Hand Of Brotherly Love Extended Across The Sea

The spirit of love and understanding common to Easter has again manifested itself, this time through the congregation of the First Baptist Church.

According to Rev. Glenn Roenfeldt, for sometime, the church congregation had been in search of a refugee family to sponsor and bring to this country. They began their search in 1978 after reading an article in the "Baptist Standard" about the need for sponsors for refugee families.

Rev. Roenfeldt said at that time, the church, working through the Southern Baptist Mission Board, located a

family of five and made arrangements for the family to fly from Bangkok, Thailand to San Francisco and then on to Abilene, where members of the church would meet them.

At the last minute, Rev. Roenfeldt said, the family decided to go to China instead of coming here.

So, the search for a family began again.

Through correspondence, it was determined that the family of a Laotian woman, living in Abilene, was in a refugee camp in Bangkok, awaiting a sponsor.

Another group had offered to sponsor the family and relocate them to North Dakota.

Because the sister was in Abilene, the First Baptist Church membership decided the family would be happier

nearer the sister and offered sponsorship.

However, there was some difficulty in identifying the family in the

refugee camp.

The Laotian have no surnames and no identification number was available. See HAND Page 2

Unveiling Rolls Time Back A Hundred Years

Time rolled back in Colorado City Thursday as Centennial Belles

Brothers of the Brush, Ambassadors and members of the Mitchell County Historical Commission unveiled and dedicated a Texas Historical Marker denoting the sites of Texas and Pacific Railway Depots in Mitchell County.

Mattie Hines, local historian, addressed the crowd which grew to about 100 persons as the ceremonies began.

She recalled a time when a person could travel for hundreds and hundreds of miles in any direction and never see a building, when city streets were made of dirt and dust and homes were but a piece of canvass held in place by poles.

There were no fences then, and buffalo roamed wild, but the coming of the railroad in 1881 changed all that, she recalled.

When the first train pulled into Colorado (the City was added much later) it was a

town of from 100 to 400 tents, Mrs. Hines noted.

With the coming of the railroad, Colorado became the greatest shipping point anywhere. Cattle herds were driven in from all directions and held here for shipment across the states.

Herds were held at stockpens, located at the standpipe water reservoir and Iatan Tank, which was named for Comanche Indians.

There were four depots, one each in Lorraine, Colorado, Westbrook and Iatan, Mrs. Hines said.

W. A. Crowder became stationmaster and agent for the T & P Railway in 1885. Mrs. Hines recalled having heard stories of Crowder and the many night hours he spent walking from the station house, located at the south end of Oak and Walnut Streets, to the stock pens to check the cattle. Volunteer Firemen To Salvage Antique Engine

A treasure long since pushed aside and all but forgotten has been reclaimed by the Colorado City Volunteer Fire Department.

The treasure, a 1924 vintage American LaFrance fire engine purchased by the city for the sum of just over \$14,000 in 1924, is being completely restored by members of the VFD.

Its shabby red fenders, tattered leather seats, hand carved wooden spoke wheels and tarnished chrome will soon reflect the tender sentiments that these volunteer firefighters feel for this reminder of their proud heritage.

The engine was retired from service in 1953, when its engines failed for the last time while firefighters battled a blaze at a lumber company which stood where Virgil Stone now has his business on the Snyder Highway, Jack Green, VFD member, said.

At that time, the then almost 30 year-old truck was dragged to the north waterworks plant and abandoned, Green noted.

Later, Roscoe VFD took the old firetruck to use in a parade.

Exhaust Ignites Wreckage

A passing motorist possibly saved the life of a truck driver for Halliburton Service Tuesday about 6:15 a.m. when a truck overturned and burned, trapping the driver inside.

Michael Ray Gunter, Rt. 1, Box 17A, Snyder, was driving a 1973 International, two-ton truck south bound on Highway 208 about 20 miles south of Colorado City when the truck left the paved surface, drove onto the shoulder of the road, veered back across both lanes and overturned on its left side in the bar ditch.

Fuel leaked from the tank, dropping onto the hot exhaust system, and ignited.

According to Texas Highway Patrolman James Burson, who investigated the accident, a passing motorist saw the flames and pulled the driver from the wreckage.

Phil Riddle, formerly of Stephenville, has been named to replace Fred Johnston, who recently resigned, as publisher of the RECORD.

