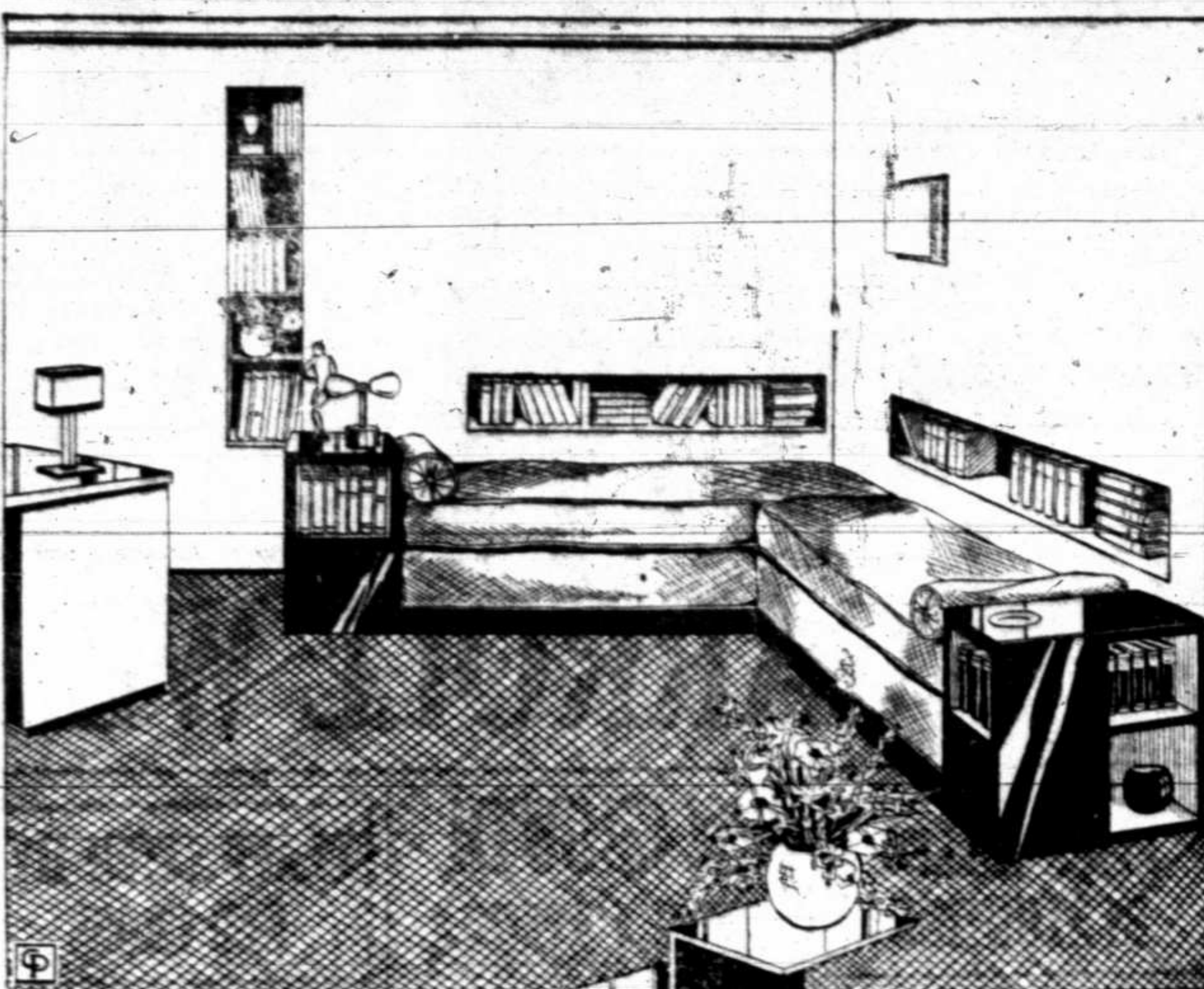

BUILT-IN RECESSES FEATURED IN LIVING ROOM

Even those who have no flair for flat surfaces and colors and the straight lines of modernistic proportions, must acknowledge that with this new movement called "modern" has come many practical suggestions for convenience and comfort. One of the latest ideas along these lines is the single built-in bookcase. It is shown in the cozy corner of a modern living room in the sketch. The grouping of this particular corner, attractive as well as cozy. The books are within easy reach of anyone lounging on either couch.

