**Antelopes Fall To Strong
Denver City Eleven, 44-0**

Defeat is still ringing in the ears of the Abernathy Antelopes as they lost their fourth consecutive game of the season Friday night. They lost this one to the defending Class AA State champions, the Denver City Mustangs, 44-0.

The Mustangs, who seem to be able to muster a strong team every year, no matter how many they graduate, made it their 19th straight victory Friday night, and their fourth win of the season.

Abernathy failed to cross the Mustang's center stripe the first half and managed no further than the Denver City 46 in the second half. The Antelopes made five first downs to the Mustangs' 16.

The Mustangs started the scoring early and stayed busy all the way. On the third play of the first period, Pat Hubbard swooped around end for 75 yards and the first counter. Tommy Jones ran for two extra points.

Striking on the first play of the second period, Hubbard sneaked from the 2-yard line for a TD, and then, less than three minutes later, swung around left end for 47 yards and another counter.

In the third period Larry Rawls went over from 1-yard out for a touchdown after a pass interception by Jimmy Mobley carried 40 yards to the Abernathy 15-yard line. In the fourth period, Bobby Hunnicutt went over from two yards out. With only a minute on the board, Hubbard racked up the final TD from the 1-yard marker. Hunnicutt ran over the two-pointer.

Freshman Boys Down Slaton Team, 24-14

The Abernathy freshman team of fine football boys outclassed the Slaton team in the first quarter, Abernathy quarterback Jake Mallow burst through the line, picked up some good blocks from his teammates and raced 51 yards for Abernathy's first touchdown. The extra point kick by fullback Charlie Stallings was blocked and Abernathy led, 6-0. Slaton took over on their own 30 again and moved to Abernathy's 46 yard marker as the first quarter ended. The Tigers chose to punt on third down and as the ball hit the ground and bounced it touched an Antelope and then was recovered by Slaton on Abernathy's 3 yard line. Two plays later a Tiger slipped over from the two to tie the game. The extra points try failed.

After taking possession on their own 30, Abernathy moved the ball 70 yards for the tally in only four plays. Speedy halfback Pat O'Neil started and ended the drive. The first play from scrimmage he took a pitchout from quarterback Charles Lusty and sped around end for 21 yards to Slaton's 49. Stallings picked up one yard. Lusty added two, then O'Neil skirted left end and raced to the double marker 46 yards away. The Antelopes led 12-6 after Stallings' extra point kick bounced off the middle bar across the uprights.

The ball exchanged hands twice, then the Tigers began to move into Antelope territory. They worked the ball to Abernathy's 35 from which point a 15 yard penalty against the Antelopes put the ball on the 20. This threat ended two plays later when alert tackle Bill Lee pounced on a Tiger fumble on the 13 yard line. The Antelopes moved the ball out to the 41 yard line as the first half ended.

Abernathy opened the second half by taking possession on their own 30 and not giving up the ball until they scored again. On the first play from scrimmage Earl Brown took a handoff from small but determined quarterback Frankie Garcia, blasted through the line and outraced the Slaton secondary to the goal line 70 yards away. But a clipping penalty at Slaton's 29 yard line nullified the touchdown and moved the ball back to the Tigers' 44 yard marker.

Brown almost broke loose again as he went for 13 yards, then Joe Sandoval went around left end for 31 yards and the TD. Stallings' kick failed.

Abernathy scored again shortly before the end of the third quarter after forcing Slaton to punt. The drive covered 44 yards with O'Neil carrying the final 28 yards around end for the score, which put Abernathy out front, 24-6.

A pass interception set up Slaton's final touchdown. The interception was made on Slaton's 43 and was carried to the Antelopes' 24. From here the Tigers drove for the score. They added the extra points by running to make the final score Abernathy 24, Slaton 14.

National Merit Scholarships To Be Offered

All 1963 graduates of Abernathy High School who wish to enter the 1962-63 National Merit Scholarship competition should register now at the school office, Ralph Stevenson, principal, announced.

The National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test will be given in the school at 9 a.m., Tuesday, March 6, 1962.

Students who will graduate from high school in 1963 and enter college in the same calendar year are eligible for scholarship consideration in the 1962-63 Merit Program.

To receive consideration, the student must take the test when it is offered in his school. Participating students pay a \$1 fee on the day of the test. Any interested student who is unable to pay the fee should consult Ralph Stevenson.

Awards in the Merit Program are granted on the basis of intellectual merit, but student financial needs determine the amount of individual stipends. The stipends are renewable each year without further testing.

A student's performance on the qualifying test also provides him with information that is useful in career planning or in selecting courses in high school and college, M. Stevenson stated.

After the test, each participating student receives an interpretive folder prepared by Science Research Associates, the testing agency, that reports individual test results for comparison with scores of high school students across the country. Thus, students can learn more about their educational strengths and weaknesses—whether or not they plan to attend college.

