Deputy Collectors to Be In This City Feb. 29-March 2

Deputy Collectors Ben M. Hawkins and S. E. Gillespie will be at the local Post Office on February 29, March 1 and 2 (Tuesday through Thursday from 8:30 a. m. to 5:00 p. m., to render assistance with income tax problems to any who desire it. This will be the only visit that can be made to this city before the end of the current filing period on March 15, 1944.

The Revenue Act of 1942 and the Current Tax Payment Act of 1943 continue the personal exemption allowed a single person of \$500.00 and a married couple of \$1,200.00 on individual income tax returns for the calendar year 1943. The Addition of the Victory tax and the additional information necessary to properly compute the 1942 and 1943 income tax under the Current Tax Payment Act of 1943 requires definite information.

According to W. A. Thomas, Collector of Internal Revenue, if you wish to receive assistance from a Deputy Collector in the preparation of your 1943 Income Tax Return the following information must be available.

1. Total salary or wages for 1943, including bonus and overtime pay before deductions.
2. Statement of Income and Victory Tax withheld by your Employer during 1943. (Form V-2 or W-2).
3. Total amount of all other income in 1943.
4. Amount of tax shown on your 1942 return.
5. Amount paid on your 1942 income tax.
6. Amount paid on Estimated Return, Form 1040-ES if any.
7. Members of the Armed Forces during any part of 1942 or 1943 should furnish a copy of their 1942 Income Tax Return.

The deputy's advice and assistance is extended as a courtesy and without cost to any citizen.

Liberty Completes Its Bond Quota; Check Reveals That \$330,905 Sold Over County

Metal Tabs to Be Used As Insignia for '44 Registration

AUSTIN, Texas — The 48th Regular Session of the Texas Legislature, anticipating unusual conditions due to the scarcity of materials used in the War Effort, authorized the State Highway Commission to prescribe whatever type of motor vehicle registration was available and best suited to the requirements of the State and the traveling public for the 1944 registration year.

The Texas Highway Commission on January 18, 1944, passed an order prescribing for the 1944 registration year, which begins April 1, 1944, two metal tabs 2"x2" bearing the designation of the State, year and an identification serial number. The tabs must be used in connection with the 1942 plates which must be retained throughout the 1944 registration year. The same procedure applies to vehicles which are required to have but one license plate except that one tab is prescribed and the one 1942 license plate must be retained.

The Highway Commission has also ordered that the 1944 tab or tabs be securely fastened to the 1942 plates in such a manner as to be clearly visible. On all motor vehicles for which two tabs are issued, one shall be attached to the front license plate and one to the rear license plate.

The Highway Commission has made every effort to comply with the request of the Federal Government for conservation of critical materials and both the steel and paint used in manufacturing the 1944 tabs were obtained from stocks on hand before Pearl Harbor. All motor vehicle owners in Texas are earnestly requested to cooperate by applying 1944 registration insignia in the manner legally prescribed.

Checks Received On Tues., More Are Due

Charles Tarter, administrative officer at the AAA office, reports that 25 dairy feed subsidy checks were received Tuesday. These checks amounted to \$90.92.

He states that there will be one more payment made this month for the November and December period, and that payment is to be made today, Monday.

Tarter and Rainey Go To Big Spring Meeting

Charles Tarter and Fred Rainey attended a checking compliance meeting at Big Spring January 26 and 27th. During the meeting they checked dams and terraces in fields.

Lewis Knowles of the state AAA office, A. H. Jeffers, also of the state office, and T. E. White, of district 11 were present for the meeting. Jeffers and White returned to this city with Charles Tarter and Fred Rainey on the afternoon of the 27th for a short visit here.

Keeping pace with Harmony and Hancock Communities, who announced last week that they had met and passed their bond quotas, is Liberty Community. E. E. Barron, head of Liberty Bond Drive, has reported that his district is now "Over the Top" in bond sales.

Chairman Collins says that several other communities have almost reached the quotas assessed them. He reports, "All are working and we are very hopeful that the issue will be put over early. Lamesa's quota of \$348,800 is just half-way completed. It's going to take some hard work to keep up with the rural districts."

