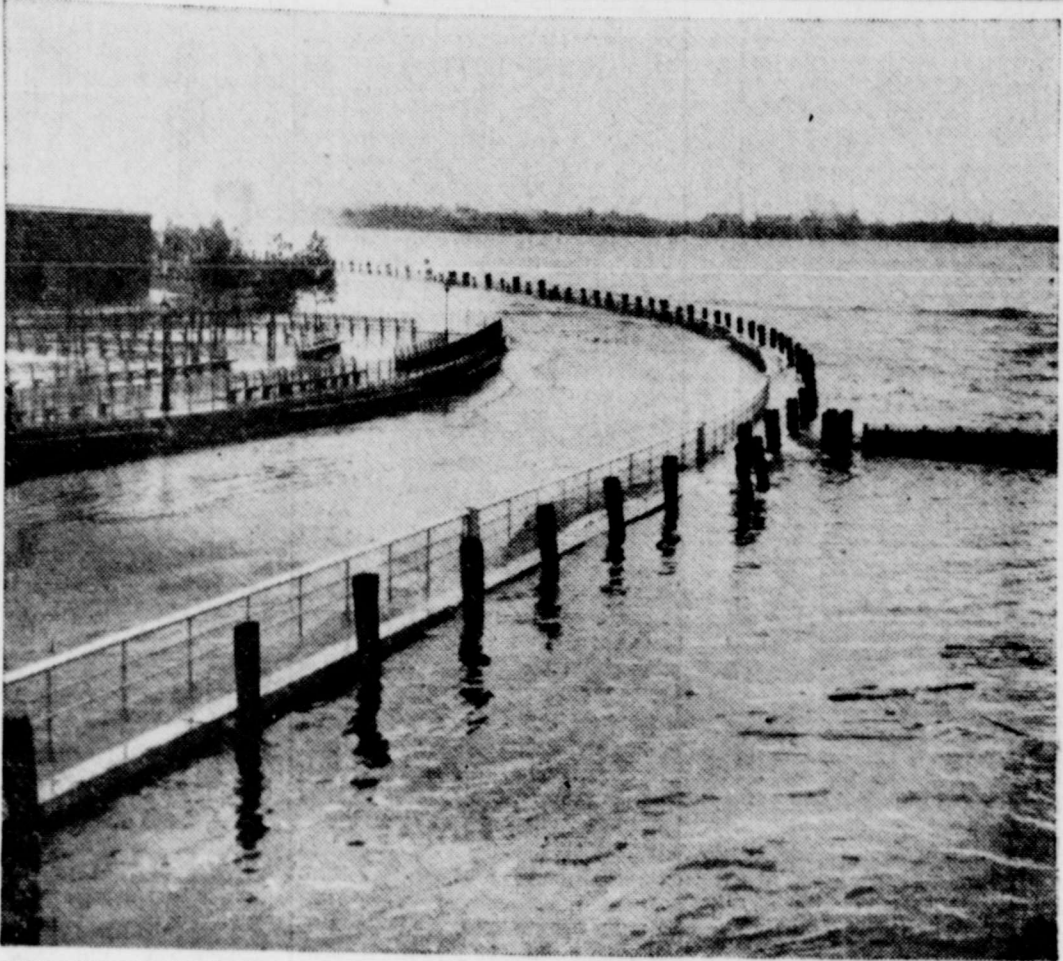
If you want to attend the annual P-TA banquet Monday night, better get your reservations in. Today's the last day.

GILMORE LEADS LOBO 'B' TEAM TO 27-13 WIN OVER COMANCHE

Joe Gilmore, fleet footed Lobo "B" team fullback, took the opening kickoff on his own 10 yard line on Chesley Field Thursday night and behind beautiful blocking carried it 90 yards to cross the Comanche goal and begin a parade that downed the Comanche "B" team, 27-13.

Gilmore caught the ball on the 12, fumbled it, then picked it up on the 10 to begin a weaving run up the middle. He was hit by two tacklers at midfield but shook loose. Two blocks on the Comanche 30 downed the last two Comanche defenders and he went the rest of the way unchallenged. The try for point was no good and the Lobos were ahead 6-0.

