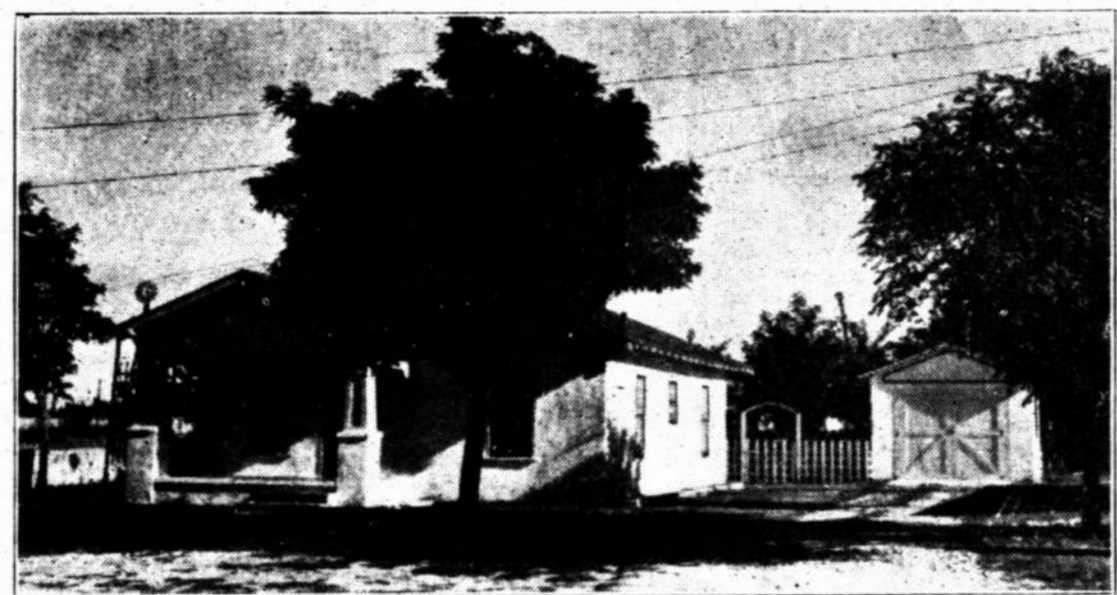

Applications For Tenant Farm Loans Now Being Received In This County

Dawson County has been named by Secretary of Agriculture Henry Wallace as one of the counties in which the Bankhead-Jones Tenant Purchase program will operate during the coming year.

No more than ten tenant farmers or farm laborers will be given loans to purchase farms, announces Seaborn P. Collins, Farm Security Administration county supervisor.

The tenant purchase program is one of the weapons which the Department of Agriculture is using to break up the growing tenancy in the United States. Tenancy has increased steadily in this century until 42 per cent of all the farms in the country are operated by tenants. Tenancy is increasing at the rate of 40,000 farmers each year.

Under the Bankhead-Jones Tenant Purchase Act, tenant farmers, share-croppers and farm laborers may purchase farms with 40-year loans carrying three per cent interest. The Farm Security Administration assists the chosen farmers with the building of adequate farm (Continued on Page Five)

Stanolind Test Creates Much Interest As Well Is Surrounded In Secrecy

The Stanolind Wildcat oil test, being drilled just east of Cedar Lake, is drilling below 4,500 feet today, according to the best information available. This test is being drilled "tight" which simply means that no information is being given out officially.

From observers who have visited the site of the well, it is understood that they are coping practically all the way down, but just what information that has revealed has not been announced. Considerable gas or air pressure is being encountered in the hole, which has a tendency to delay operations.

This well has attracted wide attention among oil men of the Southwest and as long as information was officially given out, the test was running very high, with several stratas of air and gas.

From the best information it is understood that the approximate depth at which pay should be encountered at between 4,500 and 4,600 feet. However, this could not be confirmed.

The well, located just over in Gaines County, is about 23 miles from Lamesa, and is practically on the banks of Cedar Lake.

Spectators, who are forced to stay approximately 200 feet from the well by a wire fence, report that mud and slush are thrown from the well each time the tools are taken out, with enough force to propel it about one hundred feet through the rotary opening.

