Cpl. Forgey Reported Killed in Thailand

The parents of Cpl. Jed D. Forgey, Mr. and Mrs. William M. Forgey of 1922-B 13th St., Lubbock, have been informed by the War department of the death of their son Sept. 27, 1943, who was reported to have been killed in Thailand while a prisoner of the Japanese.

The report was based on information from the International Red Cross and details will be sent by letter.

Only one card had been received from Cpl. Forgey since his capture and it arrived on Dec. 22, 1943, four months after his death. He was captured on Java as a member of the 131st Field Artillery, which he joined in 1940 after graduating from New Deal High school and attending Texas Tech for one year. He went overseas in 1941 with the "Lost Battalion" and after being taken prisoner, was first interned at Moulmein prison in Burma. Survivors besides his parents are a brother, W. G. Forgey of Clovis, N. M., and a sister, Marjorie Forgey, of Lubbock.

Memorial Rites Are Set For Lt. Harrell Sunday

A memorial service is to be held at New Deal school auditorium Sunday afternoon, 3:30 o'clock, for Lt. John Neill Harrell, 23, who was killed in Florida April 5. Rev. J. R. Wood, pastor of Idalou Methodist church, is to have charge of the program. He will be assisted by Rev. James Carter, pastor of Monroe Methodist church, and Rev. E. C. Armstrong, pastor at Southland.



Lt. Harrell, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Harrell, of Southland, and formerly of Monroe, was piloting a P-51 fighter plane from his base at Sarasota Army Air Field in Florida, as an observer for another pilot flying on instruments. Lt. Harrell's plane disappeared after a climb to 10,000 feet and was never seen afterward. He was declared dead by the War Department after an intensive 30-day search in which the army was assisted by the coast guard and the navy.

Born near Shallowater Sept. 2, 1921, Lt. Harrell was graduated from New Deal High school in 1939. He lacked only part of a semester on his degree in agricultural economics at Texas Tech when he entered the air corps in February, 1943. He received training at Sheppard Field, Nashville, Tenn., Maxwell Field, Ala., Bennettsville, S. C., Sumter, S. C., and was awarded pilot's wings and commission at Marianna, Fla., March 13, 1944. After being commissioned, Lt. Harrell was stationed at Greenville, Miss., Moultrie, Ga., Dale Mabry Field, Fla., and Sarasota.

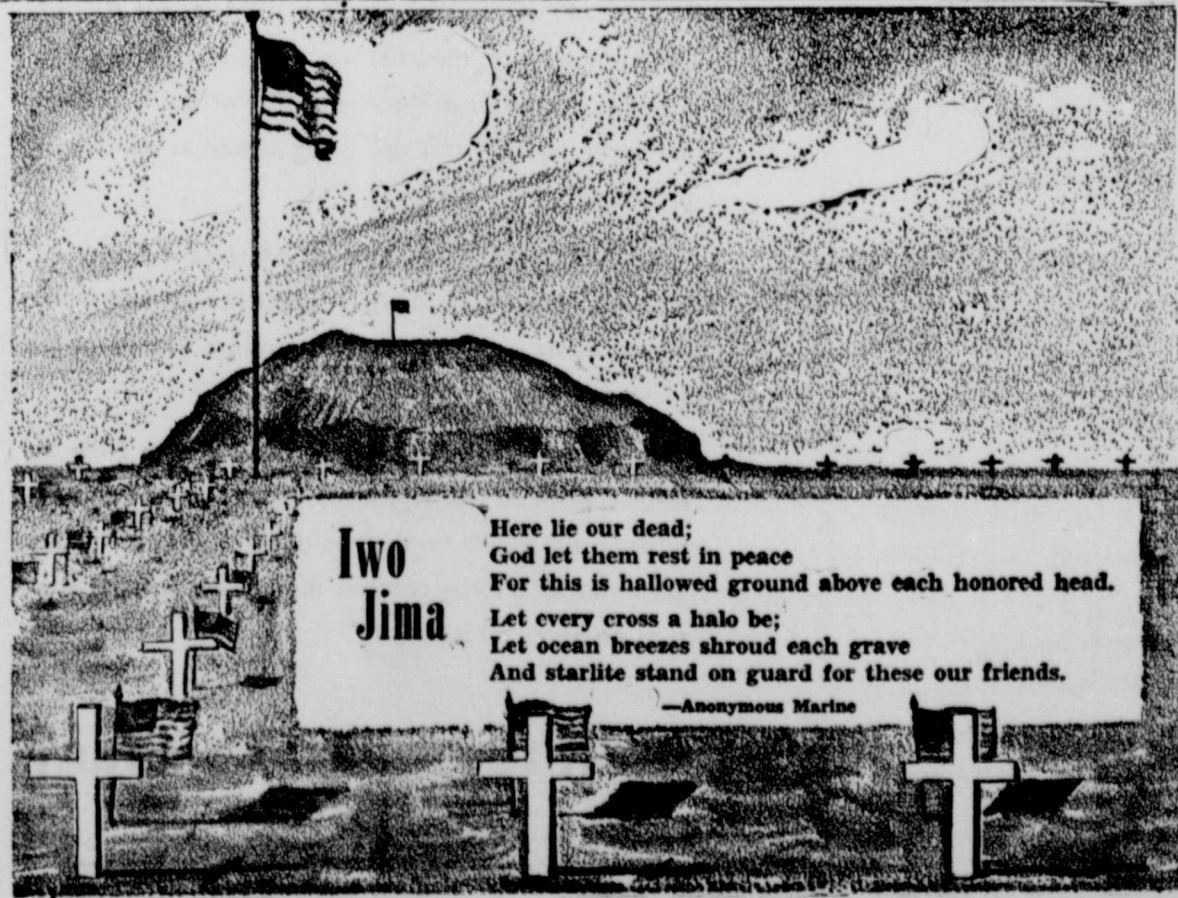

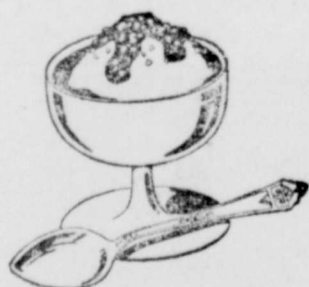

Germany, May 12, 1945

Halle, Germany, 22 May, 1945

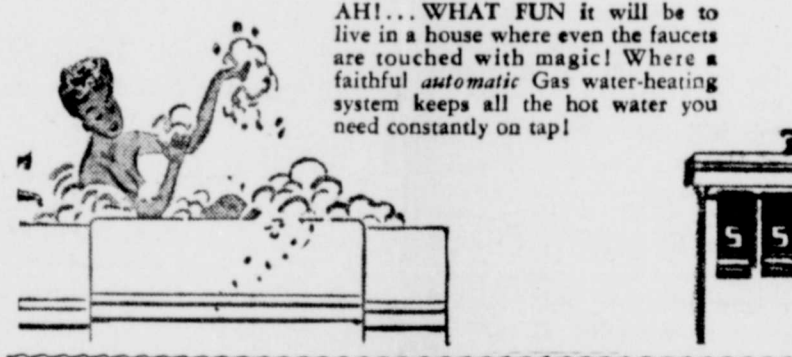
