Annual Community Thanksgiving Dinner Is Sunday

Bulldogs Wind Up Season With Loss

The Tahoka Bulldogs closed out their most successful football season in seven years Friday night with a 20-7 loss to Seagraves in Kelly Stadium.

Although the four wins this year (with five losses and a tie) were the most for Tahoka since 1981, the Dogs still couldn't beat Seagraves and claim a winning season. Tahoka was flat for the most part, especially in the first

half, and only began to play up to their potential in the last quarter.

Seagraves junior running back Steven Henderson ran for 166 yards against the Bulldogs Friday, including two first-quarter touchdowns. Tahoka, meanwhile, made its initial first down just as the quarter ended.

In the second quarter Tahoka woke up somewhat after T.C. Spruiell recovered a Seagraves fumble at the Tahoka 38. The Dogs pulled off a trick play as QB Ramiro Rodriguez took the snap, pitched back to Spruiell and then went out in the pattern, with Spruiell hitting Rodriguez on a nice 37-yard pass to the Eagles' 27. But Tahoka's drive died on a fourth down incomple- tion at the 21.

Seagraves drove deep into Dogdom just before the half, but Spruiell intercepted a pass to stop the threat.

The Eagles scored another TD in the third, with Eliot Allen going 3 yards, and the extra point kick try was blocked to leave it at 20-0.

In the fourth, Tahoka scored on a great pass play, this time from Rodriguez to Spruiell, who got behind everyone and took the ball in on a 65-yard play. Rodriguez kicked the point to make it 20-7.

Tahoka cranked up another good drive, going to a first down on the Eagle 5 with about 2 minutes left in the game. However, the next play was a disaster, as Tahoka lost its only fumble of the game.

Tahoka's rushing output was its lowest of the year, with just 52 yards total. Charles Jurden had 24 yards in 5 carries. Passing yardage was better, with Rodriguez throwing for 136 yards and Spruiell for 54, giving the Dogs 190 yards in the air.

County Votes For Bush, But Mostly Backs Demos

Lynn County voters mostly followed statewide and national trends in voting for George Bush/Dan Quayle for president and vice president, but Kent Hance of Lubbock, running for railroad commissioner, was the only other Republican with an opponent on the Lynn County ballot to be given a winning margin in the county.

Democrat Lloyd Bentsen was returned to the U.S. Senate in the state, and also won in Lynn County by 1313 votes to 834 for Beau Boulter of Amarillo.

In the presidential race, Bush

got 1257 Lynn County votes to 962 for Michael Dukakis.

The only other GOP candidate to come close in Lynn County was Tom Phillips for chief justice of the Texas Supreme Court. He lost by one vote in Lynn County, 1023 to 1024 for Democrat Ted Robertson.

Democrat David Counts of Knox City was elected to both the unexpired term of Steve Carriker and the regular term for District 78 representative, winning over Rod Waller of Snyder by a total of 19,375 to 12,994. In Lynn County Counts had 1298 votes

and Waller, a Republican, had 828.

Waller carried Scurry County and rural Taylor county, and Counts won in the other 10 counties in the district, including big margins in Nolan and Jones counties.

Lynn County had 2434 votes cast, with about 4100 registered voters, considered a low turnout for a presidential election year. Complete vote totals by Lynn County boxes are offered on page 10 of this issue of the Lynn County News.

Democrat Jim Nugent was a big winner in Lynn County in his race for railroad commissioner. Democrats Lloyd Doggett, Bill Kilgarlin, Raul Gonzalez, Jack Hightower and Karl Bayer all won in Lynn County over GOP opponents in races for state supreme court jobs.

Paul Dunn of Levelland won 1221-684 over Monte Hasie of Lubbock in the race for state board of education, but Hasie reportedly won the election.

Three proposed amendments to the state constitution reportedly passed statewide, but in Lynn County, No. 1 and No. 2 won easily while No. 3 was defeated by a single vote, 926 to 925.

Rodriguez Accounts For Top Total Yards

Ramiro Rodriguez, senior quarterback for the Tahoka Bulldogs, accounted for more than a thousand yards of offense during the season just ended, with 821 yards passing, 168 rushing, 27 receiving and 2 yards on a punt return to make a total of 1,018 for the year.