The grouping of the couches, and to end, so that they completely fill the corner, is a happy one. Each with its end table and the bookshelf built in has an air of individuality yet so complete in arrangement that if one were taken away and the other left, the corner would have a bare, incomplete appearance. The grouping with the end tables and the little occasional table between the couches, is excellent. Particular care must, however, be exercised in the color scheme. A wrong note of color can destroy the inviting comfort of the corner.

Color From Floor Covering
The color must, of course, rise from the deeper tone of the floor covering to the lighter tints of walls and ceiling. The furniture may be mahogany, walnut or black lacquer.

If the last, there should not be too much of it without bright color relief. That is one reason why so much red is used with black lacquer. Colors must tone up and tone down to create contrast without making it too strong. A safe color scheme with the black lacquer pieces would be in cream walls, a mauve rug and leaf green upholstery for the couches. Here you have a pleasing contrast between the almost white walls and the black furniture, toned down by the soft, pale green of the cushions. The mauve rug, the same color scheme would be good with either mahogany or walnut.

A little red should be introduced to accent this color scheme. If the furniture continues in the black lacquer, a desk of black lacquer and red such as that sketched at the left, would be appropriate and give the strong color note needed. If mahogany or walnut is chosen, the red spot may be brought out in a chair upholstered in deep wine, the desk remaining in the mahogany or walnut. Allowance must be made for the book bindings, the ornaments and the lamp shades, which will all be sparingly used, even in the modernistic room.

FINE GROWTH OF LAMESA HELPS CITY TO PROSPER; FARMS AID TO PROGRESS

This feed is not only sold on the open markets to supplement the money crop of the area but is fed to livestock which are sold to the open markets at a greater value than the feeds themselves on the open markets. Next to feeds comes the crop of produce including butter, eggs cream and poultry.

is bringing Dawson county farmers at this time about \$500,000 annually. Next to the produce crop comes the live stock market which consists of better dairy types, hogs and beef cattle. The section is being fast stocked with the best of dairy cattle. The Jersey leading in the population. Recent surveys reveal that more than 5,000 head of good grade Jerseys are now on the farms of Dawson county and some 15,000 Jerseys are in the area of what is known as the Lower South Plains of Texas.

In Dawson county there are now 15,000 head of good hogs and 150,000 head of good strain hens and turkeys the survey reveals. On the 2,200 Dawson county farms the farmers are making their living at home and depending on the money crops to serve them extra for land payments, homes, automobiles and luxuries of life.

Building Is Rapid
With such a background of farm and agricultural life about the city of Lamesa, why should it not grow and prosper? Last year building permits were issued for better than \$300,000. This year half of this amount has been reached, with considerably more under cover at this time. New business homes have replaced the older types of buildings and new structures have been erected to house the new industries that have come here this year. More than forty new residences have been constructed since the first of January this year and more are now under construction. Lamesa now has 1,100 good residence homes and 120 modern new brick business homes which are simply taking care of the large territory served by Lamesa in its retail way. A new \$85,000 telephone system of the common battery type has been installed by the State Telephone company this year and the city is now busy laying plans to pave all of the resident section of North First and South First streets which consists of ten blocks and will give Lamesa 27

To Have Milk Plant

And now Lamesa is to build the first powdered milk plant in West Texas and among the first few now in Texas. Plans are laid for the erection of a \$200,000 factory which will have a capacity of 110,000 pounds of milk daily. This factory will manufacture powdered milks of all types and sweet creamery butter. This plant will be able to serve Dawson, Lynn, Terry, Gaines, Borger, Andrews, Martin and Howard counties and will bring to the farmers of this area a closer and better market for their products than they have had heretofore. Milk will be picked up on routes from the producers' door and hauled to the plant and each 15 days the producer will receive his pay check thereby giving him 24 regular pay days that he does not now have. Another advantage to the farmers of this area as pointed out by sponsors of this plant is the ready market they will have for their feeds through the

dairy cow and of course the hogs and poultry that will naturally be added. Farmers of the area are jubilant over the assurance that they will in the future be permitted to support such an institution so close to their doors. With such a factory operating in West Texas the products, manufactured by the factory will naturally be distributed to most cities and community centers in West Texas and all Texas cities will be added on to buy Texas made products as an output of this factory. Present plans call for the operation of this factory by the first of January next year.

