The cold front began to hit Eastland county just about noon, Wednesday. Before the front hit the county was enjoying spring-like weather, with the mercury up in the 70s. Seven Discoveries Are Made In County In 1953

Seven discoveries in Eastland county during 1953 played a part in the record-breaking year from the standpoint of oil and gas discoveries in West Central Texas.

The 12 county area, composed of Eastland, Palo Pinto, Stephens, Erath, Brown, Callahan, Coleman, Comanche, Haskell, Parker, Shackelford and Taylor counties, shared in 139 discoveries, 20 more than the previous high of 119 established in 1952.

Coleman county led with 30 discoveries, Jones had 28, Taylor 16, and Haskell 14. Brown had 9, Callahan 12, Comanche one, Palo Pinto two, Parker two, Shack-

Vet Enrollment At RJC Due To Show Increase

A pre-registration report from Ranger Junior College indicates that there will be a considerable increase in veteran enrollment for the spring semester, beginning January 25, according to an announcement by Dr. Ashton, president of the college. GORMAN — Seeing that the Eastland county March of Dimes quota of \$24,000 is reached by the Jan. 31 deadline is 10-year-old Mike Stacy's biggest job now-a-days.

And he's busy at work getting the job done. You see, Mike knows

that MOD funds are used for a worthy fund—he's a polio victim himself.

Mike's a great fund raiser, too. Sponsored by the Eastland, Ranger and Cisco MOD committees, he will sing in the interest of the drive Friday over KERC. Mike, who has been crippled in the arms by polio since June 1950, has used his voice before in MOD campaigns at Carswell Air Base in Fort Worth and at Eastland, Ranger, DeWitt and Carbon. He has several other appearances scheduled for the present campaign and just recently made a trip to Comanche in behalf of the Dimes drive.

Mike has other "hobbies" besides the March of Dimes. He has a wide knowledge which he attributes to his being able to read at a level far above his years. He was just in the first grade when polio struck him, but he too felt advantage of opportunity offered him at the City-County hospital in Fort Worth. Many of the boys which he has spent in bed have been placed

sant hours for Mike. He has used books to make his suffering a little easier.

Mike is back in public schools now, having overcome his handicap sufficiently to attend both school and church regularly. He can also ride his bicycle and make use of other toys and instruments with his feet and hands. He still has limited use of his hands.

'Ranger Success' Of 1895 Anything But Success, Old Newsman Writes

A 17 word classified ad brought fond memories to an ex-Ranger man who now makes his home in Colorado Springs, Colo. The ad, published in the Dallas Morning News, read: "Wanted at once, floorman; semi-weekly; 40 hours; 5-day week. Good pay. No boomer. Ranger Times, Ranger, Texas."

And in Colorado Springs the one-fourth inch ad caught the eye of W. B. (Wick) Byrd. Byrd apparently got to thinking about the years he spent in Ranger and before he could shake the thoughts from his mind he sat down and wrote a three page letter in a determined handwriting to "The Editor" of the Times.

Byrd's letter in full: "Editor, Times . . . Ranger, Texas (my old stomping ground). Dear sir, my brother, now deceased, published a weekly in Ranger in 1895. He dubbed it 'The Ranger Success', but it was about everything else but a success. He (Jan Byrd) was a practical printer and to some extent, so was I. All of our typesetting was done by hand by the two of us. Our press was a hand press on which we printed two pages at a time, and of course we had one small job press, an 8 x 12 Gordon.

and here is something, Mr. Editor, which no doubt, will open your eyes wide: My brother and I boarded (room and board, excellent meals) with a private family in Ranger for—but first, guess what we paid for said room and board? Alright, I'll tell you. Just \$8 per month each, and our \$16 per month paid all expenses of the home, and, by the way, it was the home of Uncle Overton Davenport, his dear and lovely wife, and their two adult daughters, Sally and Betty, and their son, George, who is now your honorable district judge, or, he was just a few years ago. But at the time of which I speak George was a young man

and was Ranger's one and only barber. There was no railroad, running into Breckenridge, and, of course, no highway since there were no cars, and listen to this, brother, money was so scarce at that time that The Success subscribers, most of them anyway, paid their subscriptions with peaches, plums, watermelons, ear corn, etc. Grover Cleveland was our president then, but he had
