EXPLOSION FATAL TO SEVEN MEN

Heroism Attends Drowning Of Five Texans

BLIND BOY DIES TRYING TO SAVE LIFE OF FRIEND

FOUR OTHERS DIE WHEN BOAT OVERTURNS IN COASTAL WATERS

(By The Associated Press)
HOUSTON, Texas, June 14.—A blind boy's heroic efforts to save a drowning companion cost him his life when four other persons were drowned in Texas coastal waters yesterday. Recently graduated from the Texas State School for the Blind, Leslie Urban, 22, was the victim of his own heroism in a tragedy which resulted in four deaths at Victoria, Texas.

William Phifer, 23, of Houston, Texas, lost his life while swimming at Galveston. The four young persons from Victoria, two boys and two girls, were drowned when a skiff in which they were taking an outing at Magnolia Beach on the Calhoun County coast, overturned.

Dead Are Listed

They are:
Cladya Horadam, 15, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Theodore Horadam; Marguerite Thames, 15, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. P. Thames; Leslie Urban, 22, son of Mr. and Mrs. August Urban; and a recent graduate of the State School for the Blind, at Austin, Ben Gillig, 18, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ben Gillig.

Word from Victoria said Arthur Salzeiger, 18, and Lucile Thames, 11, sister of Marguerite, are survivors of the tragedy which occurred within view of scores of persons from Victoria and other coastal towns, including the parents of Cladya Horadam.

Girl Is Saved

Salzeiger seized Lucile and managed to keep her afloat until a motor boat arrived. He tried to aid the other girls but was unable to keep her up. The other two boys, Urban and Gillig, tried to rescue the girl. Urban in spite of his blindness treading water for some time, attempted to hold one of the girls on his shoulder.

No Plans Yet To Replace Razed Hotel

No definite plans have yet been worked out in connection with replacement of the Jackson House, two-story hotel building that burned here Saturday night, according to John J. Chauncey, owner of the property. The building and fixtures was a complete loss as far as service is concerned, and under provisions of the city ordinance, it cannot be replaced except with fireproof material.

Smoldering mattresses and other portions of the furnishings were still being dug out of the debris Monday by Lubbock firemen. Insurance covered a part of the loss in building and fixtures, which belonged to Mr. Chauncey, but personal property of A. C. Ellis and family, who operated the business, and belongings of other inmates of the building were a complete loss, it was said Monday.

Missouri Snakes To Fight Our Rattlers

SAN ANTONIO, Texas, June 14. (AP)—J. S. Gates, of Sugar Creek, Mo., who has heard of the viciousness of Texas rattlesnakes, has offered to send 10,000 of Missouri's black snakes to do battle with the rattlers.

In a letter received today by the San Antonio chamber of commerce, Gates said there are fully one million black snakes in his state and that 10,000 of them could easily be spared with a written guarantee that 10 years hence there won't be a rattler left in Texas—except in flippers.

Pet Cow Licks Six Texans; Hydrophobic

DALLAS, Texas, June 14. (AP)—Members of one family are being treated here to prevent hydrophobia to which they were exposed last week when licked on hands and face by a pet cow.

The animal died Sunday afternoon from effects of hydrophobia, believed to have been contracted through the bite of a rabid dog, a veterinarian said. When the cow became ill, Mrs. A. G. Edwards, 34, and her five children ranging in age from 4 to 13, attended to "doctor" her. The animal licked them about the hands and face according to information given physicians.

LEAGUE IS TOLD BRAZIL RESIGNS

Officials Worry Over Action Of S. A. Power; Spain May Follow Her Suit

(By The Associated Press)
GENEVA, June 14.—Brazil has resigned from the League of Nations. Notification of this step, received by cable today from Foreign Minister Pacheco at Rio Janeiro created consternation in league circles.

The withdrawal follows Brazil's early action resigning from the league council because of the refusal of the powers to grant her a permanent seat simultaneously with Germany, who was promised one at the Locarno conference.

League officials, basing their opinion on Ambassador Mello Franco's speech in which he said he would await the final report of the council loss as far as service is concerned, and under provisions of the city ordinance, it cannot be replaced except with fireproof material.

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75 OTHERS INJURED WHEN BLAST WRECKED STEEL MILL IN INDIANA; DEATH LIST EXPECTED TO CLIMB

HUGE BUILDING RAZED BUT FIREMEN SUCCEED IN HALTING RESULTANT FLAMES; WORKMEN CAN'T REMEMBER DESCRIPTION OF TRAGEDY

GARY, Ind., June 14.—Seven men were killed, four of them instantly, by an explosion believed to be due to gas, in a coke oven of the by-products plant of the Illinois Steel Company here early today. Seventy-five others were injured, a dozen of them seriously, when the two-story brick building was wrecked.

The arrangements committee will meet again Tuesday afternoon in the office of Mayor Parrish when final arrangements in connection with the appearance of Mr. Moody here next Saturday night will be worked out.

Frank Slumps Into Record Low Levels

PARIS, June 14. (AP)—The French franc today tumbled to a new low record for all time, reaching 35.57 to the dollar and 173.25 to the pound sterling. At the close of the Bourse the franc had receded a bit and was quoted at 35.49 to the dollar. Today's slump was attributed to the general unsettled financial and political situation without any definite factor in which financial experts could pin it. The opinion is growing more and more that the franc can never be stabilized until the entire situation political as well as financial, is threatened.

DUBLIN—Ireland is going to insist on having the real "bouquet" in her whiskey after the present year. Next year, it will be illegal to sell in the Free State any whiskey which has not been matured for five years. Since 1915, whiskey only three years old might be sold, but the government has amended the five-year restriction to increase the prestige of the Irish pot still brand, and also to check the competition in the country of Scotch whiskey, which for years has been displacing the home product.

