Survey On Brownfield Road To Start Soon

County Will Secure Right-of-Ways When Survey Completed

Sam Richardson, Carl Rountree and V. Z. Rogers, local business men, went to Austin the first of this week and met with members of the State Highway Commission on Tuesday morning and asked the commission for a tentative designation for a state highway northwest of Lamesa to the Terry county line which was granted, with the survey of the highway to start immediately.

The designated route for the new road runs about two miles out on the Seminole highway, turning north to the Terry county line, covering a distance of approximately 20 miles. By running the highway along this route it will save Dawson county about \$2,000, stated Sam Richardson this week, and will serve Menger, Pecos Center and Welch with an all-weather road.

The survey of the new highway will be conducted by members of the highway department under the supervision of the Regional Engineer, Mr. Garrett of Lubbock. When this survey is completed the county will obtain the right-of-ways, with the work of grading and draining to start immediately afterwards.

It is understood by interested officials that this tentative route is highly acceptable by landowners in that section. The road will run practically the entire distance along section lines.

Although Terry county officials have not stated what they intended to do in their county along this route, it is thought by interested officials that they will meet the Dawson county road when it is completed. This road will be a direct route from the south to the Yoakum and Hockley county oil fields.

WORK SHEETS TO BE SIGNED AT AGENT'S OFFICE

Word was received by the county agent last week that work sheets must be made out by all farm operators and also expert to receive the subsidy payment on cotton produced in 1937. Instructions were to begin signing the worksheets at once. No payments will be made on the subsidy until the work sheets are signed and submitted to the State Office. This will include land which produced a crop for the first time in 1937. Every operator or owner should call at the office and make out his work sheet as soon as possible if he has not already signed a 1937 worksheet. It will not be necessary for those who signed worksheets early last year, (1937) to make out another.

WORK OF GRADING HOUSTON STREET STARTED TUESDAY

The work of grading Houston Street was started Tuesday morning this week, with the actual paving to start when the grading is completed stated W. L. Marr, mayor.

The grading was started in the Post Office block, and will continue to North Fourth Street.

Mayor Marr stated that practically all of the residents on Houston had signed for the paving, and those who do not have homesteads on the street are going to be asked to pave along their property.

Mr. Daugherty of Big Spring has been given the contract to supervise the street work with W. S. Thompson getting the paving contract.

The city has adopted a new type of paving to be used on this project and is the same that the City of Big Spring has been using successfully, the mayor said. The new type is called a three-course inverted penetration asphalt pavement with a seal course. Six-inch concrete curbs and 18 inch concrete gutter, on a 6-inch caliche base will be constructed.

Tornadoes To Play In District 1 This Season

Will Play Plainview Amarillo, Pampa And Borger

The Lamesa high school has been tentatively placed in Conference A District 1, for future football competition by the state director of the Interscholastic League. A schedule has been entered among the member schools as follows: September 23, Plainview there; September 30, Pampa at Lamesa; October 22, Amarillo there; November 5, Lubbock at Lamesa and Borger there on November 11. Another scheduled game is that with Bowie High at El Paso on October 7.

The assignment will not be official until the regular meeting of the State Executive committee in the near future. In the meantime Lamesa authorities have requested an assignment with Conference A schools which are much nearer than Pampa, Borger and Amarillo and will continue to urge such an assignment until hope is gone on the grounds that shorter distances to be travelled mean reductions in travel hazards and expenses. The interests of both fans and team enter into this consideration. Activity is now being manifested by Conference Schools much nearer home and these institutions heads desire Lamesa's presence.

In their group, with the proposed grouping the most remote school will be considerably nearer than Amarillo. Complete details are not available at this time concerning the possible grouping.

The Conference A grouping places the local high school in competition with larger schools and increases the possibilities of inter-school relations. Future publicity of such events will include the Lamesa high school with the largest in this State and may provide opportunities for many Dawson county performers to become better known.

The Lamesa public school enrollment continues to grow. Fourteen pupils entered the elementary school this week and three were admitted to high school grades. The gross enrollment is now nearing 1600 in the three schools of Lamesa.

