TREMORS ARE FELT IN FIVE EAST STATES

USES ARE SWAYED BY DISTURBANCES; ONE CHURCH WRECKED

(By Associated Press)
A series of earth tremors, varying considerably in intensity and length of duration, rocked portions of five eastern states and one Canadian province today.

Quakes were reported at intervals from as far east as Springfield, Mass., west to Ashland, Ohio, south to various points in Pennsylvania, and north to Toronto.

Damage Done

In most cases the effects of the shocks were confined to the awakening of sleepers and the violent rattling of windows and dishes, but in western New York, where the tremor appeared to have reached its maximum intensity, considerable damage was done.

Houses Sway

In Conasauga, where the tremor lasted nearly three minutes, large apartment houses were said to have swayed noticeably, and police and fire departments were alerted with telephone calls from terrified households.

In Elmira a woman reported her bed broke down from the force of the quake.

At Alfredville and pictures were thrown to the floor during the shock which lasted about 15 seconds.

Birmingham reported the earliest experience of the quakes, fixing them between 1 and 2 a. m., when residents were awakened by the violent tilting of their beds, but no damage was reported.

Most serious damage was reported from Attica, where one of the walls of the Methodist Episcopal church collapsed and falling chimneys damaged the roof of the building. A huge chimney on an industrial plant at Warsaw, in Wyoming county collapsed.

ZEP TO LEAVE ON WEDNESDAY

DR. ECKENER PLANS TO START WORLD TOUR THIS WEEK

(By Associated Press)
FRIEDRICHSHAFEN, Germany, Aug. 12.—Dr. Hugo Eckener, commander of the Graf Zeppelin, this afternoon ordered the dirigible cleared for sailing "on the Tokyo stage of her flight around the world at 3:00 a. m., Wednesday (9:00 p. m., Tuesday (E. S. T.)."

He admitted the departure of the big air liner might be delayed by unfavorable weather until the same hour Thursday morning.

Start To Be Early.
In any case the start will be made in the early morning hours as the low temperature then permits a maximum load of gas.

TWO LIVES ARE TAKEN IN FEUD

MARSHALL, N. C., Aug. 12 (P).—The Landers and King men, three members of the Stanton family and Albert King on a narrow mountain road yesterday. Before they parted two men were killed and a 12-year old girl wounded in a flare-up of a family feud.

Arthur Stanton, 36, his daughter, Agnes, 12, his brother, Hubert, and King, 35, were riding down the road in King's car when they met Arnold and Sampson Landers in a truck. The two machines stopped.

In the exchange of gunfire Arthur Stanton and King were killed. Agnes was shot in the head. Each side accused the other of shooting first. The Landers boys and Stanton were arrested and lodged in jail.

Mountaineers of the section said there had been "bad blood" between the Landers and the Stantons.

Eight Killed In Plane Accidents

(By Associated Press)
CLOVIS, N. M., Aug. 12.—Search from the air for a cockpit vent cover blown from an airplane at the take-off ended fatally for the pilot-owner of the ship and two passengers here yesterday.

Lieut. O. L. Stephens, who was at the controls, and Thomas E. Scully, 32, and Philip Berry, 29, officials of the Clovis Trans-Continental airport, were the victims.

Attempted to Bank

Observers said Stephens attempted to bank steeply for a turn over a dry lake bed at an altitude of 100 feet when the plane went into a sideslip and fell.

The pilot's body was found lying on the motor. Scully and Berry, who were in the 4-passenger compartment of the ship, were pinned in the cabin. In taking off, the cockpit vent cover was blown off the plane. Lieut. Stephens returned to the field, and after failure to find the piece aloft, started the search from the air.

THREE KILLED IN MISSISSIPPI CRASH

ROLLING FORK, Miss., Aug. 12 (P).—Three men were killed in an airplane crash here yesterday when their plane nose dived and fell about 150 feet as the pilot banked for a landing.

The dead are: Albert T. Firth, Jr., 20, of Hollybluff, Miss.; the pilot; Warren Barter, 21, of Rolling Fork; and Joe Cox, 21, of Charleston, Miss.

FOG BLAMED FOR PILOT'S DEATH

PITTSBURGH, Pa., Aug. 12 (P).—Harry Smith, 26, Akron, Ohio, pilot, was killed today when his plane fell on the Pittsburgh-McKeesport boulevard near Bettis field. He had taken off 15 minutes earlier from Bettis field and was believed to have become confused in a fog.

BRAZILIAN FLIER IS KILLED IN BAY

PENSACOLA, Fla., Aug. 12 (P).—While his comrades of the air dived over Pensacola Bay, and Tugs skinned the water's surface, confounding their search for the body of P. F. Cardero Parais, Brazilian aviator, an official of the Brazilian embassy arriving from Washington today was expected to report on the cause of the flier's fatal plunge.

The plane, while flying high along the shore line Saturday, averted suddenly and plunged into the bay. A rescue detail from the Pensacola naval air base where the Brazilian was taking a special training course at the request of his government, recovered the plane from 38 feet of water but found no trace of the aviator.

COURT APPROVES LIONS PETITION

The Lubbock county commissioners court voted unanimously this morning in favor of granting the petition of the local Lions club for opening the east side of the public square, east of the court house, as a resting place for the public, where benches may be placed and public meetings held.

Formulating the petition last week, the Lions club proposed to purchase one bench for the designated recreation spot, while the Avalanche-Journal has agreed to purchase a bench.

