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## HOME TOWN Talk

The extreme cold weather experienced in this area during the past few days may have set some sort of record for this time of the year, with temperatures plunging to the mid-teens at times—15 degrees last Thursday—the high winds, and then the ice which hit the first of the week, paralyzing most commercial traffic, and closing schools Tuesday.

Even though there was a good bit of traffic around town—skidding on the icy streets—and on the highways Tuesday, there was not mail service from Abilene Tuesday morning, and many freight trucks were off the highways. The big bottle-necks were said to be in the larger cities—Abilene, Fort Worth and Dallas—causing a pile-up of mail and freight trucks.

We get so used to normal movement of freight and mail that if something happens once in a while to delay them, we have a tendency to think that this is the first time it has ever happened—it's the annoyance of the moment which stands out in our minds, and we forget that there have been few years in the past when we did not experience this kind of inconvenience.

Things have a habit of quickly returning to normal, however, and we'll forget about the inconvenience—until the next time.

Marvin Bedford, who recalls the coal oil, kindling and coal stove era, figures that if they had invented the "Wind Chill Factor" back in those days, most of the population would have been frozen out.

So what else is new? To prove how unexciting the reports of space exploration have become—to the average man, at least—consider that actual live telecasts of the astronauts on the moon were squeezed in during halftime of the Monday night football game, and only a few short scenes were shown—the rest of the time being taken over by shots of pro football games which had been played over the previous weekend.

Some of us all of the time, and many of us much of the time, need or think we need, a "whipping boy" or "kicking post," someone or something to blame for all our troubles, from hangnails to bankruptcy. When we run out of targets, the Post Office—or U. S. Postal Service—since the past few years—is always a likely and available bull's-eye. It's there, and it touches practically all of us in some way or another. So what's a more convenient target?

It's true that the mail service isn't what it used to be—or so we believe, at any rate. It may be true that we can get overnight service from here to Albuquerque, but it takes a little longer to get a letter delivered into the next county, and perhaps slightly longer for delivery to a town in the same county. Also, we now get one going mail and one coming mail in a day, where we used to get a couple of each daily.

We tend to forget, too, that the entire postal system is in the throes of change—the same as about everything else. It has supposedly been removed from the political patronage arena, and made into a non-private, semi-public, anti-political, quasi-governmental organization... neither man nor beast. Therefore, there are bound to be many changes.

We also tend to forget, however, that one snow goose does (Continued on page 3)

## Winters Gets \$17,070 In Revenue Sharing

The City of Winters Monday received a check for \$17,070 from the federal treasury, the first payment in the new national revenue-sharing plan.

This check was the first of two installments, and covered a period Jan. 1, 1972, to June 30, 1972. Another check, for the same amount, covering the last six months of 1972, is expected in January.

Runnels County's first-payment share was \$79,245, it was announced. The City of Ballinger received \$23,835, and Miles, \$1,680.

One percent of the amount designated for each county and municipality was withheld as a reserve, but will be paid eventually, it was stated.

Mayor Wade White said Monday there are no definite plans at this time to use the money, "except where it will do the most good." The City Council will channel the funds into the appropriate departments, it was indicated, there are several requirements and restrictions regarding the funds, it has been stated, and governing boards are expected to be cautious in expenditures involving this federal money.

## City Acquires Additional Land For Enlarging Airport, Extending Runway

The Winters City Airport, situated southwest of town, will be enlarged, the runway extended and paved, and other improvements made, it was officially announced this week.

The City Council Monday authorized payment of \$8,002.00 for the additional land needed for the improvement project.

City sources pointed out that the State will reimburse the City of Winters for this purchase. They said the Texas Aeronautics Commission has earmarked \$34,500.00 as a grant to the City of Winters to be used in airport improvement. It was understood that the City must match this amount, but that Winters' portion may be "in kind," that is, present facilities and land can be counted as the city's portion.

Surveys for airport improvement have already been made, it was stated. Plans call for

## Hearing Held On County Pay Increases

A public hearing was held in the office of Runnels County Judge Elliott Kemp Tuesday morning on the proposed salary increases for county officials and employees.

A 5.5 percent increase had been asked for all county officials and employees. This is the maximum rate of increase allowed under the federal price control regulations.

The commissioners court will act on the proposal. Present salaries of county officials are \$8,100 for county auditor, county attorney, county judge, county tax assessor-collector, county sheriff and county clerk. The proposed increase would raise these salaries by \$445.50 per year.