In addition to the awards made by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation, about 130 business corporations, foundations, and individuals give scholarships through the program. A considerable number of other scholarships utilize the services of awarding their scholar-

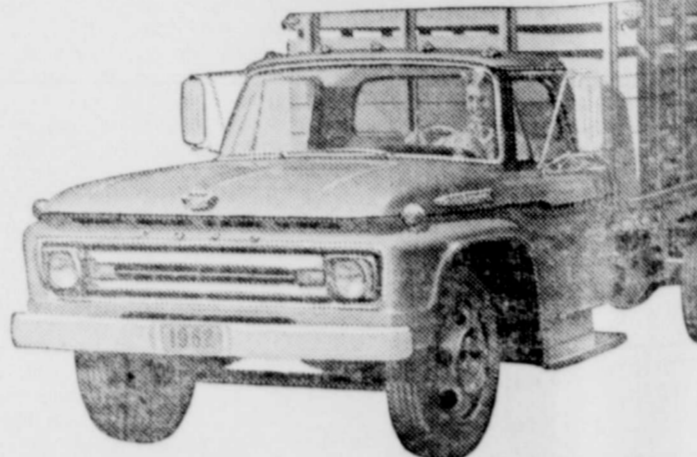

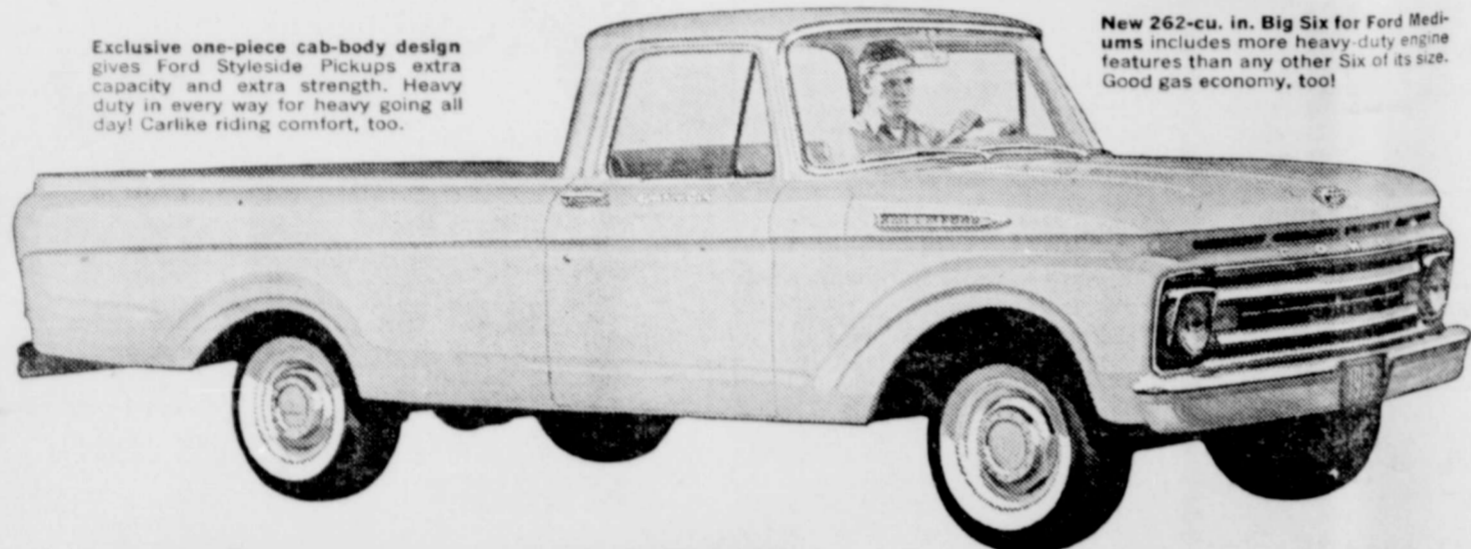

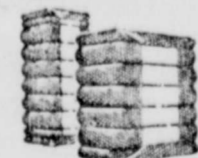

Abernathy Fire Key Rate Cut

AUSTIN—Lower fire key rates have been set by the State Board of Insurance for Abernathy and Sundown.

Abernathy's fire key rate was lowered from 49 to 46 per \$100 of fire insurance purchased annually. Sundown received a 3-cent decrease from 41 to 38 cents per \$100 of insurance.

The Abernathy decrease, which was made effective on all policies written on or after Sept. 15, was the third received this year. Earlier fire key rates were 53 and 51 cents.

The key rate is set after Board inspectors visit the city — both making charges for deficiencies and giving credits for protective measures and equipment.

