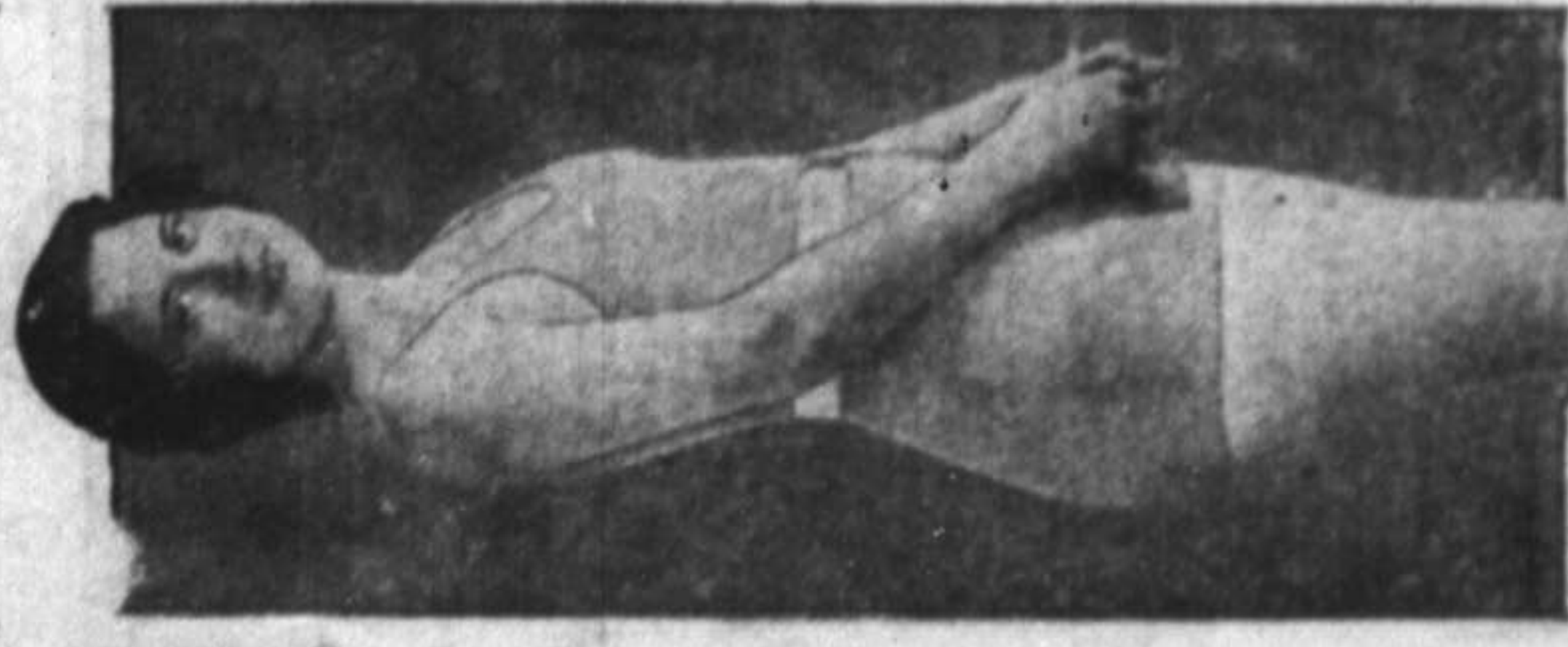

The Woman's Angle

CLERGYMAN attending the National Eucharistic congress in Omaha, Neb., the other day discussed at length methods of combating what was termed the indecency of modern dress for women and Rev. Mathiasus Steck, who led the discussion, concluded that "it will require a countrywide concerted effort to bring women back to the Christian sense of modesty."

To all of which I conclude that the learned clergymen had run out of something to discuss at their meeting.

Seeking some assistance from Webster just now, I found that modest dress is "seemly" dress and, since seemly is of the nature that it may be interpreted according to the viewpoint of the individual, I judge that no person or limited group of individuals may determine just what comprises modest dress.