Salaries of the county treasurer and district clerk would be increased to \$7,804.80 from \$7,398, under the proposed increase.

The proposed 5.5 percent increase also would apply to the county's share of the salaries of the county home demonstration agent, \$3,219.36, and the county agent, \$3,813.00, Judge Kemp said.

Salaries of employees in county offices range from \$1,900 to \$6,864, Judge Kemp said. All of these salaries would be included in the proposed 5.5 percent increase.

Judge Kemp said the commissioners court had originally planned a 15 percent increase for employees, but under the government price control rules, 5.5 percent is the limit for wage increases.

## Preliminary Plans For Pipeline Expected About First Of New Year

Preliminary plans for the distribution pipeline of North Runnels Rural Water Supply Corporation are expected to be completed for further study around the first of the new year, it was learned this week.

C. T. Parker, Runnels County extension agent, who had been instrumental in developing the proposed rural water supply distribution system, said engineers have indicated they expect to have the first location plans completed by January 1. This plan, or map, will show proposed location of the pipelines, size of lines, and other information which will be needed.

After they receive the plans, the board of directors of the corporation will make a complete study of the proposals, make changes and recommendations, and turn the plans back to the engineers for completion of final plans.

When plans are completed and approved by the board, final applications will be made for grants and loans from the Farmers Home Administration for funds to build the system.

Parker said that after talking to the engineers, he felt that the first plans should be ready with two or three weeks.

Because rural development is one of the goals of the Nixon Administration, Parker said, it is felt that this system, when plans are completed, will receive a good response in seeking approval.

About 535 rural residents of North Runnels County acquired membership in the proposed organization, which was incorporated last summer, in an effort to obtain a workable water distribution system, and good water. Much of the well water in the area has become nitrate-contaminated, and has been classified as unfit for human consumption, and in some instances, unfit for animal consumption. This fact also probably will have an effect on the priority approval for the proposed system, Parker said.

LaDell Davis, president of the corporation, has said that the board and the membership will be kept informed on work progress.

## Mesquite, Brush Control Big Problem For County Ranchers

Mesquite and brush control is still one of the biggest problems facing the farmers and ranchmen in the Runnels Soil and Water Conservation District.

Pastures, that have only small areas of good grasses on them, will lose three-fourths of the annual rainfall in the form of runoff. Mesquite, Catclaw, Lotebrush, Tasaajillo, and other undesirable plants will use at least half of the remainder. This leaves very little available water for grass production.

Gerald Merz, range conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service at Ballinger said

## Cotton Half Gathered, 6433 Bales Are In

Gathering of the 1972 cotton crop in North Runnels County is about 50 percent completed, warehouse, gin and farm sources estimated the first of this week, as cold, wet weather again dampened stripping in the area.

Winters Warehouse Co. said Monday that 6433 bales have been brought to Winters from North Runnels gins.

The USDA Cotton Classing Office in Abilene classed approximately 40,000 samples for the week ending December 8, it was announced. This was almost twice the number classed the previous week, from the area served by the Abilene office, and brings the season total to 124,000 classed. Last season, only 11,715 samples had been classed by this date at the Abilene office, according to B. B. Manly Jr., in charge of that office.

Grades and staples of samples classed at the Abilene office remained much the same as those of the previous week, with 47 percent of the samples graded white, 44 percent graded light spotted, and nine percent graded spotted. Staple lengths 30, 31 and 32 were 16, 50 and 27 percent, respectively.

Presence of bark in samples declined for the second week straight. Only 22 percent was barky this past week, as compared to 32 and 56 percent the two prior weeks, the Abilene office said.

Cotton prices were steady or increased. The price for grade 4131 ranged from 21.55 to 23.25. 4231's ranged in price from 20.25 to 22.25 and 5231's brought from 19.10 to 19.75 cents per pound.

Prices paid farmers for cottonseed varied from \$47 to \$54 per ton.

### APPLESAUCE

Applesauce once had its season. During the days of Johnny Appleseed, people cooked their own apple sauce from fresh apples, and the only time they could enjoy applesauce and apple pie was when apples were in season.

They produced apple juice or apple cider, but this lasted only until the juice eventually turned to vinegar.

