searched everyone in the streets, which were under martial law, a volunteer emergency defense corps was organized by the French community. A skirmish party of reds approached within 25 miles of Hankow and took munitions from cadets sent to fight them, but were scattered by veteran soldier fire from an armored train.

Continuing their fiendish acts in Changsha, the communists killed 100 wealthy Chinese seized for ransom and held 400 others.

Man Found Dead On Lockney Farm

ABILENE, Aug. 4. (AP)—Rufus Phillips, 44, was found shot and fatally wounded last night on his father's farm, near Lockney. He died soon afterward. A rifle lay near him. He left a note bidding two children goodbye and saying, "I am no good for anything." Relatives told officers he had been despondent over the death of his wife, who was killed two years ago in an automobile accident in New Mexico.

"Tail Wind" Lost Crash Is Nothing To Losing Dog

(By Associated Press)

HARBOR GRACE, N. F., Aug. 4. (AP)—John Henry Mears, aspirant for a new record, today was only nominally concerned over his badly wrecked airplane, worth many thousands, but was gravely anxious over the fate of little runt of a dog worth not very much in currency to anyone—except John Henry Mears.

The City of New York, Mear's plane, was badly wrecked when he attempted to take off for Ireland in the darkness early yesterday morning. That was quite bad enough. But, when it was discovered that "Tail Wind, II," John Henry Mear's little mascot, which accompanied him had disappeared with a tiny yelp just after the crash—that was worse. It was believed at first the dog, frightened at the calamity which had overtaken him, had scampered away, but Mear doesn't believe that. "Tail Wind, II," wouldn't do that.

Ten Believed Fatally Hurt In Film Fire

Clothing Catches Fire When Child Strikes Match and Ignites Pile of Films at Child's Show in Brazil

Panic Is Result

Victims Tumble Over Others in Effort to Escape Blaze; Brothers Badly Burned in Trying to Beat Out Flames

(By Associated Press)

SAO PAULO, Brazil, Aug. 4. (AP)—Twenty three children were burned, ten of them probably fatally, after their clothing had caught fire from a motion picture film at a child's show this afternoon.

The children had gathered to witness a screen exhibition in the home of Carlos and Armando Scitnack, who used a small projector.

Clothing Ignited.

A match was struck by one of the children and a pile of film in a corner became ignited and exploded. The inflammable material blazed up almost instantly and the children's clothing became ignited. Panic-stricken, the children tumbled over each other in their frantic attempts to escape. Many of them fanned their flaming clothing by running into the open before persons attracted by their screams could stop them in an attempt to save their lives.

Although fumes from the burning film were not believed to have been sufficient to cause serious injury, they contributed to the confusion in the mad rush for the open.

Half blinded by the fumes, the children who had been nearest the film when the unexpected flames swished upward, groped wildly, the tiny forms of some rapidly become living torches.

Residents and passersby caught some and rolled them on the ground, throwing coats about them.

THOSE FOUR AMENDMENTS

The voters of Texas will soon be called upon to ballot for, or against, four proposed amendments to the constitution of this state. All four of the amendments are receiving considerable newspaper support and The Morning Avalanche unhesitatingly recommends their passage.

One of the amendments would abolish the enforced three-months' summer vacation which the supreme court must take under the present constitutional provision. At present the court is forbidden to sit during the summer months, regardless of the state of its docket—which is always heavy.

Another amendment would permit counties in which university lands are located to assess such lands for taxation the same as privately owned lands. This is of very great importance to a number of West Texas counties, which find themselves handicapped by the large areas of unproductive land within their borders.

A third amendment deals with the mechanical functioning of the legislature, by providing for biennial sessions of 120 days each. The first thirty days would be given over to the introduction of bills and routine matters, the second thirty-day period for committee hearings, and the final sixty days for consideration and passage of new measures. This amendment also would increase the compensation for legislators from \$4 per diem to \$10 per diem during the regular sessions, and from \$2 to \$5 for extra time at the capitol.

The remaining amendment would permit the university regents to issue bonds against the university's permanent funds, which cannot be used for building purposes, so that new structures can be provided for. At present the university can use only the interest on its vast funds for building purposes.

Of the four amendments there is but one over which The Avalanche is skeptical and we shall support it as a matter of principle. We refer, of course, to the amendment which would raise the salaries of members of the state legislature.

We are frank to admit that the present salaries are wholly in accord with the average type of legislative salaries in the state, and in making this observation we further point out that it is entirely reasonable. As stands the 30th Senatorial district and the 19th Legislative district, in which Lubbock county and most of the South Plains are included, we are generally blessed with a higher-than-usual type of representation. The compensation, however, cannot be said of the state as a whole.

Our support of this measure is based upon the theory that better men will be attracted to the legislature by virtue of the larger salaries. Remuneration in the legislature, we believe, should at least be large enough to pay the expenses of a son and his family while they are sojourning in Austin. It is foolish to expect a man to be satisfied under other conditions.

