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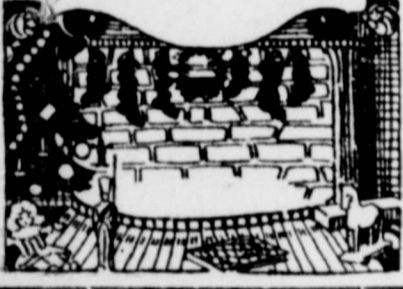
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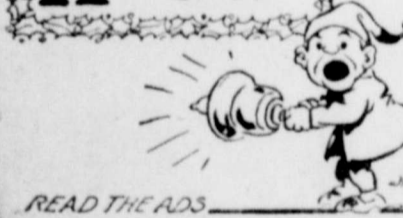
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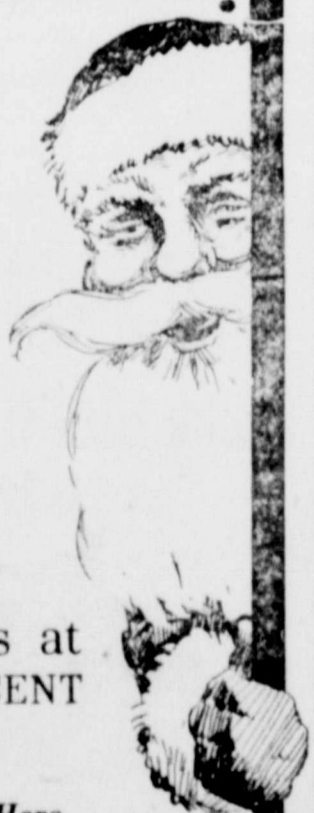

THIS IS SOME DICTIONARY

Arabic Affair Used by Scholars is in 20 Volumes and Weighs About 100 Pounds.

The ponderous dictionaries of Europe, even the famous many-volumed etymological index of Larousse, which is the monumental work of all modern tongues, are more than surpassed, says the New York Sun, by the Arabic dictionaries of 500 years ago, which are still the great authority for students in that language.

The Arabic dictionary most used by scholars who are familiar with no other language is in 20 quarto volumes and weighs close to 100 pounds. There is a 50-pound ten-volume abridgment of it, presumably for use at home. This and virtually all the Arabic dictionaries were made in the time of the Harun-al-Rashid.

The Islamic empire is credited by Moslems with two great eras. The first was that of conquest, when the only history was written with the sword. Then came centuries of Mohammedan domination, when the Moslems peacefully held the empires they had conquered in Asia and in the Iberian peninsula. During these art and literature flourished and the Arabic dictionary was born. In Arabia the flower of this period was in the golden time of Caliph Harun-al-Rashid.

Each of the words that have been familiar in the daily life of the nomad Arabs for centuries has an enormous number of synonyms. The lion, for example, was feared by villagers and hunted not only for sport but as a matter of necessity. Therefore in the Arabic dictionary the lion has more than a hundred different names. The camel was the sole means of transportation across the thirsty deserts and is characterized in 122 different ways.

But above all, the horse and the sword were the two great stand-bys of the Arab. There are more than 200 words that convey ideas of "horse" and "sword." All other familiar words, such as tent, flock, herds, water, woman, sun and air, have long lists of synonyms that are interchangeable and in constant use. This affords some slight explanation why Arabic dictionaries are of so large size.

Arabic, so the Arabs say, was the language of the Babylonians, and it is also contended by them that it was the tongue which Abraham spoke.

REVERE'S BELL PRESERVED

Still Hangs in King's Chapel in Boston—Was Man of Many Accomplishments.

In the belfry of King's Chapel, built when Boston was in its infancy, still hangs a bell which was cast by Paul Revere. It was his 101st bell. Besides being a bell caster, Revere was also an engraver, a goldsmith and a dentist. Rising above the modest houses in the Italian district on Hill street is the old North church, from which Revere received his signal previous to his famous midnight ride.

Christ church, the Second Episcopal church of Boston, is situated in the north end, and is an offshoot of King's Chapel. Its spire, designed and built in 1723, has served as a landmark to guide ships into the harbor.