LOBOS WIN THREE AND LOSE FOUR IN LAST SEVEN STARTS

The Lamesa Lobos, getting the breaks in some games and having them break against them in others, have won three and lost four during the past week. Last Friday night they wound up their three game stay in Lubbock by dropping a heart-breaking ball game, for their third loss in a row to the league leading Hubbers.

Opening Saturday night in a three game series with the Big Spring Barons, the Lobos hit their stride and collected sixteen hits for a total of seventeen runs, while Lefty Lucas had the Baron bats silenced most of the way, allowing only two runs to cross the plate.

Sunday afternoon saw the same two clubs hook up in a double-header, with Lefty Millsbaugh doing the honors for the Lobos in the opener. He kept his hits well spread throughout the first eight innings, but wakened in the ninth to allow the bases to fill, with one man down, and the Barons only needing two runs to tie the game. Lucas relieved him and did a beautiful piece of relief jurling. He was rather wild at the start and walked in a run, retiring the next batter on an infield out and striking out the third man to end the game 6 to 5 for the Lobos.

In the nightcap, Paul Reeves did

a beautiful job of hurling for Lamesa, putting the muffer on the Big Spring timber, giving them only three hits and shutting them out 2 to 0. His hurling was a masterpiece, and the first four innings he hurled hitless ball.

Monday night saw the Lubbock Hubbers, arch rivals of the Lobo camp, enter the city for three days. They took the first game Monday night without much effort on their part and a great deal of help from Umpire Zebby Howell, by a score of 9 to 3.

Brownfield Road Gets Attention of State Hiway Dept.

Work On Project To Be Rushed Ahead

Information was received this week by County Judge W. M. Yates from T. H. Webb, assistant State Highway Engineer, that the order has been issued for the completion of grading and drainage structures on the Brownfield Road from five miles northwest of Lamesa to Pumpkin Center.

The estimated cost of this stretch of road will be \$32,400 of which the state highway department will spend \$23,500, the balance to be furnished through WPA.

Oscar Kelly, Commissioner of Precinct 3, stated this week that grading had been completed to the county line on this project and that caliche base would be laid within the very near future.

This road, designated as State Highway 137, has been under construction for the past several months and approximately five miles has been completed and topped. It will connect Lamesa and Brownfield with a direct road when completed and will fulfill a dream of local highway enthusiasts, who have worked long and diligently for this project.

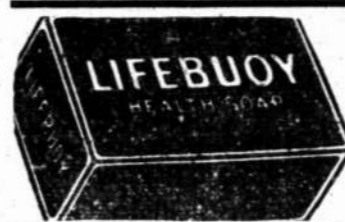

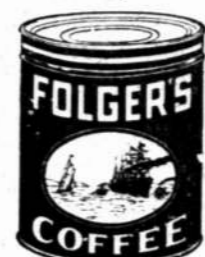

Cotton Classing Office Sought

Such an office would supplement similar services now available in Texas through classing offices at Austin, Dallas and El Paso.

One Variety Cotton Communities should file applications for Department of Agriculture classing services through Mr. George B. Miller of the Division of Cotton Marketing at Austin. Mahon expressed the opinion that if sufficient applications were filed immediately, the West Texas office would be established.

and home plans which will insure the payment of the loans.

Only farms within Dawson county may be purchased by the farmers, who must also be residents of this county. To keep land speculation out of the picture, several safeguards have been devised by the FSA: the price per acre must be in keeping with its value; the loans may not be repaid completely until after five years; the county committees have the ultimate decision on the farms to be purchased, although the borrower is expected to find the farm which he prefers to buy.

A high standard of farming ability is required by the FSA in the applicants for loans. It is preferred that they be men under middle age, with families, who have had extensive farming experience. They must have good character and reputation in their communities, and have their own livestock and equipment.

Applications may be filed at the Farm Security Administration office in the Courthouse at Lamesa, Texas, beginning August 1, 1939.