Population Increases
The population of Lamesa has substantially increased from 5,000 to 6,000 in the past two years. The scholastic population of the city schools have increased better than 100 over last census and the scholastic population of Dawson county has increased more than 100 over last year. NEW EASTERN TRUNK ROUTE IS ASKED FOR

WABASH MAKE REQUEST FOR NEW LINE TO I. C. C. TODAY

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, July 1.—Formation of a new trunk line in the east is planned by the Wabash railroad.

An application for establishment of the new system was brought to Washington today by representatives of the Wabash for the consideration of the Interstate Commerce commission.

It asks authority to acquire control by lease or stock purchase of nine railroads and joint control of five others. Trackage rights over several systems also are sought.

Fifth Trunk Line
If approved by the commission, the plan would result in the establishment of a fifth eastern trunk line with western terminal at Chicago, St. Louis, Kansas City, Omaha and Des Moines and eastern terminal at New York, Philadelphia and Baltimore.

The four trunk lines now in operation are the Pennsylvania, the New York Central, the Baltimore and Ohio and the Chesapeake and Ohio. The latter two have filed merger plans of their own with the commission which have been opposed by the Wabash.

Lines Control Sought
Lines which the Wabash seeks to control are the Lehigh Valley, Wheeling and Lake Erie, Pittsburgh and West Virginia, Western Maryland, Lehigh and New England, Akron, Canton and Youngstown, the Elgin, Joliet and Eastern, the Toledo, Peoria and Western and the Chicago and Illinois Midland.

A one-sixth interest is sought in the Montreal Railroad company, the Monongahela Connecting Railroad company, Union Railroad company of Pittsburgh, and the New York and South Shore Railway company, together with a one-seventh interest in the Toledo Terminal Railroad company.

Blind Solon Studies Claim Against State

AUSTIN, July 1. (P)—To Texas only blind lawmaker. Rep. H. R. Van Zandt, has fallen the lot of determining whether a 94-year-old claim against the state is legal. Three heirs of Thomas F. McKinney, Galveston landowner during Texas' war of independence from Mexico, have asked the legislature for \$150,000 which they claim is an unpaid part of \$150,000 advanced by McKinney in 1835 to the almost bankrupt young republic.

By an act of 1844 McKinney was given part payment through a land grant. No effort to collect the remaining sum was made after 1873 until then former postmaster general served with McKinney in the war with Mexico, appeared before a house committee in the interest of McKinney's heirs.

BUNION DERBY FAD STRIKES JAPAN; ONLY FAME WILL GO TO RACE VICTOR

TOKYO, Japan, July 1. (P)—The coast-to-coast Marathon idea, exploited in the United States by C. C. Pyle, has been taken up, with modifications, in Japan.

June 23, ten young men selected by lot from scores of applicants, started from Osaka to cover the nearly 400 miles to Tokyo in eight daily stages.

In many points, however, the Japanese version of the extended marathon differs from that of Mr. Pyle. It is strictly amateur, and the winners can hope for nothing more than medals and fame, although the promoting organization, the Shoken-kai, or society for the promotion of health, will pay for their food and lodging en route.

Entrants must be more than 18 years old, must undergo careful physical examination, and only the 10 selected by chance will be permitted to run.

The promoting society operates under the auspices of the department of home affairs, which gives the race at least semi-official recognition.

KING GEORGE IS ACCLAIMED

ENGLISH KING GIVEN GREATEST OVATION OF REIGN

LONDON, July 1.—King George's face shining with happiness and renewed health, came home to Buckingham Palace at noon today to the acclaim of one of the greatest popular demonstrations of his reign.

Leaving Windsor Castle an hour earlier with Queen Mary in a closed motor car, the Royal pair changed to an open landau with resplendent livery at Albert Hall, Kensington Garden, and from there on rode between throngs of applauding thousands.

At Buckingham Palace one of the largest crowds ever seen outside the gates had gathered, and their majesties after entering reappeared on a balcony to respond to the manifestation.

As his figure, remarkably straight and military for all the travail of the past few months, was seen on a little platform the palace bands started to play the British national anthem, "God Save The King."

The music stirred the throng to tumultuous enthusiasm, cheer after cheer coming from thousands of throats, while lands waved handkerchiefs and flags. King George removed his tall hat and smiled and waved at the crowd, with Queen Mary, who fairly beamed her pleasure, he pointed out groups in the crowd.