DEMOCRATS O. K. ADMINISTRATION

Heated Controversy Precedes Passing of Resolutions At Wichita Falls

(By The Associated Press)
WICHITA FALLS, June 14.—Enforcement of the present state administration, of a second term for all "faithful, efficient public servants," and of party support as a test of the party membership were contained in resolutions adopted by the State Democratic executive committee here Monday morning. Candidates in regular elections, two provisionally and adjournment was taken for lunch without selection of the meeting place of the Democratic convention.

Over spirited minority opposition these resolutions, read by Harry Tom King, of Abilene, were adopted by the vote of 18 to 7. Charges that the executive committee was "hand-picked for Ferguson" were made and denied. Steam roller tactics were mentioned frequently and the Klan issue was dragged out, only to be repudiated by speakers for both factions.

Resolutions Are Read

The resolutions, adopted after several substitutes and amendments had been offered there, read as follows: "Resolved that we, the State Democratic executive committee, in regular session at this time, give our full and complete endorsement to the present State Democratic officers and commend their administration of the affairs of the State as being economical, faithful and efficient.

Democracy Upheld

"That it is the sense of the State Democratic executive committee that those charged with the duty of providing for the holding of the Democratic primary elections in Texas should as far as possible see that none but Democrats participate in such elections, and that the best test party."

Petition of Scott Is Denied by Court

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., June 14. (AP)—Petitions for change of venue and habeas corpus filed by Russell Scott were denied by the Illinois Supreme court this morning. Scott is under sentence of death for the murder of Joseph Maurer, a drug clerk, in Chicago, pending a sanity re-trial.

Charlie Adams Hurt As Auto Door Slams

Charles L. Adams, of the Guaranty Abstract Company, suffered a severe bruise this afternoon when the door of a closed car slammed shut, catching the side of his hand in the groove. While very painful, Mr. Adams' injury was not serious, and he was able to continue his work after a short while.

AUSTIN SESSION WILL RESULT IN PLACING BUDGET

SUMMER SCHOOL STUDENT ENROLLMENT GOING ON AT CAMPUS

The most important financial conference since the beginning of Tech will be held in Austin on June 29, when the Board of Regents of the college will be in session with the state board of control.

It is at this meeting that the budget for the ensuing biennium will be presented before the board of control, for appropriations to continue the work of the school.

"With one thousand forty-three students enrolled the first year of the college," Dr. Horn said this morning, "it would be safe to state that by the fourth year, at least twice as many might be expected, which would mean that much increase in equipment."

School In Good Condition

The school is now in excellent condition, and while quite an increase in the amount of money needed for the school will be asked, there is not an appreciable amount of worry to be found, since the Tech college has had very good support since its beginning in practically every year.

The summer school session began this morning, with a large number of students taking call work. The majority of those who are enrolling are new to the school, but there are many who were in school during the past year, and having spent the week-end at home, are starting in again for the six weeks course.

Enrollment Figures Withheld

The exact number enrolled is not yet obtainable but enrollment, which began Friday still continues, and the total is growing each day.

Beside regular instructors of the curriculum, two classes are being taught by Mrs. Phoebe Kaufman and Mrs. L. T. Hammett, who come to the Tech from the Houston public schools.

Mrs. Kaufman has charge of the primary methods work, for primary teachers; and Mrs. Hammett, penmanship and art.

Dr. Horn is also offering a special course in public school supervision. Some twelve people are taking this course, the text of which is the report of the Texas State School commission.

Henry Ford Accepts Engineering Degree

ANN ARBOR, Mich., June 14. (AP)—Henry Ford today was awarded the degree of Doctor of Engineering by the University of Michigan. The degree, the only one ever accepted by the Detroit industrialist, was "in recognition of his material contribution to social welfare and his constructive imagination in the field of industry."

The citation described Mr. Ford as a man "whose genius brought into being an industry that changed the world."

"Endowed with vision to relate courage to persevere, wisdom to plan and execute, capacity to achieve, he has interpreted business in far-reaching terms of organization and coordination," the citation added.

Menus for the Family

BY SISTER MARY

Whenever one must plan picnic refreshments the question of "how much" confronts one. How many sandwiches, salads, cakes, and so forth. Often this is one of the most baffling problems faced by the housewife—one she must work out for herself.

The following calculations may help you to compute the quantities needed for your own special needs.

One large cake, 10 inches in diameter, will serve 12 persons.

One loaf sandwich bread will make 24 sandwiches. There are cut into halves. One-half pound of butter will spread both sides of 40 sandwiches.

One quart of sandwich filling will fill 40 sandwiches.

One quart of salad will serve 8 to 10 persons.

One 3½-pound chicken will yield about 3 cups of meat.

A 3½-pound lobster will yield when cooked enough meat for 1 quart of salad.

One and one-half dozen lemons will make lemonade to serve 25 persons.

One pound salted almonds will serve 25 persons. One pound of nuts in the shell will yield about one-half pound of kernels. These must in turn be blanched, which means a loss of two to four ounces depending on the thickness of the skin.

One pint of whipping cream will whip to serve 25 persons.

One quart of a frozen mixture will serve 6 to 8 persons. When ice cream means the main part of the refreshments a large serving is needed.

One-half pound cocoa will make 25 serving cups of cocoa and will require about 4 quarts of milk.

Three-fourths pound of coffee and 6 quarts of water will serve 25 persons.

Keep in mind that these are just estimates for the average occasion.

Outdoor appetites are usually large and for service "a la buffet" larger quantities may be needed.

If the cook calculates on the basis of her needs for her own family she can arrive at a fair conclusion.

If recipes must be made over be sure to double every ingredient if twice the rule is being made. And in the matter of cakes or any dish that requires much beating it's better to make two ordinary ones than one extra large one.

