1 OF 4 FRIDAY ACCIDENTS

Car-Motorcycle Crash Hurts Schoolboy, 17

A motorcycle-car collision at E. Sixth and Chestnut Friday afternoon sent Danny Barber, 17, to the hospital with severe injuries.

The mishap at 2:29 p. m. was one of four collisions reported on Colorado City streets within a seven hour period Friday afternoon and evening.

First of the rash of accidents was at 1:52 p. m. and the fourth was at 7:55 p. m. with three autos involved, police reported.

Barber, son of Mr. and Mrs. Dell Barber of E. 10th St., was in Root Memorial Hospital Saturday. His doctor reported that he received fractures of his arm and leg, multiple contusions and abrasions, lacerations of hip and lip.

Police said the collision happened in the intersection. The intersection is marked by a flasher-type traffic signal—red for north and south traffic on Chestnut, and amber for east and west traffic on E. Sixth St.

Principles in a two-vehicle collision at E. Second and Aus-

tin at 1:52 p. m. Friday were Nathan David Haynes, 42, driver of a 1954 model pickup, and Willie B. Luncford, 37, driver of a sedan.

Minor damage to the vehicles were reported by police in the accident that happened as Haynes was turning on E. Second and the Luncford car was turning left onto Austin.

Police estimated \$400 damage to a 1957 Ford sedan, driven by Clifton Lee, 16, in a collision in front of Post Office in 100 block of W. Third.

Lee, son of Cliff (Catfish) Lee, was driving west on W. Third when his car was in collision with a 1955 DeSoto, driven by Mrs. R. C. Johnson.

Impact of collision was at the right side of the Lee car and rear of the Johnson auto, damaged less severely, according to police.

IN COUNTY COURT

Defendant Fined In 1 of 3 Cases

Two of three charges filed against Murray Clark Jones, 21, in connection with a two-car collision here last Jan. 7, have been dismissed in County Court.

Jones pleaded guilty to the third—driving at an imprudent and improper rate of speed—and was fined \$100

plus costs in a hearing before County Judge Elmer Martin.

County Attorney Frank Ginzler asked dismissal of the other two charges—alleging offenses of driving while intoxicated and aggravated assault—because of lack of sufficient evidence. Jones, employe at a local junk yard, was driver of a sedan that was in collision with a station wagon driven by William Tourney, Pittsburg, Pa., chemist. Tourney and a passenger in his vehicle, Susan Tournay, received medical treatment after the accident on U. S. Highway 80.

There have been two additional pleas of guilty, and filing of two other charges in County Court.

Pleading guilty to transporting beer and wine was Cecil Chavarria, who has been on bond since being charged last March 26. He was fined \$125 and court costs.

Joe Tidwell pleaded guilty to swindling with worthless check and was fined \$35, plus costs.

Facing charges of driving while intoxicated are Emmet Mitchell and G. Sanchez. Mitchell posted \$500 bond.

87 Seniors to Obtain High School Diplomas

Colorado City High's Class of 1959, largest for the school in years, will step forward in mortar boards and gowns Thursday night for diplomas.

They will receive their diplomas after hearing final words as high school seniors from J. B. Thomas of Fort Worth, president of Texas Electric Service Company and one of the state's ranking industrialists.

Eighty-seven seniors are in the graduating class announced by Charles H. Graham, high school principal.

Mrs. Curtis Baker will play the organ professional and recessional for both the baccalaureate and commencement.

Rev. J. F. Selcraig will speak for the commencement in invocation. Honor students will be introduced by the principal.

Charles C. Thompson, president of City National Bank and member of the Texas Electrical Service Company board

Supt. Frank W. Wilson will present the Class of 1959 after Graham presents awards.

Seniors to Hear Industry Leader

Southwest's top leaders in industry and research gathered in Texas last week to appraise the latest developments in atomic research for electrical power.

Presiding over the group was J. B. Thomas, the president of Texas Electric Service Company.

Thursday night Thomas will be in Colorado City, home of his company's largest electrical-generating plant, to speak to Colorado City High's 1959 class.

He will be the principal speaker for the commencement, presenting to the graduating seniors and their guests the views of the one of the most dynamic industrial, civic

and conservation leaders in the southwest.

His interest and endeavor overflows from his company's operations into a dozen different channels—beginning with progressive enterprise for development of his hometown, Fort Worth, and extending across the nation.

Thomas is chairman of Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation, which is coordinating research and development of atomic energy for power.

In addition to being president of TESCO, he is vice president and director of Texas Utilities Company.

He is a leader and director in Texas Water Conservation Association, West Texas Chamber of Commerce, trustee of Texas A&M Research Foundation and Texas Research Foundation. For the See SPEAKER Pg. 7

1.82 Rate for Wheat Loans

Loan rate for No. 1 wheat here in Mitchell County will be \$1.82 per bushel.

The loan rate in the price support program was announced this week by the local Agricultural Stabilization & Conservation office.

National average loan rate for No. 2 or better grain sorghum is \$1.52 CWT and the national average for No. 2 or better barley is 77 cents per bushel.

Loans may be obtained for the construction of adequate storage facilities on individual farms and are repayable in four installments, with four per cent interest.

COST-SHARE CONSERVATION

234 Participants In '59 Project

Two hundred thirty-four farmers and ranchers in Mitchell County have obtained approval for projects under the 1959 Agricultural Conservation.

The total, to date, was revealed Saturday by Allen W. Worley, county office manager for Agricultural Stabilization & Conservation.

Projects approved in the program are practices for conservation which receive cost-share benefits from the ASC.

Approved in the practices for the 234 farmers and ranchers are 1,499 acres of crop land for seeding to blue panicum, sorghum alnum and other approved grass mixtures; 328 acres of pasture

and conservation leaders in the southwest.

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County Offices Get Refrigerated Units

Commissioners Court has purchased 10 new refrigerated air-conditioning window units for use in Courthouse offices.

The project is another phase of the court's program of improvements at the Courthouse for convenience of taxpayer patrons and office operations.

County bought the air-conditioning units from Kirschbaum Appliance Store on a low of \$175 per unit.

The Westinghouse units will be installed to replace aging and ailing evaporative cooling units which have been used for several years.

Getting the refrigerated units immediately will be the main floor Commissioner Court room, which also serves as an office for the county judge; the jury room on the second floor, the district clerk's office on third floor, county agent and home demonstration offices on second floor, justice of peace office on second floor and the law library, which is another new project of the county and which tentatively has been planned on the second floor next to the jury room.

Two additional units will be placed at locations to be decided later.

With refrigerated units in place previously in a few of the Courthouse offices and with the major air-conditioning projects already under way in the courtrooms, the Courthouse soon will be almost fully air-conditioned.

Air-conditioning of the big third floor 32nd District Courtroom is expected to be completed within two weeks. The County Courtroom project will be later.

Commissioners in their session this week voted also to purchase Shepard's Texas Citations for the county law library. Original cost is \$130, plus \$40 per year to keep the volume up to date.
