The 200 people attending the annual Farmer - Businessman banquet of Tahoka Chamber of Commerce Thursday night apparently were pleased with the humor and philosophy of the famed principal speaker, Bob Murphey of Nacogdoches.

His down to earth humor and observations on life delighted the crowd.

Honored at the banquet were Willie A. Nieman of New Home as Conservation Farmer of the year, and Frank Hill as Citizen of the Year.

In announcing Nieman as winner of the annual award, Eual Davis, district soil conservationist, cited the farmer's outstanding achievements in conservation. School dismissed here again this past Friday, because of the flu epidemic. There are still a great number ill. School custodian Oscar Roman was ill this weekend but was back to school Monday.

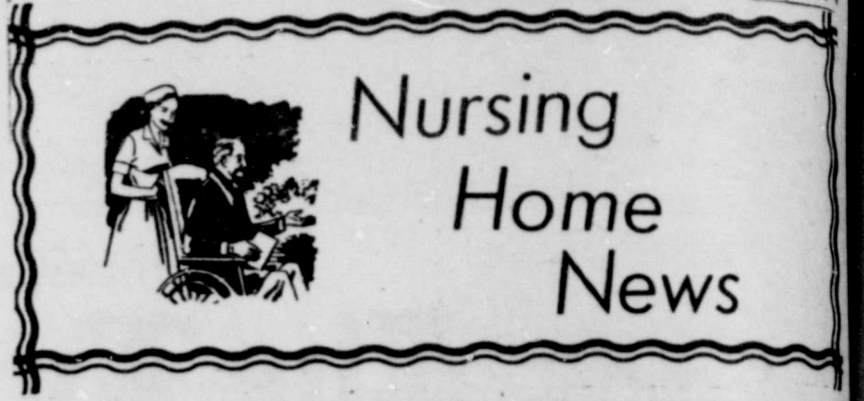

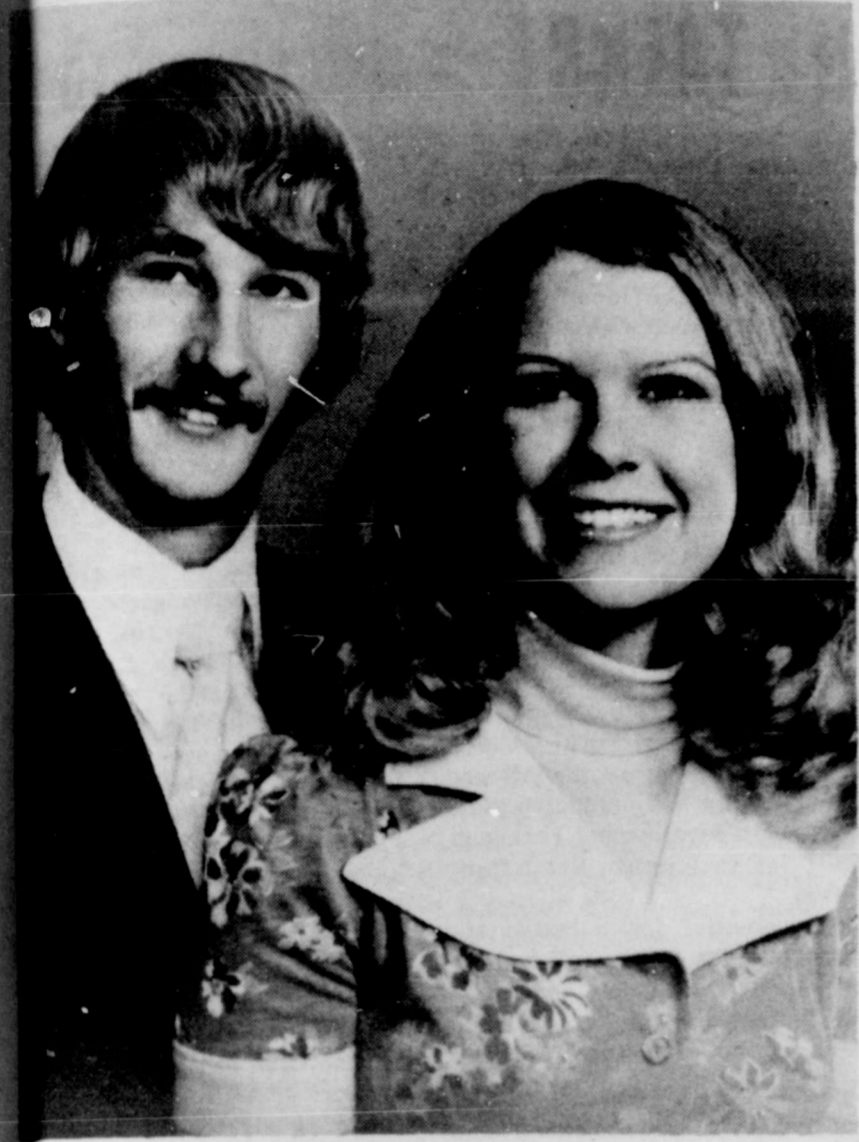
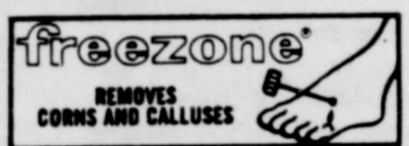
The Edd Akins returned Monday night from Garland where they had visited for about 10 days.

SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

Willie A. Nieman of the Petty community has been selected as the Outstanding Conservation Farmer for 1973 of the Lynn County Soil Conservation District.

Willie became a cooperator with the conservation district in 1954 and has carried out a complete conservation program on his whole farm.

The farm had some old terraces which served a purpose but had several drawbacks which included point rows and no end blocks. These were farmed for several years.

About 1966 Willie became interested in the Great Plains Conservation Program. He signed an application for a contract and in 1967 signed a contract and started work on a three year program.

The Soil Conservation Service was asked to prepare a topographic map of the farm and design a system of parallel terraces. It was found that the old terraces would not fit with the new system and had to be removed or plowed down before installing the new parallel system. Approximately 31,000 feet or 6 miles were built along with a 3,400 foot diversion terrace.

Farming operations are carried out on the contour and his cropping system consists of cotton, grain sorghum, small grains and cotton burs in rotation. Residue is left on or near the soil surface. The contract was carried out under the terms of the contract and was not extended one time, which is unusual.

Not only was Mr. Nieman a good conservation farmer while under the Great Plains contract but he has continued to carry out a good conservation program on his farm and those he leases. Another point to consider is that he has done this in an area of the county where there wasn't very much conservation work carried out. This too, has improved as others see his results and hear his story they are beginning to turn in that direction. It is hard to argue with success and Willie has made a lot of that happen on his conservation farm.

Willie believes in conservation farming, he practices conservation farming, and he talks about it with neighbors and friends. He is a strong supporter of all conservation team in the Lynn County Soil and Water Conservation District.

Tuesday, March 19 is the date set for the seventeenth annual membership meeting of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Lubbock-based High Plains Cotton producer organization. The meeting will begin at 2:00 p.m. at Van's Catering Service on the Slaton Highway just east of Lubbock and is expected to adjourn by about 6:00 p.m. according to PCG President Ray Joe Riley of Hart.

General theme of the meeting will be "Markets for High Plains Cotton," with emphasis placed on what has been, is being and will be done to maximize the advantages of High Plains type cottons in open-end spinning mills and other new textile processing systems under development.

"High Plains cotton producers through PCG have the opportunity to greatly enhance their position in world fiber markets through aggressive research, marketing, and investment in a textile industry right here on the High Plains," Riley said.

The newest commercially proven yarn forming process is open-end spinning, and the opportunities open to High Plains cotton through use of this system will dominate the meeting, Riley announced. He adds, however, that "rapid progress is being made in the perfection of a twistless yarn forming process and a new wave motion loom, and these plus other technological developments still in the experimental stage also hold promise of using shorter staple, lower micronaire cottons more effectively than do systems presently in use."

Texas Tech's Textile Research Center Director James Parker will address the group on how producers through PCG can best utilize the Textile Research facilities at Tech in Pursuit of markets for High Plains cotton in open-end spinning mills. TRC has two open-end spinning frames in operation, plus prototype machine for the new twistless or "Twilo" system.