Boston received effective pitching from Hal Witte and evened its series with Detroit by winning, 7 to 3. The Bostonians scored three times in each the first and seventh. Gibson started for the Tigers, but left before the first inning had been rounded out, although an error by Manush let in the three tallies.

Jess Jett, gray-haired Brooklyn left-hander, relieved Burleigh Grimes at time to save the day from the attacking Chicago Cubs, 6 to 5. HELPFUL HINTS by GOLFING STARS

George Duncan—Favorite Irons
My mid-iron is one of my favorites—15 years old and still doing good work, although it has a piece of metal soldered on the back through the weight of the head having been worn down by the diligent cleaning operations of caddies with emery cloth. Never by one way, let caddies clean your irons with new emery cloth; make them use a very old piece if they must have that particular material for their polishing. The mid-iron needs to be a little stiffer in the shaft, and still more upright.

Every amateur ought to have a

mashtie-niblick. It is not far from being the most valuable club in the bag. And yet you see the majority of club golfers approaching with mashties, while professionals are using mashtie-niblicks for the same purpose.

Herein lie a good deal of the explanation as to why the former fail very often to make the ball stop on green greens, while professionals succeed in doing so. The Americans have even more loft on their mashtie-niblicks than we do.

It was this, rather than the ribbing that they had on the faces, which enabled them to stop where they pitched.

The greatest mistake any pitcher can make is to hurry his spring training. Take your time in the spring if you have the proper amount of stuff you need have no fear for your job.

Trying to quickly condition the arm often proves a costly mistake. The arm gets sore and the pitcher is let go before he really has a chance to prove his worth.

A great many pitchers have been ruined in the spring. In a desire to improve their manager, they force themselves. This is particularly true of the recruits. It works the reverse in most cases.

As the pitcher seeks to gradually work the arm into condition in the spring, so he must save it during the season, after he has gotten it into tip-top shape.

The wise pitcher cares nothing about strikeouts. However, I have no doubt but that early in the career of every pitcher a goodly number of strikeouts in a game always had a strong appeal. I had a few such years but soon got wise to myself and put aside the foolish thought that the pitcher must try to strike out every man that faces him.

Just as soon as I learned the lesson that there were eight others in the field, all willing, yes anxious, to help retire the batters, I became a better and more successful pitcher.

Don't put all your stuff on every ball pitched. Always try to have something in reserve for the pinch. "Beating down" on every ball takes much out of a pitcher and shortens his career.

Breeze along in easy style as long as the bases are empty. When they get clogged, when a base hit means the ball game, call on the stuff you should have in reserve.

Work your hardest in the pinches only.

Competitive Spirit

A competitive spirit is a great thing in sport, golf in particular.

The winning of the British amateur by Jess Sweetser is the best proof that could be offered of the high value of a competitive spirit.

Recently, in discussing Sweetser's feat with one of the game's greatest professionals, who profess that I do not mention his name, I was told:

"Sweetser won because he is a fighter. I rate four other American amateurs who invaded Great Britain as better players than Sweetser but none of them has his fighting spirit."

"Sweetser came from behind in most of his matches to win. At the finish of the first nine holes in three of his clashes he was down to his opponent. That means considerable when only 18 holes are played."

"He is a great golfer but his competitive spirit is even greater. It was his best asset in winning the British title."

Second Waddell

Lefty Grove of the Philadelphia Athletics is the greatest southpaw since the days of "Rube" Waddell.

I desire to qualify that statement a trifle by saying I have in mind physical greatness in making such a comparison.

Since the days of Waddell there have been a number of famous southpaws, some of them just as consistent winners as the original George Edward.

There have been smarter southpaws than Waddell. There have been left handers with more competitive spirit. But none has approached Rube in physical greatness like Grove. Vean Gregg, when in his prime, was the closest.

Striking Similarity

Grove has the speed of Waddell. Probably as much, but certainly no more. His curve is just about as sharp breaking.

In one respect the two differ quite widely. Waddell kept his fast ball lower high and pitched to the hands of the bats. Grove, on the other hand, keeps his fast ball much lower.

When Grove acquires the ability to buzz the fast one over their high and on the inside corner, his effectiveness will be considerably increased.

Rookie Infield

In major league baseball no club lacking a seasoned infield of veterans is given much consideration as a pennant contender.

Despite this belief, the New York Yankees are going along winning a lot more ball games than they are losing.

The Yankee infield has two youngsters at short and second, Koenig and Lazzeri. This would ordinarily be considered fatal to pennant chances, yet the Yanks keep on winning.

Unsettling Precedent

As a matter of fact, when the Yankees won 16 straight ball games, the infield was made almost entirely of recruits.

Spts.—DIAMOND DISPUTES

Fly ball strikes hands of left fielder, who is unable to hold the ball. He so deflects it that the centerfielder backing up the play completes the catch before the ball touches the ground.

When can base-runners start to advance on such a play?

This is incorrect. In the play cited runners who have properly held their bases on a fly ball that is ultimately caught can start to advance the moment the ball strikes the hands of the first player touching it, in this case the leftfielder.

CONGRESS HAS A HEART

Congress is a house of business as a rule, and sentiment there is usually taken with a grain of salt. Dollars and cents and votes seem to be the guiding spirits to a legislator who sits and watches the house in action for a day. But sometimes stirring drama is enacted in the cradle of our laws.

So it was the other day when Mrs. John J. Rogers, of Massachusetts, halted a fiery debate with a few soft words.

The house had been plunged into the bitterest kind of factional strife. There were angry words and profanity. Members were accusing one another of "trying to Jimmy Uncle Sam's strong box for a half a billion dollars," and there were harsh words from all sides. It was a filibuster on rivers and harbors, and there is no telling how long these things may last.