A long dress will not make one opus and short sleeves are not tantamount to indecency, the clergymen notwithstanding, and regardless of their decrees and discussions, women of the world will keep right on following the dictates of stylish and faddists in regard to dress. It seems to me that souls are not going to be saved by dressing the individual up in a particular costume but that salvation should be concerned more with the emotions and spirit.

There probably was a day when men of the church, or merely men, would dictate the costume to be worn by women and today some sects may be able to enforce their opinions, but for the majority of the peoples of the world, men are simply wasting their breath when they launch into discussions of methods of reforming women's dress habits.

Here are a few verses which express my sentiments on the subject. They aren't original but are credited to a Margaret McBride.

"I wish you'd quit raggin' us wimin
About everything under the sun.
The clothes we don't wear
An' our fuzzy bobbed hair
An't none of yore business—jest a none!"

TO LESSEN FAILURES
INTRODUCING a new system, it will be customary at the Lubbock High school this winter for teachers to include their daily program with failure slips that are sent parents. These program schedules will include the hours during which the teacher will be free and the room in which she will be located at that time, along with an invitation to the parent to call for a conference.

FOR THE COOL AFTERNOON
THIS first cool day may not suggest coffee and apple pie to some of our readers but for any who might have hung around a newspaper office or some other such place of business, the occasion probably seems to demand this afternoon repeat. Here's a recipe for one-half of the meal that is recommended.

To make apple pie use 4 sour apples, 1-3 cup sugar, 1-4 teaspoon nutmeg, 1-3 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon butter, 1 teaspoon lemon juice. Line pie plate with pastry. Pare, core and cut apples into eighths; put in row around plate and work toward center until plate is covered; pile remainder on. Mix sugar, nutmeg, salt and lemon juice and sprinkle over apples. Dot with butter. Cover with upper crust and bake 40 to 45 minutes in a moderate oven.