Cisco kicked off to Comanche who put the ball in play on their own 29. A series of running plays carried to the 46 where an alert Cisco lineman pounced on a fumble to stop the drive. On six running plays the ball was carried to the 10 and Howard Hamilton took it to the one. David Ewell plunged over from there for the second Cisco touchdown in five minutes. Paul Ford plunged over for the point after touchdown.

Comanche took the kickoff on the 30 and returned to the 45. Reverses by Poyner and Hicks carried to the Cisco 3 and Hicks went over to bring the count to 13-6. The try for point failed and the scoring for the first quarter was ended.

Early in the second quarter Cisco had possession of the ball on the Lobo 46 with fourth down and six. On the punt attempt a high pass back from center rolled to the Lobo 30 and Comanche took over from there. They marched to the Lobo two but Billy Duke recovered a

fumble at that point to stop the drive. Cisco took the ball back to the six and kicked out to mid field. Comanche worked to the 35 where the Lobos held for downs. On the second play of the series Poyner intercepted a Cisco pass at the Cisco 35. From that point they went on to score. Poyner made the tally from the two with two seconds left in the second period. Ellington kicked the extra point to tie the game as the half ended.

To open the second half of play Cisco kicked to Comanche on the three and the ball was returned to the six. Poyner fumbled and Frank Walton returned to Page Four

Longview Man Is Noted For Earth Moving Machines

If Henry Ford is credited with putting America on wheels, to R. G. (Bob) LeTourneau, who speaks at the Cisco Chamber of Commerce dinner Saturday evening, must go a major share of the credit for putting those wheels on paved roads. For it was LeTourneau who took the road building industry out of the slip and fiasco stage and gave it the capacity to move mountains and iron out ravines and valleys so that modern highways might go broad and straight across the land.

Those great yellow machines snorting and tugging about new construction like jointed, prehistoric monsters, gulping and discharging earth in bites of many cubic yards, are the children of his fertile invention.

To him also goes much of the credit for the fact that, during World War II American planes were able to land on Pacific islands and European coasts almost with the first waves of American amphibious attackers. How they got there represented a triumph of American logistic genius, but it was the genius of LeTourneau which bit and tore at tangled jungle and stubborn rock and smoothed out ways in the wilderness for American planes to land and take off in support of our fighting men. And it is that same genius which must be credited with much of the success for the Alcan highway built through Canada to Alaska during the war.

Even now machines of the LeTourneau design are helping to construct the two-lane highway between Eastland and Ranger east of Cisco.

But the genius of the man is not limited to earth-moving equipment. If he needed a crane, the like of which didn't exist, or was believed could exist, LeTourneau simply sat down at his drawing board, designed it, had it built, and had it in operation doing exactly the job he wanted done.

If he needed houses where no lumber could be had, he designed a mold, poured the houses in concrete and set them on lots to be used by his workers until something better was available. If it was ships that needed building, this landlubber of a man whose element was dirt and more dirt, brushed aside the skepticism of the ship-building industry, designed boats with bottoms corrugated lengthwise to minimize roll and sent them plowing the waves.

Such is the man who will speak to Cisco men and women Saturday night — a controversial figure in some respects, as all people who do things arouse controversy, a man of boundless confidence and driving enthusiasm, a man to whom no job has been too large, no challenge too great. A successful American industrialist, he is a prototype of the sort who took a wilderness and transformed it into the greatest and most powerful nation on earth.

He says God did it. God in partnership with Robert Gilmore LeTourneau.

It began in New England — Vermont, of all places, that citadel of Yankee energy and shrewdness. There Bob LeTourneau was born of Huguenot stock, emigrating from France to America by way of Quebec.

From Vermont, young LeTourneau and his parents followed the historic route of America empire-building, traveling to the Middle West and settling in Duluth, Minnesota, where the boy grew up, his mind restlessly busy with things that couldn't be done. At fourteen, the family moved to the Pacific Coast where young Bob got hold of a welding torch and with it sparked his genius for forging metal into vast muscles that would do the will of man. After varied experiences in California and a tour of duty in a naval machine shop during World War I, young LeTourneau progressed by stages into land levelling con-

tracting in Stockton, California. He designed all-welded scrapers to replace inferior riveted machines and got into the business of making earthmoving machines through designs for his own use. Early business dealings with Henry J. Kaiser, another industrial genius, helped young LeTourneau along the road to success.