THE JUDGE WASN'T MEAN

The students at Holy Cross college thought Judge Landis was no good when he announced that "Bots" Nikola had signed a contract to pitch for the New York Yankees and that a copy of the contract was on file in the office of the baseball commissioner.

The announcement from the commissioner's office came almost on the eve of the game between Holy Cross and Boston college, and it made Nikola a professional and made him ineligible to pitch against Boston college.

Holy Cross is primarily a baseball school. They play football there, of course, but their big game is baseball and their great rival in New England is Boston college. And those Irish schools have a bitter feeling of rivalry that compares to that between Yale and Harvard in football. More so perhaps.

The Holy Cross boys felt that with Nikola in the box the game was in the bag and when Landis let out the secret they thought they had been made the victims of a great injustice.

But it developed later that the commissioner, in making his announcement, had merely answered a question.

The director of athletics at Holy Cross asked the commissioner if Nikola had signed a contract and the commissioner answered that he had and that the contract was on file in his office.

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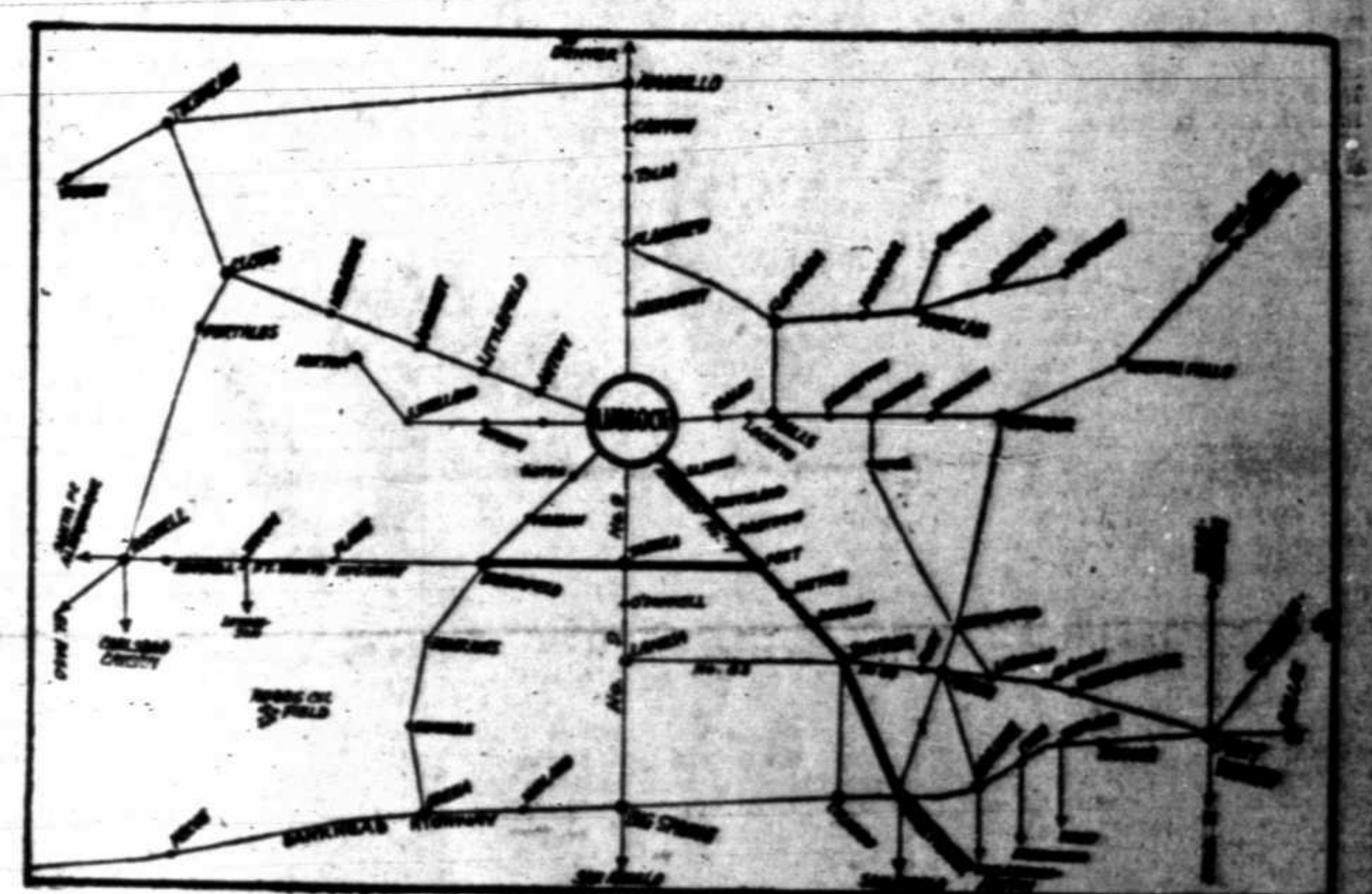