In 1804 this spire was blown down by a great gale, and was shortened by sixteen feet. The chime of bells, now silent, which hangs in the tower, was made in 1774, in the foundry of Abel Ruddall, of Gloucester, England. Each bell has engraved upon it an inscription denoting its history. The bells were supposed to possess the power to dispel evil spirits.—Detroit News.

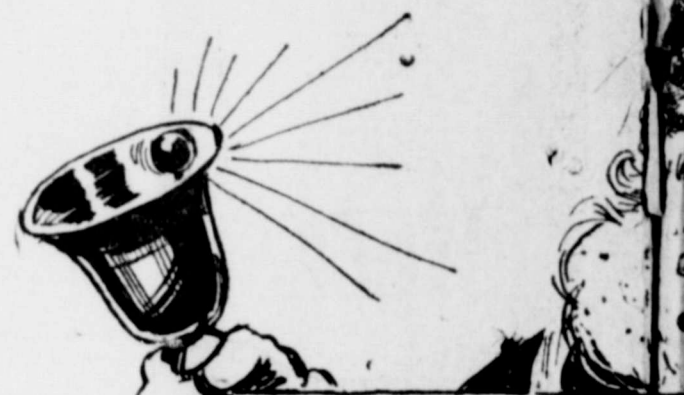

Engineer Gives Review of New Colorado River Bridge

"On several occasions the writer, in conversation with interested citizens of the city and county, has come to realize that very little is generally known regarding the Colorado River Bridge that is now under construction. A brief review of the structure will be given in order that the people may know something of how the \$18,240,000 of their money and the \$54,720,000 State and Federal Aid money is being expended. It will be noted that the State and Federal Aid for the project is just three times as large as the amount furnished by the county. Runnels county should, indeed, be very grateful to the State Highway Department for having received such a large percentage of aid on this project as the instances in which more than fifty per cent aid has been granted are very few, numbering only three or four.

"The type of the structure is known as a combination of reinforced concrete and steel-span bridge. That is, the channel of the river will be spanned by two one hundred foot steel truss spans resting on three piers. This part of the structure is led up to by reinforced-concrete approaches from either end. The two approaches are three hundred and fifteen feet long which together with the two hundred feet of steel-spans aggregate a total length of five hundred fifteen feet for the entire bridge. The width of the driveway of the new structure will be nineteen feet, while that of the present one is only sixteen feet. In addition to the wide drive, the new bridge will carry a side walk on the down stream side.

"The bridge proper is divided into three separate sections or units, i. e. the north approach, the steel spans and the south approach.

"The first of these, the north approach, which is now well under construction, consists of a sub-structure of one abutment and three five-column bents. On the sub-structure rests the super-structure consisting of four reinforced concrete deck girder spans each of which is 28 feet six inches in length. Construction of the first of the girder spans has just commenced and any one interested it presents a good example of reinforced concrete design and construction. Embodied in the design will be found three distinct and widely used methods of supporting floor systems, that is by use of T-beams, floor slabs and cantilever beams. The reinforcing steel which may now be seen as it is placed in the forms but not incased in the concrete, and which is the principal medium of support for the girder and its loads, presents an interesting study of strength without excessive mass.

"The steel-span section across

the channel of the river consists of a sub-structure of three piers, one of re-inforced concrete while the other two are formed by placing an arch-like addition to the old stone masonry piers. The super-structure will consist of two one hundred steel-spans replacing the old span. The new trusses are of the type known as the through Pratt riveted truss. The sidewalk along this section will be supported by steel cantilever beams extending out from the down stream truss.

"The south approach is similar to the north one except it is somewhat longer.

PROFIT GOES TO UNCLE SAM

All Paper Money That Goes From the Treasury and Fails to Return Is "Veil"

If you subscribe to the philosophy that one man's loss is another man's gain, to whom do you suppose, does the profit accrue when you forget to take your package from its hiding place in the parlor stove before lighting the fire in the fall? If you drop a dollar bill and it blows into the gutter and is never recovered, who profits?

If you fall into the river and drown and your remains take their place permanently in Davy Jones' locker, who is to the good to the extent of the modest roll in your vest pocket?

The answer to one and all of these questions is, Uncle Sam. Every piece of paper money that goes out from the treasury and fails to return, profits the government to the extent of its face value. If it is a gold or silver certificate the metal which was placed in the treasury for its redemption is never called forth.

