ELKS SEEKING CHARITY SHOW AID THURSDAY

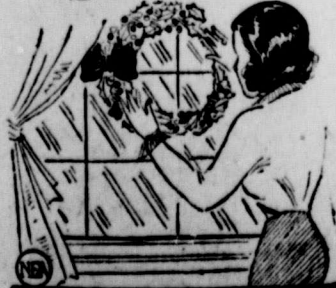
The Cisco Elks today appealed to the citizens of Cisco to aid them in their Christmas charity drive by supporting their charity show tomorrow.

Mary Lou Howell Murder Trial Continued

INSUFFICIENT EVIDENCE FOR CASE REASON

Trial of Mary Lou Howell, charged with murder in the robbery and death of L. P. Threet, Cisco rancher, was continued in 88th district court at Eastland this morning. No date was set for the hearing.

Miss Howell was charged with murder and robbery following the slaying of Threet on his ranch in Callahan county in August, 1934. Also charged in the case were Clifford Doggett, now facing a sentence to die in the electric chair for the murder and Elmer Van Cleave, yet to be tried. Miss Howell's 20-year sentence on the robbery charge recently was reversed and a new trial ordered by the court of criminal appeals at Austin. At the same time the court upheld the death sentence of Doggett on the murder charge.

Insufficient Evidence
In ordering a continuation of the case this morning District Judge B. W. Patterson held that unless the state could offer additional evidence in the case, it would be thrown out of court.

The state's case in the robbery trial of Miss Howell and the two trials of Doggett was based chiefly upon testimony of Van Cleave, who told of being approached by Doggett and being told that a girl was going to take a man to his pasture. He said that he and Doggett went to the pasture and found the man and woman. He testified that Doggett ordered them to put up their hands, and shot Threet when he failed to obey.

NEW DISTRICT RELIEF SETUP AT EASTLAND

Editor's Note: The following article, by F. A. Wells, district administrator of the new relief district number 14, explains the changes in the relief setup for this and nearby counties, effective Jan. 1.

Due to discontinuance of money grants by the Federal Emergency Relief Administration, it is necessary that the Texas Relief Commission discontinue relief to persons or families who are employable or who have employable persons either male or female, within the relief group. This action is taken by the Texas Relief Commission to conserve the funds now on hand for the use of those persons or families who are unemployable and who would suffer through the winter, which lies ahead of us. It is estimated that there are 30,000 such families in Texas.

For the purpose of administering relief, beginning January 1, 1936, the State will be divided into twenty-two districts. The district in which Eastland county will be known as District No. 14, with headquarters at Eastland. Counties comprising this district are Eastland, Shackelford, Stephens, Callahan, Erath, Coleman, Brown, and Comanche. As a result of this retrenchment program, now on administrative payrolls of the Texas Relief Commission, will be dismissed as soon as the business of the present district organizations can be closed out. At any rate not later than January 15, 1936, thereby affecting the saving of approximately \$200,000 per month. Only a skeleton force will be maintained in each county for the administering of relief to unemployables. This force will consist largely of persons now working in the case work department. In this district, certified lists of unemployable persons and families will be submitted each month to the chief accountant at Austin, and checks will be mailed by him to the client semi-monthly. All unemployable clients in this district can expect their first check by mail on or about January 8 and the second on or about January 24.

Aid Is Asked

While WPA will have absorbed a big majority of all employable families now on relief rolls by January 1, we know that there will be some who for one reason or another, will not have employment on WPA projects, but they will not be granted any relief from Texas Relief Commission Funds. Therefore, each city and county must become aware of and realize the seriousness of the situation that will exist in some of the families in their communities, and we earnestly beg you to begin immediately the formulation of plans for assisting those families and individuals whom the Texas Relief Commission will not be able to assist.

In Eastland county, there are now approximately 32,000 unemployables and it is estimated that the

Roosevelt to Back Safety Conference

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18 — President Roosevelt today promised to back to the limit the decisions to be made by Secretary of Commerce Daniel Roper's safety conference in his effort to save American life and limb.

Mr. Roosevelt received conference leaders in his office and chatted informally with them. He said he doubted that anyone knew the solution to the problem but observed it was becoming increasingly grave. He said the government would do its full part in furthering any accident program arrived at by the conferees.

