Two persons are dead as the result of a plane crash near Iraan Tuesday.

Civil Air Patrol Wing Headquarters in Grand Prairie contacted the Odessa CAP Squadron, the squadron closest to the last known location of the missing plane, and a call went out to surrounding squadrons for aid in the search.

The Lone Wolf Composite Squadron of the Civil Air Patrol, based in Colorado City, answered the call for aid and CAP Second Lieutenant Jake Autry flew to Odessa, where the base of search operations was located, to receive his flight instructions.

Lt. Autry was assigned to a search area just west of San Angelo.

Colorado Gin Company reported 825 bales ginned, with 70 bales on the yard.

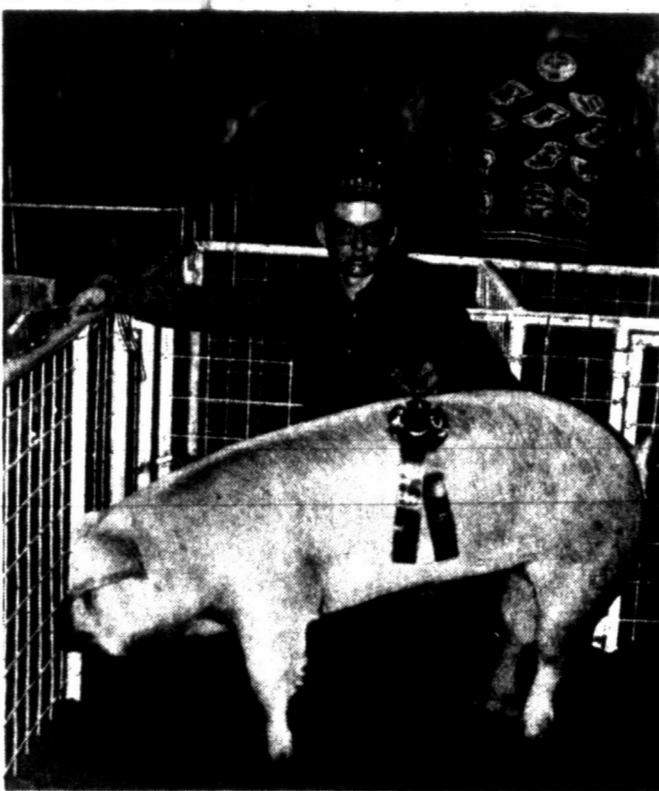
Farmers' Gin reported 1,018 bales ginned, with none on the yard.

The Colorado City Playhouse production of "Wait Until Dark" swept most of this year's awards, however, Marsha Moore stole the hearts of the audience, as she walked away with three of the six playhouse awards presented during the annual awards ceremonies Friday evening.

Mrs. Moore won the award for "Best Actress or Actor in a Minor Role" for her portrayal of "the old lady on the levee" in "Showboat" and then she was awarded the plaque for Best Actress in a Supporting Role for her performance as

"Rosemary Sidney" in "Picnic." Mrs. Moore received her third award jointly with Porter Richardson as co-directors of the Best Production of the Year, "Wait Until Dark."

The Moores remained in the limelight as husband Carl Beery Moore was chosen as Best Actor in a Supporting Role for his portrayal of the sinister "Roate" in "Wait Until Dark."

Veteran actor Kent Womack walked to the podium to claim his title as Best Actor of the Year. Womack won the award for his portrayal of the expectant father, "Harry Lambert," in "Never Too Late."

Amid resounding cheers from more than 100 persons attending the annual awards presentation, Debbie Kelly accepted the award for Best Actress of the Year in a Leading Role.

First Sermon Heard Hundred Years Ago

Mitchell County residents were privileged to hear the first gospel sermon ever preached in Colorado, exactly one hundred years ago Friday.

According to researchers compiling, "The History of the First Presbyterian Church," Presbyterian Minister Oscar Fitzallen Rogers, B.A., M.A. and Bachelor of Divinity, also a scholar in Greek, Latin and

Hebrew, preached the first gospel sermon in Colorado at that time.

