PERRYTON POST OFFICE NOW SECOND CLASS

Another outstanding indication of growth of Perryton and surrounding country is the Perryton Post Office which became a second class office on the first day of this month. There are but two other second class offices in the Panhandle north of Amarillo. They are at Canadian and Amarillo, both of which towns have a railway pay rolls so in view of this fact, it is indeed remarkable that Perryton should attain this rank.

With the advent of the second class office, comes a substantial increase in the pay roll of the employees of the office. Postmaster Beaver's salary is increased from \$2,200.00 per year to \$2,400.00. This office is also two clerks under the new classification. Their salary is \$1700.00 per year, bringing the total pay of the office force to \$5,800.00 per year, which is considerable over a \$4,000 more than was paid under third class rating.

The clerks of the office are now under the civil service act and the Post Assistant Postmaster John Black has already been given his position without the formality of an examination. The general delivery post and other windows will open from 8:00 a. m. to 6:00 p. m. The schedule of the clerk's hours are as follows: Clerk No. 1-9:30 a. m. to 1:30 p. m. and 1:30 p. m. to 6:30 p. m. Clerk No. 2-7:30 to 10:30 a. m. and 12:30 to 5:30 p. m.

We would just like to add that the authorities set the hours that the general delivery windows should open so do not expect the clerks to be up the windows for your convenience at all hours. When they are at duty at hours the window is not open, just remember that they have to do. The present schedule is for an eight hour day for each clerk.

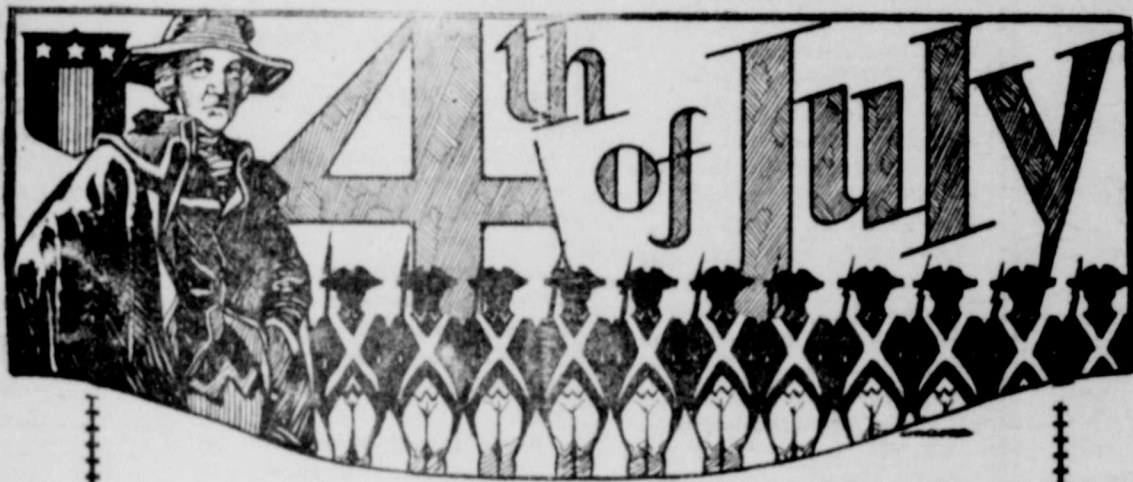
Dr. Blank is moving his office to the rooms formerly occupied by the T. Correll law offices. These rooms will be redecorated and fixed up in the best of shape.

PERRYTON WILL CELEBRATE FOURTH AT WHEELER

Wheeler, Texas, July 2nd, 1925—The Tenth Annual "Fourth of July Picnic" at Wheeler will be in a large measure a Perryton celebration of Independence Day. The Perryton Municipal Band will be here to furnish the music for the occasion. This fine North Plains band will play to more than three thousand Eastern Panhandle people at the picnic. In addition the Perryton Ball Club has been engaged for two games with the Wheeler team. One game will be played on the Fourth and the second game will be played on Sunday the Fifth.

An auto caravan of more than fifty cars is expected to accompany the band and ball team from Perryton. They will be joined all along the route by other cars coming to Wheeler for the big day. Camping facilities will be provided for all who come prepared to spend the night before or after the Fourth. The beautiful Stanley Grove with plenty of shade and water furnishes an ideal camping place.

More than fifteen hundred pounds of the finest young milk-fed, grain finished beef will be barbecued in the inimitable style made famous by Wheeler chefs. It will be served for the free dinner on the Fourth with bread, pickles and coffee.