It is about as easy for a camel to go through the well known needle's eye as for a constitutional amendment to be approved by the voters of Texas. Nevertheless, there are some amendments which should be made and we believe the four proposed are among them.

A HOOVER APPOINTMENT

The senate showed excellent judgment in deferring until its next session action on the president's nomination of Nicholas Roosevelt, of New York, as vice-governor of the Philippines. This postponement was made in the expectation that President Hoover would make a substitute nomination.

The objection to Roosevelt has nothing to do with his qualifications for the office. He is an able publicist and a man of high character, who any president would do well to add to the personnel of his administration. But it happens that he is particularly distasteful to the Filipinos because of his very uncompromising book opposing independence.

Complete accord has existed between the United States and the Philippines since the close of the Governor Wood administration in the island possessions and nothing should be done by Washington to end long-sought state of comity. Nothing would bring that about sooner than to send to the Philippines in an official capacity a man known to be inimical to the ideals and aims of the islanders.

Regardless of what is to be the future political status of the islands, whether it is to be eventual independence or some type of progressive dominion status, complete cooperation and mutual confidence is essential. Washington can engender that confidence only by sending to the Philippines men with a sympathetic understanding of the natives and their problems.

On the Firing Line at the Nation's Capital

FEDERAL PUBLIC HEALTH SERVICE THINKS AGED VISITOR FROM TURKEY MAY BE EXAGGERATING UNWITTINGLY

WASHINGTON, Aug. 4.—Without imputing to 156-year-old (so he says) Zaro Agha the slightest intention to deceive the U. S. public health service's experts on problems of senility evidently want considerable might convincing documentary evidence before wholly accepting assurances that America's elderly Turkish (or Kurdish) visitor really dates back to 1774—that is, so to speak, in an unbroken line.

"True enough" agrees Assistant Surgeon General R. C. Williams, "if he fought in the Napoleonic wars he must be pretty old."
"But it sometimes happens," continued the doctor, "that a very aged individual confuses his own experiences in his earlier years with the experiences of his grandfather, which maybe the latter related to him when the grandchild was quite young."

"It does not necessarily follow," explained the physician, "that the grandchild, as he, in turn, becomes a grandparent or great-grandparent, deliberately means to claim, as part of his personal history, what in reality was part of the personal history of his forebear."

"Rather, it may be that began by simply wishing it were so, and gradually, by a subconscious process, with advancing years and a breaking down of the boundaries of memory, comes honestly to believe that it was."

"Supposing such a romance to start with an originally vivid stock of tales, told to him at first hand at an impressive age—perhaps to have had subsequently a stirring career of his own—and to be himself a graphic story teller—it is easy to imagine him as expressing himself very convincingly."

"Of course, I've no means of knowing," admitted Dr. Williams, "that Mr. Agha is not actually 156, but I believe he holds the record since Biblical times, if he is."

"It also is a fact that illiterate, primitive folk, as age advances on them, have a tendency to add five or ten years at a time, occasionally."

"Often they are doubtful just when they did start—only know that, at such and such a time they were 'about' so old. Up to middle life they probably try to guess accurately, but as they begin to grow unquestionably old, they likewise begin to grow proud of it. A certain prestige goes with age. A point arrives when they start to feel an urge to exaggerate."

"It's quite common among old dinky 'uncles' and 'aunties' in the south."

Dr. Williams has small faith in longevity prescriptions—special diets, forms of exercise or pet abstinence.
"The capacity for a long life span," he says, "seems to be born into some people. Apparently it's inherited, not acquired. The men whose parents and grandparents were mostly long-lived (ancestors begin to become so numerous beyond the third generation backward that it is difficult to follow the sequence much further than that) is likely himself to be long-lived if he escapes accidents."

"It is no particular merit of the individual's own, or of his way of comporting himself. He simply happens to come of a line to which longevity is natural."

After all, what is old age?

"It's in the blood vessels," said the doctor.
"You know how a rubber band gradually loses its elasticity. Little by little it snaps back with less and less vigor. Finally it ceases to snap back at all. Ultimately it breaks the minute one tries to stretch it."

"Slowly they lose the elasticity adequately to carry the blood stream—and as age, as the life-renewing supply of blood for the brain, and all the rest of the body, dwindles."

And 156 years is an impossible length of time for one equipment of blood vessels to continue equal to this duty.

"I wouldn't say impossible," replied the doctor, "but improbable."

EXPLODES ELIEF THAT SOAP AND WATER DAMAGE THE SKIN

By Dr. Morris Fishbein, Editor Journal of the American Medical Association and of Hygiene, the Health Magazine

Cosmetics have been used by women and even by men, for thousands of years.

Because of the strange superstitions that women have concerning the effects of drugs of various kinds upon the skin, Dr. R. N. B. MacKenna, a specialist in diseases of the skin in Liverpool, has given consideration to many of the formulas provided and to the superstitions that people have concerning their use.