The filibuster was stilling, the fire quenched, the house changed from a madhouse of howling men to a silent and respectful body by Mrs. Rogers' plea.

It was a boy in the gallery for whom she pleaded, Charles Joseph Bronner, of Cincinnati, who had gone to the wars and come back without eyes of hands, who had beaten down the enemy of his handicap and ill health, and was about to be graduated in law.

"Charles Bronner cannot see us," Mrs. Rogers began, "because he lost both of his eyes. He not only gave his eyes, but both hands. As if that were not enough, last year he had sleeping sickness for three months. In spite of all that he graduates this month from the University of Maryland as a lawyer."

Charles Bronner has done more for the government than the government ever could do for him. He has fought and won a battle in which hundreds of our boys were discouraged at the terrible odds against them. He has achieved another victory for his country.

He stood in the gallery at his mother's side. There was nothing more that Congress could do for him because he had fought the good fight himself. To a man they rose, 400 of them, representatives sent from every corner of the union to guide the destinies of the United States.

For a moment as they stood there was the silence that comes only with great moments of emotion. Then broke a thunder of applause. To the boy and his mother up there, how sweet it must have sounded—that tribute of a nation to one of its own.

We know Congress can quarrel, can accuse, can bicker and filibuster, split hairs and waste time. But we know now what it is good for all of us to know—that Congress has a heart.

AND HELP US! IS THE CRY
AMONG CONGRESSMEN

WASHINGTON.—Congressmen are framing up their programs now for helping one another out during the coming campaign.

Some congressmen don't need much help. If they win at the primaries they can win at the polls.

Others have hard fights on their hands. These are the ones who cry for aid.

Of course, each party wants its own man to win in his particular district, or, if he's a senator, his particular state.

So it's up to each of the two congressional committees to see that plenty of reinforcements are ready to rush to the support of any of its candidates who see him in danger of getting caught in a jam.

The system is to draft candidates from "safe districts" to do their duty in "doubtful" ones.

An outsider can put in better bids in a candidate's district sometimes than the candidate himself.

A candidate can point to his past record and make promises for the future. He can argue. He can make the eagle scream. He can denounce. But he can't very well say that he, personally, is a great man.

An outsider can. That's his stunt. He doesn't come to discuss policies. He comes to discuss the personal virtues of that candidate.

There'll be a great deal of this swapping around in the 1926 campaign.

There's no broad, general issue spread over the entire country.

The issues will be local—here prohibition, there the world court, the Italian debt settlement, some other place, farm relief out west, down south Muscle Shoals.

Congressman Uphaw, for instance, is as good as elected in his district, as a dry. He can be spared to plead for some brother in distress in a wetish one.

A greyhound couldn't outrun Congressman Hill in his wet Maryland balliwick. He's available to plug for some poor wet, trying to hold his own in a district that inclines to be dry.

The congressional committees face one serious difficulty—

Party lines and local preferences no longer abide.

Try to get wet Congressman Hill to help dry Congressman Kvale, though both are republicans—not much!

Ask dry democratic Congressman Uphaw to cheer for wet democratic Congressman Goffman and he'll laugh you to scorn.

It's the same way from top to bottom of the list.

However, the committees handle it as well as they know how.

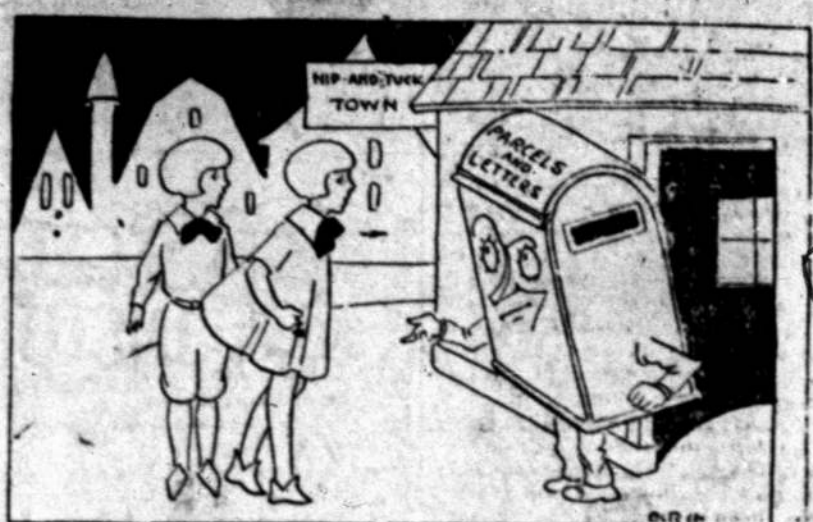
"Because it's nip to get in and tuck to get out," said the station agent, which happened to be a large mailbox marked, "Parcels and Letters."

An abundance of water, both internally and externally, is a necessity during hot weather. A daily bath during the summer cleanses, refreshes and aids in maintaining the health. Just how much water should be consumed in hot weather depends upon the work performed, the atmospheric temperature and the relative humidity. In any event, pleasantly cool water should be consumed in fairly liberal quantities.

The excessive use of food drinks is apt to exert a detrimental influence upon the digestive system, causing discomfort or actual illness, and if such drinks are sweet, the sugar contained adds to the amount of heat produced in the body.

Take a sun bath every day, but very cautiously at first, until your skin attains the necessary protective powers. Too long exposure to the sun's rays when you are not accustomed to it, is harmful.

In summer one's thoughts naturally, and very properly, turn to the prospect of a vacation, a change of scene and respite from customary labors. Every person who works would be benefited by such a vacation and should endeavor to obtain it.

The person who remains at home is fortunate in many ways. In cities the milk, water and food supplies are usually available and insect pests are infrequent.

