

DEMO LEADERS SAY THIRD TERM EFFORT WOULD SPLIT PARTY

Garner to Be In Race In Key Event

WASHINGTON (UP)—Important democratic leaders asserted today that any effort to nominate President Roosevelt for a third term would precipitate a "party jarring" contest, which might put the ticket out of the running in the November election next year. That information is confided privately by men who are uncertain of Roosevelt's plan, but who would be glad to avoid an open break with him if he took himself out of the race during the next two or three months.

Roosevelt heads the list of five democrats, among whom are many political veterans, from which the party will find its nominee next year. The others are Postmaster General Farley, Vice-President Garner, Secretary of State Hull, and Federal Securities Administrator McNutt.

Garner-for-president campaign managers ended the so-called political truce over the weekend with the announcement of a drive to organize a majority of the states for their man in the next two months. Garner's name will go before the convention regardless of Roosevelt's third term decision.

McNutt, who apparently is Roosevelt's choice if his own presidential campaign fails, fits the compromise picture frame fairly well. Farley has said "no" to McNutt's nomination and meant it.

Farley, who is also chairman of the national democratic committee, counts McNutt as a political doublecrosser and has said so, publicly and privately. Next to Roosevelt, Farley is the most influential party man.

Garner, Farley and Hull are the men upon whom conservative democrats could agree with a minimum of reluctance. They are men of flawless party records. If Roosevelt gets behind any one of this three, the matter could be settled next year in a single ballot.

The friends of neither man, however, will permit new dealers to forget that Garner and Farley, more than any other men, contributed to Mr. Roosevelt's nomination in 1932. There would be some snappy talk of ingratitude if he refused to accept either of them.

PERSONALITIES TODAY'S PROFILE

S. Hurok—his first name never is used—is the nation's chief importer of artistic talent, one of the leading impressarios. He is a quiet man of simple tastes, owns no automobiles, spends most of his time at his office, and has an extraordinarily keen interest in world events. He has been known to keep the most resplendent names in the concert world waiting while he pored over the latest editions of the newspapers.

At 15 his father, a Russian hardware merchant, gave him 1,500 rubles to go to Moscow to learn the hardware business. Instead, Hurok ran away to America. He arrived at Philadelphia with 90 cents. He peddled needles, washed bottles, bundled papers and got a job as street car conductor. Music-mad, he scraped his pennies to go to concerts. Three years later—at 18—he formed a music society in New York and had the temerity to ask famous concert artists to appear at obscure halls. They accepted.

He put on popular priced concerts at the Hippodrome and began to import talent—Pavlova, Chaliapin, Isadora Duncan, the Salzburg Opera Guild, the German Grand Opera, the Vienna Choir Boys, the Ballet Russe de Monte Carlo and numerous others. He is considered the top man at handling temperamental artists.

He saved one concert when Escudero, the Spanish dancer, wanted to walk out by teaching him to use the yo-yo top—a child's toy. He persuaded Chaliapin to stay in the United States by catering to the giant Russian's fondness for beefsteak.

He is a treasure house of artistic anecdote, and his memoirs would make half a dozen books. Most of what he knows is not for publication, however, he says.

His artistic work takes up so

much of his time that he has little leisure for outside interests. He is a daring operator in his own field. The last great ballet to play the United States before the Ballet Russe de Monte Carlo lost \$350,000. Hurok made a personal survey, decided the time was ripe and grossed \$850,000 in the depth of the depression. An accomplished road man, he is reputed to know the tastes

of every town large enough for a concert.

The job of taking care of the disabled veterans has not yet been completed, and the bill which is due them will not be paid for the next 30 years.—Lewis J. Murphy, national commander, Disabled American Veterans of the World War.

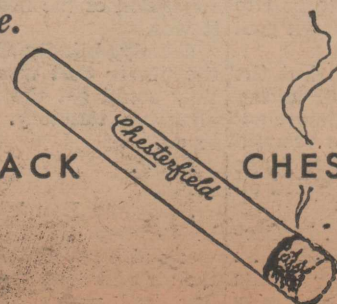