MONDAY LAST DAY FOR POLL TAX PAYMENT

Only three more days remain to pay your 1938 poll tax, citizens of Lamesa and Dawson county are urged to keep this in mind and pay their taxes before the deadline date, January 31.

Up to Wednesday afternoon, this week 2212 poll tax receipts had been issued including exemption certificates. This leaves several hundred yet to be paid, if all the voters who cast ballots in 1936 pay their poll this year.

Voting poll tax receipts are issued through Monday, January 31, and can be paid without paying real or personal property, but real and personal property tax cannot be paid without paying poll tax, if polls have been assessed.

Young folks who are 21 years of age on or after January 1, 1937 are entitled to a free vote, but must secure an exemption certificate. People who were 60 years old before January 1, 1937 are also entitled to a free vote.

PLANS MADE FOR DAIRY DAY SHOW HERE APRIL 15

At a meeting held in the District court room, Wednesday, plans were made for a Dairy Day Show and Educational Meeting, to be held in Lamesa, Friday, April 15, eighteen representatives from Lynn, Gaines, Terry, Borden, Howard and Dawson counties attended.

G. G. Gibson, extension dairy specialist of A. and M. College was in charge of the meeting, and D. T. Simons, secretary of the Texas Jersey club and field man for the American Jersey Association was the principal speaker.

The purpose of the show, as discussed at the meeting, is to have a Dairy Day Show and Dairy Education meeting, with no discrimination between the registered and non-registered breeds, at which time the knowledge and quality in cattle will be stressed. Plans were made to have dairy cattle from each of the above mentioned counties here for the show.

\$8,000 Bonds Will Not Add To Cost Of City Taxes

An election for the voting of \$8,000 bonds for the building of a new sewerage plant for the City of Lamesa will be held within the city on this coming Monday, January 31. The voting to be held at the City Hall, as in other elections, during the hours of 3 o'clock and 6 o'clock.

All taxpayers of the city are urged to keep in mind this election and cast their vote on this important issue. Mayor Marr stated this week that the \$8,000 bonds would be retired by revenue the city gets from sewerage each month, and that they will not increase the city taxes.

These bonds for the amount of \$8,000 will be the city's part of the \$10,000 project, with the Works Progress Administration furnishing the remaining \$2,000.

Plans and specifications for the new sewerage disposal plant were drawn several weeks ago by Harvey C. Allen, local architect, and have already been approved by the State Health Department and are now in the hands of WPA officials for their approval.

The approved plans call for a new and modern disposal plant, and one large enough that will care for Lamesa increasing population in the years to come. The City of Lamesa is in great need for this new plant and every taxpayer within the city limits are urged to keep this in mind when they go to the polls to vote Monday.

Officers appointed to hold the election Monday are M. Hatch, Arch Heffernan, Wade Bartlett and J. R. Flanigan.

