GENERAL ELECTIONS GOVERN ELIGIBILITY OF CANDIDATES

At the request of Hon. John W. Roberts, Chairman of the Mills County Democratic Committee, County Attorney A. T. Pribble sent the following letter requesting an opinion on the residence requirements of any candidate before his or her name could be placed on the Democratic Primary Election ballot:

Hon. Claude Pollard,
Attorney General,
Austin, Texas.

Dear Sir:

I am asking for your legal opinion. Will a candidate for county office, who has not resided in the county six months next preceding the primary election be eligible to have his name certified by the Executive Committee as a candidate put on the official ballot.

Or does the ineligibility only apply to residence next preceding the general election. Art. 2927 (8082) Revised Statutes 1925.

The following answer from the Hon. D. J. Pickle, Special Assistant Attorney General, indicates that the general or special elections and not primaries, govern the residence requirements and that any person who has resided in Mills County for six months previous to the General Election in November, who is not otherwise barred, is entitled to have his name placed on the Primary Election ballot:

Dear Sir:

This acknowledges receipt of your inquiry of 11th inst., in which you ask:

"Will a candidate for county office, who has not resided in the county six months next preceding the primary election, be eligible to have his name certified by the Executive Committee, as a candidate put on the official ballot; Or does the ineligibility only apply to residence next preceding the general election?"

You are advised that the ineligibility as to residence applies only as a general or special election; and that a person otherwise qualified, may have his or her name placed upon the official ballot for the primary election, provided such person will be qualified, as to the provision as to residence, at the time of the general election. A person ineligible to hold office, if elected at a general election, would be disqualified as a candidate in the primary election preceding such general election.

ONE AND ONE-HALF INCH RAIN BREAKS LONG DRY SPELL

Breaking what threatened to be a serious drought, a slow rain, totaling over one and one-half inches fell over Mills county and this section of the State, Monday and Tuesday. The ground was in ideal condition for receiving the moisture and it fell so slowly that practically every bit of it was soaked into the ground.

Sheep and goat men are smiling now, and a few days will see the end of the feeding season. Grass and weeds should follow within a day or two.

Possibly one of the greatest benefits which will be derived from this rain is the fact that thousands of acres of land which has been sowed in grain will not be planted with cotton. With almost an overproduction last year, the South cannot afford to produce a bumper crop of cotton this year. Several million acres of land in the Mississippi Valley, which were flooded out last year, are in first class condition—with a good bottom season—and will be planted in cotton this year. Mills county folk should make cotton only one of the several major crops.

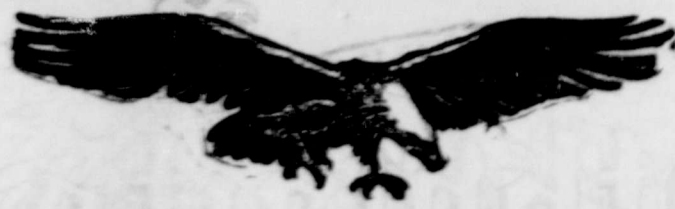
PECAN VALLEY CAMP BOY SCOUTS ORGANIZED

OTHER MIGHTY WORKS OF JESUS

Mark 5:22-43

Terrified by the miracle which cost them their hogs, the Gergesenes entreated the prophet to leave their country, and Jesus returned across the lake to Capernaum. One day shortly after his return there came to him—but Mark shall tell the story:

The Lesson Text:

Authorized Version ("Print vs. 22-27, 32-36").—(22) And, behold, there cometh one of the rulers of the synagogue, Jairus by name; and when he saw him, he fell at his feet, (23) And besought him greatly, saying, My little daughter lieth at the point of death: I pray thee, come and lay thy hands on her, that she may be healed; and she shall live. (24) And Jesus went with him; and much people followed him. (25) And a certain woman, which had an issue of blood twelve years, (26) And had suffered many things of many physicians, and had spent all that she had, and nothing bettered, but rather grew worse, (27) When she had heard of Jesus, came in he press behind, and touched his garment. (32) And he looked round about to see who had done this thing. (33) But the woman fearing and trembling, knowing what was done in her, came and fell down before him, and told him all the truth. (34) And he saith unto her, Daughter, thy faith hath made thee whole; go in peace, and be whole of thy plague. (35) While he yet spake, there came from the ruler of the synagogue's house certain which said Thy daughter is dead: why troublest thou the Master further? (36) As soon as Jesus heard the word that was spoken, he saith unto the ruler of the synagogue, Be not afraid, only believe.

The Lesson Story:
A prominent Jew in Capernaum, a chief officer of the synagogue, made his way through the crowd and prostrating himself at the feet of Jesus cried, "Lord, my little daughter is at the point of death—she is dying—she is dead; but come and lay thy hand upon her, and she shall live." Moved with compassion Jesus went with the ruler, but stopped on the way to speak to a woman who had just crept up behind him and touched the hem of his garment, and, in consequence, had been healed of her disease. While he was talking with her messengers came from the ruler's house to advise Jairus that his daughter was quite dead and that it was useless to trouble the Master further. Jesus overheard them and turned to the ruler and said: "Never mind, only believe and she shall be made whole." When they reached the house the preparations for burial were already in progress and hired mourners with their musical instruments were filling the air with hideous noises usual on such occasions. Taking with him Peter, James and John, the three disciples whom he had chosen to be with him on the most solemn occasions of his life, and the father and mother of the child, Jesus entered the room where the corpse was laid out for burial. As he passed through the crowd he told them that the child was not dead but asleep, at which they ceased their wailing for a moment and broke out with derisive laughter. Standing by the side of the cold form, he took the little one by the hand and said gently, "Get up, little darling"; and immediately the little child

opened her eyes and sprang to her feet. He then quietly handed her over to her parents,

with the simple directions that she should be given something to eat (he would have them do

their part also), and that the matter be kept as quite as possible.

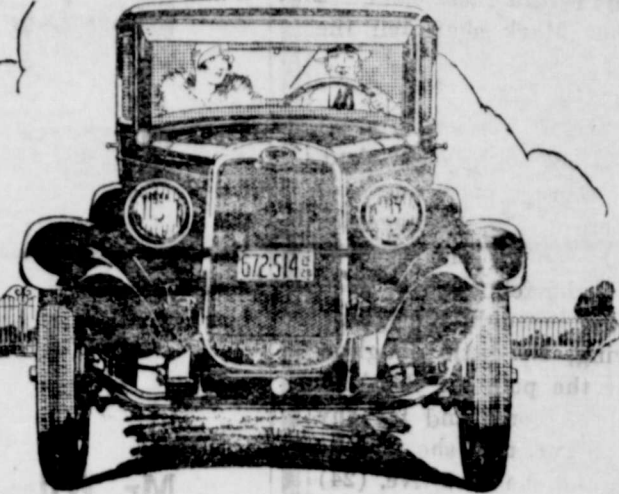
