RUSSIA MAY TAKE DRASTIC MEASURES

Many Dead, 25,000 Homeless in Earthquake

ACCUSE REBELS OF SINKING SOVIET SHIP

LONDON, Dec. 21 (U.P.)—Russian anger over reports that Spanish nationalists set fire to a Soviet ship caused new fears today that the civil war might yet develop into an international conflict.

At Russia's request, Great Britain has consented to aid in determining the ship's fate. It was understood that if it is proved that nationalists set fire to the ship, possibly with loss of life, Russia may ask that all governments declare the nationalist ships pirate, to be sunk on sight. It was believed that, aside from a possible "piracy" declaration, Russia would undertake many movements designed to protect Soviet ships in Spanish waters. There were reports that such movements already had begun.

PROTEST MASS MEETINGS BEING HELD IN RUSSIA MOSCOW, Dec. 21 (U.P.)—Protest mass meetings were held throughout the country today after the government accused the Spanish rebels of sinking the Soviet steamer Komsomol.

SUPREME COURT BACKS PROGRAM OF PRESIDENT

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 21 (U.P.)—The Supreme Court gave strong emphasis to President Roosevelt's neutrality program today with a decision upholding the validity of the China arms embargo.

The Court's decision was in such broad terms as to appear to make safe constitutionality of present neutrality legislation, and similar measures which have been suggested in new deal quarters to keep the nation out of war.

In another important action taken before recessing to January 4, the court agreed to rule on constitutionality of the Frazier-Lemke farm mortgage act in a test brought personal by Representative William Lemke of North Dakota, one of the bill's authors.

Arms Embargo

WASHINGTON, Dec. 21 (U.P.)—The Supreme Court's decision on the China arms embargo case was awaited with apprehension by State Department and other officials for its possible effect upon the neutrality policies of the administration.

The resolution under which President Roosevelt acted on May 28, 1934, when he proclaimed an embargo on shipments of arms and munitions of war to Bolivia and Paraguay, participants in the long raging Chaco war, was much the same as those under which previous presidents levied similar embargoes. At that time, however, the possible effect on business of an arms embargo had been foreseen. Neutrality legislation, later to take form in the neutrality act of 1935, amended in 1936, was already under discussion. The activity of the companies involved in the present litigation in allegedly agreeing to sell 15 machine guns in the United States to Bolivia gave indication of being a test case.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 21 (U.P.)—The campaign to restore peace to the west coast shipping industry gained momentum today with official announcement of a shipowners' agreement with deck hands and new negotiations to conciliate differences between operators and marine firemen.

Terms for Release Believed Near Today

SHANGHAI, (Tuesday) Dec. 22 (U.P.)—Negotiations of final terms for release of Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek, China's "strong man," by Marshal Chang Hsue-Liang was believed near today, after days of confusion. The position seemed to be that the young marshal was eager to get rid of his "guest" but was afraid to do so until he had received guarantees for his own safety.

Three States to Answer Tax Suit

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 21 (U.P.)—The states of Massachusetts, Florida and New York were given 40 days today to show cause why the Supreme Court should not entertain a suit brought by the State of Texas to determine its right to impose an inheritance tax on the \$50,000,000 estate of Edward H. R. Green, son of the late Hetty Green.

Lone Star, Hickok Nearing Pay Sand

The Bogs No. 3, Lone Star well, being drilled by Gallagher & Lawson, contractor, is now at 2,900 feet, expecting to pick up the pay at around 3,400 feet, in about ten days if no troubles are encountered. The Hickok, drilling in the same area and only a few hundred yards distant, is a little deeper than the above reading. With no hindrance they will pick up the pay a little sooner at about the same depth.

2 MEN, WOMAN SECURE \$4,500 IN BANK RAID

ORANGE GROVE, Dec. 21 (U.P.)—Two men and a woman clad in hunting clothes robbed the Farmers State Bank of Orange Grove today of \$4,500 and escaped toward San Antonio.