Some beauty specialists, Dr. MacKenna says, suggest soap and water should not be used, but that the face should be cleansed by the application of cold cream and any surplus removed with absorbent paper or towel, after which a vanishing cream should be applied.

The beauty specialist then suggests that the toilet should be completed by the judicious use of powder, varying in hue from green to mauve to pink or tan. The face should be cleaned at night with cold cream and a lotion or skin food applied, after which the lady goes to bed with a thick coating covering her face.

This is an unhygienic system so far as concerns the actual care of the skin. The superstition that soap and water are bad for the complexion arose in the days when toilet goods had lots of alkali in them and would irritate sensitive skins. Nowadays few, if any, toilet soaps contain more than one-fourth of 1 per cent of free alkali, an amount which will not irritate the skin, and some superfatted soaps contain extra amounts of wool fat, which will counteract any irritation caused by free alkali.

If soap irritates the skin, a superfatted soap can be used and in exceptional cases the best qualities of shaving soap can be used for toilet purposes.

There are all sorts of strange notions concerning the effect of cold cream and vanishing cream. There are few harmful effects to be anticipated from the effects of good cold cream. Dr. MacKenna states that the only cosmetic value which these preparations possess is the value they have for hiding defects of the skin.

On the other hand, fats block the glands, interfere with perspiration, cause the capillaries of the skin to fill and lead to a continued distention of the superficial blood vessels, which may be so bad as to become permanent.

The most possible forms of cosmetics are those known as wrinkle removers and skin tighteners. These are rubbed into the skin, the action depending entirely on the fact that massage causes contraction of the muscles and smoothes out the skin, except in the case of those that are irritants, which are exceedingly dangerous.

Another dangerous and useless type of cosmetic is the skin food. Nothing will feed the skin. The continued use of such skin foods is more likely to cause pimples than to remove them.