One of the big features of the day will be a speech by Hon. Lee Satterwhite of Panhandle. Mr. Satterwhite is Speaker of the House of Representatives and is being quite prominently spoken of as the next Governor of the State of Texas. His address will be heard by nearly all of those who attend the picnic.

The picnic this year will be a kind of celebration of the incorporation of the town which took place on June 4th. The celebration on July Fourth falls just one month after the date of the election which made Wheeler an incorporated town by a vote of more than four to one.

Many old timers of the Panhandle will attend the celebration. The old fiddlers will be given an opportunity to have a contest, and this event is expected to attract a large crowd.

In a recent issue of the Ochiltree County Herald, dated June 12th, my neighbor and good friend, G. C. FAMOUS FORTS IN U. S. HISTORY

Its Builders Received 18 Cents a Day

On August 18, 1846, Gen. Stephen W. Kearney's "Army of the West," marching to take part in the Mexican war, arrived in the "drowsy old town" of Santa Fe and took possession. Immediately afterwards cannon were placed on an eminence overlooking the town and these guns roared forth a salute to the Stars and Stripes.

A month afterwards Kearney wrote to Brigadier General Jones, adjutant general of the army, as follows: "As this is the capital of the territory a new fort is being built under the direction of Lieutenant Gilmer of the engineers and is called, subject to your approval, Fort Marcy." Evidently the adjutant general approved of this method of honoring William Learned Marcy, secretary of war at that time, and so Fort Marcy its name remained as long as it existed.

Perhaps no other fort in the United States was ever built by the government at such a small cost. The work on the fortification was done by the volunteer troops in Kearney's army, a certain number of whom were detailed to this duty each day. Every man who worked 10 days or more consecutively got the magnificent sum of 18 cents a day extra on his pay!

The fort was further improved by Col. Edwin V. Sumner of the Second dragoons, who took command of the military department of New Mexico in July, 1861, and some of the regiments who garrisoned it later saw some stirring service during the Civil war.

Fort Marcy was not the first fort erected on this hill in Santa Fe. Away back in the beginning of the Seventeenth century, before the Pilgrims landed on Plymouth Rock, the Spanish explorers who pushed north from Mexico found on this site evidences of a Pueblo ruin which had been abandoned many years before but which evidently had once been used by these peaceful people as a defense against the wild tribes which sent raiding parties against them.

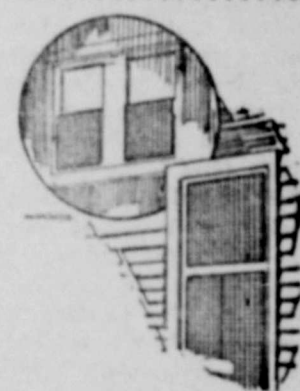
Although St. Augustine, Fla., and the predecessors of Fort Marion seem to have the best claim to the distinction of being the first town and first fort built on the North American continent by the whites, Santa Fe and the progenitors of Fort Marcy can claim a generous share in the honor of being relics of the rule of Spain in the New World.

FIRE AT BOOKER

Thursday night about one a. m. the fire alarm was turned in when it became known that the Travis Drug store was on fire. How it originated is not known as it was burning between the ceiling and roof when discovered. This was the first fire in Booker and it was only by heroic efforts of the bucket brigade that the entire north side of the town was saved. Fire extinguishers were brought out only to find that some of them would not work but the big brick building of the Booker Drug kept the wind away giving the men with buck-

OFFERED BY STATE BOARD OF HEALTH TO RURAL MOTHERS

One of the greatest aids that the state of Child Hygiene, Texas Board of Health, has to offer to women of the state, is the series of pamphlets sent to expectant mothers, especially in this service of value to women residing in rural districts, removed from medical care.

The interest of this department does not stop with the birth of the baby, as its mother is further instructed in its care through literature mailed her. This instruction is divided into two parts— from birth until two years, and from two years until school age. Mothers are also sent free of charge upon request patterns for baby layette and maternity dress.

At the beginning of each month, workers in the bureau of child hygiene, check over all birth certificates registered in the bureau of vital statistics during the previous month, and mail to each new mother a pamphlet on "Infant Care." As there are approximately 7,000 births registered each month, there are that many of these pamphlets mailed.

As a precaution against infant blindness, there is a state law requiring that prophylactic drops be placed in the eyes of new-born babies. These drops are furnished free in indigent cases to midwives, nurses and doctors.