The east side of the square, spotted with big shade trees, has long been unused by the public. The new resting center will afford a place for open air meetings and will be an inviting center for tourists and South Plains shoppers.

BEVERLY, Mass., Aug. 12 (P).—Something akin to a panic has been caused among wealthy members of the North Shore colony by Saturday's \$250,000 jewelry robbery at the exclusive West Beach estate of E. H. Hitchinson, Philadelphia, broker, clubman and son-in-law of E. T. Stotesbury, Morgan partner.

Local officers have been reinforced by private detectives from New York to guard the vast wealth in scores of exclusive homes.

EIGHT HURT IN MISHAPS IN WEEK-END

CARS RESPONSIBLE FOR 7; OKLAHOMA MAN'S ARM HIT BY TRUCK

TAX BOARD MEETS TODAY TO FIX RATE

RATE EXPECTED TO BE SET AROUND 30-CENT MARK BY GROUP

AUSTIN, Aug. 12.—The automatic tax board meets today to fix the tax rate. The ad valorem levy will be set at from 27 to 30 cents, it was reported. The constitutional limit is 35 cents. The present rate is 22 cents. It is virtually certain the school tax will be fixed at 33 cents and the Confederate pension levy at seven cents, present figures and constitutional limit.

Owing to the deep cut Governor Moody made in the appropriation bills, extracting \$3,016,401 from the total to bring them to \$44,776,334—below the aggregate amount voted for the biennium ending August 31—it was believed the rate could be fixed at 22 cents and certainly not over 25 cents, but the governor said with a bulk of the expenditures needed for the first year of the biennium he did not believe the rate could be made lower than 27 cents and it would likely be as high as 30 cents.

VANCOUVER B. C., Aug. 12 (P).—Tex Rankin, Portland, aviator, took off here at 4:45 a. m. today on a non-stop flight to Agua Caliente, Mexico, in his eighty horsepower machine, "The Three Flies." Rankin, who had expected to make the flight Sunday was prevented by smoke and mist from hopping off.

The aviators arrived here Saturday afternoon, landed their plane at Alverca airdrome, and began secret preparations for a trans-Atlantic flight from Lisbon to New York.

LIVES OF TWO FAMILIES SNUFFED OUT IN TRAGEDY NEAR DALLAS; NEGRO MAN HELD FOR PROBE IN LOCAL COLLISION

MADELINE KELLEY AND WINTA STUBBS ARE SERIOUSLY HURT

Madeline Kelly, 17, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Kelly, 410 Avenue U, and Winta Stubbs, 13, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. V. Stubbs, 2102 Tenth street, are in a critical condition today at the Lubbock sanitarium, suffering of probable fatal injuries sustained Sunday night at 9:20 o'clock, when the car in which they were riding collided with another auto at the intersection of Texas Avenue and Sixteenth street.

Robert Austin, negro, alleged by witnesses to have been driving at a speed of 40 miles an hour, was arrested immediately after the crash, and is being held in the Lubbock county jail awaiting developments as to condition of the girls, no charges have yet been filed against Austin, who was accompanied last night by his wife.

Two Others Hurt

Minnie D. Kelly, 11, sister of Madeline, and Iva Lee Bynum, 14, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Bynum, 2024 Tenth, sustained minor injuries, but condition of either is not serious. Wiloughby Kelly and Juanita Kelly, daughters of Mr. and Mrs. S. C. Kelly, of Ranger, who were visiting in this city with their cousins, Madeline and Minnie D., were unhurt in the crash.

Madeline Kelly sustained a fractured skull, deep cuts on head and face, a broken left leg above the knee, fractured right knee, fractured jaw, concussion of brain. Her left ear was almost severed.

Suffers Concussion

The girls suffered fractured bones of the skull and face, concussion of the brain and an injury to the left ankle.

Hospital attendants announce that condition of either of the two is precarious, while slight hope is maintained for recovery.

Minnie D. Kelly was injured about the right ankle and sustained two cuts above the right elbow, while Iva Lee Bynum suffered an injured shoulder and fractured collar bone. Both are receiving treatment at the hospital.

AUSTIN, Aug. 12 (P).—A man said by officers to fit the description of Jake Fleagle, one of seven bandits who held up a Lamar, Colorado, bank on May 23, 1928, was arrested today by Travis county officers. The suspect was accompanied by a woman.

The arrests were made after a newspaper bearing Fleagle's picture and an account of the \$238,000 robbery was seen by an Austin garage man. The garage owner telephoned Sheriff Coley White a man who looked like the photograph of Fleagle had spent the night in a tourist camp.

"WAS AFRAID OF WHITES," NEGRO SAYS

EXAMINING TRIAL WILL BE HELD TODAY FOR ROBERT AUSTIN

"I was afraid of the white folks," said Robert Austin, negro, held in connection with the auto accident here last night which may prove fatal to two Lubbock girls and which slightly injured two others, in explaining to a Daily Journal reporter why he fled from scene of the wreck.

Austin, arrested at his home, 1016 17th street, is in the Lubbock county jail. An examining trial will probably be held sometime this afternoon in Justice of Peace G. R. Scott's court, it was announced this morning.

Going 25 Miles
"I was driving about 25 miles an hour," said Austin. "I had time to stop when I saw the car, but I figured the girls would stop. I couldn't have helped it. I wanted to go back and see if any one was hurt, but I knew the white folks would say the 'Nigger is wrong,' so I left my wrecked car and walked home. My wife was with me."

"I was afraid, I tell you. I was afraid they would hurt me."

