It has been celebrated as a federal holiday every year since 1863, when, during the American Civil War, President Abraham Lincoln proclaimed a national day of "Thanksgiving and Praise to our beneficent Father who dwelleth in the Heavens," to be celebrated on the last Thursday in November.

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## Suspect in rash of burglaries is arrested

Colorado City Police Officers have been investigating a resurgence in the number of burglaries happening around town lately, and last week they made a huge break in the cases. Police arrested Cody T. Vining and a juvenile male for Burglary of a Habitation.

On Thursday, November 17<sup>th</sup>, CCPD officers Brown and Ortiz were dispatched to a residence in the 1200 block of Walnut Street at

about 8:11 p.m. The caller stated that there was a prowler walking around a house in that area.

When the officers arrived, they performed an initial investigation. Footprints were found in the backyard of the residence, and it was discovered that the gates to the yard and screen door to the home had been opened. A back bedroom window was open and an air conditioning unit had been removed from the

window.

As the officers patrolled the area, Cody T. Vining and a juvenile male were seen walking. The two were stopped by the officers and were found to be in possession of some of the personal belonging that had been taken from the residence on Walnut Street.

Vining and the juvenile were placed under arrest for Burglary of a Habitation. Vining was also found

to hold a warrant for another county. He was booked into the Mitchell County Jail, and the juvenile was transported to a juvenile detention facility by Juvenile Probation.

This is not the first incident of burglary Vining has been associated with. Back in April, he was arrested and booked on the charge of Criminal Attempt - Burglary of a Motor Vehicle. Vining was arrested after See SUSPECT, page 5

## Sales tax payments continue decline

As the price of oil has remained low in 2016, it's not much of a surprise that sales tax allocations, which are an economic indicator, in west Texas continue to decline. In most cases, the smaller rural towns have seen the bigger decreases in sales and sales tax rebates.

November's rebate received by the City of Colorado City totaled nearly \$59,000, but that's far cry from the \$74,000 received in the same time period last year. Overall, the city's rebates are down by

\$110,865.50 when compared to last year's totals.

While the county's November payment this year is more comparable to last year's allocation, it's still down by 17%. For the year, Mitchell County has received \$124,662.81 less than at this time in 2015.

Loraine's sales tax payments are down by a small percentage, but November's allocation was within \$200 of the November 2015 rebate. The City of Westbrook is stuck paying back an

overpayment made by the state at the beginning of the year.

The bigger towns in the area, like Abilene and Lubbock, whose sales are not based so heavily in the energy sector, have seen some decline but not nearly as much as their smaller neighbors. Abilene's recent sales tax rebate was down by just five percent from last November's rebate, and Lubbock's economy appears to be holding steady as well.

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar said today that state sales tax revenue totaled \$2.29 billion in October, 0.2 percent more than in October 2015.

Total sales tax revenue for the three months ending in October 2016 was down by 2.1 percent compared to the same period a year ago. Sales tax revenue is the largest source of state funding for

the state budget, accounting for 58 percent of all tax collections. Motor vehicle sales and rental taxes, motor fuel taxes and oil and natural gas production taxes also are large revenue sources for the state.

In October 2016, Texas collected the following revenue from those taxes: motor vehicle sales and rental taxes — \$396 million, down 4.6 percent from October 2015; motor fuels taxes — \$299 million, up 2.1 percent from October 2015; and oil and natural gas production taxes — \$224 million, down 6.9 percent from October 2015. Note: On their own, natural gas production tax collections in October 2016 were 9.3 percent higher than in October 2015, representing the first year-over-year monthly increase since December 2014.