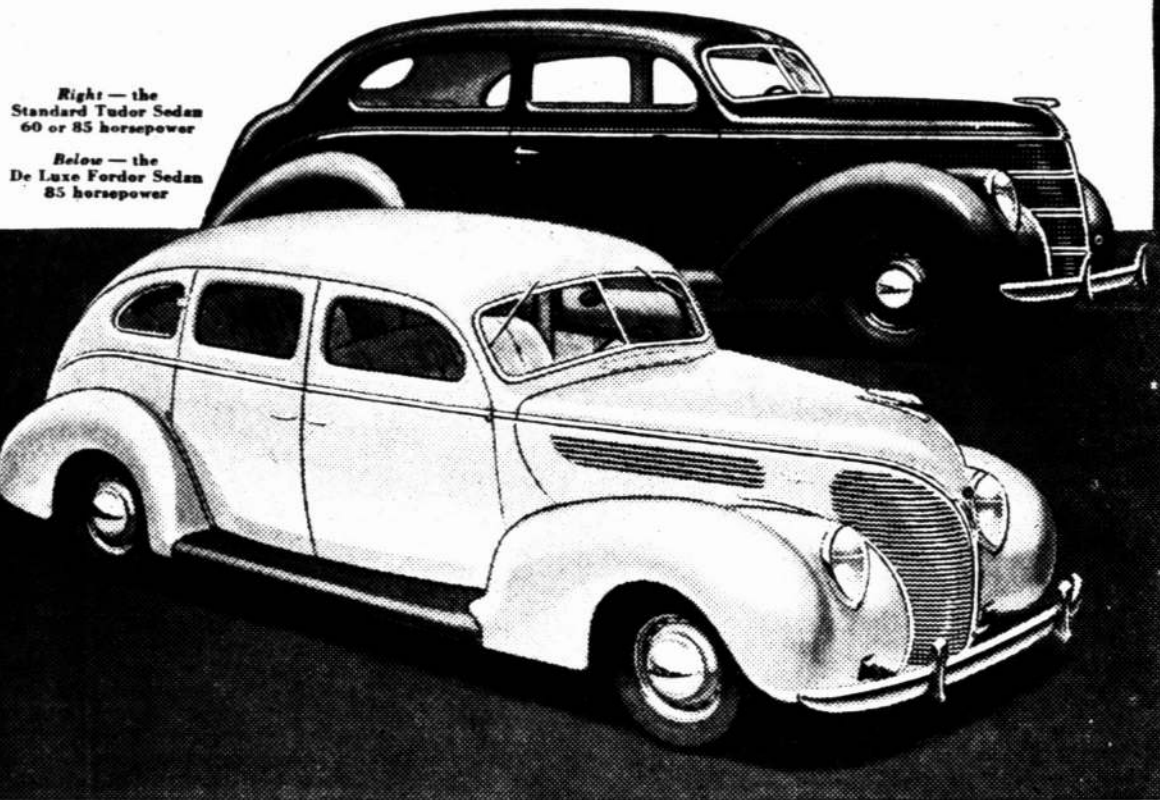

130 Dawson Families Borrowed Through Farm Security

Some 130 Dawson county families that borrowed through Farm Security in 1937 to finance their farm and home operations have made definite progress toward rehabilitation. In order to accomplish this goal, it is essential for each family to earn a large portion of its living at home.

The following totals are concrete ex-

amples of some of the accomplishments of the past year. 2004 articles of clothing were constructed, 11,935 pounds of poultry was consumed, 793 quarts of preserves, 648 quarts of jelly, 944 quarts of vegetables, 3,491 quarts of fruits, 10,280 pounds of dried fruits and vegetables, 1,905 pounds of stored vegetables, 645 quarts of canned meat, 30,932 pounds of cured meat and lard, 250 quarts of pickles and relish, all fruits, vegetables and meats were stored for future use, 242 quilts were made and recovered, 800 miscellaneous physical improvements were made in the homes and yards. Practically every family grew a garden. A large percentage have their own corn for meal. Almost 100 per cent have some type of reading material in the home. More than 50 per cent had increased poultry flocks.

There are many other accomplishments that cannot be estimated in figures such as morale and renewed vigor toward mental and financial independence.

With progress of the past year as a foundation to build on, greater progress is expected during the year 1938. However, the success or failure of the Farm Security program in the county is based on cooperation between the supervisors and the borrowers. It is this close cooperation on the part of P. S. A. borrowers that have made the above figures a reality.

Farmers and Ranchers Co-Operating With Local Soil Camp

The beginning of 1938 finds 192 local farmers and ranchers cooperating with the Soil Conservation Service in the Lamesa Camp erosion control demonstration area in perfecting and demonstrating a sound, long-time soil and water conservation program in this section, according to F. A. Vestal, camp superintendent.

The demonstration area was started in September 1935, and the camp superintendent reports that during the last year more progress in the development and demonstration of effective erosion control practices was made than in any previous year. Interest shown in terracing, contour listing, strip cropping and other soil conservation measures continue to increase persistently each year. Inquiries are being received each day for information on soil saving methods applicable to this area.

Cooperating farmers in the area have increased the acreage of erosion resisting crops (sorghum and sudan) on their farms 13,000 acres since they started cooperating with the Government to set their farms up as living erosion control demonstrations. They have protected 6,000 acres with approved terraces and have adopted flexible systems in 30,000 acres.