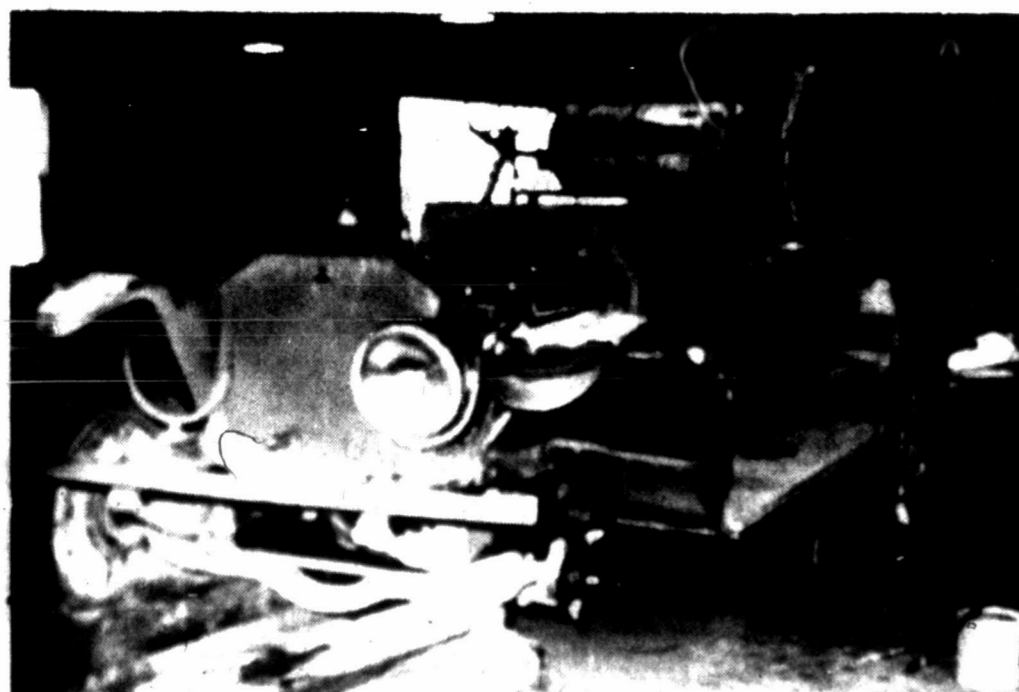
This announcement was made by West-Cor Inc., which recently purchased the RECORD.

Southwestern Appraisal Company gave an evaluation and answered questions for approximately 15 people Thursday night at a community meeting held in Westbrook School.

The question that was most asked was how the company was going to appraise farm property and equipment, according to Chief Appraiser Mike Burt.

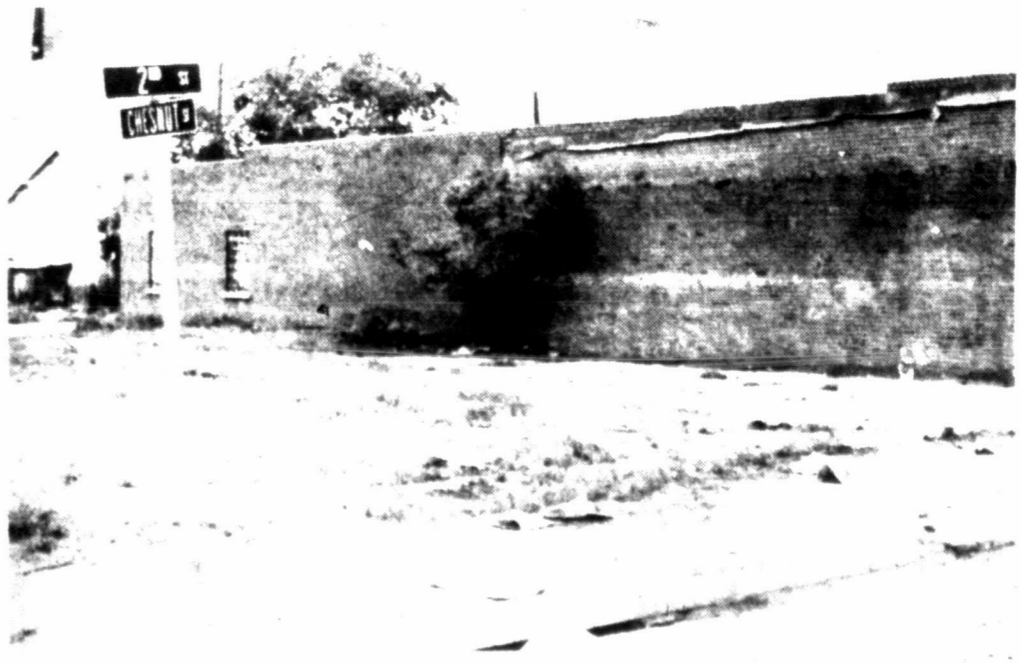
SWAC Representatives explained, on equipment, they would take the low blue book price according to year and model.