Include applesauce in your breakfast with these tasty:

**Applesauce Pancakes**  
2 c. packaged biscuit mix  
1/4 c. cinnamon  
2 T. sugar  
2 eggs  
1 c. milk  
2 c. canned applesauce  
**For the Spiced Syrup:**  
1/2 c. butter  
2 c. maple flavored syrup  
1 tsp. cinnamon  
1/4 tsp. mace  
1/4 tsp. allspice  
Combine biscuit mix, cinnamon, sugar, eggs, milk and applesauce. Beat until smooth. Bake on hot, lightly greased griddle. Makes about 12 large pancakes.

Serve hot with maple syrup or Spiced Syrup. To make the Spiced Syrup, combine all ingredients in saucepan. Boil two minutes over medium heat. Beat with egg beater until blended. Makes 2 1/2 cups.

**Apple Spice Muffins**  
3/4 c. milk  
1 egg, beaten  
1/4 c. melted butter  
1/2 c. applesauce  
2 c. flour  
1/2 c. sugar  
1 T. baking powder  
1/2 tsp. salt  
1 tsp. cinnamon  
1/4 c. raisins, chopped  
Add milk to egg, stir in butter and applesauce. Mix dry ingredients thoroughly, then stir in raisins. Add liquid mixture and stir just until most of the dry ingredients are moistened. Do not overmix, as batter should be lumpy. Fill greased muffin tins two-thirds full. Bake at 400 degrees for 20 to 25 minutes, or until golden brown. Makes 12 muffins.

**Apple-Ginger Dessert**  
1 envelope unflavored gelatin  
1/4 c. orange juice  
2 c. canned applesauce  
1/4 c. sugar  
1/2 tsp. ginger  
1 tsp. grated lemon rind  
1/4 c. chopped, candied ginger  
1 c. heavy cream  
1/2 c. chopped nuts  
Soften gelatin in orange juice. Dissolve over boiling water. Combine gelatin, applesauce, sugar, lemon rind, ginger and candied ginger. Chill until partially thickened. Whip the cream and pour half of it into applesauce mixture. Spread applesauce mixture over giant cookie. Garnish with remaining whipped cream and chopped nuts. Serves 6 to 8.

**Giant Cookie**  
1/2 c. butter  
3/4 c. light brown sugar  
1 egg  
1 tablespoon milk  
1 tsp. lemon extract  
1 1/4 c. flour  
1/4 tsp. baking powder  
1/4 tsp. salt  
Cream butter and light brown sugar, add egg and mix well. Add milk and lemon extract. Sift flour, baking powder and salt, then add to creamed mixture. Mix until dough is smooth. Spread on greased baking sheet in a 9 inch circle. Bake in 375 degree oven for 30 to 35 minutes. Remove cookie to cake rack and cool.

### IMPORT CURB PLEA RESTATED

The Interstate Oil Compact Commission again urged strengthening of the federal mandatory oil import control program.

However, U. S. Sen. Henry M. Jackson of Washington told the 34-state group at a meeting in Houston a special Senate committee already has determined domestic oil and gas reserves are inadequate.

IOCC further called for a comprehensive national energy policy to assure dependable domestic supplies and lessen the need for foreign oil and gas imports.

## HEALTH FOR ALL

**NONSMOKING JETS**  
Even jets are trying to quit smoking.

The nation's major airlines have reduced the visible pollutants from almost half their fleet of jetliners. Predictions are that by the end of the year—hopefully before the height of the holiday air traffic—the engines on these jets will be almost smokeless. The "black behemoth" that streaks across the sky will be, say the airlines, gone with the wind.

To comply with a 1970 agreement with the federal government, the airlines agreed to install control devices to curb smoke pollutants on their big jets. Six lines have completed the conversion project, and 85 percent of all engines on three types of jetliners are now equipped with the new devices.

The antipollution devices, called burner cans, eliminate a fourth of all pollutants, both visible and invisible. Visible pollutants are cut about 70 percent. Taking the country as a whole, the jets are not a major source of air pollution. But they are a highly significant contributor to the already heavy pollution levels near metropolitan airports. Pollution is what cities don't need more of.

So jets are trying to quit smoking on the outside. And on the inside, most jets separate smokers from nonsmokers. People are demanding their right to breathe clean air and — more and more — getting it.

The campaign for cleaner air didn't just happen. It took a lot of pushing and pulling from all kinds of citizen groups and concerned agencies. Your local tuberculosis and respiratory disease association is one of those agencies. To help support the fight

against air pollution, emphysema, TB, and smoking, answer your Christmas Seal letter right away. It's a matter of life and breath.