The two men, one armed with a pistol, and the other with a sawed off shotgun entered the bank at midmorning. The woman waited in an automobile. Locking six persons in the bank vault, the robbers scooped up all available currency and ran from the building.

LANDON TALKS TO PRESIDENT; SWAP STORIES

WASHINGTON, Dec. 21 (U.P.)—Governor Landon came to the White House today and traded fishing stories with President Roosevelt.

In an informal meeting Landon and the president sat around the table, "swapping fishing" stories and talked about their families. When Landon came out he told newspapermen "We talked about Christmas and children. The president talked about his grandchildren and I talked about my children."

RELIEF WORK BEGINNING IN EIGHT CITIES

SAN SALVADOR, Dec. 21 (U.P.)—Relief forces mobilized today to care for 25,000 persons made homeless in the worst local earthquake since 1879. At least 100 were feared dead and more than 500 injured. President Martinez took personal charge as reports from eight cities rocked by tremors over the weekend indicated staggering losses of life and property. Relief workers, digging in the ruins of San Vicente, 23 miles east of here, said the death toll there probably would reach 100. They had recovered 70 bodies.

NEW YORK, Dec. 21 (U.P.)—Winter arrived officially at 6:30 p. m. Central Standard Time tonight, when the earth enters the winter solstice in its path around the sun. Today will be the shortest day of the year, with nine hours and 14 minutes of daylight.

800 Lion in Search Of Missing Airliner

SALT LAKE CITY, Dec. 21 (U.P.)—A force of U. S. army regulars and CCC recruits, 800 strong, set out today to search south of here for the Western Airliner missing six days with seven persons aboard. Amelia Earhart Putnam, famous woman flyer, also joined the search. Allan Barrie, WAF vice-president, said he believed the ground search was the only feasible method left. Planes have flown over the liner's route since Tuesday, without success. Barrie posted \$1,000 reward for information leading to discovery of the plane.

Pope to Broadcast Despite Illness

VATICAN CITY, Dec. 21 (U.P.)—Pope Pius XI, despite his illness, will broadcast a message to the world on Christmas eve. The message is expected to be an urgent appeal to the world to cease warfare and live together in Christian peace. While consulting with radio officials, it was learned the Pope said with a twinkle in his eyes, "I want the entire world to know I am still alive."

BURGLARS ROB RED FRONT AND OPEN SCHOOL BOARD'S VAULT

Police were busy this morning investigating safe breaking and burglaries and petty pilfering as reported by various parties, which included opening of the school board's safe and prying into the cash register of the Red Front Drug store Saturday night. The burglars entered the Red Front through the front door, which was pried open and around \$5.00 taken. No other goods have been missed. The school board safe in the Cisco Bank building office on the fourth floor was entered and a visit made to all offices on that floor. Some \$40 or \$50 were taken from the safe whose combination was worked and the money box broken open. Fingerprints were being taken this morning by fingerprint expert M. H. French, of the police department, and clues being checked, which may lead to an early arrest. Meanwhile cars were reported broken into and Christmas packages taken in various parts of town, some on Main street while parked in front of business houses. A warning is issued to lock cars and doors of residences when being vacated. There seems to be an epidemic of thievery just now which the police is using every effort to stop and catch offenders. With their usual prompt action arrests may be expected soon.

This, A Woman's Age!

This may be classed as woman's age. Most buying, most creations in the commercial world, most planning, is done with the paramount thought of woman in mind. She is found in every kind of shop, in the bandit gang, working in the oil field and traveling vans along with man.

A king gives up his throne because he could not have the woman of his choice, even though she did belong to another, and still keep his kingdom. Woman does most of the spending for this nation and wise merchants and tradesmen have arranged their shops and displays accordingly. In the far places, in outlying islands of the sea, woman is found battling and suffering beside her man. The earth could not be conquered without woman. Her stimulation to man's ambition to build, to destroy, to live, has made him the king of the earth, but she is queen and while man holds the scepter, she does the swaying.