The Bureau of Child Hygiene, as the administrator of the Maternity and Infancy Act in Texas, offers a public health nursing service in rural communities of counties of the state, on a cooperative financial basis. Twenty seven counties are now availing themselves of this service, and in these counties the public health nurse, with the assistance of parent-teacher association, Federated clubs, and local physicians, does much prenatal, infant and child welfare work.

Much of the time of these public health nurses is spent in the rural schools, weighing the children, and with the help of a doctor, examining them for physical defects. The results of such examinations the last year shows 3 out of every 5 children to be defective in some degree. Bad tonsils, adenoids, eye trouble, ear trouble, and bad teeth, have been found to be the predominant defects, but many cases of more serious troubles have been found.

When a child is found to have physical complaint notification is sent the parents, with the request that the child be sent to the family physician for treatment. A followup visit is also made to the child's home to talk to the parents about the necessity of the child receiving treatment.

The nurse also engages in many other activities, mothers classes are organized, health centers are established, and other phases of community public health work instituted.

and hundreds of letters are on file in the department as silent testimonials to the benefit that they have received from this advice. There is also a scrapbook that is filled with pictures of babies, negro babies as well as white babies, all fine, healthy looking children, whose photographs have been sent to the state board of health by grateful mothers and fathers.

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FACTORS THAT REDUCE SUMMER MILK PRODUCTION

Drying pastures, hot weather and flies combine to decrease milk production. It is well known that these conditions must be faced during the latter part of the average summer season. As a rule too much time passes before steps are taken by the dairy men to remedy the situation.

The ordinary pasture which always submits to the first dry spell is being replaced by sweet clover, which is proving to be of great value as a pasture crop. Sweet clover will continue to grow after most other pasture grasses have dried up. The use of the summer silo is each year becoming more general, and it so great assistance as a summer source of feed.

Cows forced to be out in the sun during the hot days decrease in their production. Day tabling which prevents exposure to the hot sun, would undoubtedly be more generally practiced if the supply of good labor was more plentiful. Until day stabling becomes more general the importance of providing shade for pastures cannot be overemphasized.

It has taken a long time to develop a fly repellent which will last for more than a few hours and at the same time be reasonable in cost. There are now on the market preparations for combating flies which are proving out. It pays to reduce the fly nuisance rather than sacrifice on milk production.

It is difficult to bring a cow back to a full flow of milk once the flow has been decreased. Thus it is important that reasonable means be taken during the coming weeks to counteract the factors which will decrease production.

ANIMAL AT THIS TIME, WHEN THE CALVES ARE JUDGED BY A PERSON COMPETENT TO DO SO.

A calf to be in condition for inspection must be in good flesh, but not necessarily fat. The hide should be pliable, and in this blanketing is of assistance. Blanketing also helps to keep the hair in good condition. In the case of dairy calves, it is advisable to clip them all over a month to six weeks before they are exhibited. This will allow a nice, even growth of hair to develop, which will add greatly to the animal's appearance.

It is very important that a calf be taught to lead and to stand. If the animal shows the lack of proper training its good points will not be shown to an advantage.

Members of sheep and pig clubs receive a training equally as interesting and instructive as that enjoyed by members of a calf club. It all helps to develop a liking for farm animals and an appreciation of the good results that are possible when good care and treatment are given.

Profit in Poultry

There is an increased interest in poultry on the average farm. The care of farm poultry used to be left to the housewife, who received little, if any, encouragement from the farmer himself. As a result of this the wife usually found it necessary to get along with inefficient equipment and fowl, and the returns were in proportion.

The state agricultural colleges and the farm papers have established departments for gaining and spreading poultry information. They have made steady progress in these undertakings and deserve much credit for the work they have done. They have succeeded in working out and establishing methods by which the farm poultry flock can be made profitable.

To appreciate the important place which poultry now commands, one has only to note the large amount of space devoted to poultry advertising in the farm press. This space at some seasons of the year exceeds that devoted to all other live stock combined. Many of the manufacturers of farm barn equipment, in order to take care of the demand, have developed a special department for poultry equipment. The poultry equipment business has grown until it is of real importance. These developments are the result of the increasing general interest in poultry as a profitable source of income.

Winter egg production of a good flock properly cared for nets a nice profit. If egg production is to be emphasized, a breed that has been developed for that purpose should be kept. If more emphasis is to be put on raising chickens for the early fall market, select a breed somewhat larger than the strictly laying strains. Whether egg production or raising poultry for the market is emphasized, there is a profit to be had, as evidenced by the incomes from many farm flocks.