WILL SUBMIT TO WISHES OF LEAGUE BODY

Great Britain and France, confronted with general resentment of their "peace" plan giving half of Ethiopia to Italy, informed the league council at Geneva today they are willing to abandon it.

Captain Anthony Eden of Britain and Premier Pierre Laval of France said if Italy, Ethiopia, or the League objected to it, they will not push the plan. Both suggested the council proceed with some other form of settlement to avert spread of the African war to Europe.

500 Killed In Battle
Report from Addis Ababa from private sources told that more than 500 had been killed on both sides in a three day battle at the Takaze river.

Most of the dead were Italians, the advices said and included an unusually large percentage of whites in contrast to earlier engagements in which most of the victims were Italians native troops.

In London Prime Minister Stanley Baldwin informed the house of commons today Britain has been assured by France if Italy attacks the British fleet in the Mediterranean France will come to Britain's support.

Seymour Coombs, laborite, asked about press reports that France had indicated her inability to support the British fleet Baldwin replied:

"As previously stated, assurances of French support in the event of an Italian attack on the British forces has been received from the French government."

DUCE AND QUEEN LEAD 'DAY OF FAITH'

ROME, Dec. 18 — Premier Benito Mussolini and Queen Elena led the nation today in a "day of faith" on which Italians sought to demonstrate their unity against the world.

Mussolini, in a symbolic ceremony at the inauguration of the new town of Pontinia, which Fascists have reerected on the site of the old disease ridden Pontine marshes, used all his power of oratory to justify his course in East Africa. But he did not disclose his attitude toward the Franco-British proposals for settlement of the Italian-Ethiopian war, which he will discuss at tonight's secret meeting of the Fascist grand council.

MORGAN WILL BE QUIZZED ON WAR FINANCE

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18 — J. P. Morgan and Company and other New York bankers will be called before the senate munitions committee at a hearing on world war financing beginning January 7, it was announced today.

The announcement, made by Stephen Raushenbush, chief committee investigator, was the first definite revelation of plans for continuing the senate inquiry into the American munitions industry.

It followed a communication from the committee's chairman, Senator Gerald Nye, rep. N. D., just returned from Manila and the Orient.

Nye will return to the capital Dec. 24 to confer with other members of the committee's chairman, Senator the munitions investigation to the front during the opening weeks of the new congress.

The Fight for Hauptmann

As time approaches for the execution of Bruno Richard Hauptmann, convicted kidnaper of the Lindbergh baby, every effort is being made to stir up sentiment in favor of the former German carpenter, in order to force through a pardon or at least a commutation of the death sentence.

First it was the iron nerve with which he faced the electric chair, while his wife appealed to the public for aid for the sake of her son. That was natural and there were plenty of people who were willing to swallow that sort of bait without ever bothering to look further into the facts. Then came the plea of Hauptmann's mother and her letter to President Roosevelt.

During the last few days the case has taken a few new turns. All the old tricks are being used as well as several new ones. Stories have leaked out to the effect that Hauptmann has confessed to his part in the crime, while at the same time they are denied and other stories to the effect that startling new evidence which would free the former machine gunner has been discovered.

The very latest development, however, is the plea of Hauptmann to be given the truth serum, and 'lie detector' test, and the announcement that he probably will appeal personally to Dr. John F. Condon, the 'Jafsie' of courtroom fame, to allow the same test to be given him.

The 'lie detector' and truth serum tests are comparatively new in the field of crime detection but have been used successfully in many cases. If they were given and pointed to Hauptmann's innocence, they likely would make his case to come before the New Jersey court of pardons much stronger than it now appears to be.

Either Hauptmann is guilty as convicted or he is innocent. If guilty, he may or may not have had an accomplice, who has not been brought to light in the case thus far. If he is innocent, Jafsie may or may not know more than he has told—or he may know less. Jafsie might be mistaken in the man, or he might have been bluffing when he testified against him.

While the evidence presented in the New Jersey court last winter appeared to prove that Hauptmann actually was the guilty man, there were certain peculiarities about the case that left the average person pondering it for some time. Dr. Condon was one of the most puzzling of all the persons and incidents in the whole affair. Certainly he was willing to testify in the case. As a matter of fact, it even appeared that he was too willing to testify. The eccentric educator may have been doing what he believed was his duty, or he may have been seeking publicity at the expense of an accused man and the state of New Jersey.