Rodriguez, Tahoka's best passing quarterback in years, hit on 43 of 111 attempts for a completion average of 38.7 percent, and had five intercepted.

He also was the team's leading scorer with 37 points on three touchdowns, 16 extra point kicks and one field goal. Charles Jurden was second in scoring with 26 points; Thomas Glisson had 24 and T.C. Spruiell and Shannon Clift scored 18 each.

Jurden, a junior, was second in total yards with 978 on 680 rushing, 127 receiving and the rest on punt and kickoff returns. Jurden was the team's leading rusher with a 5.9 yards-per-carry average, making the 680 yards on 116 carries.

In second place rushing was Mike Ramirez, a senior, who gained 387 yards on 68 carries, an average of 5.7 Clift, a junior, was third with 286 yards in 65 trips. Cory McCleskey, a junior, gain-

ed 165 yards in 14 carries for a whopping 11.8 average before going down in the seventh game with a fractured knee. Kurt Bryan had the best average of all, 18.5, but carried the ball only two times.

Glisson led all receivers with 432 yards on 16 catches; Ramirez and Jurden had 9 catches each.

Tahoka wound up the year 4-5-1, scoring 153 points against 157 for opponents.

Housekeeper Forces Man To Sign Checks

A 31-year-old female was being sought by officers in Lynn County this week after an 81-year-old Wilson man reportedly was forced to sign several checks by the woman, whom he had hired as a temporary housekeeper.

The checks later were filled out by the woman and cashed at locations in Tahoka, Wilson, Slaton and Lubbock, officers said.

Sheriff's officers Tuesday arrested two Slaton men, ages 61 and 46, in possession of some aluminum pipe reportedly stolen from Keith Wied of Wilson. They were in jail pending formal charges.

Elena Manriquez of 1215 S. 4th reported to police on Monday that someone had stolen two western hats and assorted female clothing from a storage shed.

Police arrested a Tahoka man on Friday for public intoxication and resisting arrest. The subject was transported to Lynn County sheriff's office where he was booked and jailed.

Police investigated an accident on Tuesday at North 1st and Ave. P that involved a 1976 Pontiac driven by Jeribacho Rodriguez who had reportedly run into two gas meters. No injuries were reported.

Police investigated an accident on Friday at Lockwood and Main that involved a 1984 Chrysler driven by Joyce Tilley Gary of Lubbock and a 1979 Mercury

driven by Larry Garza Salinas of Tahoka. No injuries were reported.

Police also arrested two persons during the past week on outstanding warrants.

Ten persons were placed in jail in Lynn County during the last week, with charges including forgery, expired motor vehicle sticker and failure to appear, DWI subsequent offense, driving while license suspended, public intoxication and resisting arrest, DWI, thefts, no seat belt and failure to appear, and speeding.

Certainly call if any of the following occur: abdominal pain, accidents, blood in stools, convulsions, croup, cough — especially if severe, diarrhea, earache, fever, poisoning, poor appetite, rashes — especially those associated with fever, sore throat, swollen glands, vomiting, wheezing or difficulty in breathing. Of these, poisoning, severe abdominal pain and croup associated with fever and lethargy are most dangerous and urgent.

FmHA Fall Farm Borrowers Urged To Check Insurance Needs

Farmers who plan to put in winter crops with the Farmers Home Administration emergency loans based in this year's drought should take steps immediately to see if they need crop insurance for 1989 crops, according to J. Lynn Futch, FmHA State Director for Texas.

The Disaster Assistance Act of 1988 requires any farmer with a production loss exceeding 65 percent of normal to agree to purchase insurance for 1989 crops, with some exceptions, as a condition for obtaining an FmHA emergency loan to help cover losses, Futch said.

The open season for obtaining multi-peril crop insurance for winter crops expires Oct. 31, except in certain northwestern states where it is Nov. 30, leaving farmers little time to obtain insurance. Although some extensions to the deadline may be granted on an individual basis, Futch said farmers should get in touch with their local insurance representative without delay. Proof of insurance will be required before disaster loan applications can be processed.