They stated about 20

days prior to the board of review, tax payers will be invited to discuss this valuation with Southwestern Appraisal Company.

ailable to the church group.

Through the efforts of the Southern Baptist and Lutheran Refugee Services and a representative of the United States Government, the family of eight was located and transportation arrangements were made.

There was a slight delay, however, in the family leaving Bangkok, due to the birth of the ninth member of the family, a tiny boy named Vanchai.
A frightened and bewildered man and his wife and seven children stepped off of the airplane in Abilene March

26, Rev. Roenfeldt said. The sights, sounds and people were vastly different from those they had left behind. Monee Hutchins, the sister of the refugee father known as Mr. Thom, was present to greet the family and assist in interpretation.

Mr. Thom was promised a job working on the farm of Truman Bodine and insisted on going to work immediately. He and his family were furnished a house on the farm and members of the church have helped furnish the house and clothe the family.

The family had fled before the Communist troops as Laos fell before the "Red Tide." They managed to escape by boat to Thailand where they remained in a refugee tent camp from November 27, 1979 until leaving for Colorado City.

Mr. Thom, 45, is a trained mechanic and welder. He and his wife, Mrs. Somchit, 33, were educated in Laos and speak, read and write, both Lao and Thai.

Currently, two teachers, Betsy Aycock and Earline Sellier, are working with the two refugees, instructing them in the English language.

Because the refugees are able to read and write in their native Lao, a book of translation is used, comparing English and Lao phrases.

"They are learning rapidly," Mrs. Sellier said.

The children, Nang Phou, 13, Nang Phit, 12 (both daughters) Thao Nonh, 10, and Thao Nol, 7, (both sons) have been enrolled in school and

are attending classes regularly.

"They seem to have very little difficulty in communicating, despite the fact they speak no English," Rev. Roenfeldt said.

A daughter, Nang Somchay, 4, a son, Thao Phou, 1, and the baby, born March 1, 1981, are learning American ways and the English

restore the truck. Work began, but when it came time to buy new tires for the truck, the city decided they couldn't afford it, and the project was stalled," Green said.

Now, through donations and other means, the department has begun restoration again. Tires have been ordered for the truck. Because of its age and type, special tires are required.

The front tires measure 38 inches by seven inches and have been ordered from Tennessee. The rear tires measure 40 inches by eight inches and the only place they were available was from California.

Chrome trim has been refinished, leather seats recovered, engine rebuilt and soon, the old red truck will support a brand new coat of paint, Green said.

The VFD hopes to receive enough donations to have the truck ready in time to take part in the Centennial Parade.

Already over 1,000 man hours have been put into the restoration and many more are anticipated.

Members of the VFD will appear before the city council and request funds from the Motel Occupancy Tax to be used toward restoration of the truck.

Firemen also hope to have the truck in operation by the time the Southwestern Fire Marshal's Convention is held here this year.

The old truck has the same capacity as the newest unit in the department, 750 gallons per minute. It has three, two and one-half outlets and could easily compete in the six man pumper or six man plug races, not to mention the two man pumper races held during the annual conventions, Jerry Hammond, VFD member said.

YOU AUTO KNOW

Q. How can I keep my brakes from squealing? The odd thing is the squeal comes and goes with no set pattern when the wheels are rolling but disappears when the brakes are applied.

A. What you are hearing is not a squeal but a warning of worn brake liners. Brakes "squeal" only when they are applied. Built-in wear indicators make a different kind of noise, and the noise is heard only when brakes are NOT applied. A recent study from the University of Indiana indicates that worn brakes are a factor in 40 percent of automobile accidents where owner neglect results in mechanical malfunction. The built-in wear indicator used by many manufacturers makes an intermittent scraping sound. Do not ignore this warning signal. Inspect your brake linings at once. Replace them if the pads are thin.

The family attends church services every Sunday and experienced their first shopping spree in an American grocery store shortly after arrival.

Since that time, Mr. Thom has traveled to the grocery store via bicycle on several occasions.

Unaccustomed to the American style food, the family prefers unpolished rice to the well polished white type sold in most local stores.

The family recently purchased their second 100 pound bag of rice since arriving in this country.