Contour tillage is being employed on 20,000 acres. Range land treatment includes contour furrowing of 5,000 acres, and construction of 5 stock water ponds. 236,391 trees have been planted.

These figures, however, reflect only a part of the work farmers and ranchers of the Lamesa area are doing in the unified erosion control program. Strip cropping, wildlife encouragement and other practices needed to control erosion and to make the best use of every acre on the farm are being used. F. A. Vestal, camp superintendent explains.

Mr. F. A. Vestal, camp superintendent suggests that nearby farmers and

ranchers visit some of these demonstration farms, talk with the operators and see for themselves. Information about erosion control practices for this section also can be obtained from the local county agent or the workers at the local Soil Conservation Service project office.

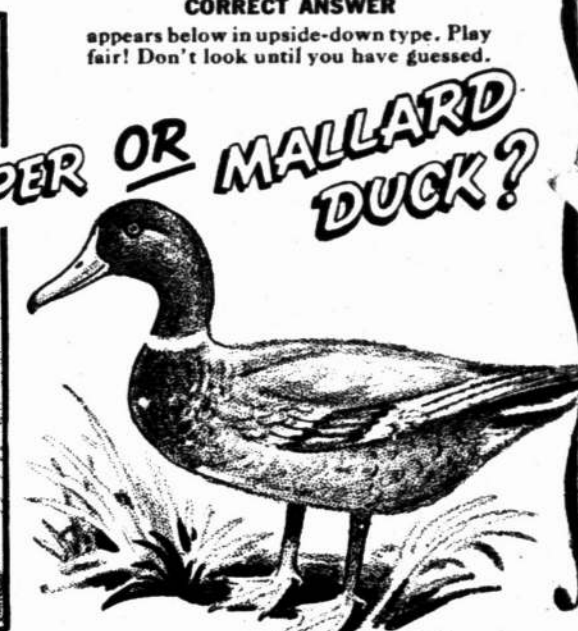

Local Delegation**Attend Meeting In Big Spring**

A delegation of 17 farmers and business men of Lamesa attended the public hearing held by the Department of Agriculture in Big Spring, Texas, Tuesday, January 25. The hearing was held in the interest of soil conservation and flood control in the region known as the upper watershed of the Colorado river and involved 16 West Texas counties and Roosevelt and Lea counties in New Mexico.

The hearing was presided over by Louis P. Merrill, regional conservator of Fort Worth, Texas, and continued throughout the day. In the course of the hearing through testimony given by various witnesses from county delegations some important facts were developed. Some of the main points were: that the grass land in the West Texas counties was becoming depleted; that cultivated land was losing top soil and fertility by water and wind erosion and that the small streams in the territory were being filled up by silt, thereby increasing water run-off.

The Dawson county delegation made an appeal for increased soil and water conservation work within the county and recommended the construction of a lake at the head of Tobacco Creek in the northeast part of the county. Much interest was shown in the lake project by the hearing committee, and it is hoped that some good results may come.

The Dawson county delegation was the largest county delegation present for the hearing, and was highly commended by officials of the hearing. The delegation consisted of the following citizens: Judge W. M. Yates; Mayor W. L. Marr; C. Baldwin, O. G. Kelly, J. F. Barron, Owen C. Taylor, Guy Weekes, Arthur Thwett, M. C. Lindsey, C. M. FARMERS SIGNED 1418 WORKSHEETS DURING 1937

The county agents office has tabulated some interesting figures from the 1937 farm program worksheets and from records of compliance measurements in this county. Dawson county farmers signed 1418 worksheets covering as many farm units totaling 273,334 acres of cultivated land. Farms not in compliance totaled 37,313 acres. 236,022 acres of cropland was measured of which 1832 acres was sod land placed in cultivation for the first time in 1937.

Crop measurements for the farms which were measured for compliance were as follows:

Total cotton measured, acres	119,467
Total feed crops measured	83,231
Total soil conserving crops	29,516
Total idle land measured	2,806

Farm measurements it was found that the average farm covered by worksheets in this county in 1937 was as follows:

Total cultivated land 187.5 acres; Percent of cultivated land 50.8; cotton planted, 95.25 acres, 50.8; feed crops planted, 66.4 acres, 35.4; soil conserving crops, 23.6, 12.6; idle land, 2.25, 1.2.