The 'lie detector' test might point to something, the innocence or guilt of Hauptmann, the truth or falsehood of Dr. Condon. The question now seems to be not "Shall Hauptmann be given the test?" but "if the test is of any value, why has it not been given the prisoner long before now?"

Ethiopia Comes to Life

After sitting idly by and waiting for the League of Nations to settle their fight with Italy, the Ethiopians yesterday took things into their own hands and started out to settle it themselves.

So far in this strange battle between black shirts and black skins in Africa the tide of victory had been in favor of the visiting team. But yesterday the Italians were driven back twelve and a half miles by a fierce onslaught of 3,000 Ethiopians.

Italy is having a far more difficult time than Mussolini and his followers expected in conquering the ancient African kingdom. If it is not conquered soon the seasonal rains will set in again and Italy will have to start all over. Meanwhile there is nothing so dampening to the spirits of a football team, a crowd of shoppers, or an army as rain. It dampens the ardor of the boys back home, footing the bill, too, and regardless of his present position, Signor Mussolini might find himself whacking away with a dull knife at a knotted purse string.

If Santa Clause brings his reindeers down in this part of the country and does not keep a constant eye on them he is likely to find them between two slices of bread in some one's lunch basket.

Olympic Tests In Philadelphia Soon

PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 18.—Two preparatory warm-ups for the 1936 Olympics will be held in Philadelphia this winter. Both events to be held under auspices of the Middle Atlantic A. A. U., will consist of track and field events.

The program was arranged by Olympic and A. A. U. officials here, but a definite date for the events was not set. It was decided, however, that they would take place in Convention Hall.

A third track and field event also has been arranged for Jan. 7, in an armory here, according to Law-

son Robertson, track coach at the University of Pennsylvania and U. S. Olympic coach.

Robertson, suffering from a broken leg, was unable to attend the meeting at which plans were arranged for the two other events, but voiced his approval of such a program.

It also was announced by Robertson that a preliminary meet of Eastern Olympic contestants here July 3 and 4.

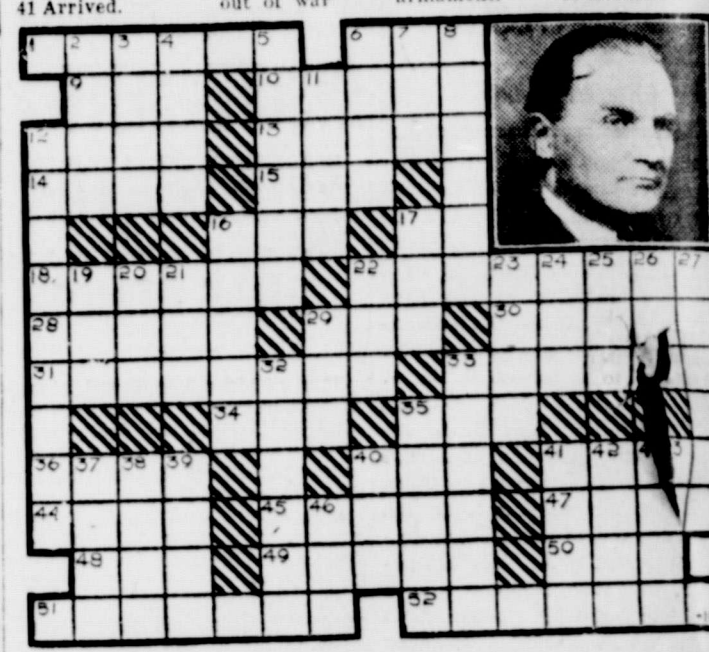

FLORIDA GOAL OF 27 CLUBS IN TRAINING TREK

MIAMI, Fla., Dec. 18—At least 27, and possibly 30, major and minor league baseball teams will train in Florida next spring.

Headed by the World Champion Detroit Tigers, who will train at Lakeland again, the teams will bring more than 600 players to the state for the training season which begins late in February and closes early in April. It is estimated that 50 exhibition games will be played. The baseball trek starts soon after Christmas, although many players spend the entire winter season in Florida and scores of them own homes in the state.

By mid-February the trek will be on in earnest and late in that month the clubs, including officials and attaches, come in for the training grind.