Atop-level staff member of Cotton Incorporated will outline CI's plans for product development and marketing efforts in connection with new systems. His address will be entitled "Making Cotton the Optimum Fiber for the Textile World of the Future." Cotton Incorporated is the national cotton producer organization supported by "dollar-a-bale" grower contributions supplemented by federal funds. Cotton Incorporated headquarters are in New York "where textile markets are made" and the company has extensive yarn and fabric development research facilities in Raleigh, North Carolina.

The potential for a textile industry on the Plains will be discussed by Paul Cook, a man already deeply involved as president of both Feather Fabrics

and the Textile Investment Group of Texas (TIGOT). Feather Fabrics, financed by local investors in partnership with a Dutch textile firm, Nijverdal-Ten Cate, in June will be installing machinery for an open-end spinning plant in Lubbock. Production from 2400 spindles is expected to begin late in the Fall of this year. TIGOT is a group of area people who own rights to the "Twilo" system.

Following the formal address the three speakers will serve as a panel for answering questions from the audience. In addition President Riley and Executive Vice President Donald Johnson will give reports to the membership on PCG activities of the past year.

The PCG annual meeting is normally held in the Fall of the year, but was postponed until March this year to avoid interference with early harvesting operations during the excellent weather on the Plains in October, November and December, Riley explained.

Following the membership meeting the PCG Board of Directors will meet at the Carriage

Farm Bureau News

The Lynn County Farm Bureau has asked Congressman George Mahon and Senators John Tower and Lloyd Bentsen to use their influence in permitting wage and price controls to expire April, 30.

The Economic Stabilization Act, authority for federal wage and price controls, is due to expire April 30, 1974.

In a letter to the Texas Senator and Congressman Mahon,

the local county Farm Bureau president, Charlie Beckham of Lynn County, said that wage and price controls had failed.

He pointed out that the Consumer Price Index has risen 13 percent wholesale prices advanced more than 20 percent and numerous shortages have developed since the price controls went into effect August, 1971. He added that the energy crisis has been made worse by price controls.

The county farm leader mentioned instances where shortages have affected local farmers and ranchers. This included items like baling and fencing wire and other farm equipment.

Mr. Beckham also pointed to the ill-fated attempt last year

to control beef prices. He said this only created chaos in the industry - and shortages at the meat counter.

Charlie said that controls do not work because they do not strike at the root causes of inflation - deficit spending by the federal government. He also pointed out that controls act as a ceiling on profits and lead to shortages - which add to inflationary pressures.

"The people of Texas have always responded generously to helping the handicapped, and I feel certain they will make it possible to increase Easter Seal services to crippled Texans throughout the coming year," Eudy said.

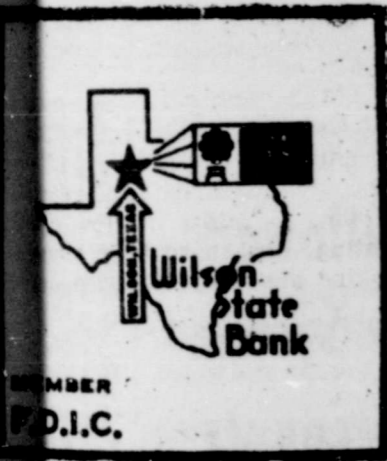



Carolyn Haley Says...

March is Nutrition Month and a good time to let good nutrition practices help you save money.

Scientists have helped by developing a guide, the Four Food Groups, to help you choose wisely. When foods are chosen from these four food groups it is possible to get all the nutrients necessary for good health without knowing about amino acids, or polysaccharides or any of the complicated chemical reactions that go on the body. The foods within a food group are similar in the nutrients they supply, so you can choose many different foods each day and still follow the four food groups. Since there are many foods in each group, you can follow the guide and save money by choosing lower cost items in each group.

The meat group includes pork, lamb, veal, poultry, fish, beef and meat substitutes such as eggs peanut butter or dried beans. Everyone needs two servings of

popular cuts of meat, variety meat group foods each day. Less meats, fish, poultry and dry beans can be nutritious moneysavers.