History indicates the setting for the sermon was Birdwell's Saloon, the place which could accommodate the most people. With a bar covered background, Rev. Rogers preached to a full house.

Faith For Life's Dark Hours

There are many people who face times of terrible darkness. Sydney W. Powell has a book entitled "Life's High Hurdles," and one of the chapters bears in its heading the pointed statement, "Life is a Struggle." None of us knows the extent or intensity of that struggle as he meets his neighbor on the street or in the marketplace. Every man bears his burden. None is exempt.

Frustration is another of the dark hours we all face. There is so much we want to do and so little we seem to get done. There is so much we want to be and so little we seem to become. But, this is not new. The apostle Paul felt the same way. He said in Romans 7:18-21, "...for the good that I would I do not; but the evil which I would not, that I do...I find then a law, that, when I would do good, evil is present with me." The battle of the divided personality is always raging in all of us!

The attitude you take toward these and other dark hours determines the ultimate outcome. The optimist who denies that there is anything wrong takes a very superficial approach. But, the person who gives up is one who is whipped before the battle really begins. Others take courage and stay by the stuff. But even courage alone cannot dispel the darkness. There is a need for something more.

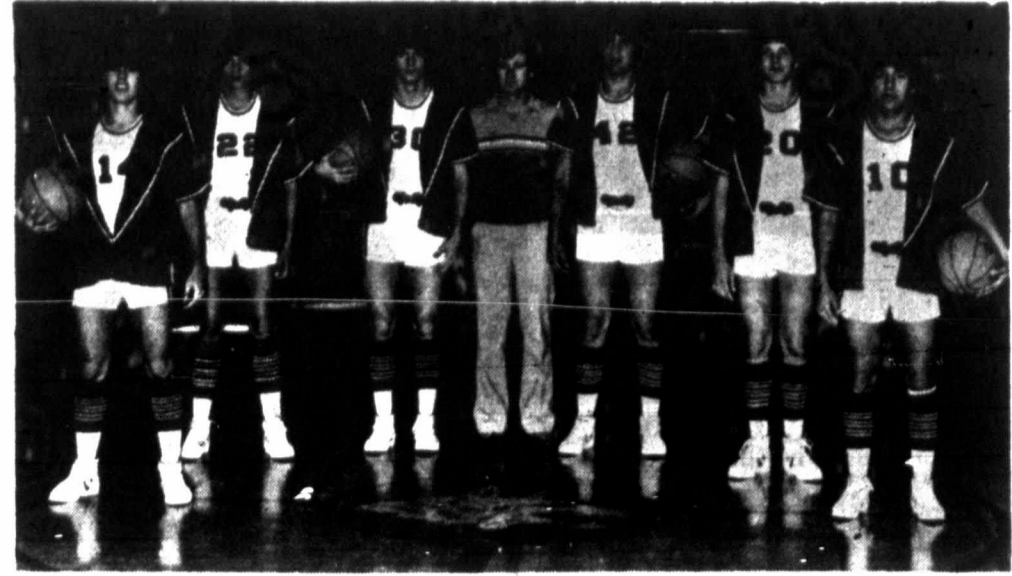
Bowl has been organized to raise funds for a scholarship for a local student in a trade school.