Sessions Open to Public
Training periods usually begin at 9 o'clock in the morning and last until about 2 o'clock. They are open to the public and scores of fans avail themselves of this opportunity to see their favorites in action.

Practice includes limbering up exercises, batting, pitching and fielding workouts, base running, and other features.
It is estimated that more than \$500,000 is spent by clubs during the training season in Florida which baseball men have come to regard as necessary to a successful season.

Cubs to Play in Florida
The Chicago Cubs, who will limber up in California, will cross the country to play an exhibition series in Florida before moving on to Chicago for the season's opening. Back in 1933 the New York Giants came from California to train at Miami Beach. They shift their camp to Pensacola in 1936.

Court Martial 20 Years Later Faced

PARIS, Dec. 18.—Sentenced to death for desertion from the French army 20 years ago, a soldier must appear before a court martial in Paris.
Felix Weissman, under the influence of his French mother, left Germany at the outbreak of the war and enlisted in the French army. After being wounded later, his feelings underwent a change and he made his way to Germany and was posted to the regiment he should have joined when originally called up for service.

When the news of his action followed through to France he was in his absence sentenced to death for desertion.

Years afterward, believing that his history had been forgotten, Weissman returned to French territory, where he was later denounced. Military authorities are not seeking enforcement of the death penalty, but they insist on some punishment to mark disapproval of Weissman's conduct, since he enlisted of his own free will on the plea of sympathy for France.

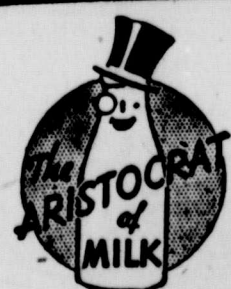

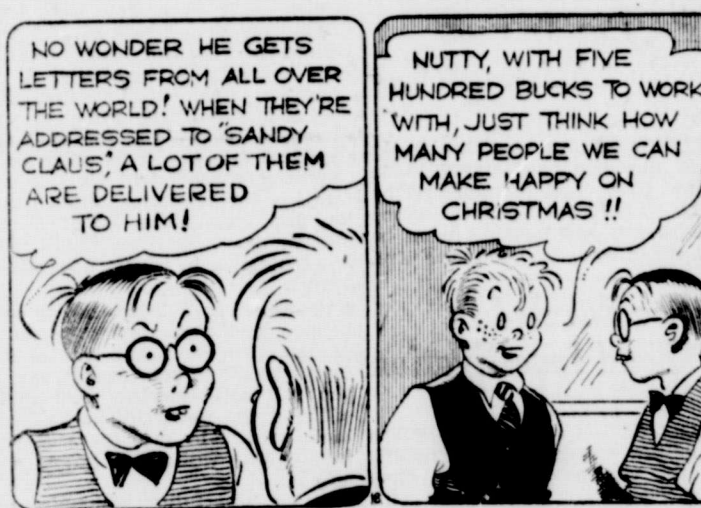

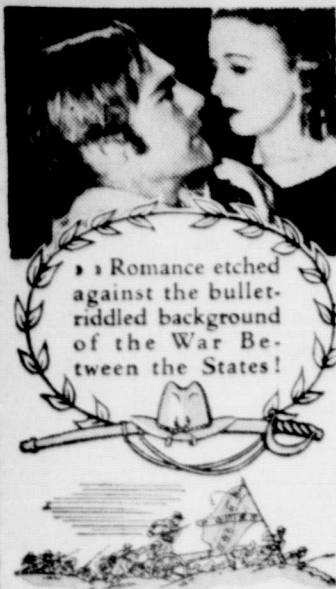

City Relief Rolls Drop 9.4 Per Cent

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18 — Federal delay in getting the \$4,000,000,000 work relief program under way resulted in a decline of only 9.4 per cent in the nation's urban relief rolls between October and November official figures revealed today.

The November dole listed 1,694,130 families and single persons, compared with 1,770,739 cases the month before, a decline of 166,609.

Relief costs dropped 9,838,142 between the two months. Direct relief cost \$42,340,559 in November and \$53,178,701 the month before. The figures were compiled from 145 of the nation's largest cities.

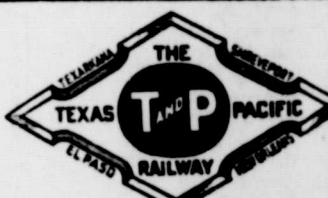