Exceptions to the insurance requirements include cases where insurance is not available and where premium costs would impose an undue financial hardship as determined by the FmHA county committee.

O'Donnell Rallies Past Plains, 14-8

The O'Donnell Eagles and senior halfback Jessie Perez claimed their first outright district championship since 1938 on an 8-yard burst late in the fourth quarter to win 14-8. On a fourth and four situation Perez burst around the right end for the TD with 3:03 left in the game that erased a 8-7 lead that Plains had taken just five minutes earlier on a 28-yard pass play from Juan Morales to Jeff Ashburn and a good PAT pass play from Monte Pierce to Ashburn.

Both Plains and O'Donnell had brought perfect District 4-1A records to Cowboy Field and each team had clinched a playoff berth.

On the game-winning play, the Cowboys had gotten penetration behind the line of scrimmage only to watch Perez sweep outside to use his track sprinting speed to outrun the defense.

"We were on the left side of the field, and the play was to the right," said Perez, who only had 57 yards rushing on 13 carries for the game. "I had a lot of room and all I needed was a little room and I was gone."

Perez scored his first TD on an almost identical play on a 33 yard sweep in the third period to give

the Eagles an early 7-0 lead. O'Donnell will meet Sudan at 7:30 p.m. Friday in Sundown, while Plains will take on District 3-1A champion Happy, Friday in Hale Center.

Texas A&M futurist says by 2006 education will change radically

COLLEGE STATION — By the year 2006, high schools, colleges, and universities will be combined into a continuous educational process, according to futurist Dr. John Hoyle of Texas A&M University.

"It will no longer be feasible to maintain two separate institutions for public and higher education," Hoyle said.

The 21st-century administrator will deal with a changed student population of fewer students and higher numbers of minorities, Hoyle said. One in every three students will be a minority by 2006, he added.

Costs to attend a college or university will escalate, Hoyle also said.

"The older part-time student is a permanent fixture," he predicted. The 21st-century administrator must have a vision for his or her institution, Hoyle said. The educational leader in 2006 should possess three types of skills — human, technical and conceptual — to free the potential of the faculty and students, he said.

- 2 egg whites

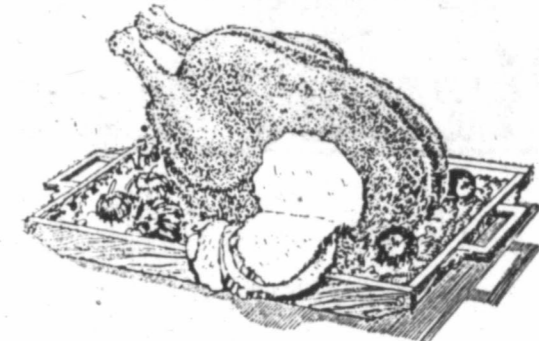

At one time the ham radio operator was the contact with the outside world in times of isolation. Civil defense followed and there has been the adventure with the CB radio.

As more innovation and knowledge of how we can serve others in times of crisis and emergency emerged, our community has produced a backlog of volunteers on call as responders.

In some cases these individuals become qualified to serve after intense training and classroom attendance, often at their own expense. Others can handle such situations through a career connection or simply having the knack to handle the unusual.

We have individuals able to observe storm potential, overlooking the risk in going to the scene of action. There are those answering calls to medical and injury emergencies, supplying first aid until more organized help arrives.

Some responders have a telephone number people with varying kinds and degrees of problems can dial. The response comes from a voice able to counsel and temporarily alleviate whatever is wrong, often heading off more serious consequences.

Our on call responders have added a dimension in our community we all can be proud and feel good about their work.

* Preschoolers- Hand puppets; felt-boards and shapes; costumes; dolls with easy on-and-off clothes; sewing cards.

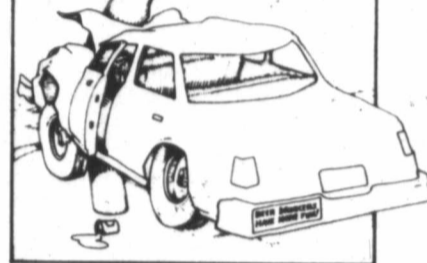
* Young- school-age children- dolls with a variety of clothes and accessories; stuffed ani-

The U.S. Department of Agriculture October 31 confounded the whole cotton industry with its failure to offer a paid cotton acreage reduction program for 1989.