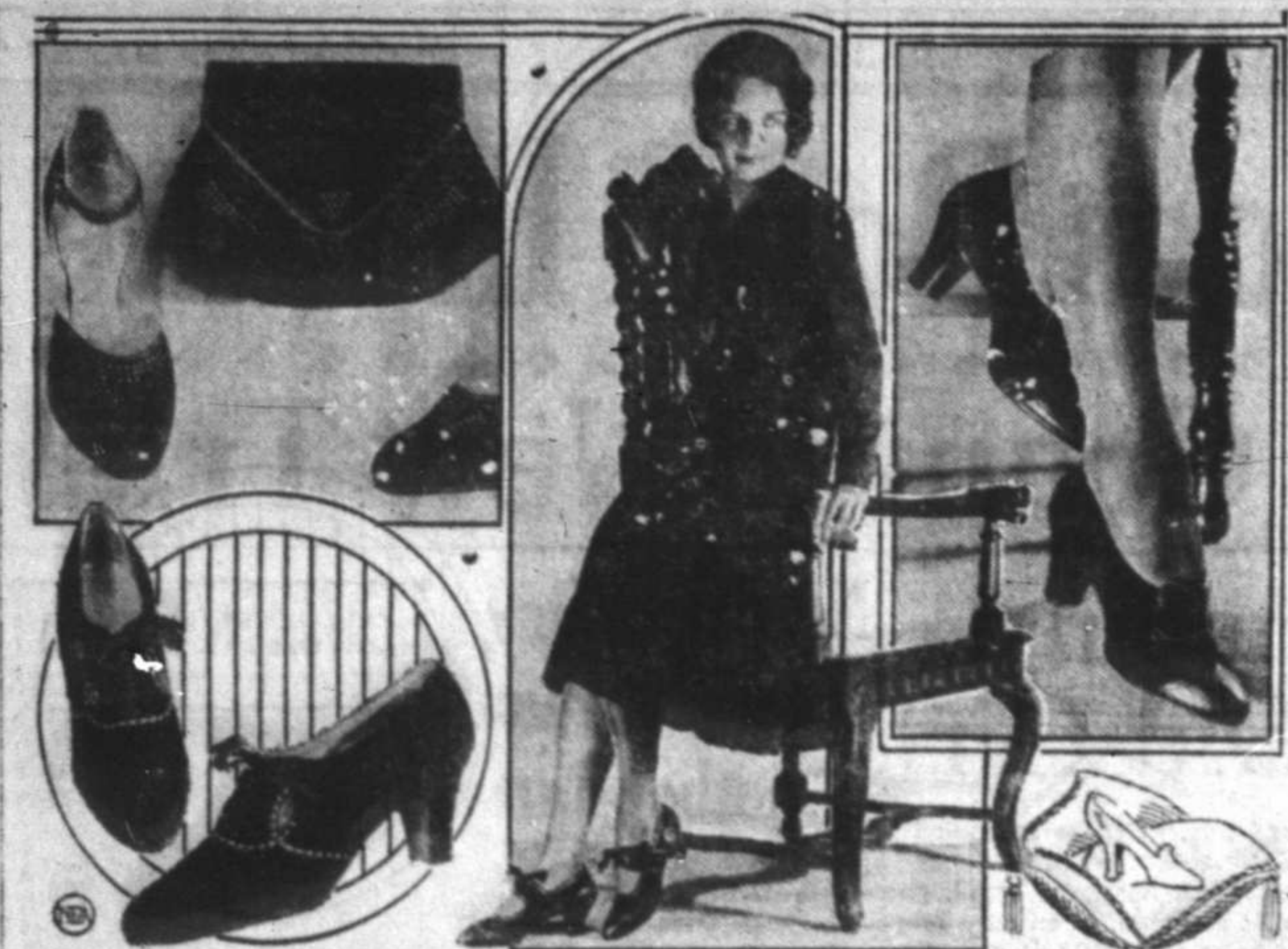
Program Given at O. E. S. Box Supper

NEW YORK, Sept. 26.—Successful business or professional women should watch their steps this year! New shoes are as different from last year's as the new hats are from the old.

Chic by the foot comes in pairs of materials this autumn, especially in shoes designed to suit the meticulous professional or business woman.

Suede combines with glazed kid, calfskin with lizard, baby alligator with buckskin, python with suede, patent leather with dull kid, or in some other smart way a couple of leathers prove that there is a style in union.

The second noticeable new note in footwear is the color that flaunts itself beneath longer gowns. Russet and wine reds, deep, soft greens, blues in many hues, browns of varied tints, and grape purples abound. Not that the all black shoe is out. It is excellent, but only for wear with the black costume or one that calls for black accessories.

Dressmaker Shoe Important
Third, listing the salient style features, the dressmaker shoe is the accepted mode, with intricate designs, all finished and fitted with impeccable workmanship. The result is a sleek, graceful shoe.

Fourth, for the busy careerist, the tailored shoe runs to oxford, high-cut pumps that grip and support the foot without tiring it, and a new type of pump that has the saddle of a sports shoe, furnishing a maximum of comfort with grace de luxe.

The height of heels is important this year. There are new high-low leathers, heels that are extremely comfortable. Covered heels are good too now, with dainty new oxfords, and they come in heights to suit any taste. Since the height of heels not only makes or mars comfort but has much to do with a woman's posture, the woman of common sense will learn which heights give her a proper walk and which tilt her and stick to the chosen heel.

Many shoes this year have intricate cut and fine trim, such as pipings, stitchings, and decorative saddles. But all this trim should be felt rather than seen, giving a richness to footwear but no fussiness. The elaborate shoe that gives the impression of being merely very well planned and executed is the one to step into.

Among the new shoes designed to give a smart understanding to the autumn suits and ensembles are several pairs in different colors that are typical of diversified styles along the same lines.

There is a trim oxford, in navy blue buckskin, with a delicate braid trim of navy blue and white kid which outlines the vamp and outlines the flap on a purse of matching material. This has the leather heel, silk shoestrings and fits in a manner to support a woman nobly through a hard day.