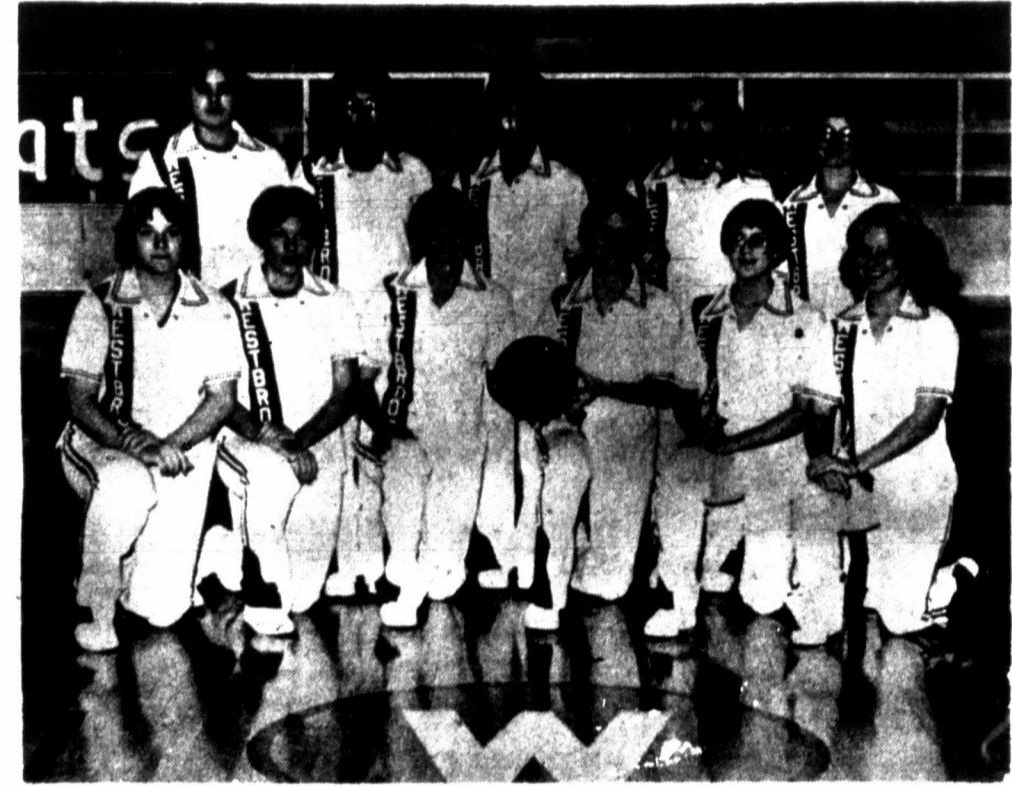

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HEAP Funds Are Now Available For Lower Income Families

Some 600,000 Texas households will divide \$33.8 million this winter under the Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP). Ann Gregory, coordinator of Mitchell County Community Action Program said.

Mrs. Gregory said, "The program, estab-

lished by Congress, is designed to assist low income households meet the increased cost of energy for heating their homes."

Gregory said the case assistance will be one-time payments and will range from \$20 to \$140, based on family size,

income, primary heating energy used and county of residence.

Payments will begin in January and continue through March, 1981, Mrs. Gregory said.

About 400,000 households will receive the energy payment automatically and do not have to apply for it.

These are households now receiving benefits from Aid to Families with Dependent Children, Supplemental Security Income or Food Stamps.

The remaining 200,000 households are low-income families and individuals not already receiving public assistance. Members of these households will be required to apply for HEAP benefits beginning Monday and not after Feb. 28.

Each county in Texas has a designated location for members of these 200,000 households to apply for the energy assistance. These locations may be determined by phoning the local office of the Texas Department of Human Resources. If certified as eligible for the assistance, applicants should have their payments within 20 to 30 days.

Household gross monthly income cannot be more than the following figures for eligibility. Numbers of people in household, in parentheses, precede income figures: (1 person)—\$296; (2)—\$446; (3)—\$613; (4)—\$756; (5)—\$893; (6)—\$1,044; (7)—\$1,196; (8)—\$1,348; (9)—\$1,498; (10)—\$1,649; (11)—\$1,800 and (12)—\$1,951.