Sometimes a vacation at home affords the very best opportunity for rest and recuperation. However, many of the home advantages are offset by the summer heat and the sameness of the surroundings.

If an "away from home" vacation is decided upon, a place in which adequate health protection is afforded should be chosen. The selection of such a resort is an important matter requiring the exercise of good judgment and careful attention to numerous vital health factors that have been discussed in previous lectures.

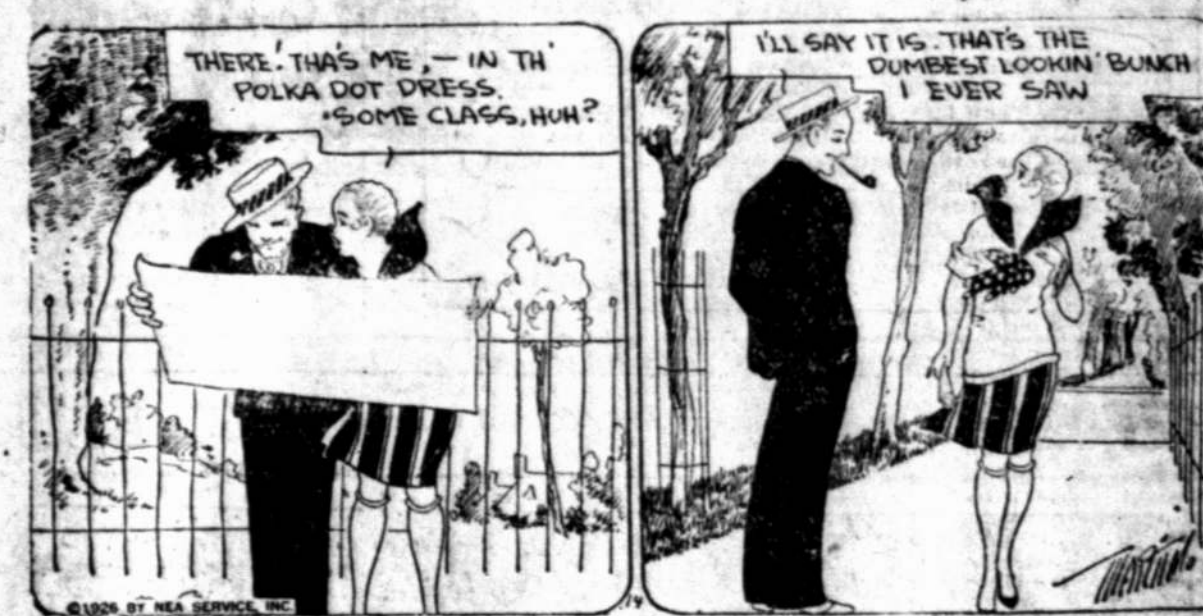
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"Neighbors' Wives"

The Papers Say**INSURANCE RECORDS SHOW THAT FAT PEOPLE ARE HURT LESS THAN OTHERS.****FERGUSONS ARE GIVEN SCATHING REBUKE BY KEMP****CHAIRMAN OF ROAD BOND GROUP COMES OUT FOR HON. DAN MOODY**

(By Associated Press.)

WICHITA FALLS, June 14.—A vigorous denunciation of the Ferguson county road bond case and a scathing personal rebuke to James E. Ferguson was issued here today by J. A. Kemp, prominent capitalist and chairman of the state-wide committee on validation of Texas road bonds, who said that Ferguson's only concern is the furthering of his personal fortune.

In a lengthy report of the committee's efforts to secure validation of bonds held invalid by the United States Supreme court decision in the Archer county case, Mr. Kemp went into detail on his work.

He traced the organization of the committee, starting with the first state-wide meeting in Fort Worth on April 16 and bringing it on down through the meeting of Senators at Waco and the conference at Chicago where, with leading bond attorneys of the nation, he drafted validating resolutions for presentation to the governor.

"In behalf of our committee, I feel justified in saying that we have endeavored to discharge the duties and responsibilities reposed in us in presenting this important matter to the governor," Mr. Kemp said. Continuing, "We have complied with every request, or suggestion advanced, and justly entered the feeling that further responsibility in this matter rests with the executive offices."

"Speaking for myself, individually, I have determined that further appeal to the Ferguson administration would be a waste of time. Jim Ferguson has utterly disregarded the tremendous responsibility involved in the failure and refusal to do anything and everything within the power of the governor to relieve at the earliest moment possible the chaotic condition now existing in Texas as a result of the United States Supreme court decision in the Archer county case. The only thing I feel Mrs. Ferguson is real certain of, from her knowledge of the situation is that it would be extremely unwise for the Ferguson political welfare to convolve the Legislature in special session."

Ferguson "Real Governor," Jim Ferguson, who is the real governor of Texas, and who manifests such indifference to the gravity of the situation now confronting our people, is wasting the people of Texas many millions of dollars besides casting a serious reflection upon the good name and honor of the citizenship of our state.

"It is quite apparent to me that Ferguson's only concern is his political fortune."

Mr. Kemp then endorsed Attorney General Dan Moody's candidacy.

Two Die In Cave-In In California Mine

REDDING, Calif., June 14. (P)—Two men were killed, another was injured, probably fatally, and three others suffered less serious injuries late Saturday, when a cave-in occurred in the Horton Copper Mine 18 miles north of here. The tragedy occurred in a mine shaft of the mine approximately 2,000 feet from the shaft outlet. The survivors said that tons of earth suddenly descended upon them without warning, burying two of the men. The others, who were buried only partially, freed themselves and dug their way through the barrier of rock and earth which was between them and the mine entrance.

Up to a late hour the two bodies still were in the debris.

Texas Supreme Court Hands Strange Decisions Down After Review Of Contested Verdicts Of Other Courts

(By Associated Press.)