Pumps For Office Wear
A second choice for autumn is a brown pump, made high and well-fitted, of brown calfskin and brown suede, with a saddle of the calfskin that looks like an oxford. It, too, is an excellent office choice, especially good with the new woolen frocks.

For the woman who wears green with distinction and has chosen it for the winter's wear, there is a green suede and calfskin pump, made with a calfskin buckle stitched for decoration which gives a richness but no ostentatiousness.

For the woman who likes wine reds, there is the new type of suede shoe, made with lustrous pearl luster kid woven in and out, in a little bowknot design or straight lines. With red shoes they may be tan and ruby, with green, emerald and lighter green. They twinkle and blink like gems as the light strikes them, giving a decorative note to footwear that is pleasing coming from under the longer skirts.

Commissioner Is Improving

Victim of Eccentric Widow's
Gunfire May Recover; Okla-
homa Women Held in Jail
Charged with Assault

ENID, Okla., Sept. 26. (P)—H. Z. Wedgewood, United States Commissioner and local attorney, showed continued improvement today from a serious bullet wound received Wednesday when Mrs. Dollie Douthitt, elderly and eccentric widow opened fire in the state district court room here at the conclusion of a law suit in which she was the loser.

Wedgewood's condition still was considered dangerous, but his chances for recovery were regarded as better than at any time since the episode.

Mrs. Douthitt, held in the county jail on assault charges filed in connection with wild shots she fired at Arthur Sutton of Ave., presiding judge, and Roy Elam, young Enid attorney, apparently had reconciled herself to jail life today. Much of the time yesterday she berated county officers and fellow prisoners. She ate a hearty meal last night.

The widow, who was acquitted of the murder of her husband 26 years ago has not asked for an attorney or for arraignment on the assault charges.

Delay Sentence To Wean Baby

GARY, Ind., Sept. 26. (P)—The 30-day jail sentence imposed upon Mrs. Ethel Hall has been held up by court order temporarily to give the 24-year-old mother a chance to wean her baby.

Mrs. Hall was convicted under the Indiana nuisance law because there had been drinking at her home. When she was sentenced to jail her attorney appealed to the court on the ground that the eight-months old Beverly Hall was still a nursing infant and could not leave her mother.

Judge Martin J. With agreed to postpone the sentence until the baby could be weaned.

Body of Hogg Laid to Rest

Texas Philanthropist Buried Beside
Grave of Father in Oak-
wood Cemetery at Austin;
Tribute Paid

AUSTIN, Sept. 26. (P)—Will C. Hogg, Texas philanthropist and patron of the University of Texas, was buried simply here today beside the grave of his father, former Governor James Stephen Hogg, in Oakwood cemetery. Hundreds of residents of the capitol city stood silent as the funeral cortege wended its way from the railroad station to the last resting place of the son of the "Great Commoner."

The body arrived here from Houston where funeral services were conducted yesterday. Mr. Hogg died at Baden Baden, Germany, two weeks ago.

Last Respects Paid. State and city officials and officials and professors at the University of Texas paid last respects at the body of Hogg, who had spent his boyhood in Austin attending the university, was lowered into its grave.

The Rev. Beverly Boyd of St. David's Episcopal church read the burial service. Glowing tribute to the memory of Hogg was paid today by state leaders in the columns of the Daily Texan, official newspaper of the University of Texas. The tributes included eulogies from O. O. McIntyre, Irvin S. Cobb, noted writers and close personal friends of Hogg; United States Senator Morris Sheppard; Thomas Watt Gregory, "University benefactor and close co-worker of Hogg in furthering the interests of the institution; H. V.