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HOUSTON PLANT BLOWN TO BITS SUNDAY; AMONIA LOOSE

(By Associated Press)
HOUSTON, Aug. 12.—A dairy plant ammonia explosion here yesterday killed three men and the forces that set off the blast still were unknown today, pending official investigation.

Several rescue workers, digging frenziedly in the debris, were sickened by the fumes, but none was believed to have suffered permanent injury.

Two Blown To Bits
Chester Hilton, 30, an engineer, and L. A. Robinson, 35, electrician, were blown almost to bits, but Robert E. Williams, 25, cold storage room workman, died even more horribly. His body was found wedged in a door leading from the compartment where he had been at work.

The blast smashed the ice storage room of the Phenix Dairy and the adjoining chamber where Williams lost his life.

TRAIN SMASHES TRUCK IN TEXAS' WORST ACCIDENT

DALLAS, Aug. 12.—Joyously returning from a holiday in the city, 13 persons, members of two rural families, were killed by a fast passenger train at a grade crossing near here last night. A fourteenth was in a serious condition in a local hospital today.

A gravel truck bearing them home from Dallas was struck by the Sunshine Special, Texas and Pacific train, and smashed.

The dead: Mrs. Iva Badgett, 45, Mrs. Vera Badgett, twins, 22, Texas Badgett, 16, Emma Badgett, 19, Birdie Badgett, 9, Jessie Badgett, 7, Mary Joe Badgett, 3, E. F. McHenry, 33, Mrs. Annie McHenry, 45, Beniah McHenry, 14, Emma McHenry, 10, Billie McHenry, 4, Mary Lee McHenry, 7, was seriously injured.

Inquest to Be Held
A coroner's inquest at Mesquite was set for today.

Four hours after the catastrophe, which took more lives than any other of its kind in Texas history, the torn bodies lay in a heap on the floor of an undertaker's establishment at Forney, while officials sought relatives of the victims in efforts at identification—a difficult task because the McHenry family was almost annihilated, and relatives of the Badgetts could not be found for some time. None of the townsmen could name the individual members of the families.

Sherwood Badgett, head of the family, a thin, stooped farmer, walked in long after the accident, twisting his battered hat, but he gave no aid in making up the death list. He spoke a few low words to an attendant and left without glancing at the white covered mound in the rear.

Part of one body was found lodged on the front of the locomotive where the pilot was knocked off by the impact with the truck. The vehicle itself was stripped of its body, fenders and other parts. A body was seared badly when the remainder of the machine caught fire.

Sheets were obtained from Pullman cars and the bodies were gathered from along the right-of-way. Those of the McHenry family were taken to Forney while the Badgett family victims were removed to Mesquite.