If it is a federal reserve note or a national bank note, the securities that have been deposited as a guarantee at the time of its issue, or their equivalent, remain in the treasury. So is there solace to the patriot who so loses his wallet that if it is not found by another its contents are applied to the expenses of the government.

Doubletons Now Merely Bullion.

Should one find a pirate's buried treasure he would have to dispose of his Spanish gold at its bullion value, for, since August 1, 1908, when the common crier made proclamation from the steps of the Royal exchange of London that after that date the doubloon would cease to be legal tender in the West Indies, including British Guiana, the doubloon has not been the precious thing it was.

In 1739, and for a century after, it

was worth \$8, more or less. It has ceased to be coined in its native country, Spain, and since 1908 it has been unpopular in the West Indies, where for a long time it figured in a mixed circulation embracing British, United States and Spanish coins. In the interest of romance, however, the name must survive. It signifies nothing more than that the coin was double the value of a pistole, but the doubloon was never such a mouth-filling mockery as pieces of eight, which suggests great riches, but means only Spanish silver dollars, pieces equivalent to eight reals.

Invitations Came, All Right.

PASSES ON LEGAL MATTERS

Robert A. Adams, Judge Advocate, Rose From Rank of Private to That of Major.

Robert A. Adams, recently appointed national judge advocate of the American Legion by the national executive committee, rose from the rank of a private in the Eighty-fourth division at Camp Taylor to that of major during his army career. Mr. Adams went overseas with the Thirty-first heavy artillery brigade and served in the Aisne-Marne, Oise-Aisne and Argonne-Meuse offensives. After the cessation of hostilities he was assigned to duty in the judge advocate general's office at G. H. Q. He served fourteen months in the A. E. F.

When Legion officials at National headquarters at Indianapolis decided early in January that it was necessary to enlist the services of a legal adviser to thrash out the knotty problems of eligibility, interpretation of statutes affecting the Legion and other legal matters, Mr. Adams was appointed to fill the position. His appointment to the new position came as a result of efficient service as legal adviser after an amendment was made to the Legion constitution at the Cleveland convention, which authorized the creation of the office of national judge advocate.

Mr. Adams has practiced law since 1916 and is associated with a prominent Indianapolis law firm. He is a graduate of Washington and Jefferson college, and also attended Harvard law school. He is twenty-nine years old. The duties of the office consist in the supervision of the legal department of the Legion, the employment of counsel in law suits in which the Legion is involved, interpretation of legal questions, and the adjustment of questions of eligibility.

TO BUILD WOMEN'S AUXILIARY

Legion Administrative Machinery to Be Used in Safely Launching the Branch Organization.

Assurance that the administrative machinery of the American Legion will be used without stint in an effort to build up the Women's auxiliary, has been given by National Commander F. W. Galbraith, Jr. It is expected that the auxiliary will take charge of its own destinies next spring with the holding of the first national convention of the women's units.

"All doubts and misgivings in regard to the future of the Women's auxiliary of the American Legion were removed, and a system of orderly expansion in state departments and a national organization was provided for by the Cleveland convention," announced Mr. Galbraith.

"We propose to offer the aid of our organization in building up the auxiliary, but we are not going to meddle with its policies so long as our recognized ideals and purposes are carried out. The Cleveland convention voted to let the women swim without water wings. It authorized state executive committees of the Legion to call state conventions and to establish department organizations of the auxiliary, killing the rule which made necessary the establishment of a total of units equivalent to 50 per cent of the number of posts in the department."

AIDED IN GROWTH OF LEGION

Rev. John W. Inzer, National Chaplain, Long Identified With Activities of Veterans' Organization.

As national chaplain for the entire year the American Legion has in Rev. John W. Inzer, pastor of the First Baptist church of Chattanooga, Tenn., a man identified with the activities of the veterans' organization since its inception. Dr. Inzer not only was one of the men who initiated the formation of the Legion, but during the early days of its growth, aided the work by traveling over the country and making addresses as a member of the national executive committee.

Dr. Inzer, who was born in Hamilton county, Texas, January 6, 1860, entered the ministry at the age of nineteen, his first pastorate being in Birmingham, Ala. He volunteered his services as chaplain in the army after the war broke out and served with the Fourteenth Infantry in the Northwest and at Camp Dodge, Iowa, where he was senior chaplain for three months. After the armistice he moved to Camp Grant, Ill., where he served until March, 1919. He married Miss Marie Smith of Alabama in December, 1918.