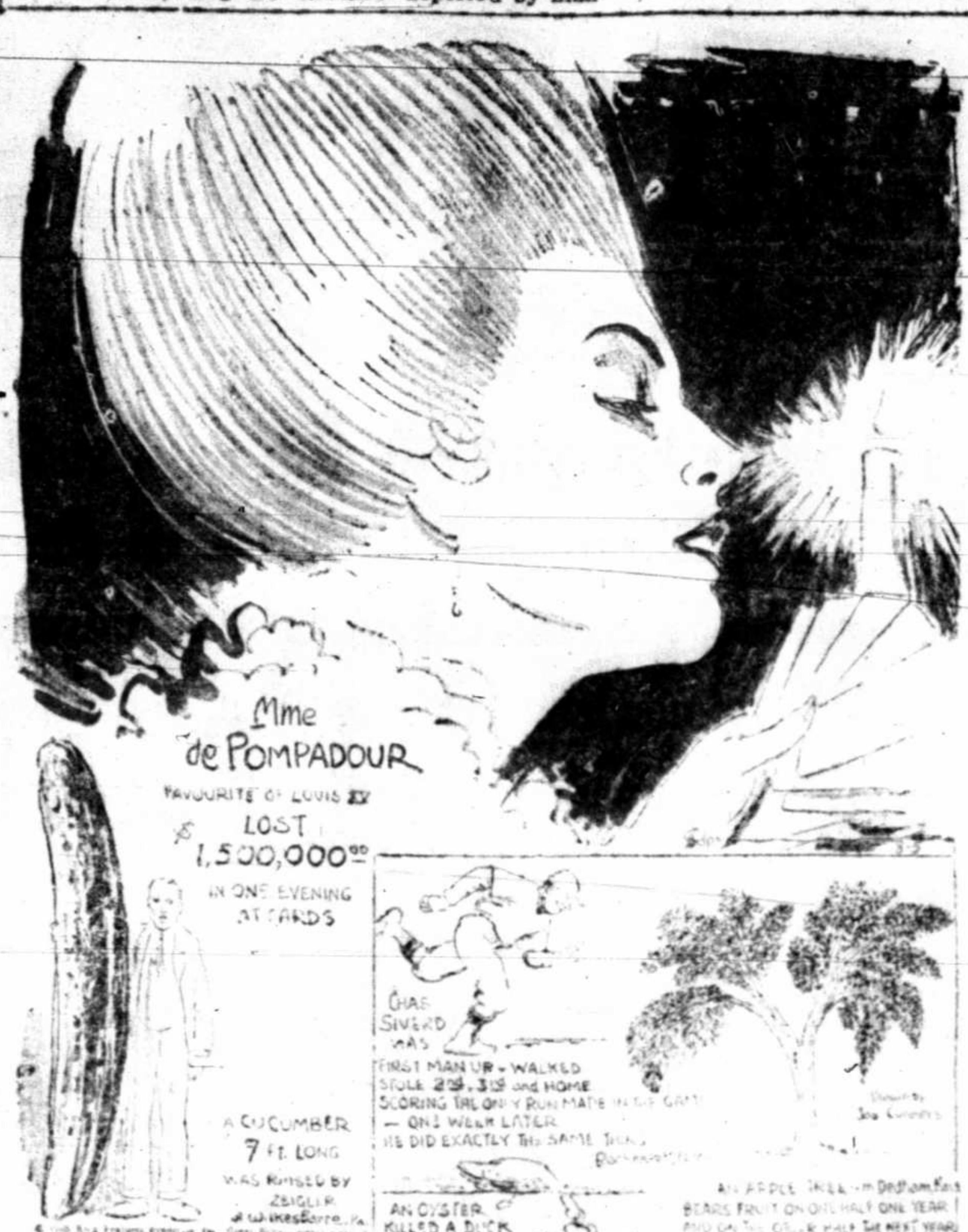

Economic Problems and Price of Wheat Are Discussed

WHEAT RASH COMPETITION

Now that we are engaged in the more or less diverting game of politics, there is a phase of the more serious real struggle for economic existence that is reacting alarmingly on the life of the farmer.

This kind of competition, instead of being the life of trade, may prove the economic ruin of many of us.

Of course we all want to buy in the cheapest market, and are pleased to pick up a bargain when we can. Especially under monopolistic conditions a little competition often helps considerably. But there ought to be a limit to this price-cutting. One man offers an article or a service just a little lower than another, or throws in some special inducement to tempt the customer away from his rival. Perhaps the buyer yields and congratulates himself on his good fortune. The man who sells to him has a very narrow margin of profit. But what becomes of the individual who has long been in the business and has a standard of living already established? He sees his customers slipping away from him, and must in self-defense resort to the same ruinous methods of competition.

At the same time he has his own obligations to meet, and his purchasing power is weakened. It is easy to see where all of this is leading.

I do not know whether our chamber of commerce and various associations can or ought to do something about this, but the buying public might exercise a wholesome influence in explaining a little more self-restraint and less eagerness to find a bargain. Especially where we have received good service through the years, often including accommodation and credit, it is ungracious and unfair to turn to a rival who seems for the moment to offer some slight advantage.

The only kind of a satisfactory community in which to live and work is one of a high standard of living with substantial homes, good wages, adequate income, and good will and fellowship.

In the present stress we are not helping matters by this cutthroat competition. We think we've got to live, but so has the other fellow.

THE PRICE OF WHEAT

There is much wonder in the minds of the farmers and others in the country why, with the operation of the farm board for now more than a year, the price of wheat is the lowest it has been in 16 years.

One of our oldest agricultural papers said recently that the Farm Board so far has been only negative so far as prices are concerned. The first step was to buy 60,000,000 bushels of wheat to stabilize the market, but that step has failed to have the desired effect. The board is now being urged to buy a 100,000,000 more bushels of wheat to see if that would not stop the downward tendency. They have refused to do this and we think wisely so. It seems strange that the board and the wheat growers can not see what is the only true remedy, the one and the only one that has ever saved the price of wheat except in the time of the war, and that is for the board to make a price on the wheat of say \$1.00 per bushel and not sell for less. We can not understand why the board is not a better bunch to make a fair price to the grower and the country than are the gamblers in the exchanges of the country.

There can be but one reason why the wheat farmers are not in good plight financially and that is they have not received an adequate price for their wheat. It has been decided many years ago that wheat can not be grown profitably for less than \$1 per bushel and there is no valid reason why wheat should sell for less right now.

If the Farm Board had named that price and advised all growers to not sell a bushel of good wheat for less and that the board would take care of any surplus after all