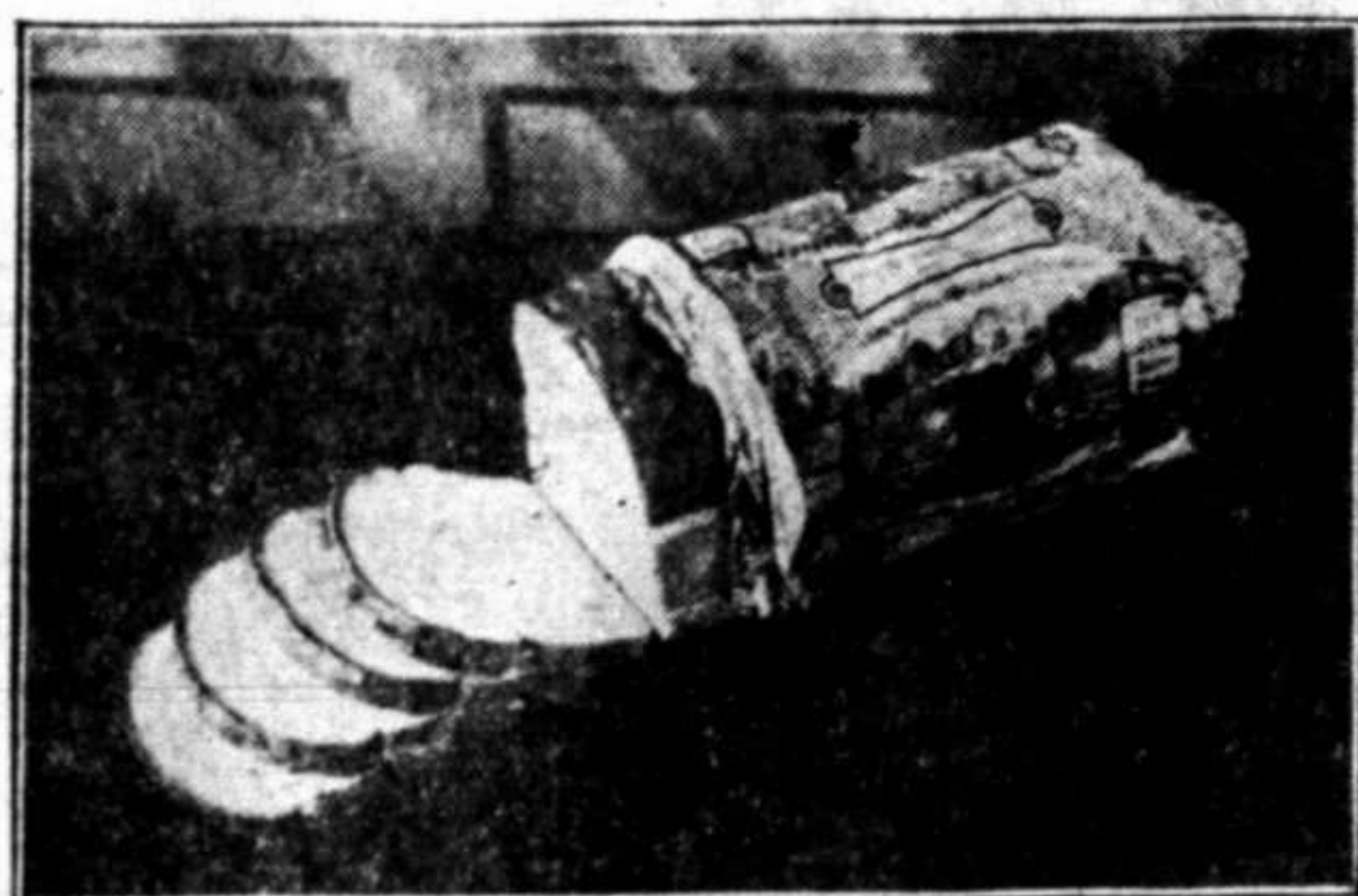

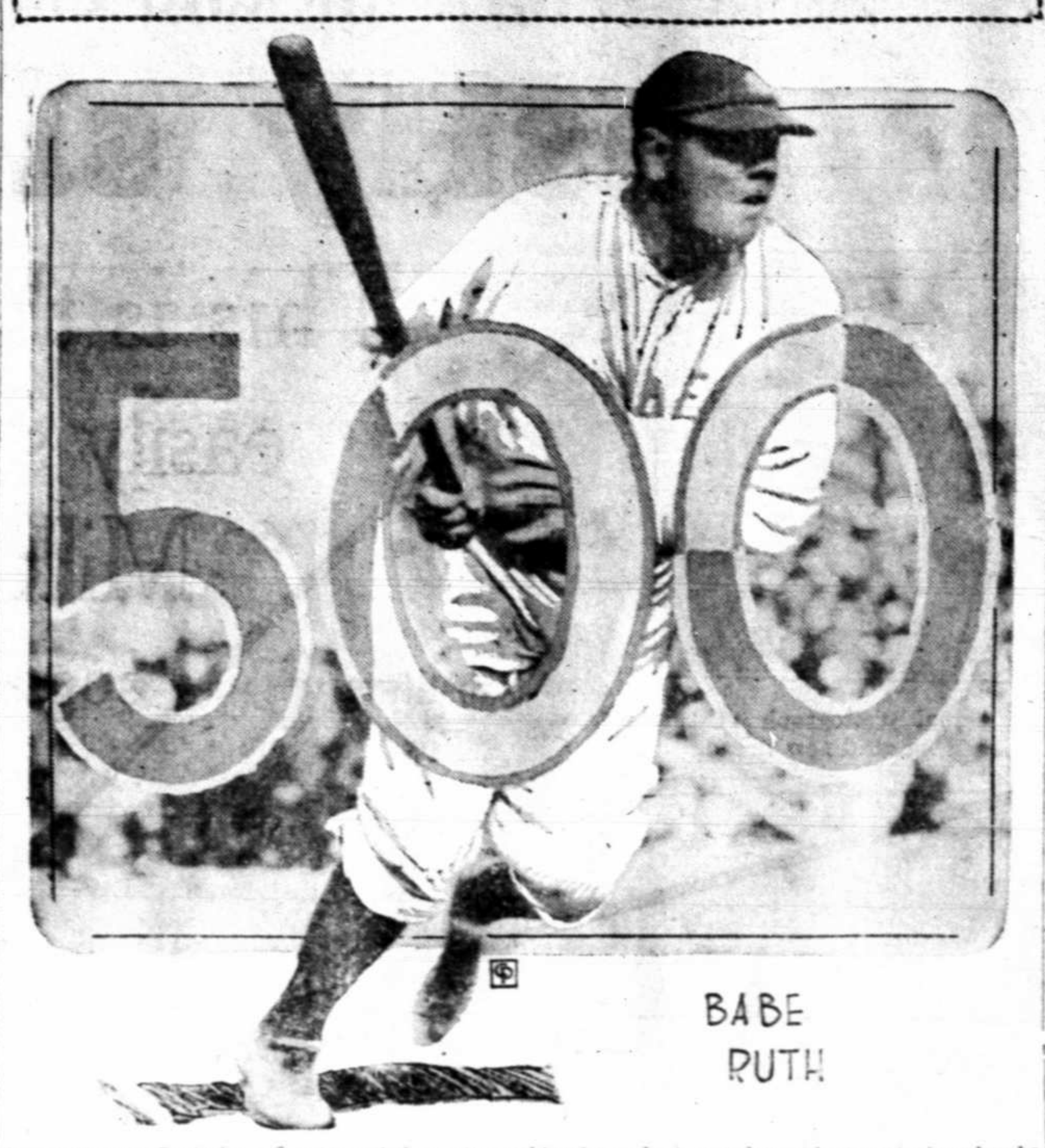

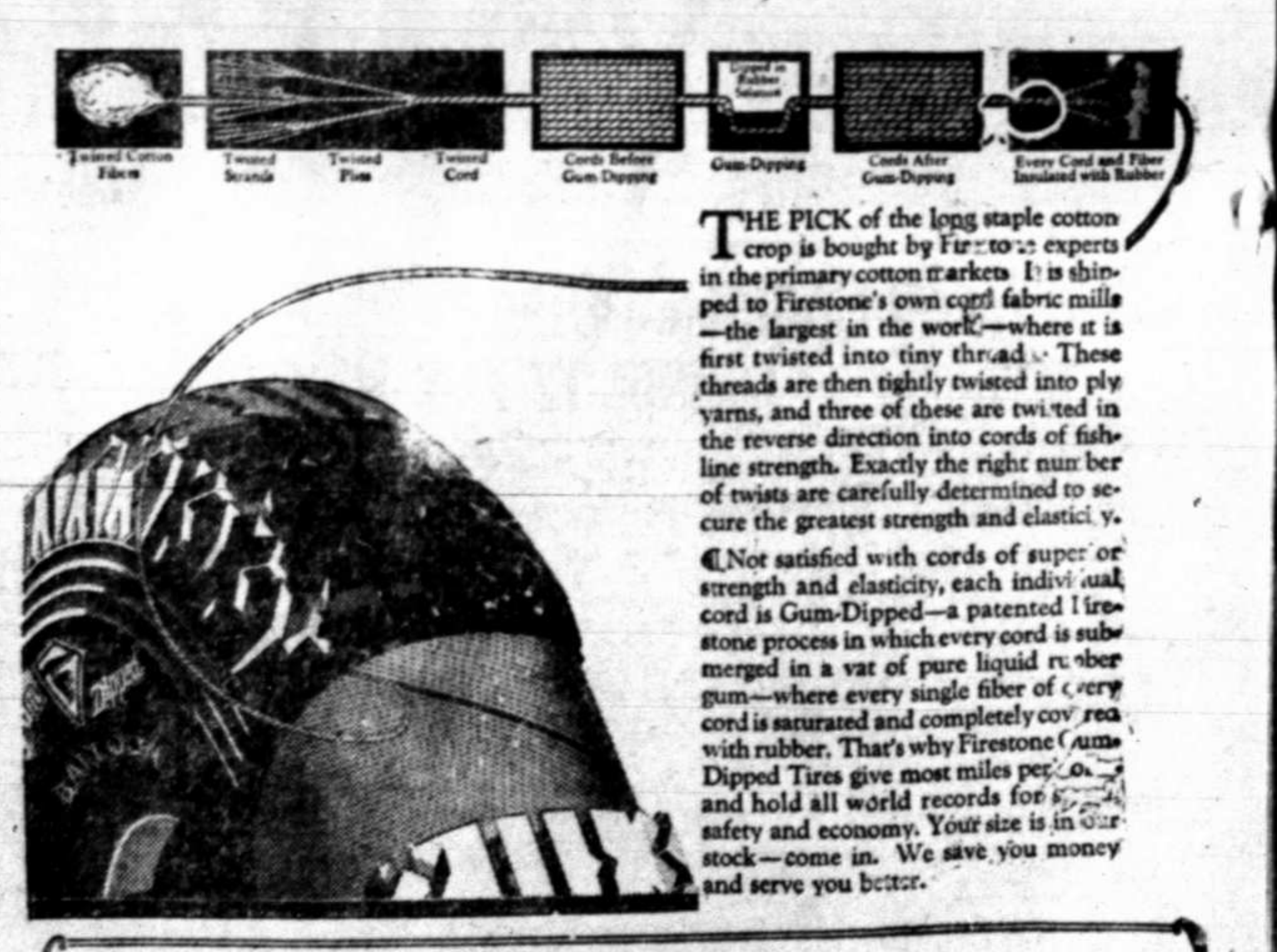

MARRIAGES IN ARKANSAS ARE GIVEN BOOST

NORTHEAST TEXAS IS SUFFERING BECAUSE OF NEW LAW

(By Associated Press)

TEXARKANA, Aug. 10.—Miller county, Arkansas, is enjoying the biggest marriage business in its history, while nearly every section of northeast Texas reports the worst slump in years for Cupid.

The Texas marriage statute requiring the posting of three day notice of intent to wed is held responsible for both.

In Bowie county, Texas, the issuance of marriage licenses is 30 per cent behind the same period a year ago, and the clerks of several other counties report even a larger decrease in business.

With the new marriage law in effect June 12, the first license to a Texas couple was issued in Miller county, Arkansas, on June 13. From June 12, 1928 to July 31, 1928, a total of 89 marriage licenses were issued in Miller county, with only 29 of them to Texas couples. During the corresponding period in 1928, a total of 152 licenses have been issued in Miller county, 72 of them to Texas couples.

In addition, many Louisiana couples, who formerly went into Texas to be married in order to escape the strict Louisiana law, are now coming to Texarkana, Arkansas.

The marriage boom may be short lived, however, for already Arkansas solons are discussing passage of a law as strict as the Lone Star state's statute.