A SERMON FOR THE TIMES

The following dispatch from Hugo, Oklahoma, contains a sermon that carries a lesson of the times:

"A flock of sixty-five hens bought last Spring has brought O. M. Mashburn more ready cash this year than the fourteen-bale crop which he has produced. The old stock was sold off at an average of \$2.50 a head; egg, brought more than \$350 during the year, and there is on hand a flock of 125 pullets with a valuation of \$2 placed per head.

"Money from the sale of the chickens and eggs were used to pay the cotton pickers."

Add to a flock of such hens a few purebred dairy cattle and registered hogs, with a sufficient average of feed crops for them and a home garden for the family and you have the proper basis upon which cotton should be raised. Besides farming safely, the man who follows this plan will renew the fertility of his land and not deplete it from year to year, dissipating his capital. It is the application of ordinary business sense to farming—Fort Worth Star-Telegram.

A WASTE OF MONEY

The printing of the Official Register of the United States, the directory of Government officials and employees popularly known as the "Blue Book," the issuance of which is required by law, probably costs more than any other Government publication. The report of the Divisions of Publications of the Department of Commerce shows that an edition of 3,251 copies of the 1919 volume, consisting of 1,704 pages, cost \$35,715.33, approximately \$11 per copy. The charge for the paper stock used in this publication was \$3,320.66.

The printing bill for all publications issued by the Department of Commerce during the fiscal year 1920 was \$425,370.75. These figures represent the cost of 975 miscellaneous reports and various issues of periodical publications. The free distribution of publications issued by that Department has been greatly curtailed, and as a result the receipts through sales by the Superintendent of Documents, and other agencies have increased from \$53,080.98 in 1918 to \$86,677.47 in 1920.

Many of these publications are of little value to the public, and further curtailment should be made.