Sixteen days of the Fourth War Loan Drive have gone by and a check at bond headquarters this morning (Monday) reveals that Dawson County has not yet reached the half-way mark in bond sales. Up to this time \$330,905, bonds have been sold, leaving \$461,095 to be sold before the War Loan Drive officially closes on February 18.

To win quicker, our soldiers at the battlefronts must have munitions and materials, more and more of them. War materials, like anything else, wear out after much use. The government has asked us to provide new guns, planes, ships, and other equipment to replace those worn-out materials. To provide them, all of us must buy more and more War Bonds.

The bonds come in \$25, \$50, \$100, \$500, \$1000, etc., denominations. The issue price is 75 per cent of the maturity value so that a \$15, bond costs \$11.25 and a \$100 bond costs \$75. Examine your family budget, and see if you can manage to buy one or several extra bonds. It may mean sacrifice, but that is what the people on the home front must expect. Men at the battlefronts are making sacrifices daily, and they are depending on every man, woman, and child on the home front to do their part.

Buying bonds in the next few days will be directly helping to finance the war—and financing the war is the key to victory.

The Clerk-Carrier Exam Deadline Set for Feb. 7th

The deadline has been extended until February 7, 1944, for filing applications for the substitute clerk-carrier examination. Mrs. Emma C. Dixon, local civil service secretary announced today, emphasizing that war service regulations now given these post office jobs.

"Appointment to substitute clerk-carrier positions henceforth will be made for the duration of the war and not to exceed six months thereafter," Mrs. Dixon said, urging persons not engaged in essential war work to secure an application form from him and file it immediately with the director, 10th civil service region, 210 S. Harwood St., Dallas, Texas.

L Long, Decorated Many Times; Is Promoted to Capt.

Texas bombardier, Louis E. Long, Jr., of Gail, has recently been promoted from First Lieutenant to the rank of Captain. The son of Louis E. Long, Sr., of Gail, Texas, Captain Long is now a bombardier instructor at the Big Spring Bombardier School, which is one of the AAF Training Command's largest bombing colleges.
Previous to his assignment here, Captain Long spent eight months as a bombardier in the Middle East and North African theatres. He was on duty in Africa when Rommel was in El Alamein, and as a bombardier on a B-24, he took part in devastating raids on Tobruk, Tripoli, Bengasi, the Greek isle of Crete and Axis convoys in the Mediterranean. He also helped blast the Axis out of the Sicilian ports of Cantania, Augusta, and Siracusa as well as Reggio, Naples and Bari on the Italian mainland.
Already decorated with the Distinguished Flying Cross and the Air Medal, Captain Long is putting his combat experience to good use by instructing fledgling bombardiers in some of the finer points of "Axis Blasting."
Captain Long, a graduate of Abilene High School, spent several years at Washington & Lee University in Lexington, Va. He became an aviation cadet at Ryan Field, Calif., in August of '41, received training at Ellington Field, Texas, and Henrichs Field, Fla., and won his bombardier wings at Albuquerque, N. M., on June 13, 1942.

With the exception of protein feed, practically everything needed in the feeding of livestock is raised on the farm.

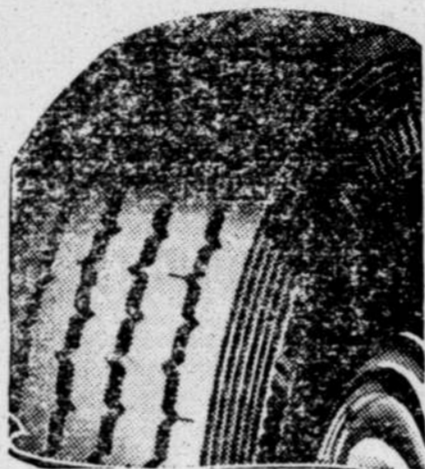

Home Demonstration Club Women Launch "Culling for Egg Production" Program

Four million culls from Texas poultry flocks should go to the market, be eaten at home or put in cans or storage lockers at once. That's the news from the War Food Administration and from the Extension Poultry Husbandman of A. and M. College. That means 10 hens out of every 100 in Texas flocks should be culled now!