### COURTS SPEAK

While upholding a 1,001-year sentence for rape, the Court of Criminal Appeals pointed out such sentences serve no purpose, since those under them are eligible for release on parole in 20 years.

The show is open to all junior livestock exhibitors, FFA members and 4-H Club members in the Winters and Wingate school districts.

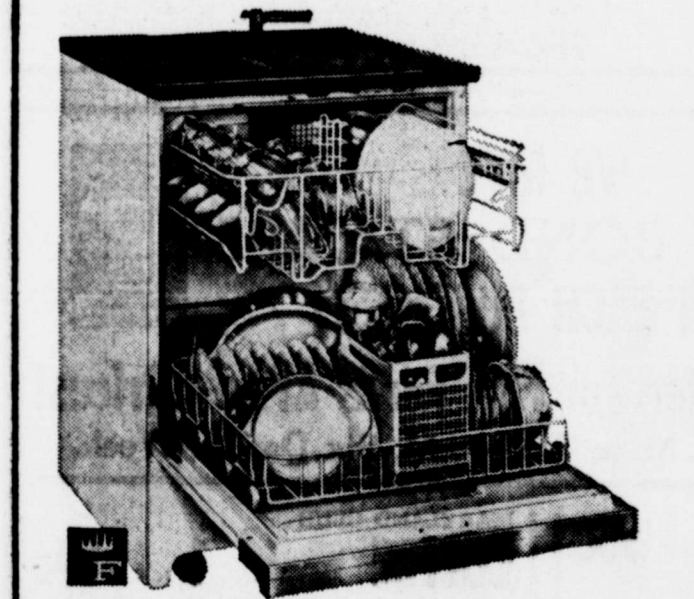

## MACHINE TOOL INDUSTRY RECOVERING

Wellesley Hills, Mass.—After an extremely disappointing showing in the past few years, the machine tool industry is currently registering considerable improvement. The new-order rate turned the corner some months ago and now appears to be in a strong upturn, with the improvement likely to continue throughout the coming year.

## A RECESSION CASUALTY

The machine tool industry was particularly hard hit by the 1969-70 economic recession. According to Dep't of Commerce figures, total new orders for machine tools fell 47 percent in 1970 from the year-earlier level. Because of the time lag between new orders and shipments, however, the latter declined by only about 10 percent. This resulted in a fast erosion of backlogs,

which as the end of 1970 were a whopping 41 percent below the corresponding year-earlier level.

In the following year the new order rate receded still further, but this time by only 6 percent. The big decline in 1971 occurred in shipments which fell 31 percent and again the order backlog also declined.

The depressed industry conditions were reflected in the operating results of the machine tool builders. Furthermore, because costs could not be cut quickly enough to offset the decline in sales, profit margins deteriorated. Thus, by 1971 net income of the machine tool producers had been substantially reduced and in some cases had been replaced by a red-ink figure.

## A CYCLICAL UPTURN

While machine tool orders began to bottom out in the second half of 1971, it wasn't until the first half of this year that the recovery picked up any steam. Latest available figures indicate that the industry may now be in a solid upturn.

Aided by a strong rise in domestic demand, machine tool orders in October were 1.5 percent above the September rate and more than double the October 1971 figure. Perhaps even more significant is the fact that machine tool orders have exceeded \$100 million for seven of the past eight months.

While industry shipments for the first 10 months of 1972 continue to trail the year-earlier rate due to the time lag between new orders and shipments, the full-year total should be on the upside. And since shipments have trailed new orders every month so far this year, backlogs are swelling and at the end of October stood at \$583.6 million vs. \$573 million a year earlier. With the economy expected to register further gains in 1973, the new-order rate should remain strong while shipments continue to move higher.

## LONGER TERM OUTLOOK

Looking further ahead, machine tool shipments could remain strong over the next few years. Demand is expected to benefit from the growing emphasis on profitability by many companies. In this respect domestic metalworking plants have not kept pace with the other major industrialized countries in the replacement of machine tools. It is estimated that some 60 percent of the machine tools in domestic metalworking plants may be considered obsolete.

Barring another economic downturn, it appears that the machine tool industry could operate in a favorable atmosphere through 1975. In fact, the U. S.

not make a winter, and that one delayed letter or package is not an indication of a complete breakdown.