The milk group is a favorite with time and money conscious consumers. The milks, cheeses, ice-creams, and custards found in this group are usually quick to fix, moderate in cost and always nutritious. Everyone needs at least two servings from this group each day but children, teenagers, pregnant and nursing mothers need more than two servings each day. Instant non-fat dry milk and processed cheese are two economical choices in this group.

The fruit and vegetable group also gives you many choices. Wise consumers will choose canned or frozen forms of fruits and vegetables that are "out-of-season" in the early spring. For example, canned tomatoes or frozen strawberries might be better choices than the fresh produce. Cabbage, carrots, sweet

potatoes and grapefruit should be "in-season" in the early spring and make good choices for consumers who want fresh produce. Everyone needs four servings of fruits and vegetables each day.

The bread and cereal group also offers many choices for the penny wise consumer. All kinds of enriched or whole grain breads, cereals, spaghetti, macaroni, rice and tortillas are in this group. Everyone needs four servings from this group. Enriched white bread and cooked cereals are good choices when you consider cost and nutrients.

Other foods like candy, soft drinks, and fats may be used to round out meals and fatten food bills. Wise consumers will let nutrition help them save by choosing foods from the four food groups.

RECIPE OF THE WEEK
Liver and Creamed Vegetables
 4 cups thinly sliced potatoes
 2 cups thin sliced carrots
 2 cups sliced onions
 butter or margarine
 1 lb. sliced beef liver, cut into 5 serving pieces
 1/2 cup all-purpose flour
 1 tablespoon salt
 2 cups milk

About 1 1/4 hours before serving: In covered 4 quart saucepan over medium high heat, in 1 inch boiling water, cook potatoes, carrots and onion 10 minutes; drain well. Meanwhile, in 12 inch oven-proof skillet over medium heat, in 2 tablespoons hot butter or margarine, cook liver until browned on both sides; remove from skillet.

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. To drippings in skillet, add 1/4 cup butter or margarine; melt. Stir in flour and salt until blended. Gradually stir in milk and cook, stirring constantly, until mixture is thickened.

Gently stir potatoes, carrots and onions into sauce. Arrange liver on top of mixture. Cover skillet and bake 30 minutes or until hot and bubbly. Makes 5 servings.

BILL GRIFFIN SAYS



Using a mulch in the home garden will go a long way toward insuring high yields of fresh, nutritious and tasty vegetables.

Mulches can be composed of many materials, including straw, leaves, hay, sawdust, wood shavings, compost, paper and plastic sheeting. If organic mulches such as hay or compost are used, apply the material around the base of growing plants to a depth of two to three inches. Apply mulches such as black plastic or paper before planting but after fertilizing and watering. Do not use mulches on dry or cold soils, the agent warns.

Properly used mulches have many benefits. They will conserve moisture by reducing the evaporation rate from the soil. They also provide for a more uniform soil temperature which will result in more rapid and healthy plant growth.

One of the most important advantages of mulching is that it helps control most weeds. This

reduces the time and labor involved in weeding the garden plot. However, use care to make sure that the mulch material you use is itself weed free.

Another important advantage of mulching is that it will reduce losses caused from fruit rot. A considerable amount of good food is lost because fruit such as tomatoes and cucumbers are allotted to come in contact with the bare ground.

Materials such as cedar chips and wood chips add to the beauty of the landscape along with serving as a mulch. Mulches also improve the soil by protecting it from compaction. Organic mulches worked into the ground will increase the organic matter content of the soil.

When working organic mulches into the ground for your garden, be sure to apply additional nitrogen fertilizer to aid in the decomposition of the additional organic matter.

THE FAMILY LAWYER

Telltale Gamma Rays

Police scientists, working on an assault case, checked the gamma rays emanating from a bit of dirt taken from the victim's sweater. Then they checked the gamma rays from dirt on the suspect's trousers.

The rays matched—and the evidence later helped to send the man to prison.

The case illustrates a potent new weapon ("neutron activation analysis") in the fight against crime. Gamma rays, under proper conditions, can reveal whether any two objects—no matter how small—came from the same source. The gamma rays are brought into action by "charging" the objects with radioactivity.