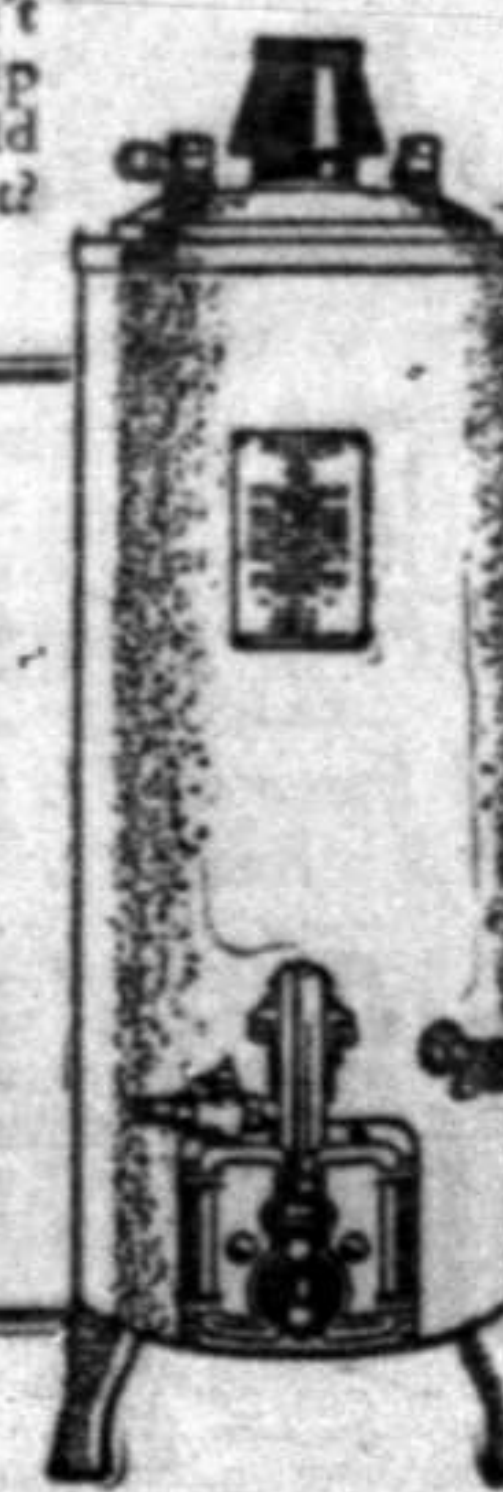

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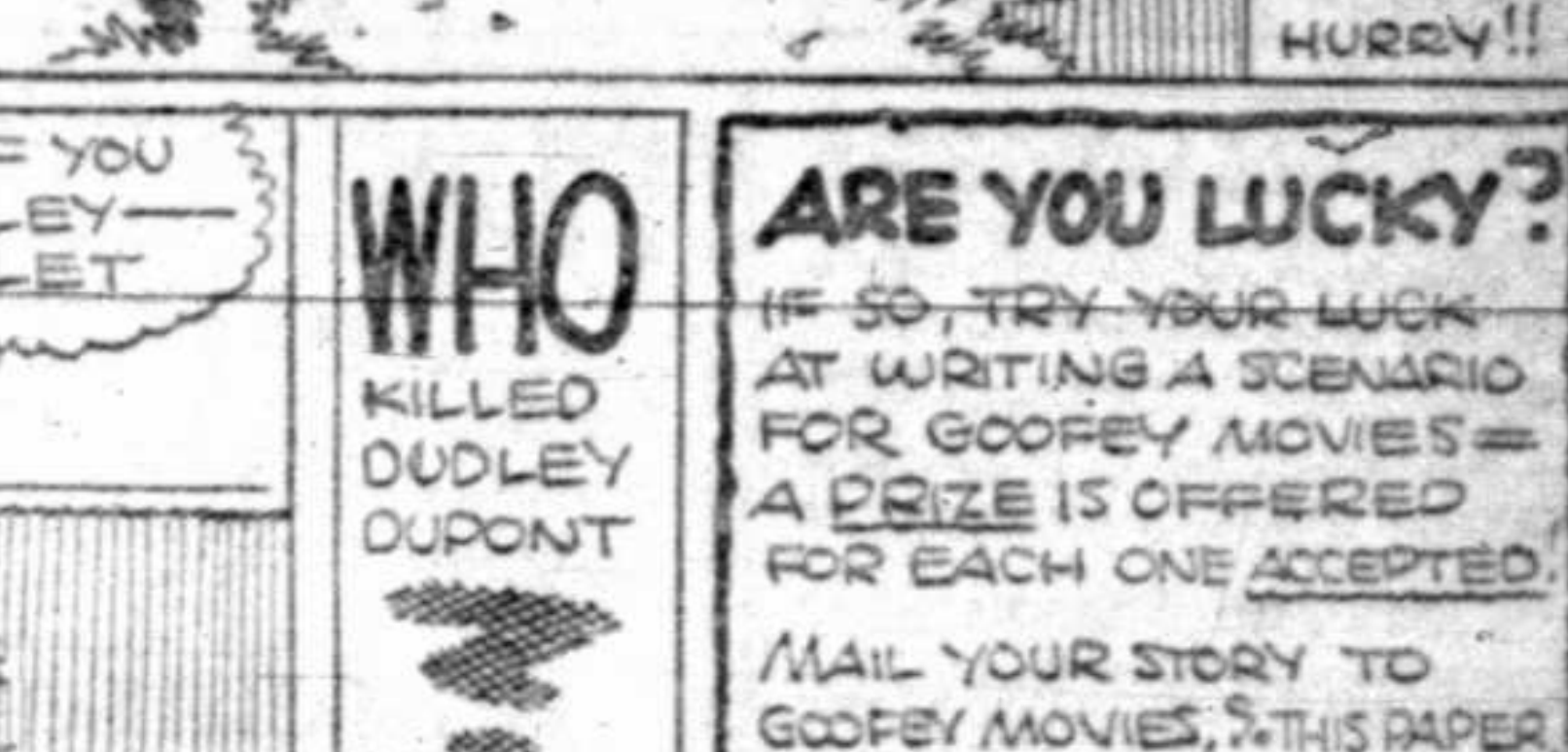