Even in the face of all the changes (whether or not they exist, or whether or not we understand or like them) which have taken place in the towering structure of the mail service, on the local level we are fortunate. In our direct contacts with the Postal Service, we do not deal with nonentities or anonymous faces. We deal with actual persons, our friends, our neighbors, our coffee-mates, our social equals. They are representatives of the Postal Service, and pretty good reps they make, too. Knowing them as we do, we can understand—or should understand—the problems they face. We can understand the gigantic tasks they face in their attempts to keep the mail moving, and in giving the best local service possible. If something goes wrong up the line, they are present to take the brunt of our displeasure, without possibility of recourse. If the mail is late in arriving, they face the task of getting it out to us as early as they would under normal circumstances (something we have grown to expect), which is no small job in itself.

During the Christmas season, the people of the post office are under overnormal pressure. The amount of mail handling increases tremendously, and yet they have to meet the same schedules. But they keep at it, in their efforts to please each individual, and somehow they get the job done... between answering complaints about circumstances over which they have no control, and trying to figure out why Aunt Tidley's package has not arrived. So the next time we're in the post office, let's give them a little howdy and at least a slight smile of approval... they may think the whole world has gone cockeyed, but it'll help to lighten their loads a bit, we'll bet.

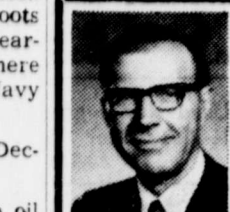

## Dyess Planes To Make Low-Level Flights In Area

USAF aircraft stationed at Dyess Air Force Base, Abilene, have been scheduled to make a series of low altitude flights over North Runnels County and the rest of the Big Country, on a daily basis, in training exercises, the Air Force Base has announced.

These low level flights may be scheduled between 8 a. m. and midnight, Monday through Friday, and less frequently on weekends, the announcement said.

Planes will be from the 463rd Tactical Airlift Wing (TAW) at Dyess. The Wing has a world wide commitment which requires continuous low level flying training, and the highest possible degree of proficiency must be maintained and aircrews must be current in all modes of aerial delivery. C-130 Hercules aircraft are used in the exercise.

Daylight missions are flown at an altitude of 500 feet above the terrain while night low level activities are conducted at least 1,000 feet above any obstacle, man-made or geographic, within three miles of the prescribed route. Airspeeds will vary from 150 to 290 miles per hour.

All flights are made along specific routes which are approved by Tactical Air command. Minimum disturbances of farms, ranches, and communities is the primary consideration in selecting low level routes, the announcement said. Towns, local airports, resorts, hatcheries and stock pens are avoided when planning the routes and will not be overflown under normal circumstances.

Officials of the 463rd Wing have emphasized that, even though training must be conducted at low level and high airspeed in order to be realistic, all possible precautions are taken to prevent disruption of local agriculture and community activities.

Training flights will be made over the following counties: Knox, Haskell, Stonewall, Baylor, Shackelford, Throckmorton, Garza, Fisher, Jones, Stephens, Mitchell, Nolan, Taylor, Callahan, Eastland, Coke, Runnels, Coleman, Brown and Tom Green.

Although the primary mission of the 463rd TAW is a military one, its aircraft and crews are ready, able and willing to assist in a non-military role. In the past, the wing has provided to help in flood relief, hurricane assistance, air-evacuating burn patients to the burn treatment center in San Antonio, air dropping hay to stranded cattle, and pursuing aircraft hijackers.

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Austin.—Proposals for major "reform" statutes and changes in the House and Senate rules have been drawn by Texas legislative leaders.

Rep. Price Daniel Jr., Liberty, slated to be the next Speaker of the House of Representatives, has announced a nine-point "reform" program. Several Senate members and Lt. Gov.-elect Bill Hobby, Houston, have discussed proposals to change some of the "reform" rules adopted by the fourth called session of the 62nd Legislature.

Speaking to a seminar sponsored by the Texas Society of Association Executives, Daniel discussed these proposed changes in state statutes—which he feels are necessary because of a "mandate" of Texas voters this year.

1. A one term limit for the Speaker of the House of Representatives. 2. Elimination of the pledge card system for election of the House Speaker—where pledges are exchanged for support of legislation.

3. Disclosure by the Speaker of contributions to support his campaign for that office.

4. A limit on the number of conferees on tax bills.

5. A new "open records" law which would provide more access to public documents—with certain guidelines and safeguards.

6. Improvement of campaign contribution laws.

7. Tightening of the laws governing lobbyist registration.

8. An ethics code for legislators.

9. Changes in the state's "Open Meetings" law to provide the public with more information about actions of governmental bodies.