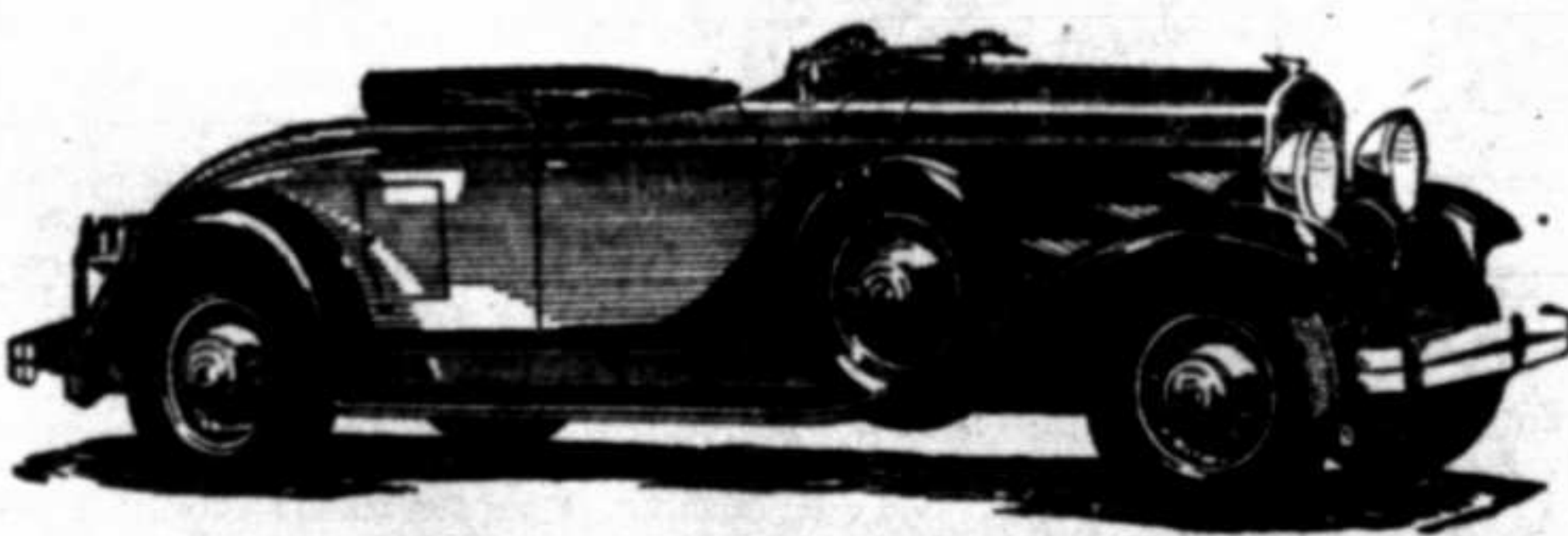

U. S. Citizens

The Commercial Law League of
America, meeting in Montreal,
Adopted a report urging amendment
of the immigration laws so that
only those "who will make good
American citizens" will be admitted
to our shores henceforth.

If this is not done, the report
predicts that "popular government
in the U. S. may become a thing
of the past before the end of the
present century."

Ever since the adoption of the
country, we have had a nation
which has been a good citizen
government. We seem to have evaded
one peril only to run into another
right from the start. It is not so
very long, as time goes, since it was
asserted that popular government
would end if the abolitionists were
not quickly suppressed; nor is it so
many decades since it was prophesied
that our government would
tumble if laboring men were allowed
to organize into unions.

Yet, somehow, we have survived;
and it may be that we shall
continue as a self-governing nation
even if our immigration laws remain
unchanged.

With the first part of the law
league's resolution, however, we are
in hearty agreement. By all means,
let us admit only such immi-
grants as will make good American
citizens. First, however, we might
find out how we are ever going
to tell in advance.

Outright lunatics and half-wits
to be sure, ought to be banned. But
then what standards are you going
to set up?

Will you raise a strict physical
standard, so that no one malformed
or diseased can enter? Will you
keep out another Siemens if you
do.

Will you set up political stand-
ards, to keep out all rebels and radi-
cals? Such a statute would have
kept out a certain Pole named Pu-
laski, who was such a radical that
he had to flee from his own coun-
try—so he came to America, fought
under Washington, was made a
brigadier general by the Continental
Congress for gallantry at Brandy-
wine, and was killed in action help-
ing to free the southland of British
troops.

Would you keep out all men who
have criminal records? John Paul
Jones, another hero of the Revolution,
would have been excluded on that
basis.

Would you exclude pacifists and
conscientious objectors. The
sons of President Hoover could not
have come in under such a law.

The plain fact of the matter is
that humanity is unpredictable. We
might save ourselves a great deal
of trouble if we put a Chinese wall
up along our borders, and insisted
that no one come across who is
not exactly like we are; but we
would lose more than we would gain.

There is altogether too much wor-
rying about immigration nowadays.
Anyway, our existing laws seem,
in all conscience, to be strict enough.
If we are too careful about exclud-
ing undesirable, we are apt to bar
a few geniuses as well. And that is
a chance we can't afford to take.

Autos

The facetious question, "what on
earth becomes of all the old autos?"
has been current ever since our
automobile age began. The National
Automobile Chamber of Com-
merce, looking into the matter, has
the answer; they get tossed on to
the scrap heap.

Every year the United States
scraps 2,450,000 automobiles—one-
tenth of the entire number in the
country. Indeed, the American people
are throwing away, annually,
one-third as many autos as there
are in use in all the rest of the
world.

The Chamber of Commerce points
out, incidentally, that the average
life of an automobile in this country
is about six years and nine
months. Which, when you consider
the automobile's cheap price, isn't
a bad record at all.