USDA instead announced only a 25 percent unpaid diversion as a condition of program participation. That's the maximum required reduction permitted under the farm act of 1985. Also revealed for 1989 was a base loan level of 50 cents per pound, down from 51.8 cents this year, and USDA's intent to use marketing loan plan "B" which allows producers to redeem cotton from the loan at the lower of the loan price or the adjusted world price. Already established by the 1988 Budget Reconciliation Act was a 1989 target price of 73.4 cents, down from 75.9 cents this year.

The Department had the option to set the loan at the statutory minimum 50 cents or anywhere between there and the 51.79 cents justified by the U.S. spot market formula authorized in the law.

Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. in September and again October 27 recommended that the loan be at the higher level and that an optional paid land diversion program be offered, over and above a 25 percent required reduction, for up to 20 percent of base acres.

PCG's call for a paid land diversion program was duplicated by the National Cotton Council, which represents producers, textile manufacturers, merchants, ginners, warehousemen, seed crushers and cooperatives. On its own, the American Cotton Shippers Association asked for a "0-92" program, allowing producers to plant no cotton and still collect 92 percent of their deficiency payments.

So the entire industry recognized the need for an acreage reduction greater than that to be achieved by a simple 25 percent layout requirement.

However USDA, if it saw the need, apparently found its own reason for ignoring it, but that reason was not included in its program announcement.

Given that USDA's figures reportedly project reduced government costs with the lower loan, says PCG Executive Vice President Donald Johnson, the 50-cent loan announcement, while a disappointment, came as no great surprise.

But in the face of USDA's October estimate of an 8.4 million bale 1988 U.S. carryover, he continues, the absence of a paid land diversion program to reduce 1989 plantings is hard to understand.

Johnson also points out that a USDA regulatory impact analysis released last June, when the 1988 carryover was expected to be only 6.1 million bales, projected that a 15 percent paid diversion, as opposed to no paid diversion, would cut the government's cost of the program by \$152 million, "which makes the Department's decision even more incredible," he says.

Major V.J. Cawthon, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety, urges Texas motorists to use extra caution in driving this Thanksgiving holiday season. He says, "Because there is more traffic during holiday weekends, there is more exposure to accidents. Therefore, be alert and drive defensively. Stay alive and have something to be thankful for."

To help avoid speeding and stress, plan ahead, leave early, and allow ample time for arriving at your destination. Remember, if you leave late, you will arrive late.

According to Major Cawthon, more alcoholic beverages are consumed during holiday periods. A drinking driver is less skilled and more dangerous than a sober driver. Remember that approximately 50% of all traffic fatalities involve a drinking driver. So, please, do not drink and drive!

It has been proven in recent years that wearing seat belts saves lives. Develop this habit of "buckling up." It may be the best habit you can have.

Take it upon yourself this holiday season to observe traffic laws and regulations and help the law enforcement agencies make this a safe, happy holiday for everyone.

A recent seat belt utilization survey in Tahoka was conducted by the Intergrated College Traffic Safety Program at Texas Tech University. The survey indicated a usage rate of 7%. This can be compared with a 35.5% usage rate in 1987 and a 25.23% rate in 1986. The Texas Transportation Institute found there to be a 54% usage around the state as of January 1988.

In a recent Opinion Poll conducted for Traffic Safety Now, Inc., it was found that most Americans believe that the usage of safety belts offer ample protection from death and serious injury. Some other findings were:

* more than 90% said safety belts protect occupants from injury.

* 85% believe a safety belt will someday save their life.

* 8 out of 10 think safety belts use laws are saving a significant number of lives.

* 3 out of 4 who live in states with a safety belt law favor the law.

* nearly 70% of those who live in states without a law support safety belt use legislation.

* 74% favor strict enforcement of the belt law.

* 51% said they always wear their safety belt.

Statistics indicate that proper use of safety belts will reduce death and serious injuries 50-70%.