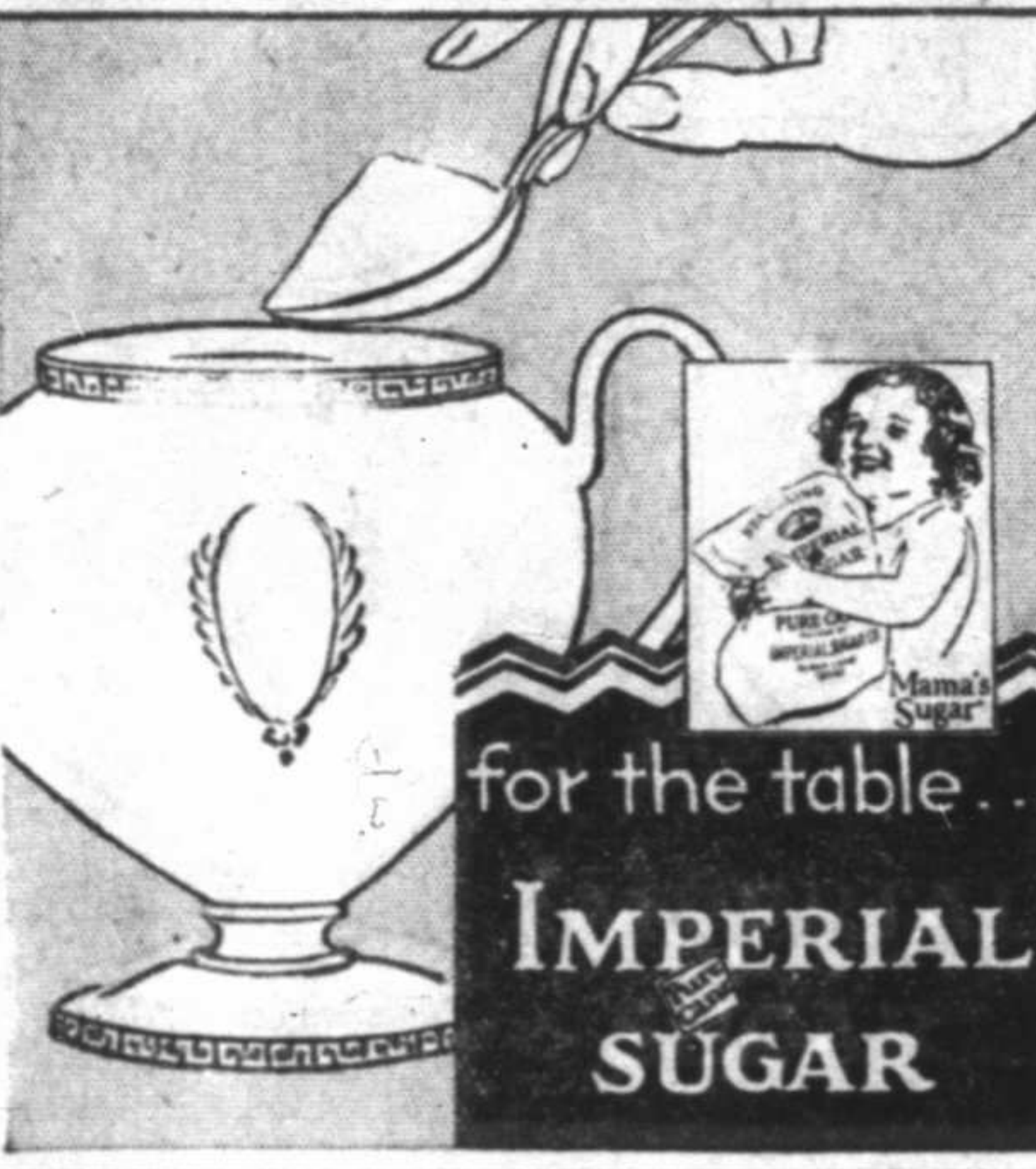

PLAGUE IS REPORTED

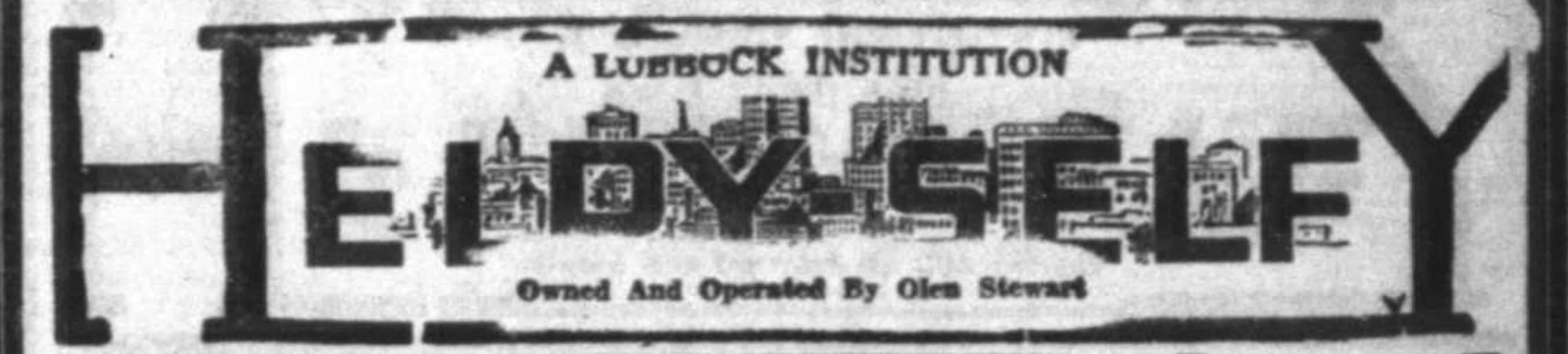

Pampa Harvesters Make Bid for Title; Defeat Lubbock

Westerners Go Down 12-9, in Thrilling Set

Evenly Matched Teams Carry on Sensational Battle for Three Quarters Before Western Line Crumbles

A golden day skinned over the Texas Tech gridiron yesterday, wrecking havoc from one end to the other, and finally stole away, having done its duty. But the Golden Harvesters were not to be denied. They were to be crowned champions of the Golden Harvesters, and the Lubbock High school Westerners may be compelled to wait another year to win the football championship of District 1, for the fates decreed that the Gold and Black shall be worn by Lubbock teams, while Pampa, the so-called "mystery team" of District 1, will continue to flourish under Green and Gold banners.

No longer are the Pampa Harvesters known as the mystery team. There was not the slightest hint of mystery about the manner in which they undertook to place nice, slippery skids under the Lubbock Westerners, and leave the field on the shoulders of a joyous mob of 600 rooters who came 200 miles to see just how the trick would be turned. It was to the tune of 12 to 9, and the score indicates the nature of the affair; the first conference game for either team, and the first time the teams have met.

Lubbock Leading at Half