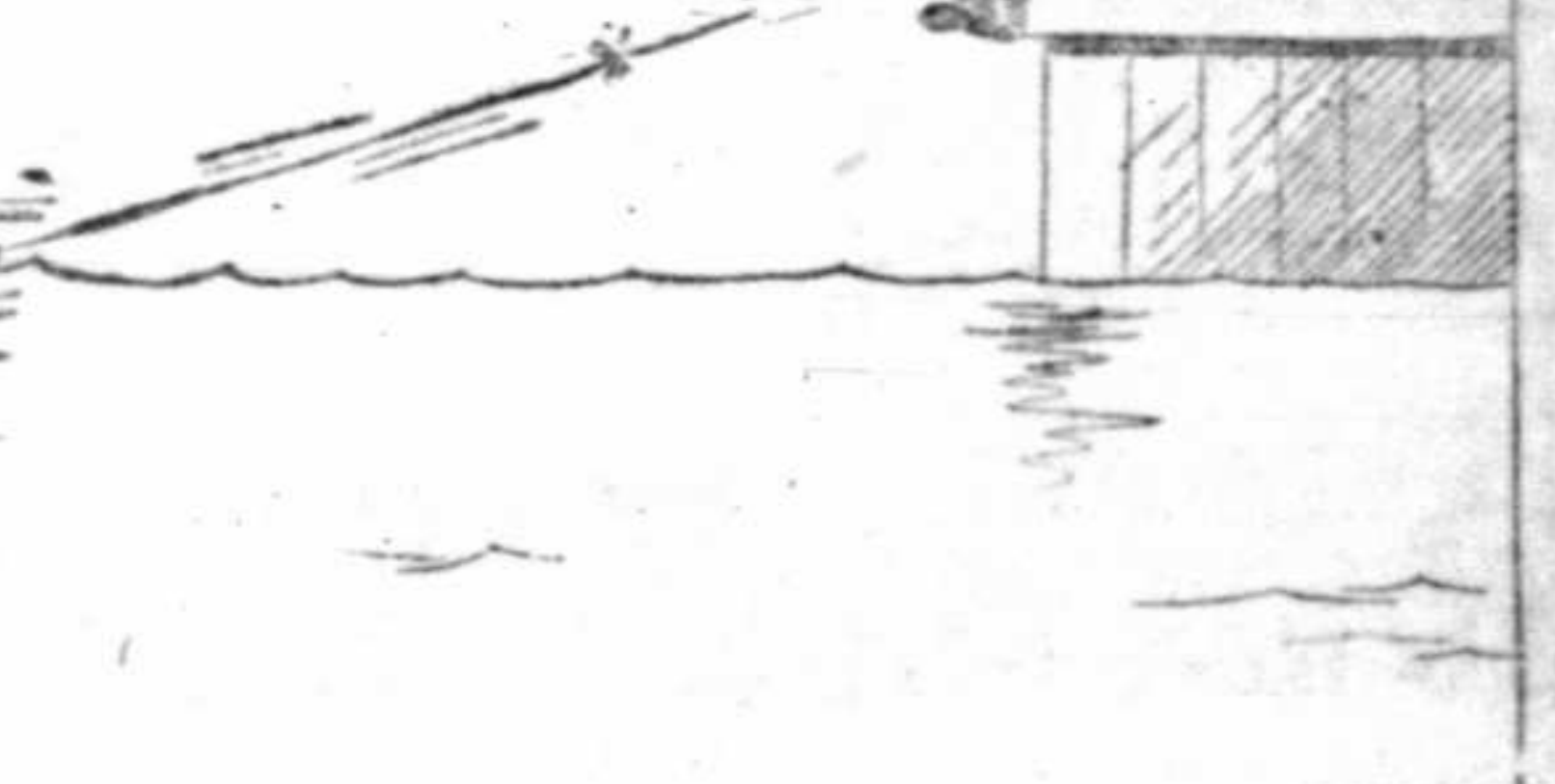

Cotton Fluctuations in Cotton Erratic Livestock Trading Is Slow Grain Wheat, Corn Soar In Grain Market

Markets At A Glance

COTTON
NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 4. (AP)—Trading was fair in the cotton market today and price fluctuations were narrow and erratic. Liverpool continued closed owing to bank holidays but the market here opened 3 to 4 points up on the absence of rain over Sunday. Prices eased off 4 to 5 points after the start on pre-bureau realizing and liquidation but soon rallied 11 to 12 points in sympathy with firmer stocks and grain and the absence of rains and high temperatures shown by the detailed weather reports.

Around mid-session prices eased off again losing all the previous gain owing to lack of support. The market experienced a sharp rally in late trading on active trade and Wall Street buying due to the high temperatures in the west and firmness in stocks. Prices made new highs, 32 points above the lows and closed near the top showing net gains for the day of 24 to 28 points.

First trades here showed gains of 3 to 4 points and after easing off 4 to 5 points on realizing the market rallied. October advancing to 12.75 and December to 12.93, up 11 to 12 points from the early lows.