"These are beautiful independent people," Rev. Roenfeldt noted. He explained that the family is in no way obligated to remain here. If offered a better job, or if they decide to relocate, it is their decision.

Mr. Thom currently is paid minimum wage and works a 48 hour week.

being held for shipment. Leslie Crowder, son of W. A. Crowder, was appointed to handle the freight office, she noted.

Soon, lumber was in great demand and towns began to spring up across the state. Lumber was shipped from Colorado to build Lubbock, Amarillo and towns in East New Mexico, making his truly the "Mother City Of West Texas," Mrs. Hines stated.

Four generations of Crowder's were present at the unveiling of the monument, Mary Lee Moore, granddaughter of W. A. Crowder; Mrs. Charles Franklin, great-granddaughter; David Sanders, great-great-grandson and David and Lori Sanders, great-great-grandchildren.

The marker is located on First Street between Oak and Walnut Streets.

In making the dedication, County Judge Bill Carter commented that only a few feet down the track from where the dedication was being made, the birth of West Texas and Mitchell County began one hundred years ago, on April 16. Mayor Elmer Martin read the inscription on the monument to the crowd.

The inscription states "Rail service to Colorado City began on April 16, 1881, when a Texas & Pacific supply train arrived with materials for the construction of a freight and passenger depot in the town. Completed the following month at the foot of Oak

St., it was similar in style and size to a T & P Station in Fort Worth.

Cattle pens were constructed later to the east of the station on land donated by Aaron W. Dunn, John Wesley Moorar, W. H. Snyder and George W. Waddell.

The railroad and stockyards established Colorado City as the major shipping center and supply station for the vast ranching region of West Texas and sections of Eastern New Mexico.

W. A. Crowder came here in 1885 as the agent for the T & P Railway. During his 35 years of service, local rail traffic flourished.

brought the necessary manufactured products for local ranches such as barbed wire and windmills. Goods shipped from here to eastern markets included cattle, hides, salt, ice, wool and buffalo bones.

The 1881 depot was later destroyed by fire and replaced by a new freight station in 1896. Another depot, built at the foot of Walnut St. in 1907, was used by passenger trains until service to the city ended on March 22, 1967.

Master of Ceremonies J. Lee Jones, Jr., concluded the ceremony by inviting those gathered to return to the Centennial Celebration in July.

Matthew 28:5-6 "And the angel answered and said unto the women, Fear Not: for I know that you seek Jesus, which was crucified. He is not here: for He is risen, as he said. Come, see the place where the Lord lay. And go quickly, and tell his disciples that He is risen from the dead..."
What would you consider the most important words ever spoken? Many would place the words of the Declaration of Independence in this category. Others might place the words that rang around the world at the conclusion of World War II, words which told that peace and victory had been achieved are the most important words ever spoken. Still others might say that the words spoken by Neil Armstrong when he first walked on the moon are the most important. I suggest unto you today, that all other words uttered by men or women have to take a secondary position to these words spoken by the angel to the women. The angels words were; "Christ is not here, He is risen."
These words the angel spoke are the most important for several reasons. I will mention only two. These words are important because they signify that God's salvation in Christ Jesus is now complete. Ephesians 1:4 declares that even before the foundation of the world God had purposed to save mankind through His Son. For years, during the period of the Old Testament, God worked toward this goal.  burial cloth of Jesus, that was interesting if not fascinating. In the documentary, 30 scientists, mostly Americans, worked two and a half years trying to prove if the Shroud was a forgery or not. The scientists came from all walks of life, some were Christians, some atheists and some believers of evolution.

After extensive research and every kind of experiment and test known to man, they came to the conclusion that the Shroud was not only authentic, but several tests proved it could and probably was the burial cloth used on Jesus some 2,000 years ago. Over 50 percent of the scientists stated that they believed it to be the same cloth.

In conclusion, they decided that there was only a one in ten million chance that the Shroud was a forgery or fake. Sounds like pretty good odds to me. By using scriptures from the Bible, where it gave detailed accounts of the crucifixion of Christ, they concluded there were blood stains on the cloth in same places where Christ had bled.