Strange, perhaps, but business is conducted mostly for women in this era of many paradoxes. It wasn't so long ago that the majority of the stores traded with men, that advertisements were written to attract men and that the manufacturers were busy supplying the needs of men.

The woman has three exclusive ladies' wear shops to one man's shop. Every man knows how the bobbed hair craze created "bobber" shops and beauty parlors for women only in sufficient numbers and capaciousness to completely overshadow the male tonsorial institutions. Automobile manufacturers are accounting the appointments for women afforded by their models and where they formerly advertised that their motors were accessible to men drivers they now herald the fact that the operating levers and pedals are easily accessible to women. Department stores cater almost exclusively to feminine shoppers, and the cosmetic counters now consume the greater part of the floor space in the corner drug store.

A few years ago womanhood had to be content with one or two small and poorly edited magazines, for the large majority of the weekly and monthly periodicals were published for men. A census taken at any news stand today would show magazines for women predominating. The modern women's magazine is larger and carries more advertising than the more popular men's magazines and while there are many periodicals strictly for women there are few strictly men's publications. The office girls are even making encroachments on man's traditional morning newspaper, as the advertisements and departments bear witness.

This metamorphosis has not been the result of granting the vote to women. The ballot for women came with the rest of the evolution. The greatest factor in the transformation was the increase, during the war and since, in the number of financially independent women. More women working meant more money to buy. Better wages for husbands have given wives more money to spend and more time to shop. Then, also, women are earning a wage today more commensurate with their needs and love of luxury.

Emulating the Bee

A great naturalist describes the honey bee as having the white man's craftiness, his industry, his architectural skill, his neatness and love of system, his foresight, and, above all, his eager miserly habits. The honey bee's great ambition is to be rich, to lay up great stores, to possess the sweet of every flower that blossoms. She is more than provident. Enough will not satisfy her; she must have all she can get by hook and crook.

When the white man came to America the Indians learned that he offered stiff competition in reclaiming the land, in the hunt and in tilling the corn. It meant that life became a little more work and a great deal less leisure for the dusky warriors and they naturally resented it. This old competition between the palefaces and redskins has been supplanted by an even more spirited competition among the white men themselves. There are some men and women who are content with a bare existence and there are others who have the honey bee's great ambition to be rich, to lay up great stores. The energetic and thrifty man makes it harder for the indolent to eke out their existence and so the latter dislikes the ambitious one as fiercely as did the Indian and white man.

But God put that insatiable desire for work, for building, for progress, into man's mental and physical make-up. And through that divinely implanted instinct—and it is an instinct as surely in man as in bee—man has developed the earth and has started and continued a development within himself that leads to a refinement more nearly like unto God himself, who has commanded energy and rebuked the slothful in His Holy Book.

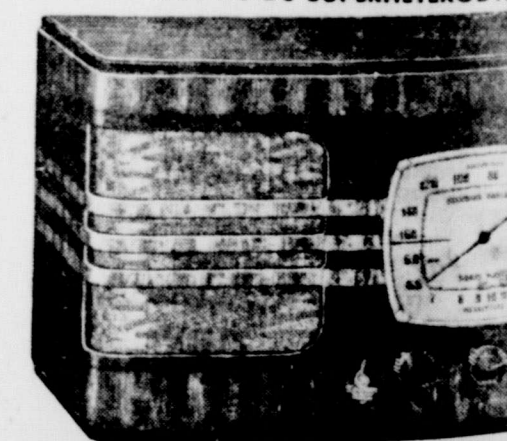

Watch for the time is drawing night.