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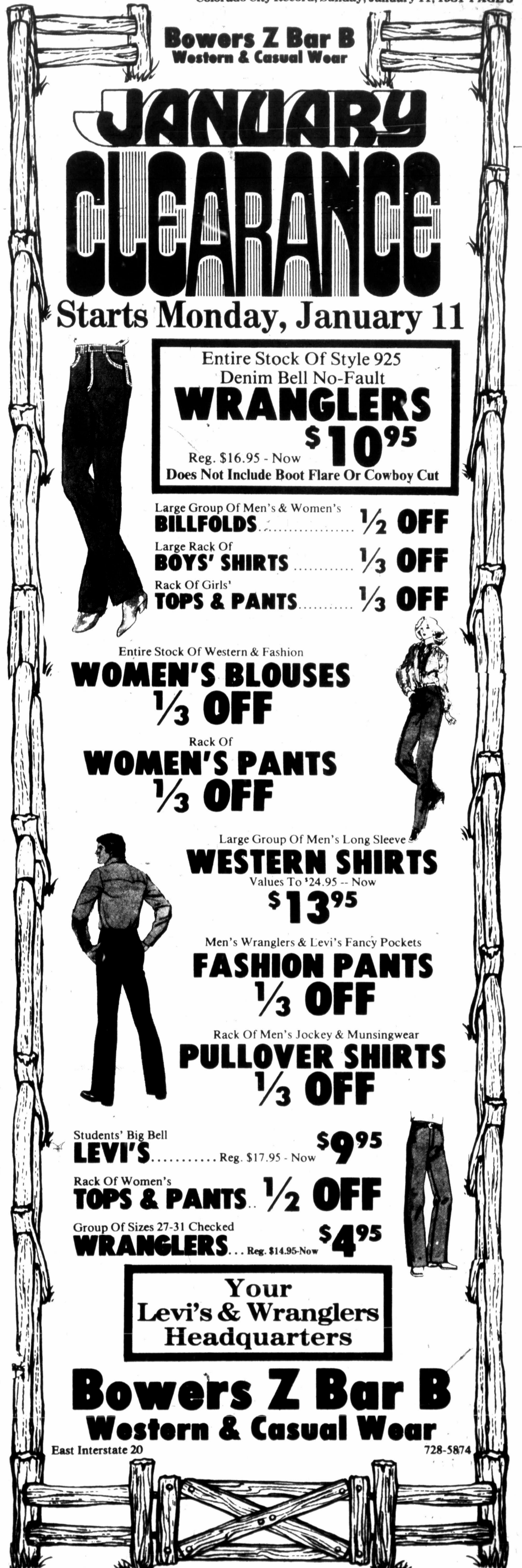