Daniel said these proposed "reform" measures should not be tagged with "liberal" or "conservative" labels.

"Liberal and conservative labels are unfair to the 77 new members of the Legislature. They have not yet cast a vote. The new members will be more independent and reform minded, because that's what the voters demanded in the primary, runoff and general elections this year," he added.

"I don't believe we should over-react to the problems of the past," he said when he discussed major changes in House rules which will be introduced.

## LAWMAKERS LOOK AT BUDGET

Key lawmakers who make up the Legislative Budget Board met here this week to take a look at multi-million-dollar state spending plans the legislature

must pass on soon.

Other signs of preparation for a vital and stormy 63rd legislative session are apparent.

Lt. Gov.-elect Hobby has moved into temporary offices and has assembled a staff.

Speaker-elect Daniel also is putting together a staff.

Both the incoming Lieutenant Governor and Speaker are working on their assignments to key standing committees which process legislation, although they prefer not to talk too much publicly about this important chore.

The Legislature, under new leadership and with a near-record crop of freshmen members, faces a staggering array of tasks.

In addition to the usual problems of making spending fit income, lawmakers have assigned themselves a monumental task of furthering legislative reform.

A hangover from the 1971 session is House of Representatives redistricting which must be redone or left to a federal court for boundary realignment.

Big decisions will also be necessary in the education field if the U. S. Supreme Court upholds a December 1971, decision invalidating the present Texas system of financing public school education.

## "SHIELD LAW" BACKED

Speaker-to-be Daniel has informed newspapers, radio and television stations he will back a bill in the Legislature next year to protect confidentiality of news sources.

Daniel's letter to publishers and station heads noted the U. S. Supreme Court has held newsmen do not have constitutional rights to protect their news sources.

"It is my firm belief that, in the face of the recent ruling, and without statutory protection, the inevitable result will be loss of confidential sources of information," said Daniel.

"News sources will dry up, thus depriving the public of the fullest news coverage possible. For the press to be an effective watchdog over public affairs and government officials, newsmen should not be required to disclose confidential news sources."

Daniel's bill provides that no newsmen may be required to disclose information or sources of information obtained in confidence in the course of news gathering and distribution. The privilege conferred would not extend to actions for libel, slander or invasion of privacy.