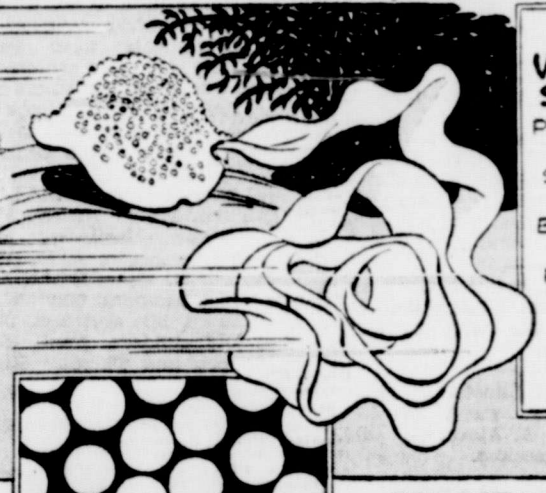
What if it were today?"

HUNTERS SPEND MANY MILLIONS

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 21.—Fishing and hunting have been developed into a major industry that benefits California about \$63,000,000 a year.

Next year, it is hoped to boost this figure to \$80,000,000.

Statistics just completed by the Fish and Game Development association indicate that fishing and hunting are de luxe sports and de luxe industries. The association four months in finding out just how much anglers and hunters of the state spend during a year for their favorite hobbies. The first two figures they arrived at were total annual expenditures of \$63,015,440 and 400,000 fishing and hunting licenses. This latter figure will reach 500,000 in 1937, it is estimated.

Hunter Spends \$115
The average annual expenditure of the California hunter is \$115.58 and the average annual expenditure of the angler is \$116.80.

The total investment in equipment by hunters and anglers in California is placed at \$128,948,728.75. The average individual equipment totals \$475.19.

The total expenditure for supplies for 1935 was \$16,916,215.

The total expenditure for fishing and hunting equipment during 1935 was \$24,429,203.75.

Sportsmen of the state during the same period spent with hotels, inns, resorts and camps for lodging a total of \$11,248,323.75. These same men spent for transportation, principally in operation of automobiles, approximately \$10,500,000.

Hunting and Fishing Linked
Of the total number of licenses issued in the state more than 58 per cent of the buyers purchased a fishing and hunting license, these constituting approximately 235,000 men and women.

Fishing clubs revealed that they operated at an average of expense of \$1,573.14, but hunting clubs found themselves under the necessity of putting up more serious "front," which cost them an average of \$2,906.96 annually. Hunting and fishing clubs had an average investment in land and equipment of \$36,995.38.

conspirators in connection with the transaction.

The penalty for violation of the embargo was fixed by Congress at up to a \$10,000 fine and a maximum prison sentence of two years.

Instead of going to trial the defendants entered a demurrer to the indictment.

They charged that the resolution under which President Roosevelt acted was an invalid delegation of legislative power to the President. They also asserted that the indictment must fail because a substitute proclamation was issued by the president after the offenses complained of had been committed.

In addition they argued that the embargo was not within the powers granted the president after the offenses complained of had been committed. In addition they argued that the powers granted the president in the embargo resolution.

Restrictions On Authority
The last named contention was based on the fact that the resolution gave him authority to proceed only after conferring with representatives of other nations and after having their assurance that an embargo would halt hostilities.

The district court ruled only on the first contention. It held power had been improperly delegated to the president and set the indictment aside on these grounds.

Martin Conboy, then U. S. attorney for the southern district of New York, appealed at once to the Supreme Court without waiting for the action of the Circuit Court of Appeals. He was named a special assistant attorney general to argue the case before the Supreme Court.

In his briefs and in his argument Conboy contended that condemnation of the delegation of power employed in the Chaco case would have a possible serious consequence on the present neutrality law. He asserted that since 1794 similar delegations of the power to embargo had been employed.

Other Presidents Cited
In 1912, Conboy said, an embargo resolution had been adopted permitting the president to embargo arms and munitions shipments to any American country where he found a condition of domestic violence existing which had been promoted by the shipment of supplies from the United States.

Subsequently, he said, embargoes had been proclaimed under a broad delegation of power halting shipments to Mexico, China, Honduras, Cuba, Nicaragua and Brazil.

Conboy contended that only the president through the State Department, was equipped to obtain the information necessary to determine whether an embargo was desirable or would prove effective.
