Walton's School Mates Tell of Threats He Made

(By Associated Press)
WEATHERFORD, Nov. 1.—Schoolmates of Tom Walton, Jr., at the University of Texas, today told of threats he made against his father-in-law, R. H. Hamilton, of Amarillo, who is being tried for the slaying of Walton.

Three young women, two of them sorority sisters of Walton's then 17-year-old bride, and daughter of an associate justice of the Texas Supreme Court, said Walton threatened to kill Judge Hamilton while Theresa, Hamilton's daughter, was in an Austin hospital recovering from an operation for appendicitis.

Helen Hamilton, daughter of the defendant, on the stand just before the noon recess, told also of threats Walton made against the life of Hamilton.

INSURANCE CASE TO BE HEARD NOV. 18TH

AUSTIN, Nov. 1.—Jury trial of the case in which three insurance companies are attempting to set aside the state insurance commission ruling fixing the maximum commission of fire insurance agents at 20 per cent has been set for Nov. 18. It will be held in the Travis county district court here.

Revelers Celebrate; Little Damage Done

Halloween prowlers in Ballinger did considerable damage Thursday night in some sections of the city. Most of the damage consisted of overturned outhouses and removal of backyard fences. Property was carried off and found Friday morning in the four corners of the city. Citizens who left porch furniture out were scouting for it early Friday.

Eighth Street was probably covered more thoroughly by the marauders than any other section. On some blocks the street was piled full of all kinds of trash, signs, implements, and anything portable. Several ears were rolled from in front of homes. Almost every section of the city was visited by the prowlers, who left evidences of their unwelcome calls.

Groups of large boys and girls in fancy garb, paraded over the city, serenading and paying friendly visits. A number of the teachers were visited by these troubadours who sang choruses and gave school yells. A number of parties and banquets were on the program for the students and practically all of them were out on expeditions with the exception of the football team. These boys all retired early at the request of Coach Felton Wright in order to be in good condition for the game here with Lampasas Friday afternoon.

Misplaced signs, front yard decorations and other amusing things were viewed by business men on the way to their work Friday morning. Most of these tricks showed a humorous rather than a destructive nature. At one place where a party was in progress the "ghosts" took valve stems from castings of cars parked in front, and when the party concluded every car had from one to four "flats." This was rather trying on the patience of the owners late at night, but Friday most of them were able to see the funny side of the incident.

A lock on the West Ward school building had been tampered with and teachers could not get in Friday morning until a locksmith was called. Metal and wood had been hammered into the lock and it was defaced to such an extent that the door could not be opened by regular methods.

A number of citizens stayed up until late to guard their homes but most of them were visited later in the night.

Obstetrical Ward is Added to Sanitarium

Improvements have been going forward the entire week at the Ballinger Sanitarium, formerly the Halley & Love Sanitarium. New equipment is being installed and a new department is being added to the hospital. The new department to handle obstetrical cases, will occupy the entire first floor.

The ward will be divided into four patients' rooms, and each of these will be finished in some bright color, one a pale green, a canary, a pale blue, and an orchid. There will also be a waiting room and a delivery room finished in white. A nursery will be added and will be maintained separately.

Equipment for this type of treatment is being ordered and will include all modern conveniences and appliances. A new gas machine is being installed and will be used to aid in a practically painless birth.

N. N. Campbell, manager of the sanitarium, stated that the institution would specialize in obstetrical work in the future and would make special effort to accommodate everyone. He said that special rates were to be made and that they would be low enough to be within reach of everyone desiring this service, and would be made in three- and ten-day period rates. "We intend to give our best in equipment and time to this work and intend to have it cheap enough for everybody. Children should have the privilege of receiving a sanitary birth, which can not be gotten except under the care of trained nurses and physicians in a clean, wholesome environment. Every child should have the best start possible and we intend to give them that," Mr. Campbell declared.

The department will be ready for occupation within the near future. Every doctor is invited to bring his patients to this ward. Mr. Campbell asserted, and they will receive the same courteous treatment as in other departments.

Psychologists Find Hidden Link In Wide Wave of Love Slaying

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1.—The wave of stranglings and wife and sweetheart murders which has struck Washington and the rest of the country have their connections, but they lie deep in the obscure and tortuous mazes of psychology. Even the trained psychologist follows them there with caution.