The score at the end of the first half was 7 to 6 in favor of Lubbock, and that was just as it should have been. Rarely are games played with such deadly intent or with such forcefulness and drive as was the case yesterday. But common are the games in which one team is completely outclassed, outfought, and outdone by the other, as in the case of the fourth quarter yesterday. A Brilliant Display
Brilliant football, with both teams playing in mid season form, thrilled a crowd of some 3,000 spectators for more than an hour yesterday. From then on one section of the stands, occupied with spirited fans waving green and gold banners, was an upheaval of joy and delight, while the other gave vent to moans of disappointment. For more than an hour yesterday the ball was weaving back and forth between the two teams' 30 yard lines, but after the second half started the ball was almost continuously on Lubbock territory.

Many Stars in Game
Stars? Yes, a whole galaxy of them—stars on both sides, shining like Mars and Venus on a clear night, but it was if the firmament was divided, and like a cloud was setting over one half when the teams entered the second period of play. The Lubbock stars outshone the Pampa constellations for a while, but while the visitors became transformed into roaring meteors in the last part of the game, those of Lubbock resembled ordinary falling stars. There was a star called Sausbury, who shined brightest of all. From start to finish he was a star, ever growing brighter. A kicker, a passer, a runner, a variable human power plant, a dynamo, he charged and circled, kicked and passed, and every time he left a dent in the opposing wall.