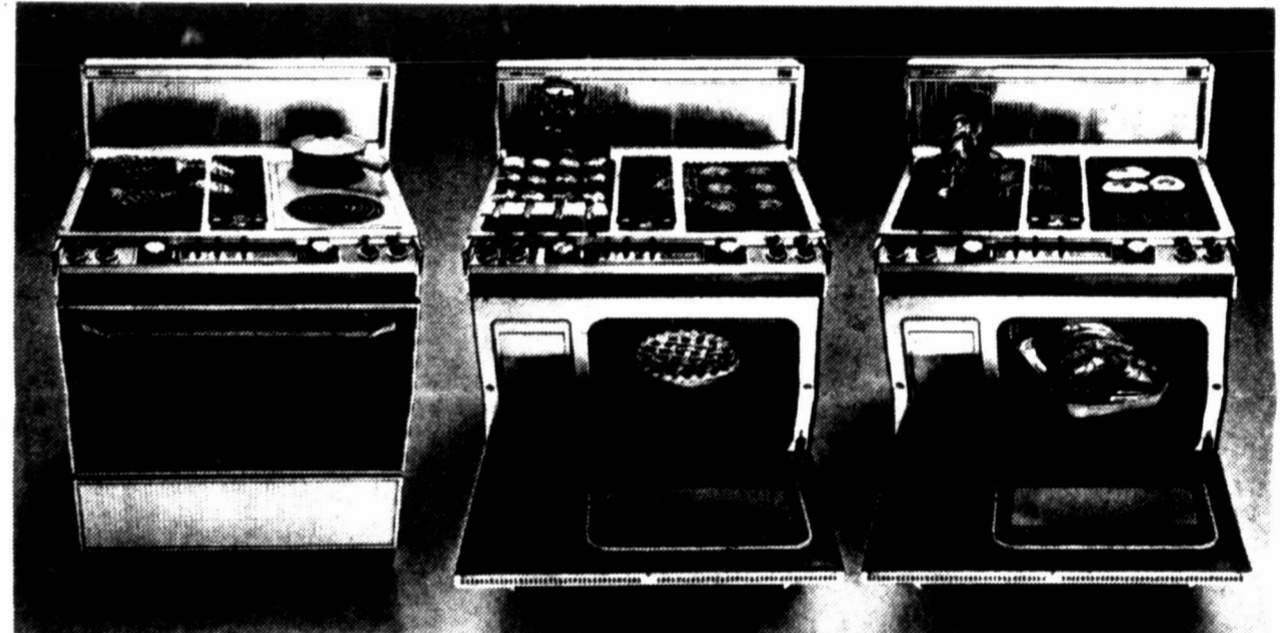

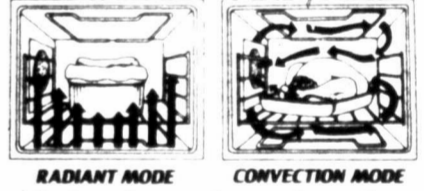

Letter To The Editor

Dear Friends:
Knowing that you share my deep concern for the plight of royalty owners under the so-called windfall profits tax, I am writing to share some good news with you. As you may have heard, the Congress has approved my amendment to refund up to \$1,000 to royalty owners for their payments made under the windfall tax during 1980. The President has signed the measure and the "windfall refund" is now law.

As I told my fellow Texans last Summer at the Finance Committee hearing in Austin on royalty owners and the windfall tax, this one-time refund is only a first step. However, its passage has laid valuable ground work in the House of Representatives for further amending of the tax in the next Congress, which will convene in January. I have stated over and over that this tax is unreasonable and a deterrent to domestic energy production. For this reason, I opposed the tax and I will continue to make use of every opportunity to amend the tax to allow for greater energy production.

The \$1,000 refund is available to individuals, estates and family farm corporations and not to

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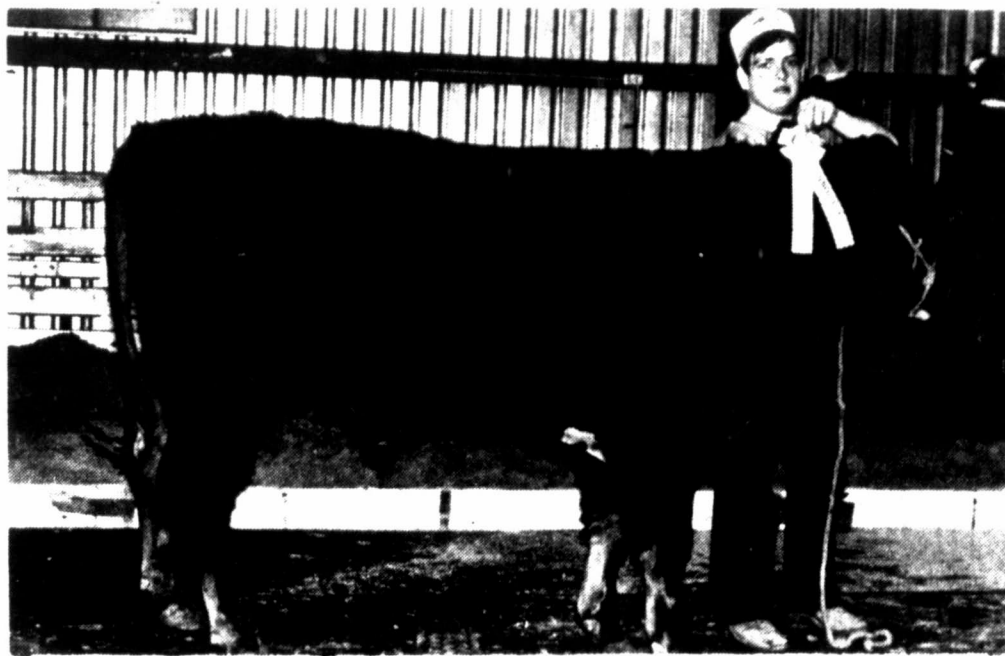
