Three Incumbents Unseated In Races

Three incumbents seeking election in Mitchell County were defeated Saturday.

In the hotly contested City Council of Colorado City election, four new councilmembers were elected, knocking two incumbents from their positions.

Elmer Martin, Ray Dillard, Sammy Par-

ham and Macca Findley will be sworn into office as councilmembers tomorrow (Monday) at the city council meeting.

Martin nabbed the most votes in the election with 459, followed by Dillard with 350. Parham received 308 votes and Findley, 307.

Other contestants in the race received the following: Incumbent Rick Perkin, 296; Nancy Hamner, 228; Incumbent J. O. Dockrey Jr., 191 and A. R. Straub, 82.

A total of 596 votes were cast in the city council race, including 31 absentee votes.

In the 1978 city council election, which was also contested, 325 ballots were cast.

In the Colorado Independent School District board of trustees race, Incumbent Eddie Mitchell was unseated by Dr. Billy Bruce Bridgford.

Dr. Bridgford received 337 votes, Incumbent Gene Blassingame received 285 and Mitchell had 282. A total of 477 votes were cast in the school board race, including 22 absentee ballots.

In the only other contested county race, both

incumbents were re-elected to the Westbrook School Board.

A total of 56 votes were cast in the Westbrook race and Jerry Webb received 56 votes and James Dorn received 46. Wayne Pierce, the challenger, had 10 votes.

In the Mitchell County Hospital District board race, four incumbents were seeking re-election unopposed.

A total of 153 votes were cast in the hospital board race with the following results: Herbert Mearse, 144; Willie Landau, 144; Preston Morris, 144 and Bobby Lemons, 143.

A total of 72 votes were cast in the unopposed Loraine City

City Council To Adopt Budget For 1979-1980

The adoption of a 1979-80 city budget calling for revenues of \$1,260,378 and expenditures of \$1,148,763 will be one of the top items on the agenda at Monday night's meeting of the City Council of Colorado City.

Revenues and expenditures of \$773,175 and \$682,650 respectively are called for in the general fund and water and sewer fund revenues and expenditures are set for \$434,100 and \$413,010 respectively.

Councilmembers will hold a public hearing on the budget and will vote

on an ordinance as to whether to adopt it or not. Included in the budget is \$53,103 of revenue sharing funds.

Passage of an ordinance establishing the new city service rates to go in effect on May 1 will also be considered.

In other matters, the council will consider giving their permission for the endorsing of Mayor Marion Bassham and City Secretary Brenda Tarter to execute a \$100,000 loan from the City National Bank for the general fund.

The Colorado City Chamber of Commerce

will make a request for \$4,000 from the city from funds collected from the motel occupancy tax to sponsor a rodeo in connection with the American Junior Rodeo Association.

A city representative to the ambulance board will be appointed to replace Buddy Hertenberger.

City Manager Ray Mason will ask the permission of the council to advertise for bids for a new backhoe for the water and sewer department. The backhoe is expected to cost about \$20,000 and the money

will come out of revenue sharing funds.

Councilmembers will also open and award a bid for paving for the Colorado City Airport.

Finally, Mason will present the council a financial report for the city as of the end of March.

During March, the city had general fund revenues of \$84,910.25 and general fund expenditures of \$62,783.13. The general fund had a deficit balance as of March 31 of \$22,340.06. This compares with a \$44,467.18 at the end of February.

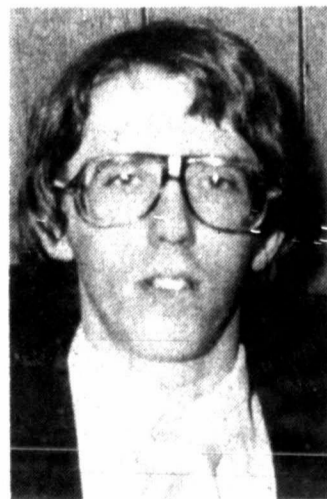
Veterinarian Retires After 40 Years Service

Dr. Williams came here in 1936. He said that he was looking for a small town to open a practice in and relatives encouraged him to come here. He indicated that he had never regretted his decision.

Dr. Williams was born in Granbury, Texas and attended Thorp Springs Christian College and John Tarleton Jr. College, now Tarleton State University in Stephenville. From there he went to Texas A&M where he received a degree as Doctor of Veterinary Medicine as a distinguished student. His graduating class of 13 members was the largest in the history of the veterinary school up to that time.

Dr. Williams stated that there has been changes in veterinary medicine since the time he first opened his practice. Then, about 80 per cent of his practice was spent treating large animals such as horses and cattle and only 20 per cent was spent with the smaller animals. Now, the practice is about half and half between the larger and smaller animals.

He went on to say that when he first came here in the 1930's, he was virtually the only veterinarian in the entire area and he often traveled an area from Abilene on into New Mexico and worked seven days a week doing it.

Despite his heavy schedule during these

years, he found time to involve himself in other things. He is a past master of the Colorado City Masonic Lodge and he served a term on the Colorado School Board.

Dr. Williams has received many honors over the years and was considered then, as he is now, an outstanding practitioner in the treatment of horses.

Possibly his biggest honor came in 1953, when, in a poll conducted by Southwestern Veterinarian magazine, he was named the "Outstanding Practitioner of Texas" for that year.