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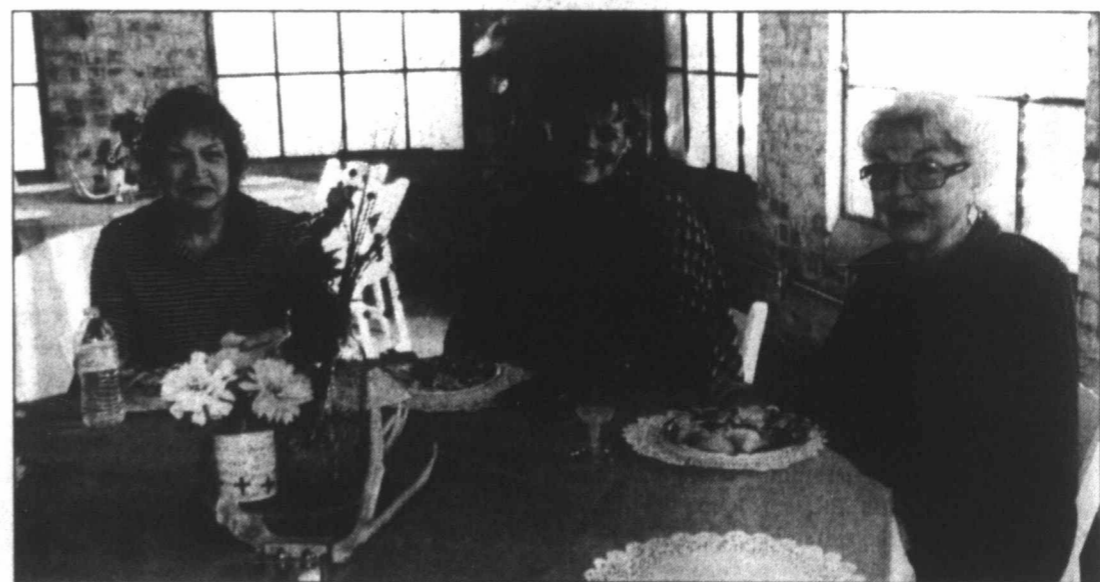

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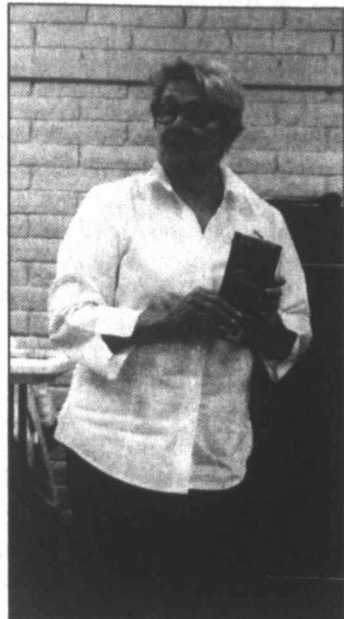

## Museum curator speaks to Lions Club



**A MUSEUM THAT INSPIRES** – Carol Cain, curator of the National WASPs WWII Museum in Sweetwater, came to Colorado City last Friday to talk about the museum and some of the ladies that served in the Women Airforce Service Pilots program during World War II.

At Avenger Field in Sweetwater is the National WASPs WWII Museum, and its director Carol Cain came to the weekly meeting

of the Colorado City Lions Club to encourage members to visit the inspirational facility. The Sweetwater museum has joined forces with six other air-based museums located in west Texas to form a group of facilities that can be visited over a two-day period.

Cain said that the western part of Texas was a hotbed of Air Force training activity during the war. Planes were much more viable following World War I and with most male pilots already serving, there was a need for more pilots. That's where Women Airforce Service Pilots came in.

The six museums in the association, besides the one at Avenger Field, are: Rattlesnake Bomber Base Museum in Monahans, Midland Army Airfield Museum in Midland, 12<sup>th</sup> Armored Division Museum in Abilene, Silent Wings Museum in Lubbock, Hangar 25 Air Museum in Big Spring and Texas Air Museum in Slaton.

The WASP museum in Sweetwater is located on the actual grounds where the women trained. Given the weather and wind in west Texas, the ladies were definitely challenged. It's important to remember that they were not

drafted and didn't have to serve.

In order to serve after the program, the women pilots had to have a lot of flying experience. After their training was completed, most WASPs served by ferrying planes to the bases closest to the fighting. Because they were flying into combat areas, they had to carry a gun and became known as "pistol packing mamas."

Cain said the ladies also served as instructors, trained some of the infantry and even towed targets behind planes for target practice. Serving as they did freed up the men to fight in the war. Of the 77 planes in the Air Force at that time, all were flown at some time or other by WASPs.

Quite a few of the women who served loved flying so much that they continued their careers in the air. Many went to work for the Red Cross and some flew mail routes in Canada.

As the generations age, historical stories are dying with the people who lived them. Cain emphasized the importance of visiting with the older generations and

jotting down their stories so they can be taught to the younger generations.

After moving to Sweetwater in Houston, Cain first visited the WASP museum with her granddaughter, Molly. As they were leaving, her granddaughter asked,

"Precious, I can be anything I want to be, can't I?"

It was at that moment that Cain knew she should become involved with the museum and she has spent many years volunteering, serving on the board and is now employed by the museum.

Driver's license Trooper positions were being phased out, so she took calls from other offices and completed audits and additional reports for the six DPS offices in the area. Bullard completed a month of leadership training in Austin to be certified for the position.

Bullard said she enjoyed her career with DPS and worked with many exceptional people. She wanted to spend more time with her husband, now a retired game warden who is a hunting manager on three different Spade Ranch

hunting leases, including one in Mitchell County.