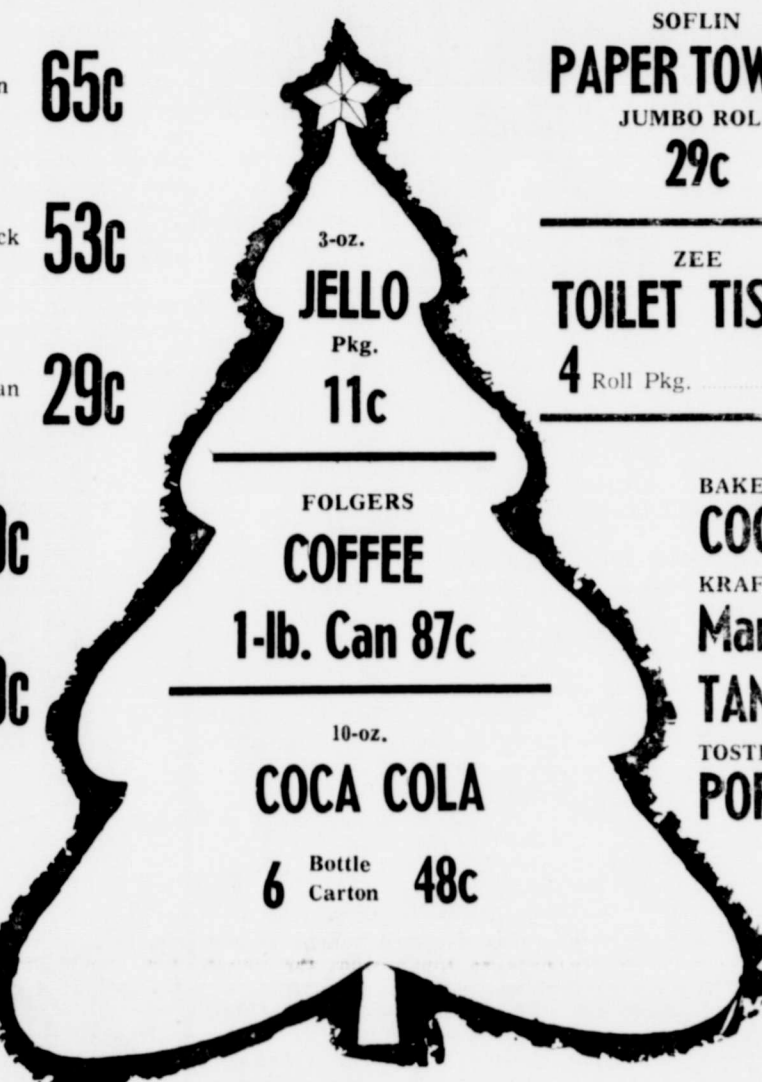

**Check All Gear Carefully**  
He checks to see that each of his four or five rods is solid, has no cracks or breaks of any kind — anywhere; that the line-guides are smooth on the inside, with no rough spots or abrasions; and that the tip-top guide is cemented on tightly.

Furthermore, he corrects immediately any faults he finds. Next he makes a critical inspection of the reel—takes it apart, cleans, oils and greases it thoroughly.

If a break-test reveals a weak line he replaces all the line on the spool. If the line is strong but the supply is low he adds more line, filling the spool to within 1/8" of the tip and no more.

He knows that a properly filled spool means easier casting and fewer lost fish. Also he realizes that nylon line stretches. Therefore he doesn't fill the spool to overflowing, for after battling with a lunker he may not be able to bring the bass in close enough to net.

**Always Carries Spare Line**  
In case of emergencies Mr. Cautious Angler invariably carries in his tackle box an extra spool or two of brand new line.

Once he has seated the reel securely in the rod handle the angler will tie the end of the line to the shank of the rod, or attach a snap swivel and loop the line around the rod.

If he is taking along a closed-face reel for top-water fishing in open areas, he ties the end of the line to a round paper clip to prevent the line from retreating through the hung-hole in the reel cap.

For safety reasons he does not attach a lure until ready to make the cast.

Other items on his must list include an extra supply of gasoline; a tool kit for emergency repairs; a jug of ice water; an icebox of refreshments; at least three rods with matching reels for worm fishing; bait casting and top-water angling.

Also an anchor or two, a bail bucket, a flashlight, a hook pole, two paddles, a seat cushion for each passenger and we hope a

"coast-guard approved" life vest for everyone aboard.

**Depth Finder Now a Must**  
Naturally there are other essentials such as a trolling motor and a depthfinder, together with the necessary batteries to operate the 100 H.P. or larger powerhouse on the transom, the fish locator in between.

All of which explains why today's bass boats carry only two passengers and have grown in length from 14 to 15 to 16 footers; while the lure cases have expanded from cigar-box-size to six, seven and eight deckers.

And the best is yet to come, for new gadgets for fishermen are being manufactured every day.

That day is coming, in the not too distant future, when you will be carrying another license card in your billfold. Or, perhaps we should add — if you qualify.

Already you are licensed to drive a car, or you'd better not drive. Also you must possess a license before you can pilot a plane, or you'll be in violation of both State and Federal laws.

In both cases you must demonstrate certain abilities and prove that you are knowledgeable of safety regulations and procedures before you can obtain these permits.

Today there are millions of boats operating in the fresh wa-

ters of these United States. Yet very few of the owners have even taken, much less passed, a safe driving course.

Such a requirement is coming . . . and sooner than you think. Stringent safety regulations have already been written into the Federal laws. They are still inadequate, but far better than none at all. These rules are for your good. They were drafted for your protection and will be enforced for your benefit. Strict adherence to them may save your life, or the life of your family or closest friends.

But, instruction is not mandatory; nor is a "driver's license" required of boat operators who operate recreational vehicles. For many years private groups, government organizations and the Coast Guard thought that safety laws relative to boating were unnecessary. So voluntary safety courses were offered by the Coast Guard Auxiliary, the U. S. Power Squadron and others.

However, only one out of five recreational vehicle owners enrolled. So, another boating self-study program soon may be available, with participation as a possible basis for issuance of a license by individual states under Federal guidelines.

Proposed licenses would include everyone who operates a boat of any size—from canoe to cruiser. Today a ten-year-old is not allowed to drive a car on Texas highways for two very sensible reasons—he is not physically able to handle the machine, and he does not have the experience and judgment to react promptly in an emergency.