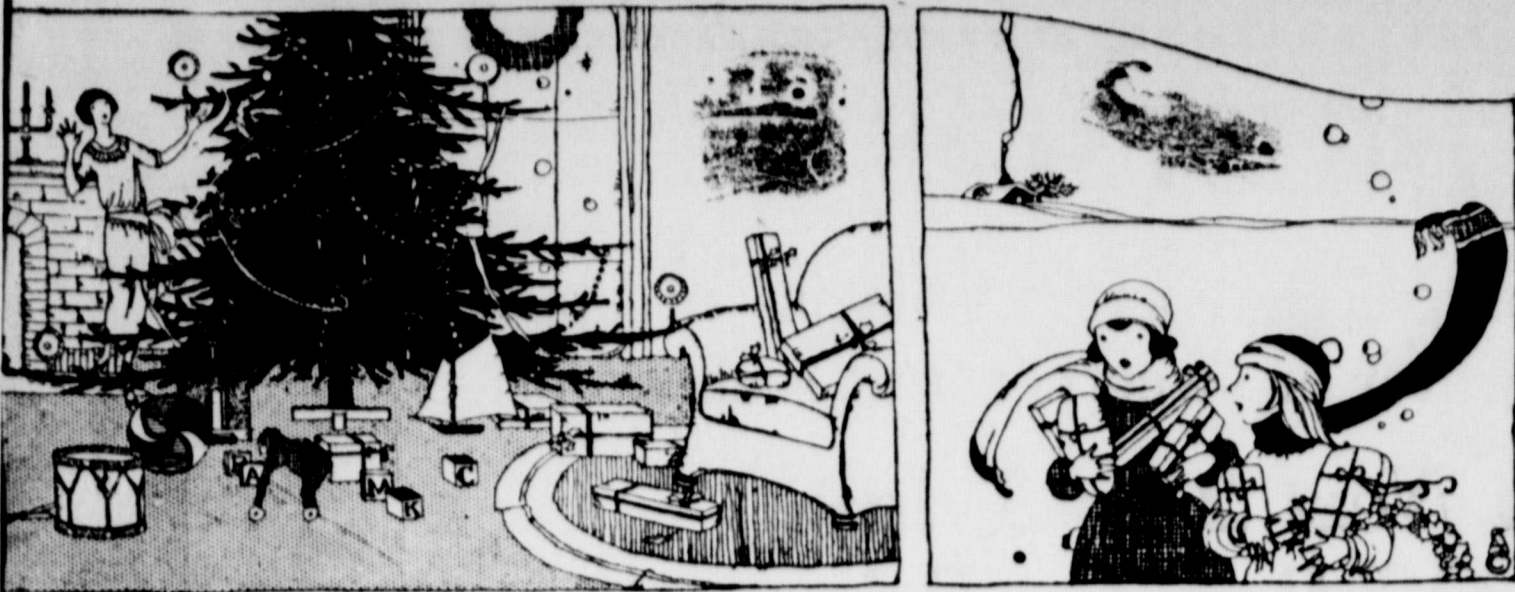

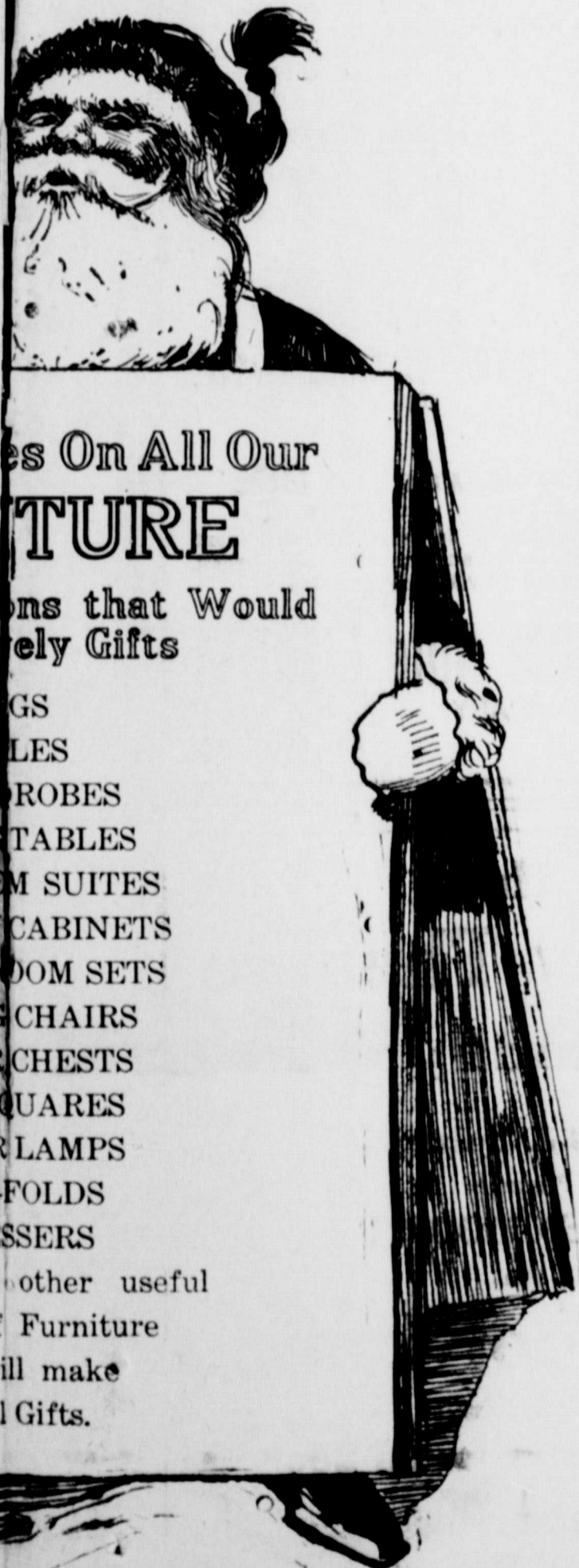

BUSY FRAMING REVENUE BILL

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13.—The initial steps in framing a new revenue bill by Congress were taken today with an opening hearing before the House ways and means committee on tax questions and the nation's revenue needs.

Dr. Thomas Adams, of the tax report treasury department, told the committee that the first problem was to decide whether the level of taxes be retained at four billion dollars annually. He expressed the belief that no reduction should be considered.