From measurements of farms in the program and estimates of acreages on non-cooperating farms the estimated total cotton acreage in this county is placed at 200,000 to 210,000 acres for 1937. The average cotton acreage in the county for the period 1928-1937 was 195,000 acres. The average from cotton feed on cooperating farms in 1937 was 12.56 per cent.

Gail Ranchman Conducting Tests

A. M. Clayton, prominent ranchman of this section, is making an experiment in water conservation, just west of Gail, at the base of what is known as Gail Mountain. The purpose of the experiment is to utilize runoff water from a small rocky hill and distribute it over pastures, with excess turned on crop land below.

The Clayton ranch, which borders on Highway No. 15, for several miles west of Gail, furnishes an ideal situation for such an experiment. The slope of pasture land around Gail Mountain recently has been terraced, as has the field just below the pasture. In this project 45,726 lineal feet of terraces were built, in addition to seven "spreader" dams totaling 3,396 cubic yards of dirt and 3,294 feet of ridge. Of the total amount of terraces, 9,299 lineal feet were in the field adjoining the pasture.

Construction work was done by W. D. Smith, Gail contractor, working in co-operation with the local CCC Camp. The CCC Camp furnished a terrace with a nine-foot blade. Lines were run on the water level by E. B. McLeroy, Borden county agent.