NEW YORK COTTON
NEW YORK, Aug. 4. (AP)—After showing considerable irregularity during the greater part of the day, cotton advanced sharply today on active covering which was believed to be partly on account of generally dry weather in the drouthy sections of the cotton belt.

The new October contract which after selling up from 12.60 to 12.73 early eased off to 12.50, advanced to 12.85 in the late trading and closed at 12.92. The general market closed very steady at advances of 17 to 28 points.

Opening Steady
The opening was steady at an advance of 4 points to a decline of 4 points, with the market paying very little attention to failure of late Sunday weather reports to indicate any general rains or showers in the drouthy sections.

Owing to the bank holidays in England, there were no cables to influence sentiment here either way at the opening today. Trading in Liverpool will be resumed tomorrow.

News Conflicting
There was some active constructive news in the form of automobile production in Detroit after the vacation shutdowns stimulated sentiment, and additional support was forthcoming in the announcement that steel operations in the Youngstown district were improving. Republic's July orders exceeded the June total.

Strength of Grain Markets Encourages Bullish Activity In Late Stock Trade Livestock

NEW YORK, Aug. 4. (AP)—Strength of the grain markets, encouraged bullish activity in stocks in the last hour of trading today.

Share prices, which had declined during the forenoon, bounced up ward as wheat soared 4 cents a bushel and final quotations in a wide assortment of issues were 2 to 6 points net higher.

Turnover Small
Until the bulls staged their demonstration today, the turnover of the stock market was only a repetition of the dull sessions of the last week; and even with the late rally, the turnover was the second smallest in more than two years, totaling only 1,201,800 shares.

Wall Street heard some alarming reports from the grain belt. Still gripped by the drought, while some of these were saying that expert crop statisticians had declined to estimate the damage done since their recent estimates of losses were compiled, the head of the national grange was informing President Hoover of the seriousness of the situation and traders on the Chicago pit were bidding up wheat and corn. The former grain closed 3 3/4 cents higher while corn showed advances of 2 3/4 to 3 1/2.

Cow Demand New
Cows found a slow demand with buyers bidding 10 to 15c—spots little more, lower, but most morning sales about steady when the fill is considered. Canners sold at 5.25 to 5.25. The better steers very slow and buyers inclined to reduce values 25 or more. Bulls sold at 4.50 and common light bulls from 3.00 to 3.50.

CHICAGO GRAIN
CHICAGO, Aug. 4. (AP)—In a wild struggle to out do each other's price jumps, wheat today made a greater leap than corn.

The corn market, however, surpassed any high record which corn has heretofore touched this season. Disquieting reports of broadening irreparable damage to the corn crop as a result of unbroken drought and of scorching temperatures were chiefly responsible, together with an official statement that wheat was worth more as feed than corn.

Close Is Nervous
After scoring a maximum upturn of 4 1/2c a bushel compared with Saturday's finish, wheat closed nervous at 3 5/8c net gain. Corn closed 2 5/8c, 3 5/8c up, oats with a rise of 1 7/8c, 2 1/4c, and provisions showing 1 1/2c advance.

Abnormal conditions threatened sensational reduction of the nation's corn crop led many grain traders today to ignore the recent general anxiety as to likelihood of an unwise 1930 surplus of wheat as a result, corn prices at first moved faster than wheat values, but subsequently the wheat market soared the quicker, notwithstanding late announcement of a huge enlargement of the United States wheat supply, today's total being 3,500,000 bushels more than a week ago.

Farmers To Blame
"The farmer is to blame for present conditions, as any body," declared Mr. Murray, "because he has failed to organize and cooperate with his fellow farmers in fighting the battle for equality to his class with other industries."

"The government has failed to organize the farmers under the Agricultural Marketing Act and through the Federal Farm Board," he said "in spite of any all opposition."

All Year Market
Mr. Murray called attention of the Slaton farmers to the all-year cotton market that would be available, through the association, and advantages of having cotton graded and classed by a federally licensed grader and classifier.

"The grower of cotton is entitled to a square deal," said "Uncle Sam now so recognizes it. I can stand the barbs and criticisms of the powers who control our present markets, and have controlled them for so many years." He contended that these powers had been keeping the law of supply and demand working to benefit the producer. "If this law works for the grower, why isn't cotton prices up, with a serious drought facing most of the country? When the crop is gathered, then they'll listen to reports of crop failures, and before the season ends every report of rain will be used as an excuse to batter the price on downward."

Brewer Makes Talk
J. H. Brewer, Slaton banker, spoke shortly before the gathering, as did L. A. Wilson, secretary of the Slaton Chamber of Commerce, and B. Sherrod, Lubbock county chairman of the association's drive for members.

About 35 farmers signed marketing agreements at the close of the meeting and interest manifested was marked.

Mr. Brewer stated that the farmer must see his condition improved from the present, when he can not get what products are worth.