Caution and effects in these morbid matters are often greatly confused by the speculator who leaps quickly to conclusions, according to Dr. William A. White, superintendent of St. Elizabeth's Hospital for the Insane, and one of the foremost psychologists and psychiatrists of the country.

"No one case can be said to bear directly upon another," said Dr. White, "but there are certain principles upon which I believe some of them probably are based."

He declared he had not followed the recent murders in Washington close enough to venture an opinion directly upon them. Franklin Ellsworth Smith awaits execution for the confessed strangling of the daughter he had violated, Dexter C. Dayton, Kansas City salesman, awaits trial for the confessed strangling of his sweetheart and Robert McPherson is charged by the grand jury with strangling his wife.

These cases here followed the conviction of Earle Peacock for eating and strangling his wife in Scarsdale, N. Y., which in turn brings to mind the manner in which Judd Gray and Ruth Snyder beat and strangled Albert Snyder. Other cases of similar nature have marched through the pages of newspapers all over the country.

They are all part of a pattern to Dr. White. Science can not yet catalogue them individually, he said.

But if one murder has had any influence in prompting another it probably has been a particular and well defined way, White believes.

For instance, if reading about a man who has strangled his wife prompts another man to strangle, say, his sweetheart, it is almost certain he already has had the desire to strangle her, perhaps subconsciously, none the less definitely.

"This is well illustrated in sub-

cide cases," said Dr. White. "For a while there will be a preponderance of gas suicides, succeeded by a number of shootings. Any community has a great number of potential suicides. But an account of one suicide by bullet does not give another person the idea to do the same thing, though it may prompt him to execute the idea already in his head."

"The same principle probably applies in murder cases. It is not motivation, but activation."

"The news of one strangling may activate another, but it was already in the making."

To a hypothetical question, Dr. White replied that the reading of a great deal of morbid and abstruse philosophy, would not motivate a homicidal tendency, even if coupled with liquor-inflamed jealousy and a mind filled with accounts of other homicides. The cause and effect would be reversed, he declared.

"Rather, the type of mental pattern, based in environment and brain capacity and formation, which would tend toward

such a homicide is probably also the type which would investigate such literature if once directed toward it. The literature would accentuate the homicidal or suicidal tendency, but would not create it. It would be the tendency which would create the relish for that type of philosophy."

"The important thing is that the brain pattern already is formed. Experience, reading or other things may activate its impulse, but they are there to begin with and are themselves the motives which await the outside impulse."

Comedians Get Good Break in Talk Film Gags

HOLLYWOOD, Cal., Nov. 1.—Movie town's comedians have something to laugh about. For years they have been thinking up their gags as they go along, as all comedians do, not writing them extemporaneously, perhaps, but revising and substituting, changing them as they proceed.

Now that talking pictures have installed themselves permanently, the actors of serious roles find themselves forced to take lessons from the comedians in adapting their lines and cautions as they go—"adlibbing." It is called—and in getting the most out of each speech.

Charlie Chaplin is perhaps the most famous of the comedian "adlibbers." Writing his own scenarios and changing right and left as he proceeded in his famous comedies, Charlie developed his keen sense of dramatic values and razor edge wit.

The professional comedian, too, can shape and fondle his lines to get the most out of them, in a way that makes the serious actor green with envy.

"To a comedian," explains Harry Gribbon, one of the laugh makers, "a line is a rare jewel to play with, to juggle and toss in the air to see how it gleams brightest. That's why the other actors have quit laughing at us."

Screen comedy, Hal Roach prophesies, will not lose its expertness in pantomime, despite the present emphasis upon dialogue. "Every popular comedian knows that his success has been built

largely upon his skill as a pantomimist. He has developed this talent to the utmost of his ability.

"Laurel and Hardy don't have to say anything. Their style of comedy depends on expression. In comedy like theirs, and I consider it the best, action and pantomime shall remain the essence of humor."

Monte Brice, the director, would be a newspaper man if he had his life to live over again.

"I would study journalism, if I were a boy," he declared today in an interview. "Newspaper work opens up more avenues to success than any other vocation."

Unless you are filled with the zest for living, unless you love the unusual, and have a ready wit and the determination to suc-

ceed, you won't be a good reporter, Brice says.

"Actors who have had newspaper training are more apt to be proficient than their fellow players," he said. "They have studied life and types of people. Their wits are sharper. They have more ambition."