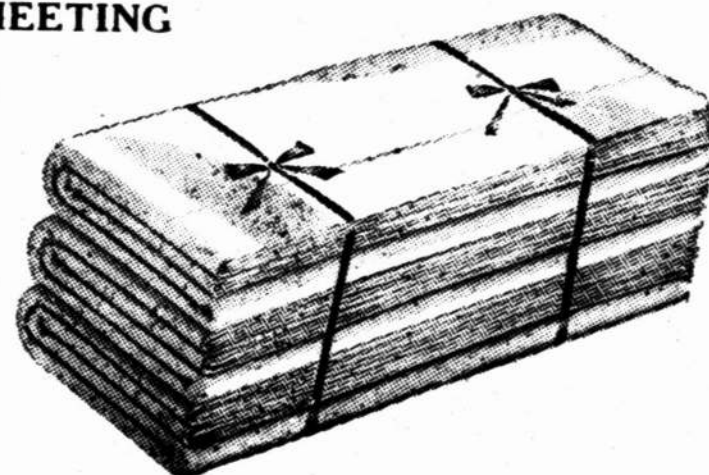

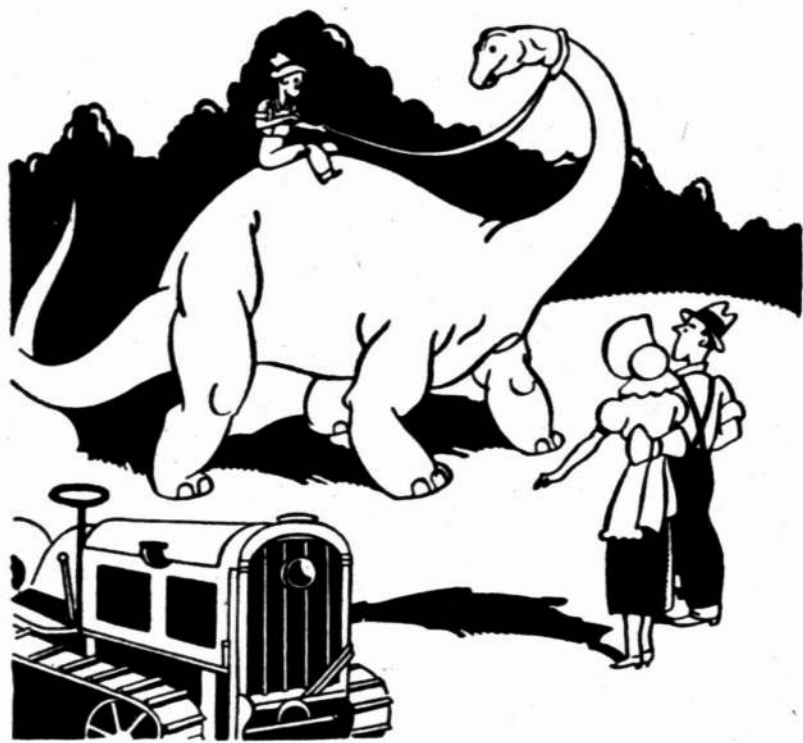

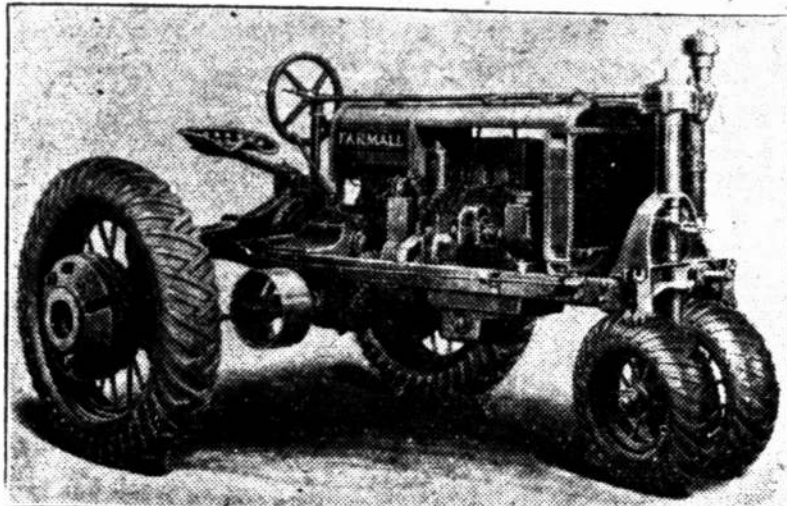

WINDBREAKS FOR THE RURAL HOME

By Mr. Elmer Wells, reporter for the Central Home Demonstration Club.

"Landscapes for the rural home are more or less formal than those in town for the country has a natural variety of space to be used," said Miss Mattie Phenix, our county agent, in her demonstration on windbreakers for the rural home to the club members in the home of Mrs. L. A. Sasser, Wednesday afternoon, January 19. Making a windbreak for the rural home will call for strenuous labor as well as patience and courage. We need while waiting three years to attain the proper growth.

Soil preparation means the life of a tree and seventy-five per cent of the battle is won. For windbreakers the evergreen trees are most effective. Due to the slow growth of the evergreen for the first few years. A combination of evergreen and deciduous trees are more desirable. To avoid obstructing the summer breezes place the windbreak on north and west side of farm homes at an approximate distance of 100 feet. When using five rows you may have the choice of one species for each row, such as desert willow, Tamarix, Sand Plum or Chaste tree. For the first row and spacing between first and second row, eight to ten feet. For the second row Chinese

Elm, Honey Locust, Osage Orange or green ash. The third row some seeded juniper or red berry juniper and space 20 feet from second row.

The fourth and fifth row, yellow pine. Scotch pine or red cedar, spacing the distance of ten to twelve feet.

Mrs. R. B. Moore was appointed our recreation chairman and Mrs. Claud Cowen appointed as our expansion committee.

Texas Faced With Smallpox Epidemic States Dr. Cox

Austin, Tex., Jan. 17.—"Texas is faced with the probability of local smallpox epidemics if precautions are not immediately employed," declared Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer. "Last year there was not a single death from smallpox in Texas, while last week over thirty cases and two deaths were reported."

"Smallpox epidemics would never occur, if everyone, and especially children, could be effectively vaccinated. The lack of vaccination causes the present menace of this disease. Modern safeguards have removed legitimate objection to vaccination. The virus is made from calves and, consequently

is incapable of transmitting human blood diseases.

"A primary vaccination with one successful re-vaccination will, as a rule, protect throughout life from the milder forms of smallpox, but this is not true in the severer types of this disease. Therefore, be vaccinated and re-vaccinated at least every seven years so that you will have the greatest protection possible and the least chance of being sick. Re-vaccination should also be done after each time you have been near a known case of smallpox, for you know that the old vaccination protects if the new one fails to 'take.'