Chairman Fordner and Representative Garner, Democrat from Texas, had a lively tilt when the Texas congressman demanded that a statement be included in the record showing the exact purpose of the hearings. Chairman Fordner announced that the committee proposed to gather information upon which to base the contemplated revision of the tax laws, and planned to continue the hearing to December 23rd, when Congress will recess for Christmas.

HOUSTON WILL REPAIR WEST END BASEBALL PARK

HOUSTON, Dec. 13.—Contracts for repairs and improvements to West End Park have been awarded by President John H. Crooker of the Houston Baseball club. These improvements include roofing the third base bleachers, installation of about 1,000 extra seats in the main grandstand, and the construction of a two-story modern club house and dressing room for the players.

Dr. W. T. Allen, of Coleman, and Bishop Howden, of New Mexico, arrived here at noon Monday and will conduct special services at All Saints' Church tonight at seven o'clock.

OBJECT LESSON ON TRAFFIC

Accident Added Weight to New York Traffic Policeman's Order to Pedestrians.

On a road on Long Island there is a dangerous spot where five main roads come together. It is said that more than 100,000 automobiles pass there on Sunday. A stocky-built little policeman, known to nearly all New York motorists, stands there all day long regulating traffic. His arms are continually going like semaphores, but he always manages to say something pleasant—or caustic—to passers-by. This little policeman is very proud of his responsibility, and is imperious of gesture.

AUSTIN, Dec. 13.—The University of Texas track team is scheduled to participate in six track meets this season, according to Coach Clyde Littlefield. Dates have not been fixed, but the schedule has been outlined as follows: Dual meet with Rice at Austin, Baylor at Waco, S. M. U. at Austin, Oklahoma A. & M. probably at Austin, Texas A. & M. at College Station, and the Southwestern Conference meet on May 13, and 14, at a place to be selected later.

CHIEF JUSTICE IS ON TRIAL

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Dec. 13.—William H. McGannon, chief justice of the municipal court, will be placed on trial in Common Pleas court here tomorrow, charged with second degree murder for the slaying of Harold C. Kagy last May.

An indictment charging Judge McGannon with the crime was returned by the Cuyahoga county grand jury on November 27, after a six day investigation of the case. Judge McGannon pleaded not guilty and was released on \$10,000 bond.

John W. Joyce, former downtown saloon keeper, indicted for second degree murder for killing Kagy was found not guilty by a jury on November 17. The next day the grand jury started a second investigation of the case, resulting in McGannon's indictment.

Judge McGannon was one of principal witnesses for the prosecution at the Joyce trial and it is expected that Joyce will be one of the State's principal witnesses against McGannon. A motive for the killing of Kagy was not developed by either investigation.

The case is one of the most important ever brought before local courts, involving as it does, a jurist who was chosen by the people for a position of high trust and responsibility and presenting a dramatic contrast—a judge before whom many have been arraigned—accused of murder. As assistant county prosecutor in 1905, McGannon prepared cases against men accused of murder.

Harold C. Kagy, garage owner, after spending the evening of May 7 in company with Judge McGannon and John W. Joyce, a former saloon keeper, was shot at the corner of East 9th Street and Hamilton Avenue, early in the morning of May 8, dying in a hospital on May 23, after making a statement a few days previously

that Joyce had shot him.

Joyce was indicted and placed on trial. McGannon a witness for the State at the Joyce trial, testified that he was not present when the shot was fired. He testified that Kagy, Joyce and himself came down town from the East End in McGannon's automobile but that he got out of the machine at Euclid Avenue and East 9th Street, three blocks away from the spot where Kagy was shot.

Other witnesses at the Joyce trial testified that McGannon was the "third man" present when the shot was fired and one witness testified that it was McGannon who fired the shot.

A few days before he was indicted Judge McGannon announced he would not sit on the bench "until his name was cleared." He has not resigned.

Judge McGannon has been a conspicuous figure in the municipal life of Cleveland for the past thirty years.

He was born a poor boy at Reynolds Station, Lake county, Ohio, on October 5, 1870. He came here after teaching a district school for two years, obtaining employment as a bookkeeper. He graduated from Western Reserve college in 1897 and was admitted to the bar in 1908. He served for a time as assistant prosecutor and next fall would be completing his second term as chief justice, being elected to his first term in 1911 and re-elected to serve a six year term in 1915. He is married but has no children.