Bullard retired with a total of 32 years of service credit, full benefits and a nice monthly annuity check which she will receive for the rest of her life.

"I am thankful to DPS and am grateful that I got to spend my career serving such an elite department," Bullard said. "I will miss so many great people, my supervisors, coworkers and troopers."

Bullard said she plans to spend more time with family, her dogs, hunting and traveling with Randy.

## TUMBLEWEED SMITH The Cowgirl Hall of Fame gets some new members

It was like a fashion show for women's upscale western wear. There were signs of elegance and grace among those present, most of whom were women dressed in boots, hats, long dresses, suede suits with fringe, miniskirts and items seen in fancy magazines like *Cowboys and Indians*. Turquoise was the jewelry of choice and the boots were art objects, with their colors and designs. Some vendors were on hand with all types of western merchandise for women, including purses in several types of leathers with price tags in the thousands of dollars.

The event was the induction of four women into the National Cowgirl Museum and Hall of Fame, located in Fort Worth's Will Rogers Coliseum area. More than 900 people gathered in the Roundup Inn, which resembles a convention center. It's near the rodeo grounds and stock pens. The \$200 ticket included a meal of salad and cornbread, a tenderloin steak with vegetables and corn soufflé and a dessert of spiced nutmeg tres leches. Table decorations had everything from rotating sculptures made of horseshoes to impressive bronze pieces. Guests were not allowed to take them home.

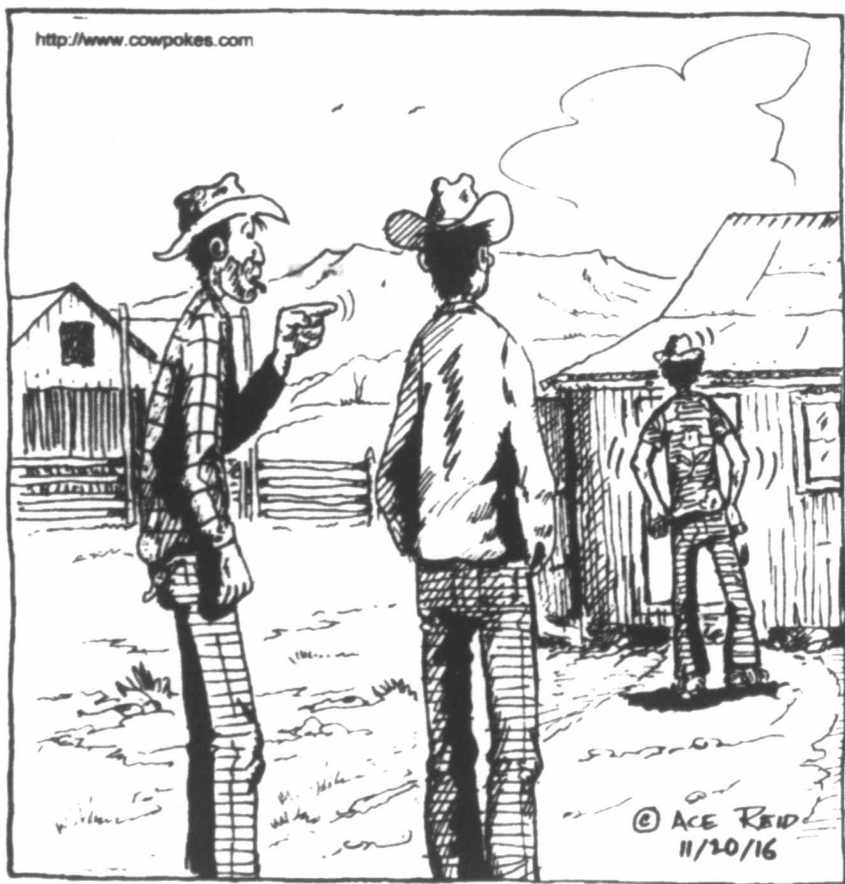
If you haven't been to the Cowgirl Museum, you should go. It is a state of the art museum with a two-story moving mobile that has both still photographs and videos on it. The mobile was designed by a group from Paris, France that also did the displays in the museum.

The facility had its beginnings in 1975 in Hereford, Texas. At first it was housed in a temporary location, later moved into a home. In 1990 the museum organizers wanted more exposure so they put the museum up for bids to several cities. Fort Worth submitted the highest bid and in 1992 the museum was moved to Cowtown. An art deco building was constructed to house the honorees' artifacts and photos and the museum opened in its present location in 2002.