AUSTIN, June 14.—The Supreme court has granted John R. Bigham, Bell county sheriff, permission to file a petition for mandamus compelling Lewis H. Jones, Bell county district judge to pay him certain fees he claims are due for serving subpoenas.

Bigham served 38 subpoenas on an out-of-town trip, and contends he is entitled to such fees as would accrue to him had he made 36 different trips.

The court overruled the motion of George W. Thelien of Houston for leave to file a petition for a mandamus against J. T. Robinson, head commissioner, to compel him to lease certain state lands to him at ten cents an acre, instead of leasing to the higher bidder.

Under the workmen's compensation act, recovery cannot be had for an occupational or industrial disease, gradually developed as a natural result of the employment, the Supreme court ruled in rendering judgment for the Aetna Life Insurance company against Carrie Graham and others of Waco.

Shoe Polish Case Up. Artie Graham worked for a Waco company that manufactured shoe polish. She resigned in May, 1922, because of ill health and died of tuberculosis, January 31, 1924. It was claimed she inhaled fumes and gases of shoe polish.

"Our statute has never gotten away from the central thought that the injury must be accidental in its nature," the court said.

The court affirmed in part and reversed and remanded in part to the District court of Hidalgo county, the case of the Edinburg Irrigation company, et al. vs. A. Ledbetter, et al., holding that if an irrigation concern "should deliberately incur additional obligations whose performance would likely overtax its facilities, its bad faith could not be doubted, whether the motive be gain or spite."

It reversed and remanded the case for trial on issues pertaining to the statutory rights of J. W. Holt, and those for whom he acts as owner of "adjoining or contiguous land" who held contracts to receive certain quantities of water during drought periods.

Wagoner Estate Wins.

Judgments of the District court and the Court of Civil appeals were reversed and judgment was rendered for the W. T. Wagoner estate, for circulation of a lease of 3,000 acres, excepting ten acres, by the Supreme court in the case of the Wagoner estate vs. the Slinger Oil Company of Wilbarger county. The lease was cancelled on the ground that the oil company had failed and refused to carry out the purposes of the lease or to carry on the enterprise which the lease created.

ed or to use the property for the production of oil and development of the land for oil. The Wagoner estate sought to cancel the lease in order to clear the title, which was so ordered by the Supreme court.

CHICAGO, June 14.—Sheriff Peter M. Hoffman and Wesley Westbrook, former Cook county jail warden, Saturday went to jail to serve terms for contempt of court imposed because they allowed two wealthy bear runners to come and go almost at will while serving jail sentences.

Hoffman also was fined \$2,500 by Federal Judge James M. Wilkerson, who imposed the sentence.

Hoffman went to jail determined to execute from that cloister his duties as sheriff of Cook county, exercising dominion over Deputy Sheriffs, county highway police and the several hundred prisoners in the Cook county jail here. He named two assistants to do the actual work over which he expected to retain supervision.

He rode to jail in his own automobile and maintained that the enforced detention was merely "a vacation."

GOVERNOR GIVES FORMER LUBBOCK MAN ALL RIGHTS**J. L. JORDAN RECEIVES AN IMMUNITY DECREE BY MRS. FERGUSON**

The District Clerk's office, received yesterday from the executive offices at Austin, proclamation, restoring full citizenship to J. L. Jordan, formerly of Slaton, Texas.

The proclamation set out "that it appears J. L. Jordan has served his sentence, less credits by reason of good conduct, and after careful examination of his prison record and the endorsements filed in his application, the Board of Pardon Advisers recommend for him restoration of the rights of citizenship, giving him the full right to testify in any and all the courts and the full rights of suffrage."

It will be recalled, J. L. Jordan, was charged with the murder of F. F. Forrest, at Slaton, December 2, 1922. The case was later tried in the District court of Lubbock county, and on January 1st, 1923, the jury returned a verdict of "manslaughter," and assessed his punishment at two years in the penitentiary. Jordan reported immediately to the penitentiary authorities, in person and began serving his sentence, completing it in 1924, later making application for restoration of citizenship which was immediately considered and granted.

Cotton Markets

NEW YORK COTTON

NEW YORK, June 14. (AP)—The cotton market opened today with prices generally unchanged to five points higher on active months. In response to relatively steady Liverpool cables, covering and buying for a rally after the severe declines of late last week. July sold up to 17.55¢ and December to 16.30¢, or about 4 to 8 points net higher, but the bulge met renewed selling on the favorable view of over Sunday weather conditions, prospects for a continuance of favorable weather for the next few days and talk of increasing crop estimates.

This eased prices off as soon as the initial demand had been supplied and the market was no better than steady at the end of the first hour. July selling around 17.45¢ and December 16.20¢, or about 3 to 5 points net lower. Offerings increased slightly following the report of the census bureau showing domestic consumption of only 516,758 bales for May against 531,663 last year, but the market firmed up again later in the morning on renewed covering. Trading remained comparatively quiet with the demand restricted by continued favorable weather and crop news. Prices held fairly steady at mid-day, with July selling around 17.50¢ and December 16.30¢, or about 5 to 10 points net higher.

The mid-day advance extended to 17.75¢ for July and 16.45¢ for December, or about 20 to 28 points net higher. Demand tapered off at these figures, however, and there were reactions of 8 to 14 points from the best under Southern and local selling. July was ruling around 17.45¢ and December 16.35¢ at 2 o'clock.

NEW ORLEANS COTTON

NEW ORLEANS, June 14. (AP)—The cotton market opened today with fairly good trading. As Liverpool was higher than due, first trades showed gains of six points on July and 1 to 2 points on later months. Prices soon reacted to a 19 to 20 point advance on a renewal of liquidation due to favorable weather over Sunday, but rallied again on indications of unfavorable weather. The consumption of lint cotton by domestic mills during May totaled 516,758 bales, according to the census bureau.