Already, the method has been used to track down the source of everything from paint to pipe fittings, from oats to heroin, from hair to moonshine.

Nevertheless, like any new technique, it must be used with appropriate caution in order to qualify the findings as legal evidence.

Thus, in a murder case, comparisons of blood made with gamma rays were held not admissible because technical difficulties made these particular tests less than convincing. The court warned against "the misleading aura of certainty which often envelops a new scientific process."

In one unusual case a taxpayer, claiming a refund from the government, staked everything on a scribbled notation in the margin of his checkbook. The government retorted that he might easily have inserted the notation years after the date of the original entries.

To settle the matter, scientists compared gamma rays from the ink in the notation with gamma rays from the ink in the regular entries. The similarity of the rays convinced the government that the taxpayer was indeed telling the truth.

Result: he collected his refund in full.

Farmcast

678 Is Average... Fertilizer Use Jumps Again... Texas Citrus Prospects Are Reduced.

What's your idea as to the average size of a Texas farm? It could range from a few acres to several hundred thousand. The Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service has made it official: the average size of a farm in Texas contains 678 acres.

That's almost twice the size of the average farm for the nation. As the average size gets larger, the number of total farms in the state and the nation continue to decline, with perhaps an exception for 1974.

Preliminary figures now show that there are 209,000 farms in Texas as of January 1. This is the same number as of January 1 in 1973 and 1972. Fifteen years ago--back in 1959--there were 252,000 farms in the state with an average size of slightly more than 600 acres.

Nationwide, the total number of farms has declined slightly as of January 1 from a year ago. It's estimated there are 2,821,000 farms in the nation now, compared to 2,844,000 in 1973.

Average size of a farm in the nation is 385 acres, an increase of almost 100 acres during the past 15 years.

In Texas, there are 141,800,000 acres in farms; for the nation there is slightly more than a billion acres in farmland.

FERTILIZER use in Texas during 1973 as of June 30 showed a slight increase from 1972. The June 30, 1973 total is 2,556,371 tons of fertilizer compared to 2,514,837 tons in 1972.

Fertilizer is broken down into three categories: mixed fertilizer, primary nutrient, and secondary and micronutrient.

Mixed fertilizer utilized in Texas in 1973 was up four per cent from the 1972 usage.

Primary nutrient fertilizer used in the state was one per cent below 1972.

Secondary and micronutrient fertilizer applied amounted virtually the same in 1973 and 1972.

Nitrogen fertilizer accounted for the biggest use in Texas in 1973.

BASED on February 1 prospects, the 1973-74 citrus crop for the state is forecast at 18,500,000 boxes, which is four per cent below the production of last season.

The February 1 forecast is one per cent less than the January 1 forecast reflecting freeze damage which is now apparent in the Balencia orange crop.

The grapefruit estimated at 11,500,000 boxes and the early and mid-season orange estimate of 4,600,000 boxes is unchanged from a month ago.

Grapefruit harvest was active in January. Harvest of early and mid-season oranges is virtually complete.

COMPLETE details of the experimental program to control predators in 44 Texas counties are now being implemented. The Texas Department of Agriculture is in charge of the program on a state level.

Through the cooperation of the Environmental Protection Agency and several state agencies, the use of the M-44 coyote spring ejection device will be available to eligible producers.

Because of this training, through the Texas Water Utilities Association, the largest water and wastewater training school in the U. S., there are cleaner streams and better operated facilities here than any other section of the country.

He received the certificate only after completing a formal and specialized education, accumulated a prescribed amount of actual work experience, and passed the examination given by the State Health Department's Sanitary Engineering Section.

Our growing concern over clean water makes the water ecologist one of the most important workers in the community. Though his efforts are not seen by those he serves, his results are visible every time one turns on a tap.

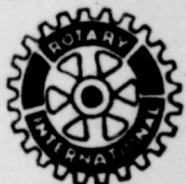

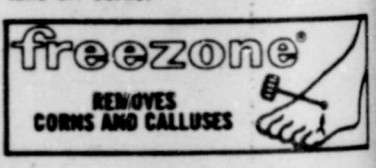