To the 49 cents in charges, 3 cents in credits were deducted for a booster truck, methods of fire prevention and principles of fire insurance taught in the public schools, and a maintained arson reward.

SAFETY CHECK CARS NOW

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, suggested the start of fall "is an excellent time to have motor vehicles safety inspected" in preparation for hard winter driving.

The new 1962 Texas Vehicle Inspection Sticker is now available at the 5,000 official inspection stations in compliance with orders issued by the Texas Public Safety Commission. The order states that all vehicles coming under the provision of the Vehicle Inspection Act must display the new sticker by April 16, 1962.

Garrison said that during the past three months mechanics at inspection stations over the state have undergone an intensive training program on the inspection of vehicles under the law.

"There have been no changes in the Inspection Law from last year," he explained, "but we have re-examined every mechanic in the program to be certain he knows the procedure."

The DPS director noted that since the beginning of the inspection program 10 years ago, vehicles having a defect that was a causative factor in motor vehicle accidents have steadily decreased.

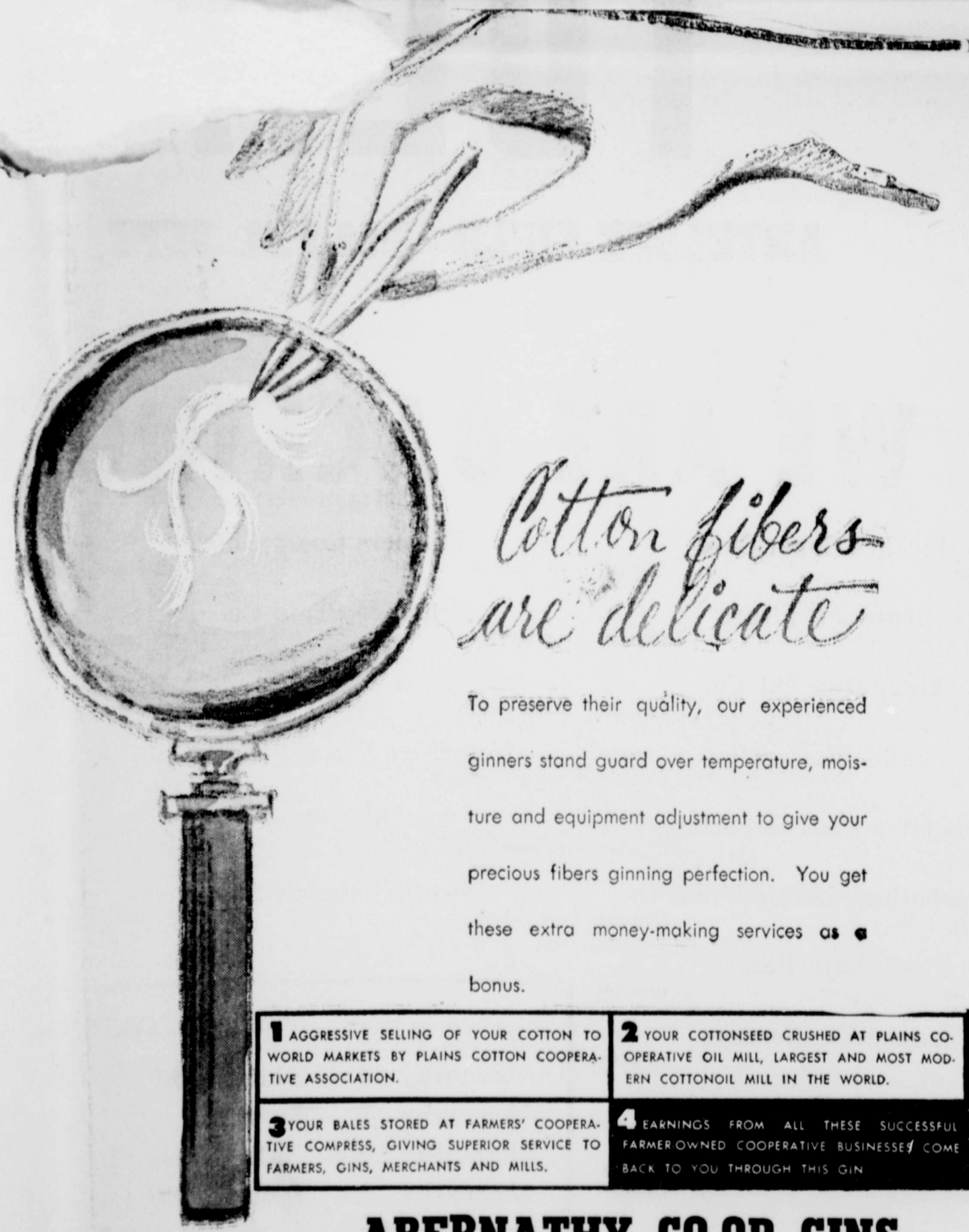