The market rallied during the morning mainly on the strengthened technical position, the market having apparently become overbought. July traded up to 17.55¢, October 16.00¢ and December 16.00¢, or 22 to 27 points up above Saturday's close. Trading was fairly active on short covering.

THREE MAJOR CANDIDATES FOR GOVERNOR TURN ATTENTION TO NORTHWEST TEXAS ADDRESSES

MOODY, DAVIDSON AND FERGUSON WILL COME INTO THIS SECTION OF STATE WITH THEIR PLEAS FOR VOTES; RACE WAXING HOTTER

(By the Associated Press)
WICHITA FALLS, Texas, June 14.—Sunday, the hottest day of the year here to date, ushered in a week which promises to be as warm, politically, as it is warm, physically. With the atmosphere supplied by the Democratic state executive committee meeting Monday morning, the week concentrates the pre-primary speeches of three of the leading candidates in the gubernatorial race.

Miriam A. Ferguson, seeking to succeed herself, is to speak Monday night. Dan Moody, making his race on the basis of "what he terms 'Fergusonism,'" will appear Monday night. John Davidson, a candidate against present Governor B. B. Ferguson, is scheduled to speak Friday night. James E. Ferguson, former Governor and his wife, is to speak Monday afternoon at Vernon on behalf of his wife's candidacy, and here Tuesday night.

The Democratic executive committee meeting opening shortly before noon with two or three important matters awaiting action. The first of these was the selection of a successor to Dwight Llewelling, resigned state committee chairman from Dallas. The second was the choosing of the next meeting place of the State Democratic convention, with several leading cities bidding for the meeting.

Moody Goes To Bowie
DALLAS, June 14. (AP)—Dan Moody journeyed toward Bowie Monday, after a week-end in Dallas, to resume his campaign for governor. His afternoon talk is preliminary to an evening address in Wichita Falls, capital of today's meeting of the Democratic State Executive Committee. Moody started for Northwest Texas after a tour of the Southern section where he closed his swing Saturday with an address at Gonzales Saturday night. He delivered no addresses Sunday, but he issued a statement marking particularly by more than the attention he has been giving to opponents other than Governor Miriam A. Ferguson, asserting that "a vote for any of the other candidates is half a vote for Ferguson."

Mentioning that he has delivered 14 addresses since last Monday, his week-end statement followed in a general way the subject matter of his campaign talks.

Ferguson Starts West
DALLAS, Texas, June 14. (AP)—James E. Ferguson, like two gubernatorial candidates, will turn his attention to Western sections of Texas when he begins Monday a tour of Northwestern Texas. Only one address is included in his

announced schedule for Monday, that is to be delivered in the evening at Wichita Falls, one day after Dan Moody's scheduled address in the same city.

Ferguson closed an active week in behalf of the candidacy for re-election of Governor Miriam A. Ferguson with an address at Corsicana Saturday night, where he predicted she will receive a plurality exceeding 200,000. His addresses of the week continued to make Dan Moody the center of fire.

Davidson in Dallas
DALLAS, Texas, June 14. (AP)—Lynch Davidson extended his stay from the stump into its second day as he devoted Monday to conferences here with at least one of his headquarters. The candidate spent Sunday in Houston after a speech at Somerville Saturday night.

However, he will begin waging his speaking campaign again Tuesday when he starts on a tour carrying him into Central West and then into Northwest Texas. The candidate will launch his Westward swing at Weatherford Tuesday afternoon at 1 o'clock. Mineral Wells Tuesday night, Breckenridge Wednesday afternoon, and Albany Wednesday night are other dates on his program.

Davidson devoted Sunday to resting, although statements were forthcoming from his various headquarters. That issued from Dallas declared that Texans are sick of policies in their government and out of State control of their natural resources, referring in the latter instances to charges that Standard Oil is seeking to monopolize petroleum resources of the State.

University Getting Rich From Oil Wells
HOUSTON, Texas, June 14. (AP)—Oil royalties from May production of its lands in Reagan county netted the Texas university \$253,564.98. This amount was today turned over to the university permanent fund by the Big Lake and the Texas oil companies.

The Big Lake paid \$175,471.58 and Texas \$88,093.40. May receipts were a bit short of April receipts which totaled \$269,555.96.

Since the first well was brought in more than a year ago, the university has realized \$3,575,935.93 from the Reagan county field.

The water was not more than six feet where the skiff overturned. The party had been on the bay a short time when one of the girls leaned over the side of the boat and caused it to list sharply. Others in the party, becoming frightened, leaped suddenly the other way, giving the boat such a rock that it rolled over.

Screams Are Heard
The screams of the young people reached the shore, only about 200 yards away, and scores, shouting and shrieking, rushed to the edge of the water, powerless to aid. Two men in a motorboat headed for the capsized skiff and reached it in time to pull out the water, but not before the other four had sunk.

The bodies of all the victims were recovered Sunday afternoon and brought to Victoria.
The body of Gladys Horadam was still warm and limp when brought to shore, and Dr. J. V. Hopkins of Victoria at once began a resuscitation exercise, but the girl collapsed and further efforts to save her proved futile.

'PRELATE LIED' MEXICO CLAIMS

Caruana Told Authorities He Was 'Protestant Teacher,' Document Sets Forth

(By the Associated Press)
NEW YORK, June 14.—Echoes of the expulsion from Mexico of Monsignor Caruana were reverberating here today in the form of evidence offered by the Mexican Consul-general that the prelate had falsified his entrance declaration, and the reply that the evidence was forged.

"I am sending you a photostatic copy of Mr. Caruana's declarations made before the Mexican immigration authorities at Nuevo Laredo in March, when entering Mexico," said a statement to the New York press of Consul-general Arturo M. Elias yesterday.