Mr. Wilson announced that the Slaton Chamber of Commerce district had voted to make an effort to secure a sub office of the Texas Cotton Cooperative association for that city.

Dupree Talks Co-Op Work At Post Meet

Lubbock Attorney Speaks to
More Than 250 Farmers of
Garza County in Interest of
Cotton Association

Gambling is an inherent part of farming and cotton growers will heighten their stack of chips considerably by affiliating with the Texas Cotton Cooperative association, as sponsored by the Federal Farm Board, more than 250 Garza county farmers were told by George Dupree, Lubbock attorney, at a countywide meeting in Post last Saturday.

"You hold within your hands the future destiny of America," declared Mr. Dupree. "By organizing and cooperating and holding together for your mutual interests you can command respect and command a fair value for your product. The farmer has no more to say about the price of the things he sells than the negro on the street corner."

Powerless As Individuals
"This plan worked out by experts of the government and crystallized into law presents to the farmers of the nation an economical remedy for their troubles and a practical way to get relief from the government. You are powerless as individuals. Organized you are the greatest power for progress in the United States."

"You are interested in the welfare of your homes and the future of your children. What kind of a heritage are you going to leave them? If this new marketing system can help you in some way and place farming on a business basis it is worth while."

Give It Chance
"For the sake of your homes, for the sake of your families and all that you hold dear approach this proposition of the Farm Board with an open mind. Give it fair consideration and a fair trial. You have nothing to lose and a lot to gain. With the United States government behind it and your cooperation some day you will get a fair return for your toll."

The farm problem was described by Mr. Dupree as the biggest problem confronting the entire nation. Having been reared on a farm, Mr. Dupree said he could approach the farm problem from the farmers' viewpoint.

Usually The Goat
"In the past the farmer usually has been the goat," said T. R. Greenfield, President of the Post Chamber of Commerce and chairman of the organization committee for Garza county for the Texas Cotton Cooperative association. "But this time if there is any goat the government will be the goat. It is taking all the chances in this \$300,000,000 marketing set-up."

It's the first time in history that the farmer has had a chance to put his hands into the Federal treasury and get back some of the tax money he has been putting into it, true.

farmers were told by R. J. Murray, president of the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce and chairman of the organization committee for the Texas Cotton Cooperative association. He said it was an opportunity that comes once in a lifetime and should not be passed up.

Passed For One Purpose
"The government realizes you have to increase your purchasing power," said Mr. Murray. "The agricultural marketing act was passed for one purpose alone—to help the farmer and for no other reason. It appropriated half a billion dollars and it will appropriate a billion more or two billion if necessary to make cooperative marketing a success. The Texas Cotton Cooperative association will be supervised and controlled by the government just as much as the banks are. On a show of hands it was learned that nearly half of the more than 250 farmers present already had signed marketing agreements with the Texas Cotton Cooperative association and many volunteered to help complete organization of Garza county.

Highway Work To Be Started Soon

Grading and draining work on highway No. 9 in Lubbock county, from the Lynn county line to the Hale county line, will begin within the next two weeks, it was announced Monday by Guy R. Johnson, resident engineer of the state highway department.

Contracts for the work were let at a meeting of the state highway commission last week.

Lubbock county commissioners are engaged in obtaining right-of-way for the road. Johnson said Monday that about three-fourths of the right-of-way had been obtained. Condemnation proceedings have been started against several property owners who refused to sign easements. County Judge Robert Bean said.

About eight and a half miles of paving has been laid on highway No. 7 between Lubbock and Slaton and the road is open to traffic from immediately north of Posey to the southern limits of Slaton.

South Plains Needing Rain

Precipitation Within Next Ten Days Will Eradicate Any Danger from Drouth, Authorities Say

Although crops in Lubbock county and the South Plains area are suffering from lack of rain, sufficient precipitation within the next 10 days will eradicate danger of great damage, agricultural authorities said Monday.

Conditions in this section are better than in most other areas of Texas and in other states from which reports of withered crops have been received.

Lubbock county's rainfall has been about 50 per cent normal as 10.8 inches is normal here. Thus far 5.6 inches have fallen. The precipitation here in July was only 12 inch as compared to the average July fall of 2.29 inches.

Sunday's maximum temperature here was 101 degrees. The thermometer registered 95 at noon Monday.

Telephones to Be Changed Up

Brownfield System Will Be Completely Rebuilt; Work to Be Completed Some Time This Month, Plans Show

BROWNFIELD, Aug. 4.—A complete rebuilding of the local telephone system of the State Telephone company's plant here is under way and it is expected the work will be finished some time this month.

This matter has been brought before the telephone company by the chamber of commerce and the company has given assurance of its intentions to install the common battery type as soon as conditions permit. "The State Telephone company is spending a lot of money here in rebuilding its local plant and we believe the expense will be justified by increased patronage," Mr. Shelton said. "The company is making every effort possible to improve its service and I believe our citizens appreciate its efforts."