Westerner Wall Crumbles
Finally those many dimes merged into one, and before the game came to a close, the visiting Harvesters could go through the Lubbock forward wall with comparative ease. It was the same wall that formed an impenetrable barrier to the Colorado High team last week—a wall that seemed a bet against any competition this league might offer, but it crumbled and gave way in the fleeting moments. If it was one McGee, a guard, who did more than any lineman on the field toward holding his own. Few advances were made over his territory, and on the offense he proved as valuable as any backfield man on the team. Lubbock's backfield, however, there was another star, Captain Dub Lawson, who knows the business of football as a good quarterback should know it. But even Lawson was not up to par. Co-Captain Mina Watkins and his educated toe held off the Pampa attack and battered through the opposing wall like a true veteran. Moody Smith, usually a terror, was below his game in the second half, though playing like a Tartar in the first.

Ten Other Satellites
Aside from Captain Sausbury, there were ten other stars on the Pampa team. In the backfield there was one named Lard, and he lived up to his name, slipping through holes, under ends, over tackles, and around centers like a greased lightning bolt. There were two others whose presence was a source of misery to the Westerners. They were Chastain and Martindale, a pair of half backs.

Fallouts on Part of the Westerners
Fallouts on the part of the Westerners to complete passes was a determining point in the game. Seven passes were attempted, but only two were completed. Four were intercepted, this accounting for Pampa touchdowns. Had the Westerners completed one pass that was missed by a fraction of an inch, the victory would have gone the other way. The running attack of the Westerners was equal to the Harvesters.

Neither team scored in the first quarter, both sides playing sensational defensive games. It was in the latter part of the second quarter

Cawthon Men Blow Lid Off With Wayland

Two Weeks Hard Drill Shows Matadors in Shape; Teams Meet Third Time; Frosh Play Cameron Aggs Tonight

Here goes another football lid! Two lids, a lid within a lid, in fact. Aside from being the maiden effort of the 1930 Matadors, it will be the first appearance of a West Texas Cawthon coached team when the Texas Tech Matadors clash with the Wayland College Jackrabbits of Plainview on the Tech field this afternoon. The game is called at 3:15.

Two Questions Answered
A two-fold curiosity should be answered this afternoon when the colleges open the season at the local park. How strong are they and what hopes do the Tech Matadors have to win the majority of their games this season? What has Pete Cawthon, after lying dormant as a coach for three years, done with the material on hand and will he show that he is still the coach his previous records show him to be?

To those who have been permitted to watch the Matadors practicing this fall it appears that the Matadors compose a potential power plant, with Coach Pete Cawthon taking over the coaching reins for the first time this season, the central source of power. Although the material with which the Tech coaches must work does not portend of a championship team, it is hard to see the Matadors winning the majority of their games this season.

Tech Won in 1929
Last season the Matadors defeated Wayland 19 to 0 on the local field. Tech had a stronger team, a heavier team then, and Wayland was weaker than it seems to be now. The showing made by the Jackrabbits last Saturday night when they defeated the Simmons University 14 to 6 was enough to indicate that the Rabbits will be powerful in the remainder of their games. Pre-game indications from the Rabbits last Saturday night to the effect that Wayland Collegiate are coming to win over the Matadors, with vengeance in their hearts and strength in their arms.

Wayland has never defeated a Texas Tech team, though the teams have been bitter rivals since 1925, when Tech opened. In that year, the Jackrabbits were everything but chivalrous off the field, when a strong Tech team made a race track out of the field and ran up a score of 120 to 0. The teams did not meet during the next three years, so that the 19 to 0 score last year shows that considerable effort has been made to form a winning team at the Plainview college. The game today will be a feature along the lines of rivalry if not in close scoring.

Scrimmage With Frosh
Coach Cawthon has been running his first scrimmages with the freshmen, who have made the going tough for the Matadors. Never has a Texas Tech team undergone so fierce a practice season. Since the training season opened on September 10, the Cawthonmen have been made subject to daily workouts of the toughest sort, and the team that faces the Jackrabbits today will be in form.