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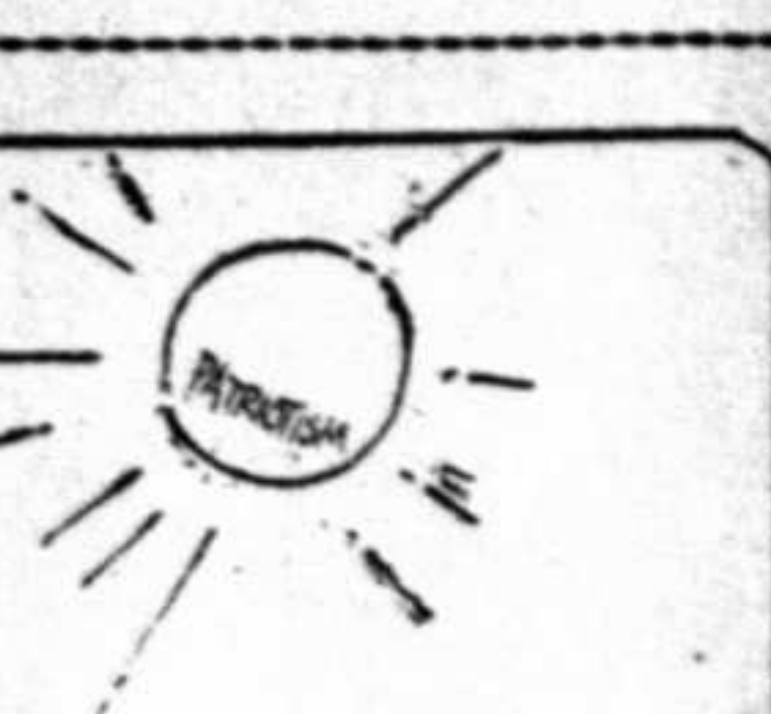

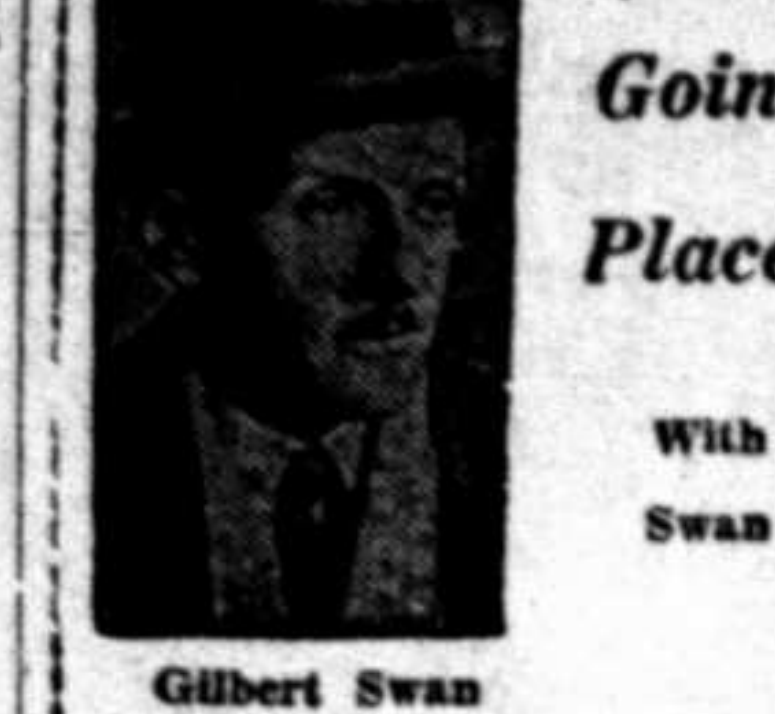

Aerial races, glider exhibitions and receptions for the visiting planes were on the program.