Yet this same ten-year-old youngster can commandeer a 220 H.P. inboard loaded with kids of all ages and drive on a crowded lake at full throttle and be within the law. Such wild and dangerous acts must be prohibited, as should many other unsafe practices by young and old alike.

Check your area for members of the Coast Guard or the Auxiliary—or any group offering instructions in boating (be they civic clubs, chambers of commerce, boy or girl scouts, FFA, etc.) and sign up for their training program. Enroll your entire family—and be ready for the mandatory exam that's bound to come.

## Your Social Security

One out of every 14 college students in the United States receives social security benefits, according to J. M. Talbot, social security manager. These benefits are paid to full-time unmarried students between 18 and 22 who are children of retired or disabled parents receiving social security benefits, as well as those surviving a parent who worked under social security enough to be insured under the program, he explained.

Although the students may continue receiving benefits throughout a summer of non-attendance between semesters, Mr. Talbot added, the benefits end if the student's school attendance drops below full-time during the college year.

A college or university load of at least 12 semester hours is considered full-time, Mr. Talbot said. Attendance at a business, technical, or high school of at least 20 hours weekly is also considered full-time, he added.

All social security student beneficiaries must notify social security if their school attendance is reduced, he said, to avoid an overpayment of benefits that would have to be repaid.

Retiring workers are advised to call on the Social Security Administration two or three months before retirement in the payment of benefits, according to J. M. Talbot, social security manager. "Early application for social security benefits will enable us to attend to details necessary in the processing of

a claim," he said. "Everyone should apply for Medicare two or three months before age 65 to have the health insurance protection at the earliest possible time," according to Mr. Talbot. Each applicant must furnish some proof of his age and an earnings statement showing the amount he made last year. A self-employed person should furnish a copy of his latest income tax return.

An application may be filed in person or by telephone. For more information, contact the Social Security Office at 3000 West Harris Avenue (P. O. Box 3808) in San Angelo, Texas, or see the representative when he is in your area. Persons who are unable to meet with him are encouraged to call the office in San Angelo. Residents of Winters may call toll free by dialing "Operator" and asking for "Enterprise 2058."

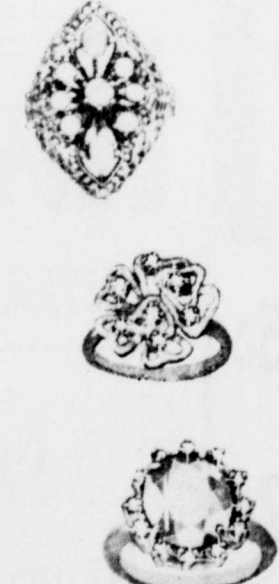

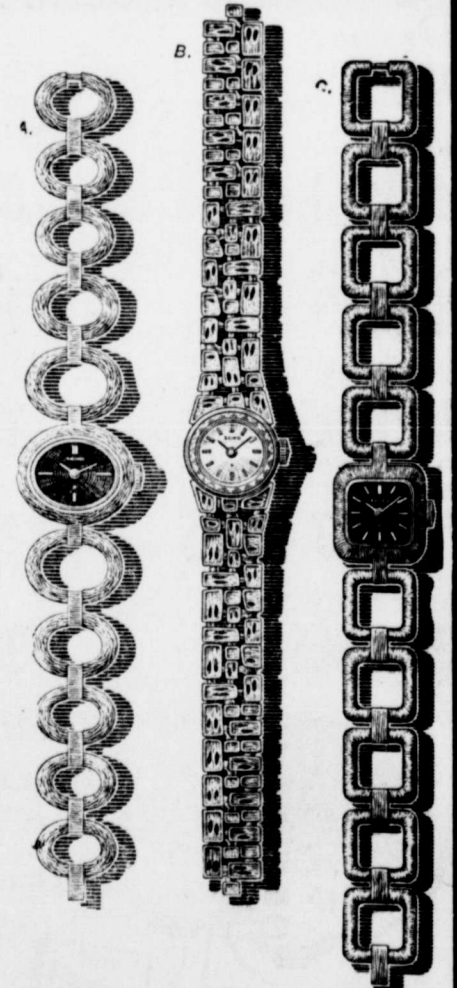

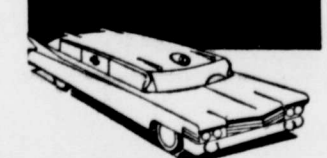