Wayland looked mighty tough in their game last week, and it will take everything we've got to beat the Jackrabbits," Mr. Cawthon said yesterday. He expects a hard game, closely played, and on fairly even terms. The Jackrabbits have some big men on the team, and it is certain that the Matadors will be called on to do their best if they put over a victory.

Coch Dudley Smith and twenty-five of his best freshman gridsters left early yesterday for Lawton, Okla., where they meet the Cameron Aggies, champions of their district last year, in a game tonight. It will be the first game played by and will be the opener of the season for both teams. Coach Smith expressed his belief that the Pampas would win, but that it would be a tough game. Coach Penn Dixon of the Aggies has a team that is as strong if not stronger than the champions of last year. Eight letter men return for service this season.

The starting lineup for the fish tonight will probably consist of Woodward and Price, ends; Owens and Barton, tackles; Baker and Greer, guards; Gribble, center; Dunven and Odum, halves; Black, full back; and Dovel, quarter.

Eugene Homans Fights Way to Finals in National Amateur; Meets Robert T. Jones Today

King of Golf in Easy Victory Over Sweetser Who Defeated Him 8 Years Ago; Homans in Thrilling Match

MERION CRICKET CLUB, ARDMORE, Pa., Sept. 26. (AP)—Twenty-one-year-old Eugene Vanderpool Homans, the fighting son of a father who fought many an old grudge match for Princeton, staged one of the most sensational combats of golf tournament history today to win and earn the distinction of playing the great Bobby Jones tomorrow for the amateur championship of the United States.

Barring the unexpected, he was a nearly unbeatable as anything can be in this sport.

Jones, despite a bad streak of golf midway in his morning round had old man par at his mercy as well as the blonde, good-natured but also outclassed Sweetser, where near the golfer who overwhelmed Jones eight years ago at 8 and 7 at Brookline.

Two Gunboats Silence Reds

American Boats Fight Their
Way Through Barrages Laid
Down by Chinese Reds on
Yangtze River

SHANGHAI, Sept. 26. (AP)—Two American gunboats fought their way through barrages of artillery fire laid down by Chinese Reds along the middle Yangtze river last night and today, each silencing the heavy attack and escaping undamaged.

As in previous cases the American vessels were subjected to fire from shore as they patrolled that section of the river which has been infested with pirates and other marauders for months.

The U. S. S. Guan fought an artillery duel with a battery of red field guns, hidden along the shore, 120 miles above Hankow. The Guan opened up with her three-inch guns and then brought machine guns into play. The red attack stopped and the Guan proceeded unscathed.

Proceeding down the river the U. S. S. Chu ran into a battery of red field guns a few miles above Kiating. The marauders raked the river with heavy fire. Speeding up her engines and bringing her machine guns into action the Chu raced to safety. She peppered the shore line with bullets, silencing the shore battery.

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., Sept. 26. (AP)—Bertram H. Mautner, 38, associate professor of sociology at Colorado Springs college died here last night after a year's illness. He is survived by his widow and a son.

Jones Will Probe Fish Conditions

AUSTIN, Sept. 26. (AP)—Charley Jones, director of law enforcement of the state game, fish and oyster commission, has been sent to Medina Lake in Medina county to investigate reports that conditions are a menace to fish. W. J. Tucker, executive secretary of the commission, said today.

Fish were reported endangered by lack of water in the lake, which is used for irrigation purposes. Inadequate rainfall for two seasons

has depleted the water, the lake normally covering 130,000 acres, whereas it now covers only about 900 acres, Tucker said.

The depth of the lake at the dam has fallen from a normal 80 feet to 20 feet.

Tucker stated that if the lake continued to go down and reached a point where it was impossible to sustain the fish, it would be necessary to remove them to other water.

The case was brought against him by his "divorced" wife who alleged that she had not been notified of the divorce proceedings and Judge Jose De La Hoz Chauvart ruled that the divorce was therefore illegal. Ocorio married his first wife, Natalia Planck, in Ensenada, Lower California, in 1922.
