Edgar Hilton Dies of Self Inflicted Shot Gun Wound Monday

The entire community was severely shocked Monday afternoon about 2 o'clock when word went out that Edgar Hilton, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Hilton, of the Prairie Chapel community had died almost instantly from a shot gun wound self inflicted.

Shortly afternoon he went to the home of neighbors, Mr. and Mrs. John Byrd, who were away from home and where he secured a shot gun. From there he went to another neighbors home, Mr. and Mrs. Haskell Byrd, where he borrowed a shell. Mrs. Byrd asked him if he were going hunting to which he made no reply but proceeded to load the gun and placing the barrel near the waist line and stooping over, pulled the trigger. The entire load passed through almost severing the body.

Edgar was born July 22, 1911, being 22 years, 2 months and 3 days old at the time of his death. He was a high school graduate, having attended high school at Sweetwater after finishing the prescribed course at Afton High School and for a time attended schools of this city.

Young Hilton had been in ill health the past three or four years and had brooded over his physical condition and had evidently become so despondent that he preferred death. Reports are that he left a note to that effect among his possessions.

Surviving are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Joe Hilton and two brothers, J. C. and Floyd Hilton.

Funeral Services were conducted at the home by Rev. H. T. Harris, pastor of the Baptist Church of Espuela and interment was made in the Afton cemetery.

Co-op Cotton Office Established in Spur

L. M. Richardson, cotton classifier for the West Texas Cotton Growers Association, arrived in Spur Tuesday and at a conference with business men and farmers made plans for the operation of a Spur branch office of the association. Announcement was made afterwards that the office is now open and ready for business. The new marketing association is replacing the older state-wide association in this territory.

Mr. Richardson stated that one of the most important things done by his organization this year was to join with other co-ops in getting the acreage control plan adopted, in opposition to groups wanting a large crop.

Receiving agents are being appointed to send samples to the Spur office from points where it is not convenient for farmers to bring them. Agents named so far are: M. A. Darden, Girard; W. J. Collier, Afton and Dickens; and Chas. McLaughlin, McAdoo.

The 1933 Spur Football Team ran into stiff opposition Friday when they went against the fast Matador squad and came out on the little side of a 20-0 score. The Matador boys had the edge on the Bulldogs from the start. The Spur team showed up fairly well considering the experience they have had. It was several of the boy's first game.

This was a non-conference game and has no bearing on Spurs standing in the League.

Matador scored in the first period after Spur drew a 15 yd penalty which placed the ball on Spurs 1 yd. line. The second period was a good contest and neither team was in scoring distance, most of the playing was in Matador's territory.

The third quarter was one taken up by fumbles and penalties. Matador showed power by charging down the field from her 20 yd. line to Spur's 12 yd. mark in eight downs.

Spur's chance to score was lost by a fumble when within less than yd. from Matador's goal line.

In the last quarter Matador went down from mid-field on straight football to within easy scoring range and completed the distance with a pass.

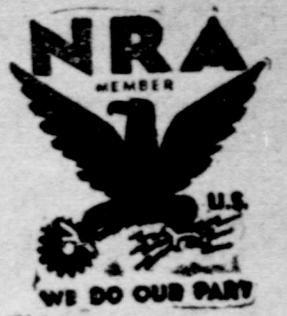