By ridding the flock of (1) extra fat hens, (2) all lame hens, (3) hens that are coarse and masculine, (4) those that are extra small, (5) and the ones with grey eyes, in fact, all hens that are apt to be poor layers, the poultryman gives the good hen a chance to do her share.

This chart gives an idea of what to expect from that good hen after the culls have been removed:

48 to 52 pounds feed; body maintenance one year; 52 plus 9 pounds feed; around 10 eggs per year; 52 plus 18 pounds feed; around 200 eggs per year.

Poultrymen this year can profit by avoiding last year's mistake of overcrowding their laying houses. In culling flocks or buying chicks for replacements, it is a safe rule to allow 3 square feet for each bird in the house. For example, a 20x20 foot laying house has 400 square feet of floor space. On that basis of 3 square feet per bird, it would have a safe capacity for 135 hens.

To cooperate with the state-wide program of more production per hen in Texas poultry flocks, Dawson County home demonstration club women and Four-H club girls and boys are planning chicken culling demonstrations during the month of February. Lee R. Pool, County Agent, will cooperate with Mrs. Myrtle Negy, County Home Demonstration Agent, in these meetings. All poultry raisers, men, women, girls and boys, interested in learning how to cull hens are invited to attend the meetings most convenient to them.

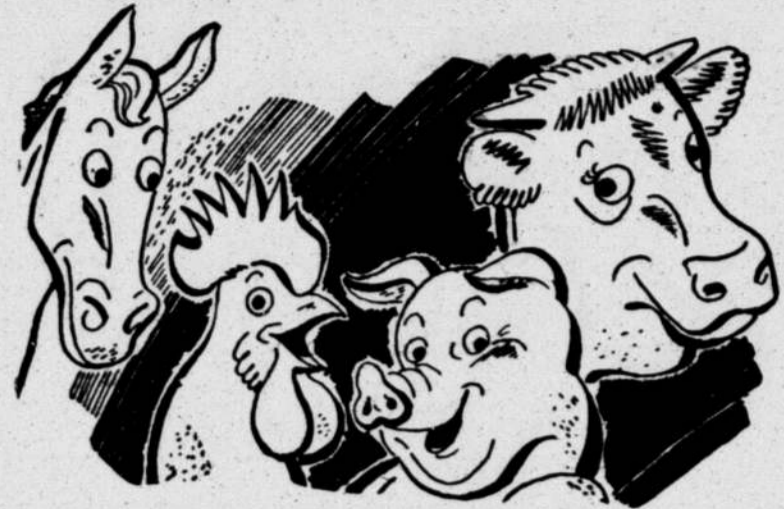

Forum On Many Store Problems to Be Held Tonight

Miss Gertrude Prince, of the University of Texas Division of Extension, who is conducting retail sales courses here states that tonight (Monday) will complete a series of class meetings for Department Store people in Selling During Wartime. The class will be held at the Chamber of Commerce Office from 7:30 until 9:30 p. m.

Miss Prince reports that the discussion tonight should be of special interest to all retailers, who are invited to hear a Post-War Forum on these topics with the following questions to be discussed:

1. Manpower—What about manpower? To what extent will present wage rates be maintained? Will we see a dramatic change in thinking in reference to job analysis and remuneration?
2. Women in Jobs — To what extent will jobs filled by women be carried over, and on what basis?
3. The Retail Personnel Problem—What do you consider will be the most outstanding problems to be faced?
4. Raw Materials—What is the outlook for raw materials, such as cottons, wools, rayons, silk, nylon, other synthetic and new finishes?
5. Textiles—Textiles make up a large portion of our merchandise. How do you think today's new uses for fabrics and finishes will affect postwar merchandising? Will blends and mixtures further advance or will there be a return to all wools, etc.? What part will nylon, casein and other synthetics play in postwar fabrics?
6. Postwar Merchandising — Will there be drastic changes in some types of postwar merchandise? a. What part will plastics play? b. What about metals? c. What part will glassware play? d. What new types of appliances do you expect?
7. Inform the Consumer — How much basic merchandise information do you think consumers will want to have passed on to them in the postwar era?

8. Average sales during the Post-war Period.