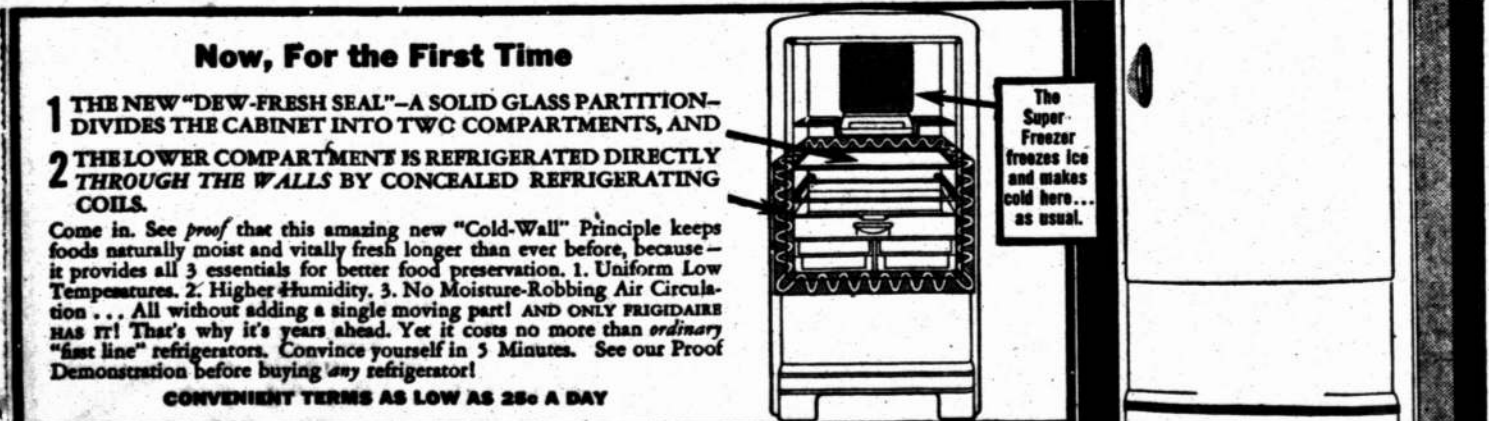

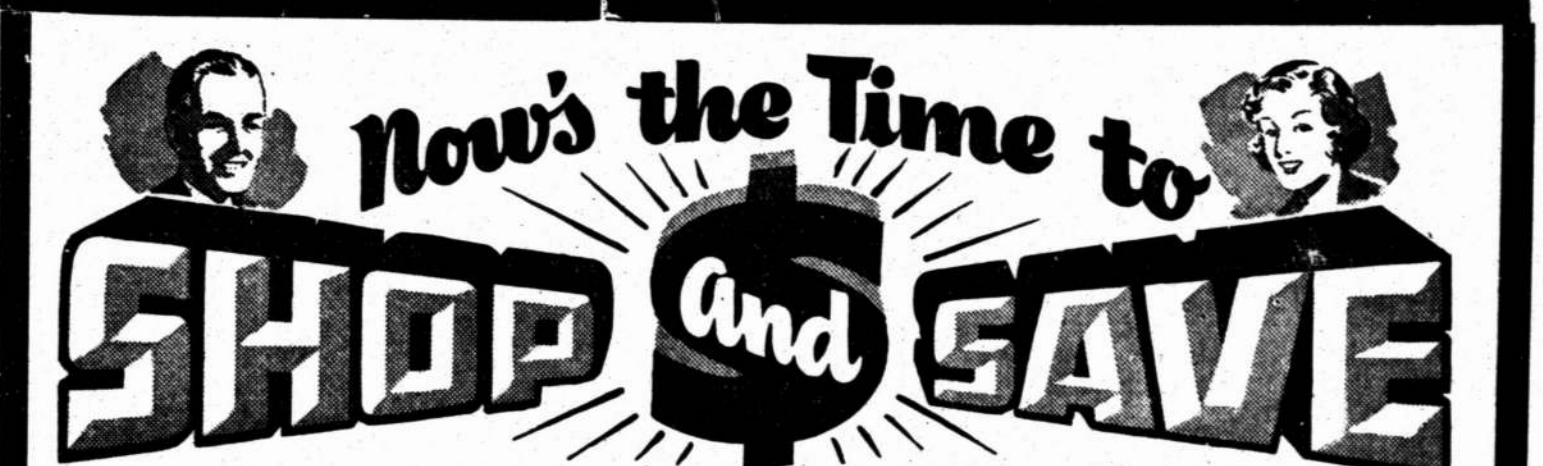