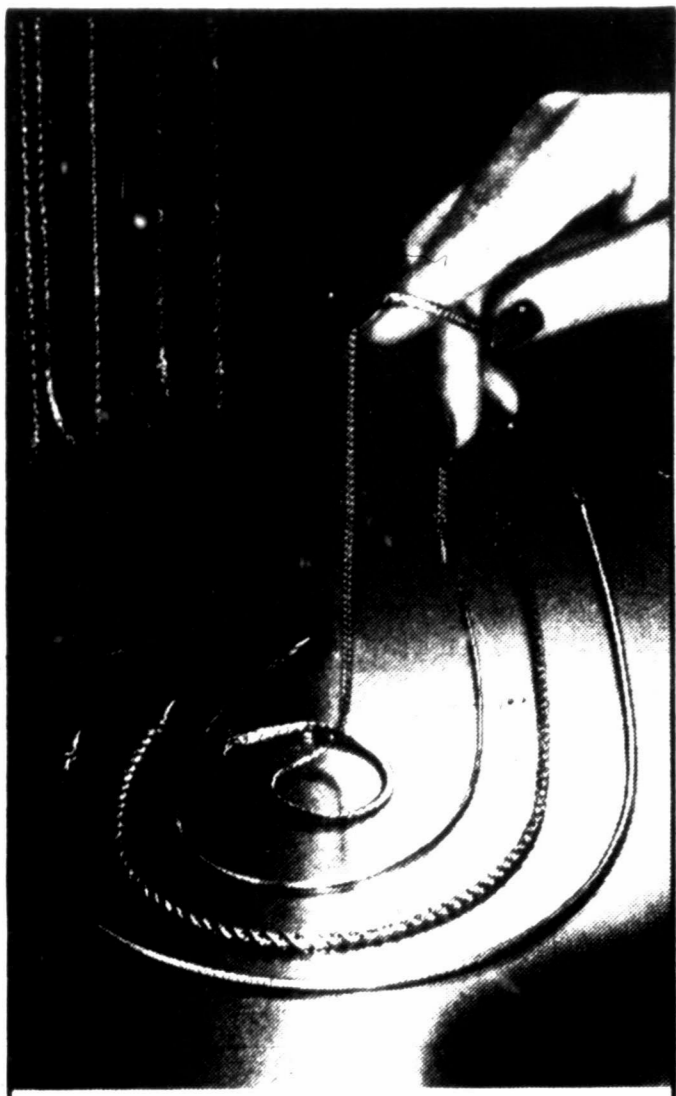

An ordinance amending and changing a franchise ordinance enacted by the City of Colorado City, Mitchell County, Texas, on March 11th, 1968 and being partly styled, "An ordinance granting to Lone Star Gas Company, a Corporation, its successors and assigns, a franchise to furnish and supply gas to the general public in the City of Colorado City, Mitchell County, Texas;" and providing for a modification of the definition of the terms "Service lines" and "Yard lines" referenced in Section 4 thereof.
Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Colorado City, Texas:
SECTION 1. As of the effective date of this amendatory ordinance, and upon acceptance by Lone Star Gas Company of the provisions hereof, Section

4 of the aforesaid captioned franchise ordinance enacted on March 11th, 1968, shall be stricken, cancelled and nullified and there shall be substituted in lieu thereof a new provision reading as follows:

"SECTION 4. In addition to the rates charged for gas supplied, Company may make and enforce reasonable charges, rules and regulations for service rendered in the conduct of its business including a charge for services rendered in the inauguration of natural gas service, and may require, before furnishing service, the execution of a contract therefor. Company shall have the right to contract with each customer with reference to the installation of, and payment for, any and all of the gas piping from the connection thereof with the Company's main in the streets or alleys to and throughout the consumer's premises. Company shall own, operate and maintain all service lines, which are defined as the supply lines extending from the Company's main to the customer's meter where gas is measured by Company. The consumer shall own, operate, and maintain all yard lines and house piping. Yard lines are defined as the underground supply lines extending from the point of connection with Company's customer meter to the point of connection with Consumer's house piping."

SECTION 2. Enactment of this amendatory ordinance shall in no way ever be construed so as to diminish or impair any consumer's ownership interest in service lines (or portions thereof) installed prior to the effective date of this amendatory ordinance.

SECTION 3. The terms and provisions of this amendatory ordinance shall be deemed to be severable, and if the validity of any section, sentence, clause or phrase of this amendatory ordinance should be declared to be invalid, the same shall not affect the validity of any other section, sentence, clause or phrase of this amendatory ordinance.

SECTION 4. Except as heretofore and hereinabove changed and amended, the terms, provisions, conditions and requirements of the aforesaid franchise ordinance shall remain in full force and effect.

SECTION 5. This amendatory ordinance shall become effective as of July 11, 1981 if the Company files its written acceptance of the provisions of this ordinance within sixty (60) days after its final passage and approval by this City and upon acceptance, the provisions hereof shall be binding upon City and Company, their successors and assigns.