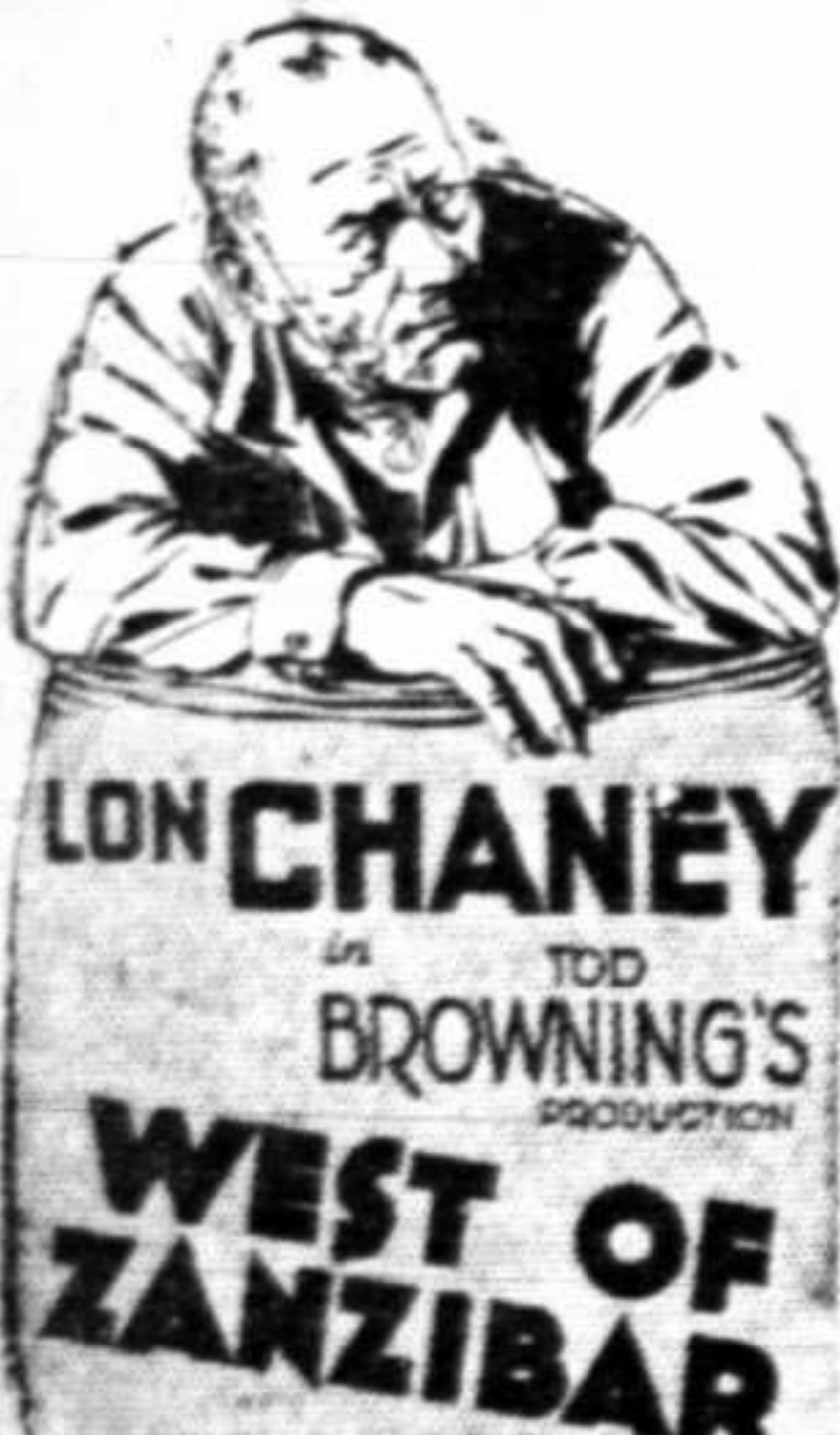
Tate Suggests City Street Car Control

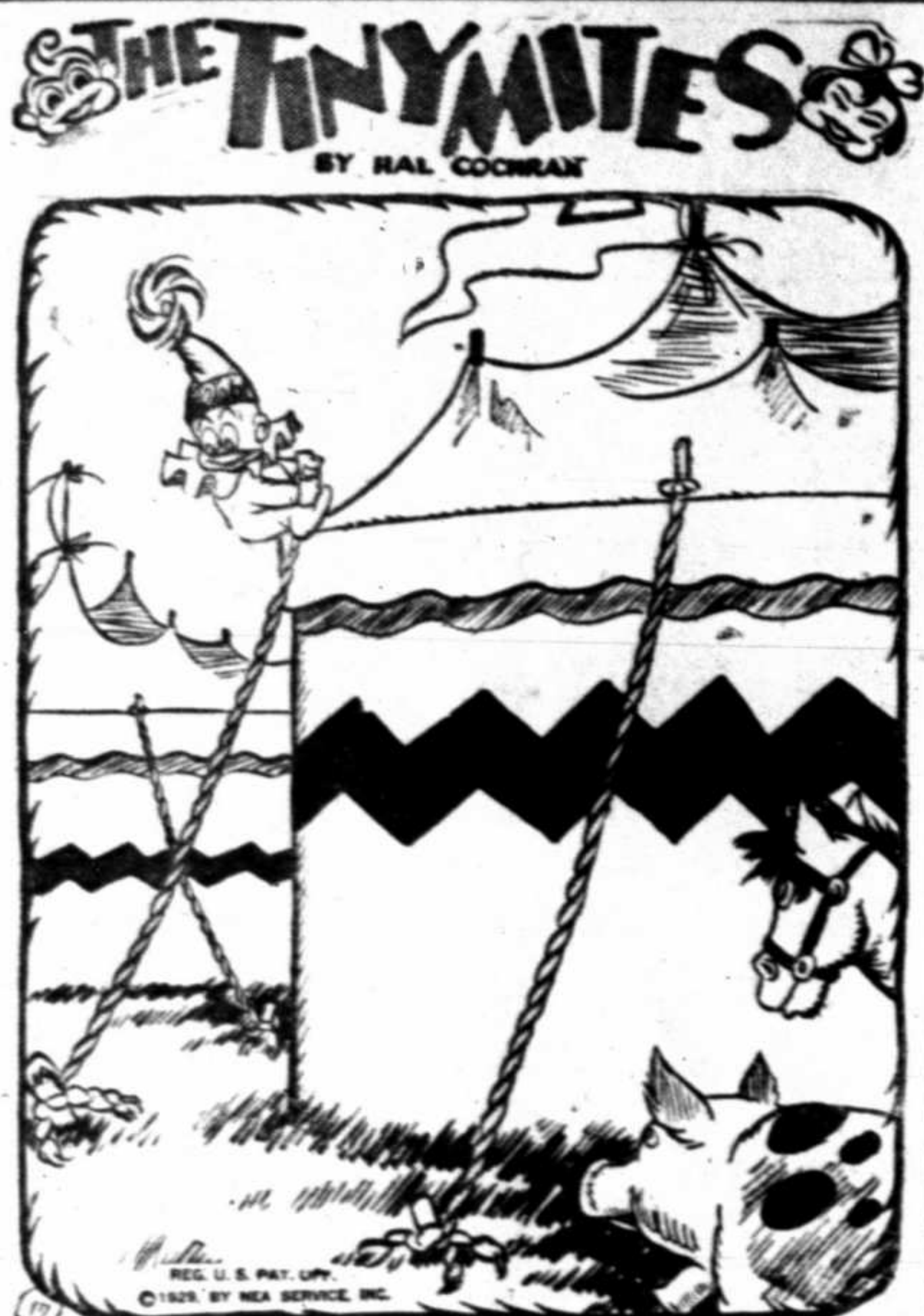