In naming Dr. Williams for the honor at that time, the magazine stated, "The veterinarians of Texas chose in

Dr. Williams a man who has shown ingenuity, progressiveness and achievement that all practitioners strive to obtain."

It was also in 1953 that he served as President of the Texas Veterinary Medical Association. He also served on the executive board of this association for a number of years and served a two year term on the Texas State Board of Veterinary Medical Examiners.

Dr. Williams has also apparently been very influential in guiding others in his family into his profession. He has three nephews who are now veterinarians, in Denison, Lubbock and Indianapolis, Indiana.

The veterinarian related a number of unusual and humorous incidents that have taken place during his career here in Colorado City.

He said that probably one of the funniest happened a number of years ago when he was on vacation.

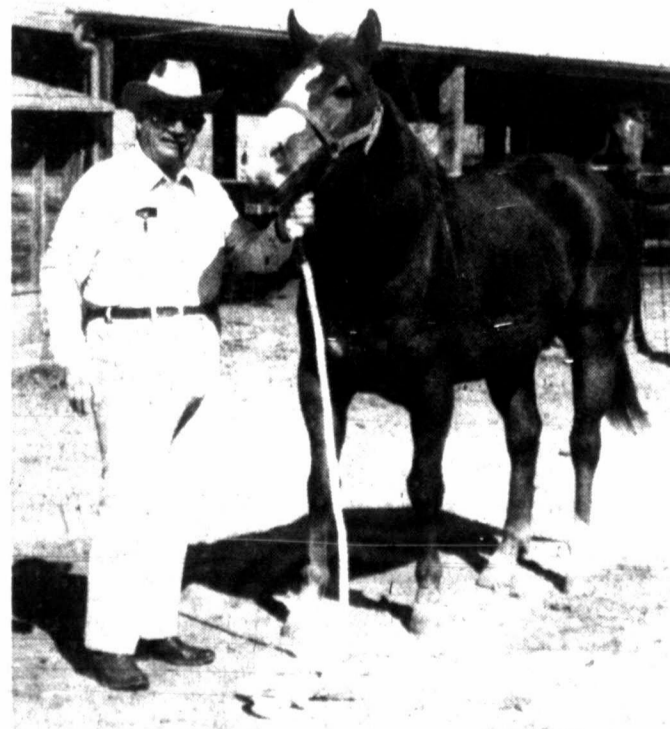
A young veterinarian and another assistant whom he employed at the time were caring for two Cocker Spaniels who were virtually identical. One of the animals belonged to a man in Abilene and the other belonged to a family who was in Arkansas at the time.

The man in Abilene called the office and asked that his animal be sent to him. The two assistants did send an

animal to him and in the meantime sent the other dog to the family in Arkansas.

Shortly afterwards, they received a call from the man in Abilene saying that the dog he had been sent wasn't his. They had an embarrassing situation before they finally got the two dogs reunited with their rightful owners.

Dr. Williams said that he didn't know about this incident until many years later he ran into the young veterinarian and the man told him the whole story.

By comparison, only about one in 10 men or women said that they look forward to commercials on radio and TV and less than three in 10 (33 per cent of the women and 24 per cent of the men) look forward to seeing the ads in the magazines.

Psalms 25, Unto thee, O Lord, do I lift up my soul. O my God, I trust in thee: let me not be ashamed. Let not mine enemies triumph over me. Yes, let none that wait on thee be ashamed: let them be ashamed which transgress without cause. Show me thy ways, O Lord; teach me thy paths. Lead me in thy truth and teach me; for thou art the God of my salvation; on thee do I wait all the day.

There seems to be an obsession with God's teachings and proper worship and right doctrine in today's churches. A great deal of time is spent in explaining why the other fellow is wrong and we are right. There are conservative denominations, the Pentecostal groups, the "hard shelled," the "soft shelled" the literature users, the Bible ushers (The Bible Alone), the Sunday School havers, the no Sunday School Churches, the independent, the non-denominational, the all-denominational Churches and the list of deferences go on and each church promoting its differences in a search for identity. Board Considers Athletic Director

The most notable is the possible selection of a new athletic director to replace Mike Farda, who resigned his position last month.

Superintendent Char-

lie Uselton said Friday that he and a screening committee made up of boardmembers, Fleta Lewis, Eddie Mitchell, Tom Rees and Eddie Plaud had conducted many meetings during the past few weeks going over the more than 60 applications which have been received. He said that they had interviewed and were still considering 12 applicants for the position, two already on the coaching staff here and 10 from out of town.

The superintendent said that the committee would make a recommendation at the meeting as to their choice after which the entire board will decide whether to approve it or not.

Another matter on the agenda will be the canvassing of Saturday's school board election in which two seats are coming open.

Boardmembers Eddie Mitchell and Gene Blassingame have both filed for re-election and challenger Dr. Billy Bridgford is also in the race.

After the canvassing and the giving of the oath of office of the two elected boardmembers, the board will be reorganized with the election of new officers. At present, Tom Rees is president, Mac Morris is vice president and Fleta Lewis is serving as secretary.

Prior to the regular meeting at 7 p.m., the board will take a tour of the fieldhouse at Wolf Stadium.

Tax Assessor-Collector J. S. Craddock Jr. will present the school's regular monthly financial report to the boardmembers.