In the 41 years the museum has been in operation only 224 women from all over the United States have been inducted into the National Cowgirl Hall of Fame. Four or five are selected each year among several nominations. "We're not looking for just great women," says Dr. Diana Vela, Associate Executive Director. "We're looking for exceptionally great women." The nominees go through three separate screenings, which come after a several page narrative about them is submitted. Supporting material is carefully examined and facts are checked.

The only Texan among the group and the first Jewish woman inducted into the Hall of Fame is Frances Rosenthal Kallison, a community activist who lived in San Antonio before her death in 2004. Many of her family and friends attended her induction.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF COLORADO CITY, TEXAS; REPEALING AND REPLACING ORDINANCE NO. 2002-04 AND ORDINANCE NO. 2010-20; AMENDING ARTICLE 6.03 WEEDS, RUBBISH, BRUSH, AND OTHER OBJECTIONABLE, UNSIGHTLY, OR UNSANITARY MATTER, OF CHAPTER 6, HEALTH AND SANITATION; ALLOWING CODE ENFORCEMENT OFFICIALS TO ENFORCE SAME; REPEALING ALL PRIOR ORDINANCES OR ORDINANCE PROVISIONS IN CONFLICT WITH THE PROVISIONS OF THIS ORDINANCE; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY OF THE PROVISIONS OF THIS ORDINANCE; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

**PENALTY**

Sec. 6.03.013 Penalty for violation

Any violation of this section shall also be considered a criminal violation, class C misdemeanor. If any person or owner violates any of the provisions of this section, the code enforcement officer official may issue a citation to said person or owner, prosecuted in municipal court, and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined in the sum not to exceed the amount allowed by law for each offense. Each day such violation continues shall constitute a separate and distinct offense. Code enforcement officials designated by the City Manager shall take complaints to the Municipal Court Judge and the Municipal Court Judge may issue a notice to appear. Further, prosecution in municipal court does not waive any of the city's civil enforcement actions if it may have to enforce this article against any person or owner.

**EFFECTIVE DATE**

V. **Publication and Effective Date.** This Ordinance shall become effective no less than ten days following passage of the ordinance and after publication by the City Secretary of the descriptive caption and the penalty section of this ordinance in a local newspaper twice within a ten-day period in accordance with Section 29 of the City Charter.

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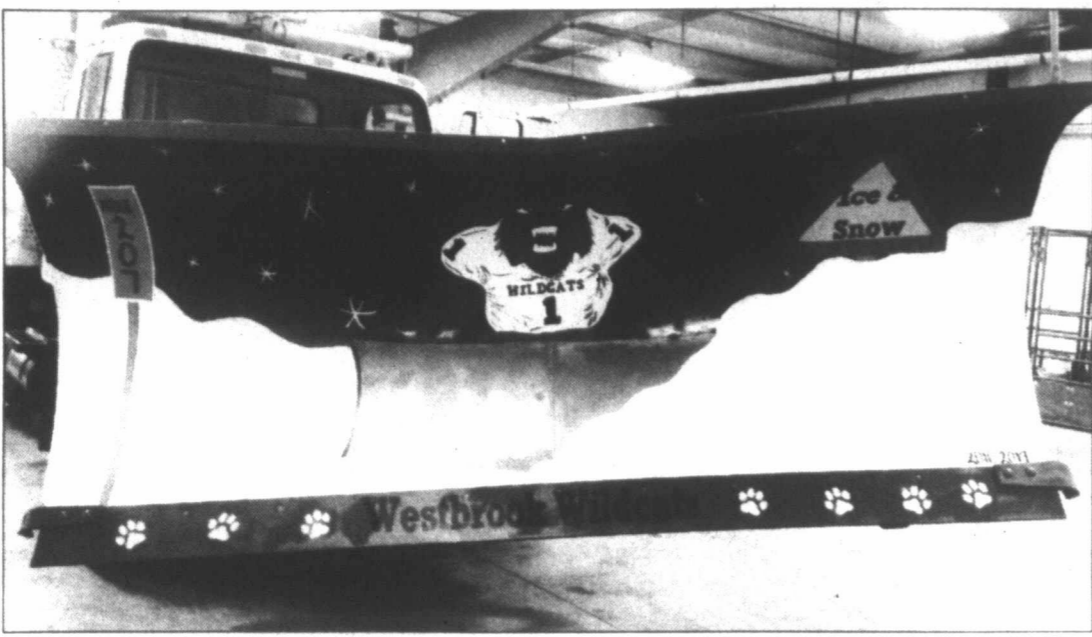

## Westbrook Elementary wins painting contest