U. S. PUBLIC DEBT LOWEST SINCE WAR

NATIONAL PROSPERITY ATTRIBUTED TO CUT OF OBLIGATIONS

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, July 1.—The government entered its new fiscal year today with the public debt cut to the lowest figure since the World War and \$61,000,000 on hand to reduce it still further.

Largely because of the widespread prosperity and more specifically the profits made by industrial income tax payers in the "exceedingly active and constantly rising security market," the treasury announced today that the public debt for the fiscal year 1929 was \$185,000,000 greater than expenditures, as compared with a surplus of \$37,000,000 estimated in the budget.

Debt Brought Down
By applying to the public debt \$124,000,000 of the year's surplus with \$549,000,000 from the sinking fund and other debt requirements chargeable against ordinary receipts, the total debt was brought down to \$16,991,000,000 from \$17,040,000,000 a year ago. The remainder of the 1929 surplus is to be applied to the public debt in the near future. Total receipts for the year were placed at \$4,633,000,000, about \$9,000,000 less than was collected in the fiscal year 1928, while expenditures amounted to \$3,848,000,000, an increase of \$204,000,000. Interest payments totaled \$678,000,000, a reduction of \$54,000,000 in the year.

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WEEKLY CABLE REVIEW

Debts and disarmament, the Siamese Twins of international politics, drew most of the attention again last week in the world show-booth.

As the time for payment of France's \$400,000,000 bill for American war stocks approaches, the French parliament, faced with difficult debates on ratification of the American and British debt settlements, has grown restive. This broke out finally in a request, transmitted to Ambassador Claudel at Washington by Premier Poincare, for unconditional postponement of maturity of war stocks bill. Secretary of State Stimson's reply gave little hope of favorable action by the United States, which few French statesmen had been sanguine enough to expect. A cabinet crisis was feared.

Damper Put on Meet
In London Premier Ramsay MacDonald threw something of a damper on hopes for early progress on the disarmament problem, declaring "we are not going into a peace conference without such preliminary preparation as will avoid the failure of 1927."

British statesmen understood this was also the attitude of Washington. Professor Webster, who holds the chair of international politics at the University of Wales, suggested Great Britain relinquish her West Indian naval bases to advance a better Anglo-American understanding.

Germany Celebrates
Germany celebrated the tenth anniversary of her extreme preoccupation with debts and disarmament by a day of national mourning for the treaty of Versailles and of protest for the "War Guilt Lie" embodied in it.

There was brief flurry in Berlin when the Reichstag failed to prolong the defense of the republic act under which the former Kaiser was excluded from Germany at the pleasure of the government.

E-Kaiser's Visit Halted
Officials calmed the excitement by pointing out the government had

other ways of preventing the return of the ex-Kaiser, who would be obliged to apply for visas and other papers like any private individual.

The world had a thrill when Major Ramon Franco and three other Spanish aviators, missing for eight days on a round-trip flight from Spain to New York and almost given up for lost, were picked up by a British air-plane carrier southeast of the Azores. They survived a week of storms, hunger, fatigue and nervous tension without being much the worse for it.

Manchuria furnished a background for a new cabinet crisis in Japan. The ghost of the assassinated warlord Chang Tso-Ling arose to trouble the conservative ministry of Baron Tanaka. Political observers forecast the resignation of the conservatives and the advent to power of the liberals.

Church of Christ Program Is Planned

LAMESA, July 1.—The Young People's classes of the Church of Christ in West Texas will meet in Lamesa August 26th and 27th for a trip to Carlsbad Caverns, Carlsbad, N. M. They will go through the Cavern August 28th and render a program in the Caverns. J. D. Borden, minister of the Church of Christ at Lamesa will head the caravan with 1500 or 2000 young people and a number of preachers are expected to take part. A grand reception will be given the youngsters when they arrive in Lamesa. This meeting of young people will be inspirational as well as an educational trip.