The average farm flock can be improved by using the same general methods that apply to dairy herd improvement. Males which have been specially bred for the purpose desired should be used. Through a proper selection of males, their offspring will raise the standard of the flock. While this is being done the flock may be culled from time to time in order to

get rid of the non-profitable members. County agricultural agents and poultry specialists from the colleges give valuable instruction in this work. When such a program is put into operation, the interest and the financial returns are bound to increase.

The proper sort of hen-house is an important factor in determining the degree of success which is attained with poultry. Temperature, ventilation, sunlight, sanitation and exercise must be considered. A hen that is expected to lay eggs must be in good physical condition and happy. If she is kept under conditions which allow her comb to freeze in winter, good results from egg production cannot be expected. Proper ventilation prevents the air and birds in moderately warm hen house from becoming too moist. Sunlight and sanitation are important considerations for any class of live stock, and plenty of room for exercise is necessary for best results.

It has been demonstrated that the feeding of farm grains alone do not the best results. The growing chicks as well as the laying hens need green feed in their rations. Do not forget to set aside some nicely cured clover or alfalfa hay this summer to be offered to the flock during the winter months. Roots, such as mangels and beets, when feed as a supplement to the ration stimulate egg production. Meat scraps and skim milk are other necessary supplements, while some form of grit and plenty of fresh water should be provided at all times.

The early hatched pullets should be grown well, but not forced, if winter egg production is desired. It is desirable to raise the pullets so that they will start laying in October or November. If they begin before this time, they will moult and waste much time during the months when eggs are high in price. It is desirable to feed

the males so that they will take on the most growth and weight in the least possible time in preparing them for the early fall market.

In spite of the fact that there has been an increase in poultry and egg production, the demand holds strong. The consumption of eggs and fowl is on the increase, which means that the public realize their value in the diet. With the increased tendency to diversify the source of the farm income, poultry makes good if given a chance.

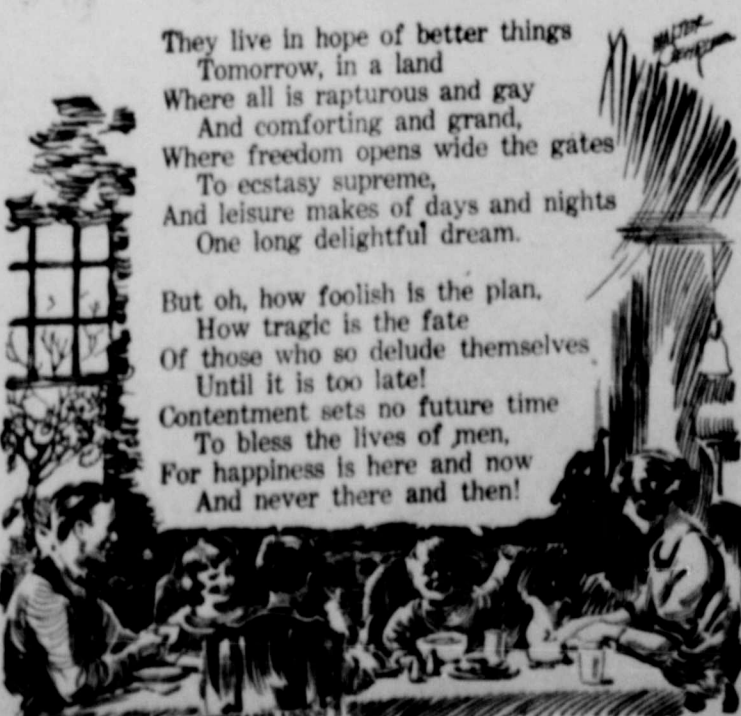
Here and Now

THE BINDWEED IS

A BAD WEED

One of the most dangerous weeds known is bindweed, often called wild morning glory and pea vine. A few plants show up, spread rapidly and soon make a field unfit for cultivation. Any plant that looks somewhat like morning glory, but smaller as to height, leaves and flowers should cause quick action to determine if it is bindweed.

The worst thing about bindweed is that it is very difficult to kill out; no easy or quick method has been discovered. Until seven years ago no method was known. Since that time the Fort Hays (Kansas) Experiment Station has gone deeply into the subject and discovered things about the bindweed that will prove untold value to farmers.

The bindweed is in Oklahoma. It is scattered in many counties. Last year and this, enough samples of the weed have come into the office of OFS to give it a good start in the state. It is high time that the facts about the dangerous nature of the weed became known and everything done to stop its spread and to eradicate the spots we now have.