Document Produced
"In addition to confirming his admission that he, the apostolic delegate of the Pope and Bishop of Porto Rico told Mexican authorities he was a 'teacher' this declaration shows he went under. When asked 'Do you come as a tourist or on business?' the Bishop of Porto Rico said that he was just a tourist. When it came to the question of his creed, the prelate of the Catholic church and personal representative of Pope Pius XI flatly answered 'Protestant'."

He Must Explain
"In view of the fact that no one has ever been kept out of Mexico because of religious creed, the claim of a Catholic prelate that he was a Protestant is something Bishop Caruana will have to explain himself."

Monsignor Caruana said in reply that his declaration had been filled out by the inspector at Nuevo Laredo. He denied that the signature on the declaration was his. He said he had not been asked regarding his religion or whether he came "as a tourist or on business." He reiterated the statement that he had given his profession as that of a "teacher," and asserted that really is his calling.

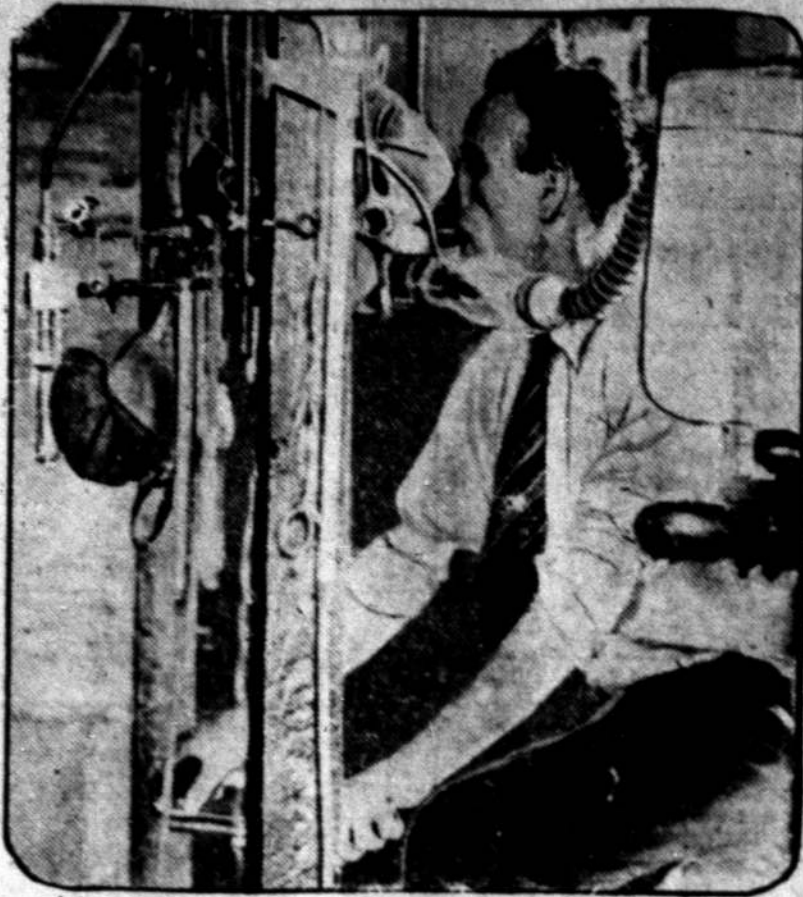

Mr. Smith declared it the duty and privilege of every member of the association as well as every newspaper "worthy the name," to throw the weight of his influence "on the side of respect for law."

Reviewing the year since the association last met at Tyler, President Smith said that its wisdom in the establishment of the Texas Press Weeklies, Inc., had been fully justified by the year's experience.

Praises Panhandle
Smith praised the Panhandle Press whose meeting at Wichita Falls he attended. He was convinced, he said, of the value of district press associations.

"One result of my experience this year is a firm conviction that the chief obstacle in the way of the accomplishment of the big things planned and dreamed of by the most active members of the Texas Press Association is a sort of inherent lack of cohesion and sympathy among the newspaper publishers that prevents their uniting in an aggressive, ambitious cooperative effort." He added that competitors in one Panhandle city actually take their vacations together and tour the Rocky Mountains in the same "flier," pointing to this example as evidence of the splendid spirit among the craft in that section.

To Fight Libel Laws
An intensive fight to change the libel laws of Texas will be launched in the immediate future.

Clarence Gilmore, of Austin, attorney for the Association, stated that although the Texas Supreme Court yesterday said that "truth is a complete defense in libel," there should be some changes made in the libel laws of the State.

QUEER QUIRKS OF NATURE

All have seen the tangled web of the house spider, an irregular network of silken strands—in apparently aimless confusion in the dark corner of a room or at least neglected room.

Perhaps they were made by the same species which, according to a popular tradition, helped Robert Bruce when he was striving for the crown of Scotland.

Discouraged and sick, he lay on a couch thinking over the dark situation, when he saw a spider trying to fasten its web in a particular place on the rafters. Several times the attempt failed, but always the spider persisted.

Which after repeated trials the brave spider won success. Bruce arose, heartened by the example, returned to the fight, and this time won his cause.

Whether or not the story be founded on fact the bravery and persistence of the spider is beyond question, for no rebuffs can discourage her. In due time she spins for her prospective eggs an urn-shaped nest and leaves the

rest to Providence.
When the young spiders hatch, the stronger substat on the smaller and weaker ones. As the survivors grow larger and stronger, and are able to capture other prey, they gradually abandon cannibalism as a means of livelihood, and race suicide is averted.

In the great class to which the spiders belong, the young are miniature of their parents. As they increase in size, the more or less unyielding skin is shed, and the growing body is allowed room for expansion.

In most spiders the female is the larger, and frequently devours her husband. Truly in spider land the female is more deadly than the male.