The demand for his machines grew. It became so great that LeTourneau went into the business of making earth-moving machines, establishing his first factory at Stockton, known as the Old Moss Avenue Shop. Here what may be considered the original LeTourneau heavy machine was built, a welded one known as the Gondola capable of scooping and carrying six cubic yards. That was in 1922. In 1923 "The Mountain Mover," with a capacity of 15 or 16 yards, was built, and LeTourneau was on his way.

That "way" led to a revolution in earth-moving machinery, an international reputation and four or five great plants from which flowed and continues to flow streams of behemoths hustling and grunting about construction jobs all over the world, pushing their enormous snouts and scrapers into all kinds of dirt and rock

moving problems and carrying enormous loads of earth as easily as a touring car carries passengers.

Then, when the industrial trend pointed to the South and Southwest after World War II, LeTourneau came also, locating at Longview, Texas, where his plant and other institutions have helped to spur the industrial awakening of the East Texas area.

Today, LeTourneau has turned the operation of his manufacturing enterprises over to industrial partners, such as the Westinghouse people, while he devotes his time and all of his profits to what he calls the work of the Lord. Darkest Africa, benighted India and many other out of the way places, whose populations suffer under low standards of living in the midst of vast natural resources, have known his energy and genius and the help of the money he uses to improve the condition of mankind and to serve the Master of all things to whom, as his partner, LeTourneau gives credit for his success. His own country, however, receives the most benefit from his philanthropies.

He is a rare individual, a challenging person, a man whom it is an inspiration to meet and hear, say those who know him.

NUMBER OF TRAFFIC FATALITIES ON INCREASE, SAFETY MAN SAYS

Ross Kemp, safety director for the Abilene District of the Texas Department of Public Safety, told Rotarians at their meeting at the Hotel Victor Thursday, that the traffic toll in this area, and all over Texas, was increasing and cited driver education as the only means of slowing down the tragic trend.

He said that for the first nine months of the year there had been five traffic fatalities in Eastland County and 50 in the Abilene district. Also in Eastland County, he said, there had been 24 accidents that had caused personal injury requiring hospitalization, and 34 accidents causing \$57,551 in property damage. He said that the figure would probably rise to \$100,000 for the year.

He said that the high figure caused every automobile owner to suffer through higher insurance payments.

He cited the three Es of safety, Education, Engineering and Enforcement. He said that engineer-

ing and enforcement had not succeeded in cutting down the accident figure and that an adequate driver education program was the only answer.

He said that speed was the principal figure in accidents and proved his point by giving statistics showing that 60 percent of the accidents last year were one car accidents caused by excessive speed.

He strongly recommended a driver education program in all Texas schools.

Following the talk Mr. Kemp presented a film, "Day In Court." The film told of many of the problems facing enforcement officers today and stressed driver courtesy as the answer. B. A. Butler was at the projector and the program was in charge of Rotarian J. E. Proctor.

Visitors at the meeting were Rotarians Homer Scallorn, Victor Behrens, Prosper Campbell, Bob Gilchrist, M. E. Barnett and Fred Higginbotham of Abilene; Jack Frost of Eastland. Another visitor was Rev. Boesmans of Ranger.

Between 300 and 400 persons from Cisco and area cities are expected to attend the event.

The Rev. Leslie Seymour, superintendent of Cisco District Methodist Churches, will be master of ceremonies at the banquet. The invocation will be given by Dr. H. M. Ward, pastor of the First Baptist Church.

President E. L. Jackson of the Chamber of Commerce will introduce Mr. LeTourneau. Out-of-town guests will be introduced by Charles Graham. Banquet entertainment will be provided by Mrs. W. O. Wylie on an electric organ and by the Cisco Junior College choir, under the direction of Jack Chambliss.