Following is a report of the work done with bindweed in Kansas. It is a report to be carefully read, and as carefully used by any farmer who is so unfortunate as to have a start of bindweed on his farm.

The Hays station's experiments extended over a field of 14 acres, where there were a few plants of bindweed little noticed 20 years ago. By 1908, part of the field had to be abandoned, and in 1909 the bindweed was so bad all over the field that henceforth the whole area was dropped from the station's rotation system, and handled by itself as an isolated unit. Thus the first big step in control of bindweed was accomplished, namely to quit dragging the roots on harrows, cultivators, etc., to new parts of the farm.

The second step was to look for the several small areas of a few square

rods or so where bindweed had gotten a foothold outside the 14 acres. These small spots and any others like them that were discovered from time to time were killed out immediately with salt. The salt companies put out a cheap grade of salt for this purpose. It requires not less than 10 tons per acre to be effective. At Hays, the rate used is 20 tons per acre, which is about the same as one pound of salt to the square foot. Salt leaves the soil ruined indefinitely, and is too expensive for large areas. It is recommended for only such small spots as one is willing to sacrifice for the sake of stamping out the bindweed immediately.

The big problem still remained unsolved—what to do with the 14 acres which at best would always be a source of danger to the excellent wheat land surrounding it on all sides. An attempt was made to get it ready and start alfalfa, which failed on this dry upland. Two neighbors having bindweed on bottom land naturally suited to alfalfa were more successful, one of them appearing to have smothered out all the bindweed. The point brought out in these and other trials of smothering crops is that such crops have some possibilities when themselves naturally vigorous and when the soil is one naturally ideal for the crop.

Closely-drilled sorghum and sudan grass are about the best annual crops for this purpose, and their effectiveness depends on having plenty of fertility and moisture to make a rank, dense growth, rapidly and continuously. Under ordinary dry-land conditions, they have not reduced the bindweed to any extent, but in the wet year, 1915, both sorghum and sudan grass choked out all but a few stray plants of bindweed on two plots of one-tenth acre each. Ordinarily, these two crops seem to have more chance of going if the seedbed is intensively fallowed all spring, or perhaps the preceding season also.

Various unsuccessful plans were tried on the 14-acre field up to 1919. One year the sheep were grazed on it closely, with no headway either in killing bindweed or in putting flesh on the sheep. When summer fallow was tried, with only the ordinary tillage incident to accumulating moisture, the bindweed grew at its best and spread rapidly. Close-drilled sorghum put in without much preparation deserved credit for at least holding the bindweed about even, but it was unsafe to haul the hay to other parts of the farm.

Finally, in 1919, the field was laid off into a large number of one-tenth acre plots, each plot to be handled differently. The central point about which these tests were outlined was the use of very intensive fallow. Some plots were plowed in May, and kept clean all summer. Ordinarily a "duck foot" cultivator with 10-inch sweeps was run about three inches deep once a week. If the ground was very badly run together or if the vines got some start in wet weather, it was necessary to double-disk heavily or to re-plow. The ground was worked 20 times during the season, keeping down nearly all leaf growth. This gradually starved the roots, and in the spring of 1920 it was apparent that at least 99 percent of the bindweed was gone. The few remaining plants were very puny, and all trace of them was wiped out before July 1. In later years this experience has been repeated, killing from 85 to 99 percent the first year, and the rest the second year.

Intensive fallow takes a good deal of work, but is applicable to large areas, does not hurt the ground in most cases, and does not require much direct cash outlay. The disappointment about it is that all the dormant seeds of bindweed that have accumulated in the soil from year to year must all be germinated before the land can be declared entirely clean. There is, however, nothing that will get this

seed sprouted any sooner than intensive fallow that includes several good plowing during a year. Closely drilled sorghum is an excellent crop to follow intensive fallow as it gives the young seedling plants least chance to get established.

A method very similar to summer fallow is to turn the bindweed patch into a hog lot, plow it occasionally and let the hogs clean out the roots. Some farmers find this method a good one.

Unsatisfactory methods other than already discussed include smothering with straw stacks, building paper, etc. Spraying with various chemicals also comes under this heading. There are various commercial weed killers that will kill the tops of the bindweed, and a good many of the roots but they so far have failed to do a clean job.

Small grains do not fit in with bindweed eradication, even after the roots of the bindweed are killed. The grain affords too good a nurse crop for new seedling bindweed.

Prevention is the big point for those who do not have bindweed. Much bindweed is spread in seed grains, cheap commercial feeds, some poultry feeds, and by threshing machines—Okla. Farmer & Stockmen.
