New Motorized Home Units Display Today

Another new Colorado City industry has a special display today (Sunday) for its product--economy priced motorized mobile home designed especially for travel.

The firm is Pioneer Motor Homes and the showing will be at the small plant located on West Second, immediately east of Colorado River Bridge.

Both the motorized mobile home and the manufacturing firm is idea of its owner and operator, C. W. Pruett, 51, former Odessa business executive.

Pruett, who sold the widely known Pioneer Furniture in Odessa and Pioneer Country Store, located between Midland and Odessa, is producing his 1971 mobile home (or motor bus) on Ford and Chevrolet van chassis.

Each unit will sleep persons and is equipped with self-contained commode, lavatory, built-in cook stove with either butane or propane fuel, lighting with 110 volt electrical connection or battery.

Price for each unit, completely motorized on the Chevrolet or Ford chassis, is only \$2,995.

The secret is Pruett's compact design plus the use of used chassis with completely rebuilt engine.

"It has been my hobby for 10 to 15 years to build myself a motor home. . . use it for a while, then sell it and build myself another," Pruett said.

He did that even when he owned Pioneer Furniture, adver-

tised as 7 stores in one and covering the entire 600 block of South Grant in Odessa employing 55 persons.

Six years ago Pruett, on the advice of doctors to change his pace, sold the store and also the country store between Midland and Odessa. His home, since then, has been his 5-bedroom home at Lake Colorado City, a spot he has come to for years to relax after business.

Now he and Mrs. Pruett, who is interior decorator for the motorized homes, are busy with the new enterprise here with 5 additional plant employees.

In addition, the plant utilizes four additional Colorado City firms in its manufacturing process--Colorado Machine Shop, Shaw Upholstery, Jay Adams Chevrolet and Hutchins Ford Service.

"I really call this a hobby with me," said Pruett, who

owns 2 apartments in Odessa with a total of 60 units. "But I believe it can work into something good.

He believes there is promise for the operation to later employ a staff of about 12 persons, continuing also to provide work for the four other local firms.

Pioneer Motor Homes contracts with the local Chevrolet and Ford dealers for complete reconditioned engines, etc. for his motor homes.

Colorado Machine Shop makes 4-inch adaptors for the homes 8-inch wider wheel units--an extra width which provides improved and safer stability.

Shaw is being contracted for upholstery within the homes.

Employed at the plant proper are Floyd Turnage, another Lake Colorado City resident, who is manager of the operation. Floyd Turnage and Wayne

Turnage, brothers of the manager, also are on the staff as are Herman Upshaw, paint and body, and W. C. (Bill) Hutchins, cabinet maker who resides at Lake Colorado City.

Mrs. Pruett designs the drapes, pillows and cushions as well as supervising the entire decorating.

The secret for the firm's economy pricing per unit is with the use of used chassis and rebuilt power units.

"When you go to a company that sells mobile units with new chassis," he said, "the price will be twice as much as ours."

Pioneer building job here not only includes new block assembly, etc. in the engine, but also new 6 ply nylon tires with guarantee, load - leveling springs.

"Our display today is to acquaint the public with our motorized units. . . let them see what they can purchase already completely finished. . . or what they obtain on custom order," Pruett said.

"We have 3 units ready to show."

In the display will be fully-completed units and a cut-away unit for custom finishing.

\$119,814 Job Local Firm On Pecos River

Colorado City's firm of Hudson & Sparks has been awarded a \$119,814 clearing contract on the Pecos River.

Senator John Tower notified The Record Saturday the contract had been announced in Washington by Bureau of Reclamation, Department of Interior.

The contract is to clear salt cedar from the Pecos River 10 miles north and 3 miles south of Pecos in Ward and Reeves counties.

Ben Sparks, co-owner of Hud-

son & Sparks, said his company expected to move equipment into the site soon after receiving official work order from the Bureau of Reclamation.

It is the second contract for the Colorado City dirt company on the Pecos River. A similar clearing job was completed a few months ago.

Sparks and Bill Hudson are principal executives of Hudson & Sparks, a firm which operates out of Colorado City on projects all across Texas and into neighboring states.

New Seed In Cotton Test

Two new varieties developed by Dr. Luther Bird are included in a cotton demonstration plot planted for Mitchell County observation.

The Bird varieties are Tamcot SP 21 and Tamcot SP 37, both showing evidence for resistance to root, verticillium seedling disease, wilt and other cotton diseases.

Only 50 pounds of the new seed was available for all of District 2, according to County Agent Bobby Lemons.

Also planted was Tamcot 24, developed by State Experiment Station at Lubbock.

The cotton demonstration plot, first of 3 or 4 hoped for by Legmons, was planted on Kenneth Merket's irrigated acreage at Lorraine.

Three other varieties in the test are Lockett BKL, Northern Star 5, Coker 5110.

The Coker variety was developed in South Carolina and is being checked for adaptability in this area of West Texas.

Lots No. 1 Target 'Do It' Replies For Mowing

What do Colorado City citizens want most to be accomplished for their community this year?

A sampling of ideas obtained by Chamber of Commerce points mainly to these 3 areas:

1. Vacant lots kept mowed and clean for better appearance, cleanliness and safety.

2. More new industry for more jobs and community development.

3. Removal of vacant buildings that are deteriorating through long periods of non-use.

Of course, there are more. Some with broad support from citizens.

But a check of "Do-The-Job-In-'71" questionnaires delivered to the Chamber's office definitely spells priority interest for upkeep of vacant lots, more industrial development and removal of deteriorating structures.

Citizen ideas for "Do-The-Job-In-'71" were invited recently by the Chamber of Commerce through radio and newspaper publicity.

Sefton Pickens, executive director for the Chamber, reported that 95 persons accepted the invitation and listed their priority projects with the Chamber.

"Nearly everyone of the replies urged that vacant lots be mowed," said Pickens. "It was almost unanimous."

More than half of the suggestions also named new industry for priority. To be exact, 50 of the 95 replies listed industry as a major concern for this year.

Thirty, almost one third, pointed their finger for removal of vacant buildings.

The emphasis for clean-up, look-better was reflected by others, too. A dozen do-the-job suggestions urged enforcement of the city ordinance for removal of abandoned and unused cars from the community's residential areas.

Colorado City Garden Club received bouquets from several citizens for the garden island they have planted and maintained in cooperation with the city. These citizens suggest more islands of this type to add beauty to the town.

Pickens said several suggestions concerned recreation and work for teenagers.

Only a few, the chamber official said, voiced a desire for lower taxes.

"Do-the-job-in-'71" replies aren't being junked. Not the least, according to Pickens. Chamber officials are tabu-

lating the information and referring the data to what it describes as "proper authorities."

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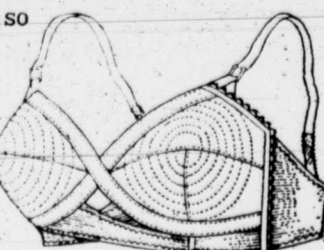