Mr. LeTourneau will make three appearances Sunday in Cisco churches. He will speak at 10 a. m. at the First Presbyterian Church, at 11 a. m. at the First Christian Church and at 2:30 p. m. at the First Methodist Church.

The Rev. Grady James, pastor of the Presbyterian Church, reported that the morning worship service would be at 10 a. m. instead of 11 a. m. in order that the congregation might hear Mr. LeTourneau. Following the morning worship, there will be a congregational meeting for the purpose of election to additional elders. Mr. James will speak on the subject "A Reason for the Hope that is in You" at the 7 p. m. service.

At the 11 a. m. service at the First Christian Church, the choir will sing a special number, "We Gather Together to Ask the Lord's Blessings," prior to Mr. LeTourneau's address.

Dr. Ward will be in charge of the 2:30 p. m. service at the First Methodist Church. Mr. LeTourneau will make his final appearance in Cisco at the service, and the Community Choir will sing the Hallelujah Chorus under the direction of Jack Chambliss.

Manager B. A. Butler of the Chamber of Commerce said the organization's annual report would be made in booklet form to conserve time at the banquet.

Ticket sales indicate a near capacity crowd for the event. Tickets are on sale at the Chamber of Commerce office, and they may be obtained there until 5 p. m. Saturday.

The LeTourneau party is due to reach Cisco by airplane late Saturday afternoon.

DEDUCTIBLE EXPENSE?

Expenses of soil conservation practices have not been deductible for income tax purposes up till now, but may be if a decision of the Tax Court of the United States in favor of a Kansas farm owner stands. Even if the decision does not stand, congress may remove any question about such deductions. Sen. Andrew Schoepel (R) and Rep. Howard Miller (D), both from Kansas, have introduced bills on the matter in congress.

How will the decision affect other farmers who would like to make similar deductions? Here are the possibilities:

1. If the Commissioner appeals, the case will go to the Tenth Circuit Court of Appeals. A decision there in favor of Collingwood would be binding in all states in the Tenth Circuit — Kansas, Oklahoma, Colorado, New Mexico, Wyoming and Utah. However, the Commissioner could later appeal to the Supreme Court whose decision would be binding to every state.

2. The Commissioner can acquiesce — accept the decision — by public announcement. This would give others the same opportunity to take the deduction.

3. The Commissioner can announce non-acquiescence. Then other farmers could not expect their deduction to be allowed without going to court and winning a decision in their favor.

4. The Commissioner can make no announcement one way or the other. Then tax officials all over the country would be on their own in allowing or disallowing the deduction.

There is a good deal of support for the Schoepel-Miller bills which would encourage conservation practices by allowing deductions for expenses of terracing, contour farming, dams, etc. "Enactment of this legislation will enable us to make great strides forward in conservation," says Sen. Schoepel. "I am not unaware that it will cost the government some revenue if such deductions are permitted. However, the ultimate good that will result in more productive crops and soil-saving will far exceed any temporary loss in revenue."

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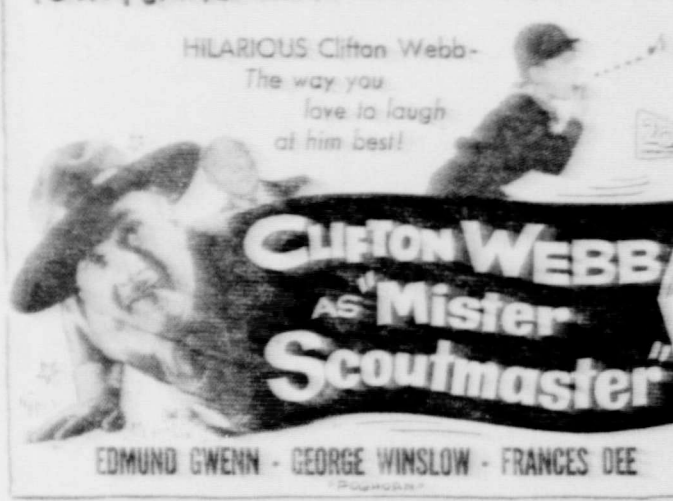
